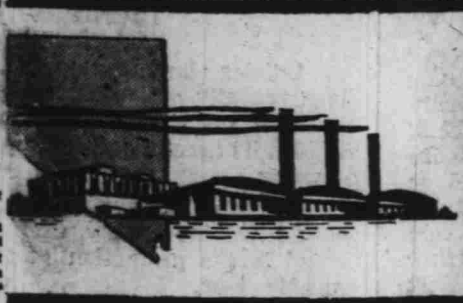

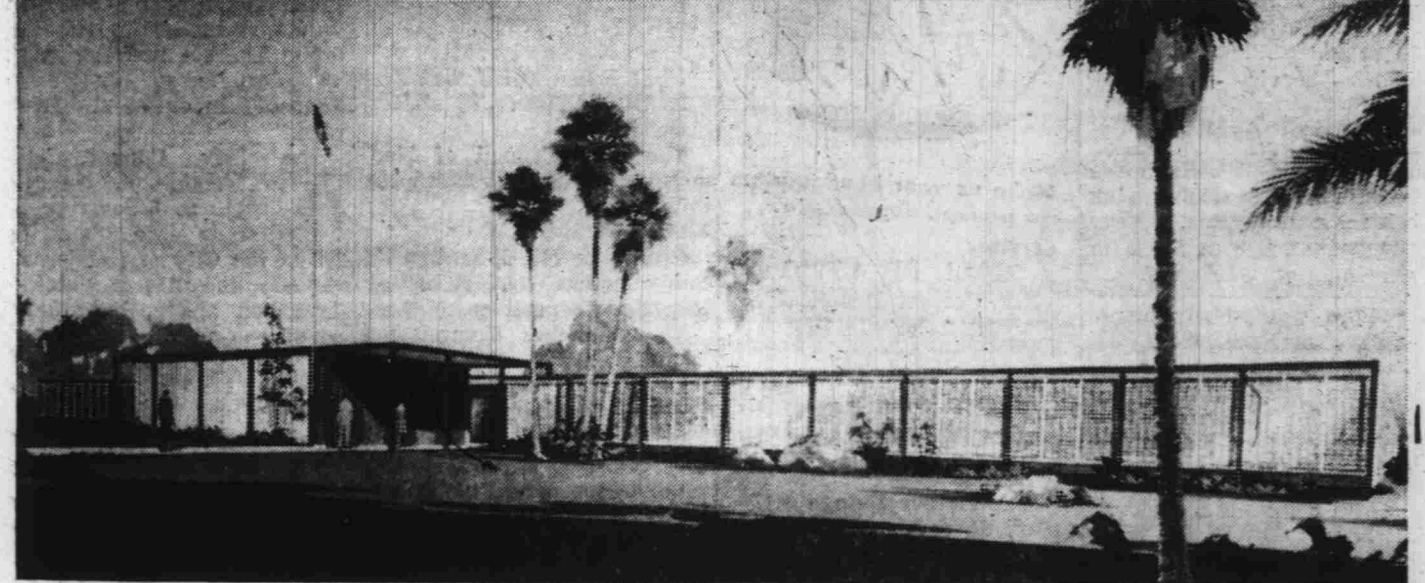

Beer Drinking Party Ends With \$50 Fine

A beer drinking party for a Las Vegas youth turned out to be a little too expensive when Rennie Lee Davis, 20, of 1620 Lenwood St. Las Vegas, was fined \$50 by Judge George O. Treem, Tuesday.

Davis was picked up on Boulder Highway early Sunday morning by officer Patrick Maloney while he and three teen-age girls were joy-riding. The officer reported he found 12 cans of beer in the car.

Davis was fined \$25 for possession of beer and another \$25 for disorderly conduct. He told the judge he knew better than to have the beer with him, but the weather was hot. He said he had nothing to say for his disorderly conduct.



HENDERSON CIVIC CENTER — Here is an architect's drawing of the planned new civic center to be located on Water Street, between Basic Road on the south and Texas Street on the north. In all, counting the six jail cells as one room, there will be 40 rooms. It will be of all steel construction, fronted by a sun control screen, at an estimated cost of between \$200,000 and \$250,000. Working drawings will be submitted to the Council in September for approval and call for bids.

Gets \$100 Fine For Hit and Run

Betty Scott Frenze, 83-D Victory Village, was fined \$100 or her choice of spending 25 days in jail, in municipal court Tuesday, on a charge of hit and run. Judge George O. Treem said he imposed the heavy fine mainly for her not reporting the accident.

The hit and run accident occurred at 12:50 a.m. Tuesday on U. S. Highway 95

when she struck a southbound car driven by Duane Arthur Olson, 20-D Lincoln St. Olson reported to the police he was traveling between 45 and 50 miles per hour when she struck him, smashed the left rear fender and blew a tire. When Judge Treem asked her why she ran she replied "I was scared, awfully scared."

ART FESTIVAL IN LV SEPT. 2

The Artists' and Craftsmen's Guild has selected Squires' Park, down by the City Library, under the big trees, for the location of their second big Art Festival, to be held Sunday, Sept. 2. The Festival held in the patio of a Strip hotel last year, was the biggest and best art showing ever made in Las Vegas, and the one this year is expected to far surpass it. Many pictures were sold and many orders taken in last year's show.

Out-of-town exhibitors are invited and some are making reservations at this early date.

In this year's exhibit, there will be working artists in every field, music food, cold drinks, and colored lights. The show will open at 10:00 a.m. and close at 10:00 p.m. The children are working enthusiastically this summer under the direction of Kelly Ryan and his junior assistants to get their own display ready.

There will be a special patio section devoted to art work for gardens. Another interesting section will be for collectors who wish to show a treasured piece of art work done by someone other than themselves.

Virtually all media will be on display: oils, watercolors, pastels, ceramics, weaving, needlework, sculpture, wood carving, and mosaics, to mention just a few.

A popular portrait artist will be doing sketches and James Grenvald will be doing silhouettes. James Rozzi will be demonstrating silk screening; Elise Long, mosaics; Marilyn Glover, sculpture and woodcarving. There will also be ceramic demonstrations by Janet Parsons; and weaving demonstrations by Edcil Zoller.

The Festival came about through the theory that one good showing is more valuable than many scattered showings of just a few people's work. There is an opportunity for the "Sunday Painters and Craftsmen" to show and sell as well as for the professional artist. The Artists' and Craftsmen's Guild holds a show only when they can make an impressive display, and only show where many paintings can be viewed and sold . . . where people can come who are actually in the market to buy, can compare and select the best for his personal needs. Their aim is to create a market for their work.

The Festival is open to members and non-members of the Guild. Small entry fees will be charged, but there will be no commissions on sales made.

4051 Students Return To School Here September 4

The local schools will open September 4, with a total anticipated enrollment of 4051 students, Lylal W. Burkholder, Director of Area Schools, said yesterday.

The largest enrollment is in grades Kindergarten through Sixth Grade with 2426 pupils; Junior High School will have 950 students in grades seven through nine; Basic High School will have 675 in grades 10 through 12.

A teaching staff of 172 will be required to serve the educational program of all schools in this area, Burkholder said.

Temporary zoning regulations, based on this estimated

enrollment, were published in the HOME NEWS with the exception of children who reside in the original Townsite homes but were enrolled last year at Basic Elementary School. Children from this area will be assigned to the same school.

KINDERGARTEN ORIENTATION WEEK—All parents of kindergarten children are requested to report to their school of attendance on Thursday, August 30, or Friday, August 31, to schedule parent-teacher conferences to be held the week of September 4, through September 7.

SCHOOL REGISTRATION —

All former and new elementary students will report for registration at their assigned schools at 9 a.m. Thursday, August 30.

Ninth grade students will assemble in the Junior High School Auditorium at 1 p.m. Thursday, August 30.

School personnel will be available on Friday, August 31, to register those students unable to attend on Thursday, however, students who report to their assigned schools on August 30, will not be required to attend on Friday.

School bus schedules are published elsewhere in this edition of the HOME NEWS.

House Appropriates \$100,000 For Vegas Wash Flood Control

Congressman Walter Baring stated yesterday that the Public Works Appropriations bill passed the House containing \$100,000 to complete planning for the Las Vegas Wash flood control program and \$15,000 for the planning of the Humboldt River and Tributaries flood control project.

The Las Vegas Wash project will give flood control to major portions of Las Vegas and North Las Vegas, all of Henderson and a large part of the adjacent developed areas.

Congressman Baring said he has followed these two projects since their inception and urged early completion of the studies so that the flood control projects can be accomplished as soon as possible.

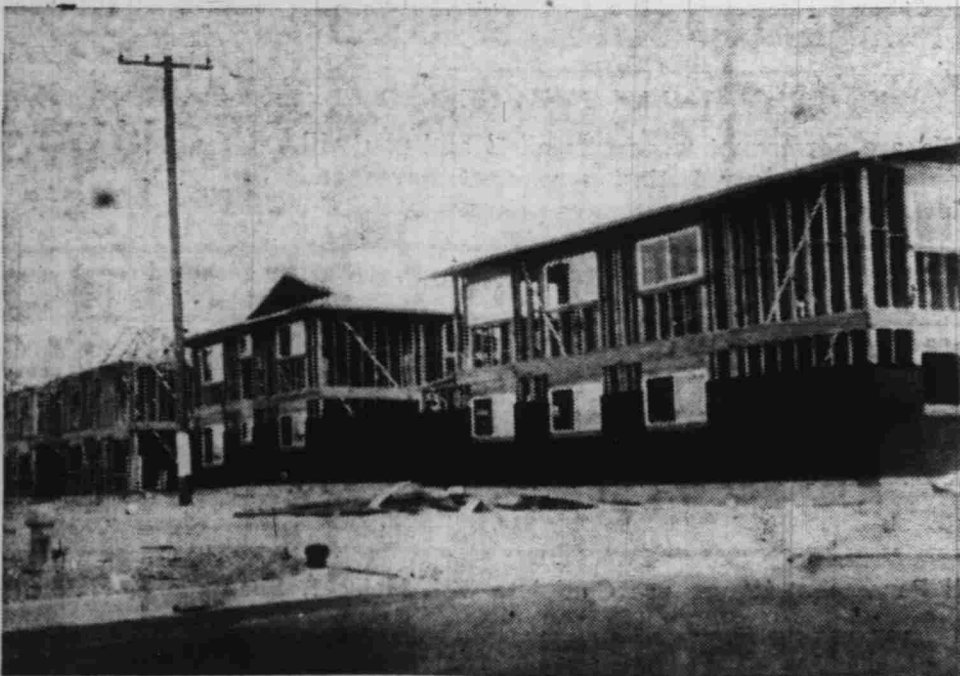
The purpose of the Blue Suit test series is to test the missile's reliability and demonstrate the Air Force's ability to launch its own weapons systems.

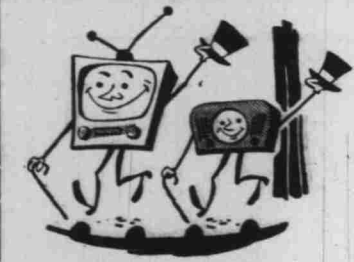

ORDINANCE NO. 301
 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 5, SECTION 19, SUB-SECTION D, PROVIDING FOR AN INCREASE IN THE CHARGE BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION FOR AN APPLICATION FOR A VARIANCE OR ADJUSTMENT IN ZONING, OR APPLICATION FOR A USE PERMIT WHEN PUBLICATION IS REQUIRED.

The City Council of Henderson, Nevada, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.
 Ordinance No. 5, Section 19, Sub-section D, is hereby amended to read as follows:

The Planning Commission is authorized to make a uniform charge of fifty (\$50.00) dollars, payable to the City Clerk, to partially cover the cost of making maps, sending out notices, and other incidental administration expenses involved in any application for a variance or adjustment or Use Permit, this charge being due and payable at the time of filing such application. The Planning Commission may designate its planning engineer as its agent to receive and inspect any application for variance at the time of filing. When it has been ascertained that such an application shall be approved for filing. No such application shall be filed unless it complies with the requirements of this article.

SECTION 2
 The City Clerk of the City of Henderson, Nevada, shall cause this ordinance to be published once in the HENDERSON HOME NEWS, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Henderson, Nevada.

SECTION 3.
 This ordinance shall be in effect twenty (20) days after the publication as provided in Section 2.

 DIGNIFIED FUNERALS AT SENSIBLE PRICES

Articles clamoring against the appalling cost of dying have recently appeared in newspapers and magazines in most parts of the nation and citizens in many places have decided it's time to quit talking and do something about this situation.

A group of community leaders recently banded together in Riverside County, California, to form a society dedicated to the promotion of simple, dignified funerals at sensible cost.

This organization was so well received that it now embraces three counties, Riverside, Orange and San Bernardino.

The Memorial-Funeral Society is not to be confused with burial insurance plans. It is a non-profit cooperative organization and is democratically controlled by its members with its work supervised by a board of directors elected at an annual membership meeting.

This association has compiled information on the costs of morticians' services, and makes agreements with funeral directors. The information is available to members. The association has reciprocal membership arrangements with funeral societies in an ever-expanding number of cities.

Members believe that expensive, ostentatious funerals are in poor taste, frequently add to the burdens of the bereaved, and that the money spent could be used more wisely.

They realize that under emotional stress and confusion incident to the loss of loved ones, bereaved persons often acquiesce in unreasonable funeral proposals against their better judgment.

In Southern California, morticians services ordinarily cost from \$400 to \$1000. Frequently as much as \$2000. The association, however, has arrangements with morticians for simpler services at lower cost.

Type 1 funerals at \$150. Plan A—Immediate cremation. Includes transporting remains to crematory, supplying container selected by mortuary, cremation and undesignated interment of ashes in Westwood Memorial Park.

Plan B—Immediate interment. Includes transporting remains to mortuary, securing legal papers, minimum cloth-covered casket, and delivery to cemetery of family's choice.

Type 2 at \$225 includes: Transporting remains to mortuary, securing necessary legal papers, embalming, cosmetic work, private viewing if desired, use of chapel for memorial service, conveying remains to cemetery. No funeral procession. Private interment.

Type 3—Complete funeral service. \$395. Includes all normal services usually supplied by mortuary except... No funeral procession. Private interment, casket, use of chapel for funeral or memorial service if desired. Transportation of remains to church of family's choice. Family is responsible for minister, flowers, music and procuring pallbearers if funeral is held in church.

Except in case of cremation, the charges indicated do not include cemetery cost, however, in the counties represented by this society there are County Owned cemeteries paid for by a very small part of the ad valorem tax. The cost of lots, including perpetual care is \$25.

Membership in the funeral society cost \$10 for a life membership for a family or \$5 for individual membership.

Should the residents of Henderson and Boulder City be interested in forming such an association here, the Southern California society will give all possible aid and advice.

Walter Baring Presents Stand On Medicare

In a recent report to this newspaper, Congressman Walter S. Baring presented the following views on Medicare for the aged:

A lot has been said these past few weeks about my stand against the King-Anderson bill pending in Congress, and which measure on first attempt was defeated in the Senate about a month ago. My stand against the King-Anderson bill is due to the fact that this medicare will come in under the Social Security System—this I feel is a direct road to socialized medicine, and I feel sure that most people in this country do not want a repeat of what Britain today is suffering from—namely malnutrition as far as medical progress and care is concerned, which can directly be blamed on the advent of socialized medicine in that country.

I want you to know that I am very much cognizant of the necessity for medical help for the people who need it over the age of 65, and I am confident that a plan, not under the Social Security System, can be found; for several have already been introduced in Congress, which after thorough study would not only reach a greater part of the American population, namely also those who are not under the Social Security System, but would make this medical care on a VOLUNTARY basis.

At this point, however, I feel it would be well for me to point out that in the 86th Congress a little over two years ago, a medical program was passed by Congress, the so-called Kerr-Mills plan, which provides for a State-Federal matching fund. This plan is in effect now in 27 of the states of the Union. The State Legislature of Nevada has not so far attempted to consider this plan, which would be of tremendous help to the people of Nevada today if it were in effect in the state now. I supported the Kerr-Mills plan in the hope that the aged would have an opportunity to get the care they need, when they need it.

Coming back to the King-Anderson bill, I would like to tell you a little bit about what this legislation really does and

what it does not do. There are sixteen million people in the United States over the age of 65. Four and a half million of these people are not on Social Security, and therefore, are not covered by this legislation regardless of how sick or in need they may be. The bill provides for ninety days of hospital care, provided the beneficiary pays the first \$90 or the cost. It does not provide for doctors or medicine outside of the hospital, and does not provide for the doctor's service in the hospital if you have your own attending physician. The bill provides for six months in a nursing home, but no doctor's service there. It provides for out-patient diagnostic services, provided the beneficiary pays the first \$20 per study. It provides 240 home health service visits during a calendar year, but does not pay for the drug or biologicals. The bill does not cover the cost of a doctor's services at home, office, or hospital. The bill does not pay for medicines used outside of the hospital. It pays for no cost of preventive medicine. In fact, you have to be so sick as to be a hospital case before you get any benefits at all. You cannot go to a nursing home until after you have been in the hospital.

Social Security taxes would be increased by one per cent to two per cent. The automatic increases in this tax without further benefits will go to 9 1/2 per cent by 1969, so that the average worker will be paying over \$500 a year Social Security taxes, which is more than most of these workers pay in income taxes, and which could just as well buy the individuals a medical insurance policy which would offer much more. It is true that half of this tax is borne by the employer, but it is then reflected in the increased cost of goods, so in fact the worker pays the full amount.

The King-Anderson bill is the first step toward complete socialized medicine. I have heard the proponents say that once they get their foot in the door they will go the full distance. Proponents of the bill already say that they are going to lower the age limit to include everyone once the bill is enacted. It is like a man who steps into an elevator well—the first step is fatal.

This King-Anderson bill is a political hoax, and if passed, there will be a clamor for further legislation to provide all of the services that the Administration and the proponents of this bill falsely claim are in the bill, and then Congress will be accused of short-changing the aged.

I say—let's not short-change the aged by giving them this bill—let's get a plan which covers all the aged people of 65 and which truly will help those in need on a VOLUNTARY basis.

Let's get medical care for the needy aged, but OUTSIDE THE SOCIAL SECURITY TAX SYSTEM.

The film depicts the versatility of today's modern Marine Corps and its ability to meet aggression anywhere in the world on a short notice.

During the showing, the Marine Corps Recruiter presented a display in the theatre lobby including literature explaining all various enlistment programs in the Marine Corps.

Highlighting the display was

the featuring of the new M-14 rifles in use throughout the Marine Corps.

"I wish to publicly thank these two fine, patriotic American citizens; Sgt. Soehngen said.

Presently open for eligible men 17 to 28 years of age is the Marine Corps aviation assignment. Men who qualify are assured aviation upon completion of recruit training. Married applicants are acceptable for aviation if they have a wife only.

Men who apply for aviation and do not qualify for this service are under no obligation to enlist, Sgt. Soehngen said.

Young men are prepared through participation in USMC technical school. Courses range from three to 35 weeks with the majority of the training in Memphis, Tennessee.

Instruction includes such courses as jet and helicopter mechanics, electronics, aerology, ground control approach, air traffic control and aviation photographic technician programs.

Enlisted men may receive extra pay for flying, Sgt. Soehngen said, and enlisted men, navigators, radio operators, man the troop transports in Marine Aviation.

The Marine Corps offers an opportunity for men who are unemployed and have not completed their education a chance to acquire a technical skill, complete their military obligation and be prepared and trained in a specialty which will enable them to face the future with confidence, Sgt. Soehngen concluded.

The Marine Recruiter invites all young men who are thinking of joining a service to visit him at 601 East Bridger St., or call Dudley 2-9982. He will be happy to explain all branches of the Marine service and the opportunities each offers.

Students who registered last spring but wish to change their choice of subjects should see the counselors BEFORE August 30.

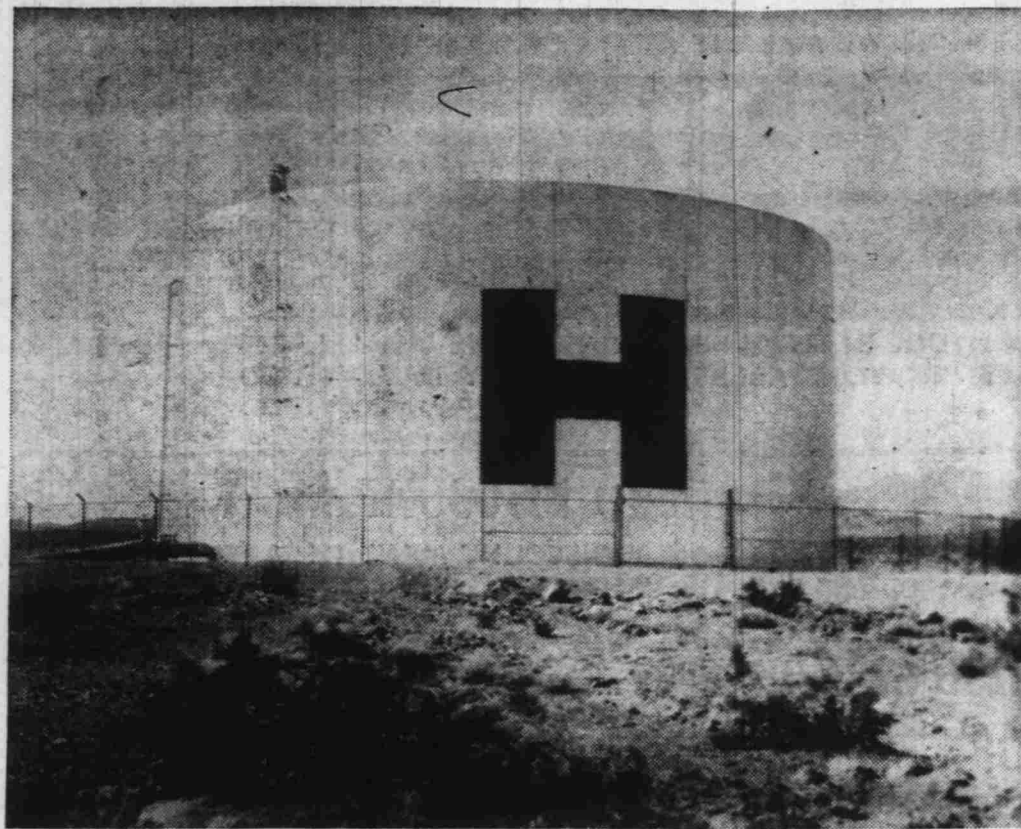

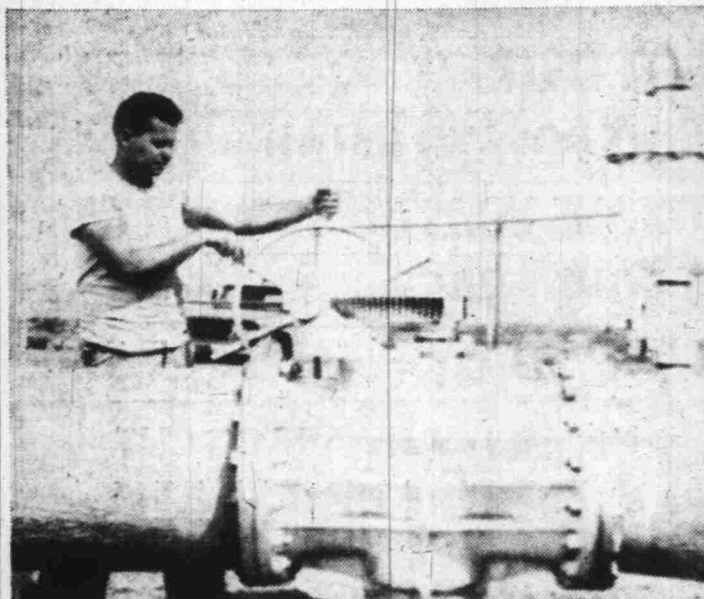

Carver Park Warriors Charges Reduced To Disorderly Conduct

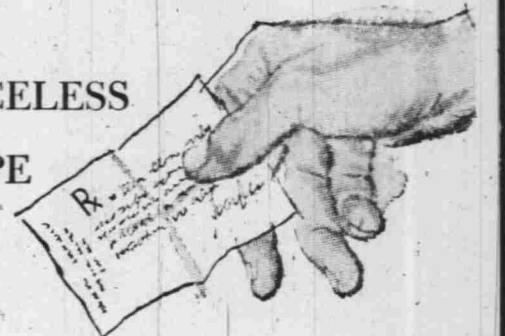

Bill of Rights For Consumers

By Senator Philip A. Hart (D-Mich.)



For the first time in American history a President has sent to the Congress a special message on protections for the consumer. President Kennedy's message is in effect a bill of rights for the consumer. These rights, the President said, include the right to safety, the right to be informed, the right to choose, and the right to be heard.

Our national interest requires that concern for the rights of consumers be a major governmental function. The President said: "If consumers are offered inferior products, if prices are exorbitant, if drugs are unsafe or worthless, if the consumer is unable to choose on any informed basis, then his dollar is wasted, his health and safety may be threatened, and the national interest suffers. On the other hand, increased efforts to make the best possible use of their incomes can contribute more to the well-being of most families than equivalent efforts to raise their incomes."

Recognition that the buyer has rights entitled to government protection and that the exercise of these rights is essential to the "efficient and equitable function of our free competitive economy" firmly places the economic emphasis where it belongs—on genuine consumer sovereignty.

The President, in his message to the Congress, pinpointed administrative and legislative programs to strengthen the national economy and the national interest by improving consumer knowledge, choice, and protection.

In that part of his program concerning truth in packaging, President Kennedy referred to the investigation that I have conducted during the past year on deceptive packaging and labeling of market basket items.

Our investigation revealed that the new salesman in the market is now the package. The question before us is: Can the

buyer get the same kind of basic information from the package that he once could expect from the clerk or store owner? This question is answered by the packages themselves. In many cases he cannot.

We learned — what every housewife already knows—that rational shopping in today's market is difficult, if not impossible, and this is no fault of the shopper. Too often the packaging and labeling practices mislead rather than inform. Yet these practices are within present laws and regulations.

As a necessary ingredient to the right to be informed, the buyer has a right to know not merely what product is inside a package, but how much of the product is in there, and how much it costs on a unit basis. And the buyer has the right to have this basic information presented in a manner readily seen and understood.

Legislation which we hope will make rational shopping possible by securing to the consumer his right to be informed will shortly be introduced in Congress. We are cooperating with the President in this effort.

President Kennedy's consumer program places proper emphasis on the rights of the American consumer.

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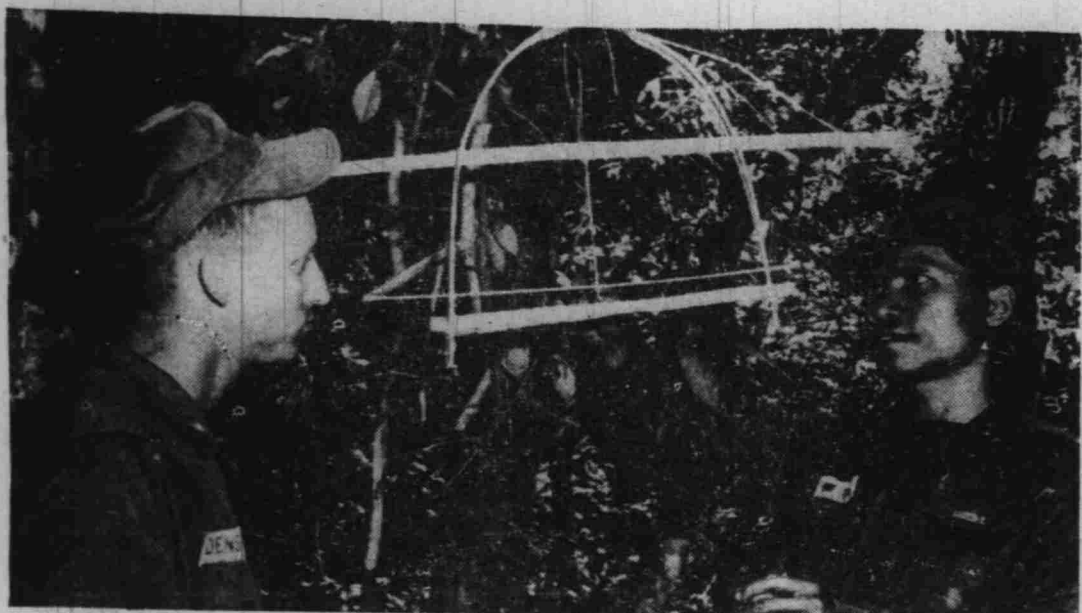

Pondering With Pond

By Howard C. Pond

Whoever it was who first made the remark about everybody's talking about the weather but no one is doing anything about it, should step from the blazing 115 degree heat into a refrigerated building — then step back into the heat.

Mark Twain is blamed for the expression, but, in all probabilities some one long before this time said something about it and he just repeated it. But, with the thermometer climbing up almost out of sight, it might be well to cool off with a few thoughts of hotter climes — not the one after we die, either.

The desert is timeless. It has been out there for so many countless centuries it has lost count, but there is one thing it has not lost, nor ever will. That is the ability to kill.

There are whitening bones

hidden in the deep recesses of the desert regions of the American southwest, mute evidence of some who placed the power of man above that of the desert, who didn't believe that the desert, slow, plodding, with millenniums of time in which to work, is waiting, patiently for that one mistake.

Heat is one thing we have plenty of at this time of the year. The one life - saving difference is that we have faster modes of travel now, 100 mile an hour cars equipped with air conditioning or 600 miles an hour jet planes. But just get out in the blazing sand and try a shortcut to another desert region also noted for its heat.

I have some statistics here that should be of interest to those of us who live in the desert. The hot spot of the nation is laid in the Southwest, embracing the states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, California, Utah and Nevada.

Every state in the Union, including Alaska and Hawaii has experienced official temperatures of over 100 degrees in the shade. The lowest high was 102 in Rhode Island and the highest was in California where the superlative of every thing is said to be found — 134 degrees in an official weather station shade. That, of course, was in Death Valley.

The official highs, month by month, are January, 98 degrees in Loredo, Texas, 1936; February, 105, Palm Springs, Calif., 1902; March, 108 Rio Grande City, Texas, 1954; April, 118, Volcano Springs, Calif., 1898; May, 124, Salton Springs, Calif., 1896; June, 120, Volcano Calif., 1902.

In July the highest temperature ever recorded in the Western Hemisphere was reached at Furnace Creek Ranch in Death Valley, Calif., with 134 degrees. August, 130 degrees at Amos, Calif., 1885; September, 126 degrees, Mecca, Calif., 1950; October, 116, Sentinal, Ariz., 1917; November, 105, Craftonville, Calif., 1906; and December, 100 degrees at La Mesa, Calif., 1938.

Of the twelve monthly official highs, California leads with nine, followed by Texas with two, and hot Arizona with only one. I sincerely doubt if there is another inhabited spot on earth where it is so consistently hot and dry as the Colorado and Mojave deserts of Southeastern California, following both sides of the Colorado river into southern Utah and Nevada.

This area covers the hottest spots in the four states in a very small area. APrker, Arizona, on the Colorado River, 127 degrees; Overton, Nevada, 122 degrees; St. George,

Utah, 116 degrees; and the 134 in Death Valley.

The heaviest day's rainfall in the United States fell at Hogle's Camp, L.A. County, in January 1943, when 26.16 inches of rain was dumped in one day. The hottest calendar month was at Helen Mine, Calif., in January, 1909, when 71.54 inches of rain fell.

The longest dry period was also in California, at Bagdad, in San Bernardino County, it went from July 3, 1912 to Nov. 8, 1914 without raining.

However, there has been recorded a rainfall in California at Sand Canyon, north of Mojave, California, when 240 inches pounded down in one half hour. A 60 foot high wall of water rolled down the canyon, poured over and under the Los Angeles aqueduct, took out seven miles of highway and fifteen miles of the Southern Pacific tracks and left huge logs far out into the Mojave desert.

California also is ahead on snowfall with 60 inches in 24 hours at Giant Forest; 88.4 inches at Tamarack, and 390 inches in one season, also at Tamarack. The record snowfalls are all in the Sierra Nevada mountains

So, we will continue to have weather whether we like it or not. A little ditty I read some years ago expresses the desert:

"From the Pullman cars with turning fans,

The desert looks like a beautiful place,

But, when you're riding alone o'er the burning sands, She's hell, with a grin on her face."

"He then placed himself in an exposed crouching position and started firing his M1 rifle from the hip into the two remaining machine gun nests, and by his so doing attracted to himself the fire that had been previously placed on his men. While Capt. Streeter stood alone in the deadly hail of bullets that luckily missed him by inches, his unit advanced to a position of safety. Capt. Streeter stood his ground and fired two bandoliers of ammunition while the bullets plowed the snow at his very feet and two of them tearing holes in his field jacket. He then zigzagged across the open field to rejoin his unit and to lead them in a brilliant attack on the German pillboxes.

"This act of supreme sacrifice and utter disregard for his own personal safety, won Capt. Streeter the undying regard and complete respect of his men and reflects the highest ideals of military service."

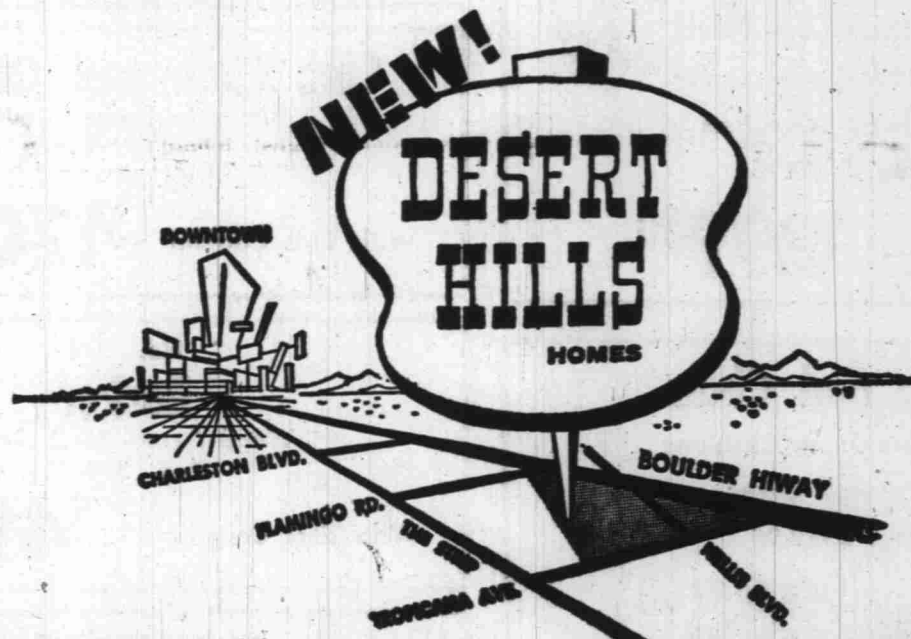
