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Ind. Days Makes Less \$\$\$ But Is A Great Success

"The Chamber of Commerce won't make as much money this year as in 1961," Burkholder, Industrial Days chairman said yesterday, "but it was one of the grandest Industrial Days celebrations we have ever had."
Reason for the drop in revenue for the Chamber from a round figure of \$2,500 to an approximate figure of \$1,500 this spring was a drop in booster button sales and in ride book sales. There was only 1,100 booster buttons sold in 1962 as compared with 1,700 in 1961, and 1,000 fewer ride books sold this year than in 1961.
Lyal Burkholder who did a superb job as chairman of the Industrial Days Committee as is his usual custom, was loud in his praise of all com-

mittee members. He especially lauded Dan Reed his assistant chairman, and Ron Langford for their performance.
"All of the events were great," Burkholder told the Home News. "The sports car races were outstanding, and will grow in the years ahead," the chairman added.
"The fireworks display was bigger than ever, and sponsors of this event should be proud of the exhibition," Burkholder said yesterday. These fireworks were sponsored by Thunderbird Hotel, Wells Cargo, Southern Nevada-American Potash, Stauffer Chemical, U.S. Lime and Henderson Land Development Company.
The beauty contest, square dance, hobby show, flower show, horse show and parade

all tops according to the local school administrator. The square dance festival according to reports attracted a large crowd, and drew from California, Utah and Arizona as well as locally.
In closing his discussion of the 1962 Industrial Days, Lyal Burkholder said he wanted to express his appreciation to all who helped make the celebration a success. He said that Keith Lopeman and the Kiwanis Club staged a great beauty show. Burkholder said he was very much impressed with dignity with which the beauty contest was handled.
Special praise went Chamber of Commerce president Phil Hubel for his part in making the event one of the best in the city's history.

MAYOR'S ENTHUSIASM UNBOUNDED

Far-Reaching Developments Assure A Wonderful Future For Our City

Henderson today is on the very threshold of the greatest growth and development in its history. Its improvement, physical and economic, during the past eight years of its childhood should be a sense of pride to everyone who has been here during that period, but the best is yet to come.

During the past six or seven years we have installed streets, curbs and sidewalks in practically the whole of our city; we have improved the water system and storage facilities by the investment of hundreds of thousands of dollars; miles of sewer mains and the City's own sewage disposal plant have been installed; many new businesses have joined our community; that very important part of our economy — the industrial plant operations — have continued at a maximum of production and several have added greatly to their operating facilities; an excellent golf course and country clubhouse which is fast becoming one of the best playing courses in our State.

Now for the future. During the past year hundreds of acres of the thousands sold by the City to private investors have begun to be subdivided for various purposes. In the Valley View area a 125 unit trailer park has been built by the Henderson Development Company, headed by Harry Polk and associates, which is already occupied by approximately thirty modern trailer-homes and within the next few months will be completely occupied and established as one of the finest trailer parks in the County. It is now owned and operated by Ron Richardson, owner and operator of the Ballerina Trailer Park in the Las Vegas area. The Ballerina park in Henderson will be even more modern and beautiful than the one at Vegas.

A short way down the Vegas Wash Road toward the Lake the new Trailer Estates sub-division is presently under construction and when completed within the next month or so will establish 140 completely improved trailer estates with water, sewer, gas, electric energy, streets and street-lighting. This is another project of Harry Polk in association with Mr. Bill Moore, of Western Industries and the Showboat Hotel.

Generally behind the Bowling Alley and along Major Street and Center Street a

Industrial Park Item Tops The Council Agenda

Topping the agenda for the regular Monday night meeting of the city council is the engineering report on water and sewer lines. This session to be held at Eagles Hall will probably see the finalizing of the contract between the city and Industrial Park for 1,040 acres of land which will be developed by Joe Wells, Harry Polk and Associates.

The engineers have been studying water line needs and sewer line requirements for the Industrial Park area. They will make recommendations Monday night, and the city and Industrial Park will abide by the decision. The developers will install water pipe larger than eight inches if the engineers recommend it, but the cost of the larger pipe will be borne by the city. The same situation prevails in regard to sewer pipe. The developers feel 10 inch pipe will suffice, but if the engineers pipe, Industrial Park will install the pipe, and the city will pay for the difference between 10 inch pipe the size suggested by the engineers.

Both the city and the developers hope to finish up the huge land deal Monday so work can start immediately to develop the area.

Also listed under deferred matters in the contract with the Las Vegas Sports Car Club, an agreement with the Junior Chamber of Commerce on bench advertising, final plans for the intersection of water and Frontier and the swimming pool ordinance.

A report on sports car races held April 28, 29 and discussion of an easement at Sunrise 1-A are on the agenda under new business. A resolution on management of the race track is also on the agenda.

ROGER HOFFMANN — American-Potash — "I drew Phil Rodgers in a pool so I'll be forced to pick him. Understand he has been real hot in practice sessions too."

BURT HOFFMAN — California employee: "I like the chances of Jay Hebert. When Jay's putter gets hot he is real hard to handle. Herbert was runner-up to Barber in that record breaking performance in 1960 remember?"

WILLIAM BYRNE — Mayor of the city: "I'll have to go with the 5-1 choice Arnold Palmer. The way he is playing now he'll be hard to beat."

I'll take Gene Littler for second place, and Bill Casper for third."

ROD DELANEY — Industrial plant employee: "I'll string along with Arnold Palmer who is the tournament favorite. His play has been sensational at times this year."

SELMA BARTLETT — Assistant Manager of Bank of Nevada: "I am picking Sam Snead to repeat. He was good enough to win last year, and I think he can come right back again this year."

BOB LUNT — Assistant Principal at Basic High: "I am not an authority on golf even if I do serve as Basic golf coach, but I have a feeling that Doug Sanders, the golfer with the unorthodox swing will win this one. I have an unusual swing too, and this is why I am going for Doug."

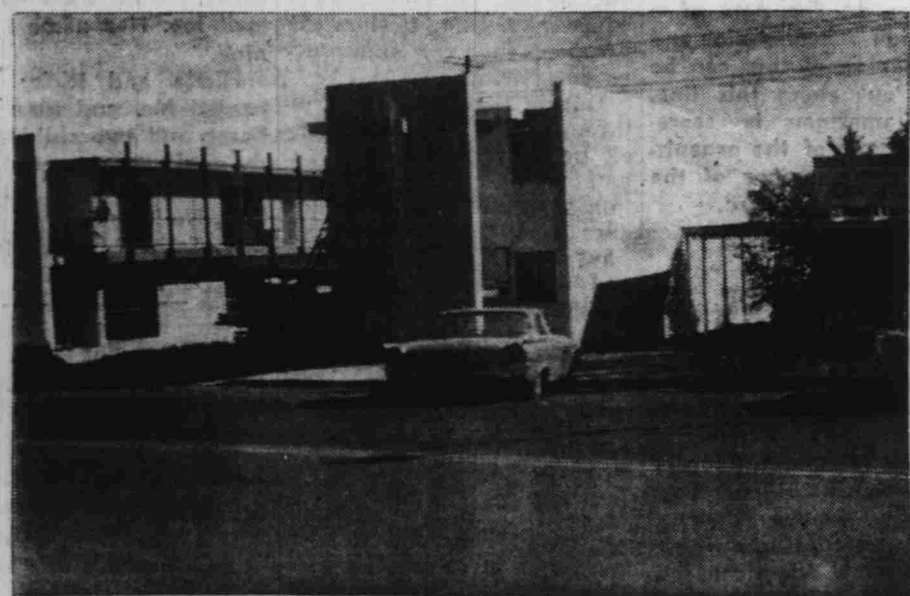
CLARE MC CALLUM — Titanium employee, and holder of a hole-in-one at Black

Mountain Country Club: "I think Bill Casper is overdue. He knows how to play the desert courses, and has been runnerup here before."

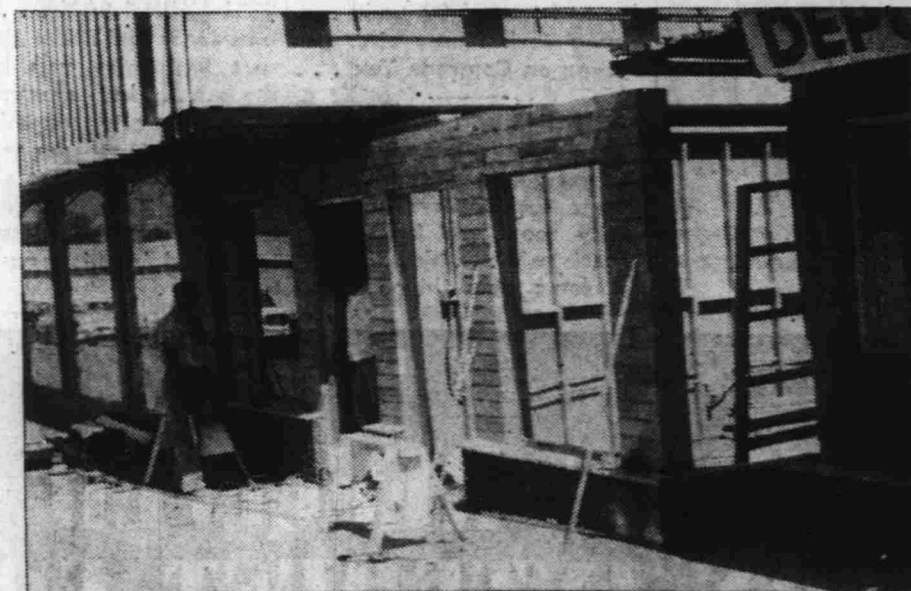

Boulder Dam R.R. Sold To Calif. Firm

The railroad line, fondly known as the "Boulder City & Back", officially as the Hoover Dam Construction Railroad, will soon join Nevada's historic past. The 11.32 miles of track were sold yesterday to Lipsett Division Luria Bros., of New York and California for a bid of \$89,920.08. Three of the flat cars went to the same firm for \$309.09.

National Metal & Steel Corp. of Terminal Island purchased the 65 ton diesel locomotive for \$7,831.00 and Henderson Industrial Park bought the 30-ton locomotive for \$1,501.00.

According to Bob Parker at the No. 2 warehouse, the last train load to go to the dam carried transformer oil for N-8 generator in September, 1961 and the last to come out of the dam was the heavy construction equipment belonging to Shirley, Gunther & Lane who installed the last unit, finishing in December of that year.

The successful bidder expects to start removing the track as soon as possible before hot-weather sets in. They were not present when the bids were opened at the Bureau of Reclamation.

The rails were a spur line from the Union Pacific and were laid before the town of Boulder City came into being.

The terminal point up here was at that time known as the Summit.

During Boulder Dam construction days, the line operated around the clock. Only two or three cars could be handled at a time because of the steep grade and more often than not the big diesel spun her wheels in reverse to navigate that final grade.

The distance to the dam from Boulder is only about six miles but the extra track had to be laid to temper off the steepness of the path to the dam.

The unusual characteristic of the railroad, and one which caught the fancy of railroad buffs, was that it was strictly a one-way road. Materials came into the dam area, but nothing came out.

No ceremonies marked the final trip, but Blackie Hardie and Mayor Morgan Sweeney, having been with the Boulder Dam Project since its early beginning, both let out an nostalgic sigh as the empty tank car, which had carried the last parts of the generator, rose slowly 600 feet in the air and gradually faded from sight.

This reporter can't help it feel that Boulder, or the state of Nevada, let a valuable heritage escape them when they didn't hang on to "Old 8810" as the big diesel was called affectionately, and preserve her as a hallmark of the building of the dam. Just as the Old Frontier in Las Vegas was sold to a Californian, so goes our favorite Toonerville Trolley. Why should California swipe our history — let her illustrate her own!

Industrial Park Buys An Engine

Bids were opened at 2 p.m. yesterday by the Bureau of Reclamation on the Boulder City railroad (1 1/2 miles of track), two locomotives and some flat cars. Henderson Industrial Park was third high in bidding for the track, and was high bidder for a 30-ton six wheel Davenport-Bessler locomotive.

Mayor William Byrne who works with the Industrial Park group made the announcement of the purchase yesterday afternoon. He did not divulge the price of the locomotive however. A New York concern was high bidder for the track according to Mayor Byrne.

The locomotive purchased by Industrial Park will be moved to the site in the near future and be used in this area during development of the park.

The Boulder City Railroad was built during dam construction days, and used extensively at that time. The track 1 1/2 miles in length starts at the dam, runs around the dam to Boulder City.

Completion of the deal for Industrial Park with the city is expected to be finalized at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night at Eagles Hall. Engineers are studying the size of the pipe needed for the area, and will make recommendations to the council Monday. Both the city and the Industrial Park group have agreed to abide by the engineers' recommendations. If a water line larger than eight inches is suggested, the city will pay the cost of the extra size of pipe, and the developers will lay the pipe. A 10 inch pipe has been suggested for the sewer line.

sub-division of improved lots has been created by Mr. Polk and Mr. Boyd Bullock. These are completely improved lots, including sidewalks, and will — at long last — make available improved lots upon which a purchaser can build his own home to his own architectural desires. Several of these are city owned.

Also in this area, approximately 40 acres of land are presently under development by a group of Henderson citizens who banded together in a co-operative effort which resulted in the purchase of these acres from the City and which will shortly contain 30 or 40 beautiful new homes to be occupied by the group who are doing the sub-division. Starlight Homes and another 40-acre sub-division by Art Espinoza and Associates is in the immediate offering.

During the past year Mr. Mark Leff has presented to your Planning Board and City Council tentative and final plans for the construction of hundreds of developed and completely improved half-acre and larger lots which will be sold to purchasers all over the Country, particularly retired people, upon which to build their homes. These estates are located in the area of our Golf course and Country Club.

On the other side of the Boulder Highway Mr. Leff will build — the plans for which have already been approved by the City Council — a Senior Citizen development which will establish a complete new community within that area. A bit further up along the Highway Mr. Leff will establish a beautifully landscaped cemetery and crematory. Two beautiful ultra-modern motels will probably break ground this year.

A year and a half ago Mr. Harry Polk and associates began negotiations with the City to purchase over a thousand acres of land from the City for the creation of an Industrial Park at Henderson for the introduction of new and additional industries in our City. One of the most pleasant parts of writing this report is being able to now say that the deliberations and discussions between all the parties concerned have been brought to successful fruition.

Mr. oe Wells of Wells-Cargo Construction Company and substantial owner of the Thunderbird Hotel will be the most substantial interest in the Industrial Park development and, associated with Mr. Harry Polk, will begin the actual development of the park within the next few months after the agreements are signed within the next week or so.

The Industrial Park, I believe, will be one of the most important economic steps forward that we have made during the brief history of our corporate city and will create the situation where Clark County will now be able to offer to industries interested in coming to Nevada, land areas completely improved with water, gas, electric energy, streets and roads, street lighting, sewage system, and any other improvement needed by industries in the conduct of their business, instead of having nothing to show the prospects than raw unimproved desert land.

During the past two or three months I was approached by representatives of a national Sports Car Association to conduct a road-race here during our Industrial Days celebration. Meetings and discussions eventually decided that the race should be held at the area of our present Drag Strip if the track could be improved and made larger.

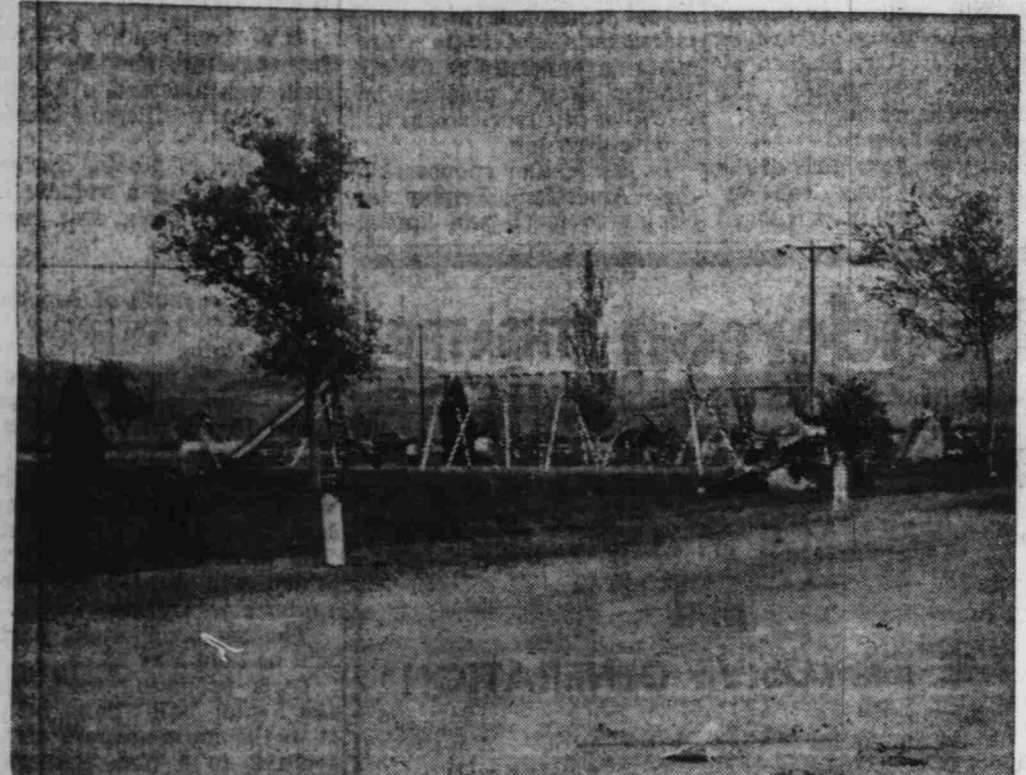

Mayor Seeks Job Openings For Youth

Mayor William Byrne today called on Henderson employers to put the assets of youth to work in their firms.

His appeal was made with an endorsement of the nationwide Jobs for Youth drive being pressed locally by the Las Vegas office of the Nevada State Employment Service which serves Henderson residents. Governor Sawyer also has given his support to the drive.

Noting that employers face a growing shortage of qualified workers in the prime age groups, particularly in "demand" occupations, Mayor Byrne urged employers to tap the reservoir of job-hunting, out-of-school youth. He pointed out that young people possess the qualities needed by every firm: a fresh outlook, ability to learn quickly and eagerness to do a job well.

Slogan of the campaign is "Put Youth on a Job—Today's Investment, Tomorrow's Profit."

"I call upon all local employers to fill existing trainee and other beginner job openings now and to make ready to fill the developing gaps in their work force by hiring trainable youth now," the mayor said.

"I also urge that employers avail themselves of the know-how of the State Employment Service in matching the skills and aptitudes of young beginners with their job openings."

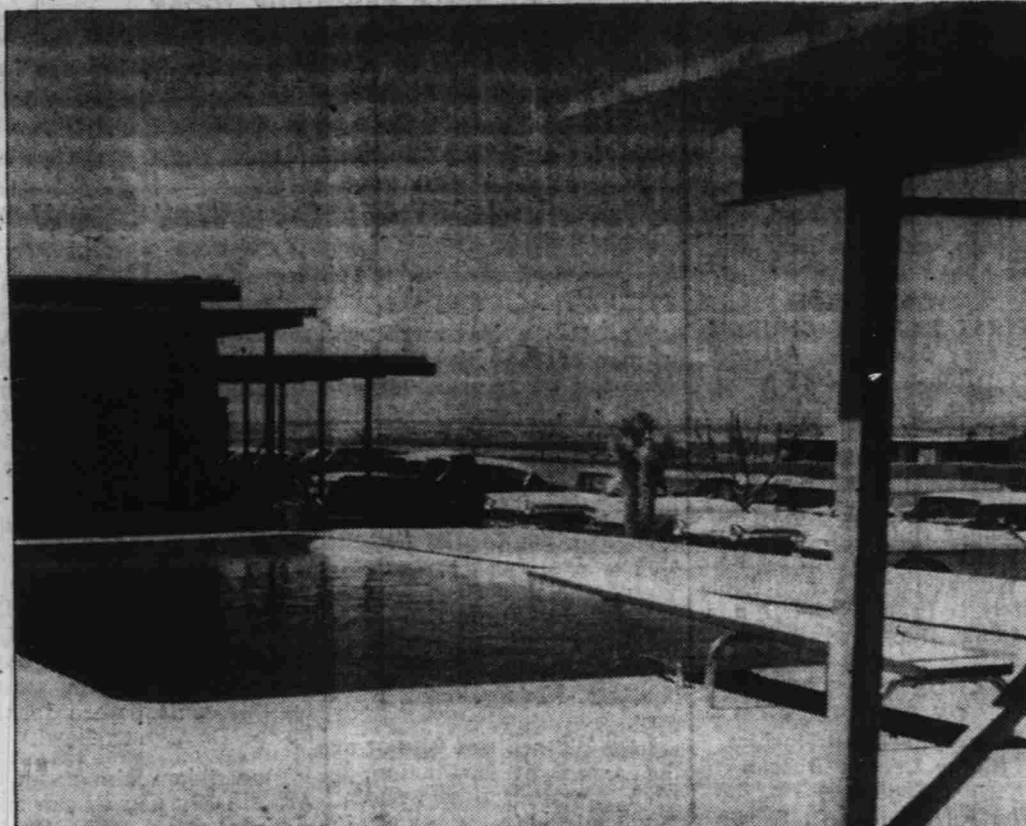

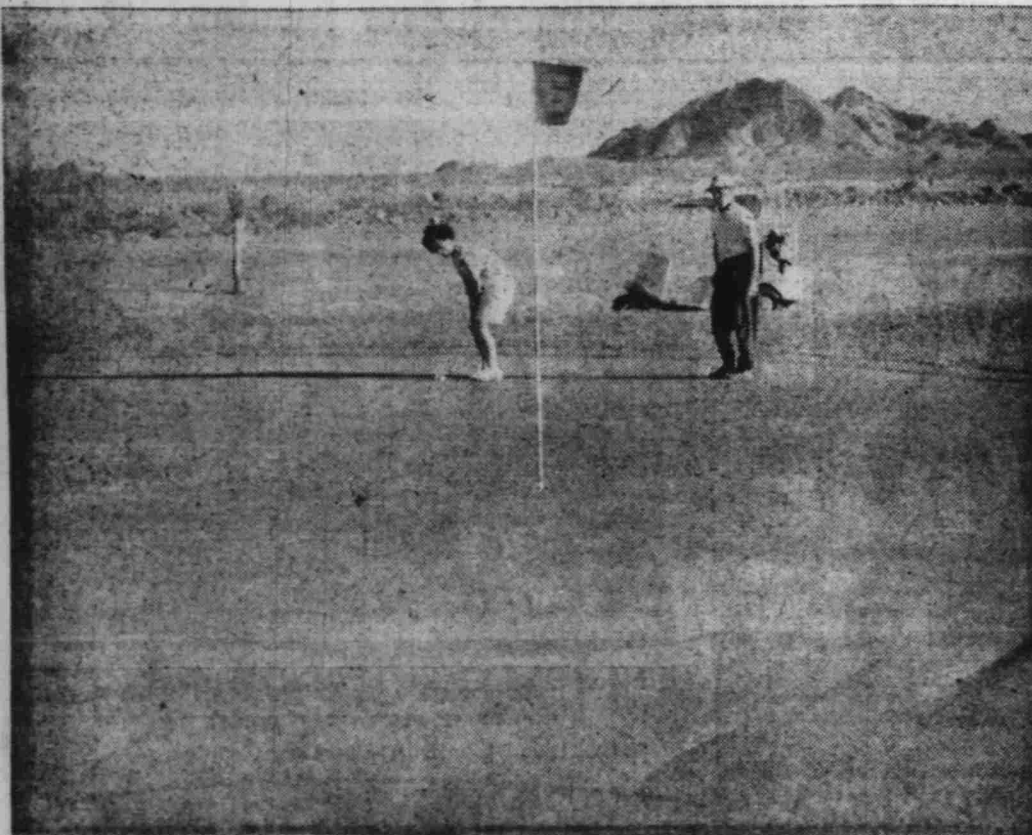

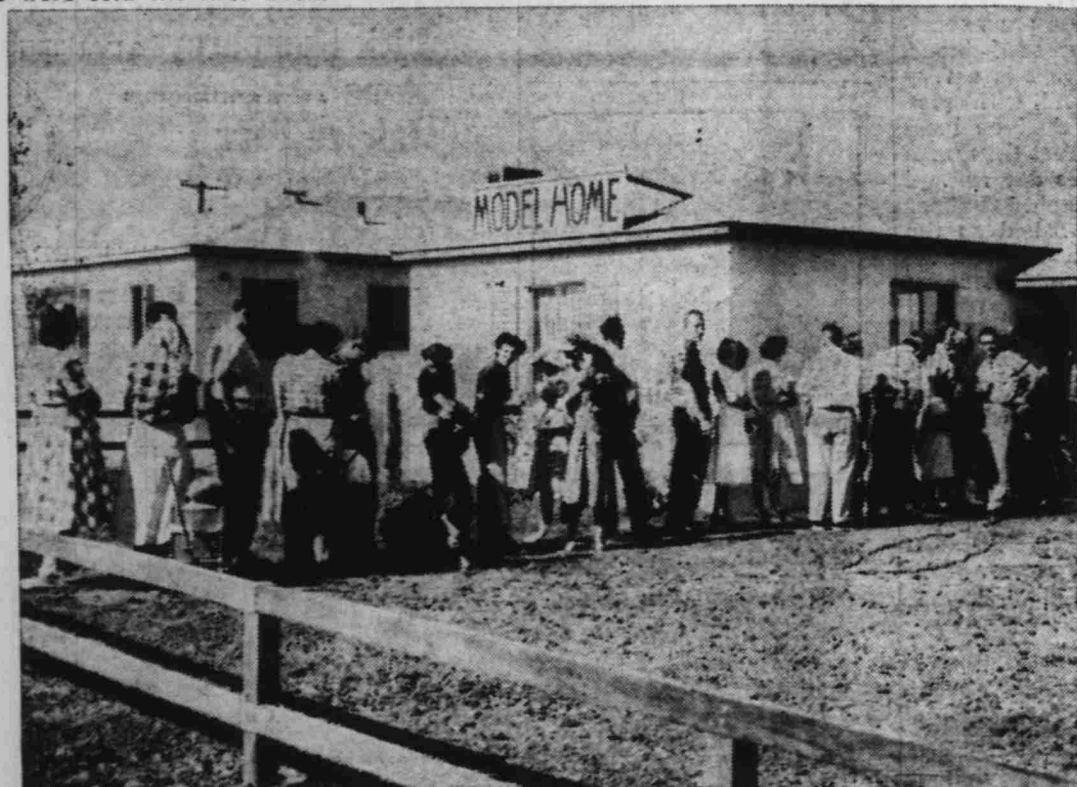

HAVE DOG TROUBLES**

Poundmaster Terry Larkin recently visited Salt Lake City and while there the following item in one of the Salt Lake papers caught his eye. Terry wonders if this system might help stem some of the local dog problems? We print it for your consideration.

OWNER FINED \$75 AS DOG RUNS LOOSE — A Salt Lake woman Tuesday morning was ordered to pay fines totaling \$75 or serve 15 days in jail on two citations for permitting a dog to run at large.

The fines, which were paid at the time of sentencing, were ordered by City Judge J. Patton Neeley as part of a program he announced to levy increased penalties to assist the City Animal Control Department in its enforcement of dog ordinances.

The woman, whose name is not important here, told Judge Neeley that she had received the two citations on succeeding days, April 3 and April 4, but that she felt there had been but one offense, since she had been unable to locate her dog from the time it escaped from the care of a child until after the two citations had been issued.

H. C. Wood, in charge of the Animal Control Department, reported that in each instance, the dog had eluded capture by his officers, but that they had been able to trail it to the Allen residence.

DOGS ON THE LOOSE

Letters to the editor which are not signed cannot be printed. That is one of the oldest rules in the newspaper business, for the paper must know who is responsible for every word printed, whether it be in advertising or news columns.

Sometimes the thoughts contained in such anonymous letters deserve consideration, even though the entire message is not printed. One such letter deals with the dog nuisance in Reno. The wanton disregard of dog owners for their neighbors, and the apathy of Reno officials toward this nuisance has raised indignation in the letter writer, who is not alone in this feeling.

The city ordinances declare that owners shall not let their dogs run at large, or commit trespass, or otherwise become a nuisance — and one of these nuisances is the barking and yelping that disturbs a neighborhood.

The humane society is designated as official pound-keeper and enforcer of the ordinances, but its enforcement seems to be limited to sporadic efforts to collect license fees, nothing more.

Some dog owners seem to take offense at any effort to regulate their pets. They take the attitude that dogs have a suprallegal right to commit any kind of offense or nuisance or trespass, rights that are denied to humans. Acts that never would be tolerated if committed by humans are considered to be freedoms granted to dogs by some power or authority that can't be found in the law books.

The fanatical dog lovers are entitled to their devotions, but that doesn't mean that the rest of the population must share this adulation, and the city certainly is bound to enforce the laws on the subject of dogs and to protect those persons whose yards and gardens are wrecked or fouled by free-ranging dogs, or whose nights are made hideous by howls and yappings from next door or across the street.
