Council Looks Over Floor Plans For New City Hall Here

City Council members Monday night got a look at the recommended floor plan of the new city hall on Water Street. Harold Corbin, city administrator who worked with the architects in drawing up the suggested floor plan explained the lay-out to the members of the council in their regular meeting at Eagles Hall.

Corbin told the group he made some slight changes in the plans from the original plans made months ago. The new floor plan places the clerk's office, building superintendent and maintenance offices in one wing of the building, and has the police station, lock-up and Municipal Court in the other end.

Two vaults were relocated in the new floor plan according to Corbin. It will be possible to lock off one end of the building while keeping the police station and the other end of the steel building open.

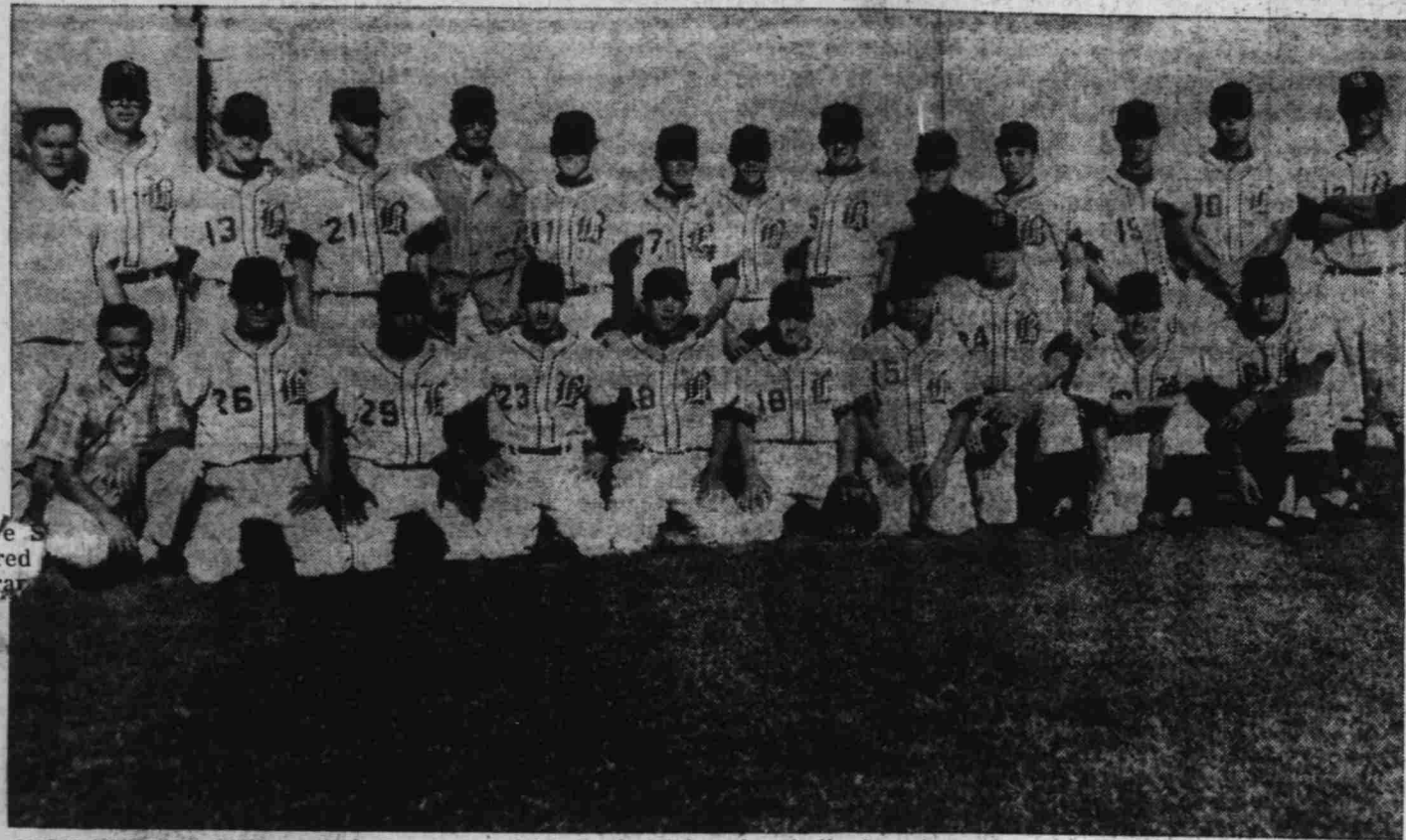
The last of the houses on Water Street will be moved this week. After the architects have finished the drawings for the city hall, bids will be advertised, and then work can begin on the new building.

The cost of the building will be in the neighborhood of \$200,000 it was reported at a recent council meeting. City Auditor Don Dawson has \$114,000 in the treasury for this construction, and the balance will be raised through a loan from the state under council plans.

Construction of the city hall could start in September, and the building might be completed by Christmas, architects advised council members.

The Municipal Court room of the new City Hall will be a multi-purpose room according to Harold Corbin, city administrator. In addition to serving as the court room in the day time, the room will be used by the council for regular meetings.

There will also be a council room in the other end of the building which will be used for special council meetings, and council committee sessions. The planning commission is also expected to meet in the council chamber.

Sawyer Denies Report He Will Run For U.S. Senate

Governor Grant Sawyer, late yesterday afternoon issued a statement denying he has any intention of running for United States Senate.

He made the following comments to the press "... in order to clarify any possible misunderstanding relative to my position, let me again say that I have filed for a second term as governor. This term is for four years.

"I aspire only to the office for which I have filed and to no other either elective or appointive. ...

"If elected, I would expect to serve a full term and have no intention of voluntarily vacating the office for any reason now known or reasonably anticipated."

Bob Taylor Has A Putting Green In His Own Yard

Bob Taylor, Park Village principal and outstanding local golfer comes from a family of golfers. He and his father and mother and three brothers all started playing the game on a dirt course at Ruth, Nevada almost 27 years ago. Bob was 15 when he started swinging golf clubs.

Taylor joined the school system here in 1948, and has maintained a great interest in golf ever since he started playing back in Ruth.

Realizing that putting is a very important phase of the game, Bob Taylor installed a putting green on his lawn at 206 Minor not long ago. He and his father Louis Taylor, 71, take advantage of the putting green often, and it has improved their game considerably.

For the past three years, Taylor has dominated amateur play at the Black Mountain Country Club course where he is a member. He has won the club championships three straight years, and is highly favored to repeat again this season.

Bob was also the low amateur in the Black Mountain open tournament last year, and he rates as one of the top amateurs in the approaching best ball tournament to be held at Black Mountain, Stardust and Paradise Valley.

Taylor says his father Louis, 71 is the real golfer of the family. The elder Taylor plays daily, indicating that he is even more smitten with the golf bug than his highly regarded amateur son. Louis Taylor, a miner retired some time ago, and has thoroughly enjoyed his tours around the Black Mountain Country Club course.

"I think golf has added years to Dad's life," Bob Taylor said Tuesday in discussing his fathers daily golf rounds. The elder Taylor was forced to retire from mining because of an ailment, but days in the sunshine playing golf have worked wonders, Bob Taylor advised.

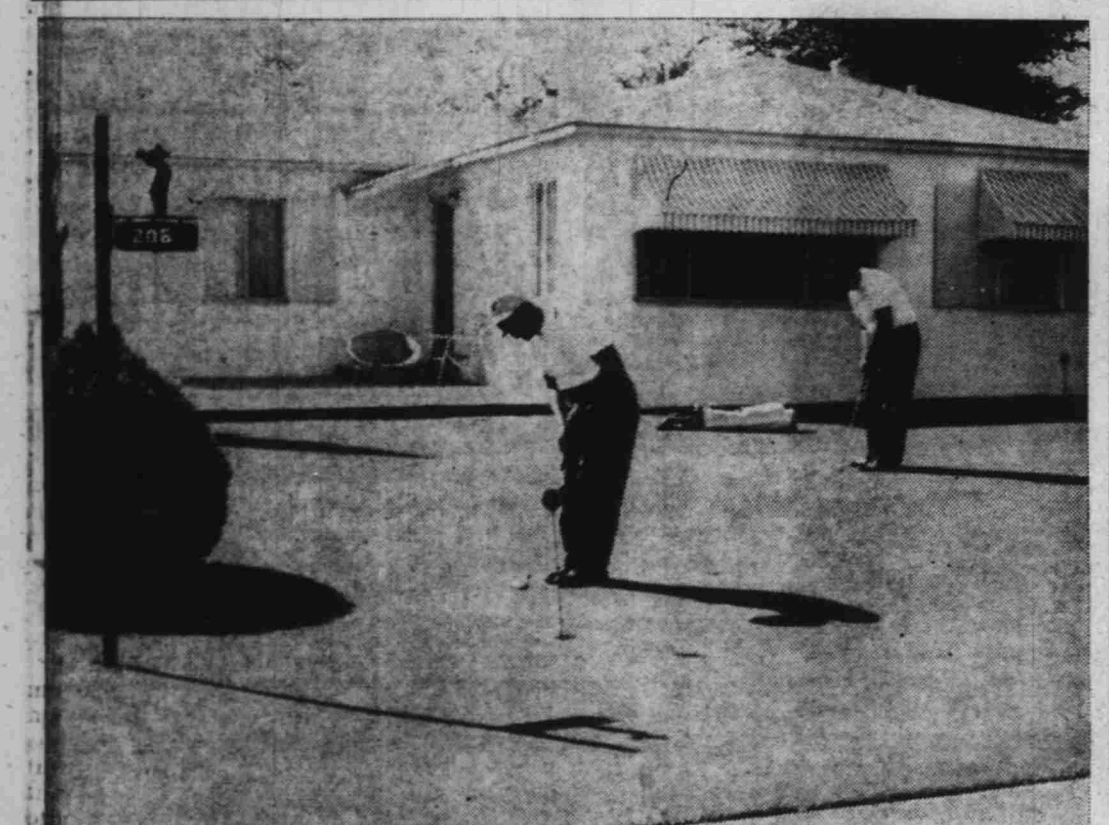

Jerry was graduated from Basic High School where he was active in football, track, dramatics, Science Club and Spanish Club.

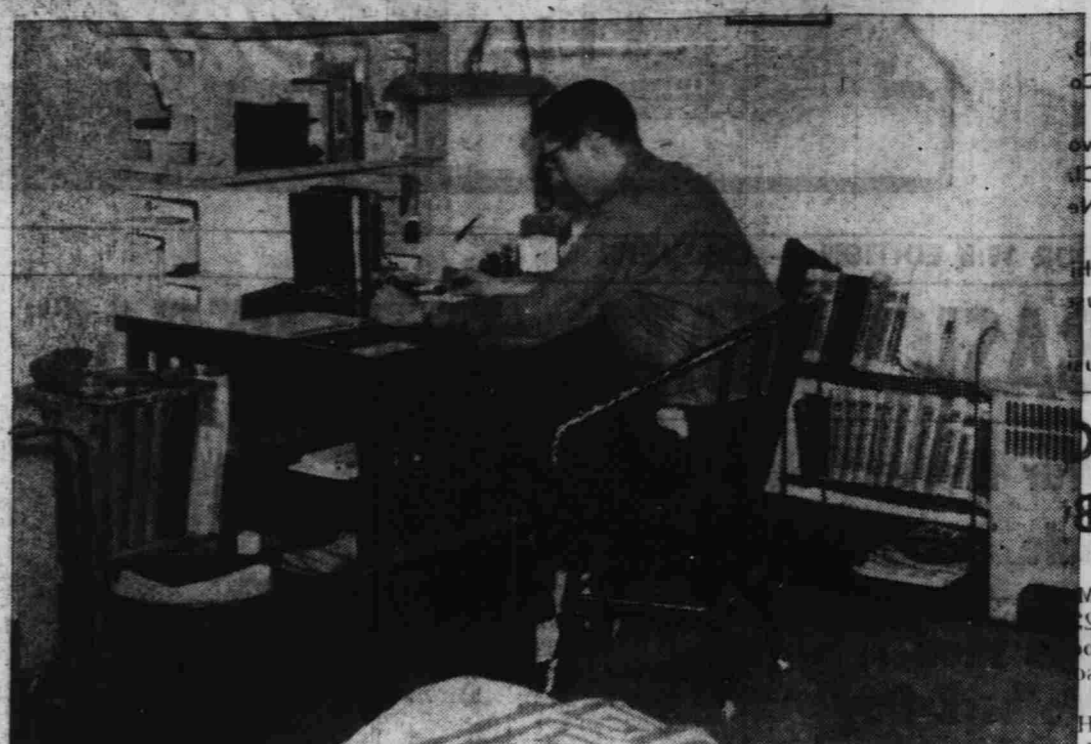

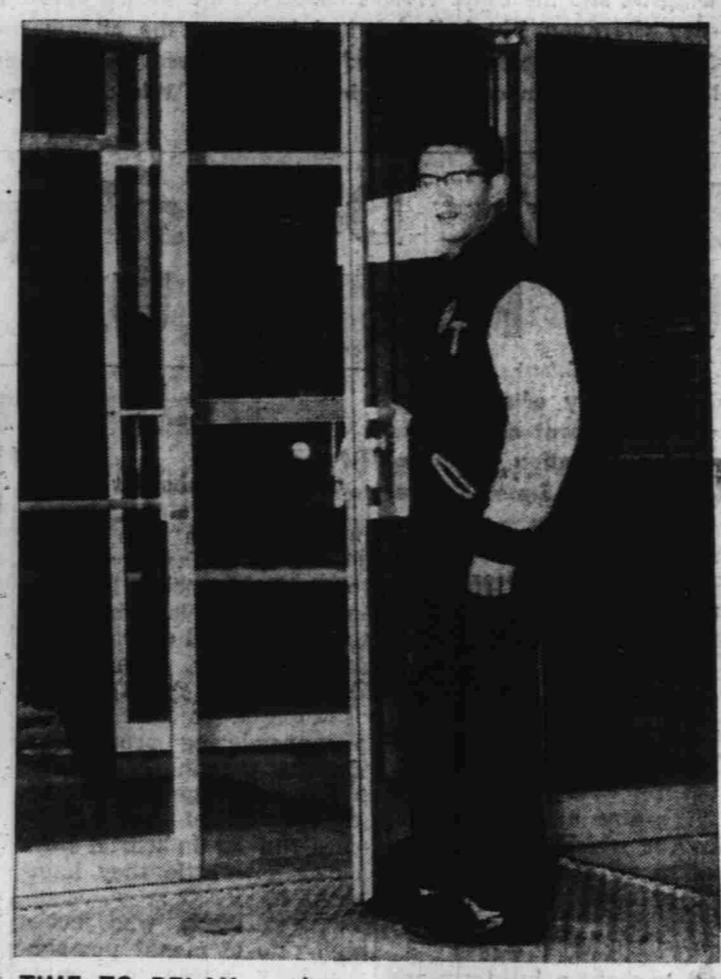

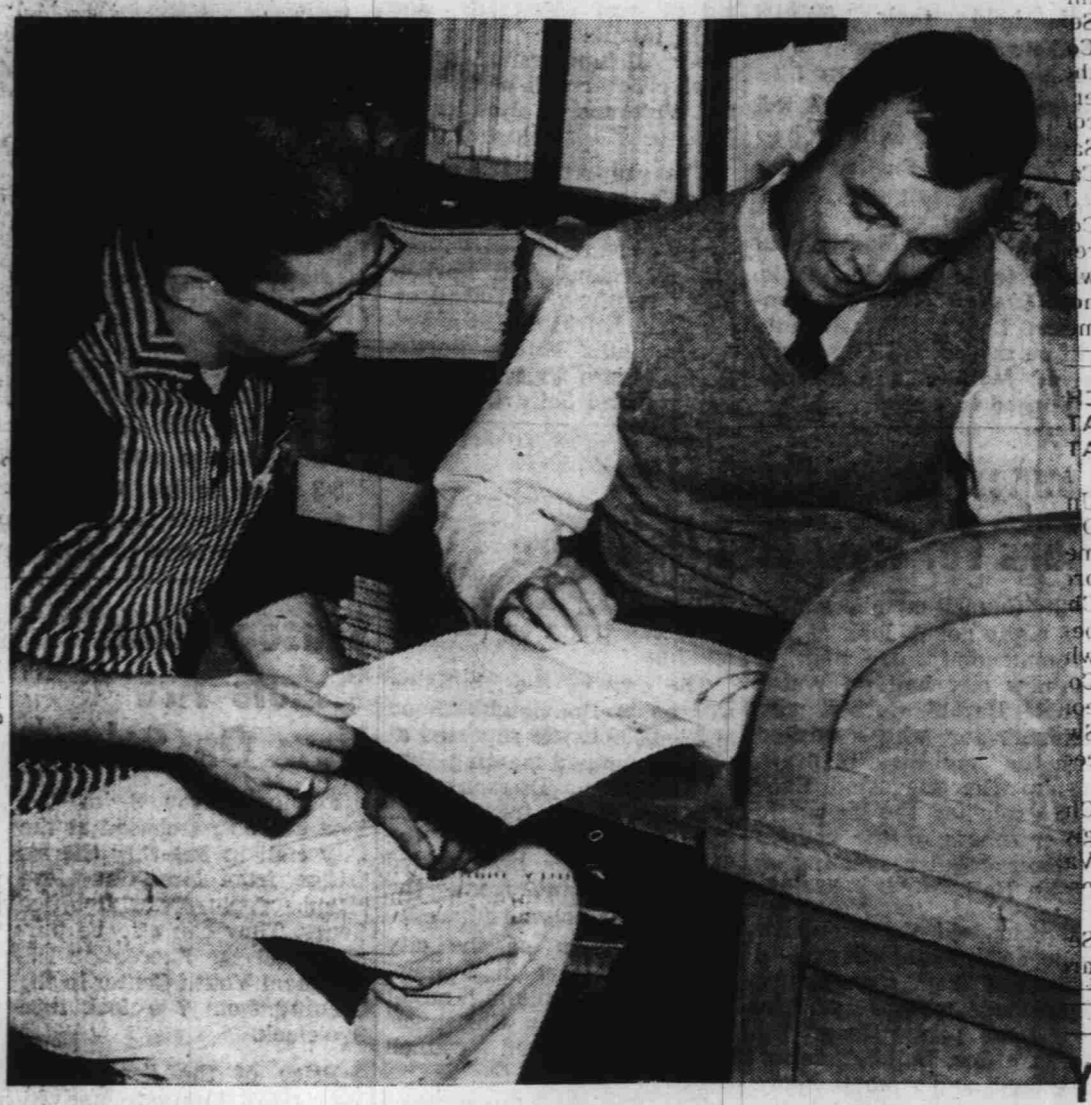
HOME WORK — Jerry is shown studying in his room in the School of Mines Residence Hall.

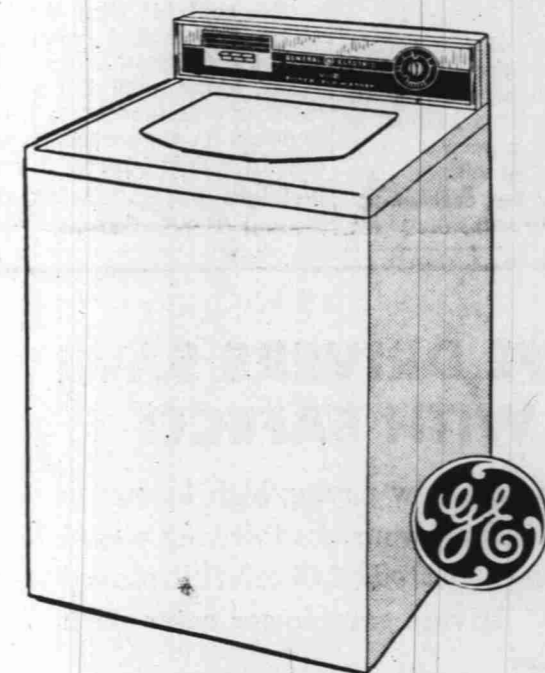

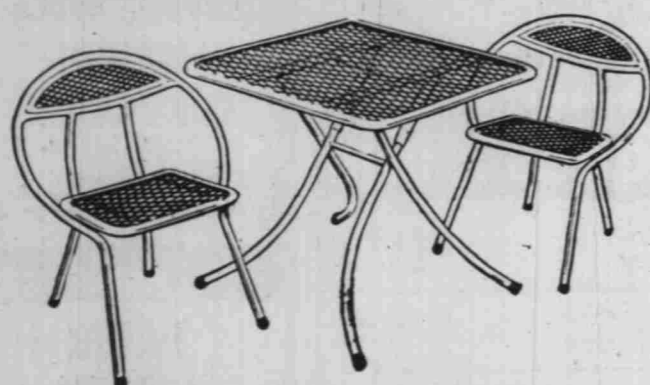

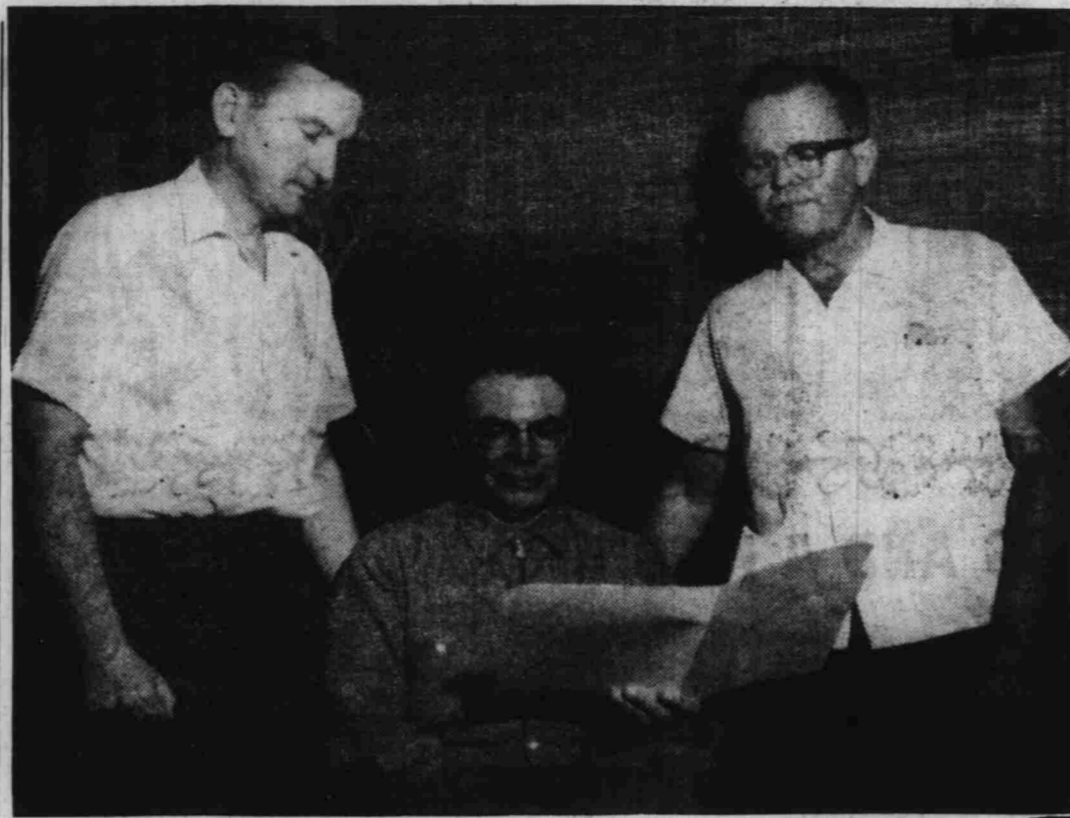

City Council In Recessed Session Tonight At 8 p.m.

The City Council will hold a recessed meeting at 8 tonight at the City Hall to discuss several matters which were not cleared up at the regular meeting of the council at Eagles Hall last Monday night.

The matter of the recommendation of Ted Turegun for a 12 inch pipe in the Industrial Park area instead of an eight inch pipe was to be considered. Councilmen asked the matter be recessed until they could consider the

cost of pipe for the project. The city agreed to pay for the difference in size of the pipe from the eight inch size to the 12 inch pipe advocated by the engineer.

The contract with the Las Vegas Sports Car group also will be weighed again tonight, along with the agreement of the Jaycees to place benches on the streets of the city in public places. Jaycee member appeared before the council Monday night, and

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Public's Reaction Sought On Educational Principles

A proposed statement of educational principles is being developed by school district officials for consideration by the Clark County School Trustees for possible adoption in the County School District.

School officials feel that one of the greatest problems facing a public school district is a clear definition of its primary tasks as opposed to the educational tasks of other institutions in our society.

Not having the human or material resources to be "all things to all people," school officials have found it necessary to make many decisions of a priority nature, choosing from among alternatives what is considered most important.

It is not enough to use merely the criterion, "Is it good for the youth of our community?" to determine what the primary tasks of the school district shall be. We must determine what is the most important, in terms of what the public school can do best.

Considerable time has been spent in the past to increase continually the quality of public school education in this district. Now school officials wish to utilize the thinking of teachers and members of the community which they serve. They will greatly appreciate candid reactions and criticisms of the statement of educational principles printed below.

Write briefly your comments and either give them to the principal of your local school or mail directly to the office of Leland B. Newcomer, Superintendent of Clark County Schools, Box 551, Las Vegas, Nevada.

All suggestions or criticisms will be considered before the final draft of the statement of educational principles is submitted to the County School Trustees for consideration.

TENTATIVE STATEMENT OF EDUCATIONAL PRINCIPLES

The Board of School Trustees of the Clark County School District recognizes that it has responsibility for educating all students in the District. It recognizes that the entire person comes to school and that the school cannot well ignore his health, character, and total personality development, but that the school cannot assume complete responsibility for the total development of the student. This responsibility must be shared by the home, the church, and the total community with its various organizations and environmental conditions.

The Board of School Trustees thus recognizes that the Clark County School District is but one of several institutions in our society and community that has responsibility for the educational development of our students, and that the primary responsibility of the District should be the achievement of those educational goals which are uniquely ours and for which the other institutions of our society and community do not assume major responsibility.

In keeping with the above statements, the Board of School Trustees of this District believes that the area of Primary responsibility assigned to the school is that of maximum intellectual development of students including the development of their ability to apply their intellect to the solution of the problems of citizenship in a democratic society. Therefore, this district will concentrate its resources and develop an educational program to discharge this primary responsibility.

The Board further recognizes, however, that if the education of its students is to be complete, the educational tasks of other community agencies must be supported and reinforced. Thus, the District shall assume secondary or shared responsibility for the physical development, social-emotional development, and ethical-moral development of its students.

Consistent with the above state principles, the Clark County School District shall assume primary responsibility for and instruct each student toward his maximum achievement of the following educational goals:

1. An inquiring mind, with a continuing desire for knowledge and maximum educational effort, including the development of effective study skills and habits.
2. The ability to think clearly and accurately, draw conclusions, make decisions, and take action based on evidence.
3. Excellence in the use of the basic tools of learning in functional problem solving and in the acquisition of information, facts, and knowledge about the world and its people.
4. Excellence in the skills of communication, these to include the ability to read and comprehend the printed word, the ability to express himself clearly and accurately, both in writing and speech, and the ability to listen effectively and critically.
5. Knowledge of man, his nature, his environment, and his relationship to the society in which he lives with emphasis on his responsibilities and rights as a citizen including the study of history, geography, civics, economics, and the arts.

6. Knowledge of science and excellence in the use of the scientific method of problem solving.

7. Knowledge of mathematics and excellence in the use of the fundamental process of quantitative reasoning and expression.

Also in keeping with these principles, the Clark County School District shall be concerned with and assume shared responsibility by providing instructional activities which supplement the efforts of other institutions and community agencies toward the attainment of:

- A. The power of personal discipline and moral integrity without which education is mere training
- B. The information, guidance, and training necessary to help students make wise educational and occupational choices
- C. The health, both physical and mental, of each individual student
- D. The social and moral competence of each student toward responsible membership in our democratic society
- E. The knowledge and practice of personal and community safety
- F. The active interest of each student in aesthetic experiences with the skills and attitudes necessary for satisfying self-expression in the creative arts.

Now Is Time For Car Checkup

- 5) Be sure your headlights are aimed properly, and that the dimmer is in good operating condition. The battery and charging system also should be checked. Turn

signals must be dependable.

6) For safe stops, check brake linings, fluid and adjustment.

7) Inspect and rotate tires—make sure they are free from bumps, cuts and bruises. Wheel alignment, tire balance and proper tire pressure also will add to your driving comfort and tire mileage. Also check your springs.

8) Have your muffler, tail pipe and exhaust pipe checked for leaks or damage.

9) Make sure all your glass is clear. Check the operation of the windshield washer and blades.

10) Check operation of the horn.

11) Complete your warm weather make-ready with a car wash and polish job.

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Governor's Day Set At U of N at Reno Thursday

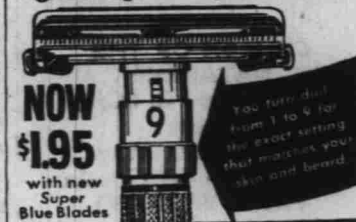
Governor's Day at the University of Nevada will be observed today according to President Charles J. Arms - Strong.
