Seating Of New Councilmen Heads Agenda For City Council Monday

Top item on the City Council's agenda Monday night at City Hall will be the swearing in of three new councilmen. Taking the oath of office will be Councilman Paul Marshall of Ward One; Councilman Ida Belle Riggins of Ward Three; and Councilman Dale Roberts of Ward Five. The ceremony will be pre-

ceded by the pledge of allegiance to the flag and the opening prayer. Holdover councilmen who will serve for another two years are Councilman Wilbur Hardy of Ward Two and Councilman Lorin Williams of Ward Four. Referred matters on the agenda include a tentative agreement with the Bank of

Las Vegas; the reading in full of the Roadside Peddlers Ordinance 320 and Solicitors Ordinance 319; and the proposed audit of the land program and utility connection fees. Deferred matters will be, Bank of Nevada as trustee of title of land in the Industrial Park; and the rezoning of a

portion of Section 20. New business expected to come before the Council includes the minutes of the June 13, meeting of the Planning Commission; filing notice of completion on the new City Hall; a package beverage license in the name of Anna L. Sessions at Ann's Bait and Tackle, 2001 North Boulder Highway. Also expected to be on the agenda is the appointment of a Decent Literature Committee; a memorandum by George Perkins on the engineering cost on acquisition and sale of federal land; and a report on Sunrise Subdivision I-B by City Administrator Harold Corbin.

Voters Here Follow State Trend; Defeat Sales Tax

Henderson voters Tuesday followed the trend of the rest of the state by turning down the proposed sales tax amendment. Voters here, however, failed to live up to past participation in elections.

This city has formerly led most of the state in percentage of voters going to the polls. They fell short Tuesday when an estimated 55 percent of Nevada's registered voters cast ballots in the special

election and only about 43 percent of Henderson's voters showed up at the polls.

Of 4047 registered voters here, only 1738 voted in the sales tax referendum. Of these, 699 voted "Yes," and 1029 voted "No."

The failure of the sales tax issue leaves the City as well as the schools in difficulty. One of the first unpleasant duties of the newly elected councilmen will be trying to

raise an additional \$65,000 or \$70,000 to balance the budget; or find a place where they can cut this amount from the budget, which has already been slashed in every conceivable place by the previous council members.

The County School District is in dire need of school buildings and additional teachers, to meet the educational needs of the exploding population. The State cannot, under the Constitution of Nevada, furnish money for school buildings and Clark County has \$16 million in school bonds which it cannot sell because bond sales have already reached the limit of taxable valuation in the County.

Senators Alan Bible and Howard Cannon have announced that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has given approval for a tentative entitlement of \$984,675 for the Clark County School District, with \$710,000 certified for immediate payment.

This help will undoubtedly be greatly appreciated but will not go far in helping to alleviate the critical needs of the School District.

CRC Consultant Speaks Today at Chamber Meet

Pat Head, consultant for the Colorado River Commission of Nevada, will be guest speaker today at the luncheon meeting of the Chamber of Commerce at noon in the banquet room at the Royal, it was announced by President Dan Reed.

Head, a former high official of the U.S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Reclamation, was personally appointed by Governor Grant Sawyer to fulfill the various negotiations for electrical power and the very important Southern Nevada Water Project.

Being eminently qualified to speak on the subject of the Colorado River Commission's problems and especially the water project for this area, Head will present a very informative program, President Reed said.

Also discussed will be the plans for a new highway billboard. Suggestions from the membership will be welcome.

Everyone is asked to "come as you are" and help make the sign more attractive.

Vice-President Frank Morrell will conduct the meeting in the absence of President Reed who will be unable to attend.

The Senate Interior Committee today sent to the floor a house-passed bill calling for the conveyance of 15,000 acres of federally-owned land to the city of Henderson, according to Senator Alan Bible.

Bible, who chaired the committee meeting which voted to favorably report the bill to the floor, said final senate passage of the measure would provide a firm base "upon which the future growth of Henderson will be assured."

The bill, sponsored jointly by senators Bible and Howard W. Cannon, calls for the sale, at fair market value, of the land to the city of Henderson for resale of industrial and other developmental purposes.

The measure was initiated by the Nevada senators upon requests from the Henderson municipal government whose officers pointed out that the industrial community's growth was threatened by federal ownership of land encircling the city which curbed all potential expansion.

Supreme Court Resolves Colorado River Dispute

Nevada Sen. Howard W. Cannon today said the recent Supreme Court decision resolving a water use dispute between states served by the lower Colorado River "may result in speeding construction of a southern Nevada water supply system, utilizing Colorado River water."

The ruling, handed down this week, held that Nevada is to be allotted 300,000 acre feet of Colorado River water each year, plus the acre footage from tributaries such as the Muddy and Virgin Rivers.

Cannon said that without such a ruling, it would be impossible to obtain Congressional authorization for construction of a municipal and industrial water development

in the Las Vegas-Eldorado Valley area.

The Nevada Congressional delegation — Cannon, Sen. Alan Bible and Representative Walter Baring — was successful in requests in 1961 for an \$85,000 authorization for the Bureau of Reclamation to conduct a feasibility study for the southern Nevada water system.

Cannon said today he has been informed that the study will be completed June 30.

If the report is favorable, the delegation will introduce bills to authorize construction of the water system.

Cannon said that without resolution of the water dispute, no Congressional action

would have been taken, even if the feasibility report were favorable.

Building Shows Slight Decline For Past Month

Building showed a slight drop in May with the total of new construction for the month recorded at \$105,330 as compared to \$139,477 during the month of April.

Total construction for the first five months of 1963 shows again of almost \$1 million over the same period in 1962 with \$683,954 as compared to this year's total of \$1,653,812.

During the month, 71 building permits, 76 electrical and 21 plumbing permits were issued by the city building department, according to Superintendent Pat Doherty.

Construction included four new commercial buildings valued at \$51,200; one new dwelling \$7000; 18 trailer space slabs \$7200; four aluminum siding to dwelling \$5640; one asbestos siding \$500; one aluminum roof \$150; 15 additions to dwellings \$14,118; one addition to commercial \$4000; 19 fences \$7342; 19 miscellaneous and four signs.

Salute To Coast Guard And More Boating Safety

A group of four men, with headquarters in Boulder City, are taxed with the great responsibility of making users of the lakes on the Colorado River safe and happy while they enjoy the facilities offered in boating, fishing, skiing and swimming.

They are Nick Galash, BM-2, Bill Harbison, BM-3, Al Keith and En-3 Richard Carter of the U.S. Coast Guard. Galash is the officer in charge and the pretty office is maintained at the corner of Colorado and Ash Streets.

Their duties stem from the Boat Act of 1958 which entitles states to issue boat numbers with state boating regulations. The primary purpose here is boating safety and enforcement of the boating act concerning pleasure craft and vessels for hire.

The secondary purpose is search and rescue, either on the scene, or called by another agency to give an assist. Thirdly, the Coast Guard makes on scene investigations of accidents, and according to Galash, the men have boarded 6,000 boats since starting the unit in Boulder City last May. This included inspecting equipment on the boats and in addition the contacting of another 1,000 boats, not on water, and giving assistance in safety matters.

The men have issued approximately 50 licenses to operators of vessels for hire and have given lectures on safe boating to various organizations. To date, over 4,000 persons have been contacted in this fashion.

"Most accidents on the Colorado River involve one boat," Galash stated. "It's a case of either being pulled into the screw (propeller) or the boat rolling over on the victim. The main reason for accidents is lack of common sense, the number one rule of good seamanship. Other basic rules cover most circumstances," he added.

"We are not picking on people when we board their boats and criticize their lack of necessary equipment. As an example — we boarded an open inboard ski boat on Lake Mohave and asked to see the fire fighting equipment in case the motor caught fire.

The owner responded with the answer that he knew he needed it and an examination of the boat disclosed that the stern was burnt out, but, evidently he had not learned his lesson — the extinguisher was still dry!

"People generally say that, in cases of collision with another boat, they were going slowly when the accident happened. Yet, one boat had gone through the hull of the other," Galash went on.

"Another violation against safety is riding on the bow of a boat. The danger in this lies in the fact that sudden maneuvering can throw the passenger into the water and the screws will automatically suck the person into them.

"Our area covers from Blyth, Calif. to the uppermost navigable part of Lake Mead, including all of the Colorado River and the lakes on the river.

"We, my group, are all on general duty in the Coast Guard, but each has had other phases of Coast Guard duty. Each man here has been screened and has successfully completed a prescribed course set forth by the district commander to qualify for boating law enforcement.

"A refresher course is held every year at Long Beach and I generally participate in it. Weekly briefing sessions are also held locally, which I feel, keep the men ready for any type of duty which they might encounter, as well as making them more proficient in their present duties.

If a ticket for violation is given a boat owner, he is allowed two weeks in which to contact the commander of the 11th Coast Guard District. If the citation is not answered, the person is turned over to the U.S. Attorney in Las Vegas.

"In the case of arrest, we work with the U.S. Commissioner, in this case, Elton M. Garrett, and the U.S. Attorney. The violator is considered a federal holdover and is held in any jail where there are federal facilities. Arrest is made only for serious violations where a warrant is issued. We work directly under the Chief of Intelligence and Law Enforcement of the 11th District.

"Our work continues the year around and we are constantly circulating wherever boating congestion demands our presence. We now have two boats—a small one which is used on the smaller lakes and the new, large, jet boat used exclusively on Lake Mead.

"We are called a mobile unit, and it means just that. Our radio-equipped Coast Guard station wagon transports the smaller boat to wherever it is needed. The larger one is moored at the

Lake Mead Marina.

"The Coast Guard is on a 24-hour standby at the station and there is someone in the office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. days and members may be reached at home in the evenings.

"Boaters are asked to feel free to call on us any time to check out registrations and numbers, see that life saving devices are regulation and to make sure fire extinguishers, horns and whistles are in working order. Equipment is determined by the size of the boat and brochures on safety are available at the office.

"In the case of an accident, we are available to help the person file his reports and if the accident should happen in another area, the boater may call this office collect.

"We work closely with the National Park Service and other state and federal agencies in search, rescue and enforcement.

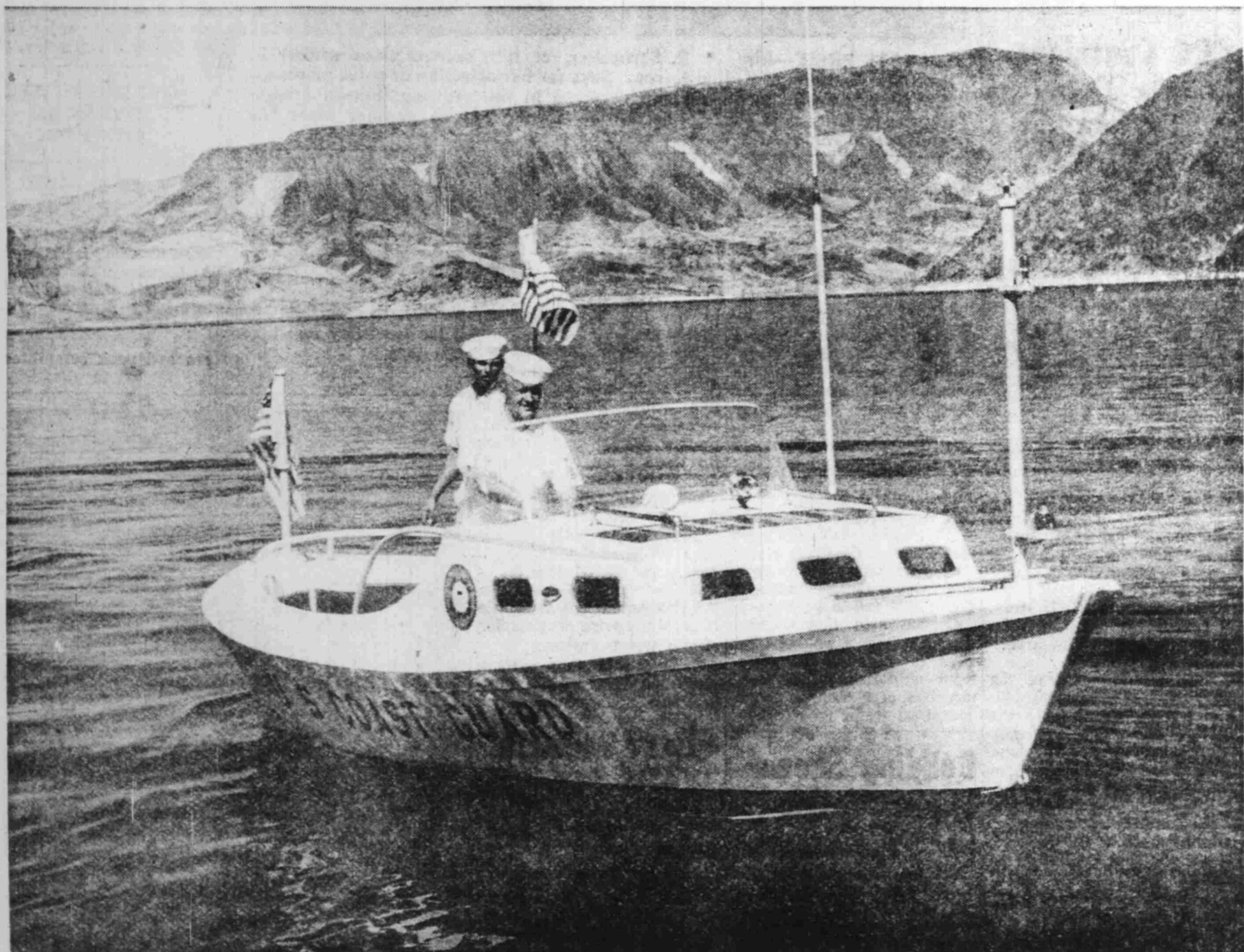
"A group, which is invaluable to us, and which is rapidly enlarging its membership, is the Coast Guard Auxiliary. It is a civilian group and anyone interested in assisting the Coast Guard in teaching boating safety is encouraged to join. The local flotilla meets at the office every third Wednesday and the next meeting will be June 5. The group now has 20 members.

"Each must have a boat or a plane and part of the functions of the flotilla is to assist in patrolling regattas and search and rescue. "Classes on safety and courtesy boarding are taught and members may issue the seal of safety decal to those abiding by the rules. The group also enjoys social gatherings.

"The morale of my men is important and the first requisite is an understanding wife. A Coast Guardsman may leave home this morning and not return for several days. His wife must realize that his duty is not an 8 to 5 job and that when he is called away, time doesn't stop until the work is completed.

"The four of us work in pairs, but change off regularly so that each may learn to work with everyone. Complaints, as well as daily problems with boaters, are ironed out immediately and the weekly briefing keeps everyone on his toes," Galash concluded.

As an after thought, he added that he is proud of his staff and said that their enthusiasm for their work, and the response from the general public makes for a good duty in Boulder City.

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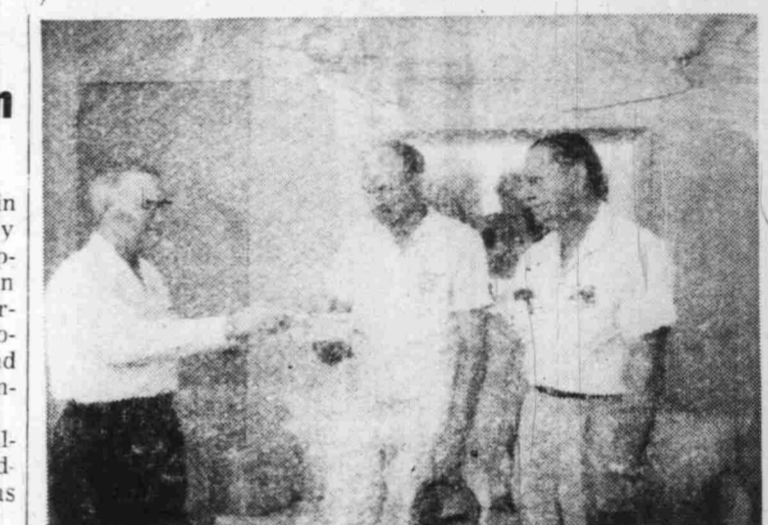
Three Pay \$175 OR 44 Days On DUI Charges

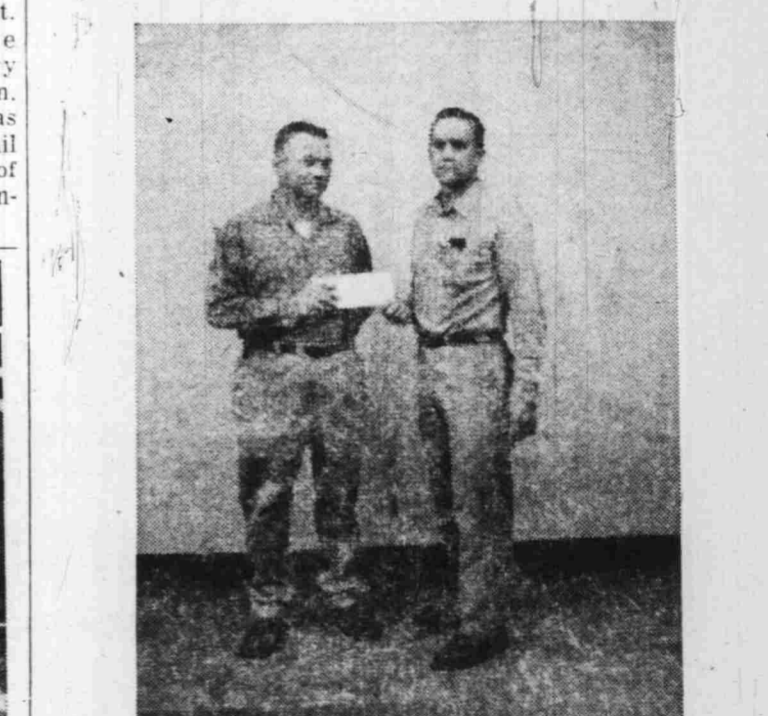
Henry Crandy Shumale, also charged with DUI, pleaded not guilty and trial was set for July 2.

Final plans for Nevada's 1963 big game season were set at a meeting of the Fish and Game Commission held May 25-26, with deer hunting season to open October 5 or 6, in most sections of the state.

There will be drawings for antelope, bighorn sheep and elk. The Commission announced that the price of resident antelope tags will be raised from \$7.50 to \$10, in keeping with the price of trophy tags for bighorn sheep and elk. Non-resident antelope deer tags will also be raised to \$10.

PRECIPITATION RECORD LOW ON MAY RUNOFF

Runoff prospects on the half the 8.3 million acre-foot Colorado River dropped again during May as precipitation on the watershed hit a near record low of 20 percent of normal, Regional Director A. B. West of the Bureau of Reclamation's Region 3 reported today.

Extremely light rain and snowfall dropped the October through May seasonal total to 78 percent of normal compared with 109 percent of normal for the same period last year, Director West said.

The Reclamation forecast for Colorado River runoff has fallen steadily during the past several months as a result of below-normal precipitation. The forecasted mean runoff of 4 million acre-feet issued last May 8 likely will be reduced when the next forecast is issued later this month, Director West said.

This year's April - July runoff on the Colorado River is expected to fall to less than

average for this period. Last year's runoff of 10.9 million acre-feet was 2.6 million acre-feet above average.

With releases at Glen Canyon Dam, 370 miles upstream from Hoover Dam, held to a minimum during May, the river's flow at Grand Canyon, Arizona, below Glen Canyon

Dam, was 78,800 acre-feet for the month.

Glen Canyon Dam's reservoir, Lake Powell, has stored 1,476,000 acre-feet of water to date, most of it since it began impounding most of the Colorado River's flow last March 13. Releases of water at Glen Canyon Dam will continue to be held to a minimum until

Lake Powell has stored a minimum power pool of approximately 6 million acre-feet, Director West said. Lake Mead at the end of May contained 20,197,000 acre-feet, a decrease of 857,000 acre-feet during the month. This storage content, compared with 21,920,000

acre-feet a year ago, is 8,230,000 acre-feet less than the reservoir's capacity. The reservoir above Hoover Dam is expected to drop about 49 feet between now and next April 1, during the filling of the minimum power pool storage in Lake Powell, Director West said.

All About Dogs

Mr. Lamps came by with his Pug the other day. Duke is certainly a nice dog and a real clown, like most Pugs. All they need is an appreciative audience of one to show their true sense of humor. Maybe it's the "ham" in them that makes them enjoy attending the American Kennel Club Obedience Trials.

The Pug's general appearance is decidedly square and cobby. Both the dog or bitch should weigh from 14 to 18 pounds, be compact with well-knit proportions and hardness of developed muscles.

The head is massive and round with a blunt, square,

black, muzzle and large, deep wrinkles. His little, thin ears are like black velvet. His bold dark eyes are very large and prominent, globular in shape with a soft and solicitous expression. They are very lustrous and, when excited, full of fire.

The tail is curled tightly over the hip and, if he has a double curl, that is perfection.

His short coat is soft and glossy and is either black, silver, or apricot-fawn in color or with a black line, or trace, extending from the top of the head to the tail.

The Pug seems to have originated in China where practically all of the short-faced dogs with tightly-curling tails have come from. He was first imported into England by traders from the Dutch East India Company and that seems to be the reason he is oftentimes called the Dutch Pug.

He soon became the favored pet of the English ladies of the nobility and his rise to popularity was rapid and deserved. The parent country did little to exploit the breed, and the credit for the acclaim with which the breed was received must go to two well-known British fanciers.

Lady Willoughby de Eresby of Greenhorpe and Mr. Morrison of Walham Green were the breed's sponsors. These two strains were interbred as their only difference was in color. The lady's dogs being a silver-fawn shade and the gentleman's dogs, a brighter golden color.

The black pug entered the picture years later and seems to have come from the Japanese Pugs. These were similar to our present day Toy Spaniels but with shorter hair. The Japanese Pugs were black, white, or both and I believe that is why many of our black Pugs have white on their chests and feet. There are also white Pugs, but they

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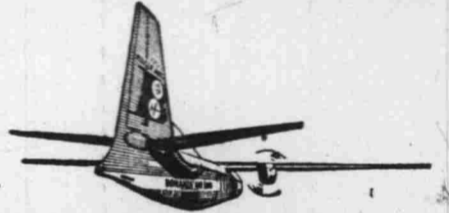

NO SERIOUS ACCIDENTS OVER HOLIDAY

Superintendent Charles A. Richey of Lake Mead National Recreation Area reported that, in spite of heavy recreational use over Memorial Day, no serious accidents or injuries occurred.

Statistics for the four days from May 30 to June 2, for the Boulder Basin, included: 3,424 boats; 7,042 fishermen; 7,948 skiers; and 33,796 swimmers. These figures are taken from the Boulder Beach and Las Vegas Wash facilities only. In addition, there were 826 wilderness campers in Boulder Basin and 8,346 people enjoyed picnicking at the established picnic grounds.

Visitation figures from Lake Mohave and the remote areas of Lake Mead were not available; however, the safety record indicates that the Memorial holiday was one of the safest in the history of the Recreation Area. Lake Mead National Recreation Area, the third largest unit in the National Park System, is visited by some three million people annually for water recreation and camping. Present indications are that 1963 will be a record year for visitation.

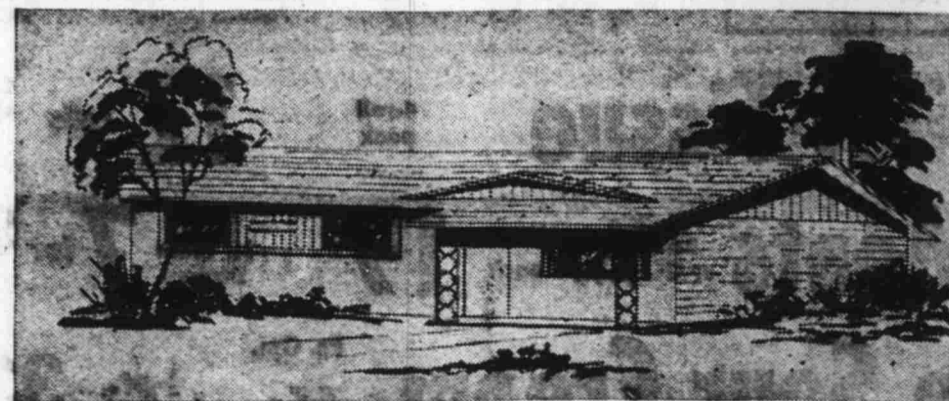

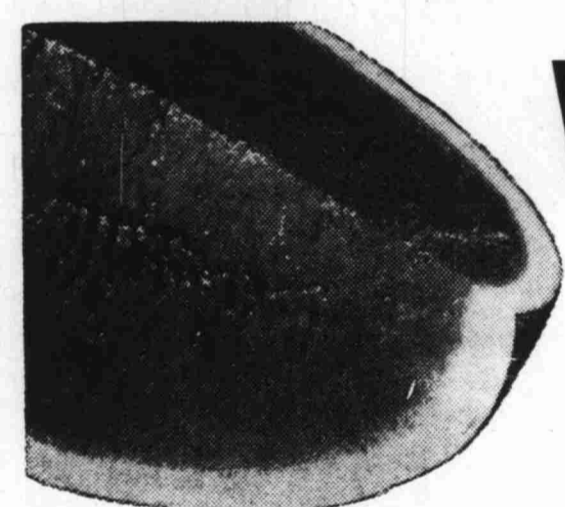

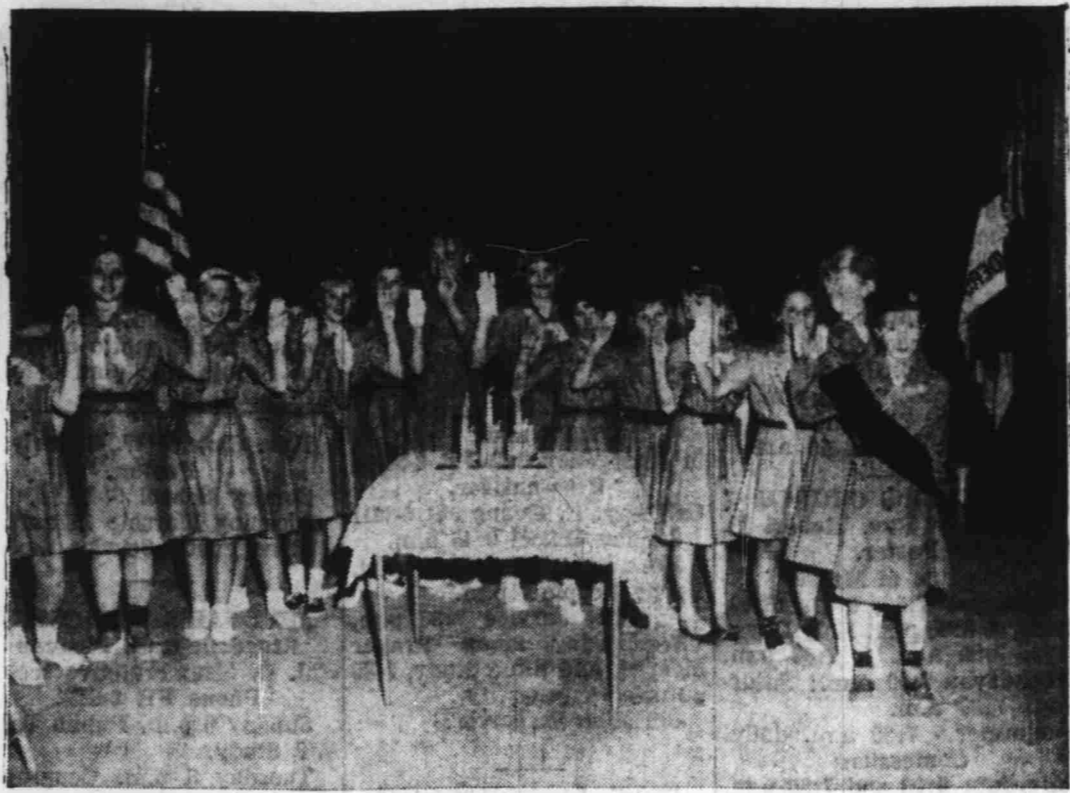

Am-Pot Executive Officer Speaks At Vegas Chamber

Peter Colefax, chairman and chief executive officer of American Potash & Chemical Corporation, will be the fea-

ture speaker at the Las Vegas Rotary Club luncheon to be held today at 12:15 p.m. at the Tropicana Hotel. Subject of his talk will be, "The Chemical Industry in the West."

Colefax, who arrived in this country from England in 1924, and later became a naturalized citizen, personifies the conscientious newcomer who finds the United States the land of opportunity.

The son of England's leading patent attorney, Sir Arthur Colefax, KBE, Am-Pot's chief executive officer was 21 at the time and the holder of a master's degree from Oxford University.

His first job was in the classified ad department of the New York Times and, in the ensuing decade, prior to joining AP&CC as secretary-treasurer in 1934, Colefax held jobs with several brokerage and banking firms. When he joined the company, its headquarters were located in New York City and its sole production facility was at Trona, Calif. Sales were run-

ning about \$6,000,000 annually.

Colefax became vice president in 1942, president in 1947, the year after AP&CC headquarters were moved to Los Angeles, and chairman of the board in September, 1961.

In May of this year, upon Colefax's recommendation, the board of directors elected P. S. Dunn president. The move permits Colefax, as chairman and chief executive officer, greater freedom to concentrate on the growth and development of the Company, and puts the new president, a member of the strong management team Colefax assembled, in closer contact with the day-to-day operations.

Under Colefax's direction, AP&CC has expanded from one plant at Trona to five plants and two research laboratories in five states. Product from a sixth plant at Mojave, Calif., is expected to be available in 1964. During the same period, the company also developed financial holdings in firms in England, France, Southern Rhodesia and India. Products produced by AP&CC have increased from less than a dozen to more than 200.

Colefax is a director and member of the Trust Committee of the Security First National Bank, and a member of the Advisory Board of the Investment Company of America. In the past he has

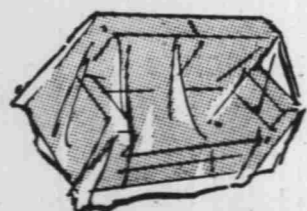
