# Mayor's Boss Has Suggestion for Charter Leaders

In a point-blank attack on the efforts to call for a vote by the people via the charter petition, H. L. Polk, Mayor Bill Byrne's employer, has asked two former council members, Frank Morrell and Bob Kesterson, why they don't try the recall petition route instead of possibly costing the people of Henderson \$20,000 in useless elections.

In "An Open Letter" brought to the Home News office on Thursday following the council's vote to invalidate the second charter petition on Wednesday, Polk, a Las Vegas resident, declared: "Now that the second charter petition has also been declared invalid by the unanimous vote of the City Council, it must be apparent to

a lot of people in Henderson that ex-Councilman Morrell and ex-Councilman Kesterson — the leaders in this smoke screen movement to evict the Mayor from his office — just can't seem to get the job done by this method."

### TELL THE TRUTH

"Therefore, I have a suggestion to make. Why don't you two fellows stop handing

out a lot of talk about commissioner form of government being better for Henderson and tell the truth for a change as to what you're trying to accomplish."

Polk continued, "If you, Morrell, must get even with the Mayor for criticizing you and getting in the way of your using your office for major advantages for yourself and your clients while

you were on the Council, and if you, Kesterson, can't get over the fact the Mayor saved the people of Henderson from going backwards instead of forward by beating you for the office of Mayor in a fair election, then was don't you try a recall petition to have him removed?" "Could it be that you don't dare try that route because it probably would disclose

the hundreds of thousands of dollars he has saved this City by his experience, ability, and know-how?" Polk asked.

"The wonderful development Henderson has enjoyed since he has been Mayor, and the hundreds of thousands of dollars he has directly and indirectly been instrumental in bringing into Henderson for investment by

many people who otherwise wouldn't have given Henderson a thought," Polk stated. Continuing the Mayor's employer said, "I wonder how many people in Henderson, for example, would then learn that Mayor Bill Byrne saved the city about \$315,000 in the purchase of that 6,000 acres of land the CITY bought merely by his knowing where to go, who to see, and how to argue successfully for a reduction in the price," Polk stated.

"When a city saves \$315,000, the people save it." "Yes, gentlemen, why don't you try that recall petition route instead of possibly costing the people of Henderson \$20,000 in useless elections. Just a suggestion," the Open Letter to Morrell and Kesterson concluded.

All of her personal bedroom furniture was also destroyed in the fire.

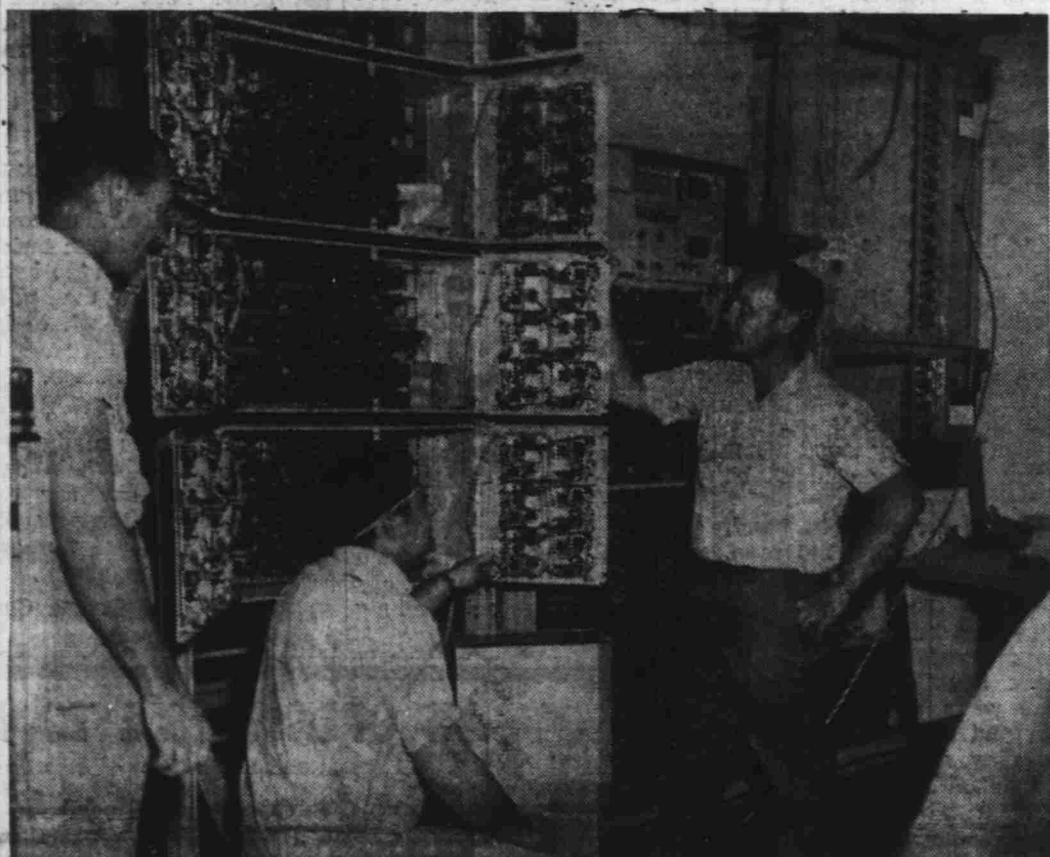
Her 8-year old son picked up his 2-year old sister and ran outside of the bedroom and neither was burned.

## Telephone Company Ready For Free Area Dialing

President Hershel Trumbo of the Henderson Telephone Company told the HOME NEWS yesterday that all facilities necessary for free area dialing have been installed and with the exception of a certain amount of testing that should be done, the company is ready to perform this service.

The exact date on which free dialing will start is not known as the date on which the Central Telephone Company will complete its installations has not been learned and no announcement has been made by the Nevada Public Service Commission.

As soon as this information is available to the local Telephone Company, it will be released to the residents here.

Construction necessary for the free area dialing has taken 18 months, Trumbo said, and equipment alone cost the Telephone Company approximately \$250,000 with many other expenses involved.

It is believed by many that this new service will be very beneficial for Henderson as many businesses and residents, who have constant need for communication with persons or business places in

Las Vegas, prefer not to locate in a toll area.

Another project of the Henderson Telephone Company, to make nation-wide dialing possible, is progressing on schedule and should be ready to start on February 15, Trumbo said.

When this new service becomes effective, Henderson will go directly from the local office to the San Bernardino nation-wide switching center by use of microwave instead of copper lines.

All digit telephone numbers was one of the first steps necessary to the nation-wide dialing service.

## End Of Smoke, Dust---We Hope

Installation of a "scrubber" unit at a cost of \$33,000 which will eliminate dust and smoke from the hot mix and gravel plant just off Sunset Road in the Pittman area, was announced today by H.W. Polk of the Henderson Industrial Park, Inc.

The plant was closed down over the past week-end to accomplish installation of the scrubber unit.

One of the workmen at the plant said that when there was no wind that tiny particles of dust — like snowflakes would settle over the area, and ventured the opinion that it had the same effect on the surrounding areas when it was carried by breezes.

Since the plant's erection and operation, volumes of dust and smoke have frequently blanketed the Pittman areas and extended into the Henderson residential areas provoking widespread criticism.

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## You're Right, It's Just Too Simple

Dr. Harold L. Miller, to the best of our knowledge, has not expressed himself as pro or con to the charter petition controversy.

Even after addressing the City Council, Wednesday, we don't know how he feels — but that's immaterial.

The doctor was at the council attempting to work out an arrangement to get water to his property in Section 19. He stayed on at the meeting to listen to the debate about what was legal and what was not, on the invalidated charter petition.

Apparently his calm was disturbed by the petty bickering and he came up with a common sense suggestion — a rare occurrence in those chambers.

At the time he made his proposal he frankly admitted, "It probably is too simple."

To refresh your minds, he suggested that the forms for the petition be placed in a convenient location at the city hall. City employees would check the validity of the singer against voting records and also serve as witnesses to the signature. Surely the city attorney could not object to such precautions.

The good Doctor continued "It is apparent that at least one-fourth of those who voted at the last election are interested enough to ask for the privilege of voting on the issue."

He continued that the city employees, even the Mayor and councilmen are paid by city taxes, and they would

be serving the general public or an expression we once used "public servants" — whatever became of the full implication of those two words?

His plan of procedure was just too simple — too uncomplicated for the advocates as well as the opponents of the charter petition. It left both sides stunned and without words to answer.

Now if he had proposed that the signatures on the petition be obtained at night and only by knocking at the back door and witnessed by a committee of six, three pro-petition and three anti-petition with a Socialist notarizing the document — that situation would have been intriguing and loaded with political enticement good for barrels of charges and anti-charges. That is a situation which they could have fathomed without any trouble.

But to use a public building for a public service and put some people to work and take them away from their coffee mugs was an unspeakable proposal and not worthy of an answer.

Dr. Miller not only did not get an answer. He did not receive a comment.

That should be a lesson to a novice in the field of politics — we can stand anything but straight forward, common sense suggestions. It was non-political. It made sense. It was uncomplicated. It was simple. Who wants all of that?

Just us poor old taxpaupers.

They too, were unable to find the cause of the mysterious smoke and two building inspectors came to see if the pipes to the new furnace were setting on the wood in the rafters. All this time, nothing but the pilot light on the furnace would work, so we were freezing inside the house.

The building inspectors tried desperately to help us get some heat and finally called the City electrical engineer. We were still unable to get the heater to work and couldn't find the cause of the smoke.

The next day my husband took the furnace apart and we found the fire. A piece of two by four had fallen inside the furnace between the heating elements and the pilot light had been enough to ignite it.

My husband and I feel that we are really lucky to live in a city where so many people are willing to help and would like to say our extreme thanks to these people and Dave Keel as we are very grateful to them.

Not that it's any of your business, but since you have seen fit to point the finger of criticism at me re the residence I own on Water Street, and which was destroyed by fire recently, it might benefit the Henderson Home News to use their space more constructively and fairly if I inform you as follows:

I am perhaps more desirous of having this structure removed or repaired without delay than you or your editor but it so happens that insurance companies who insure against such losses have an interest in the matter as well as the owner and it does take a little time to negotiate settlement with the adjusters.

As you may or may not know, if the insured elects to rebuild a structure, the insurance company will pay the full amount of the insurance; if the insured elects to accept a cash payment, the insurance company will pay materially less than the amount of the insurance in consideration of depreciation.

In the interest of our city, and against our own personal interests, I have been giving serious consideration to accepting the lesser amount for the sole reason that this property is in the area where the City has been purchasing the dwellings and the lots and if I were to instruct the insurance company to rebuild the dwelling, it would create the condition that the City would have to pay materially more for the property than if I elected to accept the lesser amount as a cash payment for the simple reason that when and if the City should determine to make the purchase, a \$9,000 dwelling on the lot would be involved instead of the lesser

ser-valued "townsite house."

I think it might serve a good purpose if before you see fit to criticize, you might make inquiry of the facts in the situation.

## Extensive Intra-Mural Sports Program Launched

Basic high school has initiated an improved intramural program for the purpose of providing extra-curricular athletic activities after school hours for all students. The program is being coordinated by Don Smith, Head of the Basic High School Physical Education Department. At the present time five phases of the program are in operation.

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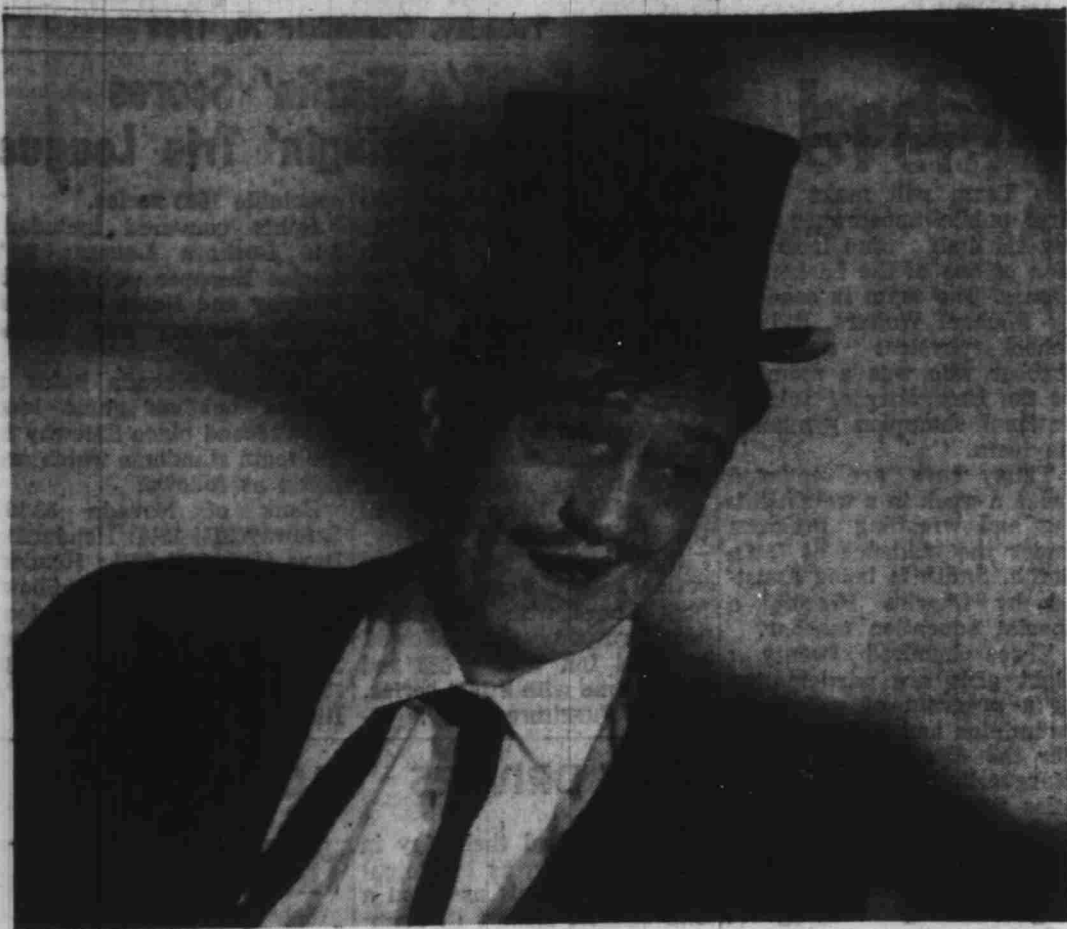

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# People Here May Pool Aid To Korean Orphanage

All too few people in this nation could be considered rich; however, the poorest of us are wealthy as compared to the people in the underdeveloped countries of the world and nothing brings home this point as does personal correspondence with individuals in these places.

Mr. and Mrs. P. T. 'Jack' Stevens, who have offered assistance to the Star of the Sea Children's Home in Inchon, Korea, recently received such a letter. The need for help is so great that Mr. and Mrs. Stevens have offered to pool their own donation to this orphanage with that of any other residents here who wish to aid these children. The donation can be any amount that anyone wishes to give.

The names and addresses of all donors will be included and the money will be changed into Korean funds and sent directly to Sister Mary Bernadette, as a Christmas gift to the Children's Home, to be used as she sees fit. Donations may be mailed to his office, 156 Water St. All donations received on or before December 21, will be included in the Christmas gift to the orphanage.

Sister Mary Bernadette's letter reads, in part, as follows: In Korea, it was a year of suffering and of hunger. Spring and summer were difficult times economically. Some days we received as many as seven children; other days five — receiving at least three was the normal daily thing. Almost half of the children we took in were only a few days to few months old and were nothing but skin and bones. During these months of famine, which were aggravated by numerous floods in which many died, 83 children came into our home. St. Peter must have had a very busy time opening Heaven's doors.

As we say in Canada "we had to tighten our belts" during those days. Things were so expensive and we had to stretch what little we had in the house. Meals were cut down to save. I could not write at that time, there was so much to do every day. Begging hospitals to admit our little ones who were sick. During that time we had every kind of sickness imaginable. Many children went to Heaven! At the writing of this letter we have 302 children under 15 years of age and 41 children between 15 and 18. It is especially about these matters that I would like to write to you today—those who have had to leave our home because of lack of space; there have been so many of these!

I know you will answer my appeal. Would you hang another stocking on your chimney for one of our babies? A pound of powdered milk costs \$2. If we could afford it we would give a baby

eight bottles of milk a day for its physical needs. As it is now we give each one only four bottles of milk and two bottles of sugared water. The vitamins that some of you sent us have already long since been all used up. As a second choice, perhaps you would consider helping one of the older children who has left our home. Something must be done to save these girls from falling into prostitution. There should be some kind of fund for the many girls who write to me or meet me on the street and ask for help. I hope I am not shocking you by speaking this way of children who have come out of a Catholic orphanage. If you could only see the poverty here, I'm sure you would understand. This is a typical case:

"We place a child in a good Catholic home upon the written recommendation of the pastor of a place. Everything seems well, but the lady of the house, who may never have had someone working for her before, treats the child more like a slave. She eats what is left over after the family eats, gets up at 4:30 a.m. and is the last to go to sleep at night, does all the cooking, cleaning, etc. and even in the city here that means carrying heavy buckets of water from the well and, in winter, washing clothes outside with water that often turns to ice. In short, the girl gets discouraged and leaves the house — but for where? There is the danger! They have nowhere to go.

"They try to find work. Too often the owner of one of the many little food shops along the street will hire one of these young girls. He will give her a month's salary (about \$4) in advance and tell her to wait on the few dirty little wooden tables that are in the shop. Compared to the difficult work she has just left, the child finds this rather easy. But, after a few days the owner will call the child up

to the second floor of the shop where she is forced into prostitution. After all, he has given her a month's salary which she has already used to find a place to sleep; and what can a child do when the owner beats her with a stick — not at all common.

"I have tried to get several children out of such situations by sending one of our workmen to pay off the proprietor, but sometimes he has had to argue with the police too.

"We have a small house where there are now six girls for whom I have been able to provide jobs and I can give them about \$10 a month with which they are able to go to school to learn a skill. But I am afraid, at times, that they will meet their friends who will lead them into bad lives. "So I am sending you an S.O.S. for these poor children. If I only had enough money to provide some kind of hostel for these older girls. If we had a home of this type to which they could go when they leave the orphanage, then they could find jobs in factories or in families and always have a place to come back to at night. How many sleepless nights I have spent worrying about these poor girls!

"I have written you this idea; it has been the greatest sorrow of my life as a missionary. I hope sincerely that you will help me." Ending her letter with thanks for the wonderful cooperation already received from the orphanage sponsors and best wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy and Blessed New Year, Sister Bernadette says:

"May the Divine Lord give you Health, Prosperity and bless specially your teenagers. My great gratitude and my deep affection."

A Christmas card, in which the letter was enclosed, was inscribed: "Our Christmas Gift To You nine days of prayers and sacrifices to your very own intentions."

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## Hints to Get Your Xmas Mail There on Schedule

Postmaster Chuck Connor offered these helpful hints today on how to mail your Christmas cards and gifts to insure prompt and safe delivery before December 25th.

If you use the new five cent Christmas Tree stamps on your Christmas cards, they will be sorted and delivered first and, if you include your return address with your ZIP Code number on each card envelope, they will be forwarded in the event of a change of address, or if they are undeliverable, they will be returned to you for correction of your mailing list. Also, remember you can write personal messages only on Christmas cards sent by First Class mail. Nothing but your signature is authorized on cards sent at the unsealed, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster warns against careless packing of your precious Christmas gifts. He says it is unbelievable how some people fail to use strong cartons, heavy wrapping paper and sturdy cord when packing their precious gifts for mailing. He requests that you take special care in packing breakable gifts — mark the cartons, "Fragile" — "Handle With Care" and be sure to put an extra label carrying the recipient's and your name and address inside of every package.

The Postmaster also said, "By giving special attention to your Christmas mailings right now, by being sure that your mailing lists are up-to-date and by planning your mailings so that you send out cards and packages in groups, rather than all at one time, you'll be certain that all your Christmas greetings and gift packages reach their destinations before Christmas."

The Postmaster reminds us that we can make it a merrier Christmas for everybody if we will try to get all of our Christmas presents mailed before December 10th. Christmas cards out of town delivery should be sent before December 15th, and those for local addresses should be mailed at least a week before Christmas.

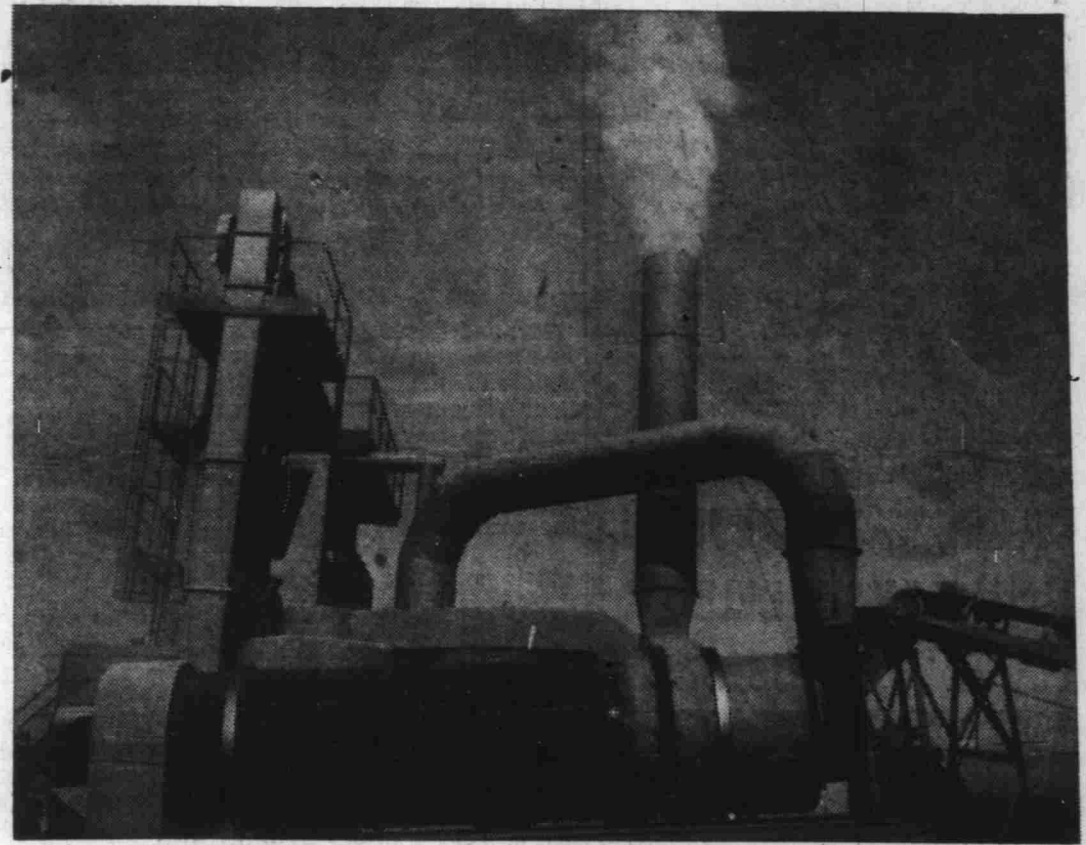

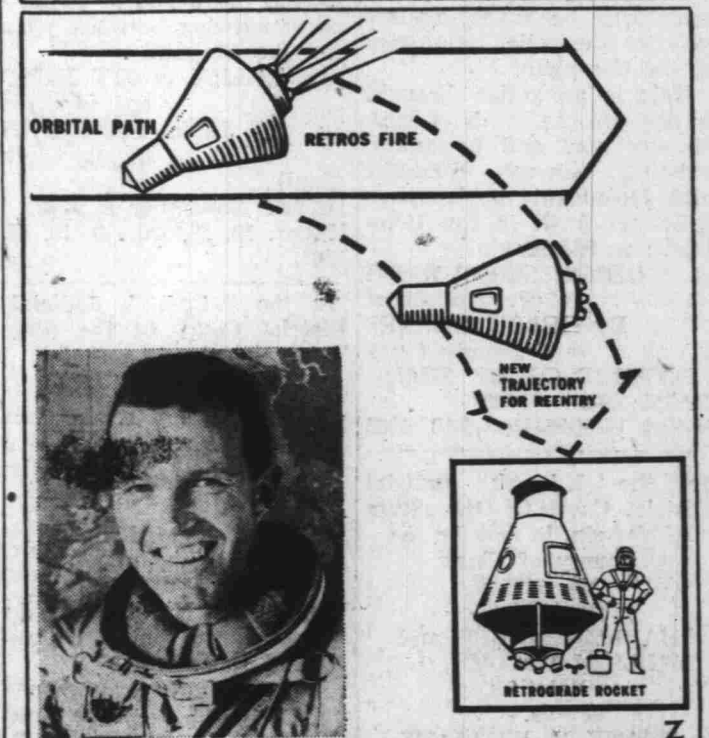
perfect us golfers.

## Getting Back From Space



At almost 18,000 miles per hour, Astronaut Gordon Cooper had to put on his "brakes" almost the way you would apply yours to slow a car. This was his only way down.

These brakes, called "retro-rockets," are three solid-fuel motors shaped like buckets and strapped in the blunt end of the capsule. They slowed his forward by reverse thrust, and pushed him out of the orbital path, down into a new trajectory for re-entry into earth's atmosphere.

These same rocket brakes brought home Astronaut Carpenter, Glenn and Schirra. Confidence in the retro-rockets is based not only on successful performance, but also on the specific and exacting standards taken in their design and manufacture at Thiokol Chemical's rocket engine plant in Elkton, Maryland. Before these rockets are installed in the capsule,

they have been x-rayed, inspected for dimensional accuracy and proper thrust alignment, drop tested, vibrated and subjected to innumerable other tests such as humidity, salt spray and aging!

Though one of these retro rockets alone can do the "braking" job, three are installed in the capsule! Fired at five-second intervals, they burn for approximately 11 seconds each, break the capsule speed by about 500 feet per second.

The same retro-rocket principle will apply in braking the larger vehicles now under development by Thiokol for landing men and equipment on the moon - in future space projects Surveyor, Gemini and Apollo.
