## Public Hearing Set On Rendering Plant Permit

H Page 1. 3-36-2 Public hearing

A public hearing has been set by the City Planning Commission for November 21, at 8 p.m. at City Hall on a use permit requested by Jack M. Brown for the operation of a "chicken feed plant" on Gibson Road, between Sunset Road and Frontier Highway, in the industrial park area.

Inquiries by the HOME NEWS turned up the information that this is the Rendering Plant which formerly tried to locate near the Steam Plant just outside East Las Vegas, using "a more acceptable name."

George Perkins, Director of Public Works and Planning

Director, explained that anyone who did not make application for the establishing of any type operation; which does not necessarily mean that the Planning Commission will look with favor of the granting of a use permit.

Perkins further explained that although a public hearing is not mandatory when a use permit is requested in an M-2 industrial zone, he felt that in this instance a hearing should be held to allow residents in adjacent areas to express their opinions and make protests, should they desire to do so.

In requesting the use permit, Brown told Mr. Perkins

that there would be no odor from this plant as he would use air pollution devices and an "after burner" which would burn up the fumes.

He did not cite any cases of other rendering plants which had used such devices and burners successfully.

The plant would reportedly be located about a half mile off Sunset Road, on Gibson Road.

All interested persons are welcome to attend the hearing which is being held one day earlier than the regular date for meetings of the Planning Commission, on Thanksgiving eve.

Dr. Paul Marshall gave the invocation and background notes on the construction of the Girl Scout House were recapped by Jim Gunville, who in his term as Rotary President.

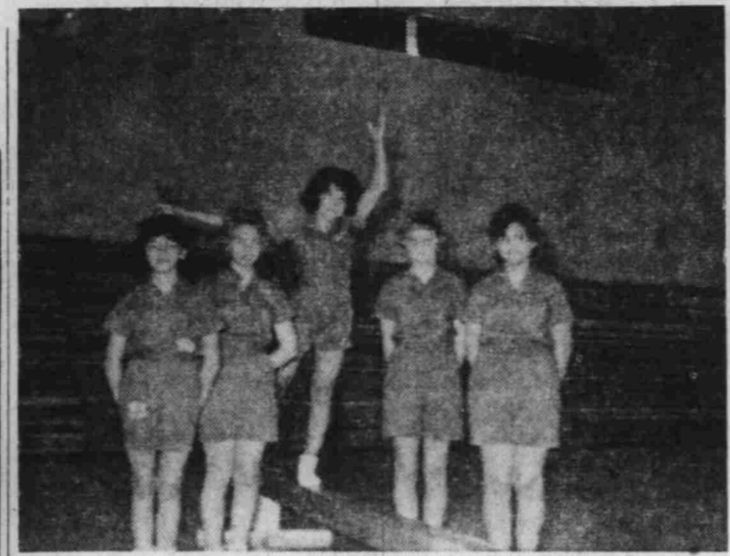

Speaking at a recent meeting, Mr. Schroeder of the FBI spent two hours discussing various aspects of his occupation. In sharp contrast to the traditional concept that FBI agents are colorless, unremarkable in appearance, and easily forgotten, this speaker towered over his audience like a larger-than-life guardian of the people.

Today, to become an agent, the speaker said, an applicant must have a degree in accounting or law. An undisclosed number of the nation's 6,000 agents are in Las Vegas; however, there are not more in Las Vegas than in Chicago, as was recently reported.

About 95 percent of the FBI's work in Southern Nevada is criminal investigation; the remaining five percent deals with special services to police, laboratories and the like. Of the cases prepared by the FBI, 98 percent of those taken into court end in prosecution.

The work of the FBI is investigative, said Schroeder. They make no attempt to evaluate or pass judgment.

To help eliminate overcrowding, the FBI files are purged when the investigated individuals have reached the age of 80, Schroeder said, as they are assumed generally harmless after that age.

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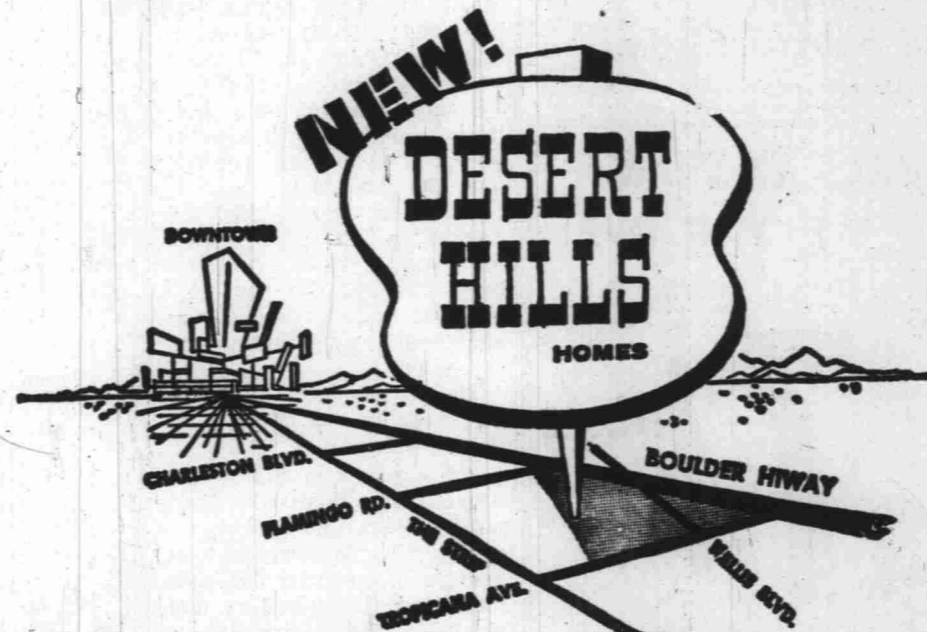

## Co-op Power Lines From Here To Amargosa Valley Urged

With critical rights-of-way negotiations underway between the city of Henderson and the Amargosa Valley Co-operative rural electrification project, the coop manager yesterday cited the vital need of the power project to the national space engine development project at Jackass Flats.

Philip Parker, manager of the \$3,940,000 Rural Electrification Administration sponsored project, said easements are being sought this week in the Henderson area to provide rights of way for 138,000 volts transmission lines to carry power to Pahrump and Amargosa Valleys and the Jackass Flats area.

The Atomic Energy Commission is a major member of the cooperative and has contracted for a minimum of 10,000 kilowatts of power at the vital rocket engine testing center beginning Jan. 1.

The amount of power to be provided the AEC can be increased by negotiations between the coop and the federal agency to meet further needs of the space project, Parker said.

Transmission and distribution lines are being installed to carry heavier loads which might be sought both by the AEC and the agricultural areas to be served in the Amargosa and Pahrump areas.

The project calls for the coop to install transmission lines to carry the 138,000 volts from Henderson to the areas to be powered by the coop.

Although both California

Edison and Nevada Power companies are contesting the legal rights of the coop to construct the lines and to serve the areas in dispute, Parker said the coop is continuing its construction program pending legal rulings.

Distribution lines are near completion in both the Amargosa and Pahrump areas and a new contract awarded recently provides for the \$1,202,170 transmission lines.

Hi-Voltage Co. of Cleveland last week was the winner of a \$140,000 contract for materials for two substations and a switch station last week and the final contract which will complete the system in the Nevada portion of the project — the construction of the substations — is slated to be awarded Nov. 15, Parker said.

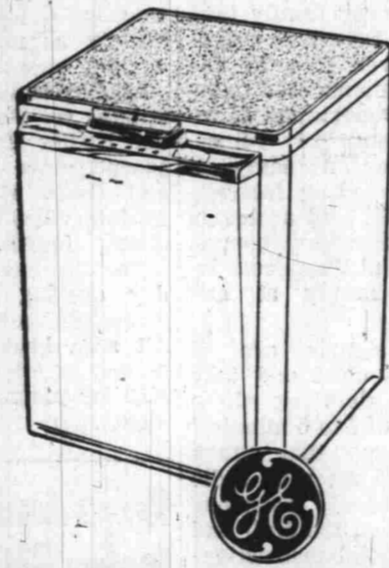

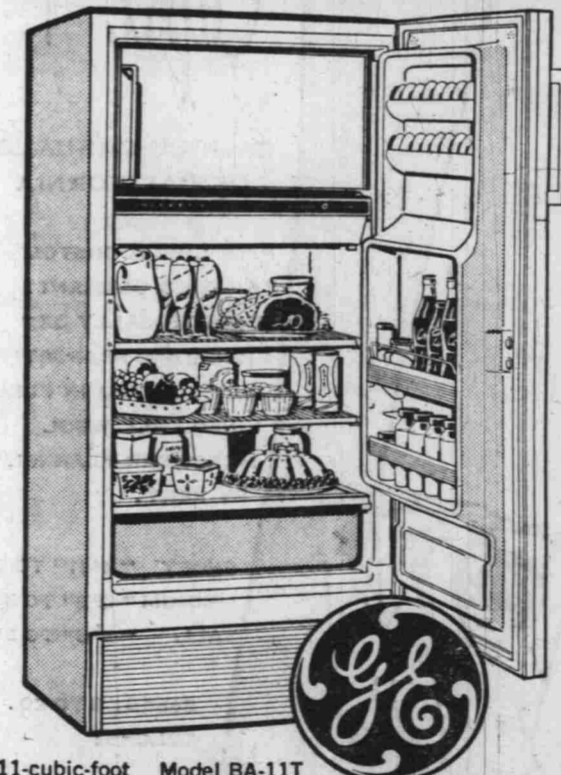


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### Here's The Real-Down On What To Do In Case Of War! Information Direct From Civil Defense Office

Things you should do prior to an emergency:  
You should have a two-week supply of food and wa-

ter on hand for emergency use. Probably you have a partial supply of food in your refrigerator and cupboards.

You should add a stock of canned and dried foods that can be eaten without cooking, such as soups and juices, fish, milk, and meat. Avoid foods that would increase thirst. Store this emergency food in your evacuation kit or near the family shelter. A well-balanced emergency supply of food:

- Fruits and juices
  - Vegetables
  - Soups
  - Milk
  - Instantaneous Drinks
  - Canned meat and fish
  - Baby food
  - Raisins and chocolate
  - Packaged cereals and dried foods
  - Seven gallons water per person
  - 10,000 Calories per person for two weeks is sufficient.
- Other needed supplies which should be in or near your sheltered area include blankets, warm clothes for cold weather, pliers or a wrench, heavy gloves, paper cups and plates, eating utensils, extra bulbs and batteries for your flashlight and portable radio, a supply of old newspapers, toilet tissue, sanitary napkins, invalid supplies if you have illness in the house, and disposable diapers if you have a baby. Also provide escape tools such as a pick, shovel, crowbar, or ax.

You also should have available spare washcloths, towels, soap, matches, a can opener, one or more cooking utensils, a small compact cooking unit, a small covered pail or can for human waste, and a supply of paper sacks for making soil bags. You should have a first aid kit.

Be sure that you know the school emergency plan in effect. Check with the principal of the school that your children attend for information about this important part of civil defense operation.

To learn more about saving lives, have at least one member of your family take a complete first aid course of the kind given free by the American National Red Cross or the U.S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Mines. Don't wait for an enemy attack before getting interested in first aid. Bad accidents and local disasters happen every day, and they could involve your family at any time.

Warning signals are of two kinds -- alert and take cover. The alert signal, a steady blast of 3 to 5 minutes' duration, means that attack is probable. Turn your radio to the conelrad frequency (640 or 1240) on the dial and listen for official instructions and information. Follow the instructions promptly. Do not use the telephone.

The take cover signal, a wailing tone or a series of short blasts of 3 minutes' duration, means that attack is

imminent and you must take the best available shelter immediately, regardless of whether you are in a target or nontarget area.

Things to do during and after an alert:  
In the event of an a.e., remain in or return to your home. If you do not have a prepared shelter, nail blankets or other covering over your windows and doors to keep out the radioactive dust. After an attack, remain in your home or shelter, be sure to keep house closed tight. Keep your blankets or heavy coverings over doors or windows. If exposed in the open after the explosion, change clothing and wash thoroughly all over including the hair. Keep your radio tuned to 640 or 1240 for further instructions. Don't leave your sheltered area until you receive instructions to do so over conelrad (640 or 1240 on your radio). Contamination by fallout is possible without visible evidence of moisture or dust.

Turn off or disconnect all heating appliances, including toasters, irons, gas stoves, or hot plates which might cause fires if upset. Close all doors on your coal burning furnace or wood burning stove if in use, shut off feed line valve from oil tank. Turn off the blower motor of oil burner, smother open fire in fireplace with sand, and close chimney damper.

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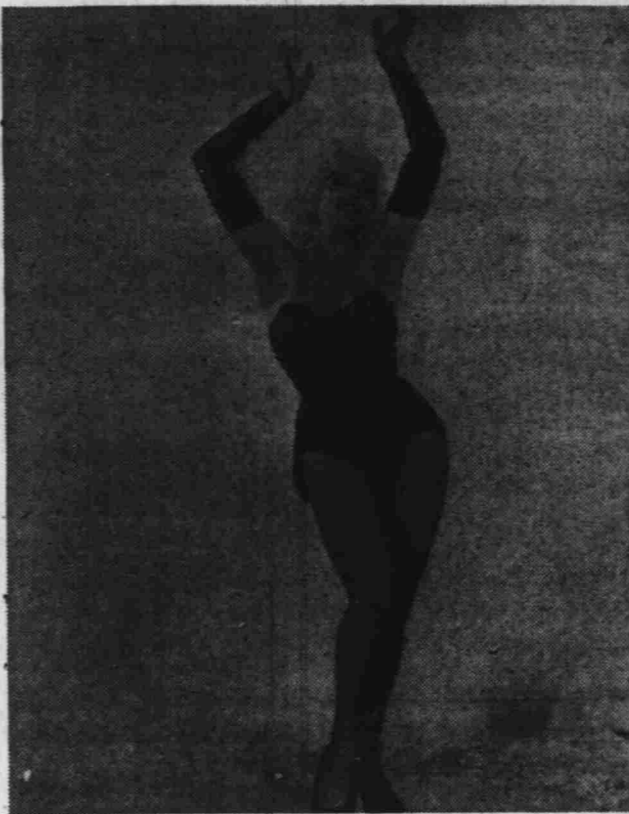

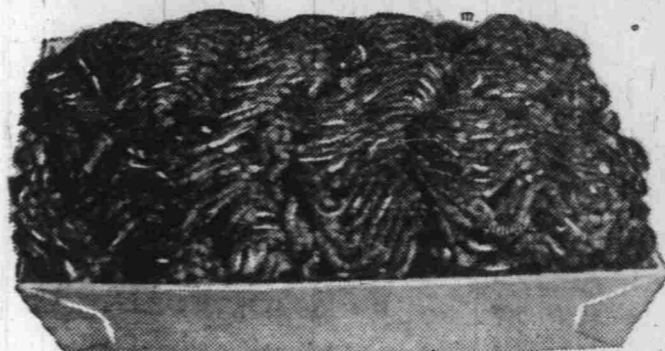

### Two Colorado River Areas Sought For Recreation

NEEDLES — San Bernardino County officials have asked the federal government to set aside two areas along the Colorado River for future recreational development under a county management plan.

The request was made at a meeting of the Lower Colorado River Land Use Committee in Yuma, Ariz.

One area is a six-mile strip extending south from a point two miles south of this city. Known as the Topock Swamp Recreation Area, it would be used for a wide variety of recreation under the proposal, including water skiing, fishing, boating, hunting, camping and picnicking. In the area is Park Moabi, a county marina development.

The other area, on the west shore of Lake Havasu, covers present and future recreational facilities.

County officials said they will back any proposal by the committee to transfer federal administration of these lands from the Fish and Wildlife Service to the Bureau of Reclamation.

Such a move would enable the county to arrange longer leases on the lands it administers, thus easing the long-range financing problem facing those who sublease land from the county.

The county's proposal will be considered when the Department of Interior makes a decision on land use in the former squatter land along the river.

### Get Outdoor Air Indoors As Health Aid

For the next five months the problems of good ventilation and added moisture should be given full heed in every Nevada home and every place of work, the state department of health cautions.

Indoor heat is on again, and with it are two dangers—carbon monoxide and lack of humidity, says W. Wallace White, director of the department's bureau of environmental health.

Carbon monoxide is a poisonous byproduct of fuel combustion which must not be allowed to accumulate indoors or in closed vehicles, he points out.

"Regardless of winter temperatures, ample outdoor air is an indoor must," White emphasizes. "Modern construction methods tend to create buildings that are virtually airtight when closed, increasing the carbon monoxide hazard."

To meet need of indoor moisture, a broad pan of water or the traditional teakettle steaming away during the winter months will serve the purpose very well, keeping the delicate nasal mucous membrane of people and their pets properly moistened for prevention of colds, he cites.

### "South Pacific" Premier To Benefit Girls School

The home of the Good Shepherd Auxiliary, Inc. will launch its campaign to raise \$100,000 for the construction of a permanent St. Ives School for Girls on Dec. 20, in conjunction with the premiere performance of the all-time great Broadway show, "South Pacific," at the Thunderbird Hotel.

Mrs. Rubin Lockitch, president of the auxiliary, announced today that the "South Pacific" benefit will be the first step toward reaching the \$100,000 goal.

Benefit tickets will soon be available at \$25 each and will be distributed by auxiliary members.

General chairman of the benefit is Mrs. Glenn Tueller. Persons interested in the early purchase of tickets are advised to contact Mrs. Hicks by telephoning DU 4-1424.

In outlining the auxiliary's project, Mrs. Lockitch explained that temporary quarters of the St. Ives School for Girls, located at 451 Twain Ave., were dedicated on Sept. 23, by the Most Rev. Robert J. Dwyer, D.D. Ph.D. bishop of Reno, and Gov. Grant Sawyer.

Due to the location of the property the Clark County Planning Board and Commission gave permission for a "zone exception" for only two years, making it necessary to have a permanent school completed at the end of that period.

The permanent home will be constructed near Tule Springs on land donated by Mrs. Marie Lawton, a pioneer resident Mrs. Lawton was the first to propose that a branch of the Home of the Good Shepherd be founded in Las Vegas to aid girls. The sale of a parcel of her property allowed for the purchase of the present temporary quarters, now under the direction of Mother Mary de Lourdes, Superior, and a staff of four other Sisters of the Good Shepherd.

The Home of the Good Shepherd accepts girls between 12 and 18 years of age, when properly referred

and fitting the category of "not requiring restraint." All races and religious backgrounds are accepted.

Establishment of a branch in Las Vegas has been hailed by judges, welfare workers and volunteer social service groups as being one of the most progressive steps taken in this area in many years.

The success of the Pelletier Training School for Girls, conducted by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd in Los Angeles since 1904, is widely known here. Its purpose has been to rehabilitate young girls who have made some social or moral mistakes or to protect those who have been in a dangerous environment. Placements are arranged by the juvenile court, established social service agencies or through parents.

With the establishment of the St. Ives School for Girls here, Las Vegas joins more than 400 such schools operated by the Sisters of the Good Shepherd throughout the world with 60 located in the U.S.

### Cannon Tells World Congress Of 'Real Nevada Attractions'

A higher level of personal freedom, the right of choice and the good sense not to abuse freedom and privilege are the real attractions of Nevada — Senator Howard W. Cannon told the World Travel Congress in Las Vegas.

The Nevada Senator, an original sponsor of legislation which created the new U.S. Travel office, urged assembled travel agents from throughout the world to "look beyond the glittering neon lights, the glamour and physical wonders of Nevada", for an appreciation of the unparalleled freedom and responsibility that is enjoyed by adult citizens of the state.

He said the "secret weapon" which has made Nevada a success is the moderation, dignity, individuality and dedication to preserve personal freedom which motivates Nevadans.

Cannon also told delegates that the U.S. was dangerously late in getting started in the business of being "good hosts" and making travel available to large numbers of people. He urged speed in developing travel because of increasing world tensions and new barriers to better world understanding.

Military security, Cannon added, is no substitute for person-to-person contact between nations and he urged conventioners from many countries to work toward "opening the gates of every land to unrestricted travel".

The senator stressed the value of such innovations in tourism as package tours, charter flights, and praised recent reductions in travel tax authorized by the Congress.


"In being good travelers and good hosts we will be taking giant steps toward making this challenging and struggling world a better place in which to live", he said.

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## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

September 15, 1962  
Dear Dolores & Morty:

The Walkers have migrated again -- this time to Long Island, New York. Now that we are finally settled in our new way of life, I have time to bring you up-to-date on the move from Alaska.

We left Wasilla around 7:00 A.M., Monday, July 23rd. Not as early as we had planned. A long day and late evening on Sunday, which we much appreciated with all of our friends, caused us to oversleep a little. Had breakfast in Palmer and then set out. Bill and I in one car and Jon and kids in the Volks bus. Both cars were loaded down and our speed averaged between 25-30 miles per hour. We arrived at the Alaska-Canada border about 1:00 A.M. and parked off the road for a few hours rest.

The next day's driving ended at Marsh Lake for a good night's sleep in a motel. Wednesday night found us sleeping in the cars again for a few hours at Coal River. Thursday we started our early rising drive and while passing through Fort Nelson, the Pontiac developed transmission trouble. We limped on into Dawson Creek, 300 miles in low gear (only forward gear working) at 25 miles per hour

and arrived around 7:00 A.M., Friday morning.

There we stayed for the next six days waiting for a small piece of transmission (which Pontiac has now redesigned) to be flown in from Detroit. We also had to have the Volkswagen overhauled (redo what Sunset Motors supposedly fixed before we left.) Our stay there was rather costly to say the least.

We enjoyed the trip and the scenery on the Alaska Highway but were not impressed with the terrible dust. Also, I was getting just a little unhappy with all the mountainous terrain. Left Dawson Creek early Thursday, August 2nd, driving to Red Deer, Alberta, Canada, where we had lovely accommodations & a good rest. Friday, we drove through to Havre, Montana.

Weather was good, but quite warm. Saturday we drove to Dickinson, North Dakota with another good rest in a very nice motel. Sunday saw us through Minneapolis -- St. Paul and sleeping in the car just across the Wisconsin State line. Monday evening found us in Elgin, Illinois for the night and a comfortable rest, enjoying some T.V. programs and wonderful beds. Tuesday we set out bright and early and drove through to

Bethesda, Maryland, arriving at Bill's folks about 1:00 A.M.

I was never so happy to be anywhere as I was to sit in a soft chair and enjoy a long, tall drink.

Truthfully, I think we all enjoyed our trip and driving, even with all the dust, breakdowns and sleeping in cars. We tried to take a stretch stop about every two hours and of course we had to stop occasionally and walk the dog and cat. This did slow us down a little, however, I think we made very good time even so. I enjoyed the scenery in some states more than others, especially, I think, in Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio. The Turnpikes and Toll Roads are wonderful, only Pennsylvania leaves something to be desired. That particular Turnpike is miserable.

We rested and had a chance to become reacquainted with Bill's sister, mother and brother -- in law for several days (Bill caught up on his rest and sleep) before taking off on the last portion of our trip. Bill and I left on Friday morning, August 10th, and drove to Long Island where we found a motel and Bill reported into his office. He now works for the Long Island State Park Commission which has beautiful headquarters located in Belmont Lake State Park, right on the lake. The grounds are beautifully kept and there are wonderful old trees everywhere.

During the two weeks we spent in a motel while house hunting, we had an opportunity to attend a swimming, cocktail and buffet meeting held by the Long Island State Park Commission, entertaining the rest of the New York State Park Commissions. We had a most enjoyable evening and were very pleased to me had a most enjoyable evening Mr. Robert Moses, who had just come in from swimming. Along with running the New York World's Fair, he is also President of the Long Island State Park Commission. What an amazing personality; looks far younger than his years and has a most powerful voice. This meeting was held at Jones Beach. You would have to see this beach to believe it! With all the millions of people who use, and have used the beach, there isn't a speck of litter anywhere. Not only is the beach patrolled constantly by pick-up crews, but the public has been well trained over the years to keep the beaches clean.

We found a home for us and moved in on the 22nd. Bill drove back to Bethesda the following Saturday with a friend from his office and picked up the kids and the Bus. Poor Jon -- has his Alaska drivers license but can't drive in New York until 18, so after driving 4700 miles, he

couldn't finish off the remaining 300 miles here.

Our house is quite old, on a very lovely residential street in Bay Shore, about 35 miles from Manhattan. It has four very large bedrooms and bath and a half upstairs, living room, dining room, library, half bath downstairs. There is a glassed in screen porch across the front and along one side of the house. It's completely furnished in what could be called partial over-stuffed -- antique. The lot is very large, giving us a nice front yard and a huge back yard. Plenty of trees, shrubs and flowers, including cherry trees. We are about a block from the beach, fishing docks and marina and three blocks from the downtown area of Bay Shore. There are a number of shopping centers all around. Leading stores of New York are well represented in the Centers, such as Gimbel's, Macys, Abraham & Strauss and Sears Roebuck. The supermarkets are plentiful and the prices are wonderfully low. Fresh fruits and vegetables are a pleasure. Living costs should run quite low. Forgot to say that the rental on our house is \$125 per month. After Alaska, that's almost a gift!

The kids have started school

and the bus stops around the block from us. Both Jr. High and Sr. High Schools are a little over a mile away. They had no difficulty with their grade placement and will be carrying quite a subject load this year. All of them have five solids.

We have taken several drives around various sections of the Island since we arrived and it's very lovely. The price of houses is wonderfully low in comparison with Alaskan prices.

Bill is most happy with his position and is very busy. He now has a State car to drive, leaving us with both cars here at home. He leaves home every morning about 8:15 A.M., with a 15 minute drive to work and is home in the evening about 5:30 P.M. What a change from the homestead hours of 5:30 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. He's beginning to look and feel much better and what an improvement in his disposition.

Made our first purchases recently of furnishings. Portable T.V., Vacuum Cleaner and Stereo Record Player. Decided to wait awhile for Freezer, Washer and Dryer, until we know where we will be permanently.

I believe that I can truthfully say the Walkers are all

blast and heat for the simple reason that it covers an area many times larger than that affected by blast and heat. Protective measures against the hazards of fallout are much simpler and more effective than those against blast and heat. All that is needed is material between you and the radioactive dust.

Furthermore, except in the immediate vicinity of the explosion, a matter of one to seven hours will elapse before

the radioactive dust descends, depending on the wind and the distance from the explosion.

The Clark County Civil Defense Agency has available at 320 North 2nd Street, Las Vegas, additional information on many aspects of civil defense, such as shelter designs, for the home, fallout manuals, first aid and food supplies lists, etc. These are available free on request at City Hall.

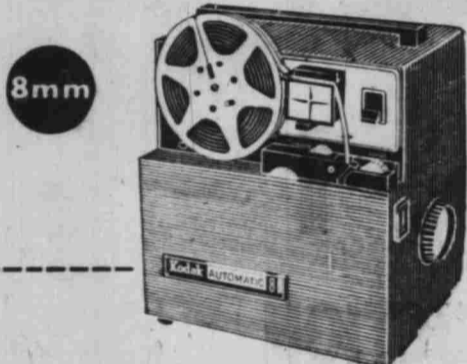

## THE "LOW GRADE" BONANZA

# City Starts Crack-Down On Dump Law Violations

The company which took over the crane and rigging operation is now located on Frontier Highway, behind a redwood fence designed to match the fence at the neighboring lumber yard. All that was required in Pittman was cedar posts and hog wire, as shown here.

The HOME NEWS recently received a unique communication from City Sanitarian Dr. E. R. Lindblom complete with the above headline stating that illegal dumping of assorted junk has reached such alarming proportions that an all-out campaign to stop it would begin immediately.

Violators, according to the communication, will face a maximum fine of \$299 and in addition city equipment and crews will be used to clean up these areas.

It was further stated that no more junk is to be dumped on the strip running parallel to Pabco Road in Pittman, which now gets more than the city dump. Six trucks, the message said, recently dumped discarded junk in Pittman. Also cited as an illegal dumping ground was the area across Vegas Wash Road from Trailer Haven.

Accompanying this communication were two pictures of desert areas, being used for the dumping of trash, which unfortunately are not available for use in the HOME NEWS.

This being the case, we decided to aid the City Sanitarian and any other officials, concerned with promiscuous trash dumping by scouting the area and taking our own pictures.

Pittman being the prime source of violation, we decided to start there and much to our surprise, were able to come up with this series without going out of the residential area.

We suggest the City start its cleanup drive in these pictured areas, though we sincerely doubt that those responsible will ever appear in Judge George Treem's court.

As a benefit to city beautification, we will continue this series next week.

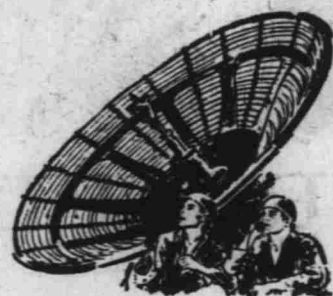
## BABY BOY CAGLE WELL EQUIPPED WITH GRANDPARENTS

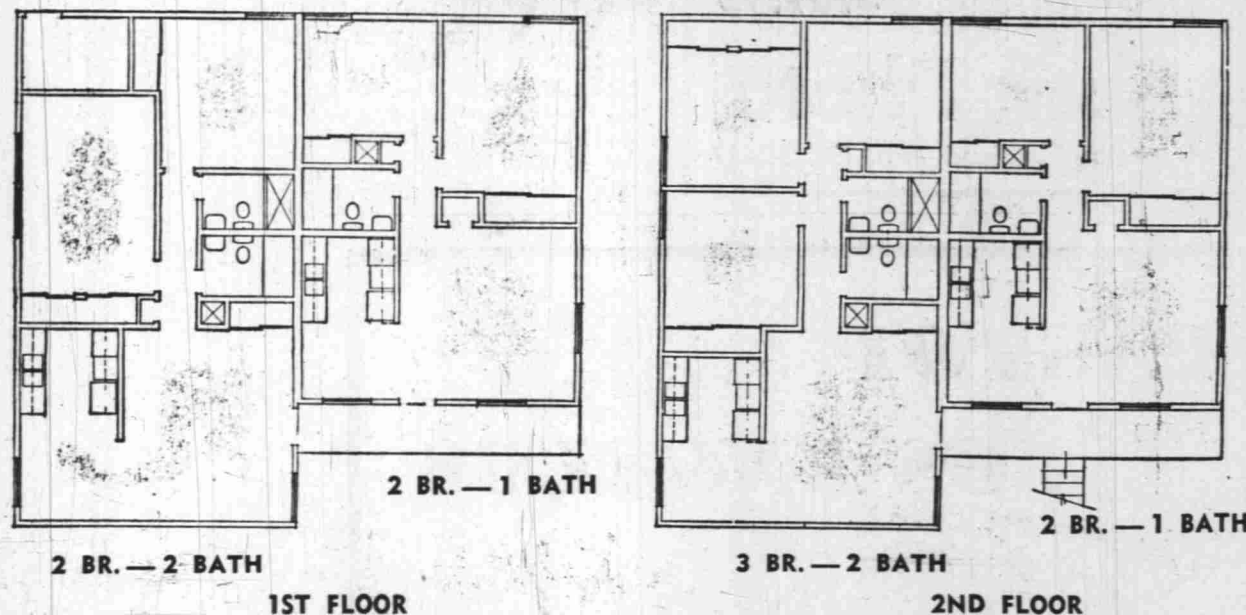
