"The Colorado River Commission of Nevada with whom we have our contract is doing everything possible to see that Henderson and Townsite homes receive this cheaper power."

In a reassuring tone Albert said that his company would not give up without a struggle the Davis Dam power.

Referring to the statement credited to him when the story broke about the possible loss of Davis Dam power, Albert said, "We hope to stay out of the courts — that is the best policy."

The city receives a certain allotment of Davis power Dam power along with Boulder Dam power and some steam power.

Several weeks ago Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall said that Davis Dam could not provide Cal-Pac power because it was a non-preference customer.

Work Starts On County Housing Authority Project; 12 Duplexes Are Planned

When the Clark County Housing Authority Tuesday announced plans for a new 12 duplex housing development on Monson Road for the Nellis Air Force enlisted personnel, William Brown, chairman of the Commission said that a similar project would be started near the Industrial Park development if the Commission was able to obtain land for the development.

Such a housing project might be very much needed in that area if there is a real industrial development. It has been established that some of the city land near the proposed Industrial Park would be suitable for residential development. Low rent duplexes such as the Clark County Housing Authority have designed would be ideal for the area it was suggested by a Commission spokesman.

Jack T. Belcher, Las Vegas architect designed the housing project which will be utilized by the three grades of enlisted personnel at Nellis Air Force Base. There will be four one bed room units, 10 two bedroom units and 10 3 bedroom dwellings in the first stage development. A total of 50 more duplexes will be built as soon as the present project is completed.

William Brown, chairman of the Clark County Housing Authority indicated that more than 200 units will be built on an 80 acre tract which the Authority owns. If able to obtain ground in the Industrial Park development, Brown said that the Clark County Housing Authority would also like to construct units in that area.

"We're striving to get away from institutional housing developments," Brown said at Tuesday's meeting. "It is our intention to construct these duplexes as a nice residential area with a play area for children and a grass plot for

the adults. Olive trees will be planted in the project and the grass will be rye and Bermuda. Shrubbery is to be planted at each duplex also.

The contract for the construction of the project was signed by the Tobler-Oliver Construction Company of Las Vegas.

The construction company has 120 days to complete the project. Buildings will be of concrete block with concrete floors and a rock roof. The units will be completely electrical, and there will be a refrigerator cooler in each unit. Showers and tubs will be installed, Chairman Brown advised.

A housing representative from the Air Force Base will handle renting of the units: Brown said Tuesday that every unit will be filled as soon as they are completed. Rental money will go to the Clark County Housing Authority however.

The housing project was

built solely for Nellis Air Force personnel. As each of the 50 units are added they too will be utilized by the Air Force personnel.

Each unit will have parking space for two cars, Brown informed. Maintenance at the project should be at a minimum. Jack T. Belcher, the architect stated. However if any maintenance is necessary it will be provided from the Housing Authority maintenance crew here.

Architect Belcher had a model of the first stage project at Tuesday's meeting at the Housing Authority Building here. Chairman Brown indicated that the model would be taken to Riverside, Calif., May 21, 22, 23 for the regional meeting of the National Housing Administration officials. Harold Baldwin, one of the members of the Housing Authority Commission was present at Tuesday's session.

BYU Symphony Orchestra To Perform At LDS Church Here

A 75-piece symphony orchestra from the Brigham Young University, will make its only Nevada appearance in Henderson on Tuesday, March 20 at 8 p.m. at the Cholla Street Auditorium of the LDS Church.

Conducted by Professor Lawrence W. Sardoni, the orchestra is on its annual spring tour, which this year will feature concerts in five cities in Utah, Nevada and California. They include St. George and Cedar City, Utah; Henderson, San Bernardino and Fresno, California.

Professor Sardoni comes from a family of musicians. His maternal grandfather was a member of the London Philharmonic Orchestra and

one of the early conductors of the Tabernacle Choir. His father was a concert violinist.

He has a rich background as a teacher-performer and conductor having been with the University of Colorado; Western State College and Mesa College. He was conductor of the Civic Symphony at Grand Junction before going to BYU.

Included on the program for Henderson concert to which the public is cordially invited, will be "Brahms' Second Symphony," Howard Hanson's "Romantic Symphony," Smetana's "Dances from the Bartered Bride," Sibelius' "Valse Triste," and a piano concerto.

City Share Of Cigarette Tax Money \$4,140.83

When the Nevada Tax Commission sent out checks recently totaling \$94,314 to cities and counties, the city received one for \$4,140.83 as its share of the cigarette tax money.

This represented the February share according to Don Dawson, city auditor. The distribution started with the current fiscal year. To date the city has received a total of \$35,310.67 as its share since actual distribution started last August.

In drawing up the city budget for 1962-63 Auditor Dawson estimated that the cigarette tax receipts for the next fiscal year would be \$49,550. This was included in anticipated revenue for the next fiscal year.

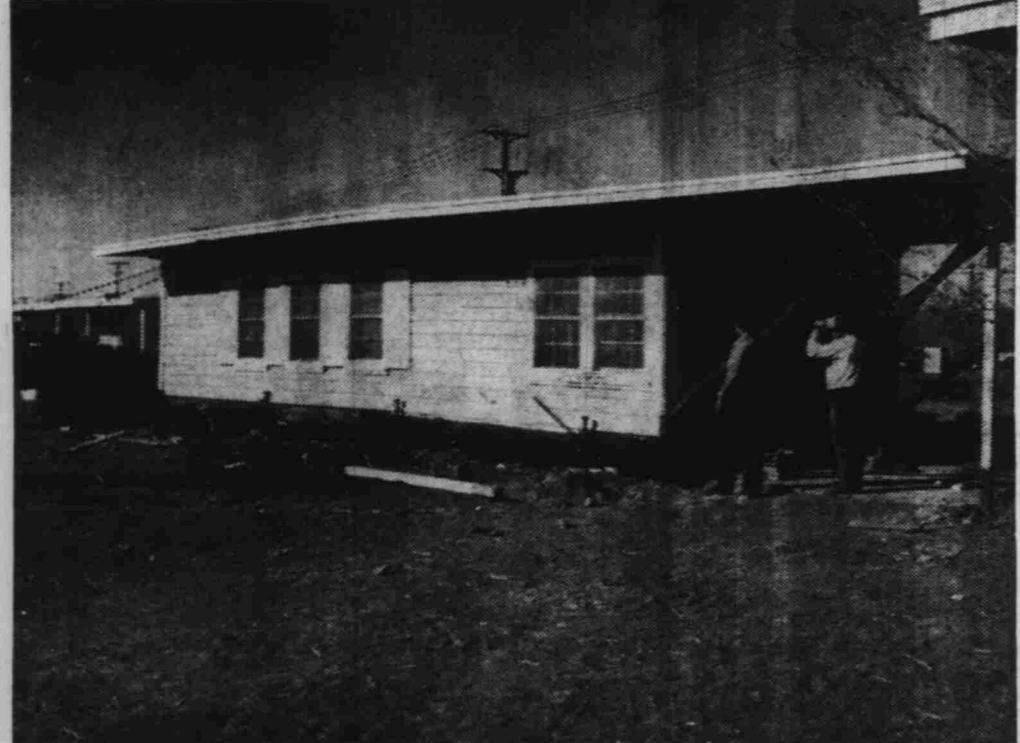

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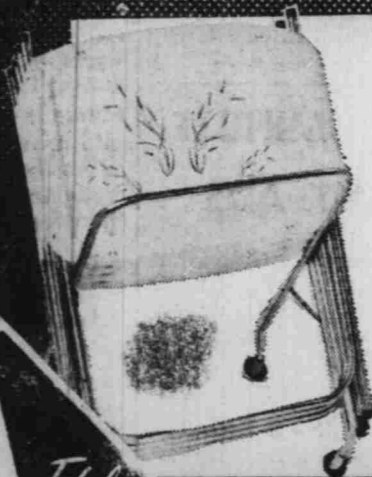
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NPS NAMES NATURALIST AND ASSISTANT CHIEF RANGER

Following varied experience and training in three National Parks, James W. B. Packard has been named assistant chief ranger of the Lake Mead National Recreation Area, according to today's announcement by Superintendent Charles A. Richey.

Packard, who comes to the Recreation Area on a promotional basis from Yellowstone National Park (Montana-Wyoming-Idaho), succeeds Verne R. Bertsch. The latter was named to the position of chief ranger at Dinosaur National Monument (Utah) last October.

Richey said that Packard's

duties will include that of fire control, pointing out that in addition to numerous Government and concessioner buildings throughout the Area there also is the heavily forested Shivwits Plateau on which it has been necessary to control several fires in recent years. Packard's former assignments, all in timber areas, have given him considerable fire experience.

Born in Iowa Packard attended Oklahoma University prior to his four-year service in the U.S. Navy beginning in 1942.

Following his discharge in 1946 he was assigned as a seasonal park ranger in Yosemite National Park (California) for three summers and was appointed to a permanent ranger position at Yosemite in 1949. He was named assistant chief ranger at Crater Lake National Park (Oregon) in 1951 and held that position until 1957 when he was reassigned to Yellowstone.

The Packards have two children, Susan, five and Jeffrey, two.

Selection of permanent interpretive personnel for the Lake Mead National Recreation Area has been completed with the appointment of Derek O. Hambly as park naturalist succeeding James W. Schack who transferred late last year to Grand Canyon National Park (Arizona), according to an announcement today by Superintendent Charles A. Richey.

Richey previously announced the appointment of Theo-

dore F. Whitmoyer as chief naturalist, replacing Merdith B. Ingham, Jr., who was promoted earlier this year to the position of interpretive specialist in the National Park Service Region Five office in Philadelphia.

Prior to his promotion to the Recreation Area Hambly was a park naturalist at Catoctin Mountain Park (Maryland), which is a unit of National Capital Parks. The latter contains National Shrines, Memorials, Parks and Parkways in Washington, D.C. and nearby Maryland and Virginia.

A native of Texas, Hambly attended California State Polytechnic College where he earned his B. S. degree in biology. He served in the U.S. Army from 1951 until 1953.

Hambly's park service career began as a park ranger in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park (North Carolina-Tennessee) in 1957. The next year he was reassigned to Catoctin Mountain Park in the interpretive division and remained at that station until his transfer to the Recreation Area.

Hambly is married and the couple has two daughters, Kathleen, five and Karen, four.

Richey pointed out that the Recreation Area is fortunate in being able to round out the interpretive staff prior to the heavy use season inasmuch as it will enable them to familiarize themselves with the area before the intensive interpretive program gets un-

der way. As in the past seasonal naturalists will be added to the staff in late May or early June.

According to Hill who is the only Henderson player on the team, the newly formed Nevada Soccer Association hopes to have a four team adult league next year.

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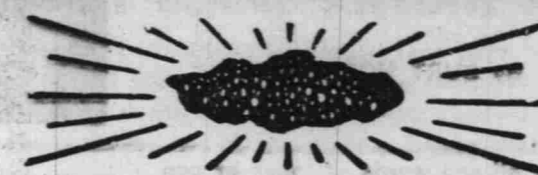
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On SPORTS

Brenda Creekmore was judged the best girl rider and Billy Amon outrode the boys during the children's intermission calf riding.

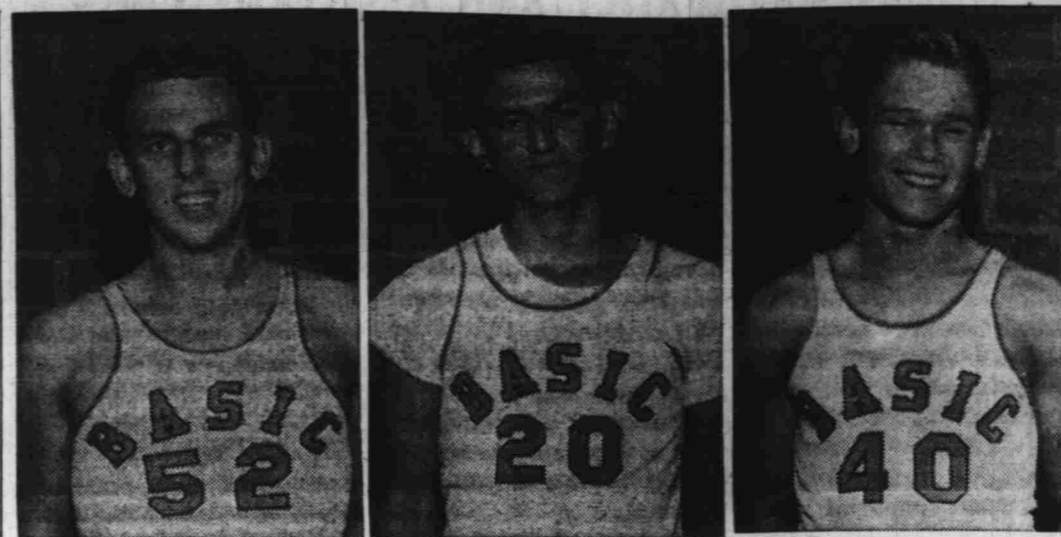
John Farnsworth's team got in another practice session for the Sunrise Gymkhana March 25, in their attempt to bring home the revolving trophy for the third consecutive year.

It can only happen in Nevada — such an event as the International Gin Rummy Tournament.

To fully appreciate it, one should play in it — or, at least, stand as a kibitzer in, around and among the 800 assorted men and women who are competitors.

These are all athletes, like those gathering for the Olympics. Mental athletes who come to the tournament after long hours at the training tables back in the home "athletic" clubs.

By the time they arrive here they are keyed for the battle. They have gone thru memory tests so as not to forget one card that has been played, so as to make sure they have a mental picture of what the enemy player is holding in his hand.

They have trained to take the 16 hours of qualifying play by having spent at least that many hours every night at the game back home.

They have trained to meet each opponent on his or her terms. They know that one woman is a yakker which could possibly throw you off your concentration. They know that a cigar smoker puffs at you across the table, which could numb your mental processes. They know that another woman wears bracelets that flip and flap as they reach for the cards, which disturb your mental workings.

These competitors are ready, too, at the drop of a hat, to contest anyone's honesty. Some suspect the others of possibly being a bit fast with the shuffle, yet, on the surface, each player is a gentleman and friendly with each opponent.

They say you can learn a person by playing poker with him.

At this gin tournament, you not only learn a person — you soon have him or her categorized as to being a kneeshaker, a gum chewer, a teeth-clacker, a squinter, a table-tapper with five fingers, a table tapper with ten fingers, a sweater, a blusher, a squirmer.

The uniform of dress at this Olympics of the card world is varied. There is the casual fellow who sits down wearing a big cable-knit alpaca right from Italy, shiney alligator shoes with socks to match the sweater, and his ring on his right hand has a diamond that is only dwarfed by the ring on his left hand. His long black cigar is right out of Touchin's, no less.

There is the casual dresser among the females, too, who wears capris so tight you wonder if she's going to make it when she sits down, but the color of them is dazzling and bizarre and make you forget whether they'll hold for the day. She wears a big loosely-knit crew sweater that fits sloppily-nice, just tight enough to show the subjects, but loose enough to be interesting.

Her fingers are the tools of this gin business. They are the show-case, so to speak, so the fingers are adorned with rings, watches, pearls that go back to the elbow.

These, then, are the way most of the players walk into the field of battle.

At the moment that play commences, all bodies are tense. Last year a man died in the first hour of a heart attack. This year, they called a doctor out of the audience for a person in trouble. The person lived. Watching the initial dealing of the cards by the players shows the nervousness. Cards flop over face up in the shuffling. Some slide across and fall on the floor. Hands are jumpy and clumsy as they try to duplicate the calm riffling they did back home.

There are many Jewish athletes in the world of gin rummy. But a glance at the names of the entries, show that more than 50 per cent are non-Jewish. To match the Zeppo Marxes, Isidore Kaplans and Hyman Eismans there are the Don Coolidges, the eFlix McDaniels, the Walter Scotts.

Checking the vocations of these card table athletes, you run the gamut of the nation's business and professional world—as well as the women representatives of the great American Home.

Doctors, lawyers, merchants, chiefs — secretaries, house wives, artists, interior decorators, cocktail waitresses, girls of the street — they all compete in the Olympics of Card Playing—the International Gin Rummy Tournament—where it only can be run — in Nevada.

REA Approves \$3,940,000 Loan To Nevada Electric Co-Op

The Rural Electrification Administration today approved a loan of \$3,940,000 to the Amargosa Valley Cooperative, Inc., of Lathrop Wells, Nevada. The funds will be used by the cooperative as follows:

- \$1,288,200 to finance distribution facilities including 319 miles of line, meters, transformers and sectionalizing equipment.
- \$1,958,250 to finance transmission facilities including 110 miles of 138 kilovolt transmission line, a 30,000 KVA substation, a 138 kv oil circuit breaker, and substation site.
- \$448,550 to finance a 15,000 KVA substation in the Pahrump Valley, and a 7,500 KVA substation in the Amargosa Valley.
- \$245,000 for general plant equipment and miscellaneous expenses.

The Amargosa Valley Cooperative is a new borrower of REA loan funds. It will serve rural areas in Clark and Nye counties, Nevada, and Inyo county, California. Unserved farm and rural people in these counties organized the cooperative and will operate it.

Distribution facilities provided in the loan will result in electric service for 513 consumer outlets, including 151 irrigation pumps. About \$215,000 of the loan will be used in California to provide electric service to 77 rural

consumers over 82 miles of distribution line in the vicinity of Furnace Creek, Ryan and Stovepipe Wells.

Power for the system will be obtained from the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation at Henderson, Nevada, where the 30,000 KVA substation financed by the loan will be located. The transmission line will extend from this point northwesterly through the Pahrump and Amargosa valleys — bringing an adequate, low-cost supply of electric power into areas which previously did not have central station electric service.

A number of other people in the area are negotiating for service from the cooperative. These include ranchers, operators of small commercial establishments and mining enterprises.

Future meetings will be conducted at the same place on the last Monday of each month. All licensed amateurs and persons interested in amateur radio are invited to attend.

Tickets may be purchased on the grounds. Beer, soft drinks and extra hamburgers will be available.

There will be some inter-club Gymkhana events after lunch and competitive games for one and all.

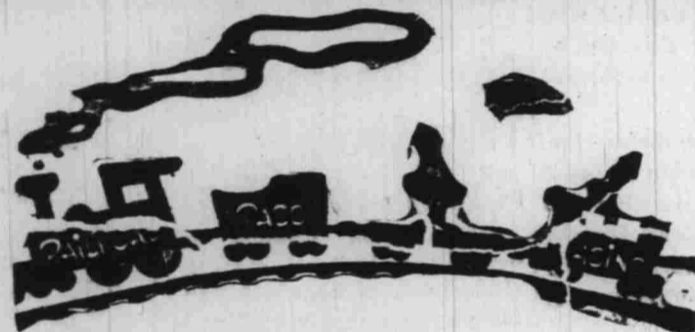

New Civilian Uses Expand Military Metals Market

The continuing search for military use at the end of World War I, actually gave our city its start. It also came to sounding the death knell for Henderson when the Basic Magnesium Plant was closed by the Federal Government at the end of the war.

At a recent trade show in New York, the Magnesium Association displayed more than 150 civilian products made from this lightweight metal including ladders, typewriter and business machine chassis truck bodies, and vacuum cleaners.

The newest use of magnesium is baseball bats. These will be put on the market next spring and will retail at 12.50 to \$14. The bats were tried out for the first time last season by the Cleveland Indians in a pre-game warm-up session.

Although they may never find acceptance in big league play, it is believed they will prove popular in practice and with little leaguers and sandlot ball clubs. They are more durable than wooden bats and will not dent.

The Newark Processing Company of Newark, Ohio manufacturer of these bats, is also considering making magnesium golf club heads and magnesium tennis rackets.

Such products have helped boost non military use of magnesium to 70 per cent of total consumption against only 5 per cent in 1955 and almost none in the years immediately following World War II.

Titanium producers, also seeking new uses for their metal, claim that chemical manufacturers can sometimes save on titanium equipment because it conducts heat more efficiently than many rival materials.

Staffer Chemical Company recently installed a titanium heat exchanger to cool wet chlorine gas, using 394 square feet of titanium at \$30 a square foot.

A similar system made of glass would cost only \$7 a square foot but take 3,200 square feet of glass. Thus, Stauffer's bill for its titanium heat exchanger was only about half as much as the total price for comparable glass equipment.

Titanium shipments to chemical plants have increased four-fold in the past two years and by 1956 are expected to double the 1961 level which was about three per cent of total titanium production, according to Donald B. Dik, supervisor of commercial markets for Titanium Metals Corporation of America.

Nassau Smelting and Refining Company figures it already has saved \$40,000 by installing a 49 inch titanium exhaust fan at its Staten Island plant about a year ago. The titanium fan cost \$17,000 as compared to the \$1100 price of carbon steel fans formerly used.

A spokesman for the firm, a division of Western Electric Company, says he expects the titanium fan to withstand corrosion from acid gasses indefinitely; the carbon fans had to be replaced about once a week.

One titanium official recently remarked that a lot more titanium could be sold to the chemical industry if it didn't last so long.

Moapa Valley Chamber of Commerce members pointed out that some measures must be taken by authorities to prevent destruction by marring, carving, drawing and chipping of the famed Indian petroglyphs.

It was suggested that banks which are low enough to be reached by visitors, be fenced off by a five-foot hurricane fence. A stand for photogra-

phers could be built back from the fence to take pictures above it.

Areas particularly hit by tourists are the Mouse Tank and Atlatl picnic grounds.

The chamber stated that these displays are an outstanding attraction to the park and the state and cannot be replaced if destroyed.

The group also requested of the commission that it give a silicone protective layer to the older banks to prevent further weathering.

Removal of petrified wood in the park also came under fire and it was suggested that penalties be imposed on those visitors who violate the rule.

A third request, relative to the Valley of Fire, was that the Jeep road north from the

Mouse Tank area leading into Overton Wash be declared a jeep road or any four-wheel vehicle, to be traveled at the driver's own risk.

It was urged that the Valley of Fire be left open at all times to be used at the pleasure of the visitors and that firewood be furnished by the State Park system.

Moapa chamber stated that in its belief it is too early to consider concessions for the Valley of Fire, but that at a later date, when the park is more fully developed, measures for concessions could be considered by local residents and interested groups in Nevada.

It concluded with the thought that at present, concessions would tend to lessen support of local business to-

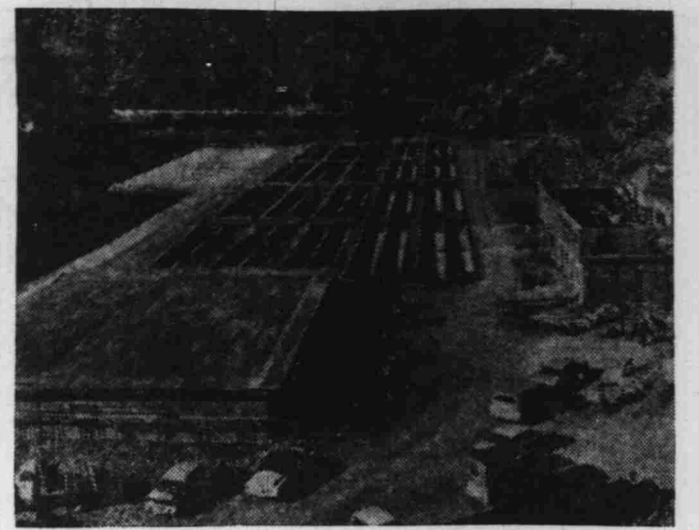

WILLOW BEACH FISH HATCHERY

HATCHERY TO BE DONE MAY 1

Trout fishing on the Colorado River, roughly between Glenn Canyon Dam and Parker Dam, is expected to be enhanced to some degree when the new federal fish hatchery at Willow Beach begins operations, expected around May 1.

The hatchery, located on the Arizona side of Lake Mohava, is nearly completed and it is anticipated in the initial year that approximately 50,000 pounds of trout will be available for the stocking season of 1963. After the first year, production will be stepped up each year until the ultimate of 200,000 pounds is reached.

The site of the new hatchery was literally cut out of the hillside, providing a picturesque setting. Color of the buildings is the same reddish brown tone as the surroundings and precipitous outcroppings of rock aid in blending the installation to, its location.

The station, which consists of 40 large rearing ponds along with the hatchery 2-buildings, including hatchery and nursery ponds, will operate entirely on pumped water from the Colorado River in that area. The station is mechanized to a high degree in order to reduce man power in handling and feeding of the fish.

At present, planting schedules and allocations of the fish to specific locales in the area have not been completely worked out and just how the fish from the station

will be distributed between Glenn Canyon and Parker is not known.

24,398 Visit The Dam

A total of 24,398 visitors took the guided tour through Boulder Dam and Powerplant during February. The daily average for the month was 871 visitors. This year's total to date is 46,518, as compared to last year's 48,991.

Noteworthy visitor for the month was Rear Admiral John Quinn, Director of Pan-American Affairs, Navy Department, Washington, D.C.

Special courtesies were extended to fourteen foreign visitors from the following countries: Brazil, Canada, China, India, Japan, Pakistan, and Turkey. 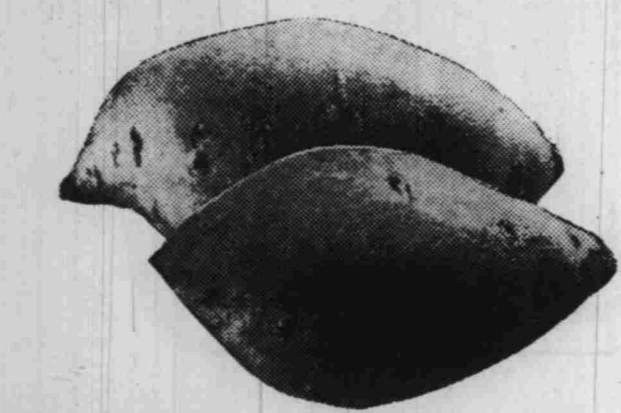

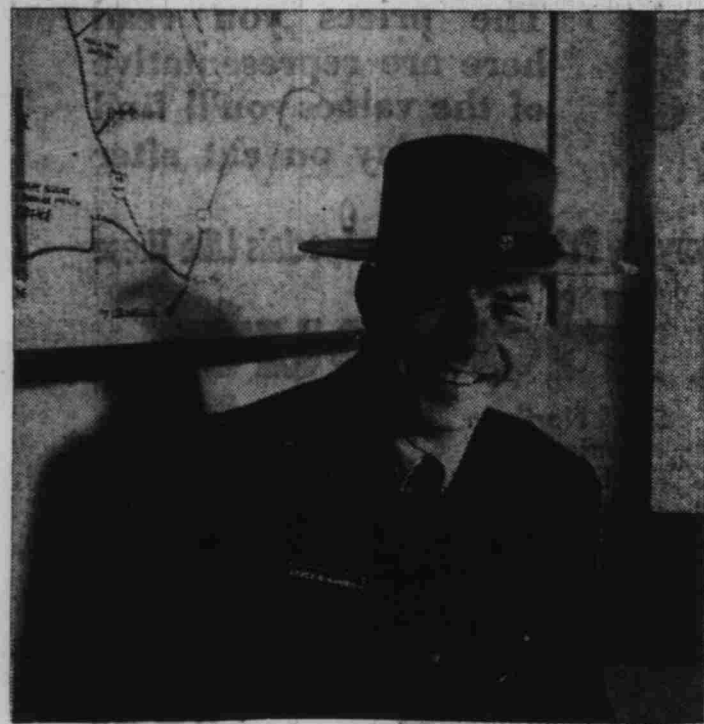

SILVER DOLLAR HISTORY STUDY SAYS LAST MINTING IN 1935

Westerners glance at them with a great deal of resignation when receiving them as change for a bill of large denomination; Eastern and Mid-Westerners avidly cache them to take back home to show their friends. We're talking about the silver dollar or "cartwheel".

It might be interesting to note that the dollar has not been minted since 1935 and that year, according to a guide book on United States coins, almost four million were struck.

The silver dollar was authorized by Congress April 2, 1792 and the first issues appeared in 1794. Until 1804, all silver dollars had the value stamped on the edge: "Hundred cents, one dollar or unit." After a lapse in coinage covering the period 1804 to 1840 these coins had reeded edges and the value was stamped on the reverse side.

Several interesting patterns were produced by Christian Gobrecht from 1836 to 1839. The seated figure of Liberty was the resulting type, becoming a regular coinage issue starting in 1840. From then on, the edge was reeded.

The word dollar evolves from the German Taler, the name given to the first large-sized European silver coin. It originated in the Tyrol in 1484 and was designed as a substitute for the gold Florin. The coin immediately caught on, and many other countries struck silver coins.

The Spanish Dollar or piece-of-eight was widely used and familiar to everyone in the English-American colonies. It was only natural, therefore, that the word "dollar" was adopted officially as the standard monetary unit of the United States by Congress on July 6, 1785.

The 321 silver dollars reported for 1805 were not dated that year, but were found among Spanish Dollars brought to the mint. They were of an earlier coinage and instead of being melted, were transferred to the Director of the Mint.

The 1804 dollar is one of the most publicized rarities in the U.S. series and there are specimens known as originals (type 1) of which seven are known, and restrikes (type 2) of which seven are known.

Mint records show that 19,570 silver dollars were coined in 1804 and were struck before March 28 of that year. Years later a die with the date 1804 was found at the mint among discarded dies.

It is a matter of record that Director Boudinot stopped the coinage of silver that year because the face value was less than the bullion value. It is supposed that the coins were never released, but thrown back into the melting pot. The record also shows that seven 1804 dollars were reserved for assay and these may be the original type now held by museums and collectors.

Although history says that 19,570 dollars were coined in 1804, in no place is it mentioned that they were dated that year.

Coinage of the silver dollar was again suspended after 1904 when the bullion supply became exhausted. Under provisions of the Pittman Act of 1918 coinage of the silver dollar was resumed in 1921.

During the Chicago Convention of American Numismatic Association in August, 1920, a resolution calling for a commemorative peace coin was passed and the Peace Dollar came into being January 3, 1922. More than a million coins were struck of this issue in December, 1921.
