

The Senate Interior Committee today sent to the floor a house-passed bill calling for the conveyance of 15,000 acres of federally-owned land to the city of Henderson, according to Senator Alan Bible.

Bible, who chaired the committee meeting which voted to favorably report the bill to the floor, said final senate passage of the measure would provide a firm base "upon which the future growth of Henderson will be assured."

The bill, sponsored jointly by senators Bible and Howard W. Cannon, calls for the sale, at fair market value, of the land to the city of Henderson for resale of industrial and other developmental pur-

The measure was initiated by the Nevada senators upon requests from the Henderson municipal government whose officers pointed out that the industrial community's growth was threatened by federal ownership of land encircling the city which curbed all potential expansion.

CHIPPED BEEF AND POTATO SCALLOP 1 cup boiling water 1 pkg. (3½ oz.) smoked sliced beef

1/2 cup chopped onion 3 large potatoes, peeled and cubed (4 cups)

(13/3 cups) Salt and pepper I tablespoon dried or fresh cut parsley (optional)

Melt butter in a large skillet. Pull beef into small pieces and cook gently in butter over low heat until edges begin to curl. Remove beef from pan and set aside. Add onion and potatoes to skillet. Cook over low heat until most of fat is absorbed and the onion is transparent, about 3 to 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add boiling water and evaporated milk; continue cooking over low heat until potatoes are tender and sauce begins to thicken, about 25 to 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add I teaspoon salt, a dash of pepper and beef; mix well and cook until heated through, about 3 to 4 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in parsley and serve. Makes 4







Ever wonder how to keep the youngsters from being bored during the holiday season when shopping, cooking or just plain housework keeps you busy? There's a wonderful way to keep children occupied - fingerpainting, and it's not only fun, but

Of course, there's the messiness to consider, but with some judicious use of the old-favorite, oil cloth, paint splotches or spilled water mean nothing. An oil cloth "drop" cloth placed on the working surface not only protects the area, but the colorful oil cloth patterns can lend a bit of "inspiration" to young artists. In addition, oil cloth aprons are easy and fun to make and can protect clothes from splashing paint. Fingerpainting is amazingly simple, and can often show the creative instincts of youngsters in such sophisticated areas as proportion or color harmony. Fingerpaints are easy to make, easy to use. The recipe for the paint is as follows:

Corn Starch Fingerpaint 1/2 cup Argo corn starch 1 cup cold water envelope unflavored gelatin

½ cup soap flakes or detergent Pure food colors Combine corn starch and % cup cold water; soak gelatin in remaining ¼ cup cold water. Stir hot water slowly into corn starch mixture. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture boils and is clear. Remove from heat; blend in softened gelatin. Stir in soap flakes or detergent until dissolved. Cool mixture, then divide into a different jar for each color. Stir food coloring into mixture in each jar to desired shade. Tightly covered finger-paint keeps indefinitely.

To use fingerpaint cut a piece of paper and wet it with a sponge. Place the paper on an oil cloth-covered working surface and smooth it flat. Put a large blob of the paint on the paper and spread it out, using both hands. Designs can be made by using abs and fingers; lettering or finer details can be achieved with fingertips and fingernails.

Fingerpainting is the reverse of regular painting. Color is not put in a particular spot, but instead the design is formed by pushing the color away from certain areas. With a little practice, your child-or you-can make a colorful series of "paintings," gift wrappings, holiday decorations or a wide variety of

> Colefax, who arrived in this country from England in 1924. and later became a naturalized citiezn, personifies the conscientious newcomer who finds the United States the land of opportunity.

The son of England's leading patent attorney, Sir Arthur Colefax, KBE, Am-Pot's chief executive officer was 21 at the time and the holder of a master's degree from Oxford University.
