At a meeting of the Boulder Highway Association executive board Tuesday night, it was announced that Polk had tentatively offered of underwrite the cost of street improvements, dealing with the property owners individually, to save them the costs of increased taxes and other expenses

Polk said he had given considerable thought to the prices quoted at the City responsibilities when it sits the people of Pittman a much better deal since he has a plant situated in the immediate area.

Engineering work, Polk said, would have to be done by the city, if the people decide they want him to do the paving.







A film on the activities and training of TAC pilots was shown. This included the various types of planes and missiles used by TAC which is nuclear deterrent force. Nellis, according to Col. White, is a finishing school for pilots. In addition to Air Force pilots from other Tac bases, pilots from other Tac bases, pilots from friendly foreign nations are also trained there in bombing and in the handling of super-sonic fighter planes. SMALL POX FEAR MOUNTS FEAR GRIPS IN DISCOVERY OF MENINGITIS WHITE PINE

. MARLOW, Okla. (AP) - A food handler came down with spinal meningitis, causing fear that 500 public school students in Marlow may have# been exposed to the disease.

.A school cafeteria worker, Jessie Mae Jones, 51, was reported in critical condition Sunday at the University of Oklahoma Medical Center in Oklahoma City. Doctors said tests had confirmed she has meningiococcus, a form of spinal meningitis caused by a short-lived bacteria.

Dr. F. R. Hassler, laboratory director and head of the State ... Health ... Department communicable disease section, said this form of meningitis is not easily spread. Nonetheless fears mounted in Marlow, a small town in southern Oklahoma.

ELY, Nev., (AP) - Hundreds of White Pine county residents were immunized for small pox Thursday after a high school girl became ill with what appeared to be an unusually .severe .case .of chicken pox.

Dr. Daniel Hurley, state health director, said in Reno the case was being considered an "atypical" case of chicken pox until tests are completed, probably Monday or Tuesday.

Meanwhile, the White Pine Medical Society set up free clinics for residents of this eastern Nevada community who did not have current immunizations.


An official said 640 teachers and students at White Pine county high school received small pox shots Thursday. Clinics were also set up in Ruth and McGill, both Copper mining centers.
