# \$6 Million School Bond Issue Would Cost City \$10,000 Per Year, Average Citizen \$5.20

The proposed \$6 million school bond issue, if passed, will require a first year tax rate of about 9 cents for each \$100 of assessed valuation in Clark County, it was reported by Chester T. Sewell, President of the Clark County School Board.

Repayment of these bonds will cost the owner of a home with an average assessed valuation of \$4,000 from \$3.60 to \$5.20 per year and according to City Auditor Don Dawson will cost the City of Henderson \$10,000 per year in ad valorem taxes.

At the present time this city has an assessed valuation of \$11-million and receives \$170,500 annually in ad valorem tax

## Morrell Asks How And Where The School Bond Money Will Be Used

I believe the School Board should tell the people how and where their money is going to be spent before asking them to approve another \$6 million school bond issue, Councilman Frank Morrell told the HOME NEWS yesterday.

After is the most important. "I hope that the School Board will see fit to assure Henderson day classes will be maintained and the necessary monies to accomplish this goal will be reserved prior to the passage of this \$6 million bond issue."

"I am in favor of school bonds," he said, "my point of objection is the method used in asking for the \$6 million. I believe the School Board should have a definite and publicized construction program, specifically showing us where the money is to be spent.

Morrell pointed out the many residential tracts being built on the outskirts of Las Vegas and North Las Vegas as though questioning whether Henderson, which is growing more slowly, might be left holding the bag after helping pay the freight for the bond issue.

"I believe everyone in Henderson should feel as I do, that the Henderson School System must be provided for so that we do not have to degenerate to half-day sessions.

"According to Loyal Burkholder, area supervisor, unless we get one elementary school for the opening of the 1962 school year it will be necessary to go on half days in some grades.

"As the situation stands—we do not know whether we will get the school or not. We are told that the money will be spent in the most critical areas of need.

"This raises the question of whether an existing half-day school area is more critical than an area that will become a half-day school area if additional facilities are not provided. Obviously, we should feel that the

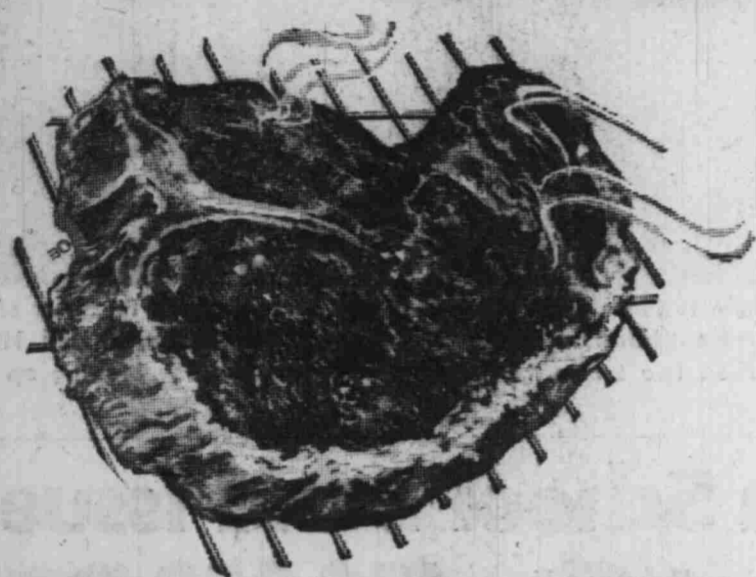

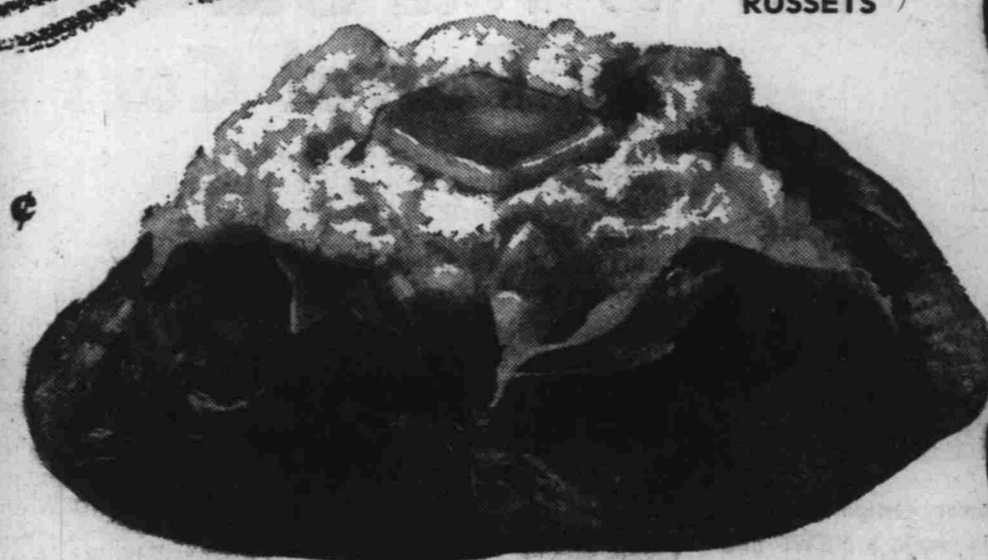

# State Title Bout In Store For Middle eight Perkins

Local middleweight Freddie Perkins, who recently defeated previously unbeaten John Payne, has been assured a crack at the Nevada middleweight crown by the State Commission.

Pat Winters, Perkins' manager, told the HOME NEWS this last night. No definite date has been set as of yet for the title scrap with state champ Roxelle Mosley. "The National Boxing Association requires a state

champ to defend his title every 6 months," says Winters. Last title defense for the current champ was close to 2 months ago.

With a championship bout on his mind, Perkins will be at his best when he tangles with Las Vegas' Billy Smith at the Convention Center Monday night. Perkins and Smith will clash in a 6 round semi-windup match on the Ray Pacheco-Manuel Magallanes card.

Another incentive for the lo-

cal boxer is revenge. Smith decided Perkins early in both of their careers. The Las Vegas puncher has won 8 of his 10 matches, while Perkins has 7 wins, 3 losses, and one draw. Neither boxer has knocked out

any opponents. Smith is a "Stand-up" type fighter known for his counter punching, while Perkins is the harder puncher of the two.

"Freddie has fought more experienced boxers than Smith and I think I got the best middleweight in the state," remarks Winters. "I'm not talking through my hat either. Marv Jensen, manager of middleweight champ Gene Fullmer, told me the same thing after Freddie whipped Payne," adds the local manager.

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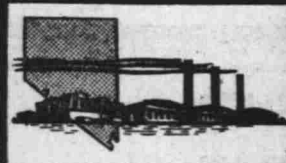

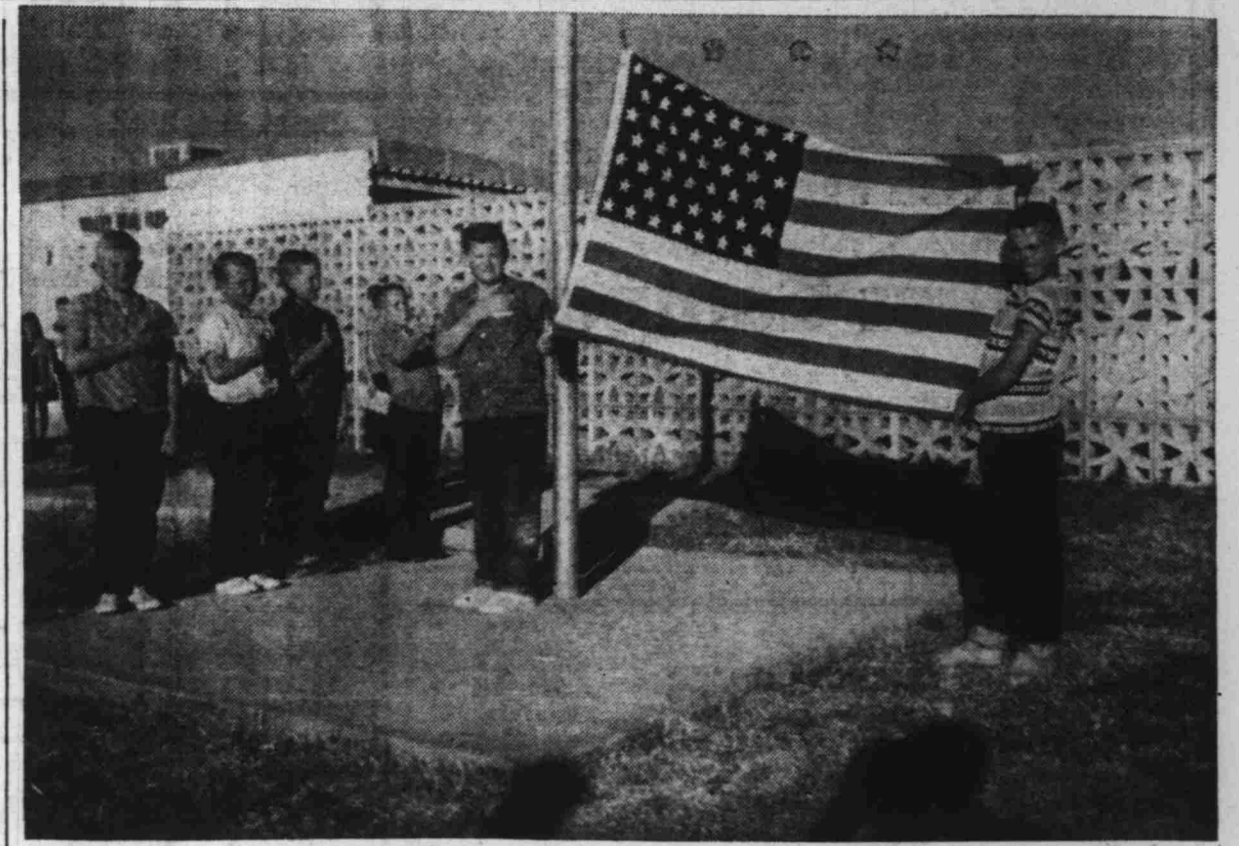
Phyllis Zander, Sr. Vice-President, who presided in the absence of President Pearl Froman made the presentation.

## I COVER THE DESERT

As our boat approached the large group of water birds floating on Lake Mead last week, there was a sudden slight rippling on the water as the birds dove beneath the surface. This immediately identified them for us, because if these had been ducks or Coots, they would have flown. These birds were Grebes.

There were many such "rafts" on the lower basin last week, and they varied from several to several hundred birds. Some live on Lake Mead all year, but many additional Grebes arrive in the fall and winter.

They are fascinating to watch. Because of their manner of diving from sight they are frequently known as "Hell-divers", and because of their evasive tactics, especially around shoreline vegetation in other lakes, they are called "water-witches."

Besides being able to dive, they are able to sink below the surface with hardly a ripple by merely expelling air from their lungs and air sacks. Frequently, you will see them swimming near the surface with only their heads in the air.

Wings of Grebes are short and weak. The lobed feet are excellent for swimming, however, and for greater efficiency the legs are located far back on the body. The plumage is soft, compact and smooth, which minimizes water friction. Therefore, he is an excellent swimmer and uses swimming and diving for

evading enemies rather than fly-

There are several species of Grebes on Lakes Mead and Mohave. The largest is the Western Grebe with its long, slender neck. He is all black and white. The top of his head, back of neck and back are black. The underparts are white. He has a long, slender, yellow bill.

The smaller Grebes are the Eared, Horned and Pied-billed.

You will enjoy watching the Grebes as they dive when your boat approaches and reappear again behind you.

# Former NEWS Columnist To Show Oil Paintings Here

Ona Mae Edwards of 106 Continental Street is contemplating a local showing of her oil paintings in the near future.

After graduation from high school she took private lessons which have been continued intermittently throughout the years. She has lived and painted in New Mexico, Arizona, and Nevada since leaving her native state.

Although she has always loved nature and enjoyed trying to capture her ever-changing moods on canvas, Mrs. Edwards says she never really appreciated what a wonderful privilege it is to view this beautiful world of ours until after she went blind.

Ona Mae and her husband, Glen, were living in Alamogordo, New Mexico when she lost her sight from glaucoma in 1949. She had no idea her eyes were affected by this disease until she woke up one morning blind.

After six months of treatments she was fitted with double lens glasses which, she says, looked like binoculars. With these she was able to resume some of her normal activities. More than a year later she was fitted with single corrective lenses and today has normal vision with glasses.

Painting was neglected during the years she was working toward restoring her vision as her eyes demanded frequent rest periods and she found that any kind of close work tired them.

From 1957 to 1959, Mrs. Edwards worked as a columnist for the HOME NEWS. She wrote two columns, "Your Neighbors and Mine," a Valley View news column, and "Lake Mead Anglers and Anchors," which was bylined "Mack Eddy," and concerned fishing and boating on Lake Mead.

Her budding journalistic career ended in September 1959 when she became ill after eating a tainted hamburger sandwich. It was almost a year and a half before she completely overcame the results of the ptomaine poisoning and many more months before she was able to resume her accustomed routine.

During her convalescence, her husband suggested that she might enjoy painting since she was confined to the house most of the time. She started rather skeptically and with only a few art supplies as her art work had been neglected for so many years.

Once she started painting, she found she enjoyed it even more than in former years and during the last eight months she has completed more than 30 pictures.

Most of these are desert scenes of places she has visited including the Valley of Fire, Sunrise Mountain, Lake Mead, Blue Diamond, Red Rock Canyon, Death Valley and some places in Arizona and New Mexico. She also has several seascapes.

In addition to painting, she and her husband, who is assistant fire chief at Mercury, enjoy boating and fishing and trips through the surrounding area—especially on dirt roads leading to remote places seldom seen by the general public.

## COURT ACTION

### Youth Forfeits \$40 For Not Appearing In Court Tuesday

A 17 year old Pittman youth had bail totaling \$40 forfeited for failing to appear in Municipal Court Tuesday, Judge George Treem presiding.

The youth had posted \$15 bail on a charge of doing 60 in a 45 mile zone. He was also charged with not having his Nevada operator's license in his possession and had put up a \$25 bail for this count.

James Rattner, 34, also had his bail forfeited for not appearing in court on a speeding charge. Rattner was accused of doing 60 in a 45 mile zone.

Robert Lattin, 22, pleaded guilty to charges of speeding and not having his Nevada operator's license in his possession. The defendant was fined \$15 concerning the speeding charge and the license case was dismissed.

A bail of \$5 was forfeited when 51 year old William Mason Sever did not appear in court on a charge of disregarding a stop sign.

Pleading guilty to another charge of disregarding a stop sign was Elnora B. Williams, 26. She paid a \$5 fine and told Judge Treem that she slowed down but did not make a complete stop. The Judge referred to her 'stop' as a "California Stop."

A no Nevada operator's license in possession charge was dismissed against 39 year old Ernest Richard Corbell. The defendant stated he was supposed to go to Texas but decided to stay here and since has received his license.

Trial concerning Robert C. Cadwallader, 43, was postponed until Nov. 14. His \$300 bail bond still stands dealing with a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence. Cadwallader pleaded not guilty to the charge and requested the postponement.

Wentworth R. Perry Jr., 31, pleaded not guilty to charge of vagrancy, dated Oct. 23. Judge Treem set his bail at \$50 and the trial is set for Nov. 14. He was in custody of the police.

An assault and battery charge was dropped against Claude Hicks. The case was dismissed when the complaint signee did not appear in court.

### Carver Park Resident Guilty of DUI

Daniel Valles was found guilty of driving under the influence in Municipal Court Tuesday, but the defendant requested a delay in sentencing. His sentence will be given on Nov. 7.

Valles, who pleaded not guilty to the charge, told the court that a fish breakfast he ate made him sick and that he wasn't driving under the influence shortly after noon on Sept. 23.

However two police officers testified that it appeared the Carver Park resident was under the influence.

One policeman told the court that he was radioed to be on the lookout for Valles' auto. Valles was spotted going south on Boulder Highway by the Water St. Extension. The officer stopped him as the defendant pulled into the gas station at the Market Town shopping center.

According to the officer, Valles appeared unsteady and gave the policeman an argument when the officer asked him to come along to the police station. Two of Valles' children were in the car with him.

Valles, who defended himself, told the court that he had taken the kids rabbit hunting in the desert and that he certainly would not have gone with his children if he had been drinking.

One of the officers told the court that Valles had breath denoting he had been drinking, but Valles claimed that it was from the day before, when he had some drinks.

Valles had to be warned by Judge Treem a couple times in court about pleading his side of the case when he was supposed to be asking the two officers on the stand questions.

A \$300 bail bond remains standing until the sentencing takes place.
