Community Decides 'Conflict-of-Interest' Issue At Polls Today

Sharply at seven this morning, the polls will open onto an election day which is generally considered one of the most vital in the short but fiery history of this city.

The community has the big chore of selecting three councilmen and a judge and in all cases the races between the runoff candidates are slated to be close.

New faces who have stepped forth offering to serve and who qualified for this general election day ballot are Keith Lopeman and Dr. Paul Marshall, who are battling for a council post after eliminating former councilman Jack Stevens in the May primary; Ida Belle Riggins, who is competing against incumbent Pete Mendive for a council post; and Dale Roberts, who is competing against incumbent Frank Morrell for a council post. Roberts was the top vote getter in the primary.

The judge race is between Lee Lamoreaux and Earl Davis. The latter has been serving as judge since the state law relieved George Treem's former double duty as both municipal judge and justice of the peace.

The general theme of this election has centered around conflict of interest of those in office. Whether the mass of voters will rectify the matter will be known by nightfall.

This newspaper has made known its stand in previous issues. It does not tell you whom to vote for — as we feel it is the citizen's job to make his own selection. Our position is to point out the dangers of re-electing anyone who has not served his office well or who has allowed himself to be swamped with conflict of interest.

We have faith in the good people of our town who are just as desirous as we are in making Henderson — a city of strong government, a community we can all be so proud to be a part of.

We have faith the vote today will be for the best interests of our town.

Blame Charter Petition As Political "Front"

The Henderson City Charter petition, signed by 1208 local residents, was officially killed by the City Council last night on a motion by Councilman Wilbur Hardy and seconded by Councilman Pete Mendive.

In making motion for the denial, Hardy charged that the petitioners were using this method for a recall movement against Mayor William Byrne, and stated that "If they want a recall then they should go through the recall procedure and not cost the taxpayers for the elections called for in the charter movement."

Hardy also charged that Morrell was using this as a campaign issue, a charge that was denied by Councilman Frank Morrell who called Hardy's declaration that it was a lever for

recall of Mayor Byrne a "presumption on his part."

Councilman Lorin Williams said that under the rulings made by the attorneys, the city council had no alternative but to throw out the petition. Councilman Jack Stevens agreed, stating that motives of the petitioners were not to be discussed, but stated that he had not determined the value of home rule.

A petition by Midway City residents for an improvement project for the streets will be presented at a future time, according to Robert Dill who represented the group. He stated that approximately 30 percent of the property owners live out of town and must be contacted.

Mayor William Byrne told him that the matter of delay would be up to the group, not the city.

4 Lane Lake Mead Highway Within Year, Says Williams

Plans for a four-lane highway extending from the city limits near the plant area to Trailer estates on Lake Mead Drive are now on the drawing tables of the State highway department, and bids for construction will be let in the next fiscal year, according to information given to Public Works Director George Perkins.

The subject of the traffic problem on Lake Mead Drive was brought to the attention of the Council by Lorin

Williams who also asked that cross walks be painted on the highway for foot traffic in that area.

City Administrator Harold Corbin said that the intersection at Water Street and Lake Mead Drive would be reconstructed again under the new road plan.

It was also requested that the traffic lights at Boulder highway and Lake Mead Drive be extended in order for week-end traffic going to the lake not to pile up at the intersection.

Other Council Action Last Night

Two auditing firms have been contacted to study the scope of an audit on land and connecting fees, and give an estimate of the cost, according to City Finance Officer Bob Adams.

Adams said that the estimates would be available within the week, along with estimates of the cost of the regular annual audit.

Other Council actions included:

1. Approval of two billboard signs on Boulder highway at Major street for LaPorta Insurance and the Sahara hotel.
2. Approval for the parking of a trailer for night watchman at the Elks hall for one year.
3. Approved \$248 for the purchase of a bronze replica of the city's insignia for the wall of the Council chambers.
4. Postponed action on a Roadside peddler ordinance.
5. Postponed action on the Planning Commission's denial for the rezoning of 22 acres of land off Boulder highway above the bowling alley for a trailer park.
6. Approved Sunrise subdivision.
7. Approved money for City Administrator Harold Corbin to attend the Nevada Municipal Association Board of Directors' meeting at Lake Tahoe, Saturday, July 13.
8. Set a meeting Wednesday morning at 9:30 for the canvass of votes for the city election.

City Passes Anti-Smut Law

City Councilmen last night took action to curb the sale of indecent literature in the city by passing an emergency ordinance which would make it illegal to sell, lend, give away or distribute any indecent literature, and those caught violating the ordinance will be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The ordinance also makes provisions for the appointment of a committee of not more than 9 persons for a "Committee of Citizens of decent literature," committee to screen the questionable literature on the news stands and recommend action to the City Council.

The question of censorship was discussed thoroughly, and Mayor Bill Byrne said that the final say would be left up to the court. The fine for a misdemeanor is up to \$299, and six months in the city jail.

It was brought up from the audience that cigarettes and liquor are easily obtained by teenagers within the city, and Byrne said that this is a matter of policing.

The new ordinance becomes effective upon publication.

Timely Tips For Parents On Coping With School Vacation

The very day school lets out in the summer, youngster all over the City suddenly realize that there is nothing to do, and they start immediately to make life, which has been somewhat peaceful for parents, as miserable as they can.

First of all, they are not looking for work which would take up some of their free time. If parents imply or suggest very strongly that they should help around the house, they are reminded that this is vacation, or that they are too busy to be bothered.

Secondly, it is the parents fault they are not entertained, and if the parents don't provide adequate and amusing enough entertainment, then it is the city's fault there is nothing going on.

A word of advice to parents seems in order at the present time so here are a few suggestions about what to do about your youngsters during the summer vacation.

1. First of all, make sure you have a good neighbor (not too close) where your children can play and you can be reasonably sure that they will be taken care of. This will alleviate a lot of your problems.
2. Make sure your children leave early enough in the morning that the neighbor's children don't have a chance to get to your house first.
3. Should you slip and not get your children off in time and the neighbor's children arrive at your house, make them as uncomfortable as you can, in fact show complete dislike for them and eventually they will leave.
4. When the neighbor begins to rebel to having your children at her home all the time, take them to the swimming pool and leave them all day . . . or to the movie house. There is always someone whom you can make feel responsible for your children.

Seriously, the City is endeavoring to provide recreational facilities for young people but not to take the burden of the child from the parent.

The City Park is open at all times, and Lydia Malcolm, local librarian, has announced that the summer reading program will open soon.

The Churches will be sponsoring Bible Schools during the summer, and a local group is endeavoring to start a 4H program here. The lake is nearby where with parent effort youngsters can fish or swim.

At any rate, when some youngsters start the old gripe that there is nothing to do, it is often because they are not looking for anything.

Clay modeling classes and ceramic classes, especially for youngsters, are now being planned and will probably be announced within the next week.

Summer camps are also being planned by churches and scout organizations to help keep the young people busy and happy with good, healthful activities.

Airman Escapes Death In One Car Roll-Over

Except for strong winds which apparently did no extensive damage, and a one-car roll-over on Sunday, the Memorial Day week-end was uneventful, other than several arrests for drunken and reckless driving, according to local Police.

A 3-c James R. Sanders, 19, of Nellis Air Force Base, escaped death Sunday morning when his car apparently went out of control on Lake Mead Drive, jumped off the side of the road for 285 feet, and hit a culvert, demolishing the car, as it overturned.

Police booked Sanders for reckless driving, stating that he was passing a car in a no-passing lane on the highway, when he apparently saw another car approaching. Sanders was treated for mouth injuries at the Nellis hospital. An airman, Charles Jost, who was riding with him apparently escaped injury.

Calvin Hoffa, 18, 5 D West Lincoln, Carver Park, was booked for reckless driving on Saturday morning when he was arrested by Clark County Sheriff's Deputy E. Sittin, after he was followed going at speeds up to 100 miles an hour. He was stopped at Lake Mead Drive and Water Street.

Frank Edward Skivier, 46, 1801 Demetrius, Las Vegas, was arrested for DUI, after an escort service man clocked him at 80 miles an hour through Henderson.

Sandra C. Gibbs, 23, was arrested for reckless driving and having no operator's license after she was involved in an accident with Joan R. Toony, 33 of Las Vegas.

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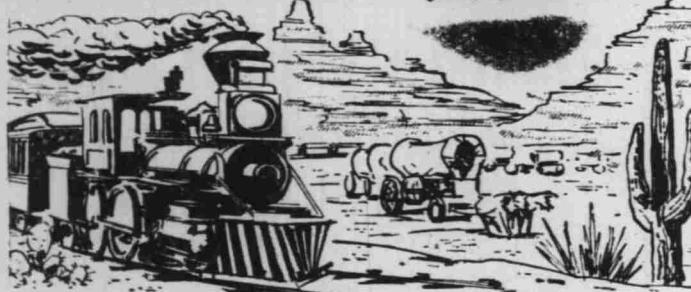

Pet Repellent For Mailmen

Happier days for postmen are anticipated with use of a new "pesticide" which will repel but not injure that is being developed especially for the use of postmen who must run the gauntlet of unfriendly dogs.

The Post Office Department is interested in this new "anti-dog spray" as more than 7000 mail carriers a year are bitten by dogs in the course of their daily rounds.

This spray would be useful for relief postmen here, who average two or three bites a year, according to Assistant Postmaster Joe Rodriguez. Most of the regular postmen have been here for several years and dogs along their routes have become accustomed to their daily visits.

Rodriguez tells us the new "pesticide" is not the only product sparked by the incidence of "dog bites mail man." He says one enterprising manufacturing company has come up with a dog biscuit that tastes exactly like a man's ankle.

The postman's life was not always so serene here. Rodriguez recalls one incident which happened eight or nine years ago when a mean dog met the postman a block or more from its owner's home and chased him down the street.

Efforts on the part of the Postmaster, to have the dog confined, failed and at last mail delivery on that block was stopped. When this happened the neighbors took care of the situation and the dog was removed from the scene.

The dog problem here has not been bad in the past five years, Rodriguez said.

MRS. PRISBREY ATTENDS MOTHER'S SERVICE IN UTAH

Mr. and Mrs. Loran Prisbrey and family, 101 Elm, have just returned home from the services of Mrs. Prisbrey's mother, Dora Empey, which was held in St. George, Utah.

Mrs. Empey had been ill the past year and hospitalized most of that time.

The Prisbrey's are very appreciative to their many friends who have shown sympathy by sending cards and flowers.

Other, less fortunate areas will be eagerly awaiting a supply of the new spray which is the only one of its kind registered with the Department of Agriculture.

It is described as "harmless yet humane," and is a combination of mineral oil and pepper.

It does not injure the dog and tests have shown that after one or two uses, it is necessary only to point the finger and the attacking dog turns tail.

Humane organizations have been informed of the experiments, now being carried on at the University of Georgia, and do not seem opposed.

Meter readers, milkmen, and other visitors to the home who are regarded with suspicion by the family dog may also equip themselves with the new spray if it is adopted for general use.

It is manufactured by Animal Repellents, Inc., Griffin, Ga.

Dogs are not the only ani-

mals who seem to have an aversion to the mailman. The Post Office Department reports that postmen have been bitten by geese, barnyard fowl of various species, as well as insects such as bees which frequent mail boxes.

Various methods of making friends and influencing dogs have been tried by postmen.

The Post Office Department regards the matter seriously however. No one knows quite why dogs look with suspicion on the mailman whom they see everyday.

While awaiting the arrival of this new product on the market; mailmen, meter readers and others who may have to face unfriendly dogs during their regular work rounds, might try out the "pesticide" used by Dick Pryor of Henderson Telephone Company.

Dick uses a simple plastic squeeze bottle filled with water which he says will quickly and efficiently disinterest dogs in ankle tasting.

CITY HALL RECORDS DISCLOSE THESE FACTS:

Prior to August 15, 1961, Councilman Morrell suggested that the engineering department of the city prepare an estimate of the cost of certain water lines, including a 10" and 12" water line in a direction running on two sides of a piece of property Morrell and James Gunville owned on Vegas Wash Road.

CITY HALL RECORDS show that on August 28, 1961, the city engineering department submitted a report on "Vegas Wash water lines" which estimated a cost of \$28,018.00 for a 12" water line from Ash Street, along Center Street to Vegas Wash Road. (This is approximately 1600 feet along the line of Morrell and Gunville's property.) The report also reads "Installation of 10" line to a point across Vegas Wash Road — \$15,297.00." (This is along the west side of the same triangular piece of property owned by Morrell and Gunville.)

The minutes of the regular meeting of the City Council held on September 8, 1961, discloses approval of this 12" and 10" water lines on both sides of Morrell and Gunville's property, and the record reads "Councilmen Morrell and Stevens abstained from voting." WHY, Mr. Morrell? Why, Mr. Watchdog of the public's interests? You were the instigator of this plan to install these lines around your property. No other Councilman profited but YOU. Maybe your abstaining from voting made it legally defensible, but did it make it honest? Did it make it morally defensible? Were not there other areas in the city sorely in need of new water lines at that time where hundreds of property owners would benefit like perhaps Pittman and Tract No. 2 around Major Avenue?

These records are available to anyone at the City Clerk's office in city hall. Do you say these records are false, Mr. Morrell?

Do you say it's untrue, Mr. Morrell, that you PRESENTLY own acreage which was city land which was originally sold to someone else and that you later bought it from that party? We say you did. Didn't you say publicly for the benefit of the press that you felt it was improper for a Councilman to buy land from the City? Is this YOUR way of doing it? Buying it indirectly, Councilman Morrell?

Thank you for laying claim to being the "Watchdog of the public's interests" Mr. Morrell. If you hadn't, it's possible these things might never have come to light.

Elect a man who will have no personal reason to "pass" his vote on the City Council.



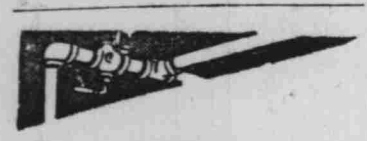

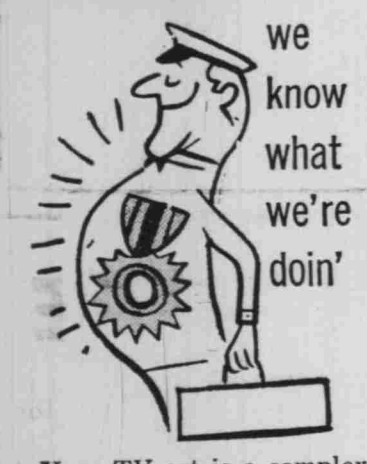

Salute To Coast Guard And More Boating Safety

By Virginia Morrison
A group of four men, with headquarters in Boulder City, are taxed with the great responsibility of making users of the lakes on the Colorado River safe and happy while they enjoy the facilities offered in boating, fishing, skiing and swimming.

They are Nick Galash, BM-2, Bill Harbison, BM-3, A1 Keith and En-3 Richard Carter of the U.S. Coast Guard. Galash is the officer in charge and the pretty office is maintained at the corner of Colorado and Ash Streets.

Their duties stem from the Boat Act of 1958 which entitles states to issue boat numbers with state boating regulations. The primary purpose here is boating safety and enforcement of the boating act concerning pleasure craft and vessels for hire.

The secondary purpose is search and rescue, either on the scene, or called by another agency to give an assist.

Thirdly, the Coast Guard makes on scene investigations of accidents, and according to Galash, the men have boarded 6,000 boats since starting the unit in Boulder City last May. This included inspecting equipment on the boats and in addition the contacting of another 1,000 boats, not on water, and giving assistance in safety matters.

The men have issued approximately 50 licenses to operators of vessels for hire and have given lectures on safe boating to various organizations. To date, over 4,000 persons have been contacted in this fashion.

"Most accidents on the Colorado River involve one boat," Galash stated. "Its a case of either being pulled into the screw (propellor) or

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the boat rolling over on the victim. The main reason for accidents is lack of common sense, the number one rule of good seamanship. Other basic rules cover most circumstances," he added.

"We are not picking on people when we board their boats and criticize their lack of necessary equipment. As an example — we boarded an open inboard ski boat on Lake Mohave and asked to see the fire fighting equipment in case the motor caught fire.

The owner responded with the answer that he knew he needed it and an examination of the boat disclosed that the stern was burnt out, but, evidently he had not learned his lesson — the extinguisher was still dry!

"People generally say that, in cases of collision with another boat, they were going slowly when the accident happened. Yet, one boat had gone through the hull of the other," Galash went on.

"Another violation against safety is riding on the bow of a boat. The danger in this lies in the fact that sudden maneuvering can throw the passenger into the water and the screws will automatically suck the person into them.

"Our area covers from Blyth, Calif. to the uppermost navigable part of Lake Mead, including all of the Colorado River and the lakes on the river.

"We, my group, are all on general duty in the Coast Guard, but each has had other phases of Coast Guard duty. Each man here has been screened and has successfully completed a prescribed course set forth by the district commander to qualify for boating law enforcement.

"A refresher course is held every year at Long Beach and I generally participate in it. Weekly briefing sessions are also held locally, which I feel, keep the men ready for any type of duty which they might encounter, as well as making them more proficient in their present duties.

If a ticket for violation is given a boat owner, he is allowed two weeks in which to contact the commander of the 11th Coast Guard District. If the citation is not answered, the person is turned over to the U.S. Attorney in Las Vegas.

"In the case of arrest, we work with the U.S. Commissioner, in this case, Elton M. Garrett, and the U.S. Attorney. The violator is considered a federal holdover and is held in any jail where there are federal facilities. Arrest is made only for serious violations where a warrant is issued. We work directly under the Chief of Intelligence and Law Enforcement of the 11th District.

"Our work continues the year around and we are constantly circulating wherever boating congestion demands our presence. We now have two boats—a small one which is used on the smaller lakes and the new, large, jet boat used exclusively on Lake Mead.

"We are called a mobile unit, and it means just that. Our radio - equipped Coast Guard station wagon transports the smaller boat to wherever it is needed. The larger one is moored at the Lake Mead Marina.

"The Coast Guard is on a 24-hour standby at the station and there is someone in the office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. days and members may be reached at home in the evenings.

"Boaters are asked to feel free to call on us any time to check out registrations and numbers, see that life saving devices are regulation and to make sure fire extinguishers, horns and whistles are in working order. Equipment is determined by the size of the boat and brochures on safety are available at the office. . .

"In the case of an accident, we are available to help the person file his reports and if the accident should happen in another area, the boater may call this office collect.

"We work closely with the National Park Service and other state and federal agencies in search, rescue and enforcement.

"A group, which is invaluable to us, and which is rapidly enlarging its membership, is the Coast Guard Auxiliary. It is a civilian group and anyone interested in assisting the Coast Guard in teaching boating safety is encouraged to join. The local flotilla meets at the office every third Wednesday and the next meeting will be June 5. The group now has 20 members.

"Each must have a boat or a plane and part of the functions of the flotilla is to assist in patrolling regattas and search and rescue. "Classes on safety and courtesy boating are taught and members may issue the seal of safety decal to those abiding by the rules. The group also enjoys social gatherings.

"The morale of my men is important and the first requisite is an understanding wife. A Coast Guardsman may leave home this morning and not return for several days. His wife must realize that his duty is not an 8 to 5 job and that when he is called away, time doesn't stop until the work is completed.

"The four of us work in pairs, but change off regularly so that each may learn to work with everyone. Complaints, as well as daily problems with boaters, are ironed out immediately and the weekly briefing keeps everyone on his toes," Galash concluded.

As an after thought, he added that he is proud of his staff and said that their enthusiasm for their work, and the response from the general public makes for a good duty in Boulder City.

MORRY'S STORY

I think Frank Morrell would be doing himself and his community a great service if he voted for his opponent — Dale Roberts — on election day next Tuesday.

The big favor to Morrell will be fully appreciated by Morrell as more and more land deals come up for him to handle in his highly lucrative real estate business.

Each land deal involving city land — and most deals have and will be in that classification — calls for complications and conflicts of interest where a councilman is handling the deal on one hand for a client and serving in judgment on the deal as a councilman on the other hand.

Morrell as a real estate man has made a young fortune during the years he has been councilman.

He will make double and triple what he already has — in the years to come.

By dropping off the council, he will be free to make deals without entanglements, without having to straddle fences, without having to play one side against the other.

He will be giving a fairer break to the city, which is all we are concerned about as taxpayers and as proponents of a sound city government.

Much has been said about Morrell and his supposed anti-Polk public statements.

Yet, on Feb. 12 — of this year — less than three months ago — Morrell and Polk did some business where in Morrell acquired some Polk land.

A week or two ago, Morrell, as real estate agent for Mark Leff, and Harry Polk got together on some lots adjoining Trailer Estates.

So don't let anybody kid you about Morrell not dealing with Polk. The facts are there. He's entitled to deal — but the conflict of interest stands out like a sore thumb.

I still can't get over a deal where the city bought some used ground grading machinery from Mark Leff for \$19,000. Morrell sat on the council in November of 1961 and voted that the deal be made — yet he knew he was sitting there as Leff's agent.

Incidentally, the road grading equipment looked like a pile of scrap iron then and

still does — something that many cities would have relegated to the junk heap back when the Model T Fords were in style.

Morrell, while in office, sat there and recommended to his council to put thru a water line in the Vegas Wash area that threaded its way around some Morrell land and thus raise its valuation at least five times its original value — the city paying for the improvements, while just a few blocks away a developer had to put up his own money to get some improvements.

He sat on the council and knew that his real estate partner and fellow councilman — Jack Stevens — had bought a piece of land from BMI at a time that the land was asked for by the state of Nevada as a site for the multi-million dollar state girls school.

No one can tell me another councilman not involved with conflicting interests would have allowed this to happen.

A councilman free of entanglements would have stood up and been counted. Instead, Morrell stood up and defended Stevens!

A state institution in Henderson would have meant millions in business and general growth. Caliente wound up with the package despite the fact that doctors, mental authorities and juvenile care experts said it should be built here.

Morrell's biggest land involvement has been with Mark Leff, Los Angeles developer, who came in and bought 2269 acres of city land with a cash deposit of \$9800. The total selling price was \$455,472.50, payable over a long period of time.

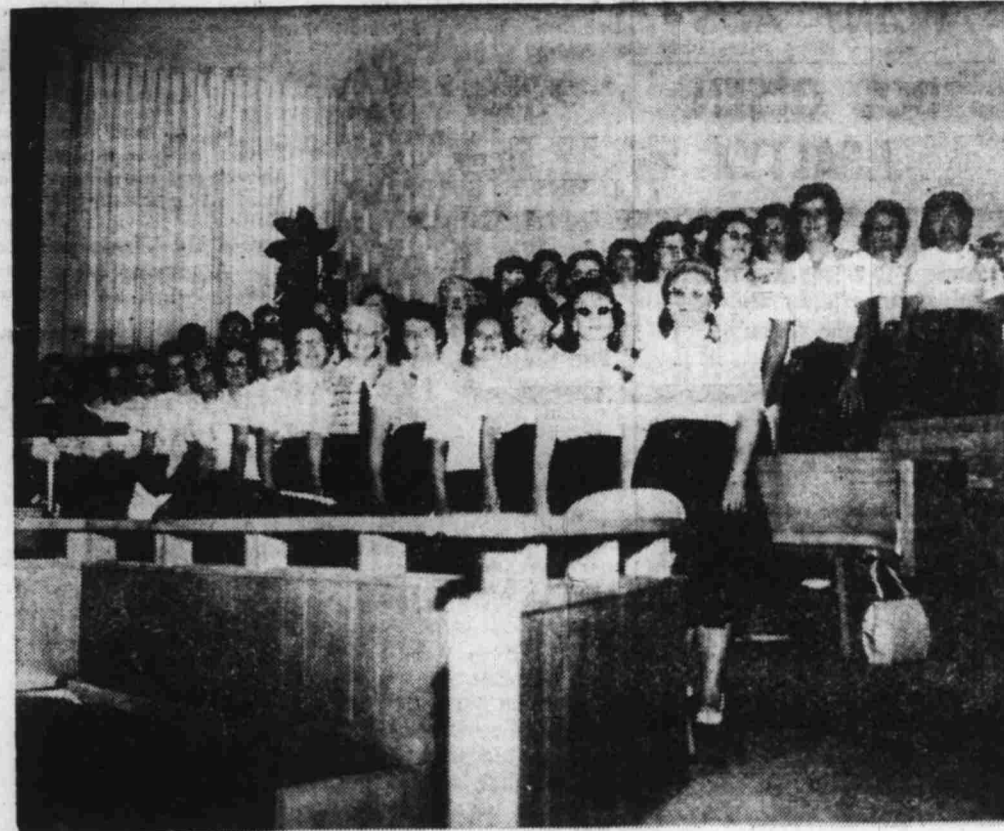
The land today is worth \$2 million dollars.

Morrell has been Leff's agent here from the start.

I could go on and on — but it makes me sicker by the word as I visualize Frank possibly being reelected to the council — which would be against the best interests of the citizens of this community.

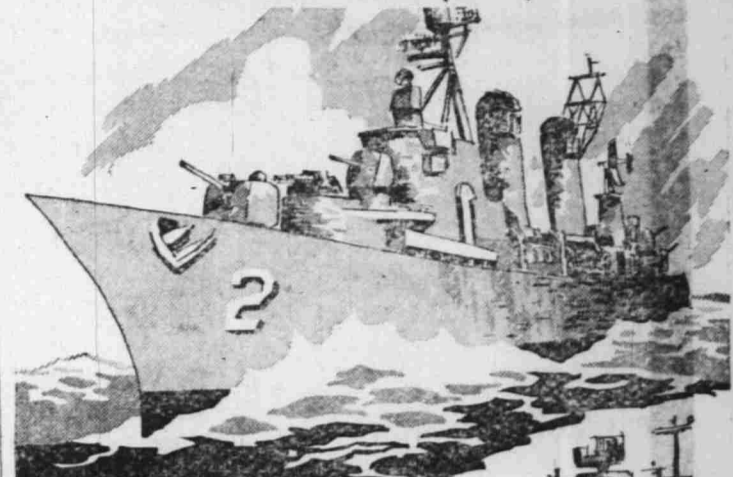

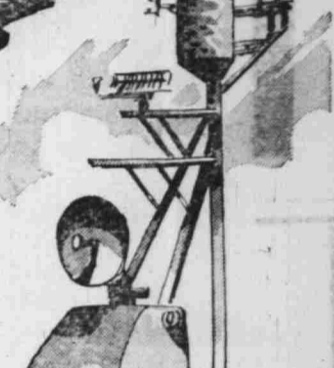
