So far, Hazel June said, about the only people she knows who haven't called are the police.

Mrs. Staton is a former supervisor of nurses at the Arizona State Hospital and became a friend of Winnie Ruth Judd when she accepted an

assignment to take a course in hair dressing and relay the lessons day - by - day to Mrs. Judd, who later worked as a hair dresser for the other patients.

Mrs. Staton left the hospital after she was accused of aiding the "tiger woman" in one of her escapes. Hazel June has never forgotten the questioning she was subjected to by the police and remarked that she is certainly glad she is no longer working at the hospital, where Winnie Ruth Judd has just made her seventh escape by simply walking out of an unlocked door.

This hit finished Sanford, who allowed but six safeties and struck out ten.

With a two and one count, Bailey drove high and wide to right field but it was short of the stands and Maris gloved the sphere for the final out.

Today is an off day to give both clubs a day for traveling. The series resumes tomorrow at Candlestick Park in San Francisco with Billy Pierce scheduled to hurl for the Giants and probably Whitey Ford for the Yankees.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Parents:  
Did you miss the last PTA meeting?

PTA should be just as important to you as school is to your children. They come to school to learn and by coming to PTA you, too, can learn; first by knowing your child's teacher; second by helping your child through knowing the teacher and understanding something of the program that confronts both teacher and student in their day-to-day school life.

Very few children just happen to grow up. It is through your love and guidance at home and the many agents of the law and school that are helping you to help your children become the men and women of tomorrow.

The Police need your help in teaching your child to obey the law. This also applies to the school. . . . What chance would your child have in school had you not first taught him how to speak, to listen, to think for himself?

Once your child is in school, it is the teacher's job to teach the child, but only with your help, because the hours in school are not sufficient.

Your child's teacher may send him home with homework while you in turn send your child to school with orders to be good, to obey the teacher, to keep clean; so the child is going both ways with orders.

With the cooperation of parents and teachers, children have little difficulty obeying the instructions of both. PTA is a meeting ground for you as a parent to meet with your child's teacher. Do you expect the teacher to do a good job of instructing your child? This is a rather difficult assignment unless you are also willing to do a good job as a parent and give the teacher the best cooperation possible . . . and that's a difficult assignment too, if you don't attend the PTA meetings at your child's school.

## New Subdivision Before Planning Board Tonight

City planning Commissioners will meet tonight at the City Hall to consider a tentative map of Sunset Village-Subdivision No. 5 which adjoins the present Trailer Estates.

Also on the agenda will be a public hearing on amendments to zoning ordinance No. 5, and George Perkins, public works director will present another ordinance amending the zoning ordinance.

Clinton Hall, who asked for a use permit for placing ten head of cattle in Section 4, is scheduled to appear before the city planning board. The board recommended that Hall obtain at least five acres for placing his cattle.

One had but to put his mind to dreaming a bit last night, after listening to suggestions for face-lifting Henderson, and the picture would come to mind of a community so beautiful and so modernized that it would be the envy of all other American cities of 14,000 people.

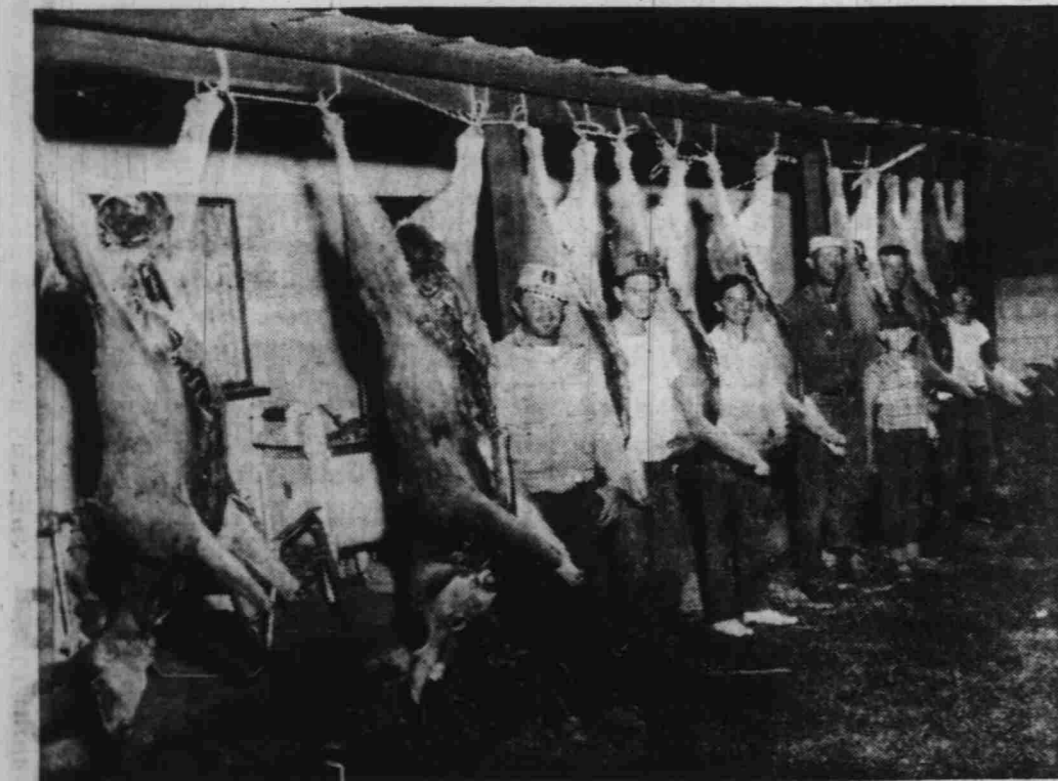
The suggestions came at the second official meeting of the city's Urban Renewal committee, which is composed of 15 mayor-council appointed citizens of our town who have agreed to serve in the public's interest until the hoped for five million dollar renewal program is completed.

Some of the suggestions follow:

- Providing an appropriate entrance road to the Basic High School complex, which presently is being added to the tune of \$800,000.
- Providing playgrounds for each area of the city.
- Planting grass and trees along the center section of Boulder Highway throughout the length of its run thru the city.
- Planting grass and trees along Frontier Boulevard from the hospital on out parallel to the plant along the plant side of the street.
- Planting grass and trees down the center of Major Boulevard.
- Providing for an overhead bridge or adequate underground walkway for school children crossing Boulder Highway.
- Providing plantings along Vegas Wash road.
- Providing attractive walls along the highways to cover up the view of backyards—similar to the Twin Lakes walls along Tonopah Highway, and the Desert Inn walls along Paradise road.
- All these and others, along with the first project that has been agreed upon—of assisting home owners in the town-site area between Victory road and Atlantic in bringing their homes up to code, and property owners along Water street in building up-to-date store buildings in place of the present old houses that have been converted.
- Some of these suggestions are to be forwarded to the city planning commission and the city council to see if immediate results can be obtained, and others will be checked with the Urban Renewal agency to see if federal funds are available.
- The committee also decided to work up an explanation sheet to better inform the citizenry as to Urban Renewal and how it can aid each homeowner. It will be distributed thru city council channels to each home-owner in the city.
- The next meeting will be held Oct. 24.

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new home of Crosby Music Center at 19 Water Street were held October 4. Present at the ceremonies were Herb Crosby, owner; Lou F. LaPorta, Chairman of the Board of Clark County Commissioners; W.B. Byrne, Mayor; Julian Moore, Vice-president of Frontier Fidelity; and a representative of Toller and Oliver contractors.

The new building, now under construction, will be a two-story concrete block structure with from two to four businesses on the ground floor and four apartments on the second floor. The building will encompass 6000 feet of floor space and 2400 square feet of parking area will be provided at the back.

The ground floor of the building will be completed in about 60 days, and Crosby

Music Center has received tentative approval from the City to occupy the first floor while the second story is being completed.

The new music center will have a special room for the display of organs and pianos and three sound proof private teaching rooms.

Crosby is the exclusive dealer here for the Lowery organ and also features Olds and Leblanc Bannister band instruments and Gibson and Guild guitars. The music center also has a complete line of tape recorders and record players and a full line of classical and popular records and accessories.

Herb and Kay Crosby and their son, Doug, moved here from California in April 1947 to establish the Crosby Music Center. Herb started giving private music lessons here immediately and later branched out into Boulder City and Las Vegas.

A retail music store was established in Las Vegas, in addition to the teaching studios here and in July of 1956, the Henderson retail store was opened at 19 Water St. Since the opening, Miss Betty Holt has been manager of Crosby Music Center on Water Street.

"One thing that I have always believed in," Herb Crosby said, "is not only the sale of musical instruments, but the teaching of the instruments as well, whenever possible. There has always been teaching available in conjunction with Crosby Music Center."

Crosby has worked closely with the local school band directors and has done whatever possible to assist them in their programs.

During the time Mr. and Mrs. Crosby resided here, both were active in civic affairs. He is a past president of the Henderson Junior Chamber of Commerce; a member and past commander of VFW Basic Post 3848 and served as Department of Nevada VFW Commander in 1955-56.

Mrs. Crosby is a member and past president of the VFW Auxiliary to Basic Post 3848. They are members of the First Presbyterian Church of

Las Vegas and Crosby is chairman of the board of trustees. During the time they lived in Henderson they attended the Community Church.

Their son, Doug, started his elementary education in the Henderson schools and is the only young man from Southern Nevada to receive an appointment as U.S. Senate page boy, an honor received through the patronage of the late Senator Geo. W. "Molly" Malone.

In speaking of their building program, Mr. and Mrs. Crosby said, they have the utmost confidence in the future of Henderson and are looking forward to the continued growth of the community. They said, they are pleased that the city is adopting an Urban Renewal plan, as they feel the improvement of the Townsite business district and Water Street is essential to the continued expansion of the city.

During the construction period, Crosby Music Center is doing business in temporary quarters at 26 Water Street, across the street from its usual location.

## Nevada's Gaming Industry Hits All-Time Record High

Nevada's gross gaming revenue for the first nine months of 1962 hit a record high of \$160,683,785, up 9.1 per cent over the same period

last year, Governor Grant Sawyer announced today.

The Governor said a report from the Nevada Gaming Commission showed a revenue increase of \$13.3 million over the first three quarters of 1961, with 14 counties sharing the economic jump. Lyon, Washoe and White Pine recorded losses.

State taxes for the nine months, exclusive of race wagers fees and penalties, amounted to \$8,189,832.

Leading revenue producer was the Clark County industry, which reported winnings of \$94,371,385, up \$11.7 million, followed by Washoe,

down \$2.4 million to \$36,600,174, and Douglas, up \$3.5 million to \$21,463,107.

Other county figures were: Elko, up \$115,154 to \$3,622,272; Ormsby, up \$32,190 to \$1,269,842; Mineral, up \$41,602 to \$998,878; Humboldt, up \$228,747 to \$711,278; New, up \$111,782 to \$568,611; White Pine, down \$128,645 to \$338,671; Churchill, up \$39,604 to \$312,308; Pershing, up \$3,125 to \$104,929; Storey, up \$29,630 to \$102,385; Lyon, down \$15,913 to \$91,142; Lander, up \$1,813 to \$64,758; Lincoln, up \$13,007 to \$48,550; Eureka, up \$1,966 to \$7,562; and Esmeralda, up \$1,408 to \$6,931.

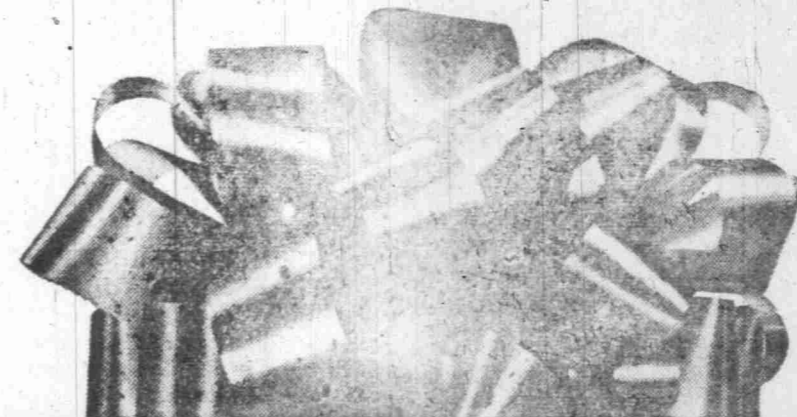

### Windbreak Trees Available From State Forester

Requests for application blanks to secure windbreak trees from the Nevada Division of Forestry are now being accepted according to George Zappettini, State Forester. Requests by letter, postal card or by telephone will be accepted by the Division of Forestry, State Office Building in Carson City.

Also these applications should be available at all County Extension and Soil Conservation Area Offices by the first week in October. In Clark County, applications will also be available at the Nevada Department of Agriculture Office in the State Building in Las Vegas.

Applications will be accepted until April 1, 1963, but trees are reserved as orders are received until stock is depleted. Other years including the 1962 shipping season, many late orders had to be returned unfilled due to lack of available trees. Ordering before the end of December in order to be reasonably assured of trees is recommended.

Ownership of at least one acre of land is required in order to be eligible to receive trees through this state and federal distribution program; they cannot be used as ornamental plantings and cannot be resold as living trees. Violation of these regulations cause all such trees to revert in ownership to the State Forester said.

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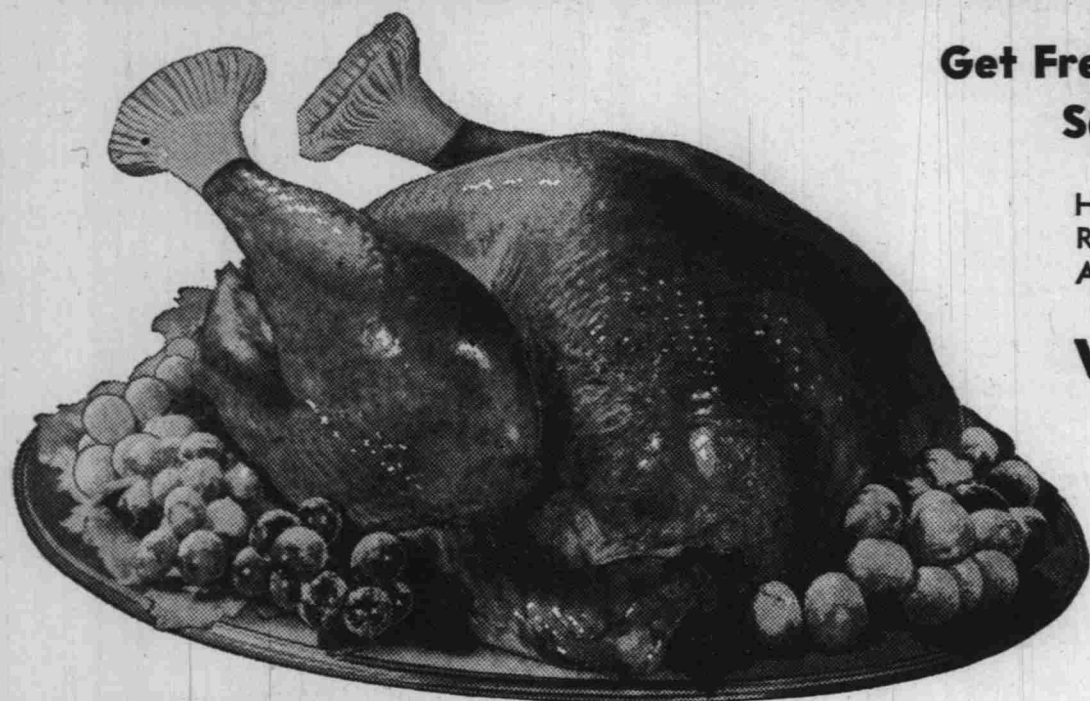

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# Hunters Are Headed For The Hills

The opening of deer season Saturday found many local hunters already at their favorite "deer camp" sites and a continual stream of cars, laden with camp equipment, guns and some cases, wives and children, have headed for the hills and the exciting chase.

Adding to the thrill of the hunt is the fact that most hunters think venison the very finest of meat.

"Mule deer, with their qualities as a big game animal and as table fare, are the number one attraction for Nevada hunters. More people hunt deer in the state than for all other species of game combined. What is there about this animal that lures so many out in pursuit of him?"

Although there are three main species of deer in the U.S., the Whitetail, Columbia Blacktail, and the Mule deer, the "Mule" is the only one of the three known to inhabit Nevada. There are 14 subspecies of mule deer but the one we have in Nevada is the Rocky Mountain "mule,"

though there is a possibility that both the California and Inyo subspecies range into the Sierra region of the state.

On the average, the Rocky Mountain is the largest of the deer found in North America and aside from being found in Nevada is found in a number of other western states such as Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Utah, Arizona, Wyoming, Montana, Colorado, New Mexico, and others.

The most massive antlers of deer in the U.S. come from the ranks of the "mules," as well as some of the heaviest body weights. The widest spread of antlers of a Nevada "mule" deer, as far as is known by the State Fish and Game Commission, is 49 inches.

This particular head was killed in Lincoln County and won the Las Vegas Golden Nugget deer contest in 1958. It actually was something of a freak head with one side a big four-point and the other side a fork which grew straight out from the head. Heaviest authenticated dressed weight of the Nevada deer is 329 pounds. This animal was killed in White Pine County in 1957.

As far as trophy mule deer racks go, as judged by the Boone and Crockett Club, Nevada is represented by four heads in the nontypical class and 14 heads in the typical head. This is based on the 1958 Boone and Crockett book since the club has not issued a book since that time. One of the heads in the nontypical class ranks number three all-time or is the third largest head ever taken in North America and registered with Boone and Crockett. All four of the nontypical heads and 12 of the 14 typical heads were taken in Elko County. The Boone and Crockett Club is the only group which gives official sta-

tus to North American trophy heads bagged by rifle hunters.

As far as average weights of Nevada deer are concerned, bucks would probably run around 135 pounds dressed, with antlerless or does considerably less at about 100 pounds. Each year in Nevada, however, a number of bucks are killed which dress 200 or more pounds.

The "mule" deer fawn is usually born during the first 10 days or so of June, although some may come earlier or later. The fawn has a spotted or mottled coat but loses this about mid-August when he gets the regular winter adult coat of cinnamon buff or grey. Rutting season for the deer occurs in late October and normally through November. Gestation for the does is seven months.

Buck deer usually get their first set of antlers in their second fall or as long yearlings. Most young bucks will first grow a forked horn, although some may be spikes and some small four-pointers. Growth of horns begins in March or April a few days after the old horn has been shed.

The new horns is a living thing with blood and nerves and is encased in velvet during the growth period. In late August and early September the antler ossifies and becomes hard. Then the bucks polish off the velvet and are ready for the rutting season. In February or March, the antlers are shed and new ones begin to grow.

In the summer, mule deer appear in a reddish-tan coat but lose this in the fall when they grow their winter coat of grey that is common to the deer hunter.

# Game Commission Lists Rules Governing Hunters In Field

While in the field, all deer hunters are required to have in their possession a valid 1962 Nevada hunting license and deer tags. A resident may hunt anywhere in the state on his regular season tag but must use his antlerless tag, if he has one, only in the area for which it was issued. Nonresidents must hunt within the area for which their regular season tag was issued.

The regular season tag is good for one deer, bucks only or either sex, depending on area, and as specified in the 1962 big game seasons and regulations booklet as published by the Nevada Fish and Game Commission. The antlerless tag is good for one antlerless deer in the area for which the tag was issued. Bucks only means deer with at least one forked antler or better. Antlerless means any doe, fawn, or spike buck.

Hunters should remember that the deer tag should be punched immediately after killing the deer in the proper spaces as designated on the tag. The tag need not be attached to the deer until the hunter has reached car or camp, whichever he gets to first.

Rifles to be used in deer hunting must deliver 1,000 foot pounds of retained energy at 100 yards, according to state law. This rules out all .22 caliber rimfires, .218 Bee, .219 Zipper, .22 Hornet, .22 Savage, .25-20, .25-35, .32-20, .32 Winchester self-loading, .32-40, .35 Winchester self-loading, .357 Winchester self-loading, .38-40, and .44-40. Also eliminated would be the .30 Caliber World War II issue carbine, M-1. (This is not to be confused with the Garand which is legal).

Ballistics are determined from factory ammunition loads. No pistols, shotguns, or revolvers can be used in hunting deer nor can any fully automatic rifle. Full steel-jacketed or tracer bullets are also illegal.

It is unlawful for any person to hunt or attempt to kill or capture any game animal by the use of any type of artificial light including flashlights. Shooting hours are from sunrise to sunset, Pacific Standard Time or daylight saving time, whichever time may be in effect in the state during the time the hunter is out in the field.

Dogs should be left home because they cannot be used to hunt deer in Nevada. The exception to this is the trailing of a wounded deer. Dogs, other than hounds, may be used in such cases provided the hunter has written permission from the county game management board in the county in which he is hunting.

Leaving all or parts of deer in the field or throwing away meat or allowing it to spoil constitutes wanton waste and is a misdemeanor. Also, it shall be unlawful to clean, skin, or butcher any big game animal in such a manner that the species and/or sex cannot be readily determined. Such evidence of species or sex, which may consist of the hide, head, horns, or antlers of the animal, shall be retained in possession in the field, during transportation, and until such time as the animal is prepared for processing, storage, or consumption.

**HUNT SAFELY; BRING HUNTERS BACK ALIVE**

"Hunt safely," these words during the past few years have almost become synonymous with the words opening of the deer season. Each year campaigns are conducted in every state of the union to get this simple message across, but each year hunters carelessly take the lives of themselves or others during the process of going after deer.

There are many rules to observe by hunters which, if followed, will make them safer hunters. Among these are alcohol and gunpowder don't mix, don't carry a loaded gun in a car or leave one loaded in camp, make sure of your target and back-stop, watch where you point that muzzle in carrying a gun, never cross ditches, fences or other obstructions with a loaded gun, always treat any gun with the respect due a loaded one.

These rules, however, are not worth much if the individual hunter does not assume a responsibility in which he takes the rules to heart and practices them. The most important thing that can be said is that a deer rifle, with a soft nose bullet, is designed for killing. Hunters must realize just how superbly it does the job. There is no half way with a big game rifle.

Describing his own debut in the Nevada political scene this year when he filed as a team with the late Rex Bell, who was seeking the governorship, Laxalt said the 1962 campaign in Nevada had been marked by tragedy and drama from the beginning.

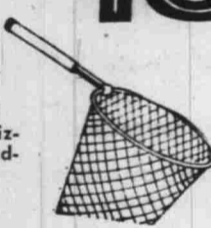

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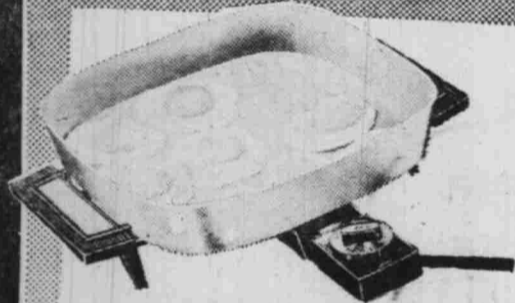

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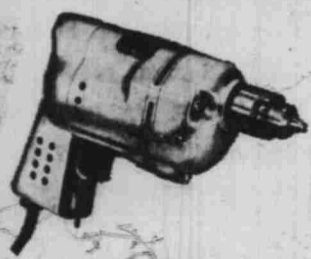

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**STATE AID TO EDUCATION  
HIGHEST IN HISTORY — SAWYER**

State aid to education has arisen to the highest point in the history of Nevada during his administration, Governor Grant Sawyer said here today.

He added that this increase has been a "key factor in Nevadas being able to boast one of the finest public school systems in the United States."

Sawyer backed his statement with statistics from the State Department of Education, which last week announced a 14.5 percent increase in statewide enrollment this fall.

"In spite of the tremendous pressures, this kind of physical growth brings," Governor Sawyer said, "Nevada has not had to lower teaching levels by taking teachers with less than standard certificates simply to fill positions. We are one of only four states in the nation in this advantageous position."

The Governor stressed that this is partly due to high salaries which attract good teachers. Nevadas average public school teacher salary runs well above the national average — \$5,900 per year as compared with a U.S. average of \$5,527.

"The Legislatures have agreed with the results I have made at each session for increased aid to education. Operating appropriations for public schools in the state have risen 67 percent in the past three years. In 1958 they were running at \$10,868,232 a year, whereas now they are at \$18,136,988.

Sawyer said that he has also asked for boosts in both operating appropriations and capital improvement funds for the University of Nevada.

"Recognizing the importance of improving our State's only institution of higher learning, our Lawmakers have gone along with this administrations requests to the extent of raising the University's operating budget 103 per cent over what it was running in 1958.

"In the same period, they have appropriated \$10,240,321 for capital improvements. That is an increase of 401 per cent over the amount appropriated for this purpose for the 1955-58 period.

"Some of the 'catch-up' money" the Governor continued. "For years the University was financially deprived in both operational funds and capital improvement outlay.

"About \$2,383,000 of the capital improvement money has gone into the plant development of Nevada Southern. Just in these few years it has sprouted from little more than a vague idea into a flourishing and vital part of the University, the budget for Nevada Southern operations alone has gone up 26.6 per cent in one year."

As for the total University's operating budget, the Governor pointed out that even though this has not grown at a much greater rate than enrollment, the increased appropriations "Have already resulted in a 30 per cent increase in faculty salaries since 1958, and have permitted the addition of 311 new positions of faculty, staff and graduate assistants.

"This, in turn, has meant higher scholastic standard, the University now offers an honors course, a number of PHD programs, and has tightened standards for admission and retention."

**State Hopes  
To Eradicate  
Old Killer TB**

If Nevada can keep after tuberculosis with no hold barred, the old killer can be completely subdued, says Dr. Horace R. Getz, director of the division of tuberculosis control, state department of health.

The pattern of Nevada's gradual control of what once was considered an unconquerable disease is impressive. Five decades ago tuberculosis was the state's leading death cause, yet in the five years ending with 1944 the annual tuberculosis death total was 69. For the five years ending with 1949 the annual average was 56 deaths, and for the five years ending 1954 the yearly tuberculosis death toll for Nevada averaged an encouraging 30.

For the five years ending with 1959 Nevada scored again with an annual tuberculosis toll of 22.4 deaths, while in 1960 deaths from this cause were limited to 11, and in 1961 to a toll of 12, the statistics reveal.

"We have many factors to thank for this progress," said

Dr. Getz, "and chief among them are improved methods of treatment and increased public support. Mass screening brings unsuspected cases to light at an early stage, permitting early treatment to effect arrest and cure of this sly disease, and if we can now redouble our efforts we can eradicate tuberculosis among our people."

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## Thunderbird Will Build \$6 Million Skyscraper

The Thunderbird Hotel, fastly becoming one of Las Vegas' most popular resorts, today announced plans for a \$6 million construction and modernization program, including the building of a 16-story skyscraper.

Announcement of the major program was made by Joe Wells, president of the resort, who also holds extensive interests in Henderson.

"The recent purchase of \$2,520,000 in stock owned by the Marion Hicks estate by Bonanza Hotel, Inc. has opened the way for the big expansion," explained Wells, who also is president of the hotel organization. The T-Bird executive said the \$2,520,000 in stock has been retired by Bonanza Hotel, Inc.

The Hicks estate has retained its interest in the Algiers Hotel Mrs. Lillian Hicks has been named president of the Algiers.

When the modernization program is completed the re-

sort will feature 1,100 rooms, new swimming pool, several new restaurants including a replica of Max Asnas' famous Stage Delicatessen and Restaurant, a quarter horse track, two more huge convention rooms and modernization of present rooms.

First major phase of the program will begin about Nov. 1 when construction will begin on a \$1 million four-story addition designed similar to the present Bel Air section. The addition, to be completed about next April 15, will add 216 rooms to the hotel's present 534, including 88 rooms at Thunderbird West on the El Rancho grounds.

Present plans call for construction of a \$4 million 16-story - skyscraper, featuring 350 rooms, in 1964 with the structure to go up in the present swimming pool area. A larger, plush pool will be built near the Bel Air section. Featured in the 16-story ad-

dition will be convention facilities, shops and two more restaurants.

A two-story building, already on the hotel's grounds, will be converted into a convention hall capable of handling large gatherings not using Clark County Convention Center facilities.

Construction started yesterday on "Big Joe's Oyster Bar," located in the hotel proper. Similar to the famous oyster bar in New York's Grand Central Station, the T-Bird's Oyster bar will feature oyster and clam stew and oysters and clams in the half shell. Seafood will be flown here from various parts of the nation, depending on the season. Served over the bar in the special room will be bottle beer from throughout the world. The room's un-

usual decor will resemble the interior of a ship.

The replica of Max Asnas' Stage Delicatessen and Restaurant will be located in the hotel's Pow-Wow room. Similar to the New York restaurant, the Thunderbird's Stage Door Delicatessen will operate from 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. and serve as an after-hour meeting place for Strip and Downtown stars, Las Vegas and visitors. The same type of foods featured at New York's Stage will be flown to the T-Bird direct from New York. Handling the distribution to Las Vegas will be all of Asnas' sources of supply.

Another big phase in the construction program will be the modernization of the Thunderbird Theatre stage in preparation for Monte Proser's presentation of "South Pacific" scheduled to open on Dec. 20.

Also being built on the hotel grounds is a quarter horse track and show arena. The track's first major event is scheduled Nov. 10-12 when the hotel hosts finals in the National Cutting Horse Assn. Championships.

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### NINE MILLIONTH VISITOR

BOULDER CITY, Nev.—The nine millionth visitor to take the guided tour of Hoover Dam since conducted trips through this pioneer Reclamation multi-purpose project were inaugurated in 1937 will be recorded the latter part of this week, Regional Director A.B. West of the Bureau of Reclamation's Region 3 announced today.

Boulder Canyon Project Manager L.J. Hudlow, who supervises Hoover Dam for the Bureau of Reclamation, will greet the nine millionth visitor at the Nevada elevator atop the 726-foot-high concrete dam and personally conduct him or her on a special tour of the world-famous structure.

State and local officials will commemorate the nine-millionth-visitor milestone in a brief ceremony atop the dam which will be reported to the Nation in the press and on television and radio. Director West said visitors to Hoover Dam represent every state in the Nation and a multitude of foreign countries.

"The Bureau of Reclamation has built a dam in the wilderness of the Colorado

River and the world has beaten a path to it," he said.

At the end of the first 9 months of 1962, 8,983,563 persons had toured Hoover Dam since tours were inaugurated January 1, 1927. With 420,338 persons having toured the dam during the first 9 months, 1962 promises to be a record year—exceeding the previous high of 472,639 set in 1959. At the present rate, the total number of persons taking the tour this year will exceed the half million mark for the first time. A total of 463,592 persons took the tour in 1961.

The Lake Mead National Recreation Area, encompassing Hoover and Davis Dams and their reservoirs, is second only to the Blue Ridge Parkway in tourist attraction.

The one millionth visitor toured Hoover Dam in 1940 without special observance. With resumption of the guided tours after World War II, each succeeding million mark has been noted.

Miss Maria Krusoff, Oak Park, Illinois, toured Hoover Dam on September 29, 1946, as the two millionth visitor; others included Mrs. K. E. Jung, Newport, Rhode Island, on May 25, 1949, three millionth; Mrs. William C. Carr, Los Angeles, California, on October 16, 1951, four millionth; Mrs. Henry Victor, Santa Rosa, California, on April 2, 1954, five millionth; Miss Clara Hoffman, Bell, California, on June 30, 1956, six millionth; Leonard Goff, Morrill, Nebraska, on August 7, 1958, seven millionth; and Wayne R. Hawke, Albany, Oregon, on September 13, 1960, eight millionth.

Hoover Dam was selected by the American Society of Civil Engineers as one of this Nation's seven modern civil engineering wonders.

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
