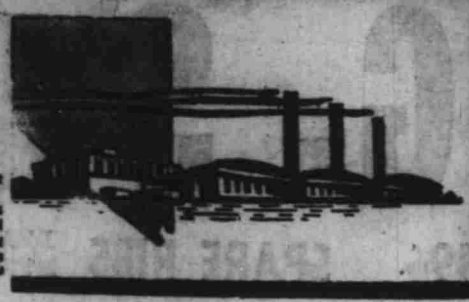

## City Asks Gibson To Seek State Laws For Voting At-Large

Legislation to aid the city financially and to set the election of City Councilmen at large instead of by Wards, was requested of Henderson Assemblyman James I. Gibson by Mayor William Byrne and City Councilmen Wednesday evening in an informal discussion.

Gibson told the Council he would be happy to introduce legislation to make the election of councilmen city-wide with candidates to reside in a certain ward, if some modifications were made from the last such bill which he intro-

duced to the legislature. It was generally agreed that the Councilmen would provide for such an election and make it mandatory that this type of election would be in effect at least two consecutive elections.

Revenue, which is sorely needed by the City was also discussed, and Gibson said he would introduce legislation or support it to make it possible for Henderson and other Nevada cities to receive a minimum of \$1.50 of the \$5 ad valorem tax back to the

city. The Mayor pointed out the need for more finances in the city and Gibson said he felt that the legislation should be introduced early in the session in order that Henderson's next budget could be figured with an increase.

The relationship of the county and the cities was discussed and it was generally agreed that the city comes on the short end of the tax return.

Gibson told the city officials that he would help in any way possible during the coming session of the legislature.

as well it must to overcome the height disadvantage it faces from opposing quintets.

Boulder City has another aggressive group and was very impressive in its victory over Big Bear last Saturday night. Plus the advantage of a home town court a win over the Eagles would go far to give the locals the confidence required to battle the Las Vegas teams on even terms.

The varsity game scheduled for 8:15 P.M. will be preceded by a jayvee tilt between the respective jayvees.

On Saturday the Basic varsity will face the Nevada Southern University jayvees at the college gym on Maryland Parkway. Tap-off time for this contest is 7:30 P.M.

## City Stays Within Its Budget

City Councilmen will hear a report on the City Audit which was recently completed by the Accounting Firm of Conway, Moe and Hibbs, next Thursday at 9 p.m., in the Mayor's office.

According to City Auditor Don Dawson, city officials, department supervisors and their staffs should be commended for living within their budgets and exercising economy over the last fiscal period.

Dawson said that the expenditures for the general city government operation for the year ending were \$64,000 or 13 percent less than the approved appropriation.

The anticipated revenue for the same period was within two per cent or \$11,000 of what was actually received, he said.

In a statement to the Councilmen, Dawson noted an improvement in the city's condition over the previous year.

## Denton Pharmacy Approved For Package License

A package liquor license for Denton Pharmacy on Pacific Street, in the name of Haig Charles Merigan was granted by the City Council Monday night.

The distance from the Episcopal Church was questioned, but the Council was advised by City Clerk Ann Schone-man that the distance was sufficient.

A letter from BMI, advising the City that the water pumps were being turned over to City maintenance and operation was read. The city crew working under assistant Maintenance Director Bill Schone-man will take direct responsibility for the pumps, and according to Public Works Director George Perkins, will use preventative maintenance to keep them in working order.

The pumps, which belong to the City, are located at BMI's clear well and above the golf course.

## 35 Residents Ordered To Clean Premises

A progress report on the Pittman Clean-up effort was made to City Councilmen and Mayor Bill Byrne Monday night by Department Heads of the various departments.

George Perkins, public works director; Pat Doherty building superintendent; Dr. E. R. Lindblom, health inspector; and Fire Chief Don Richard, are making a united effort in the clean-up.

Perkins told the City Monday night that letters were mailed to offenders in that area advising them to clean up the debris or the city would accomplish the work and assess the property. He stated that around 25 or 35 letters were mailed out and that now the ten days has elapsed the property will be inspected and action taken.

The clean-up was placed on the agenda by Councilman Frank Morrell on the request of a petition from residents of that area.

Perkins said that a meeting is held twice weekly on the problem and the city will continue to pursue the work.

### Kiwanis Club To Conduct 1963 March Of Dimes Here

H 3-36-2 Kiwanis H-14 . mg Participation in the 1963 Clark County March of Dimes in the Henderson area will be managed by the Kiwanis Club, Don Dawson, Kiwanis president announced this week.

In urging support of The National Foundation, Dawson said: "Many persons no doubt feel that since polio has been virtually eliminated from the American health scene the agency would fold its wraps and stand on the success of the Salk and Sabine vaccines which marked attainment of the goal set 25 years ago.

"This is an erroneous assumption. With the success of conquering polio to spur them on, Foundation researchers directed their efforts to congenital defects and crippling arthritis.

Significant ground has been gained in getting parents to abandon the Old World of medieval times practice of hiding birth defected children. In cooperation with The National Foundation experts have set up clinical study centers and teams of scien-

tists and medical men work closely with the patient in bedside research to determine contributing causes of deformity.

Delicate surgery and muscle grafting has restored hundreds of children to usefulness. But lessening disability is not the end goal in the total dedicated approach to these vital problems. Only through discovering causes can cures be affected. Disease strikes both the high and the lowly — no one is immune from these cripples.

Supporting figures are available through the Clark County Chapter of the National Foundation to bear out the claim that hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent in this area alone to aid crippled children and adults. Even though the Salk and Sabine vaccines have pulled the fangs of polio there

are victims of the once dread disease who will continue to need aid throughout the remainder of their lives. A large portion of funds contributed to the March of Dimes is retained in Clark County to aid Nevadans directly, according to Dawson.

The Kiwanis president appealed to everyone to give generously to support this splendid work. Just the giving of one thin dime will write the givers name along side dedicated scientists who are laboring ceaselessly to save lives. Reconstructing the house of life is a task that requires many builders — give for the life of a child, said Dawson.

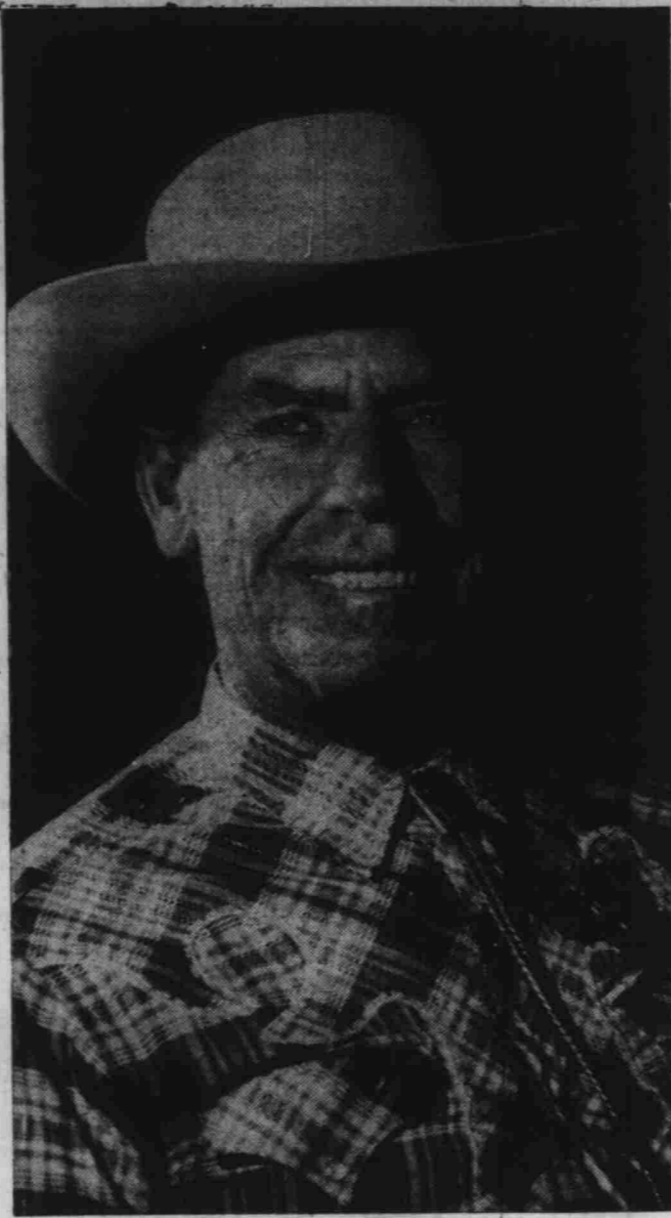
# Constable Aubrey Pagan Is City's Pioneer Law Enforcement Officer

Henderson's Constable Aubrey Pagan has seen a lot of people come and go here.

Sometimes his job isn't pleasant, but attesting to the fact that he has done it well, is the evident fact that he has had to run for office every two years and he is now serving his 16th year.

At first Pagan had competition in the political race, but through the years it has dwindled until the past several races have been a victory before the election, since he was the only one running.

The popular law officer has been in law enforcement work

for the past 20 years, having been a member of the Sheriff's Department in Henderson from 1944 until this city was incorporated in 1953 and the police department was organized. At that time he went to work for WECCO where he was Chief of Security. When American Potash and Chemical Corp. took over the WECCO plant he stayed in the security department. In that department he did fingerprinting and fingerprint classification, and photography, including the developing and printing.

Pagan first lived in Victory Village, moving to the Townsite apartments when they were built. He now lives at 311 Major with his wife Greta and five daughters — "and that's a lot of women," Pagan will admit.

Pagan can be remembered as the law officer who found the body of 20-year-old Don Brown of Henderson who was murdered in Boulder City while working as a service station attendant, around 1948.

The youth was killed by Clayton Fouquette as he was leaving the station with the day's receipts, and was taken and left in the desert. Law officers combed the area from Thursday night until Sunday morning when he was located between Henderson and Railroad Pass by Pagan. The murderer has since been executed by the State.

Pagan, who has retired from American Potash, spends full time on his Constable job in which he processes court papers from District and Justice Courts. He also serves as Deputy Coroner. With his writs of attachments in which he must pick up automobiles and attach salary checks he often runs into tough characters, however, he says most people realize that he is just doing his job and save their venom for the person who is suing them.

During the years, Pagan has attended several Police schools sponsored by the FBI. He has studied general law enforcement; fingerprinting and classification, and crime photography. He still attends special courses sponsored by the FBI.

Pagan says that the experiences he has had during his years in law enforcement would fill a book but as yet he has not set about starting one, since he spends his leisure hours either fishing or hunting.

When he finished with the FBI school, Pagan said he took a pledge which is reprinted here because of its beauty and merit.

"Humbly recognizing the responsibilities entrusted to me I do vow that I shall always consider the high calling of law enforcement to be an honorable profession. The duties of which are recognized by me as both an art and a science.

"I recognize fully my responsibilities to defend the right, to protect the weak, to aid the distressed, and to uphold the law in public duty and private living. I accept the obligation in connection with my assignments, to report facts and to testify without bias or display of emotion, and to consider the information coming to my knowledge by virtue of my position as a sacred trust to be used solely for official purposes to the responsibility entrusted to me of seeking to prevent crime.

"Of finding the facts of law violations, and of apprehending fugitives and criminals, I shall give my loyal and faithful attention and shall always be equally alert in striving to acquit the innocent and to convict the guilty. In the performance of my duties and assignments, I shall not engage in unlawful and unethical practices but shall perform the functions of my office without fear, without favor, and without prejudice.

"At no time shall I disclose to an unauthorized person any fact, testimony, or information in any pending matter coming to my official knowledge which may be calculated to prejudice the minds of existing or prospective judicial bodies either to favor or

respect to all citizens, and as an officer, I shall always be loyal to my duty, my organization and my country.

I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States, against all enemies, foreign and domestic; I will bear true faith and alliance to the same, and will constantly strive to cooperate with and promote cooperation between all regularly constituted law enforcement agencies and officers in the performance of duties of mutual interest and obligation."

Pagan, who served one term as a City Councilman, says he has always endeavored to live by this pledge both in private and public life.

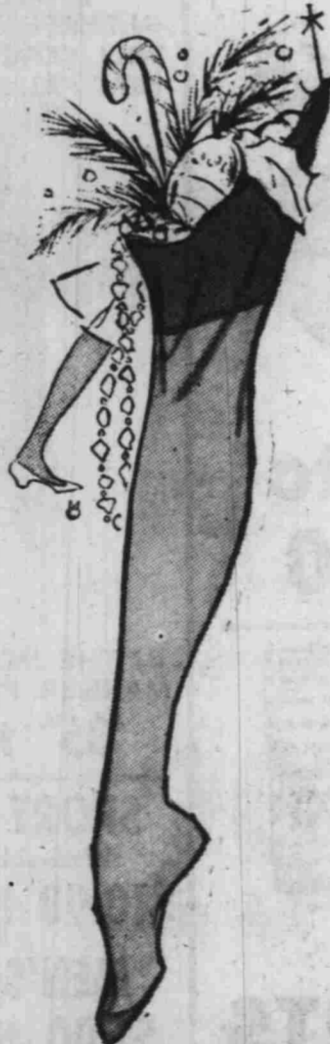

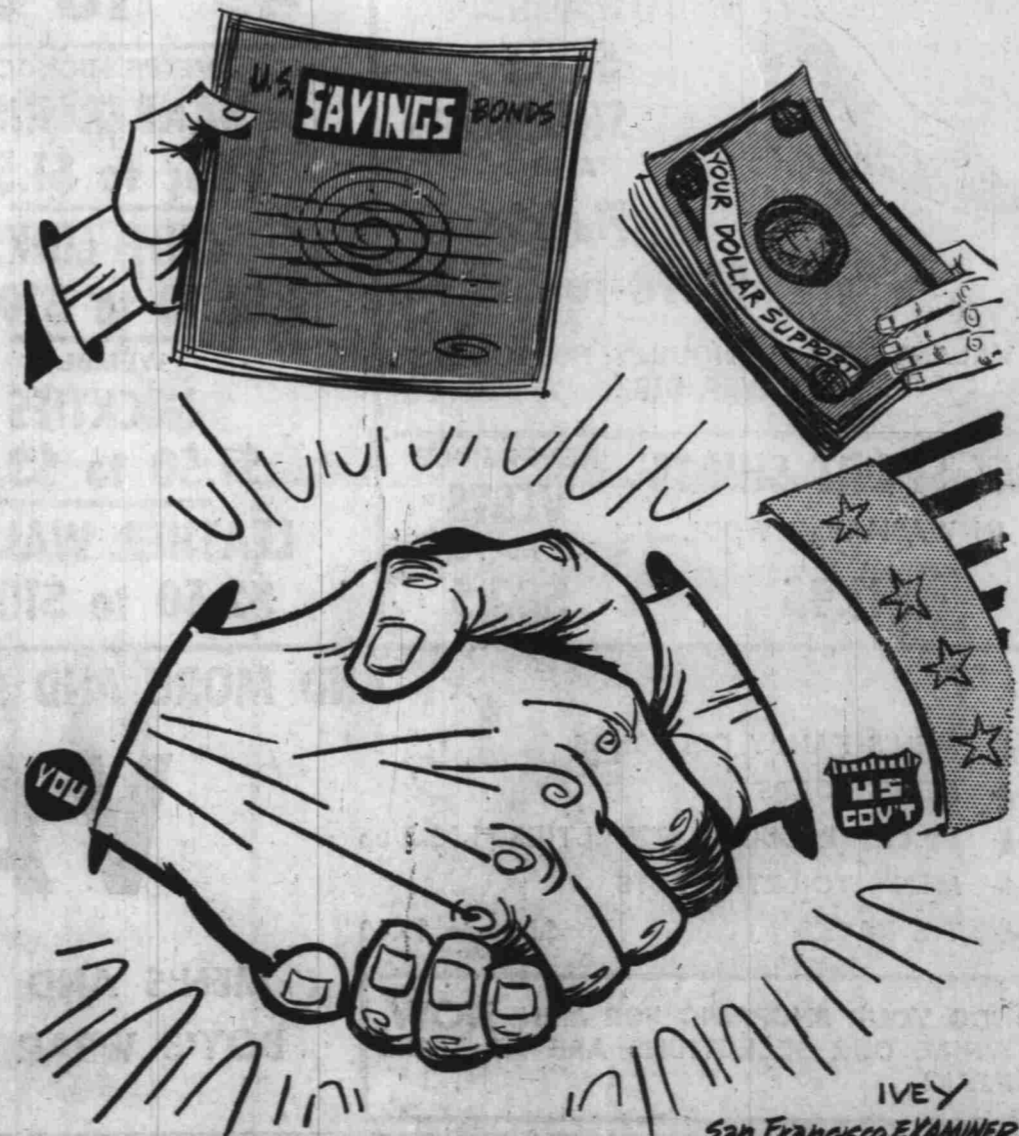

## Baring Postcard Believed The Biggest Ever Mailed

Congressman Walter Baring recently acknowledged receipt of a postcard which is probably the largest one ever mailed in the history of the U.S. Post Office.

The card measured eight and a half feet by three and a half feet and required almost \$5 postage.

The postcard, mailed by Dr. Earl Gould of 77 Frontier Highway, was once prominently displayed in Doc Gould's front yard, and according to our Congressman, it is now prominently displayed in Washington D. C., where he expects it to remain for some time to come.

This unique piece of mail was a Baring for Congress billboard, which had to be reduced in size for mailing. Even after it was cut to a smaller size, it could not be mailed from the Henderson Post Office, but was within the regulations of the lower class Post Office in Pittman.

The mailman who delivered the big postcard is also a Henderson resident and a graduate of Basic High School, Harry Reid, who is attending George Washington Law School and works as a mailman in Washington D.C. with the House of Congress as his delivery route.

The sender, who autographed the sign with the words, "YOUR BIGGEST VICTORY, Doc Gould," said, "I was probably cursed by every mailman from here to the east coast." In addition to being unwieldy, the Baring sign was tacked as well as glued to the plywood sheet used for the billboard and some of the tacks protruded slightly on the opposite side.

## Local Children Urged To Enter Nev. Design Contest

All Southern Nevada children who are enrolled in special education classes in the public schools or those whose parents are members of the Nevada Association for Retarded Children are encouraged to participate in the design contest sponsored by the NARC, it was announced by Carlisle Wilcox, NARC President.

The purpose of the contest is to obtain a design which will be used to decorate articles which may be sold as souvenirs. Royalties on these souvenirs will be paid into the treasury of the Nevada

Association for Retarded Children and will be used as the association sees fit.

There is no cash prize for the design; however, the winner's name will appear on the vace of the design and will be publicized on all appropriate occasions.

## DeVylders Have Rare Treat For Holiday Table

This treat is a rare kind of jam given to them as a gift by DeVlyder's sister-in-law, Mrs. Peter Skrepnechuk of Vancouver Island.

Mrs. Skrepnechuk, a native of Newfoundland, visited her family there last summer and during the month of August, she went to Labrador, where she picked the berries from which the jam was made.

This berry which resembles a cranberry in shape and color, but is smaller, grows only in Labrador. It is a very fast maturing fruit, ripening within a month from the time it first appears on the bush. It must be picked within the very short time it remains on the bush after ripening.

DeVylder does not remember the name of this berry, which has a delightfully different taste. He says the berries are not available every year as perfect weather is required for their growth in the very small part of the world where they are found.

# Christmas Observance Was Once Illegal In America

Celebration of Christmas — the most widely observed religious holiday of the modern world — was at one time illegal in early American history.

Colonial New England did not celebrate Christmas, according to researchers at Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia, because the stern Puritan colonists believed that such activities were wholly pagan and forbade them by law. Christmas came to the American colonies while it was the subject of strenuous controversy in England. English Puritans condemned it as "popish" and the secular celebration as a "wanton Bac-

chanalian feast." Opposition of the English Puritans to festivals culminated in an act of Parliament in 1647 which abolished the observance of Christmas, Easter and Whitsuntide. This was echoed in the American colonies in 1659 when Puritans enacted a law in the general court of Massachusetts to punish those who "kept Christmas."

The law read "Whosoever shall be found observing any such day as Christmas or the like, either by forbearing of labor, feasting, or in any other way . . . shall be subject to a fine of five shillings."

The law was repealed in 1681 but many of the Puritans were not reconciled to this action. Secular reveling at Christmas had often interfered with religious devotions and offended the Puritans' moral sense. This intensified their sectarian hostility to the religious observance of Christmas — an attitude they maintained for the better part of two centuries in parts of New England.

The fun-loving Dutch colonists of New Amsterdam, however, celebrated Christmas as their chief holiday. They brought the old customs from their homeland, especially the Christmas

stocking and observance of the feast day of St. Nicholas. In the Southern colonies, the planters celebrated the yuletide with feasting, singing, and dancing. On many plantations slaves were given a holiday as long as the great yule log burned. The latter half of the eighteenth century saw a swing of attention to the realm of economics and politics and religious controversies became of less importance. The fact that English and Hessian troops celebrated Christmas during the Revolutionary War may have added a patriotic note to the denominational controversy.

General Washington crossed the Delaware River on the night of December 25, 1776, to surprise and defeat the Hessian troops stationed at Trenton, N.J. In the opinion of one writer, Washington's bold venture succeeded because the Hessians were enjoying their customary Christmas revels and failed to maintain the usual watch and patrols.

However, denominational opposition to the ecclesiastic observance of Christmas continued into the second half of the nineteenth century. An account in the New York Daily Times for December 26, 1855 read: "The churches of the Presbyterians, Baptists, and Methodists were not open on Dec. 25 except where some Mission Schools had a celebration. They do not accept the day as a Holy One, but the Episcopalian, Catholic and German Churches were all open. Inside they were decked with evergreens."

In the twentieth century, all denominations have embraced Christmas widely both as a religious and as a social celebration. Today, men, women and children in every Christian land crowd into churches to give their thanks. More than one fourth of the world's population — about 800 million people profess some form of Christian faith.

The splendor and beauty of Christmas observances is very different from the humble stable in Bethlehem where Christ was born; but the message He brought to the world is the same — "Glory be to God in the highest; and on earth peace, good will toward men."

## Railway Express Files With PSC

The Public Service Commission of Nevada has received a new tariff filing from Railway Express Agency with proposed rate increases and rate reductions.

Railway Express Agency has filed a similar tariff schedule with the Interstate Commerce Commission for application between all states for interstate traffic. The proposed increases would apply on first and second class shipments of which types only 86 shipments were handled in Nevada intrastate traffic during October, 1962. The nominal increase averaging ten cents per shipment will be offset by decreases on many items.

Persons desiring to protest should do so in writing addressed to the Public Service Commission, Carson City, Nevada before December 28, 1962.

## First CD Self Help Medical Class Graduates

The first class in the current Civil Defense medical self-help first aid program was graduated last week after completing 16 hours of instruction, it was announced by Mrs. Betty Reynolds deputy director of Civil Defense for the city.

The class was a great success, according to instructor Lester Burgwardt, who said attendance was almost 100 per cent.

Two other classes are being instructed by Mrs. Ellen Shirley and Jerry Ludwig. Both are nearing graduation.

Fire Chief Don Richard reports that members of the Fire Department have recently completed an advanced course in first aid. After reviewing the course being offered under the Civil Defense program, Richard remarked that he thought it the most complete and most easily understood course he had ever seen.

Richard said he thought this CD course a little too comprehensive to ever be accepted for use by the Red Cross as it includes every type of emergency treatment including birth.

## ELKS FAMILY CHRISTMAS PARTY TOMORROW NIGHT

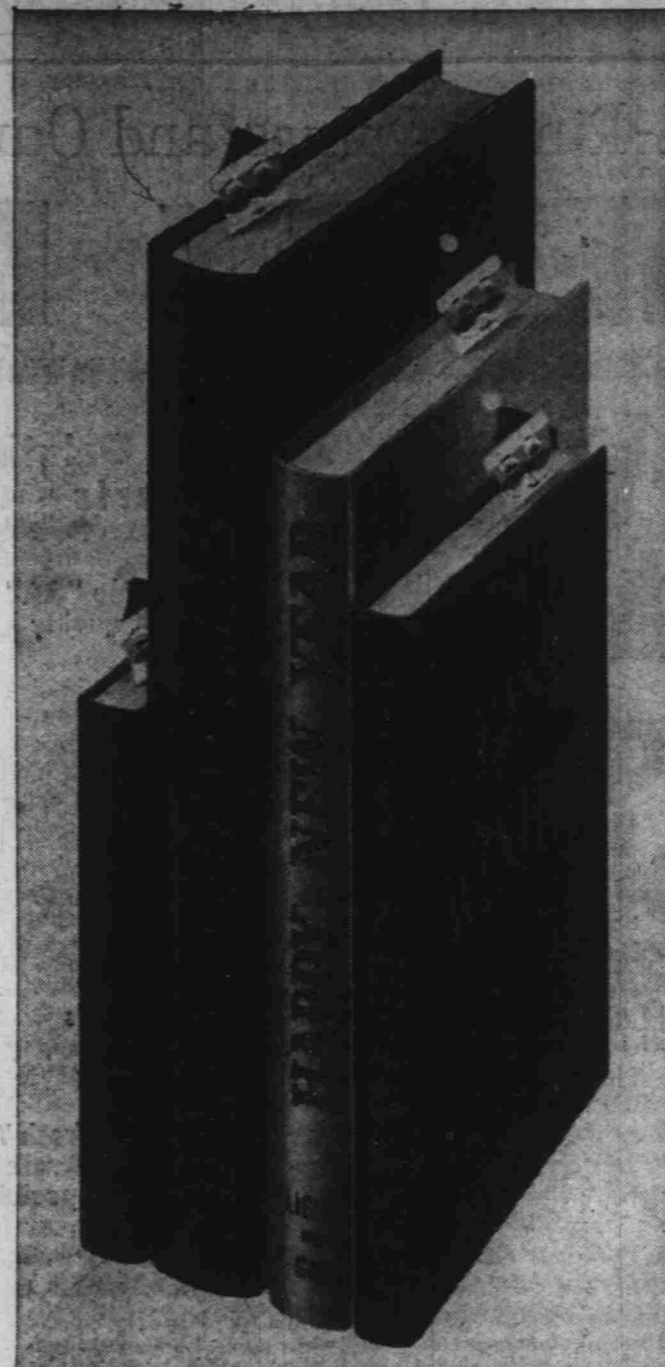
The annual Christmas party for Elks and their families will be held tomorrow evening at the Elks Lodge on Vegas Wash Road.

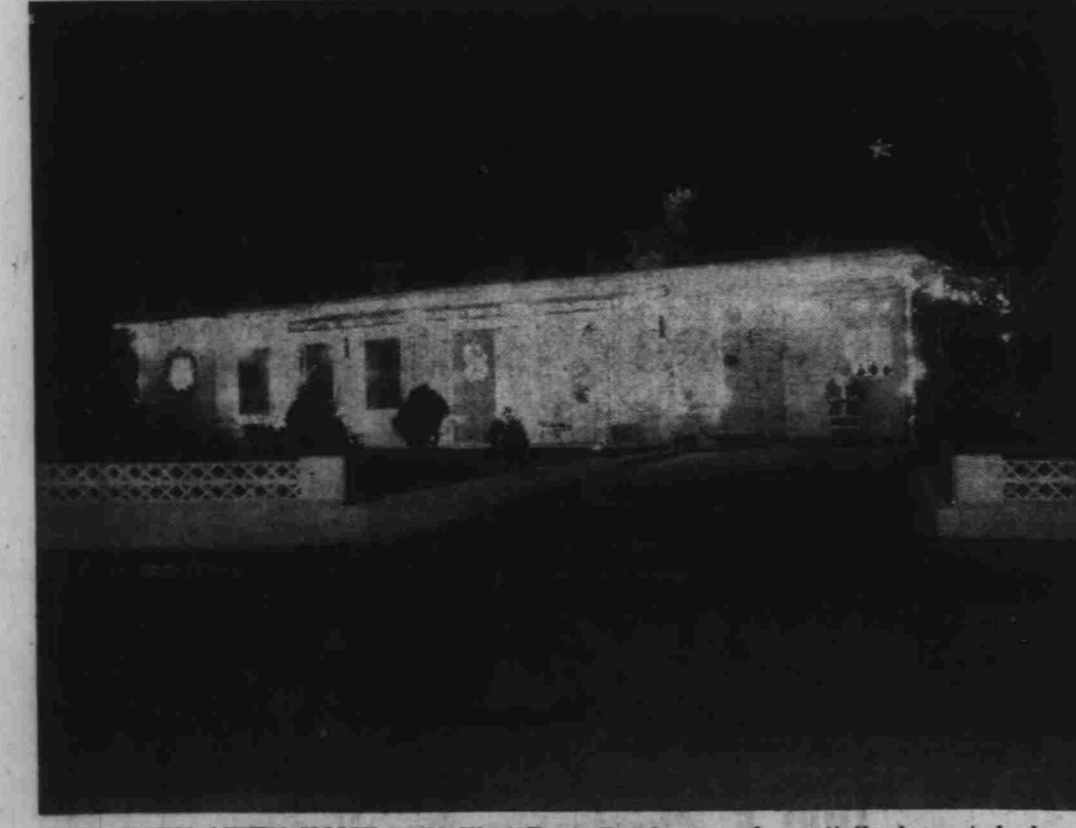

## City Attorney Poses Question On Licenses

Provisions for granting temporary licenses for liquor establishments and a second hand store, which has been done by the City Council in three instances in the last two months, are not in the city ordinances, according to City Attorney John Manzonie.

Because of possible hardship on the cases presented to the Council, licenses have been granted pending a report from the FBI, however, Manzonie said that there is no such provision in the ordinance.

"If a temporary license is issued, then the FBI report comes back negative, the Council would be in trouble," Manzonie said.

The first such license was granted to Grace F. Fulford of the Magnesium Club on November 19, by the City Council, on a motion by City Councilman Wilbur Hardy, although Manzonie advised the Council at that time that there was no such provision in the ordinance.

At that time the Council went on record as not having this made as a general practice, stating that they did not want to start a precedent.

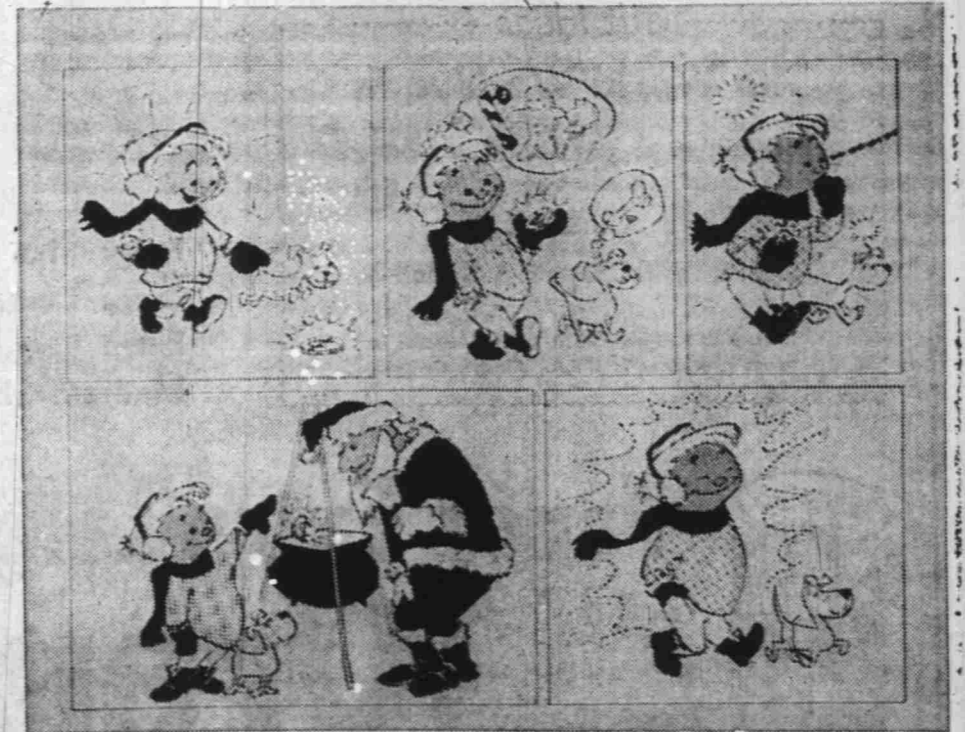
