

B.C. Woman Wins Sign Contest With 'Western Gambling' Entry

Mrs. E. E. Blanchard of Boulder City was winner of the "Name the Sign" contest conducted by the Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Blanchard's "Western Gambling" was selected from entries sent in by more than 100 contestants, some of whom sent from five to seven different suggestions. More than 80 per cent of the contestants were local residents.

The winner was delighted with her \$55 cash prize, saying it was the largest amount she had ever won. It was presented to her at the Chamber of Commerce meeting Thursday, just one day before her birthday. Hank Kovell of the Las Vegas (Casino Center) contributed \$50 for the prize name replacing (casino center).

Raymond "Bud" Sutton was the featured speaker at the meeting. He is a graduate of Basic high school and a partner in the law firm of Babcock and Sutton, Attorneys, 10 Water Street.

Sutton spoke on the Internal Revenue Department and what to do if your personal income tax is audited. Although you may be frightened if a representative of the Internal Revenue Department calls on you, Sutton said, you should remember that they are all trying to help you.

Tax returns with refunds amounting to more than \$200 are usually subject to immediate audit, the speaker said. The taxpayer trying to prove that he is entitled to a refund is entitled to a hearing. He receives a 30-day letter after which a hearing is held, if satisfactory results are not obtained, he receives a 90-day letter and is entitled to file an appeal.

If the taxpayer is still unable to come to an agreement with the Revenue Department he is entitled to file an appeal in the Circuit Court of Appeals and from there can take his case to the Supreme Court of the United States. Sutton said this can happen on a mere \$600 case, and five years can pass before a settlement is reached.

"He told of one interesting case where a junk dealer was suspected of not reporting his full income, as his expenditures greatly exceeded the income reported.

An audit of this dealer's tax return revealed the fact that he was born and raised in Arabia and as a boy had found a buried treasure in his native land. Over the years, this had been dug up and brought into the U.S.

The Revenue Agent accompanied this man to Arabia and found that his story was true and the case was dropped.

President Phil Hubel announced that the Chamber had written a letter to the Federal Communications protesting the relocation of Channel Two. It had been rumored, he said that KLRJ-TV had applied for permission to move the station. To date Hubel said, this is the only television channel allowed the City of Henderson.

Council Okays Zoning And New Licenses

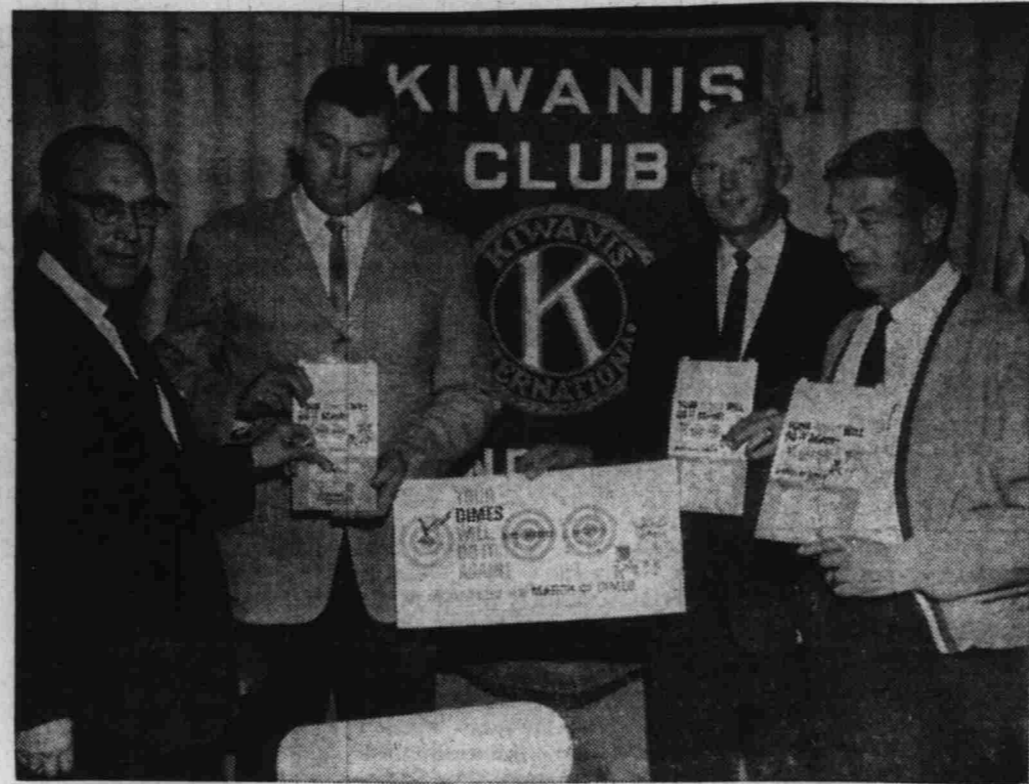

MINUTEMAN BUILDERS REPORT Large Scale Titanium Use In Solid-Fuel Missiles

Aerojet General Corporation has selected titanium for second stage Minuteman rocket motor cases, marking titanium's first major use in solid fueled missiles.

Use of titanium has enabled Aerojet to reduce by 30 percent the weight of the massive casing, which means additional range or payload is possible, according to R. R. Lloyd, local plant manager for Titanium Metals Corporation of America. Metal cases are required for the middle stage of the missile to prevent buckling under the load of the top stage.

production history. Further, it could be introduced into the Minuteman program with no scheduling penalties since steel tooling and testing technologies were largely applicable to the grade.

This alloy grade has seen extensive use in pressure vessels which operate at liquid nitrogen temperatures in liquid fueled missiles. To date, some 4000 such vessels have gone into service.

Among the key considerations which led Aerojet to use of titanium for rocket motor cases are the following:

1. Titanium is actually faster to weld than steel grades that are used for motor cases, since there is no need for pre and post-heating of the area to be welded.
 2. Titanium is immune to atmospheric corrosion, proved by exposure of sub-scale cases to 60 days of salt spray.
 3. Test firings of both second and third stage titanium cases have been so successful that cases were cleaned up and adjudged ready to fire again.
 4. Price of titanium cases are now about 50 percent higher than a steel case, whereas completed titanium assemblies once cost many times the price of steel units.
- Approximately 25 percent of titanium production is now used by producers of missiles and space probes.

... with Bill Belknap Have you ever wondered who invented the bola tie? It must have been a brave soul — only somebody who rebelled completely at the thought of neckties could have done it. Chances are it all started south of the Border. A true bola, you'll recall, is a throwing weapon used by the Gau-

chos instead of a lariat. It's a line or thong with a weight attached to each end. To catch an animal you let fly your bola, which quickly wraps up whatever it hits. While the poor beast is trying to get untangled, you rush up and brand him or whatever else you have in mind. So, in a way, our familiar bola tie is patterned after this useful

South American missile. To undermine anything so firmly entrenched as the conventional cravat took high courage. Just think what the creator of the bola did in saving countless males from daily suffocation while increasing their productivity. There's something about wearing a bola that makes you feel free and ready to work — as though your mental sleeves are rolled up. They're time-savers, too. Say you spend slightly over one minute putting on, tying and adjusting your tie each morning. Switch to a bola — even if you're a slowpoke they go on in five seconds — and you've save a minute per day right there. That's just like finding a full hour every two months.

It's amazing how many different materials are used now for bola ties — wood, horn, plastics, polished rocks, petrified wood, gold nuggets and silver. Many clubs and organizations have special bolas made up bearing their insignia.

I've yet to see one worn with a tux, but throughout the West you often spot gleaming silver bolas worn at evening affairs with white shirts and dark suits. And the idea is spreading eastward.

Whoever started this bola tie business — man, woman or child — deserves a statue. Incidentally, you'll find some of the most elegant bola ties in the West at the PHOTO CENTER in Boulder City. Some are Navajo silverwork with turquoise settings; others are exquisite old Hopi designs in plain silver. You'll

feel good wearing any one of them. If you're a Volkswagen buff — or even thinking about becoming one — you should meet the Meyer brothers, Wilfred and George. They operate a Texaco station at 901 Las Vegas Boulevard South, and specialize in VW and Porsche service. I'm always astounded at

Aside from being terrific mechanics, Wilfred and George Meyer are a couple of grand guys — you'll enjoy knowing them.

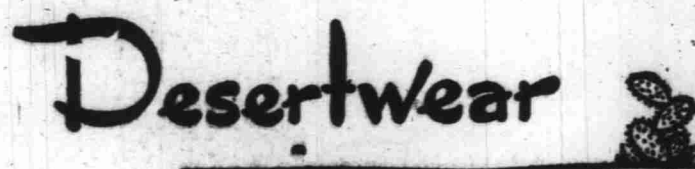

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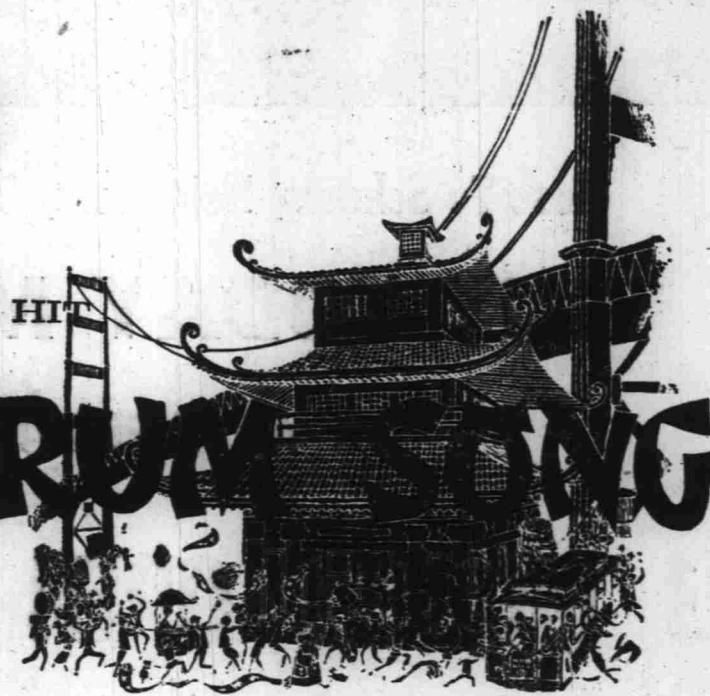

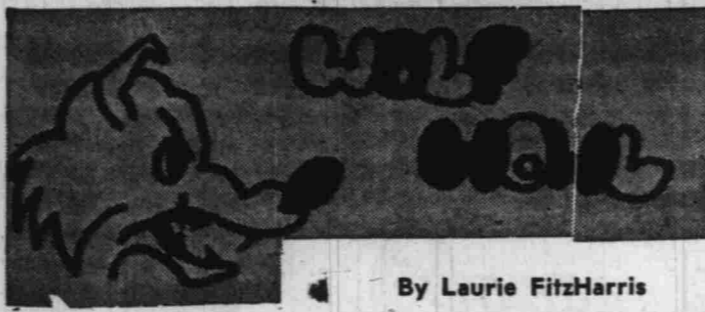

It is noted on the new Peace Corps poster that the nations of Asia, Africa and Latin America are asking the Peace Corps for skilled Americans: teachers, farmers, carpenters, nurses, electricians, surveyors, engineers, machinists, community development workers and scores of others.

The Peace Corps placement test is not competitive. Anyone with the equivalent of a

high school education is eligible to take the test. There is no passing score.

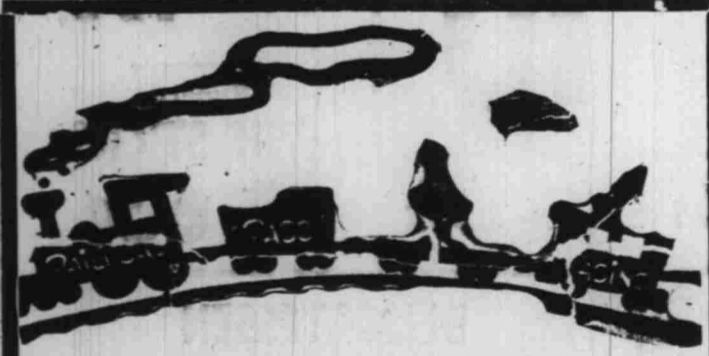

\$35 TO MULTIMILLION The Stuckey's Success Story

"You must be crazy," the Texas housewife told the businessman, "building a candy store in a cotton patch 10 miles from a dried up town."

The remark had a familiar ring to 52-year-old W. S. Stuckey, Sr., whose unorthodox approach to selling has turned a depression era roadside stand into a chain of 100 stores in 22 states.

The key to the growth of Stuckey's, Inc., he says, has been a combination of massive use of the firm's familiar yellow and red billboards and a knack for picking locations that pay off.

In the process Stuckey has become a millionaire and many of his employees, with his backing or financing, have prospered as well through store investments.

Stuckey began his business career as a pecan buyer with a \$35 loan from his grandmother in 1931. "I made an old car into a truck," he said, "and went from house to house buying nuts. If I used my \$35 too early in the day I'd wait until the banks closed and start writing checks.

"I'd sell the pecans that night and be at the bank in the morning. That year I sold about \$4500 worth. By 1933 a local banker was willing to lend me \$200. In 1936 he was backing me with \$20,000, and I was selling \$150,000 worth of pecans."

The first store in the Stuckey chain was opened in 1938 in this middle Georgia town, 145 miles southeast of Atlanta. Mrs. Stuckey and their cook made the candy, and the store did \$25,000 to \$30,000 worth of business that year.

By 1941 Stuckey had three stores. Then came World War II, and business dropped as gasoline rationing cut tourists to a minimum. He began selling candy to the armed forces.

After the war he began opening stores at sites selected on the basis of the number of tourists passing by, the highway, the terrain, and other factors. In eight years — by 1953 — Stuckey had 29 stores, and \$4 million annually in business from them and a candy plant. In the last eight years store volume has grown to \$13.8 million annual-

ly, and the candy plant grosses another \$4.2 million.

He has tried stores in city areas, but finds "we just can't operate uptown. People are accustomed to us at the side of the road."

The stores have 600 employees in peak periods, handling 54 types of candies and nuts — a pecan log roll being the most popular.

Although he stopped brokering pecans in 1943, Stuckey now buys about 500 million yearly for his operations.

The average store grosses \$150,000 annually, divided about equally between candy, other food products and souvenirs, and gasoline. One big lure is a card entitling customers to a 2-cent-per-gallon discount on gasoline.

Born Williamson Sylvester Stuckey on a farm near Eastman, the businessman now lives with his wife and 20-year-old daughter in an 11-room rambling frame house that is 82 years old.

A strapping, tanned, 6-foot-3, Stuckey is a member of the Georgia House of Representatives and an active Methodist. He owns 15,000 acres of farm land, planted mostly with pine trees.

"We've gotten where we are by hard work, building customers' confidence, and picking good men."

EXOTIC FUEL OF THE FUTURE Am-Pot Now Producing 99% Cesium Carbonate

Commercial quantities of 99% pure cesium carbonate are now being produced in a semi-works operation at the Trona Research Laboratory of American Potash & Chemical Corporation. Announcement of the operation, which processes ores from Bikita Minerals (Private) Ltd.'s deposit in Southern Rhodesia and from domestic sources, was made by Joseph C. Schumacher, vice president, Research.

American Potash has been producing cesium metal and cesium compounds since 1957 from lepidolite ores through its subsidiary, San Antonio Chemicals, Inc.

Among the more exotic of the potential uses of cesium compounds are applications as a fuel for ion engines, which scientists predict will power space ships of the future, and in the magneto-hydrodynamic generation of power.

Best known of the current down to earth uses for cesium is in photoelectric cells where it readily becomes ionized by light energy.

American Potash's principal interest in the chemical is in its application to glass manufacturing, an industry which the company already supplies lithium, boron, sodium, potassium, thorium, yttrium and rare earth chemicals.

Other important applications of cesium are in the manufacture of welding rod fluxes, Edison-type batteries and in DNA and cancer research studies. It is also used as a catalyst in ammonium synthesis and hydrogenation of hydrocarbons and in the manufacture of prisms for infrared spectrometers.

Major raw material source of the Trona cesium operation is Bikita pollucite ore, which is part of a large lithium-beryllium deposit in Southern Rhodesia, owned principally by Selection Trust, Ltd., American Potash and American Metals Climax. The pollucite in the deposit averages 24.4% cesium oxide.

New technical bulletins on cesium and its compounds have been prepared by the company's Market Development Department which provide a ready reference for the advancing technology in fuel cells, thermoelectricity, thermionic, magneto-hydrodynamics, ion propulsion and space power devices.

Leland B. Newcomer Featured As AAUW Luncheon Speaker

Newcomer, the new Superintendent of Clark County Schools, is from southern California. He has a B.A. Degree from Laverne College, majoring in history and education, M.A. Degree from Claremont Graduate School, and has completed his work for a doctorate at the University of Southern California.

He also served as a consultant to the Jordan School District and the State Department of Education in Utah, with his particular responsibility being to direct a workshop of in-service training of principals in how to observe, analyze and evaluate the effectiveness of teaching situations.

Under personal data, Mr. Newcomer has a wife, Barbara, and four children (three boys and one girl), ages 10 to 17. He spent three years in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserve during World War II, most of the time being spent in New Guinea and the Philippines area.

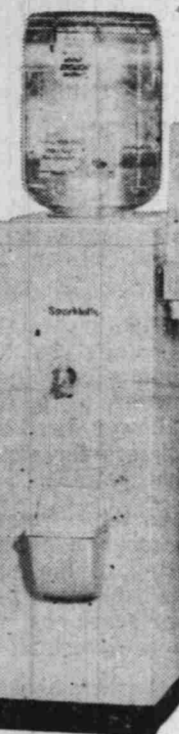

I COVER THE DESERT

Most of us think of a minnow as a tiny fish no longer than a man's finger, and which is used for fish bait. Going further, we tend to call all small fish — such as the Cyprinodonts of Death Valley — minnows.

While the first sentence is largely true, the second is utterly false. But, there are exceptions to even the first fact.

Here, in the portion of the Colorado River which runs through the desert, is one of the world's largest minnows. It is capable of reaching lengths of over six feet and weighs over 100 pounds. That would surely make some bait, wouldn't it?

This gigantic fish is locally called "white salmon" or "Colorado River salmon," although it is a member of the squawfish group. Its correct common name is Colorado River squawfish.

Your chances of catching or seeing a Colorado River squawfish within the Lake Mead National Recreation Area are quite remote, for it had become especially adapted to the swift, silt-laden waters of the Colorado River, occasionally subjected to extreme fluctuations in volume and turbidity. Hoover and Davis Dams have created entirely different, placid, clear waters. Because of its inability to become adapted to these sudden changes, it is believed to be nearly extinct.

If you do come across one of these fish, however, please keep it and bring it to me!

In recent years very few of these fish have been reported. Murl Emery at Eldorado Canyon on Lake Mohave reported that a 27 pounder was brought to his dock in 1945, when river conditions still existed there. That was before Davis Dam was built.

A much smaller one was taken there a few years ago. This was mounted and now hangs in the cafe at Eldorado Canyon. It's the only place I know of to see a Colorado River squawfish.

Many fish bones found in Catslaw Cave, about fifteen miles down-stream from Hoover Dam, were examined by Dr. Robert Miller at the University of Michigan. Dr. Miller is one of the nation's top ichthyologists (one who studies fish).

Dr. Miller found the bones belonged to the humpback sucker, humpback chub and squawfish — all native species. Remains of six squawfish were in the group. One fish skull, he determined, came from a fish over four feet long. Others indicated a five and one-half foot fish!

Early fishermen on the river reported even larger ones.

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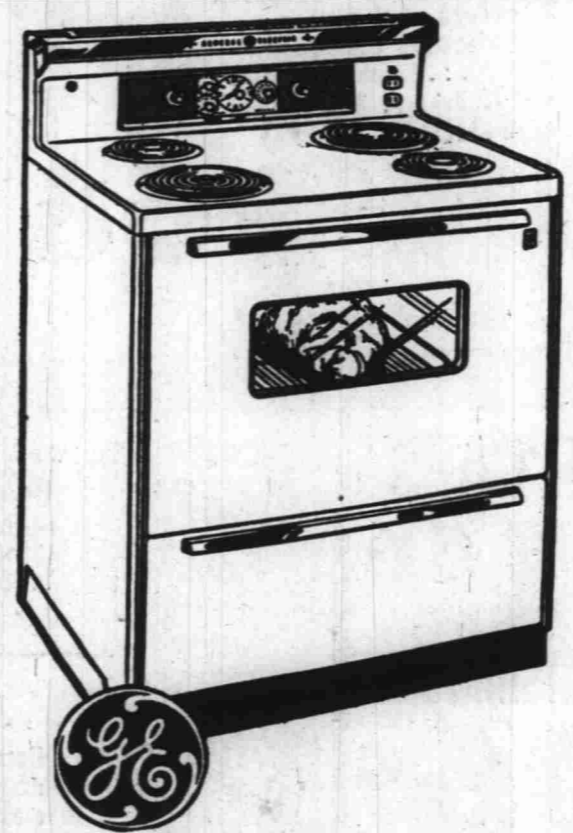
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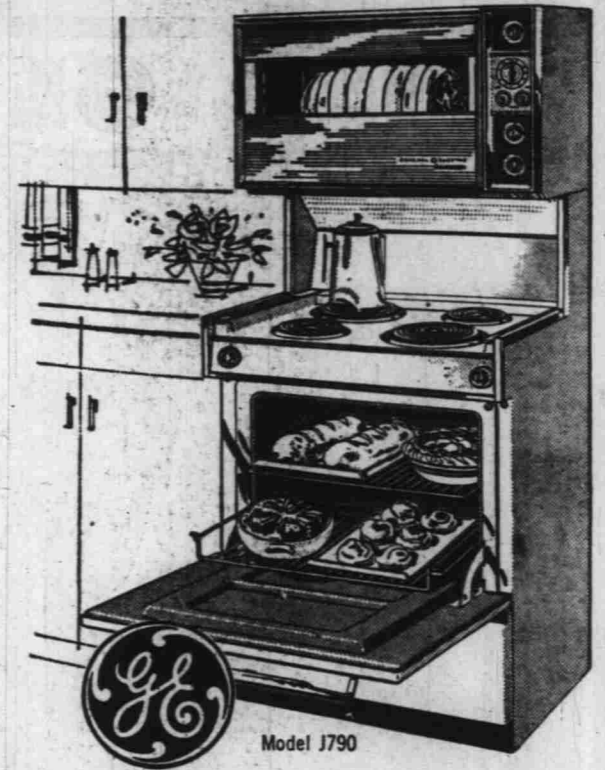

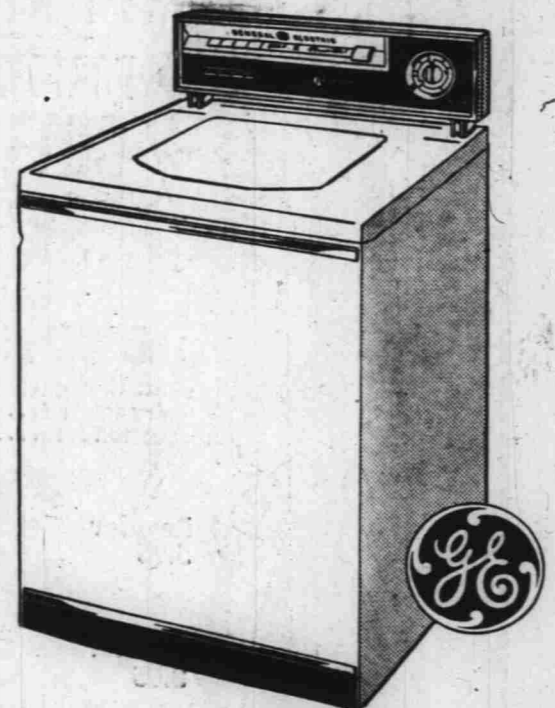
