The question of garbage collection rates was finally settled Wednesday night at the City Council meeting when the board voted unanimously to accept the slate of charges as presented to them.

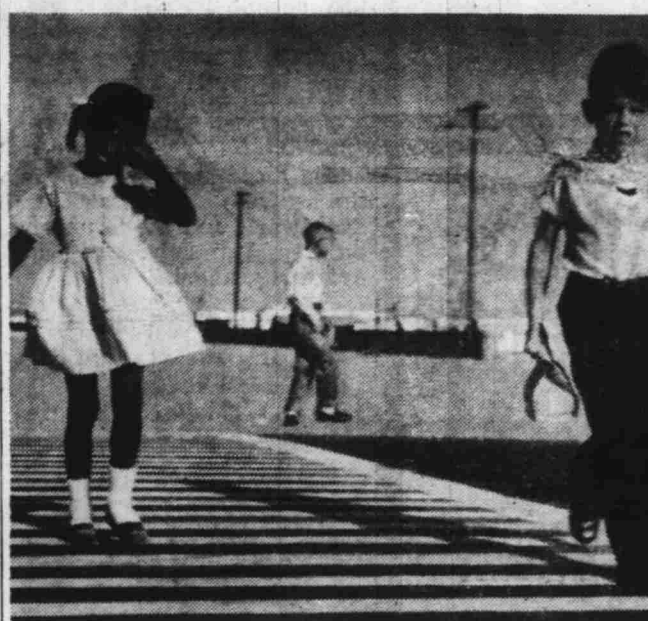

## Buyers Will Draw Numbers For Choice Of Lots From City

You reaches in the hat and you draws your number. A special meeting of the City Council will be held in the council chambers of the city hall Monday night at 8 o'clock for the purpose of disposing of the 20 lots held by the city and offered for sale. Fifteen prospective purchasers have paid their down payment on the lots and six others have indicated their desire to buy. The City Council, at its deferred meeting Wednesday night, voted to place numbers from one to fifteen in a hat and have the 15 buyers draw a number indicating the rotation of choice of the lots offered. The 15 will be notified by certified mail of the meeting and will probably be called on the phone as well. They will draw numbers in the order that their application was received and of the remaining six, five will be allowed to draw among themselves for choice of the remainders.

## Subdivisions, Zone Change Presented To Planning Board

Among the many questions and requests presented to the City Planning Commission at their adjourned meeting held in the City Council chambers last Thursday night, was a request for a zone change from Lou LaPorta of 75 Church Street.

He asked that zoning be changed from R-2 to C-2 for the purpose of constructing multiple apartments at Lot 20, Block 2, Henderson Townsite (38 Texas St.). A public hearing was set for Sept. 27 in the council chambers. Plans for a two story building, with apartments to be on the second floor were presented by Herb Crosby, owner, for approval. The structure is to be at 19 Water St. Moved by Henderson and seconded by Pantuso to approve the construction plans. Carried unanimously.

A tentative map for the approval of Sunset Village, to be located in the NW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 17, was presented by Morris Weir, representing Bill Hartman, proposed builder of the planned subdivision.

Weir was told that proper procedure must be followed in filing such a map as states Section 4, Ordinance 160. It was moved by Olsen and seconded by Pantuso that from this date on each person filing a subdivision map must follow the procedure as stated in said section. A formal application for a use permit from the Thunderbird Speedway to use the fence in front of the race-track facing Highway 93 for sign purposes was presented for approval.

The fence sign will include the name "Thunderbird Speedway" and the Thunderbird emblem only. The permit was granted.

## GOP Campaign Pays Off On Election Day

The active campaign waged by local Republicans prior to the Primary Election, and sparked by two Clark County candidates for Governor of Nevada, was apparent in the voting Tuesday when 64.56 percent of the registered Republicans exercised their franchise as compared to 57.52 percent of the registered Democrats.

In the senatorial races, which received the highest vote on both ballots, 572 out of 886 registered Republicans voted; in the Democratic senatorial race, 2416 out of 4200 registered Democrats cast their ballots. Approximately 3000 voters went to the polls out of the 5099 registered for the election. A total vote of 58.84 percent.

Senator Alan Bible led the Democratic voting with 1936 and William B. Wright with 360 votes led the Republicans. Governor Sawyer with 1928 and Oran Gragson with 351 took second place honors on their party tickets.

Other top vote getters on the Democratic ballot were Sheriff Ralph Lamb with 1921; Assessor Jimmy Bilbray, 1669; Harvey Dickerson, candidate for Attorney General, 1418; Berkeley Bunker for Lt. Governor, 1936; Art Olsen for Commissioner at Large, 1304; former city councilman Gail Armstrong, candidate for County Auditor and Recorder, 1291; and Congressman Walter Baring, 1227.

Henderson followed the State and County trends in most races except Regent of the State University. In this race, Dr. Juanita G. White led the voting with 752, followed by W. H. "Bill" Elwell with 562 and Howard E. Heckethorn with 101.

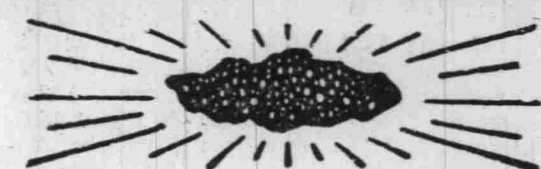

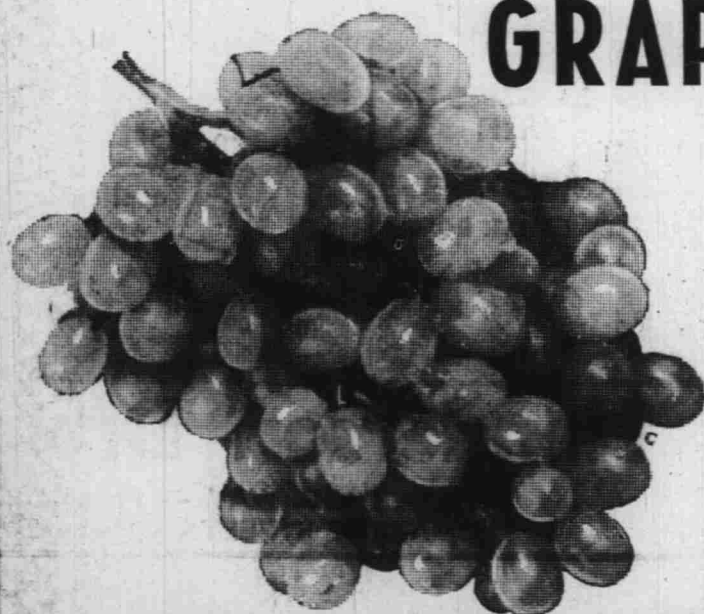

**New Peace Corps Test Sept. 29**

Information has been received at the local post office that the next Peace Corps placement test will be held at the Main post office in Las Vegas at 8:30 a.m. on September 29.

Anyone with the equivalent of a high school education is eligible to take the test. There is no passing score, but the test helps the Peace Corps officials to determine the overseas assignments for which applicants are best suited.

Volunteers for this highly successful organization must be American citizens at least 18 years old. Married couples are eligible if both qualify and have no dependents under 18.

Developing nations around the world are asking for peace Corps teachers, farm-

ing, clothing, food, housing, medical care, insurance and miscellaneous needs and receive termination payment of \$75 for each month served, if noted.

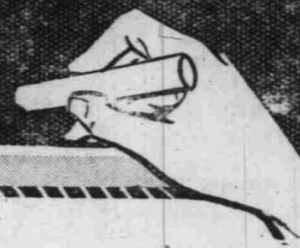

### Basic Safety Program Wins Plaque at U.S. Conference

H p-1 2-24-2 Basic Safety mc The National Education Association this week announced the awarding of a plaque to Basic High School for its 1961-62 program on traffic safety.

The plaque, awarded at the National Student Traffic Safety Conference held at the Bowling Green State University in Ohio, honors the school for meritorious activities to improve school and commu-

nity traffic safety. Basic was one of 63 U.S. high schools receiving plaques for programs of particular significance, while 135 schools received certificates for activities of outstanding value.

The conference was conducted by the National Commission on Safety Education of the National Education Association. General sessions, group discussions and a business meeting provided the ap-

proximately 100 delegates, representing 41 states, with an opportunity to review safety activities sponsored by the schools. They analyzed one another's problems, tried to determine how to improve programs during the next year, and discussed the recruitment of more schools in to the National Student Safety Association to which the 2859 participating schools belong.

The program is sponsored by grants from the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company and the Ford Fund.

The Basic program, conducted by the Driver Education Class instructed by John Razmic, consisted of safety signs posted in local business places, editorials written by students and printed in the HOME NEWS, and Traffic Safety Week, proclaimed by Mayor W. B. "Bill" Byrne.

During Traffic Safety Week, a compact car which had been crushed in a traffic accident was placed at the intersection of Boulder Highway and Vegas Wash Road, with a huge sign reading: "Keep Death Off Our Highways."

Report 1 dealt with fluorspar deposits in Nevada.

Fisher will be available to answer questions concerning small business loans, to discuss business problems, to distribute printed pamphlets of informational material, and to take applications.

Author of the molybdenum report is John S. Schilling, staff mining geologist for the Nevada Bureau of Mines. Included in the study are the names, locations, production, development, and geology of 121 molybdenum occurrences scattered over the State in every county except Ormsby. A reference list, index, and map of deposit locations complete the report.

Copies of the new publication may be purchased for 75 cents, plus 15 cents for mailing, from the Nevada Bureau of Mines, University of Nevada, Reno.

If Johnny comes home from school without his glasses this fall, you can probably find them in the principal's office. Or if Mary reports her brand new knit sweater stolen, it's probably in the office, too.

According to Principal Bennion, many an irate parent will call and denounce him and the school in no uncertain terms for allowing some "thief" to break into dear little Johnny's locker and steal his priceless things. Whereas, actually dear Johnny left his

what-nots lying around the school grounds and some student has turned them in to the office.

Bennion said that when these parents call, he asks them to stop in the office and look over what has been turned in. He said the parents' embarrassment is often amusing. Although, even in face of this evidence that Johnny or Mary had not told the truth about how the articles turned up missing, Mama still denounced the school for allowing some little thior-that to take the things that had been temporarily laid down and embarrass their child.

In the front office at the Townsite Elementary School is a metal rack on which is hanging coats, sweaters, jackets, and even a girl's slip and a pair of boy's pants that have been left there from last year. Many of the articles of clothing are left lying around or in the gym when the children go from gym to playground without changing back from gym clothes into school clothes.

Then some one turns them in to the office and no one calls for them and there they still are.

In the office at Townsite is a shoe box containing 32 pairs of children's eye glasses, many of them showing evidence of being in the real money class. Of these glasses, 16 are in cases and 16 are not. True, many of them are down in the \$5 and \$10 class but, if they averaged \$25 a pair, there is \$800 worth of

children's eye glasses just gathering dust.

Principal Bennion said he estimated that from \$800 to \$1,000 worth of clothing is turned in to the office during a school year. Much of it is reclaimed, as are many pairs of glasses, but much of it is not and the parents have to replace them.

So, if little Johnny or Mary had the misfortune of having had the locker broken in to, or so they claimed, the chances are that whatever was missing is still waiting their claim at the office.

The winds that seem never to cease whispering across the prairies of eastern Montana had stopped and a deadly silence had fallen over the white blanket that covered the loneliness and desolation lying under two feet of snow.

The snow was frozen almost to the consistency of ice in the sub-zero weather and it squealed and squaled under foot as the few who were out battled the piercing cold.

We had just crossed Minnesota and the Dakotas sharing a box car with twenty head of registered Holstein cattle en route from Ontario, Canada to Seattle. The Land of Ten Thousand Lakes may have been a gem of Nature's beauty but we saw none of it. Even the Badlands of the Dakotas were hidden behind the constantly shifting curtain of falling snow.

Huge flakes that seemed never to alight but whipped over the land an almost solid wall of white as the heavy fall of snow was churned in winds of near-blizzard velocity filled the air and hid the rugged beauty of the land from view.

Some time during the night the freight train hauling our car dragged into the yards at Miles City, Montana, battling drifts that tried to hide the rails under mounds of white, fighting the wind-driven snow hiding possible danger from the ice encrusted eyes of the engineer. But we made it.

We awoke to the dripping of melting ice falling on our bed of frozen cow blankets. We were inside the feed barn at the Miles City Stock Yards where some thoughtful switchman had shunted our car.

It was cold. The water barrels were frozen solid. The feed was so cold the cattle hated to eat it. The longer our car remained in the barn the warmer we became. There were no chilling winds cutting through the car and the animal heat of the cattle warmed us a little.

Outside a gentle wind whistled that killing cold and, as we stopped and a blanket of silence seemed to follow behind it.

Noises carry for miles in that killing cold and, as we plodded through the frozen snow to the little restaurant for a belated breakfast, the crunching of our boots could be heard nearly up town.

It was late in the forenoon before we ventured back into the cold. We found ourselves in a different world. Men stood in small groups and talked in hushed tones or peered from doorways in silence.

A strange quiet lay over the country, a silence that seemed to portend disaster. Off to the west and to the northwest hung a wall of black that seemed to crawl steadily toward us.

The black cloud seemed to roll over us, to hang overhead although it was still miles away.

Then the wind struck. One heavy gust that nearly knocked us off our feet. It stopped for a moment, then, with a gentle sigh, it resumed.

From the doorway of the feeding barn where our car of cattle was sheltered came the voice of one of the men who had been watching the weather. We caught one word, "Blizzard."

Everybody headed for cover and so did we. When the barn doors were closed behind us and the heavy bars dropped into place I went to one of the feed racks and watched the slow march of cold death.

The wind picked up in velocity and skittered frozen snow over the surface of the fields and whipped loose hay and straw through the barn. You could almost count the degrees as the temperature dropped.

Then the wind began to wail, a low, soft keening sound that picked up in volume until it was screaming over the prairies.

The cattle in the feeding pens raced for the bars and humped themselves against the cold in resignation.

The snow came. Little frozen pellets that struck with the force of shotgun shots and

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
