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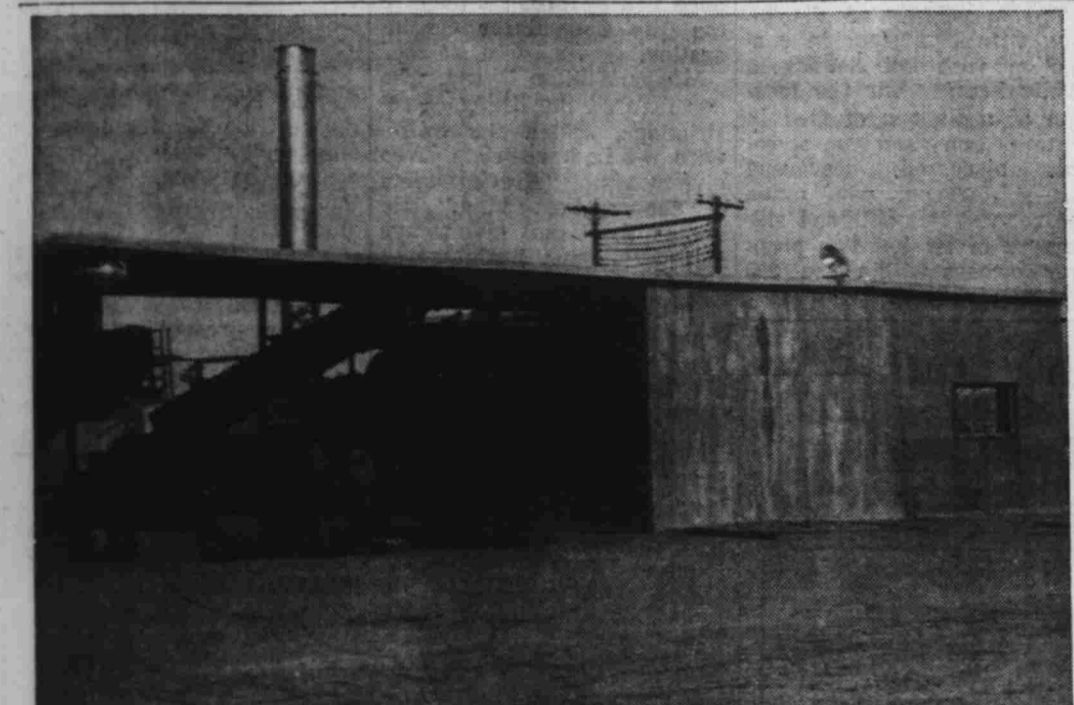

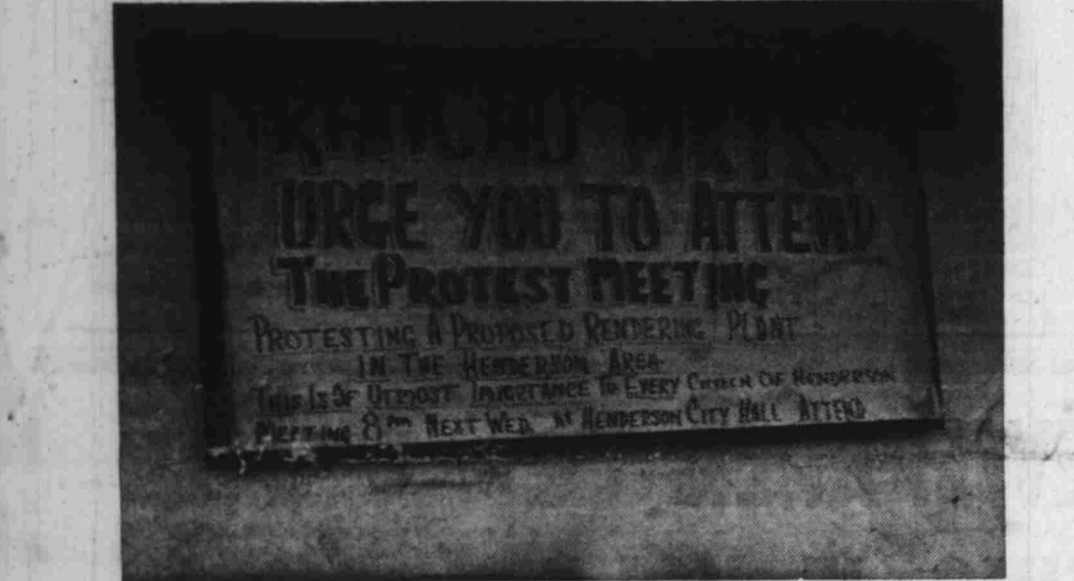

COUNCIL OK'S SALARY RAISES FOR COUNCIL, MAYOR, OTHER STAFF

AT HEARING TOMORROW

Big Crowd Expected To Protest Rendering Plant

Pittman residents are making an all-out attempt to pack the Eagles hall with protesters when a public hearing is held at 8 o'clock tomorrow night, by the City Planning Commission, on a use permit requested for the operation of a rendering plant in the industrial park area just west of Pittman. The hearing will open at 8 p.m.

The public hearing was formerly scheduled for City Hall, but was changed to Eagles hall because of the anticipated attendance.

Telephone calls, circulars and post cards have been used to urge not only the people of Pittman, but those in all sections of the City of Henderson to attend and protest this installation.

Many of the Pittman residents believe that the operation of a rendering plant in this area would succeed in evacuating Pittman if not the entire city.

This same plant, which has assumed the name of a "chicken feed processing plant," was recently denied a permit to operate near the steam plant, because of the violent protests of the people of East Las Vegas. It is also reported that this plant has tried unsuccessfully to locate in other sections of Clark County.

The rendering plant equipment is presently being stored at an old tin building, formerly used by a brick plant, near East Las Vegas.

Although the owner claims that the operation of this plant would create no odor because of the use of an after-burner and other devices, a look at the machinery shows that the jaws of the meat crusher are still filled with the desiccated, but still smelly, remains of the "chicken feed" it was last used in processing.

Several persons who have had personal experiences with rendering plants will be present at the public hearing to add their voices to the protest.

APOLOGIES TO DOC GOULD FOR WRONG-FACTS ADV.

This newspaper wishes to apologize to Dr. Earl Gould of this city for a political advertisement printed during the city political campaign of spring, 1961, in which Gould's position as city health inspector was criticized, and in which facts pertaining to his termination as city recreation director were obviously not factual.

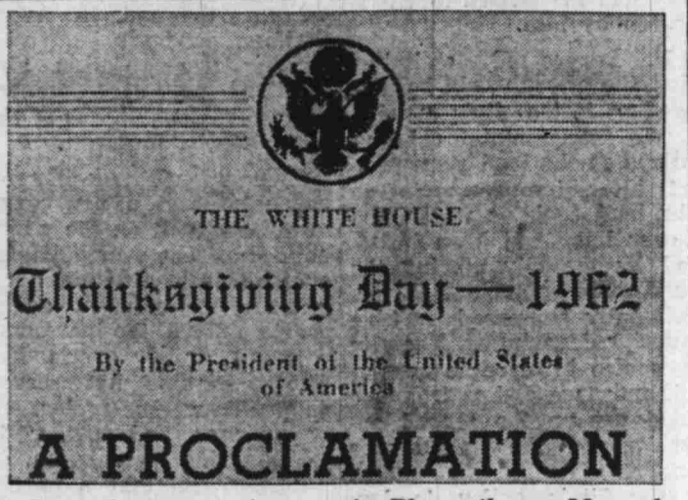

We recognize too that we live in a world of peril and change — and in so uncertain a time we are all the more grateful for the destructible gifts of hope and love, which sustain us in adversity and inspire us to labor unceasingly for a more perfect community within this nation and around the earth.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN F. KENNEDY, President of the United States of America, in accord with the joint resolution of Congress, approved December 26, 1941, which designates the fourth Thursday in November of each year as Thanksgiving Day, do hereby proclaim Thursday, the twenty-second day of November of this year, as a day of national thanksgiving.

I urge that all observe this day with reverence and with humility.

Let us renew the spirit of the Pilgrims at the first Thanksgiving, lonely in an inscrutable wilderness, facing the dark unknown with a faith borne of their dedication to God and a fortitude drawn from their sense that all men were brothers.

Let us renew that spirit by offering our thanks for uncovenanted mercies, beyond our desert or merit, and by resolving to meet the responsibilities placed upon us.

Let us renew that spirit by sharing the abundance of this day with those less fortunate, in our own land and abroad. Let us renew that spirit by seeking always to establish larger communities of brotherhood.

Let us renew that spirit by preparing our souls for the incertitudes ahead — by being always ready to confront crisis with steadfastness and achievement with grace and modesty.

Let us renew that spirit by concerting our energy and our hope with men and women toward the time when Thanksgiving may be a day of universal celebration.

Let us renew that spirit by expressing our acceptance of the limitations of human striving and by affirming our duty to strive nonetheless, as Providence may direct us, toward a better world for all mankind.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this seventh day of November, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-two, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-seventh.

A new salary range for elected city officials and appointive officers was approved by the City Council Monday night and an ordinance setting the new salaries will be drawn by the Mayor for final approval.

The new salary range will give to the Mayor between \$4,000 and \$5,000 and Councilmen between \$2,000 and \$3,000. Other ranges set included the municipal Judge for \$4,000 to \$5,000; city clerk from \$500 to \$625; city attorney from \$5,000 to \$6,000; city treasurer, \$450 to \$600; City Auditor from \$750 to \$1,000

per month. The Police Chief would range from \$725 to \$850.

Councilman Frank Morrell said he felt that the salaries for the Mayor and Council should remain as they are, however, Mayor William Byrne and Councilman Jack Stevens said they felt that it should be increased. The salary for the Council and Mayor will have as its minimum what it now is.

The three City Councilmen who are elected next year will not realize a raise until the next two are elected the following term, and the

amount of raise may be set by the Council then in office.

Councilman Bill Hardy said he felt that men who took time off work to attend the meetings such as Lorin Williams should be compensated, and stated that he did not feel that the new suggested compensation was out of line.

Byrne said he was unimpressed with press reports of former City officials who stated that they felt that the present compensation is adequate. He said that the present compensation was set five years ago and conditions have changed.

City to Foreclose On Hi-way Property

An application for land in section two, bordering on Sunset Road was approved by the City Council last night for Roy Pitchford and Kay Neilsen who plan to erect a feed store there.

A price of \$5,000 was set on the land and stipulation that the construction be started and completed by September of 1964.

The Council was notified by letter that a land application by Richard Gunn had been re-assigned to Ladco Corporation.

Stallworth and Associates, who applied for the purchase of City land on Boulder highway for the construction of a motel, will be notified by the City Attorney that if money for the second note now due is not received by January 15, the city will begin foreclosure proceedings. The firm has paid \$21,000 to the City and wished to apply this amount for the purchase of a portion of the property.

Henderson City officials Monday night adopted a resolution to be forwarded to this city's representatives on the County Commission, protesting a proposed ordinance now before the County Commission making it almost impossible for cities to annex surrounding property.

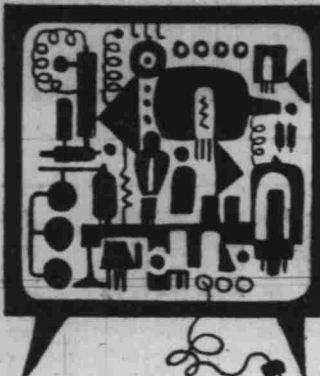

Bible to Help City's Protest On Price Rise

Senator Alan Bible had advised city officials here that this city's protest of changes in land prices within the 7,000 acres purchased by the city will be carried to Washington by him.

He expressed optimism that the prices would be lowered as to the city's request. The City maintains that prices on the land were raised after improvements on the land such as water and sewer lines had been installed by the city making the land more valuable than was originally expressed by the interior department. The city was also involved in removing nuisance claims from the land when the second appraisal on the land was made.

The City's option to buy the government land expires next November.

Civil Defense Taking Hold, Gets Action

A step-up in this city's civil defense program was proposed by Civil Defense Director Harold Corbin Monday night to the City Council, pointing out that since the Cuban scare, Civil Defense Director has turned out to be a full-time job.

Corbin, who is city administrator, told the Council that he could not spend the necessary time on the program, stating that Betty Reynolds, assistant director, has been carrying the ball. He asked that her expenses be paid for her work. Corbin also proposed getting volunteers to head various phases of the civil defense program.

Councilman Frank Morrell suggested that a new engineer be placed on the city payroll to take over duties as civil-defense director and planning commission advisor, to relieve top personnel who are already overloaded. George Perkins has served as public works director, city engineer and advisor to the planning commission. Corbin said that a partial salary for civil defense direc-

tor might come from the Civil Defense authority. Corbin, Perkins and Mayor Bill Byrne will study the proposal and bring it back to the City Council for approval.

A requested authorization to bid on Police cars was deferred until the next meeting on a request by Councilman Frank Morrell to investigate the need.

A request for abandonment of portions of Black Mountain drive and Country Club drive was approved by the Council. The agreement calls for the paving of a 37 foot wide road 660 feet long between Pacific street and Henderson avenue.

The possibility of dispensing with legal fees in connection with not holding a public hearing for the location of a Church of God in Pittman on Evelyn street was discussed. Reverend Ernest Jackson, who made the request has obtained signatures of all but two property owners within the 300 feet requirement.

Gaining Firms To Study Give-a-Ways For Council

A motion to do away with any control of give-aways from local gaming establishments, made by Councilman Wilbur Hardy, died for lack of a second at the City Council meeting Monday night, and the controversial ordinance will be turned over to local gaming establishment owners for study.

Following study by the local businessmen, the ordinance will be brought back to the City Council for consideration. Mayor William Byrne, who has favored the lifting of restrictions, called the ordinance which restricts free give-aways, "discrimination of the rankest kind." He claims that the give-aways help all of the businessmen by bringing people down-

decided the carnival air the town had when free bingo was featured in the various down-town establishments. Stevens said that the gaming establishments should be able to stand on their own feet.

Councilman Pete Mendive objected to the new ordinance giving as his reason that the Council should not have control and asked only that Bingo be played where people under the age of 21 could not participate.

Paul Perry of the Eldorado Club said he signed the petition for the new ordinance releasing Council control, however, he stated that his business does not require free give-aways. He suggested that the control be worked out among the various clubs.

In the present ordinance, each gaming establishment can hold two free give-aways each year, in addition to an opening celebration.

There will be an hour and a half lunch break and adjournment about 3:30 p.m.

Admittance is based on holding some responsible position in a firm, industry or local government having direct

interest in building, planning, design or construction. The second criteria should be willingness to assist local or state civil defense in giving advice or guidance to the public on shelter identification, construction or improvisation.

Attendees will form a nucleus of planning and construction personnel to expedite construction of effective shelters in areas where there is an accelerated demand for shelter construction by private initiative.

The program today is expected to greatly increase the amount of protection available to the citizens of our community and to provide a better understanding of the mechanics of survival.

NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING PREFERRED BY NEVADA'S SMALL RETAIL STORES

A recent survey among small retailers in Nevada metropolitan areas shows that newspapers have the highest status as an advertising medium among these merchants.

Results of a study by the University of Nevada show that due to the housewife's habit of studying newspaper ads, small retailers consider this medium more profitable than any other form of advertising.

The summary points out that "the small retailer's advertising effort can make the difference between success and failure, yet 91 percent of the advertising in small Nevada stores is done by the owner or manager with little but intuition and common sense as a guide."

Small retailers interviewed were asked to express the purpose of their advertising in specific, immediate terms. Forty-two percent saw it as a means of bringing about immediate buying action; 37 percent said their advertising was intended primarily to promote goodwill; 16 percent was aimed mainly to build product acceptance.

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CAUSE AND CURE

Vegas Chamber Speakers Explain Air Pollution

John Fairweather of the San Bernardino District Air Pollution Control Board was a guest speaker Friday at the meeting of the Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce at the Desert Inn, on the topic of "Air Pollution Control".

Attending the meeting from Henderson were City Administrator Harold Corbin, Chamber of Commerce President Dan Reed and Secretary Ellen Shirley and Rae Von Dornum of the HOME NEWS.

Representing the BMI plants, in addition to Manager Dan Reed, were R. Julian Moore, James Orr, A.J. Carardo and several other plant officials.

Also present from Henderson was Lou F. La Porta, Chairman of the Board of Clark County Commissioners, who instigated the formation of the Clark County Air Pollution Control Board.

Speaking of the air pollution problems in the San Bernardino region, Fairweather pointed out that this problem is created by population growth and industrial expansion.

Los Angeles, he pointed out is an inversion basin. This is a meteorological area in which a layer of warm air forms beneath the upper wind currents and traps the polluted air in the basin.

It has formerly been noted in local air surveys that a similar condition is found in Las Vegas Valley.

The expansion of population and industry requires land, water and other utilities, sanitation and pure air, Fairweather said.

Air pollution boards have authorized in all 52 counties of California. A survey is made in each county and if a pollution problem exists, an Air Pollution District is formed.

When the San Bernardino District was formed, the Air Pollution Control Board called in every major scientist in Southern California, to find out what kind of effluents were being released into the air and the effects the sun had on these effluents.

The study committee, headed by Fairweather, learned that the general process of living created smog or air pollution which included back yard burning, the smoke and fumes from industrial plants, the exhausts of automobiles and sanitation facilities.

The District is enabled by state law to write its own Air Pollution Control code. They have had some difficulty in controlling back yard burn-

ing because the worst offenders are the public dumps. It is difficult to explain to a citizen why he can't burn a small pile of rubbish in his yard when the public agencies fail to comply with the code, Fairweather said.

The study committee found that the San Bernardino district had nine industries whose smoke and fumes exceeded anything in Los Angeles County.

There are all types of control devices for industrial smoke and fumes, Fairweather said, and there is no reason at all why industry should not control its smoke and fumes.

Clark County, the speaker said, has taken a step in the right direction by forming an Air Pollution Control Board. The next thing is to look at the problem and find out what you want to do about it.

Dr. W.L. Faith, former vice-president, chief engineer and managing director of the Air Pollution Foundation, explained the steps necessary in working out an air pollution control program.

First, he said, determine the nature of the problem in the community, learn the nature of the pollutants in the air, find out where they come from, how they are transported from their source and the effect they have on the population.

Using hayfever caused by rag weed as an example, he told how it could be studied by determining whether it came only when the wind blew from a certain direction and following it to its source.

If you find a bed of rag weed, he said, you can destroy it; however, if you find a manufacturing enterprise such as a ladies' hat factory which used rag weed in making its product, you cannot destroy this so you find adequate means of control.

It is difficult to find air pollution effecting health, Dr. Faith said, however it does damage plants, shorts out insulators on power poles and causes nuisances such as odor, dust-fall, eye irritation and reduced visibility.

In some instances, he said, the effect may be merely esthetic — people may not like the looks of it or it may obscure a mountain which they enjoy looking at.

Each of these is a legitimate complaint, said Dr. Faith, and what we don't like we get rid of.

In seeking to solve the air pollution problem in Clark County it may be found that

an ordinance will solve it and it may require continuing work, he said.

Air pollution control is meant to protect the public, he said, but it is not meant to put an unfair burden on any part of your economy.

This is a community project and should have the cooperation of the community. Volunteer helpers can be used, industry might supply analysts, the Chamber of Commerce could supply office space. Each of these could save money.

Once the survey is completed and the nature and effect of the air pollutants known, it is up to the com-

munity to decide whether or not it is worth the cost to control it, Dr. Faith concluded.

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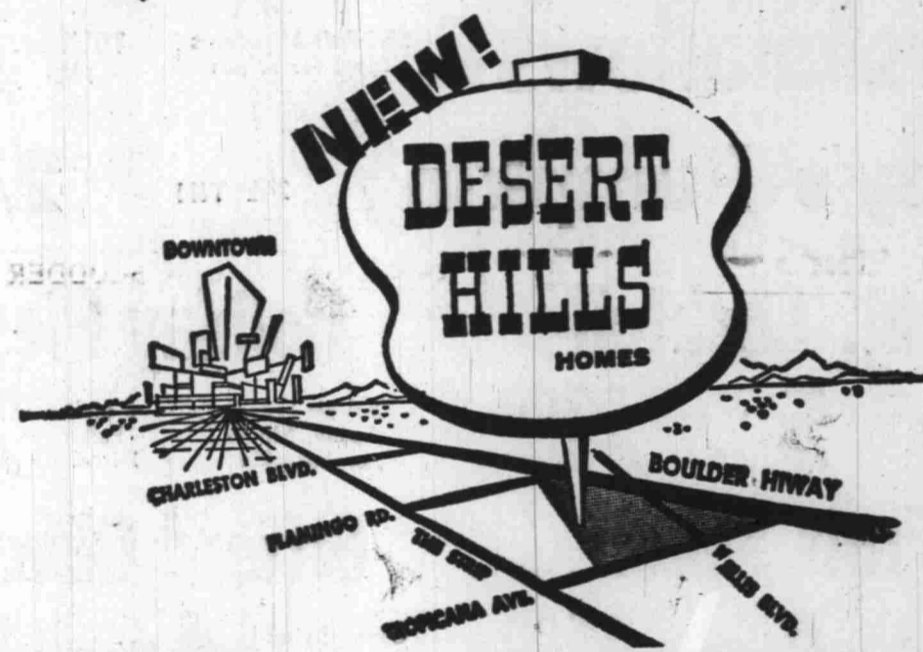

According to General Time, it was England's beloved King Alfred who invented "candle clocks" . . . foot-long gandles calculated to burn for four hours . . . by which His Majesty neatly divided the day into equal parts for prayer, work and rest!

Peter Henlein's egg-shaped clock, invented in Nuremberg in 1504, led to the development of pocket watches called "Nuremberg Eggs," roughly the size of today's Westclox Baby Buns.

Two of the world's most famous clocks are London's Big Ben, with a face 23 feet in diameter. And, in Jersey City, N. J., overlooking the Hudson, the world's largest clock. Built by Seth Thomas, it is 50 ft. in diameter, and has a minute hand 27½ ft. long.

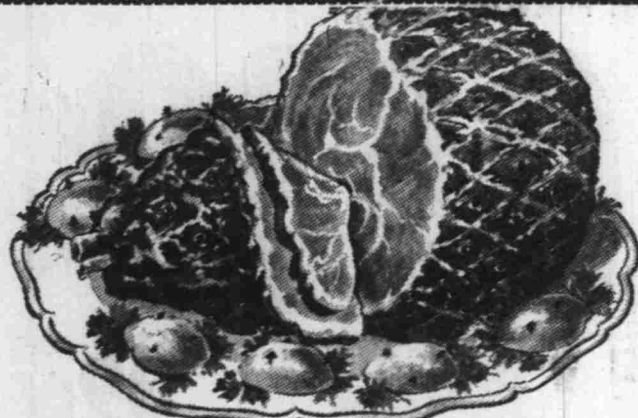

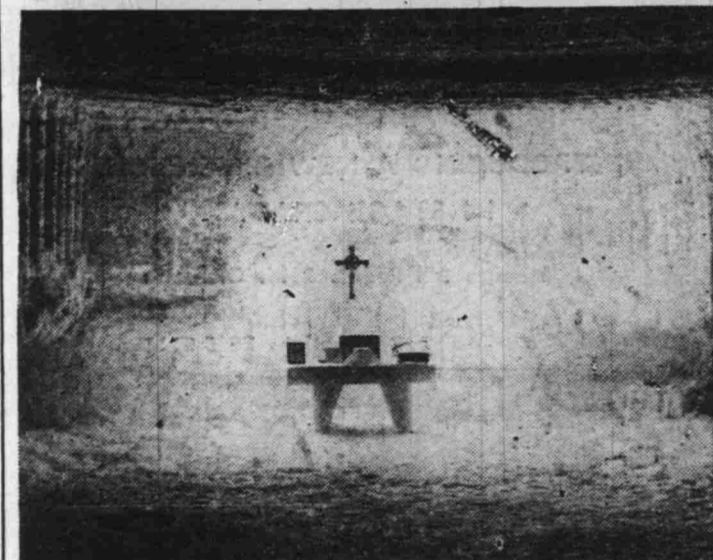

CHAPEL MADE OF ICE



CAMP TUTO, GREENLAND (ANS)—One of the most unusual military chapels in the world was put into use for the first time recently when mass was conducted inside a glacier at the edge of Camp Tuto, Greenland, summer operations base of the U. S. Army Polar Research and Development Center.

The Chapel was the result of a week's work by volunteer parishioners of the Camp Chapel under the direction of Chaplain (Captain) Joseph V. Coshan, and was built in the Camp Tuto Ice Tunnel.

Every piece of permanent equipment in the 12 feet high, 10 feet wide Gothic vault Chapel was formed entirely from ice. The altar, which weighs nearly 700 pounds, was molded into a single block of ice formed by combining water with the chips hewn from the aspe. This process formed the solid, modernistic, flaky sculpture.

Candlesticks used for the service were pure crystalline ice, blasted from Lake Tuto (the source of the Camp's water supply). After being hand-rubbed, they were as clear as fine glass.

The chamber in which the Chapel is located was particularly well lighted. A thick coating of hoarfrost causes the room's walls and ceiling to appear to be opaque. Beautiful hues of blue and green were given off by translucent lights shining through the frost and ice, illuminating the whole room.

The Ice Tunnel, in which the Chapel was built, is used for various Army Research and Development projects by the U. S. Army Cold Regions Research and Engineering Laboratory and the U. S. Army Engineering Research and Development Laboratories. Various projects involving measurements of snow and ice density and closure rate have been carried on since its construction in 1960. Always a point of great interest for visitors, the tunnel's attraction will undoubtedly increase since the Chapel will be retained as a permanent part of it.
