MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

Mayor Byrne, Councilman Morrell Give Their Views

Although the item was not on the agenda, the City Council Monday night at Eagles Hall delved into the matter of connection fees for water and sewer, and charges were made by one of the members that the failure to collect fees from Harry Polk in Trailer Estates was a flagrant violation of the law.

Jack Stevens, a member in attendance answering acting Mayor Frank Morrell's charge that the failure to collect fees was a violation, suggested charges of malfeasance of office as a means to force collection. Stevens did not specify who would be charged with malfeasance.

The connection fee discussion came up after the council had approved the last item on the agenda—the materials claims. Ordinarily this signals the end of the council session, but the group minus the Mayor and councilman Wilbur Hardy decided to go into the matter of the hookup fees.

The tape recording was available, and the discussion on the fees was available to the public up to the point when Councilman Stevens suggested the malfeasance charge. Then Stevens asked that the tape be turned off.

The council did not go into the matter of whether the fees of \$150 for water and \$150 for sewer should be lowered, but instead devoted most of their discussion to the fact that Harry Polk had water and connections in Trailer Estates without paying his connection fees.

Mayor William Byrne just back from a business trip to Los Angeles yesterday afternoon branded the council charges as being asinine.

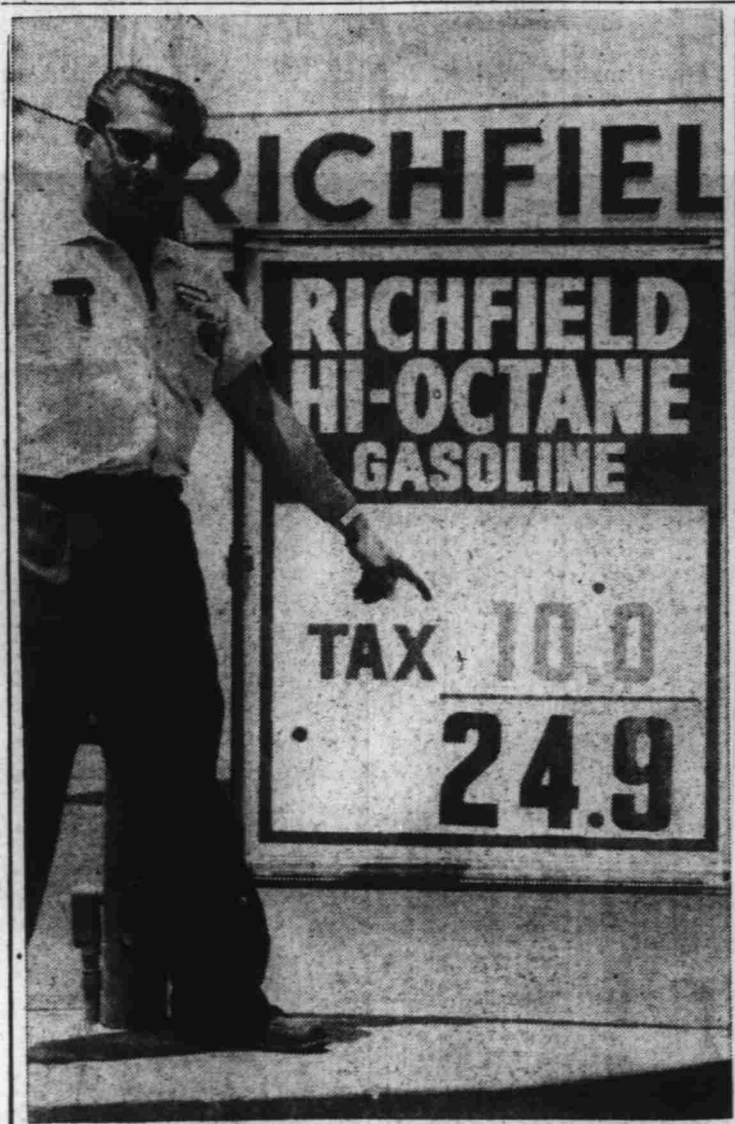
"The council has been kicking the matter of high connection fees around for weeks," Byrne said. "Since Trailer Estates has only three trailers now it seems absurd to charge \$300 in connection fees while the council is still engaged in discussion of reducing the fees which are the highest of any Municipality in the county," the Mayor added.

"In my opinion the action of the council was merely trying to find fault where there is no fault," Byrne stated yesterday afternoon.

"The city must become competitive to bring home owners to Henderson," Mayor Byrne emphatically stated. "And the first step in my opinion is to reduce the hookup fees. Only through this medium can we compete with North Las Vegas and Las Vegas," the chief executive added.

Mayor Byrne said his primary objective was to promote development, and he added that he felt sure the city would grow and prosper with an influx of residents here.

George Treem Will Not Be Judge Again

George O. Treem who doubles as Justice of the Peace and Municipal Court Judge, and does a tremendous job in both capacities, steadfastly maintains that he will not run for Municipal Judge again.

A recent Nevada law forbids a man to hold both the magistrates post and the Municipal court office in the future.

Judge Treem has said repeatedly that he will be a candidate for Magistrate, and that someone else can fill the Municipal Judge's office.

The council at a recent session indicated that they were willing to raise the pay of the Municipal Court Judge. Even this inducement will not influence Judge Treem to make the bid for the office again.

Swim Tickets Go Up May 30

Local residents who fail to purchase their season swim tickets by Memorial Day, May 30, the date for opening of the pool, will be forced to pay \$25 instead of \$20 for their tickets, recreation director Dalby Shirley announced last night.

Basic's Safety Program Wins National Award

Home News Safety bulletin board, assisting the Henderson Jaycees in their annual Bicycle Ro-De-O; placing signs in local business concerns' windows informing the community of Safe Driving Week and conducting a high-way safety program which had as its theme, "Let's Keep Death Off Our Highways."

After careful consideration, the National Education Association awarded Basic High School the distinction of being one of the Grand Champions of the Nation.

Participating in the national contest were 2700 high schools from all of the 50 states. Many of the schools involved had enrollments five and six times that of Basic with 525 students.

In addition, the National Education Association has selected Basic High's program to serve as a guide for other high schools to use in their future planning of safety programs.

It is hoped that funds can be made available for two of the participating Basic students and their instructor to attend the National Student Safety Program to be held in Bowling Green, Ohio, to receive their award and recognition for the City of Henderson and Basic High School.

Gas War Spreads In City; Car Drivers Enjoying It

The gasoline price war which started in Las Vegas has spread to the stations in the city. A survey made yesterday indicated that regular gas prices had dipped considerably below the prices charged last week. Whether the price falls any lower depends largely on the activities in Las Vegas.

Henderson being so near to Las Vegas, must in most cases abide by the rates charged in the larger city.

Ordinarily gasoline price wars start when independent operators drop their prices suddenly. However according to reports from Las Vegas, the present gas war started with the major stations making the slash to compete with the independents.

Gasoline wars always please the automobile driver. It is a break to obtain cheap gasoline, and every driver is quick to take advantage of such a situation.

At the start of any gas war the independents are quick to slash prices. As one Las Vegas major station operator said this week, "the independents keep cutting prices until they are operating at a loss, before they come to their senses."

A check at Boulder Highway service stations revealed the following prices for regular gasoline: Phillips 26.9; Stinker's 25.9; Metro 25.9 and 27.9; Mobil 26.9 and 30.9; Flying A 27.9; Texaco 27.9 and 31.9; Hancock 25.9 and Union 27.9.

Just how long the gas war will last depends upon the dealers. These fights generally wind up with both the major stations and the independents declaring a truce after the pinch starts hurting. Local managers had no idea yesterday when this might happen. Meanwhile the consumer is real happy with the turn of events.

Local CB Radio Operator Aids In Locating Seriously Ill Baby

The assistance of Citizens Band Radio Operator Mrs. W. C. Lindley of 621 National street in contacting a Florida couple traveling with a critically ill child, sparked the monitoring of a second short wave channel by members of the Tri-City Citizens Band Club.

Mrs. Lindley received a call about noon last Friday from a citizens band operator in Bellville, California and relayed the message to Sgt. James Pugh of the local Police Department, who is also a CB operator.

Mr. and Mrs. Perry Raney were enroute to Florida. They had tests made on their two-months-old son at the Bellville Hospital and were taking him back to Florida. Results of the test showed that the child was suffering from spinal meningitis and yellow jaundice.

Dr. Karl Hazeltine was at the police station and was there when Mrs. Lindley called. He told Sgt. Pugh to make every attempt to locate the couple as if the child was not cared for immediately he could not survive.

An immediate call was made to the Highway Patrol in Kingman, Arizona and Highway Patrol units through out Arizona, New Mexico and Texas were alerted, giving a description of the car which had the call letters of Raney's citizens band radio station in the back window.

The couple was located about 5:30 p.m. at Wilcox, Arizona.

Following an announcement of this valuable assistance given by Mrs. Raney at the meeting of the Tri City CB Club Monday night at the Victory Village auditorium arrangements were made to have Harry Mills, a Las Vegas member, monitor Channel 11. The Club already has a monitor on Channel 9.

The group also made final plans for a family outing at Spring Mountain on Sunday, June 3.

According to Sgt. Pugh there are more than 100 CB sets in Southern Nevada and a large number in Henderson. The Sgt. is well equipped with one set at his home, another at the Police Department and two walkie talkies.

CG operators are always on the alert for distress signals and are glad to help anyone in trouble.

Basic Basketball Captain Now Guard On Yale Freshman Team

It was Frank Schreck's first trip East. Nobody before him had come to Yale from Basic High School in Henderson, Nevada. He was filled with awesome impressions about Yale which he had heard from others or just fancied for himself. He admits that he had not ever

seen a Yale catalogue before arriving in New Haven, Connecticut. What happened when he got here?

"Yale isn't the stuffy, formal place I had expected in the East", he says. "It's really very friendly. As a matter of fact, I think it's even more relaxed than a

lot of schools. I love it here."

For most students, the beginning of Freshman Year is one of many adjustments, and Frank confesses that he was no exception. "The courses are not easy, and I had quite a bit to do in my studies.

The assignments are demanding but I found out that it's not impossible if you buckle down and work. I've been especially impressed with the quality of my professors, particularly in Political Science, which will probably be my major."

One of the most enjoyable discoveries for the young man from Henderson was the diversified student body at Yale. He meets people from all parts of the country and the world. "The boy living downstairs is from Nigeria and I've had some pretty interesting talks with him."

One of Frank's roommates is from Dallas, Texas the other from a small town in Connecticut.

Studying and meeting interesting people are not the only activities of Basic High's former basketball captain. He's found plenty of opportunities for sports at Yale, serving as the starting guard in every game for the Yale Freshman team. In one of his outstanding performances of the season, he tallied for 23 points against Brown. His best game, though, was against a strong Harvard team, in which his defensive play was instrumental in defeating the

traditional Eli rival.

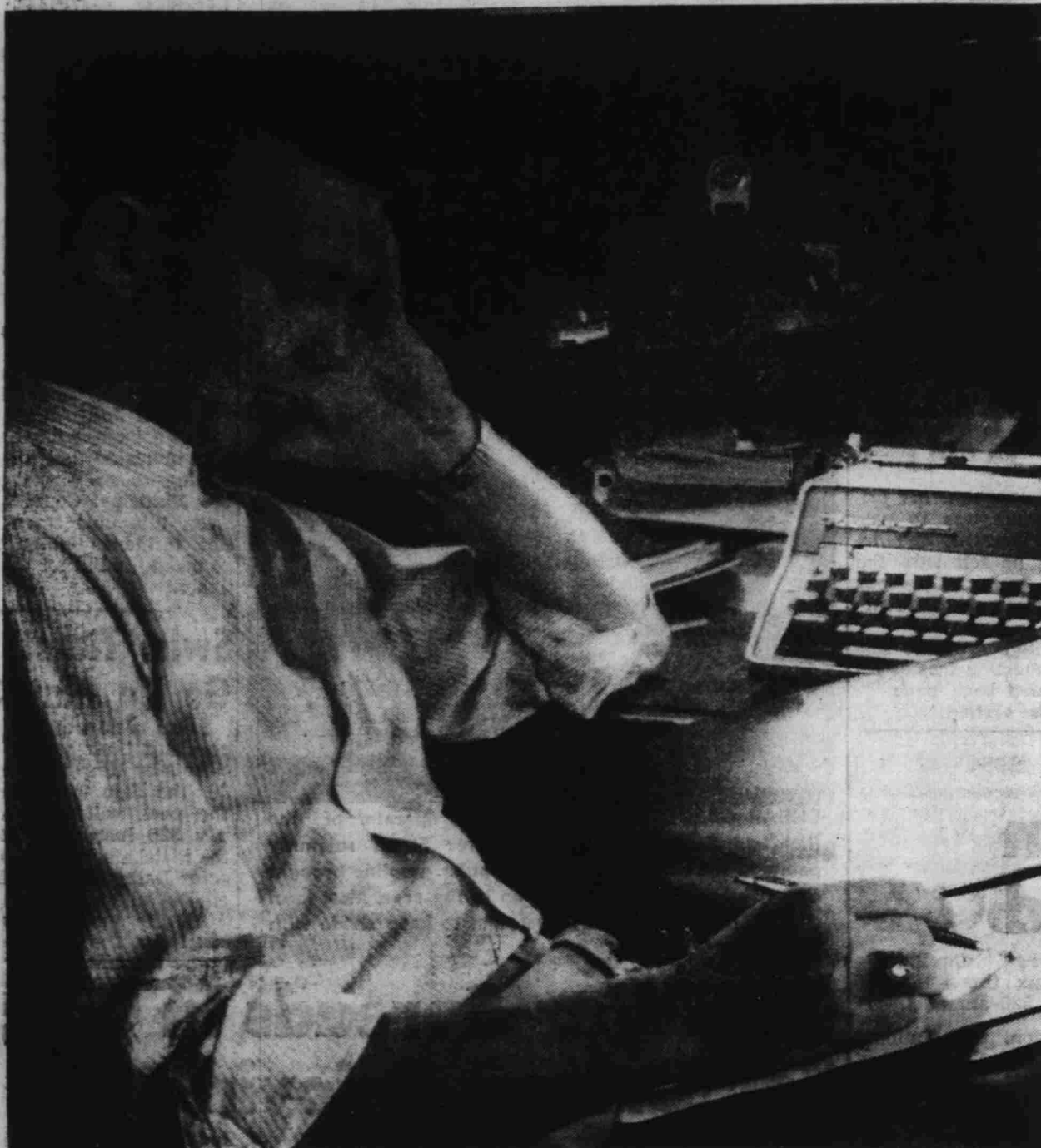
On the basis of his strong play, he is considered a top candidate next year for the varsity team, which this winter won the Ivy League title and went to the NCAA playoffs.

Not all his life at Yale is centered around the campus. Many weekends find him in Northampton, Massachusetts home of Smith College. He enjoys travelling to the many girls colleges nearby, but

Smith for some reason has apparently been his favorite.

Even with a full athletic and social schedule, Frank's scholastic record is very close to Dean's List. Next year, pursuing his interests to government and international relations, he plans to join the Yale Political Union. 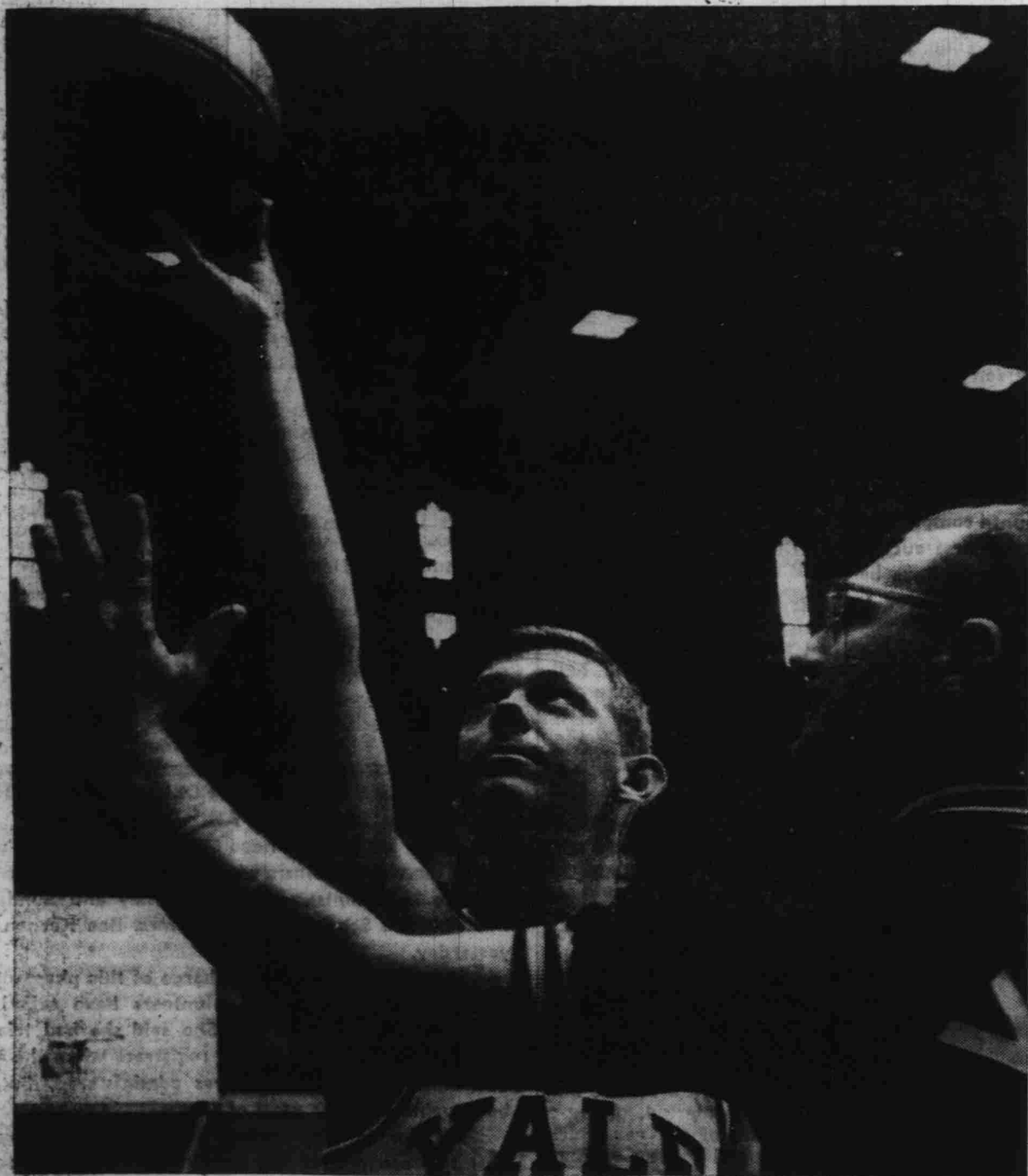

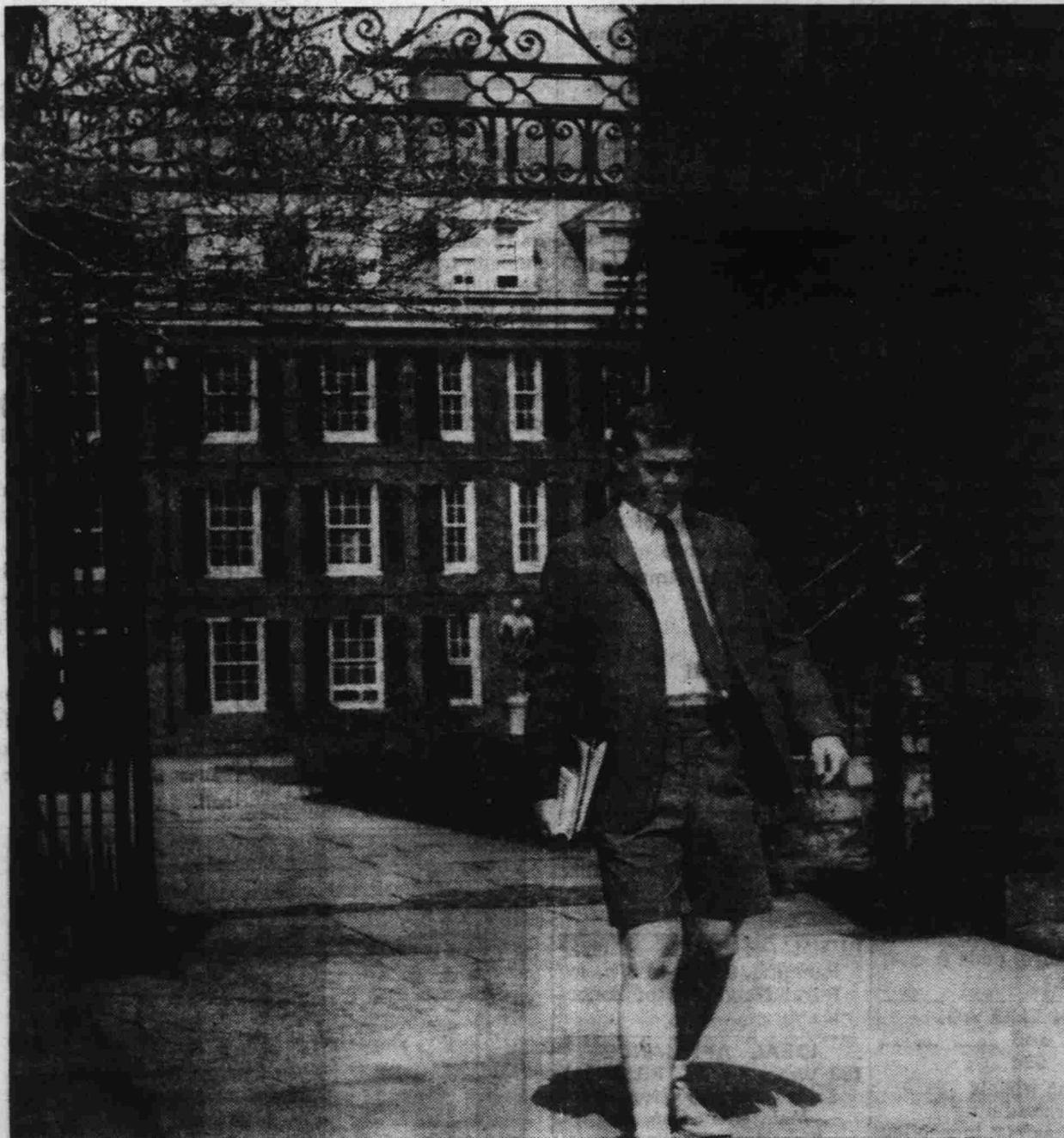

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 296
AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE
GOVERNING THE INSTALLATION,
MAINTENANCE AND ENCLOSURE
OF SWIMMING POOLS; PROVIDING
RELATED THERE TO; PROVIDING
PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION
THEREOF; AND REPEALING ALL
ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERE-
WITH.

The City Council of the City of Henderson do hereby enact the following:

SECTION 1. It is hereby declared that an emergency exists and that this ordinance is necessary for the safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Henderson.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS
PRIVATE SWIMMING POOL: A privately constructed pool which is used in connection with and is available only to the family or the household or its private guests.

SEMI-PRIVATE POOL: A semi-private swimming pool which is used in connection with multiple family or cooperative groups such as apartments, private clubs, trailer parks, subdivisions, etc. and available only to such groups and their private guests but not available to the general public.

SEMI-PUBLIC POOL: A semi-public swimming pool which is used in connection with hotels and motels, etc. and available only to their private guests and available to the general public.

PUBLIC POOL: A swimming pool which is used in connection with a public building or other structure and available to the general public either free or by paying a fee.

SWIMMING POOL: A swimming pool including all appurtenances to its use, and used for swimming or recreation bathing. Other terms shall be construed in their normal and ordinary use and sense. Technical terms shall be construed with the meaning provided therein by the Department of Health of this and other cities and /or states concerning swimming pools.

WARNING POOL: A warning pool shall mean a permanent water container used for recreational swimming purposes which at its deepest point is not over eighteen (18) inches. Any such container deeper than eighteen (18) inches or which has a volume in excess of 120 cubic feet of water shall for the purposes of this ordinance be classified as a swimming pool and shall be subject to the regulations pertaining thereto.

BODY OF WATER: A body of water shall mean any body of water such as a reservoir, tank, pond, etc., not provided for swimming pool, or a warning pool.

SECTION 3. BUILDING PERMIT
REQUIRED
It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to alter, remove or demolish or to commence the construction, alteration, or removal or demolition of a swimming or warning pool without first obtaining a building permit from the Building Official.

1. An application for such permit shall be submitted in such form as the Building Official may prescribe. Such application shall be made by a contractor holding a valid state and city license or the owner who will do his own construction after obtaining the required owner build permit. Such application shall contain the full names and addresses of the applicant and/or the owner, and if the owner is a corporate body of its responsible officers. Such application shall describe the proposed work and shall give such additional information as may be required by the Building Official for a proper understanding of the proposed work.

2. Applications for permits for Public and/or Semi-Public pools shall be accompanied by a certificate of acceptance by the State Department of Health, plans, calculations and specifications in duplicate, and shall be in sufficient detail to show the following:

1. Plot Plan
2. Pool dimensions, depth, and volume in gallons.
3. Type and size of filter system, filtration and backwash capacities.
4. Pool piping layout with all pipe sizes shown and type material.
5. The pool pump capacity.
6. Waste disposal system.
7. Other pertinent data as may be required by the Building Official.

3. If after examination, the Building Official finds the application to be in compliance with the law and ordinances applicable thereto, he shall issue a permit for the proposed work as soon as is practicable. If this examination reveals otherwise, he shall reject the application noting his findings in a report to be attached to the application.

4. The Building Official may revoke a permit issued under the provisions of this ordinance in the event he finds that there has been any false statement or misrepresentation as to a material fact in the application or plans on which the permit was based.

5. All work performed under a permit issued by the Building Official under this ordinance shall conform to the approved application and plans. It shall be unlawful to reduce or diminish the elevation of the platform or to increase the height of the platform.

6. Clearances: No private pools shall have its water line closer than five (5) feet from any property or building line, except pool may be closer to the building if satisfactory evidence is submitted to show that no damage to the building will occur, or any other hazardous or unsafe condition will be created. No semi-public or public pool shall have its water line closer than five (5) feet from any property line, nor ten (10) feet from any building line. No private pool equipment pit shall be located closer than five (5) feet from any property or building line.

7. Walls and Floors: The walls and floors shall be designed and constructed to be structurally sound under the conditions of the site. The pool walls and floor shall be constructed of smooth, non-absorbent materials, free from cracks, light in color, and be constructed as to be properly drained through one or more unslatted grates. A tight, leakproof pool with easily cleaned surfaces shall be provided. The inner surface of the pool must be covered, rounded or bullheaded at all joints, corners, angles of bases, walls, floors, or steps. No sharp corners or protrusions will be permitted. Floor drains shall be flush with the finished surface. The materials used in wall and floor construction shall conform to the provisions of the Building Code of the City of Henderson.

8. INDOOR SWIMMING POOLS: In addition to the requirements herein, indoor swimming pools shall have windows or a skylight equal to at least one-half of the surface area of the pool, provided that artificial light shall be used in lieu thereof if approved by the Building Official.

9. PROTECTIVE BARRIERS:
(a) Every Private, Semi-Private or Public Swimming Pool, warning pool or other outside body of water shall be completely surrounded by a fence or wall not less than six feet (6) in height. The fence or wall shall be so constructed as not to have openings, holes or gaps larger than (4) four square inches, except for doors or gates; and if a piece of fence is erected or maintained, the horizontal dimension shall not exceed four inches. A dwelling house or accessory building may be used as part of such enclosure.
(b) All gates or doors opening

ish the area of the construction of work provided for in an application hereunder:
a) Any plans not showing all the requirements of the granting of permit submitted shall be returned to the applicant with a written notice stating the reasons for the denial of the permit or of a sanctioning of any violation of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. POOLS IN VIOLATION HEREOF PROHIBITED
Whenever the Building Official finds that construction or work in connection therewith, the erection or construction or alteration, execution or repair of which is regulated, permitted or forbidden by this ordinance, is being erected, constructed, altered or repaired in violation of the requirements of this ordinance, or in violation of a detailed statement or plans submitted and approved hereunder, or if the person directing, constructing or performing such work is not in compliance with the required Codes of the City of Henderson, he may serve a written notice upon the person directing, constructing or performing such work, or the contractor, to correct the condition which constitutes a violation of the provisions of this ordinance. In the event that within the specified time to comply the notice has not been complied with, the Building Official shall institute an appropriate action or proceeding at law to restrain, correct, or remove such violation or the execution thereof.

SECTION 5. GENERAL CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS:
a) Electrical Wiring - Electrical wiring shall conform to the provisions set forth in the electrical code of the City of Henderson. Gas piping shall be extended according to the provisions of the plumbing code of the City of Henderson.
b) Water Heating Equipment - Swimming pool water heating equipment shall conform to the provisions set forth in the Plumbing Code of the City of Henderson. Water shall not be allowed to enter the pool at a temperature above 100°F.
c) Gas Piping - Gas piping shall conform to the provisions set forth in the Plumbing Code of the City of Henderson.
d) Waste Water Disposal - The waste water disposal shall conform to the provisions set forth in the Plumbing Code of the City of Henderson.
e) Potable Water Supply - The water supply shall conform to the provisions set forth in the Plumbing Code of the City of Henderson.
f) Water Treating Devices - Where devices for chemically treating the water to be used in the pool are installed, they shall meet the requirements of the State Department of Health.
g) Plumbing - All piping and appurtenances shall conform to the provisions set forth in the Plumbing Code of the City of Henderson.
h) Filter and Regulation System - All pools shall be equipped with an efficient and dependable circulation and purification system, consisting of circulation pumps and piping arranged for optimum circulation in the pool, and a filter with the usual and necessary appurtenances as approved by the Building Official. Such system shall be operated at all times when the pool is in use. There shall be provided a complete turnover of the pool water in twenty-four (24) hours or less for private pools and eight (8) hours or less for semi-public pools.
i) Underwater Lighting - Each pool shall have installed at least one (1) underwater lighting fixture.
j) Semi-public or Public Pools - In addition to the requirements of this ordinance, all public or semi-public pools shall conform to the requirements of the Nevada State Health Department's rules governing swimming pools.
k) Steps and Stairways - Steps and stairways for entering or leaving the pool shall be of such construction as to minimize danger. Convex, semi-circular or triangular steps shall have rounded corners.
l) There shall be at least one stairway for exiting or entering the pool, located in the shallow end; there shall be at least one ladder for entering or exiting the pool at the deep end. Treads of ladders and steps shall be of non-slip construction.
m) Runways or Decks - Runways, at least thirty (30) inches wide for private pools, and four (4) feet wide for public pools shall be placed adjacent to the pool. Runways shall be at least 1 inch to the foot away from the pool, and should be of material approved by the Building Official, which shall be of non-slip texture, easily cleaned and level. The surface runoff shall be diverted from the pool.
n) Scum Gutters and Skimmers - Scum gutters and skimmers shall conform to the requirements of the State Department of Health. Inlets for fresh or recirculated water shall be located to produce a reasonably uniform circulation of water throughout the pool.
o) Springs or Platforms - There shall be a minimum of fourteen (14) feet of clearance above each spring, board or platform. The depth of the water in the area adjacent to the springboard or platform shall not be less than the safe limits below the minimum safe depth of water shall extend horizontally from the wall under the board or platform at least fifteen (15) feet beyond the extremity of the board or platform. This horizontal distance shall in no case be less than shown in the table below:

SECTION 6. PERMIT FEES:
The fees charged for the issuance of a permit to construct and/or enclose a pool or outside body of water in the City of Henderson shall be as stated in these codes governing the applicable portions of construction. The valuation of the pool, outside body of water, or accessory building, shall be as determined by the Building Official.

SECTION 7. INSPECTIONS: All portions of the construction of the pool shall be inspected by the Building Official or his representative to insure compliance with the required Codes of the City of Henderson. A final inspection and sealing shall be made until the pool is completed, and the filter system is in operation and that all phases function correctly.

SECTION 8. EXISTING SWIMMING POOL AND WARNING POOL COMPLIANCE: Existing swimming pools and warning pools shall comply with all the sections of this ordinance within a lot of ninety days from the effective date of this ordinance.

LEGAL NOTICE

SECTION 9. SUSPENSION OF REQUIREMENTS: Any suspension of any requirement of this ordinance may be granted by the City Council by its own motion in any particular case or upon the recommendation of the Building Department. Application for such suspension must show that there are special circumstances or conditions affecting the property in question and that a suspension will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare and safety.
SECTION 10. PENALTY FOR VIOLATION: Any person, firm, association, or corporation, who shall violate the terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200 or imprisonment in the City Jail for not more than six (6) months or by a combination of both.
SECTION 11. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.
SECTION 12. This ordinance shall be in force and effect upon its final passage.
SECTION 13. The City Clerk and the Clerk of the City Council of the City of Henderson shall cause this ordinance to be published in the HENDERSON HOME NEWS, a weekly newspaper published in Henderson, Nevada.

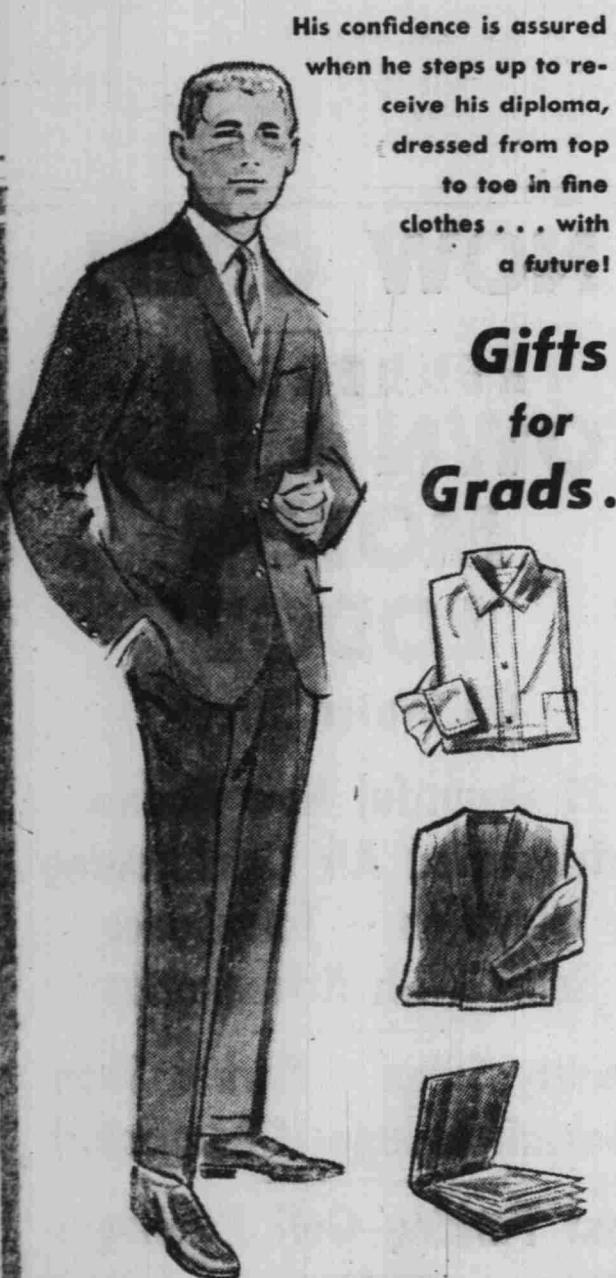

(Continued from page one) corded on tape are as follows:

"Water is \$150 and sewer charges are \$150," said Morrell, "anyway, can we conceivably go back to a retroactive status? I'm sorry the Mayor is not here. Why have fees not been collected for hook ups made?"

City Attorney John Manzonie was sitting some distance from the microphone and his remarks on the tape are rather indistinct; however he apparently gave an "off hand" opinion that the city could not go back to retroactive status.

"If we make changes which can't be retroactive, I would like to know why some hook-ups have been made with no collections," Morrell said. "How do you affect collections?"

Stevens inquired, "Does the water board stipulate by a certain date that a \$150 water hook-up fee is effective from that date?"

"Yes," said the Mayor prominently, "technically no one is hooked up."

Stevens inquired about the Starlight Estates and Black Mountain Estates which have paid the \$150 connection fees wondering if these would be refundable or retroactive.

"Wait a minute," said Morrell, "we're only talking about Trailer Estates. Everyone else has paid theirs."

Stevens brought out the fact that the city has no refundable agreement with Starlight Estates and the "golf course" and no such agreement with Trailer Estates, "but they're hooked up."

"I just don't understand it's being done," said the Mayor prominently.

"It's the administration," said Stevens, "he says he's waiting to see what we're going to do about connection fees."

When Stevens asked whether the city could legally go back, City Auditor Don Dawson opined that if they could change the ordinance one way, they could change it another.

"Who's going to enforce it?" asked Morrell.

"You know who that is," said Stevens.

"Who gives the citation?" asked the Mayor prominently.

"For collection fees . . . Stevens questioned.

"Frankly," said Morrell, "between you and me, there are no reporters here and just between us kids this is a flagrant violation of the law and there must be some recourse of law by which we can stop it."

"We can set a time and if it is not done by that time bring charges of malfeasance of office. That's all we can do."

"Shut the tape off, will you?"

Mayor Byrne said later, "It is a question of trying to find fault where there isn't any." The Council, he said, has been deliberating and discussing connection fees for the past two or three months trying to determine whether they are too high.

He said he thought the Council had acted too quickly in setting the higher fees which are now the highest in the area.

In North Las Vegas, he said, the fee is \$275, but the city installs all of the lines within the subdivision; here, the subdivider must install all of his own sewer and water lines within the subdivision and addition pay \$300 per home to connect to the water and sewer lines which he has installed.

If we expect subdividers to come to Henderson, he said, we must be competitive and offer them something to offset the fact that North Las Vegas is much closer to Las Vegas and many persons prefer to live in the vicinity which is close to their work.

Developments don't just happen Mayor Byrne said, you have to go out and sell them. If our fees to subdividers are too high, it may affect the future of the city adversely.

"You don't administer the business of the city by dotting every I and crossing every T, you do it with common sense," the Mayor said. He expressed admiration for Harry Polk saying he has had lots of experience and knows how to get things done. "I like to listen to him and feel that we could all learn something from him," said the Mayor.

IS YOUR BABY A RECKLESS DRIVER?

One seldom stops in front of a supermarket without seeing one or more cars where children have been left to wait while their mothers or other elder members of the family are shopping.

Statistics vividly point up the fact that young children should NEVER be left alone in automobiles. In fact the age and number of small children involved in fatal and non-fatal accidents . . . as drivers . . . during 1961 is both unbelievable and shocking.

Last year 47,000 children were involved in accidents . . . as drivers . . . in which one or more persons were killed. This was 200 less than the 1960 record, according to figures compiled by the Travelers Insurance Company.

Of these child-drivers involved in fatal accidents 45,450 were more than one year old; 660 were from six months to a year old; 560 were from three to six months old and 330 were less than three months.

Not all of the child-drivers involved in accidents were killed, in fact 3,463,000 drivers, one year old or more were involved in non-fatal accidents. This total is 40,000 higher than the previous year.

Of these drivers, 3,328,000 were more than one year old; 69,000 were from 6-months to one year; 24,000 were from three to six months old and 42,000 were less than three months old.

That's a total of over three and a half million toddlers who were involved in accidents (as drivers) last year.

Think about this the next time you want to dash in to the store for (just a minute) and don't want to be bothered with the baby.

New Lodge At Mt. Charleston Expected To Open On Labor Day

Final Plans for the construction of Mt. Charleston Lodge received approval from the Clark County Board of Commissioners, Monday, May 21st.

Construction of the new resort facilities will commence immediately reported lodge operator Dick Taylor. A disastrous fire broke out in the old Mt. Charleston lodge during the evening of December 28, 1961, and completely destroyed the historic Nevada landmark. It was originally a private hunting lodge in the 1920's and opened to the public by the Last Frontier Hotel owners during the 40's.

The Hacienda group acquired the lodge and surrounding property within the Toiyabe National Forest during the late summer of 1959.

Taylor described the new lodge facilities as a complete recreational project including all all-year ice rink, A heated swimming pool for summer and winter swimming, a youth center located in the large english basement, a bowling alley equipped with automatic pin-setters, a club room in addition to the facilities that were in the old lodge.

The new building will have a panoramic view of the snowcapped mountains as well as the pool and ice rink. The interior will be a harmonious blending of natural stone and timber. There will be two large fire places to comfort the skaters and winter sports enthusiasts.

Thirty cabana rooms will encircle the pool and will be available for overnight or longer vacation stays. Included in the new lodge will be a small exclusive steak house in addition to the main dining room.

Taylor also reported that a grocery store was going to be an integral part of the facilities in order to supply the Mt. Charleston residents as

well as handle the needs of the heavy influx of vacationers and family picnic needs.

The U. S. Postal Office has reserved space in the lodge to install a post office sub-station for the residents of Mt. Charleston resort.

Completion is scheduled for Labor Day, September 3, 1962.

EDITORIAL

DON'T OPERATE YOUR BOAT LIKE A LANDLUBBER!

More than six million pleasure craft will take to the waterways this Memorial Day heralding the opening of boating season, and next day the newspapers will report—along with the highway toll—the deaths and injuries from boating accidents. Will a member of your family be among them?

E. W. Kitzrow, a director of Farmers Insurance Group Safety Foundation, points out that 66 of 100 pleasure boating deaths are the operator's fault—and it isn't just the beginner who errs—experienced pleasure boat operators take chances on the water that would make a hardened sea captain swoon. Kitzrow lists 10 basic safety rules that every boat enthusiast should follow:

1. Carefully check your boat, motor, and trailer before use.
2. Know the navigation rules and live up to them.
3. Get the latest Coast Guard and other government regulations for boats.
4. Never overload the boat or rig.
5. If you capsize, hold on to the floating boat. Your chance to survive is greater than if you try to swim ashore.
6. Equip your boat with enough life jackets and the new buoyant materials to keep it afloat if it capsizes.
7. Heed weather reports; don't go out on open water if a storm is apparent. Call your weather station or coast guard.
8. Don't speed when entering congested areas.
9. Supervise your children's boat handling practices to be sure they are safe.
10. If you fall into the water while clothed, get rid of boots, shoes and other clothing that may handicap you.

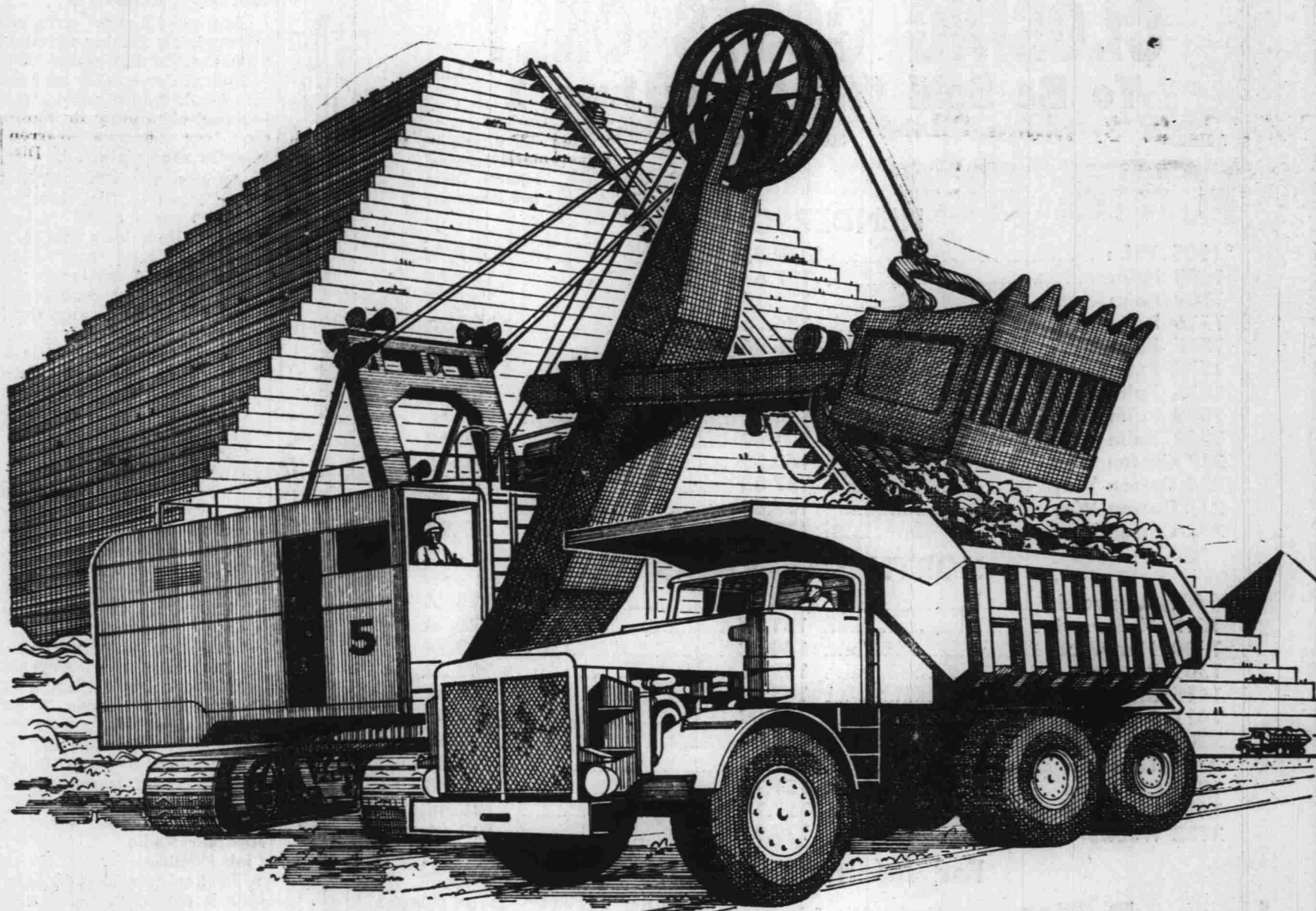

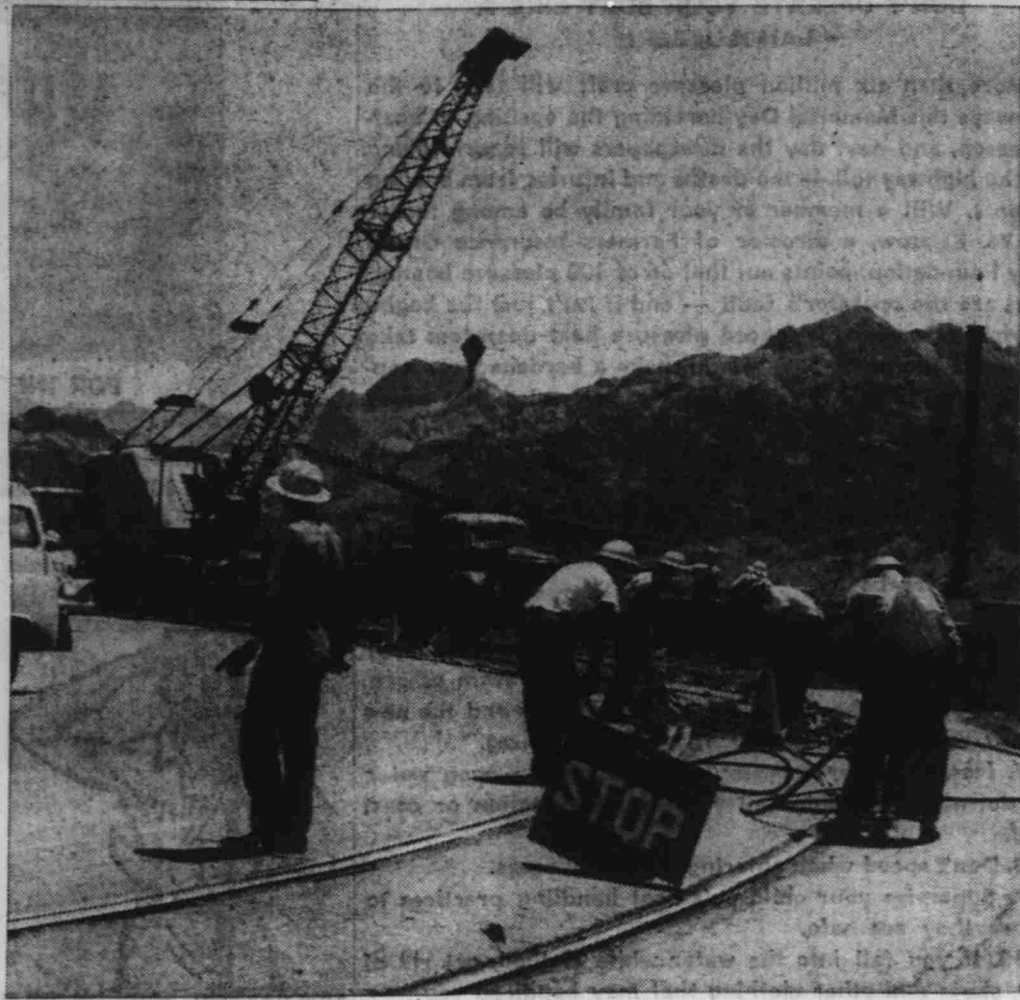

Greg Moore Wins Achievement Award At University Of Nevada

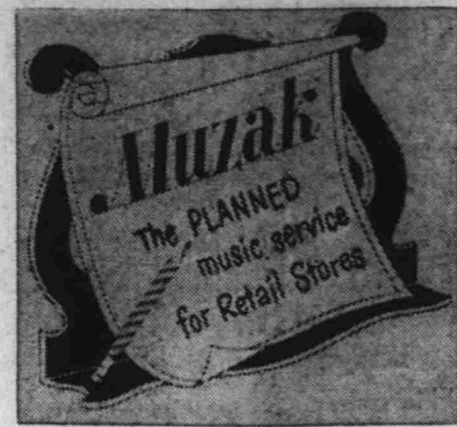
Greg Moore, a student in engineering physics at the University of Nevada was presented the annual Physics Achievement Award on May 15.
