There were many such "rafts" on the lower basin last week, and they varied from several to several hundred birds. Some live on Lake Mead all year, but many additional Grebes arrive in the fall and winter.

They are fascinating to watch. Because of their manner of div-ing from sight they are frequently known as "Hell-divers", and because of their evasive tactics, especially around shoreline vegetation in other lakes, they are called "water-witches."

Besides being able to dive, they are able to sink below the surface with hardly a ripple by merely expelling air from their lungs and air sacks. Frequently, you will see them swimming near the surface with only their heads in the air.

Wings of Grebes are short and weak. The lobed feet are excellent for swimming, however, and for greater efficiency the legs are located far back on the body. The plumage is soft, compact and smooth, which minimizes water friction. Therefore, he is an excellent swimmer and uses swimming and diving for
