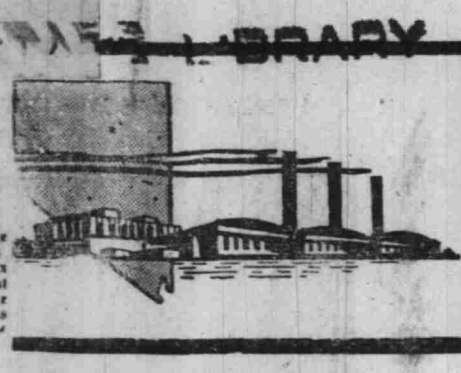

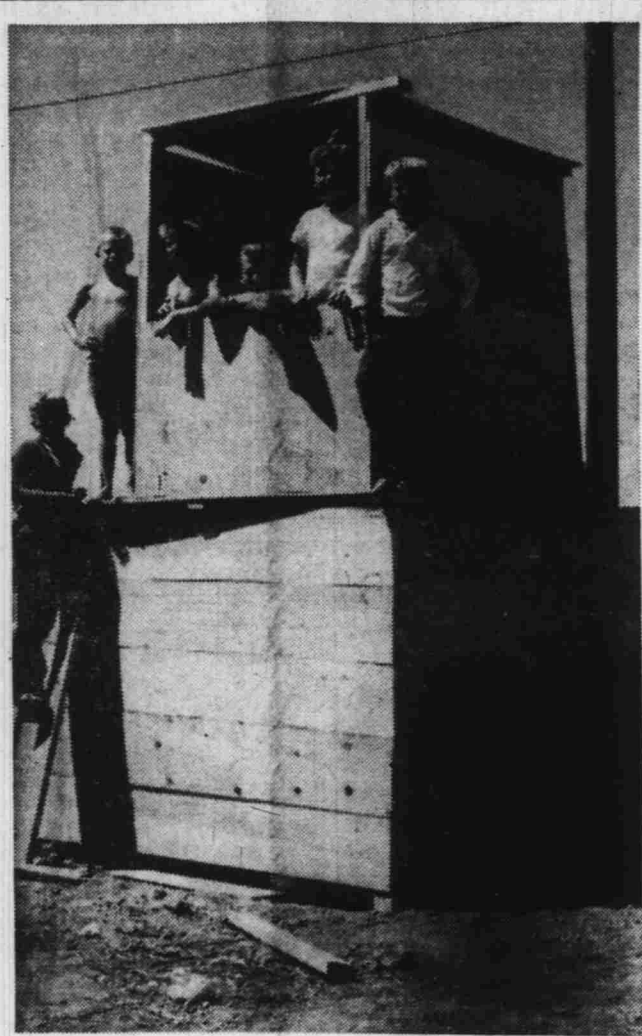

IT WILL BE BIRIE. BARING, WRIGHT, SAWYER, GREENSPUN -- M. M. ZENOFF

Without in any way seeking to endorse any candidate, and basing my opinions on observations, conversations, private polls in this county and state wide, I herewith present my predictions of Tuesday's primary election in the competition for top offices.
I believe that our headlines in the first issue following the election will read—"Bible, Wright, Baring, Sawyer, Greenspun nominated in primary."
I feel that Senator Alan Bible and Governor Grant Sawyer will defeat their democratic opponents in a walk-away. Bible's record in congress will serve him a good stead at the polls, despite the hard campaigning of his opponents. Sawyer will roll up a commanding plurality due to his position as governor and the lack of state-wide strength of any of his opponents.

Congressman Walter Baring will know he was in a race with Mendoza but his longevity in congress will squeeze him thru, I believe.
William Wright will become Bible's November opponent by the strength of his excellent advertising campaign, his fine appearance, his visitations in every corner of the state. The fact that he admires the Birch Society, although claims he is not a member, has not been played up in the campaign and thus will not stop the flow of votes that will put him in.
Hank Greenspun will win by a nod over Oran Gragson, unless Gragson's campaign from today to poll time picks up in tempo. My informants from the north country state that Greenspun and Gragson were both unknown as they started up there.
Then Greenspun is said to have made a better impression in his public appearance

and speech-making although Gragson impressed with his "being a fine, mild-mannered fellow".
In the Clark County, the private polls show Greenspun ahead at this moment.
Former U.S. Senator Berkeley Bunker figures to have very little trouble in being nominated for Lt. Governor to face Paul Laxalt in November. And Harvey Dickerson will win by a nod for the nomination spot as attorney-general.
I was right on Truman in '48, on Ike in '52, on Kennedy in '60—but my ability as a picker just about ends there—as I was wrong on the Reds in the series, on Minnesota in the Rose Bowl and the Giants in the pro-grid league. And I've never won at a horse-race—yet.
So—it could very well be my next week's headline will have to be re-written.

Byrne Picks Oran Gragson

Mayor "Bill" Byrne, who is well acquainted with most Nevada political figures, through his six years of serving in the State Legislature and five years as Mayor of Henderson, yesterday gave the HOME NEWS an "educated guess" as to whom the winners in the Primary Election will be.
In picking the candidates, Mayor Byrne made it plain that these are the ones he thinks will win and are not necessarily his choice of candidates.
The Mayor picked Alan Bible to win the Senatorial race although "Streeter has picked up considerable strength in the past ten days."
The race between Congressman Walter Baring and John F. Mendoza, he predicts will toss up. However Baring, being the incumbent has an edge which may win him the election.
He believes that Governor Sawyer will win the Demo-

cratic nomination by a very large margin; but did not venture a guess as to the outcome of the Democratic race for Lieutenant Governor.
On the Republican ballot, Byrne picked William B. Wright for U.S. Senate and he thinks Oran Gragson will win over Hank Greenspun by a comfortable majority.
Thomas A. Mulroy, Democrat; and Herbert E. Rowntree, Republican are the men the Mayor selected to be on the general election ballot for State Treasurer. He expects Harvey Dickerson to win the Democratic nomination for Attorney General over Sidney R. Whitmore, Dallas Wendall Reid and Michael J. Wendell.
Byrne is placing his bets on Jack McCarthy as State Printer and Merwin J. Gallagher as Inspector of Mines.
In the County election, Byrne says Jimmy Bilbray will win the Democratic nom-

ination as Assessor easily. The race for Commissioner at Large, he says, will be between Art Olsen, George Franklin and Mickey M. Gordon with Olsen probably emerging as the winner.
With eight candidates seeking the office of County Treasurer on the Democratic ballot, the Mayor says "this could be any one of seven men. It is by far the toughest race to predict on the ballot."
Sheriff Ralph Lamb, our Mayor thinks, can win the Democratic nomination for Sheriff "by as many votes as he wants to win by."
In other races he picked Democrat W. J. Hanks for Public Administrator; Boyd Bulloch, Republican for Commissioner at Large; and Bill Elwell, non-partisan, for Regent of the State University. He did not care to hazard a guess on the Southern Nevada Hospital Board.

Urban Renewal Agency To Start Survey In Pittman

Glenn Manley, executive director of the Urban Renewal Agency of Las Vegas, had good news for Pittman residents yesterday when he said that an urban renewal project is being considered for this area which is the only part of the city not qualified for FHA financing.
Enthusiasm and interest evidenced by telephone calls and letters received by the Las Vegas agency, sparked plans for a preliminary survey of the Pittman area that will begin soon, Manley said.
Currently submitted to the Housing and Home Finance Administration in San Francisco is an application for the survey and planning of the city's first urban renewal project, a conservation and rehabilitation program for the southern half of the original townsite.
Manley indicated a Pittman project may be considered in conjunction with the presently planned Townsite Number 1 program, with this possibility scheduled for discussion by the Mayor's committee on urban renewal and development.
Present plans call for a meeting of the committee early in September. Formed this summer as part of the Program for Community Improvement, the committee will discuss and recommend the scope and scheduling of urban renewal in Henderson.
The first urban renewal program—that of the townsite—was recommended by the Las Vegas Agency on the basis that:
1.) The homes in the townsite were at the point of de-

terioration where they could still be rehabilitated without resorting to the more drastic steps of demolition and clearance, a step which would perhaps become necessary if the program were delayed several years.
2.) The rehabilitated area, when completed, would serve as an anchor for future urban renewal projects in the city including redevelopment of the central business district and redevelopment of the project in the community. Manley suggested conservation and rehabilitation as the moderate approach to urban renewal, on which would impose less of an economic, social and legal burden on the city than would other programs.
3.) The cost of conservation and rehabilitation, since it involves little in the way of land acquisition, would be the easiest for the city government to handle. Total estimated federal grant required would be \$899,000. The city's share would be made up of public facility credits and would involve no outlay of cash.
In submitting the survey and planning application to

HHFA, note was made of the blighted condition of the Pittman area, said Manley, and that a future urban renewal project for the area was tentatively contemplated.

NO ODDS OFFERED Campaign Heats Up As Candidates Blast Away

The political situation has now reached what is aptly described as "the heat of the campaign."
As election day nears, the heat increases, as the velocity of the blasts leveled at each other by the various candidates is stepped up.
Oran Gragson, at a rally held here a few days ago, accused Hank Greenspun of being a "tool" of Teamster boss Jimmy Hoffa; while at almost the same time in Reno, Greenspun was telling the people that both Gragson and Sawyer were "beholden to a small handful of labor leaders."
Gragson told the people here that he had "turned the other cheek" and indicated that he has been slapped twice he is now mad enough to fight; his Republican opponent, on the other hand, has labeled himself a fighter

since the beginning of the campaign.
Although there is plenty of fireworks all down the line, not all the work of the candidates is being done on the firing line.
Personal letters and political circulars are swamping postal workers and the candidates are eagerly shaking the hands of the voters in business places, on the streets, at parties and at the local plants. A great many of them have dropped in at the HOME NEWS office while making their rounds.
Loot is not too plentiful this year. Mel Close is handing out emery boards and Edsel A. Gray, candidate for County Treasurer is handing out cards in the form of "wooden nickels." Art Olsen mailed packets of ball point pens (that work) and Flora Dunagan is handing out miniature rulers.

The last big political affair here before the Primary Election is a party at the Elks Club tomorrow night honoring Walter Baring. Free beer and sandwiches will be featured.
While the 74 candidates on the local ballot are each working toward their own election, they are—at the same time—doing everything in their power to get the voters to the polls on election day.
The HOME NEWS urges every eligible voter in Henderson to VOTE. We would not attempt to tell you whom to vote for, as your vote is a sacred and personal thing and should be of your own choosing.
We do urge you to go to the polls... vote for your own choice of candidates... but, if we are citizens... Let's be First Class Citizens. Only the Kremlin has anything to gain, if we find an excuse to stay at home on election day, next Tuesday.

Mayor Calls Off Wreckers Of 'Lonesome 6' Clubhouse

Mayor "Bill" Byrne, one of the original sponsors of the Henderson Boys' Club and wellknown as a friend of youngsters in general, yesterday saved the day for another club when their newly constructed clubhouse was threatened with destruction.
The beginnings of the house-

was made to Mayor Byrne, who promised to find a place for the clubhouse if it passed the scrutiny of Superintendent of Building, Pat Doherty. Pat drove out to inspect and gave the group some advice on how to strengthen the structure "so they wouldn't get their heads banged."
The clubhouse, a masterpiece of architectural engineering, is of lumber from leftovers of a Valley View project. The mother of one of the boys transported it to location via her station wagon.
The lower level of the two story structure is about 6 by 5 feet in floor area, and about 5 feet high. The upper story is also about 5 feet high, and is smaller in area than the lower level, thus a second floor balcony is formed by the roof of the first story. The downstairs room is accessible by a ladder to the balcony and a hole in the ceiling of the lower room.
It took the Lonesome Six three days to build their creation.
At this time the clubhouse is equipped with only a box of nails. Dogs as well as clubhouses are frowned on in Victory Village, but the club members have a pet lizard named "Sam" who serves as

mascot.
The boys have vaguely considered buying the property on which the clubhouse rests, but with no money and possible complications with BMI, the project seems doomed unless Mayor Byrne is able to find a new and less controversial location.

Mineral County Legislator Is Candidate For Lt. Governor

Mineral county has one candidate in the field for a state office — Farrell L. Seevers, who filed for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor. Seevers will be contesting in the September primary with Berkeley L. Bunker and Phil Cummings, both residents of Las Vegas.

Active in Democratic politics and public service in this county for the past 30 years, Seevers was first elected county commissioner in 1938 and was reelected in 1940 but resigned during the second term to enlist in the navy during World War II.

Upon return from service he was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board of Commissioners. In 1950 he was elected to the state assembly, serving one term, and in 1952 was elected to his first term

in the state senate.

He was re-elected in 1956 but lost in his bid for reelection to Bruce Parks, also a Democrat, in 1960. Early this year he was appointed to the board of county commissioners to complete the unexpired term of Glen Welsh, who had resigned.

During his ten years in the legislature, Seevers served on the powerful finance committees of both houses, and also was a member of the legislative commission (interim committees representing both houses between sessions) and served two years as chairman of the commission.

He has served as both chairman and secretary of the Democratic central committee and as a Nevada delegate to national conventions. In making his decision to

State Owned Lottery Favored By Demo Candidate Mel Close

The major plank in the platform of M. D. (Mel) Close, Democratic candidate for Governor of Nevada is a state operated lottery which proceeds used to relieve the overburdened taxpayers.

More than 45 countries are now helping their people through national-owned lotteries. "Why not Nevada?" Close asks.

He believes that such a lottery would bring several million dollars into the state treasury annually. This could be set aside in a special fund for such programs

as aid to senior citizens, relief of unemployment, welfare, etc. Close also favors the appointment of a "little" Hoover commission having the authority to audit and inspect records and to investigate transactions of all state agencies and departments. Also favored by this candidate are more severe penalties for narcotics (pushers) in order to protect the people of Nevada; and a treatment center for narcotic addicts to help in their rehabilitation.

He proposes also the creation of a "Hatch" act similar to our Federal Act, which would prohibit any state employee from taking part in political campaigns. Close has reassured the people of the state that he is "100 percent in favor of gambling, as we conduct it, in Nevada."

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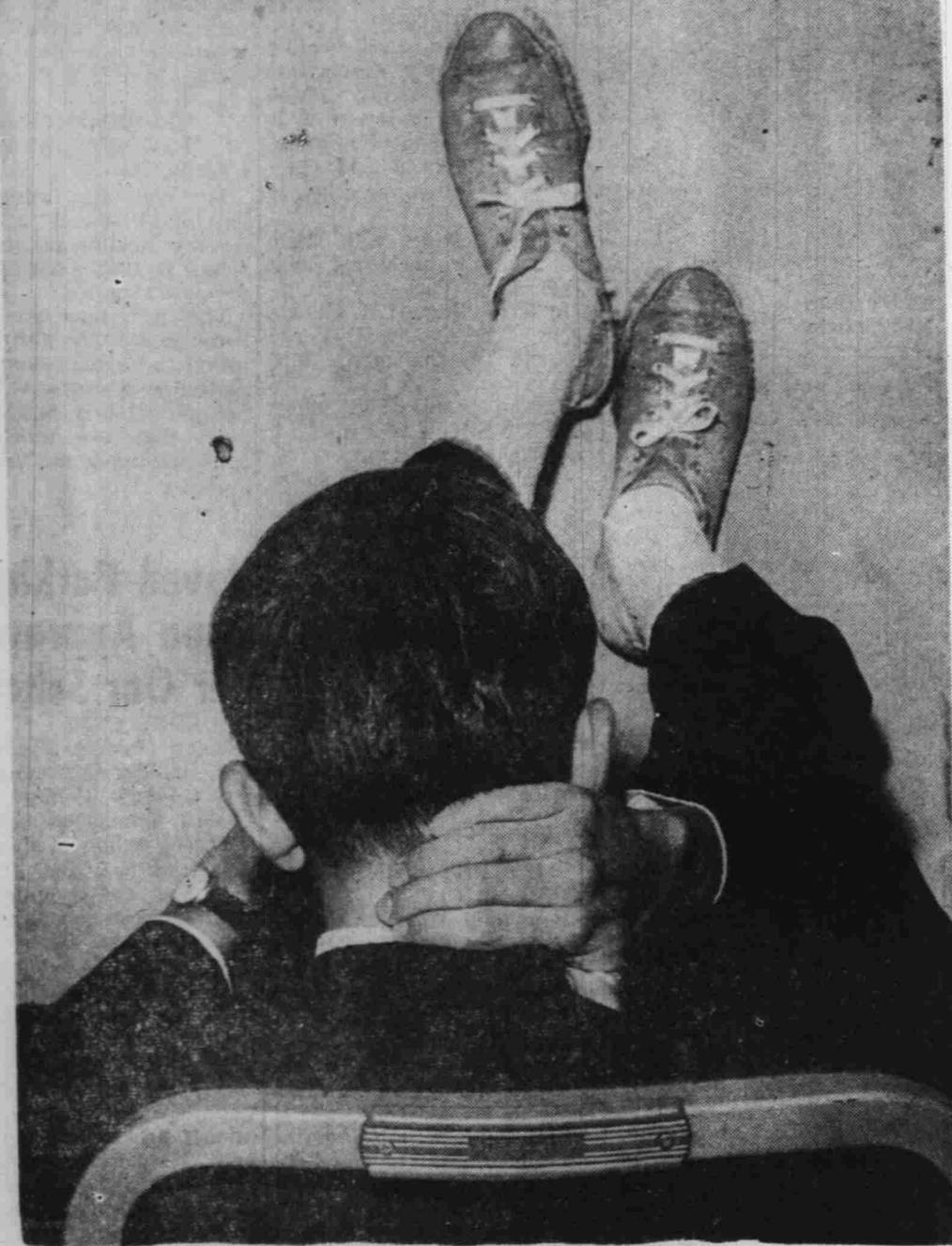

AMONG MOST SECURE IN NATION

City Has Week's Supply of Water in Reserve To Meet Emergencies, Records Show

How many gallons of water do you and each member of your family use on an average day throughout the year? Have you ever tried to guess? If not, give it a try. You will probably miss it by as much as two cups full.

Make a guess at the amount of water the average household is billed for each month the year around. Some of these figures can be astounding. You won't believe them. You will say it is impossible to use that much water in one day. If some of the members of your family are babies under, let us say, five years old, you will be right in saying that the figures presented to me by Don Dawson, city auditor, are wildly out of line. Statistics can reveal, unbelievable figures but there are proofs of every statement made in this story.

All right, how much water do we use? You, and every member of your household uses on an average of 250 gallons of water a day the year around! It sounds wildly unbelievable, and it is, but records show that this figure is pretty close to being right on the nose. You are billed for a minimum of 23,000 gallons per month. Figuring the population of Henderson at 14,000 persons and taking the average daily usage for last year, with the population maybe then just a little under that figure, then it comes out right on 250 gallons per person every day. This is figures on the twelve month year of August 1, 1961 to July 30, 1962, and not on the calendar year.

The lowest figures during the past twelve months were for last December when only 44,548,000 gallons of water was used by the people of Henderson. July was the heaviest month for water consumption with 189,856,500 gallons of water flowing through the pipes.

To break it down by months, starting with last August, we have 161,639,261 gallons; September, 126,251,946 gallons; October, 85,654,943 gallons; November, 52,778,900 gallons, December 44,548,200 gallons (the lowest for the year); January, 1962, 52,425,400 gallons; February, 50,336,100 gallons.

March began a gradual rise with 77,003,800 gallons. Then we went into the hundreds again with 117,188,600 for April; 142,498,000 in May; June jumped to 173,088,300; and July climaxed it with 189,856,500 gallons of life-giving water.

True, our consumption might well be a little higher than that of non-desert dwellers, but those are out figures and we are stuck with them. Now, get ready for another surprise. This totals over one billion gallons for the year, or, to be exact, 1,273,269,950 gallons in one year. How much is that in understandable figures? Well, let's see, your's is an eight-cup coffee pot? All right, that would make over ten billion cups of coffee, almost enough to keep one awake for a night. This will average out 3,488,411 gallons per day. So, take it from there. That's a lot of water.

So far this year, February showed a daily average of 1,735,728 gallons but July, with its 189,856,500 gallons showed a daily average of 6,124,403 gallons, or 437 gallons a day for every man, woman and child in Henderson.

We have a tendency to take things for granted. We turn on the faucet and if the water runs, fine. If it doesn't, we raise Cain and call frantically for some one to come and see what the heck. He comes and fixes and goes away and we turn on the faucet and smile happily.

The BMI operates two huge storage reservoirs at the end of Water Street, with a combined capacity of 35 million gallons, pumped from Lake Mead through huge 40 inch lines seven miles long. The storage tank on the hill holds a million gallons, so the city, even at the peak of its water consumption, has a six day reserve.

The insurance underwriters base their figures on a city with a three day water reserve as a top security fire risk. We have twice that much. If it were necessary to cut down to half use of water, we would have a 12 day reserve.

The Water Department has issued a report entitled "Suggestions for the Conservation of Water." We will quote salient parts of it verbatim:

"An amazingly large amount of water can be lost in 24 hours by a dripping faucet or other small leaks in the water fixtures or pipes.

"A slow drip from a hose or faucet can consume 15 gallons in 24 hours. A 1-32 inch from a faucet can waste 179 gallons of water in 24 hours; a 1-16 inch stream, 700 gallons; and a 1-8 inch stream will use 3,000 gallons in 24 hours if left running.

FINDING LEAKS: Faucets; Check all faucets inside and out-of-doors to be sure they turn off completely. The washers in a hot water faucet need replacing more frequently because the heat causes more rapid deterioration of the washers.

Toilets: When the toilet stand several hours without flushing (over night) pour some laundry bluing in the flush tank. If the toilet is leaking, the blue color will appear in the toilet bowl.

Washing Machines: Automatic washing machines, or other equipment which is attached to a water hose, should be shut off at the faucets when the equipment is not in use.

Air Conditioners: Make regular checks of float valves and pump on evaporative type coolers. When these function improperly considerable water can be wasted. Evaporative coolers without pumps can be expected to use water at the rate of 1-8 inch stream or greater during all the time the water (not the cooler) is left on.

Water Hoses: Always turn the hose off at the faucet. Turning water off at the nozzle nearly always results in slow leaks, especially at the connections.

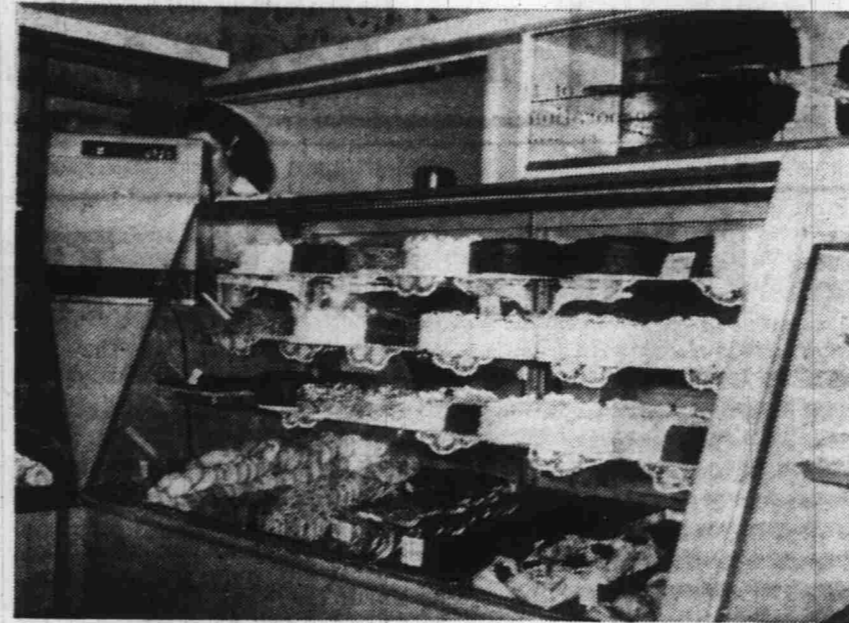
And remember, you pay for every drop of water wasted at your place.

Extension Service Issues Well Drilling Bulletin



Baring Bill For Blind Vets Passes House

Congressman Baring stated today that another of his Veterans benefits bills, H.R. 3728, passed Congress. This bill provides for total disability compensation to Veterans granted service-connected disability for blindness of one

eye, and who subsequent to separation from active duty incurs blindness in the remaining eye. Baring's bill was introduced in the House on February 2, 1961, and was originally passed by the House on April

2, 1962, and then by the Senate on August 9, 1962, where an additional disability consideration was added to the bill relating to bilateral kidney involvement, so that a Veteran who has suffered the loss or loss of use, of one kidney

as a result of service-connected disability, and who subsequently has suffered severe involvement of the other kidney so as to cause total disability. This additional consideration was agreed to today by the House, and thus Congressman Baring's bill, H.R. 3728, as now passed by the Congress, serves a two-fold purpose in helping both blinded Veterans and Veterans with severe service-connected kidney ailments.

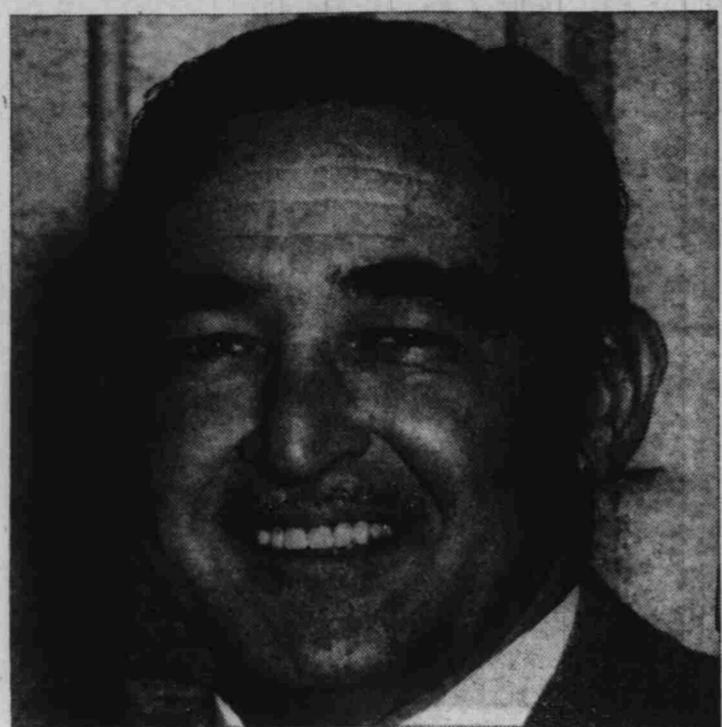

Mineral County Legislator Is Candidate For Lt. Governor

Mineral county has one candidate in the field for a state office — Farrell L. Seevers, who filed for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor. Seevers will be contesting in the September primary with Berkeley L. Bunker and Phil Cummings, both residents of Las Vegas.

Active in Democratic politics and public service in this county for the past 30 years, Seevers was first elected county commissioner in 1938 and was reelected in 1940 but resigned during the second term to enlist in the navy during World War II.

Upon return from service he was appointed to fill a vacancy on the board of Commissioners. In 1950 he was elected to the state assembly, serving one term, and in 1952 was elected to his first term

in the state senate.

He was re-elected in 1956 but lost in his bid for reelection to Bruce Parks, also a Democrat, in 1960. Early this year he was appointed to the board of county commissioners to complete the unexpired term of Glen Welsh, who had resigned.

During his ten years in the legislature, Seevers served on the powerful finance committees of both houses, and also was a member of the legislative commission (interim committees representing both houses between sessions) and served two years as chairman of the commission.

He has served as both chairman and secretary of the Democratic central committee and as a Nevada delegate to national conventions. In making his decision to

State Owned Lottery Favored By Demo Candidate Mel Close

The major plank in the platform of M. D. (Mel) Close, Democratic candidate for Governor of Nevada is a state operated lottery which proceeds used to relieve the overburdened taxpayers.

More than 45 countries are now helping their people through national-owned lotteries. "Why not Nevada?" Close asks.

Senator Bible Travels 30,000 Miles In Re-Election Campaign

Senator Alan Bible today opened the final week of his primary re-election campaign by urging Nevada voters "to weigh my eight year record of accomplishment against my opponents' barrage of propagandized promises."

A native of Las Vegas, Elwell operates the downtown hotel that bears his name.

Elwell, a Navy veteran, is a member of the American

Legion and the VFW, B.P.O. Elks, Footprinters, Masonic Lodge, the Las Vegas Shrine Club and a lifetime member of the Las Vegas Press Club.

In announcing his candidacy for reelection, Elwell stressed that he hopes to continue the efforts jointly between the board of regents and the legislature to bring about accreditation of Nevada Southern as a four-year school during his next term in office.

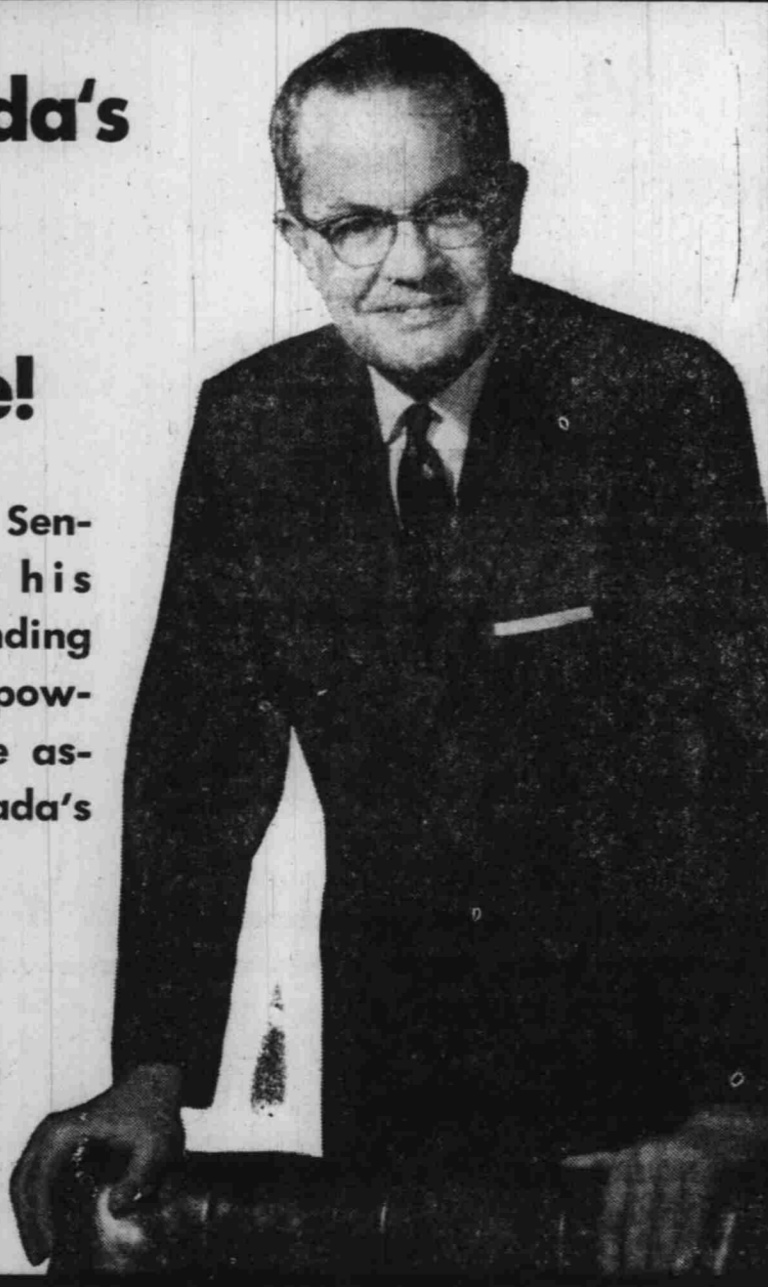

U of Nevada Granted \$42,700 For Animal Hormone Study

The Animal Science Department of the University of Nevada has been awarded a \$42,700 research grant to finance a study of the level of pituitary hormones in cows at various stages of the estrus cycle.

The grant made by the National Institute of Health, a division of the U.S. Public Health Service, is to be used over a three-year period. Forty cows or heifers at the Main Station Experiment Farm will be used in the study.

The research will be designed to assemble basic information regarding the levels of pituitary hormones in the normal cow. Attempts will be made to relate the hormone level to ovarian activity in the animals.

The hormone relationships within the animals are presumed to be applicable to other forms of higher animal life including humans with certain minor exceptions.

Dr. Darrel Foote, livestock research scientist, has been designated project leader.

Demo Candidate Flora Dungan Speaks To Desert Hills Group

At a recent party held in her honor by friends in Desert Hills, Public Accountant Flora Dungan advised her many friends there and in the adjoining East Las Vegas area that they are voters in Assembly District 2, which this year is the largest district in Nevada with nine representatives in the Legislature.

Miss Dungan is also president and one of the founders of the Student Aid Foundation, which was established to give financial assistance to students who otherwise would be unable to continue their education. She is a graduate of the University of California.

If elected to the Assembly, Miss Dungan, through her position with the Student Aid Foundation, plans to sponsor legislation creating a Nevada Youth Authority with a principal aim of providing useful training for unskilled Nevada youth, so they will be able to find employment in the present-day labor market.

She pointed out that a large number of jobs in the Las Vegas area, particularly in connection with the nuclear program at Camp Mercury, are filled by out-of-state workers because of the large number of local young men without training in needed skills.

Miss Dungan is well-known throughout southern Nevada as a television panelist and on public information programs. She is the wife of Las Vegas newspaperman Ed Oncken.

As an advocate of equal rights for women, Miss Dungan was responsible for a resolution adopted by both the Clark County and State Democratic Conventions to end discrimination against women in the State of Nevada.
