

# IT'LL TAKE PHILADELPHIA LAWYER TO SOLVE CITY'S SEWER PROBLEM!

## EDITORIAL

ADVERTISING for Henderson's main thoroughfare, Boulder highway, has for several years been considered too expensive a project for the City to undertake, so Tuesday night's traffic accident which proved fatal to a Henderson woman should not be on anyone's conscience.

THE ACCIDENT occurred while Police were investigating a three car accident—also on Boulder highway, just three or four blocks below where Mrs. Ammons was killed.

Police Officers, whose duty it is to police the area have constantly cried in the dark for someone to provide lighting on Boulder highway before more people are killed, but after little consideration it is always labeled "too expensive." Police Chief George Crisler said, following the accident Tuesday, that it might have been avoided had there been lighting there.

THINKING CITIZENS, who noted the prompt passage of a \$53,000 water line on Vegas Wash Road, might wonder where City Fathers place a value on human lives.

THE EMERGENCY ORDINANCE permitting the water line read: WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Henderson has determined that said water improvement is essential to the benefit of the public health safety and morals and general welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Henderson.

It also goes on to state that the city is not in a financial position to finance the construction of said line or for public bidding because of the state of the City's budget.

SINCE THE CITY COUNCIL'S function is to protect the health and welfare of its citizens, perhaps the Boulder highway project of lighting may, at least, become a topic of conversation.

## Viola Ammons Killed In Wreck; Funeral Tomorrow In Las Vegas

Funeral services for Mrs. Viola Ammons, 55, who was fatally injured in an automobile accident Tuesday night on Boulder Highway, will be held tomorrow at 1 p.m. at the Palm Chapel in Las Vegas.

The Reverend John Oake of the Henderson First Baptist Church will officiate and interment will be in the Wood-

lawn Cemetery.

Mrs. Ammons was killed instantly on her way to pick up her husband Bailey, who works at the Wallgreen drug store on Boulder highway. According to Highway Patrolman Tom Curlin and Henderson Police Officer Pat Maloney, who investigated the accident, Mrs. Ammons had stopped at the stop sign on

Lincoln street approaching Boulder highway.

She waited while an approaching car turned right off Boulder highway onto Lincoln street, and apparently not seeing the truck behind the car, started across the highway in front of the truck.

Curtain said that there were no skid marks, and Mrs. Ammons was thrown 67 feet from the point of impact. The car was knocked 76 feet.

Chief of Police George Crisler said the driver of the sand and gravel truck, Melvin Fox, 31, of 303 Vegas Drive, Las Vegas, would be held for investigation of manslaughter, however, witnesses verified that the accident was unavoidable.

Mrs. Ammons was born November 23, 1907 at Robbinsville, North Carolina. She was a member of the Eastern Star and the First Baptist Church of Henderson.

She is survived by her husband Bailey of 597 Burton street, two sons, John of Canosa Park, California; Dennis of San Diego, California; one brother, Vernon Hooper of Oxford, Kansas; four sisters, Charlotte Sills of Fayetteville, North Carolina; Mrs. Genevieve Rogers and Mrs. Mabel McGuire of Robbinsville, and Winona Wood, of Clenson, North Carolina.

There's going to be some wheeling and dealing necessary before all will be sweetness and light with this city's newly annexed area — Paradise Country Club and surrounding 2,000 acres.

It seems somebody forgot to ask questions, or didn't want to, for lo and behold if our city of Henderson as of this moment isn't going to have to pay .26 per five dollar bill paid in ad valorem taxes for having gone right ahead and annexed the new area, not knowing we were taking in some land already included within the Clark County Sanitation District No. 1.

It seems the city had hoped to make some do-re-mi from sewer connection fees from the 35,000 homes due to be built out there. But now, the sanitation district has first call on the greenbacks, because the law so reads. And, a conference among the powers that be on both sides the other day brought out that the new area cannot back out of the district — and now that the city has annexed it — the law says all of us will be paying 26 pennies out of every five in the District's well-loaded bank account.

The only way out is to make the district put in the 21,000 ft. sewer line from the Boulder Hiway to Paradise golf course. If this can be done, it will save the city about a quarter million.

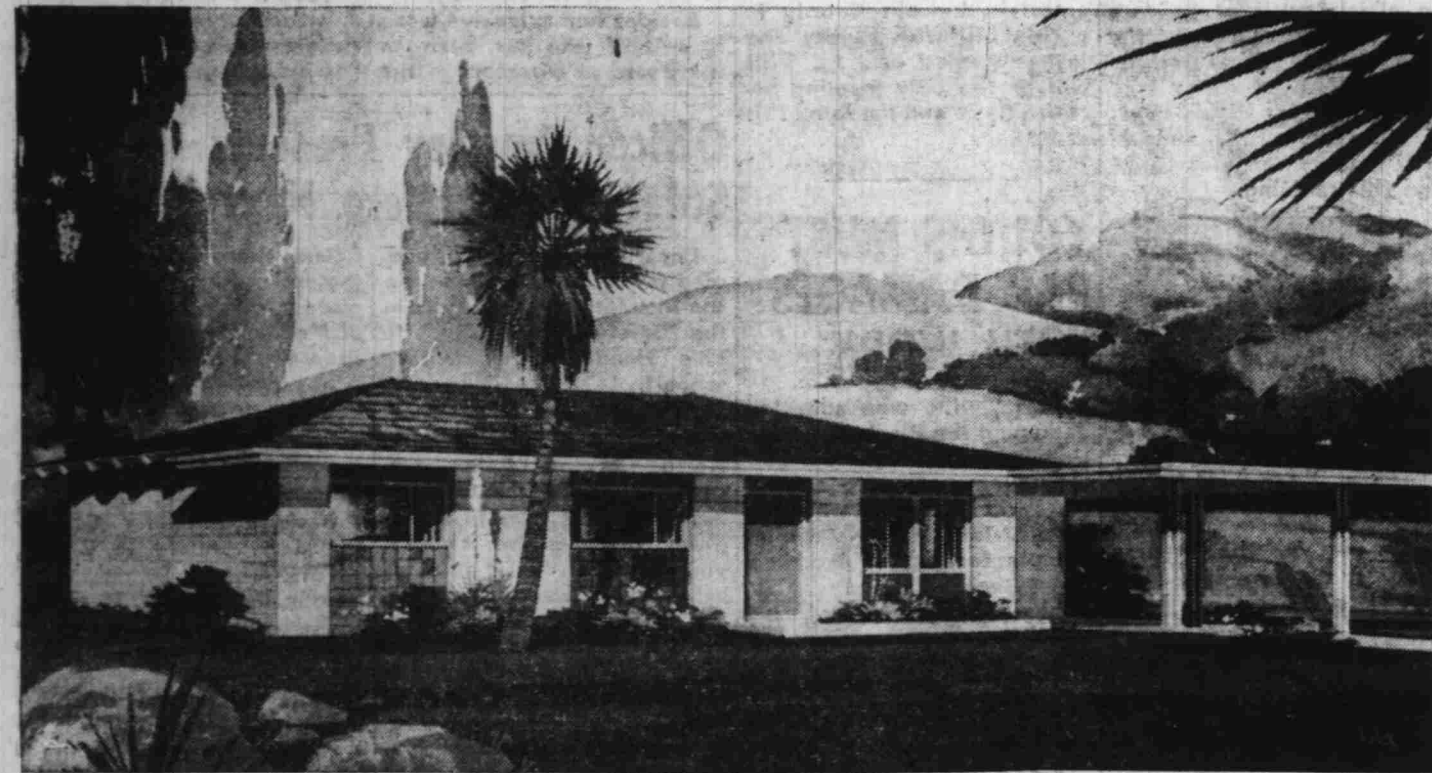
The district says it will — if the Paradise developers put up the cash to do it with — and the District will refund it over a 10 year period.

It so happens Paradise is not about to do it without much fighting — for — it had a better deal with the city — "cause the city wanted to put in the line and pay for it via its land trade plus cash deal with Joe Wells — who has to put in some lines anyway to his Industrial Park.

It could even be the city will sue the District for being placed in such a bind — or Paradise will sue the city or the District for being promised so much — for no down payment — and getting so little. Or — it could be someone will come up with something as a cure-all.

It's going to take the likes of the oft used expression — Philadelphia lawyer — to dig us in or out of this one.

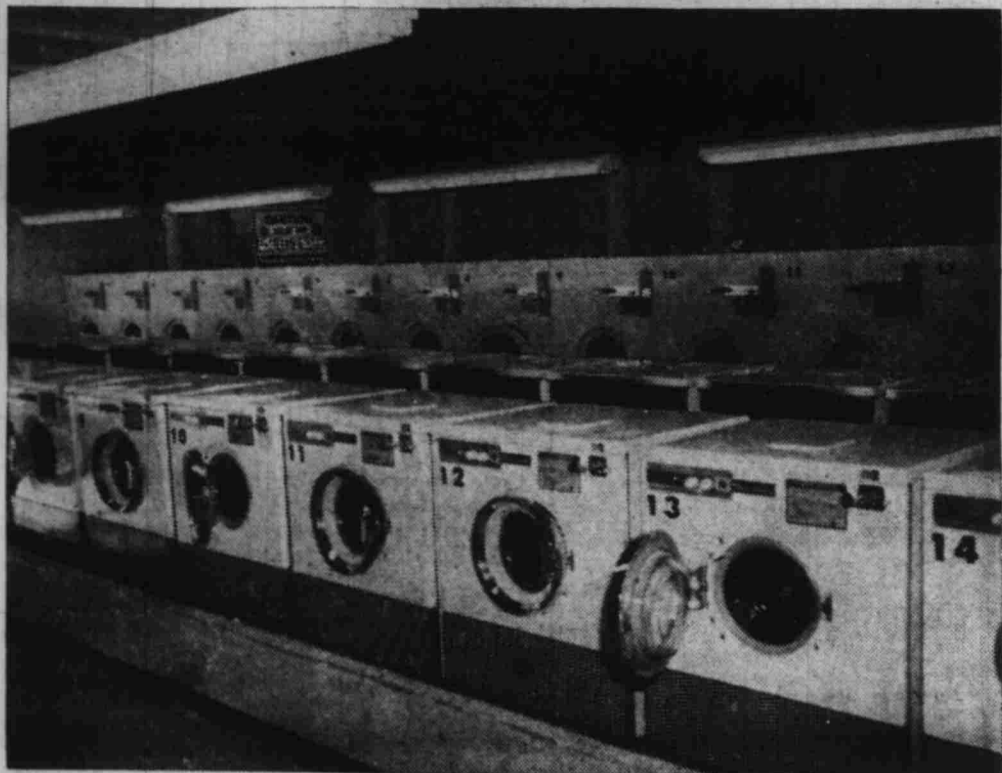
## Georgia Flittner Entertains Church Women

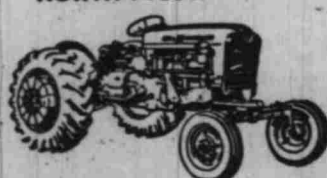

## Demerit System For Suspending Driver Licenses Now In Effect

Chief of Police George Crisler today warned local motorists that the state's newly announced demerit point system of suspending driver licenses of errant motorists went into effect on January 1.

According to Louis Spitz, director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, the department is now levying demerit points against drivers found guilty of certain traffic violations. He warned that any driver accumulating the maximum of 12 points will face possible suspension of drivers license.

The demerit point system, successful in many states, is an "effective tool to tighten driver licensing procedures in this state," said Spitz. It is being adopted by Nevada to beef up its driver improvement program and to remove habitual traffic offenders from the highways, he added.

Under this system, each time a motorist is convicted or forfeits bail for drunken driving, he will be given eight demerit points. Reckless driving will result in six demerits; speeding will bring three; and all other moving violations two demerits.

The Department of Motor Vehicles charges these demerits against the motorist's permanent driving record and any motorist building up eight points within any 12-month period will receive a written warning and be told to appear at the Department of Motor Vehicles office for an interview and counseling on driving practices.

Should the motorist continue to violate traffic laws and accumulate four more points — for a total of 12 — he will be ordered to appear before a DMV hearing officer to show cause why his license should not be suspended.

At this hearing the depart-

ment can take one of three actions:

1. His license may be suspended for from one to 12 months.

2. He may be placed on probation, in which case further violations will result in suspension.

3. His license may be restricted.

Spitz said he is establishing the point system under his authority as the state's motor vehicle administrator under a state law giving him power to suspend the license of any driver believed to be a menace to the public welfare. He will seek legislation in 1963 approved the point system program.

Chief Crisler warned local motorists that every conviction and fine levied in Judge George Treem's Court will be accompanied by demerits chalked up by the Department of Motor Vehicles who receive copies of all convictions and bail forfeitures from Judge Treem.

# Air Pollution One Of Our Nation's Oldest Problems

 Seventy years ago, when this area was still a part of Lincoln County and white habitations in Las Vegas Valley consisted of the Stewart Ranch—now the site of Cashman Field—and the Wilson Ranch in Red Rock Canyon, the study of smog control was started in the City of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Seven years later in 1899 the Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce appointed its first committee on smoke abatement, under the chairmanship of Samuel Dieschner, a noted combustion engineer and prominent member of the Engineers' Society of Western Pennsylvania, which organization had started the study in 1892.

By this time Lincoln County boasted 710 voters; a voting precinct and post office had been established in Mesquite; the Mormons had started reentering the areas abandoned 20 years earlier and life was beginning to stir in the Township of St. Thomas. Gold had also been discovered in the Keystone District at Good-springs.

Nevada at that time had little thought of smog control, the residents being much more interested in whether or not silver would be accepted for coinage, which was later accomplished when President Cleveland retained the Silver Dollar as legal tender.

The findings of the first Chamber of Commerce committee in Pittsburgh stated that "Effective air pollution and smoke abatement work depends on the joint cooperation of the City Council, civic organizations and general public."

After several years of activity by the Chamber, a Smoke Control Ordinance was passed in 1906 and a succession of ordinances and amendments followed, bringing gradual improvements in conditions.

During the years the Chamber of Commerce and other civic groups did much work, under the impression that education in matters of firing, etc., would help to solve the problem. Results were negligible and regulation seemed to be the only answer.

It was almost 50 years after the study of air pollution was started when the first Smoke Abatement program was inaugurated with the passage of a Smoke Control Ordinance in 1941.

In 1949 the first Smoke Control Ordinance was enacted by Allegheny County, Pennsylvania and the City's smoke abatement program was transferred to the County Health Department in 1957.

Dual enforcement of smoke control for the city and county is now in effect and Pittsburgh, aptly described by Charles Dickens in 1842 as "Hell with the lid lifted," now proudly refers to herself as "The Renaissance City of America."

Once known as the "dirtiest city in the world," Pittsburgh

has set her sights on the title of "cleanest city in the world" and this is being accomplished through urban renewal programs and smog control.

Herbert J. Dunsmore, P.E., M.P.H. reports that "Each year for the last 20 years more communities have expressed an interest in Air pollution control. Today there are over 350 full-time agencies at a local level as compared to 175 in 1955."

"Although each community has its own specific air pollution problem depending upon topography and the type of industry, there are some fundamental principles that are common to any air pollution control program. Air pollution control programs must be geared to take into consideration, rural, urban and industrial problems."

Studies in Pittsburgh have shown a need for consideration of meteorological and topographical factors as another dimension in planning and zoning of new industrial sites. For example, a municipal incinerator or gravel plant might better be placed at a high elevation in a sparsely settled area in preference to low land near congested areas.

It was also determined that studies establishing the behavior of pollutants in the air could be used effectively to aid in establishing zoning districts which are favorable to the intended use.

A knowledge of ventilation and air movement would be needed to develop such a plan. Such factors must be taken into consideration in land use planning if air pollution is to be controlled.

Pittsburgh, which was considered a depressed area a few years ago has found that both people and industry appreciate clean air and the city is looking ahead to making greater gains in air pollution control in the future through the reduction of particulate matter from steelmaking and power production.

An increase of 300,000 more people is forecast for Allegheny County by 1975. This new population will result in 100,000 more automobiles, 82,000 more homes, and 2150 acres of new industries.

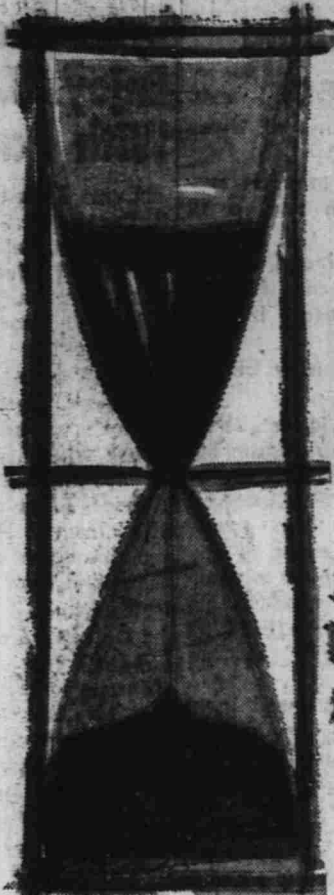
The City of Pittsburgh found it had a considerable amount of catching up to do for past negligence in controlling sources of air pollution in addition to keeping pace with rapidly accelerating expansion of new sources.

In a newer industrial area such as Henderson and Clark County an air pollution control program started now could prevent the type of problem which this Eastern city faced.

Those planning sites for future industries should take advantage of the studies made by Basic Management Incorporated and place smoke, dust and fume producing plants in areas where these pollutants will not blow or drift above residential or other type industrial areas. Pitts-

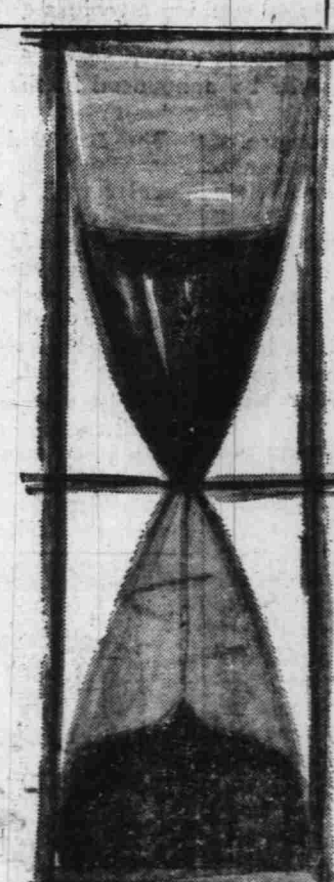

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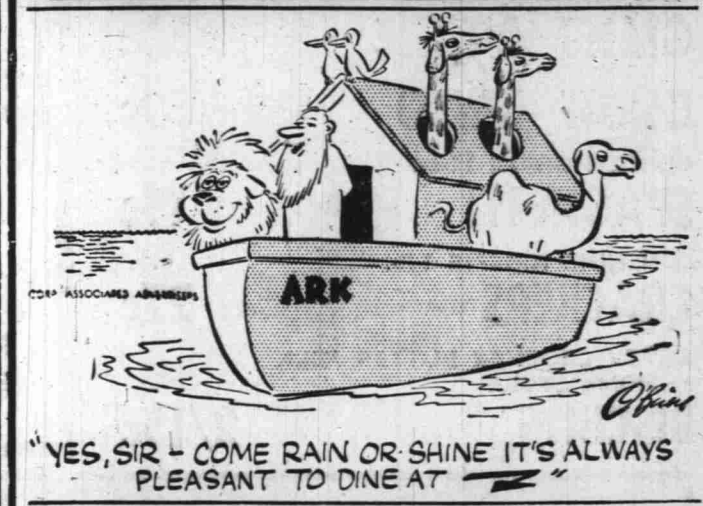

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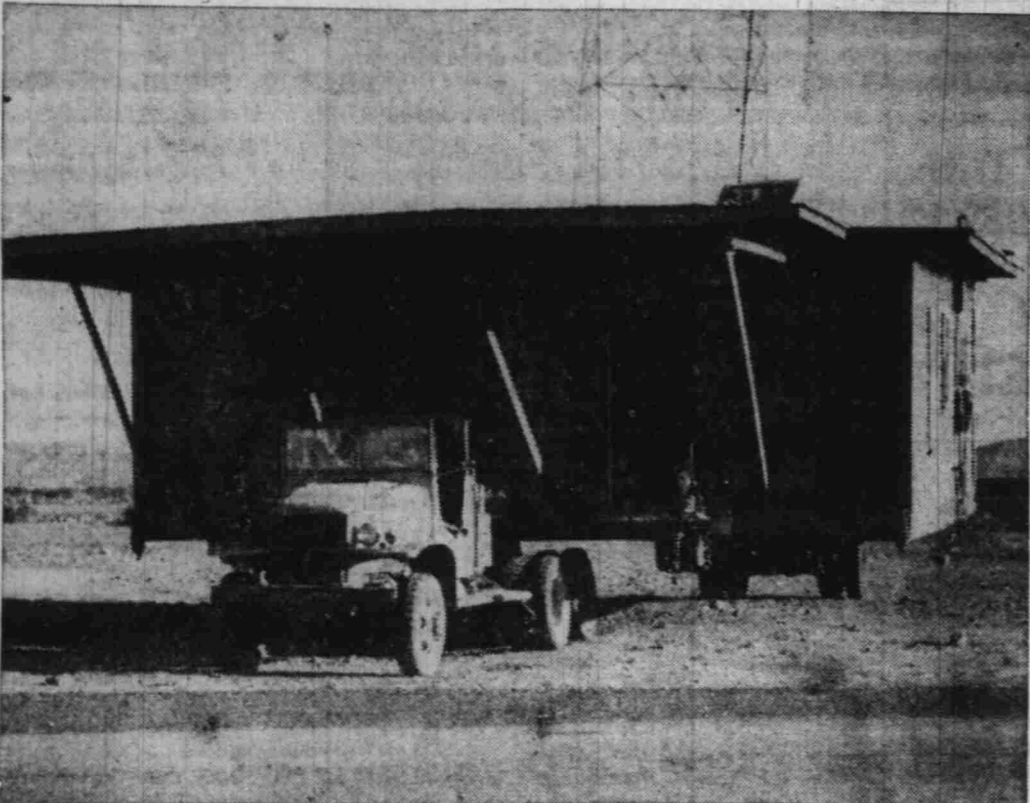

## Juvenile Officials Offer Plan For Teenage Centers

Donal "Mike" O'Callaghan, Clark County Chief Probation Officer, and District Judge David Zenoff this week recommended that each high school in the county establish a clubhouse for teenage recreation activities for after school hours and weekends.

Each such facility would be operated on a rotation basis by the various high school organizations subject to school rules and regulations.

"We have been concerned with the lack of facility for the youth of this area to which it appears too little attention has been paid while a great deal of concentration and expenditures have been made on behalf of those who violate the laws," Judge Zenoff said.

"This disregard of the well behaved should, in our opinion, be discussed, and concen-

tration exerted to improve conditions that are non-existent or at least lacking.

"At the close of school for Christmas holidays a personal experience with a large, well behaved, well dressed group at my house indicated that they are searching for a place to go," the District Judge continued.

"One such facility such as the old Wildcat Lair is not sufficient and would not be feasible for many reasons. However, to divide the facilities territorially per high school, in our view, would disburse the gatherings and still provide the outlets that are deservedly theirs."

A letter setting forth this idea is being sent to all points of interest in Clark County and if reaction to the plan is favorable, Judge Zenoff proposes to call a meeting for discussion to put the idea into effect.

Interested persons who wish to contact Judge Zenoff are asked to state frankly whether they agree or disagree. Those agreeing with modifications or suggestions are asked to say so. No costs are being discussed at this time.

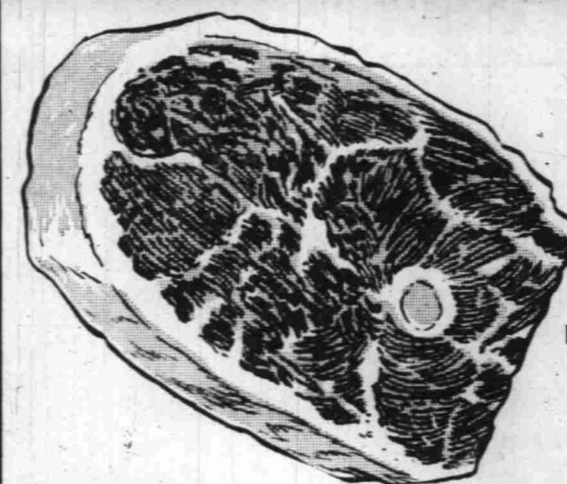

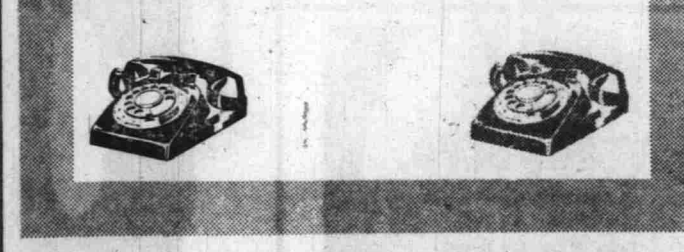

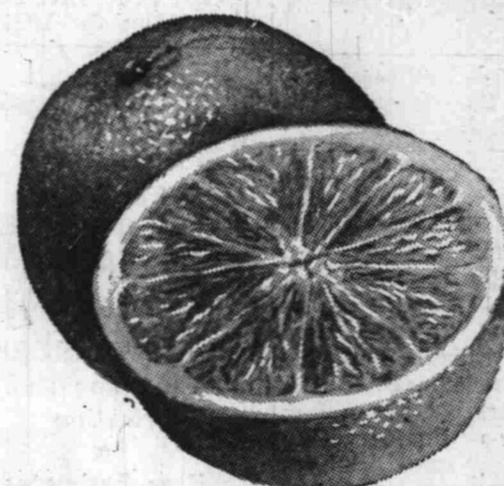

## Marines Seeking Eligible Young Men and Women

SSgt. Bill Soehngen, the local Marine Corps recruiter, announced that the Marines are seeking highly desirable young men, 18 through 28 inclusive. Young women 18 through 30 inclusive are also sought for enlistment. The only requirement for men is that they be able to read, write, and speak English well enough to complete recruit training without additional schooling. Men do not have to be high school graduates, women must have a high school diploma or its equivalent. Parents consent is required for men under 18, for women under 21. Men are given mental tests based on an 8th and 9th grade education, women must pass a high school mental test, both must be in good, sound, physical condition.

Types of enlistments offered by the Marines are a 3 and 4 year general service enlistment, the Buddy-Buddy program, aviation assignment for those interested, and the 120 days delay plan. A recruit applicant with one dependent (wife only) can apply for enlistment, if he meets the requirements. The Buddy-Buddy program affords friends the opportunity of serving together throughout recruit training only. Men interested in aviation, if qualified, will be assigned schools after completion of Combat Infantry Training. All Marines must go through this phase of training before being sent to schools. After completion of recruit training men and women are granted a 20 day leave before reporting to their new duty station or schools. Eligibility for aviation assignment is determined by the score the individual achieves on the mental tests. Marine aviation offers over 200 technical and special skills a man or woman can apply for. For those who desire aviation it is a four year enlistment. Prior service men and women may be eligible for enlistment in the Marine Corps if they can meet the Marine Corps requirements.

The Marines are the only service to offer the 120 days delay program. Any young man who will graduate this coming June 1962, who has no college plans, who wishes to start his six year military obligation to his country can, if he wishes, enlist in March 1962, take the oath to his country, return home to school, at Marine Corps expense, to graduate. He will not receive orders for active duty until 120 days from date of taking oath of enlistment. During this time nothing is required from him, he attends no drills, meetings. If a man

is in this program on his 18th birthday his draft board is immediately notified and he becomes draft exempt. The time in this program counts toward time in service, pay, promotions also, it is 120 days off of the six year military obligation, without doing one day of federal active duty. This delay period gives the applicant time to get his affairs in order before reporting for active duty. Any man can apply for the Buddy-Buddy, 120 days delay program, aviation assignment, even if he elects a 3 or 4 year enlistment.

Any man 17 through 28 inclusive who is a member of the National Guard, The U.S. Army Reserve, The U.S. Naval Reserve can apply for enlistment in the regular, active, Marine Corps, if he meets Marine Corps mental and physical requirements. A conditional release must be granted by the reserve organization to enlist in the Corps. If a member of the reserves is in receipt of orders to active duty from the reserves he is ineligible for enlistment in the Marine Corps. Men who have

been examined under the Selective Service System who are classified 1A are eligible for enlistment in the Corps. Women who are eligible for enlistment can apply for electronics field, aviation technical fields, machine accounting, intelligence, and do have the same benefits as promotions, pay, retirement.

Educational opportunities are unlimited for both men and women who wish to pursue furthering their education while in the activated Marine Corps. All personnel of the Marine Corps are encouraged to attend high school, college courses on off duty time. The Marine Corps education programs offer courses ranging from eighth grade to college level, also courses in which personnel can become more proficient in their military occupational fields.

The Sgt. also stated that there are programs whereby men and women who are full time college students, or who have two years of college, or who have completed college, and have a degree, can gain a commission in the Marine Corps. For those who are full time college students all training takes place during summer college vacations. ## Dam Visitors In 1961 Set Tour Record

During December, 25,605 visitors took the guided tour through Hoover Dam and Powerplant. The year ended with a grand total of 463,868 visitors, the second largest year in the history of the dam, an increase of 6,491 persons over 1960. Daily average for the year was 1,271 visitors.

Noteworthy visitor for the month was William G. East, United States District Judge from Portland, Oregon.

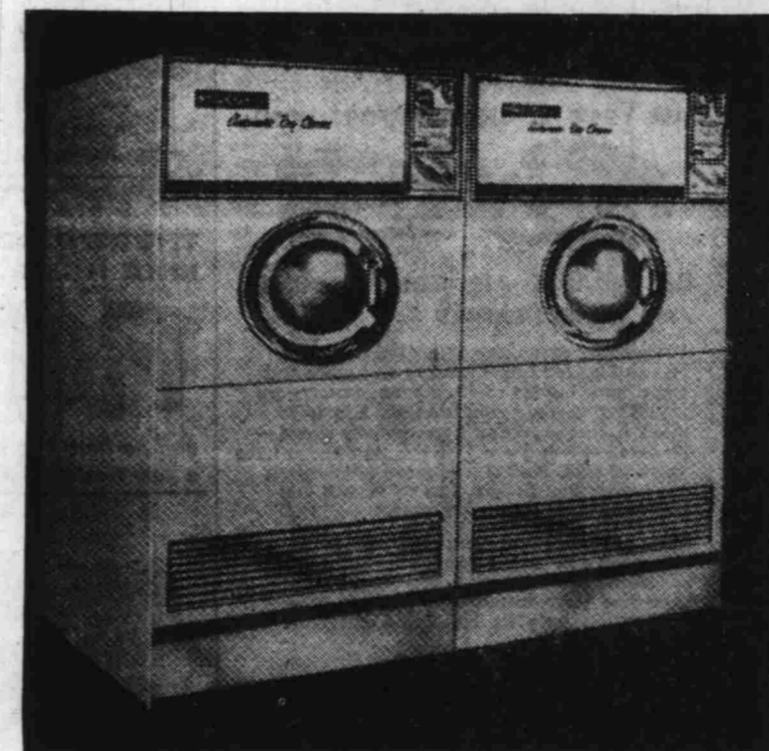

### 50 Members See Gardenier's Film On Roses

Fifty members, from all branches of Desert Gardeniers, saw the movie "Living with Roses" at the Henderson Library Auditorium Monday evening.

The film, in color, had numerous time-lapse sequences of rose buds opening into full bloom. Landscape scenes showed how Hybrid Teas, Grandifloras, Floribundas, Climbers, Pillars, and Tree Roses may be used effectively in the home landscape.

To prune to pillar form cut to an inside eye, for an open spreading bush cut to an outside eye; in either case, have the high side of the slant cut on the eye side. Any pruning of a limb, over a quarter-inch thickness, should be sealed by painting with Tree Seal.

In planting a bare root rose give each root a fresh clean cut, which helps the rose to establish itself more rapidly; also, do not fertilize until after the rose has become well-established. Do plant in soil consisting of three parts good garden loam, one part peat moss, adding a small amount of bone meal.

January is the month, in our area, to prune dormant shrubs and roses to have good blooms for the flower show in April. Tulips, daffodils, and Dutch iris may be planted, now, as well as bare root roses. Iris (tall-bearded) may be planted if already growing in cans. Local nurseries have them available.

Named roses, for the spring show, are: "Peace," "Eclipse," "Comtesse Vandal," "Tiffany," "Chrysler Imperial," "White Knight," "McGregory's Yellow," "Sutter's Gold," "Talisman," "Charlotte Armstrong," "Radiance," and "Sterling Silver." Named Iris are: "Helen McGregor," "Sable," "Zantha," "Pink Camero," "Russet Wings," "Pink Sensation," "Desert Song," and "Lady Mohr."

Under consideration are named daffodils, which will probably be, "Mt. Hood," "Twink," and "Scarlet Leader." Additional classes are being planned for potted house plants.

"There is no better way to develop an appreciation for plants than to grow them for show purposes. There are few better ways to teach children plant behavior, responsibility, and good sportsmanship than to encourage them to grow and exhibit show specimens," the Gardeniers said. "When you buy that bare root rose, get one for your child to tend as well."

## MEXICO TO RECEIVE MORE RIVER WATER

Agreement has been reached with Mexico that it will without increasing its total allotment schedule larger than normal deliveries of Colorado river water in January and February 1962 as a means of reducing the salinity of the water currently being delivered to farms in the Mexicali Valley," the Departments of State and Interior announced jointly today.

"In so doing Mexican authorities have requested and the United States has agreed that the Republic of Mexico be permitted discretion in modifying the February schedule of water deliveries on shorter notice than the 30 days or by

more than the 20 percent that are mentioned in the Mexican water treaty. Other provisions will not be affected.

"Both governments reserve their legal positions under the treaty and in the spirit of mutual good will and understanding which has traditionally existed between the United States and Mexico will enter at once into intensive discussions seeking to resolve all questions at issue and to explore every possibility of removing the basic problem for the future.

"The United States section of the International Boundary and Water Commission and the Bureau of Reclamation of the Department of the Interior have a joint administrative responsibility in operation of the river in such a manner as to discharge the obligations of the Mexican Water Treaty. The arrangement will in no way affect the rights of United States users of Colorado River water.

"With increased irrigation development along the lower Colorado river and with extremely low runoff on the River-S watershed during the past several years the flow of the Colorado River below Imperial Dam during this winter gradually has become more salty. Mexico's previous schedule for the winter months was the minimum permitted under the treaty thereby requiring no releases of stored water from upstream reservoirs for mixing and diluting the low flow."

## Wide Angles

It often shakes up people from the East to see how easily things get named around here — I mean like hills, canyons, springs or unusual rock formations.

All you have to do is pick an object you like, preferably one that isn't already on a map, and apply your favorite name. The screwier it is, the better will be your chances of making it stick. But the real secret is to use your new name often, and with complete confidence. If you keep doing this with a perfectly straight face, and an anybody-who's-lived-in-Nevada-over-a-week-ought-to-know-THAT attitude, you can't miss.

Sooner or later some map-maker will inquire locally about your pet pinnacle. And the chances are excellent that he'll hear the handle you've applied to it from several people. It will get jotted on his worksheet.

Usually Government map-makers send their preliminary sheets back to local areas for checking. If your pinnacle's new name has really soaked into the community, it'll pass even this inspection.

But beware of name some choice spot after a living person — it'll never get by the eagle eyes of the Board of Geographic Names. Theoretically, if you want to name a canyon for a friend, you must either liquidate the guy or use a cryptic nickname that would be tough to trace. Practically, however, go ahead and name it for anybody you like. Persistence pays.

Take Emery Falls, for example, one of the best known features of upper Lake Mead. For at least 30 years it's been called Emery Falls, and probably always will be. But some sleuth once discovered that Emery was still very much alive, and tried to stamp out the name by switching it to Columbine Falls on a map. This was about as effective as swatting flies with a sledgehammer.

Lake Mead National Recreation Area probably has more marvelous un-named features per square mile than any other place in the country. As these things go, we're still early settlers.

Next time you're in the Boulder Bakery ask when they're going to make pumpernickel bread again. We picked up a loaf when it was warm the other day, right out of the oven.

It is the most delectable stuff you can possibly imagine. Even if you live in Henderson or Las Vegas, this bread is worth a trip to Boulder.
