What Others Think About The Charter

(Ed. note — Because of the tremendous community interest aroused by the City Charter proposal, the HOME NEWS today presents the first in a series of articles reflecting the views of other on this change in City Government.)

The Rev. Robert J. Nicholas, Vicar of St. Timothy's Episcopal Church, says:

"The City Charter proposal offers Henderson a more appropriate form of Government."

"The Mayor and Council type of city government was quite satisfactory for the small town rural community which characterized our country 50-100 years ago."

"We live now in a vastly different world. Henderson's needs are those of a modern city."

"The changes in our way of life which we have witnessed in our own lifetime make it mandatory that a modern city be free to seek the most competent administrative leadership available, whether within or beyond the city limits."

with the need to anticipate the future now so that Henderson may grow in an orderly, meaningful and economical manner.

"The Council - Manager type of city government will allow us to preserve our American heritage of democratic control through the election of the council members. The City Council in turn will be able to hire a specifically trained administrator as its chief executive for the city."

"Such a manager will have the technical skill to enable the citizens of the community to fulfill their purposes as expressed by their elected council members. This manager will also have the knowledge of the areas of concern which the city council should advance to avoid some irremediable problems."

"The changes in our way of life which we have witnessed in our own lifetime make it mandatory that a modern city be free to seek the most competent administrative leadership available, whether within or beyond the city limits."

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"Our heritage of representative government can be preserved through councilmen, elected by their fellow citizens, who will guide and work together with their trained administrator."

Robert Broabent, Councilman and first Mayor of Boulder City, and chair only at regular elections so the only cost of amending the charter is the cost of publication of the recommended change.

"We have worked with the State Legislature in having the Home Rule law broadened until it is very workable and the City and the people are better off under a Home Rule government. The mechanics of our charter can be copied which would save Henderson much preliminary work, and we would be happy to explain what parts of our charter might be changed to help your city."

Bill Mason Named Home News Editor

Appointment of William V. (Bill) Mason to the position as managing editor of the Henderson Home News is announced today by M. M. Zenoff, publisher of the Home News and the Boulder City News.

Mason took over the post Monday, Nov. 4. The appointment, Zenoff announces, is a significant part of the overall program for the Home News to keep pace with the growth of Henderson.

Future plans call for a continued strong editorial policy devoted to the city's problems; creation of an editorial page and human-interest columns; and more wide spread use of local photos and features.

Expanded mechanical facilities are also in the process of being added at the newspaper plant which will greatly enhance the appearance of the paper for both the reader and advertiser.

Continued emphasis will be placed on Henderson news and events, the publisher said, written by a local staff who is interested in the city's problems and progress.

Mason served in a similar capacity on the Cortez, Colo., Sentinel, a twice-weekly publication which for a period of three consecutive years from 1958 through 1961 was selected as the state's outstanding non-daily from a typographical and editorial ratings. In 1961 when the Sentinel was sold, he served as associate editor of Duran-

go, Colo., Daily Herald. Mason recently returned from Alaska where he was co-publisher of an Alaskan weekly in Kodiak.

The new managing editor is a graduate of Colorado State College where in addition to being the college edi-

tor was an all-conference basketball selection for two years.

Mason is the father of two grown daughters, Marlinda, former Miss Colorado in the 1959 Miss America pageant, and Judy, a TWA stewardess stationed in Boston, Mass.

He and his wife will live in Henderson.

Solicitors' Fee For Residents Reduced By \$15

The City Council at a special recessed session, yesterday amended the solicitors' fee ordinance for local residents from \$25 to \$10.

The amendment came two days after Leo Bryant, a pioneer of the city, had petitioned the council seeking a reduction in the fee.

Bryant had said that the \$25 fee and 15 day waiting period required by anyone selling from door to door has kept students and others from earning extra money.

However, to obtain a solicitors' fee for \$10, the applicant must be a resident of Henderson and the licensee must have been a resident for a period of not less than three years.

Half Of Stores Expect To Close Veterans' Day

PROCLAMATION City Attorney Due To Receive Petition Today

WHEREAS, the provision of educational opportunity in our community is an eternal debt of this generation to the next, and

WHEREAS, education is an essential basis for America's freedom, security and prosperity, and

WHEREAS, education is confronted by unparalleled problems, such as shortages in teacher supply, classrooms, and finance, which can be solved only by public understanding and public action, and

WHEREAS, a rapidly changing world requires that education change to meet new challenges without diminishing the traditional American appreciation of the worth of the individual, the obligations of responsible citizenship, the dignity of constructive employment, and the value of the basic moral and spiritual values,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, William B. Byrne Mayor of the City of Henderson, Nevada do hereby designate November 10-16, 1963, to be American Education Week and urge all citizens to acquaint themselves more fully with the programs and needs of education and to rededicate themselves to strengthening and improving this essential safeguard of our nation.

Mrs. Harper said she had no idea as to the number of valid signatures.

It was brought out at the regular meeting of the city council on Monday night that the city attorney is tied up with a murder trial at the present time and the Assistant City Attorney Bill Devlin would take no part in validating or invalidating any of the signatures.

Council Okays 2 More Policemen

The City Council in a recessed session last evening at 5 p.m. authorized the employment of two additional members to the police department, a request which had been submitted to the Council at the regular meeting Monday by Chief George Crisler.

Chief Crisler appeared before the council again last night after a conference with City Auditor Bob Adams and said that by effecting economies in the use of squad car purchases and cutting other corners the department would be able to set aside \$1012 per month for salary payments for another investigator and a combined patrolman and jailer who would supervise the prisoners. Provision for salaries for the two men would be made in the next budget.

Henderson Nimrod Bags 210 lb., 4-Point Buck Near Cave Valley

There will be venison in the Richard Elbertson home at 101 C Victory Village this winter as the head of the

household brought home a 210 pound four point buck Sunday — the result of a successful hunt in the Cold Springs - Cave Valley area about 30 miles south of Ely.

Elbertson, a resident of southern Nevada for 27 years, has stalked his game every year since he moved here and has generally been successful.

their game. Both men are employees of the Clark county highway department.

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Traveling Museum Tours State With Nevada Centennial Exhibit

The Nevada State Museum has started to carry the message of the Centennial year throughout the state via its famous Mobile Unit.

The "traveling museum's" tour this year will reach virtually every Nevada community, carrying a special exhibit covering Nevada's history. It will be open to the public wherever it stops.

Normally the mobile unit, a specially designed, 35-foot trailer, takes exhibits to the state's school children who might not be able to get to Carson City. Because of the growth of enrollment and the

number of schools, the unit usually tours the northern half of the state one year, the southern half the next.

All tours, including this year's are financed through funds donated by individuals, businesses, and the Max C. Fleischmann Foundation of Nevada.

"We have modified our regular schedule this year to cooperate with Nevada's Centennial celebration," said Calhoun. "It will be open not only to school children, but to adults as well."

In addition to the regular school hours, said Calhoun, the mobile unit will be open from 7 p.m. on each evening to accommodate the general public.

The traveling museum contains 10 cases with exhibits on immigration and settlement, Nevada's early governors, the legislature, mining, ranching, Nevada's part in the adoption of the Thirtieth Amendment, the Chinese in Nevada, lumbering, the Pony Express and transportation.

Dr. Otto Ravenholt and his wife Maria and their three youngsters have joined our community. They are at present living in a local motel while waiting for their new home to be completed.

Dr. Ravenholt is the new head of the Clark County Health Department. Grati-fied by the voters approval of the new health center Dr. Ravenholt is looking forward to the great potential development challenge of Clark County's health program.

Of Danish background Dr. Ravenholt started life on a farm in Wisconsin. He is one of nine children (he has four brothers and four sisters), all of whom have worked their way through college and have gone into different fields such as research, library, and medicine.

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Mogensen Trailer Contrasts Former Concept Of Mobile Units

Mobile homes today are quite different from those of years gone by. As different from the gypsy's wooden box home on wheels or prairie schooner as can be, these ultra modern trailers of today rival the modern mansion.

Most mobile homes bought now are packaged deals—they come complete in every detail, including the furniture.

Sgt. and Mrs. G.L. Mogensen have a lovely trailer home that they furnished completely themselves. None of their furniture came with this trailer, however there are some cabinets that were built in at their request.

The trailer is 55 feet long and 10 feet wide. The first room at the front of the trailer is the kitchen. Here there are dark wood cabinets with glass fronts above and wooden fronts on the under cabinets. A long mirror separates them and gives the room a feeling of depth.

Elma's sewing machine is in the corner in its wooden cabinet. The dining table is round and had a lovely bright floral arrangement on top. The wooden chairs are in the modern colonial style and are padded. Appliances are in pink. The stove and oven are large, the latter big enough to cook a hugh turkey.

Double sinks are in the work area. The work area is curved and is finished with a splash wall of marble design. This curved section extends as the dividing unit between the kitchen and the living room. Also in the kitchen is storage space built in and around the refrigerator.

Overhead thruout the trailer are hanging lamps, either in the spot lamp or hurricane lamp style, depending upon their use.

The living room is four feet wider than the rest of the trailer, giving a total width of 14 feet here. A huge hide-a-bed sofa is flanked with maple end tables. On the tables stand tall antique golden candlebra lamps.

Directly across the room is a glass-fronted white oak cabinet that displays Elma's cream and sugar sets and her china figurines. To the right, and next to the divider, is a corner china cabinet with a glass front.

In front of the cabinet is an easy chair with a generous sized free standing ash tray beside it. Usually kept on this chair's arm is the remote control unit for the television set. Another easy chair is here, too.

The television set appears to be built in, it fits so well against a recessed shelf on the large hutch. The cabinet is so large it seems to take up the entire wall next to the hallway.

Of a lovely warm wood, the hutch is topped with a clock that tells time on a moving cylinder. The hand on this clock does not move because the numbers do. On each side of the clock is a set of mugs.

Small hurricane lamps are on the shelves here too. The end lamps are ready for use if there should be a power failure, and they have been used.

Down the darkened hallway, the windows are lined with foil. Both Mogy and Elma work varying hours. Their bedroom is at the far end of the trailer. Plenty of space here. Individual modern bedside tables are attached to the wall on each side of the large double bed. There are individual reading lamps over the bed. A tiny TV set is here, too. The closets are big with ample storage space above and below them.

The bathroom is the next room passed on the way up the hall. Large in size, it has a mirrored vanity and ample storage space here for linens.

The next and last room up the hall is Mogy's den. It is furnished with a desk, shelves and cabinets. On the walls are certificates earned by Mogensen for different courses of study he has taken in police and F.B.I. work. Another frame holds shoulder patches from different places where he has worked as a security guard. He keeps his police books in here, too and in the closet, his police uniforms.

Back to the living room. Elma has used braided rugs in various useful places. One long braided rug is the runner down the hallway. The living room and entrance have wall to wall carpeting.

Mogy and Elma have a lovely home that shows so very well how mobile homes have changed. From the day of the gypsy to their modern comfortable home is quite a change indeed.

man of the charter committee, says:

"I firmly believe and recognize the Home Rule Charter type of government as the best form of government for a community. Under the state laws and by virtue of our special charter, we have freedom of activity and more home rule.

"We recognize that there are some things that need to be corrected in our charter, but most of them are where the state law has been adopted by reference instead of having the items spelled out in the charter. They are mostly concerning the planning commission and such things. However, the people are protected under the charter, and specifically where land is concerned.

"Our charter has been in force four years and we have had it amended only once. Our charter specifies that amendments will be made P.T. JACK STEVENS, Former City Councilman, does not favor the charter type of government. He says:

"I am in favor of the Mayor - Council type of government, but since the charter petition has been filed, I would like to examine the charter in detail before voicing an opinion on it.

"I believe that the present City Council, Mayor and City Attorney are more familiar with the needs of the City, as to the type of charter which would best fit Henderson, and such a charter could be submitted to the legislature for approval.

"In the last legislative session, A.B.4 was introduced and referred to a committee for action. This Assembly Bill would eliminate all the charters in the state and in effect a state law would be established whereby each city could determine what type of operation it would select.

"In this law, one city may elect a mayor - council type of government; whereas, another city would elect the manager - council type of government.

"Each city in the state was furnished copies of the charter proposed by A.B.4 and requested to submit recommendations prior to the next legislature in January 1965.

"In the event this bill is adopted, all present charters would be eliminated and all cities would operate within the framework of the state law.

When asked if he had given any thought to filing for the Charter Committee, Stevens said, "I would not desire to serve on the committee as I am not in favor of this type of charter."

DALE BROCKETT, Boulder City Councilman, when asked if he thought the charter would be beneficial for Henderson, said:

"Yes, I believe it will work for Henderson. The towns of Henderson and Boulder City are different in many respects but the people are the same and home rule should work for the people of Henderson just as it has worked for us.

"We have had to make changes under the charter, but a charter is flexible and can be changed by the people of the city, not by the legis-

Polygraph Tests Described Here

How a Polygraph of "Lie detector" operates was described to members of the Rotary Club at this week's meeting by Jack J. Adams, investigator for the Clark County District Attorney's office.

Respiration, blood pressure and the nervous system, three body reactions which a person cannot control, are used as the basis for the operation of the Polygraph, Adams said.

Reaction of the nervous system is measured from the moisture which appears on the palm of the subject's hand.

Adams said that while the Polygraph itself is 100 per cent accurate, the interpretation of the results is left to the examiner.

The first objective, Adams stressed, when questioning a subject is to determine the normal pattern. No two people have the same normal pattern, and a series of questions are then given to the subject, some of which are irrelevant and some relevant to the desired information which the investigators are seeking.

Lie detector tests are not admitted into court unless both attorneys approve, but they are valuable in determining the innocence of suspects who are not involved in any crime. Adams gave examples of suspects who were cleared when some of the witnesses were submitted to the lie detector test.

Permission must be granted by each subject to taking the test. A suspect cannot be forced to submit to the test, Adams pointed out.

The Clark County Sheriff's office has a polygraph for use in its investigative work and Adams has taken special training in its operation. He has examined 15 suspects in the past two months.

Costs of taking the test range from \$50 to \$100 per subject prior to the acquisition of the polygraph when an expert was brought to Las Vegas to use the device.

The Polygraph and Adams are available to city police in the county as well as to county investigations.

Propose Joint Installation On Golf Course Water Lines

Postal receipts in Henderson are up a whopping 31.8 per cent for the first nine months of 1963 as compared to a similar period of last year, according to a report from Southern Nevada prepared and published by the Bank of Nevada.

However, for the same three-quarters of the year construction permits and housing are down.

At the end of the first nine months in 1962 a total of \$3,948,261 in construction permits had been issued as contrasted to only \$2,467,094 for the first three quarters of the current year or a decline of 37 per cent.

Residential building permits show a slight decline with 90 valued at \$1,242,550 issued for the first nine months of 1963 as compared with 113 valued at \$1,488,729 last year - a decline of 1.6 per cent, according to the report.

On a county-wide basis school enrollment totaled 49,567 students in 1963 - an increase of 8,860 or 21.7 per cent over last year.

Travel to the Lake Mead National Recreational area totaled 5,885,020 for the first nine months of 1963 compared to 4,691,150 in 1962 - or an approximate gain of 15 per cent.

October building permits released from the office of Pat Doherty, superintendent of building and safety, revealed permits totaling \$195,779 for the month which reduced the overall drop from last year.

Included in the October picture were 65 building, 107 electrical and 15 plumbing permits.

THREE CHARGED WITH DUI DRIVING

Three motorists, charged with driving while under the influence, were found guilty by Municipal Judge Earl Davis, Tuesday and ordered to pay fines of \$175 or serve 30 days in jail. The three who entered guilty pleas were Alvin Lloyd, Prutoso Duran and David Urioste.

Leading off the parade was a \$122,000 permit for the new bank of Las Vegas building and a \$20,300 permit for a commercial addition to Dick Stewart Motors.

In addition 34 addition to dwelling permits valued at \$7,488 were issued; six residential fences valued at \$1345; 14 miscellaneous concrete work jobs at \$5921; three signs valued at \$1855 and 1 remodeling Townsite house relocated, at \$7500.

The added October total reduces the drop in building permits from 1962 to approximately \$1.3 millions.

There were approximately 794 inspections made by the building and safety department during the past month.

Action Delayed On Injunction And New Trailer Ordinances

The long agenda facing the City Council Monday night was shortened by the tabling of three ordinances scheduled to be read in full at the meeting.

The ordinances, delayed to allow Building Superintendent Pat Doherty time to study them, were the Plumbing Ordinance (331), the Trailer Parks Ordinance (332), and the Mobile Home Code (333).

Also delayed was action on the injunction brought against the City and the City Council by developer Harry Polk, whose construction at Trailer Estates has been stopped pending the passage of the ordinances concerning trailer parks and mobile homes.

Assistant City Attorney Bill Devlin advised the Council that a 15 day delay has been obtained and another 15 day extension will be granted if necessary.

The City Attorney had also been asked for a business license ruling on Harry Polk,

to determine whether all of the companies in which he is interested can operate or accept contracts under Polk's personal license.

Devlin said the ruling had not been determined as Manzonie has been tied up with a murder trial.

The Recreation Board Ordinance was read in full and adopted.

A quarterly report on the budget was given by City Auditor Bob Adams, who stated that expenditures for the first quarter are 26 percent over the quarterly budget while revenue for the same period is 31 percent over that forecast for the year.

The Council approved a zone variance for Dr. Melvin Bagley as recommended by the City Planning Commission, to allow an addition to Bagley's new home, now under construction, at Black Mountain Estates.

The meeting of the Council was recessed to reconvene later this week to take care of the unfinished business.

Watkins Dealer Seeks Relief From \$25 Fee For Solicitors

Leo Bryant, a pioneer resident of this city and a Watkins Products dealer here for many years appeared before the City Council Monday night to request relief from the solicitors' fee which he said is preventing him from getting help.

Bryant suggested that the ordinance might be changed where it affects anyone who has been in business here for a certain number of years. He told the Council that he is the Watkins Products dealer for all of Southern Nevada and it is harder to do business in Henderson than any other place in the area.

It was brought out that the solicitor's fee in Las Vegas is only \$15. Also pointed out was the fact that it would be virtually impossible for a customer to be cheated in any way by a Watkins Products salesman as no money is ever collected until after the merchandise is delivered to the customer.

Bryant conducted his business here for 11 years prior to the incorporation of the City and became the first

resident allowed by the city to conduct a business from his home.

He was granted a license by the first City Council, shortly after the incorporation, to continue to operate his Watkins Products dealership in his residence at 283 West Basic Road. This privilege was granted because of the fact that he had been conducting this business for so many years.

The City Council will discuss the fee structure of the solicitors' ordinance at a recessed meeting later this week. Even if the fee is reduced for a licensee after a certain number of years in business, all solicitors or salesmen must be investigated in accordance with the ordinance.

Bryant said he could understand the reasoning behind the ordinance although he has been employing salesmen here for the past 21 years without a single complaint from a customer.



Here we are in the month of November with the holidays already fast approaching. Many of us will be taking trips with our pets in the family automobile. As I have said before, I certainly hope they are good readers and do not jump around in the car. This can be a most dangerous distraction to the driver. Make sure your pet understands he is to stay in one place while riding.

If you have not had the time to train him and are planning a trip, fasten him with a short leash or a bench chain. (Bench chains can be purchased at most stores where pet supplies are sold.) If your car has something to

snap a hook on to, I prefer the bench chain. It eliminates tying and untying and can not be chewed. (I should never use the words can not with dogs. Especially after I have patched innumerable holes in chain-link fences from puppies teething their way right on through.)

Be sure and keep the leash short enough or the windows closed far enough so the dog can not fall out. It always has upset me when I see a dog allowed to ride with his head out the window. Besides the danger of an eye injury, there is always the chance of his falling out from the car making a sudden stop.

Ask your veterinarian for tranquilizers or motion sickness pills if your pet gets exceptionally restless or car sick on long trips. Many pets will overcome this nervousness if you take them for a trip around the block fre-

quently and gradually extend the time as you see improvement.

A Boxer I once had would start panting and drooling the instant she got in the car and would get sick before we had gone half a block. Finally one day I opened all the doors and windows, told her to get in, and then gave her a good talking to without my even getting in the car. She stopped looking sick and started looking foolish. After a few months of short rides, she became a joy to take along.

A good rule I like to follow is to never let your pet out on the driver's side. Always tell him to stay of wait as you get out. Enforcing this command with a tap on the nose if he starts toward the open door.

It only takes a moment of your time to go around the car to the right side and may save your pet from being hit by oncoming traffic. Unless

your dog is obedience trained, keep him on a leash going to and from your car. This is definitely recommended when going to the veterinarians or visiting friends.

O'Callaghan Heads Xmas Seal Drive

Donal N. "Mike" O'Callaghan, Director of the Department of Health and Welfare, has been named chairman of the 1963 Christmas Seal Campaign, to be launched here November 15 by the Nevada Tuberculosis and Health Association.

The appointment was announced today by Russell Spillman, President of the association. In a statement emphasizing the reasons for the choice, he said, "During the coming year, more than ever in the past, our counter-attack against disease will focus not only on the increasing rate of TB in Nevada but on the entire spectrum of RD—Respiratory Diseases, the disorders of breathing.

When we realize that this group of ailments is the fourth largest killer in the United States, and Nevada is the second highest state in the Nation with largest percentage of TB cases, it's obvious that a tremendous job is waiting to be done in addition to our continuing campaign to wipe out TB.

To help us meet that challenge, the importance of this year's Christmas Seal Campaign must be clearly emphasized to every resident of our state. We feel that O'Callaghan is eminently qualified to fulfill that task, and have complete confidence in a record outcome and full support of all in the drive, under his direction".

O'Callaghan said he would immediately take steps to complete organizational plans for the drive, and invited all prior volunteers and

those desiring to help for the first time to join in this worthy work. "I am confident," he said, "that the people of all 17 counties will want to give us one hundred per cent support".

Russell Spillman, President of the Nevada Tuberculosis and Health Association and Edward Young, NTA Representative announced today that applications for re-

search grants awarded by the American Thoracic Society, medical section of the National Tuberculosis Association, will be received between now and December 15, 1963.

Grants will be awarded for medical and social research in the field of respiratory diseases, including tuberculosis, for the year beginning July 1, 1964.

Don't Buy 'Bootleg' Items As Official Centennial Souvenirs

"Look for the official centennial seal."

That's the advice Thomas C. Wilson, chairman of the Nevada Centennial Commission, has given to prospective advertisers or purchasers of souvenir novelties.

Wilson was calling attention to an increasing volume of sales appeals that are being made in the name of the Centennial Commission and with the representation that the merchandise has official sanction.

"As interest grows in the coming Centennial observances," he said, "we have been informed of a number of private ventures, totally unrelated to the Nevada Centennial state or county activity, and unauthorized by the Centennial Commission."

These products, he continued, are identified only with the word "Centennial", and their purveyors evidently feel that they are beyond legal action, even though they

use the word to suggest that the items have been given official approval.

"If the buyers wish to know if a publication or a souvenir or a souvenir coin, is an official Centennial item," Wilson said, "all they need to do is to demand to see if the official Centennial Seal appears on the publication or the merchandise."

Wilson explained that Centennial participation is not exclusive but is open to everyone. But it does require the payment of certain fees and royalties that are used to help defray the expenses of the Centennial, he noted.

"The 'bootleg' centennial publications and items may do real harm to the various committees and legitimate concerns who are operating under proper authorization from the Commission," Wilson said.

"Look for the Centennial Seal and be sure," he concluded.
