Some of the high school athletic coaches in the South ern Nevada area are miffed at Nevada U.'s apparent high-hatted methods of public relations.

Where in most states, the state university is looked up to by all coaches and students as the place to send high school athletes in order to help build a better state university varisty team, in this state we have cases on record where the "U" coach doesn't make an effort to seek state starsin one case even failing to answer a letter from a coach who had written to tell about a few fine athletes who could be had.

Southern Nevada coaches are agreed that if Nevada Southern could field a football team, it could, within three years, wipe the main branch team from Reno right off the gridiron.

They, like this newspaper, urge a team to be fielded as soon as possible so that more and more home town stars can be giving their all for a Nevada school for a change.

A coach for Nevada Southern could be easy to find . for the bosses need look no further than Chuck Rasmic of Rancho, Ken Andree of Boulder City or Joe Cummings of Basic.

And what fine crowds such games would draw.

Two newspapers fold in Los Angeles. Big ones. The Mirror and the Examiner.

Another folds in Apple Valley. A small one - serving that community.

We hate to see this happen-for it means each community will lose guardians of freedom.

Unfortunately, newspapers cannot and are not subsidiz-ed by Ford Foundations, Damon Runyon Funds, etc.

If they were, they wouldn't fold and would continue to fight for right, for law, for order.

The rising costs of newsprint, equipment, services plus the low margin of profit publishers set up in their operating methods - combined cause red ink on the books, forces that black ink off the presses.

It is the reading public which can save the death of newspapers, in most cases, by appreciation and cooperation of and with the newspaper's life line—the advertiser.

And Free Dialing In Vegas Valley by Rae Von Dornum

The recent installation of a new dial telephone system in Boulder City has made it possible for the first time to consider the question of a free dial system between Boulder, lion dollar national plan. Henderson, East Las Vegas, Las Vegas and North Las Vegas.

After doing some research on the existing situation, we believe it might be possible to obtain such for Henderson and Boulder City with an approximate raise of 25 percent of the present monthly telephone rate.

A cross-section poll shows approximately 75 percent of those contacted in favor. Of the other 25 percent some have no asquaintances in other parts of Southern Nevada and, therefore, would derive no benefit from the change of service.

Several thought the change would save them money over the period of a year. Many of those saying they were in favor said that at the present time they do not make this many calls outside Henderson; however, if such a change were possible they would appreciate being able to call friends outside the city without having to limit calls to three minutes or worrying about toll charges.



This alloy grade has seen extensive use in pressure vessels which operate at liquid nitrogen temperatures in liquid fueled missiles. To date, some 4000 such vessels have gone into service.

Among the key considerations which led Aerojet to use of titanium for rocket motor cases are the following:

1. Titanium is actually faster to weld than steel grades that are used for motor cases, since there is no need for pre and post-heating of the area to be welded.

2. Titanium is immune to atmospheric corrosion, proved by exposure of sub-scale cases to 60 days of salt spray. 3. Test firings of both second and third stage titanium cases have been so successful that cases were cleaned up and adjudged ready to fire again.

4. Price of titanium cases are now about 50 percent higher than a steel case, whereas completed titanium assemblies once cost many times the price of steel units. Approximately 25 percent of titanium production is now used by producers of missiles and space probes.
