Surveyor Hurt In Jeep Mishap

One member of a three-man surveying crew from Henderson was critically injured yesterday about noon, and two others escaped with minor bruises and cuts when a jeep truck in which they were riding rolled 200 feet down a steep incline on Sunrise Mountain.

Bill Blackburn, 21, suffered a punctured lung and had 40 stitches taken in his face and incurred a broken wrist as he rode out the jeep in its numerous rolls down the mountainside. He was evacuated to Southern Nevada Memorial hospital via a helicopter from Nellis Air Force Base.

Kent Nash, 28, the driver and Harold Lindsay, 25, suffered cuts and bruises. They were both thrown out of the jeep on the first roll. Lindsay walked down the steep mountainside to give Blackburn first aid, while Nash

called for aid via the walkie-talkie.

The three men were working on the 15,000 acre survey for the city and setting up a triangle from Black Mountain at the time that the brakes on the four-wheel drive vehicle apparently went out.

Nash was able to contact Larry Weider and Jerry Seaverson by the walkie-talkie but was unable to receive their answer. The two men contacted the Henderson police department who in turn asked for emergency help from the sheriff's office in Las Vegas. Lindsay, who suffered a badly cut lip, was taken to the hospital in the sheriff's four-wheel ambulance.

Blackburn was considered out of danger at about 7 p.m. last night, and the other two men had returned to Henderson about that time.

Dr. Miller—City Agree on Water

The City Council Monday night agreed to run an 8-inch water main for a distance of about 340 feet in Section 19 to serve property owned by Dr. Harold Miller for \$975.66.

Monday's meeting was the second appearance of Dr. Miller before the council. In the meantime he conferred with George Perkins, Director of Public Works on the project.

Perkins estimated cost of the construction at \$675.66 for material and \$300 for labor. He added another \$135 for the fire hydrant, but the council later agreed to absorb this cost.

Should other property owners wish to cut in on the main a refunding plan will be established for Dr. Miller by a reduction in monthly water rates.

Dr. Miller indicated the possibility of at least one and possibly two more residences in the immediate area if water would be made available.

Took 13 Years But It Was Done

The Henderson Rotary Club received a letter from District Governor Chester R. Baldwin congratulating the Henderson Club on having a 100 percent attendance for the month of November. It took the Club thirteen years to achieve this.

Bill Imhoff, immediate past President of the Henderson Club, and at present the District Governor's representative, furnished the incentive to accomplish the perfect attendance for one month. Past President Bill told the Club Members that he would personally furnish them a barbecue if the Club achieved the goal. The date has been set for the barbecue.

The Henderson Rotary Club was also congratulated for becoming a 400 percent Club of Rotary Foundation.

Boy, 11, Seriously Injured On Street

Wade Baker, 11-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn V. Baker of 127 Constitution, was seriously hurt, Tuesday afternoon about 3:45 p.m. as he was struck down in a pedestrian lane in front of the Cornet store on Pacific Avenue.

The boy was hit by the right front of the vehicle driven by Thomas R. Melvadean, 35, of 208 Kola Street Apartment 14 as he was driving west at a speed estimated of from 20 to 25 miles per hour.

At the time young Baker was hit by the car he was about 14½ feet from the curbing.

An ambulance was summoned and Baker was taken to Rose de Lima hospital for treatment where it is believed he incurred internal injuries.

Melvadean was cited for failure to yield to a pedestrian in a crosswalk area.

BOY, 12, FOUND INTOXICATED

Police officers are continuing their investigation into a case of a 12-year old boy who was so intoxicated that it was necessary for him to be admitted to the hospital.

The police department was notified of the young boy's condition about 8:45 a.m., Monday morning and when they arrived at the scene of the call, the lad was so inebriated that he was not coherent.

He was taken to the hospital and admitted. About five hours later he was in condition to be questioned.

He told officers that a man called him at a drive-in and offered him a glass of coke. He drank it and is unable to explain what happened afterwards.

Three Basic Students Attend Traffic Safety Conference

Three Basic High School students, Carol Baum, Bonnie Bray and Janet Barton, have just returned to Henderson after spending a week-end in Reno, attending the Second Annual Governor's Safety Conference.

Sponsored by the Nevada Congress of Parents and Teachers Association and the Nevada Safety Council, the conference was an outstanding success, according to the Basic students.

Traveling by bus, the young people reached Reno on Friday evening for registration and assignment to the homes of local citizens for lodging. Early Saturday morning, Governor Grant Sawyer delivered the opening address. The Governor stressed the importance of education and publicity in his Traffic Safety Program.

The remainder of the Conference was devoted to group meetings on selected discussion topics. A state constitution for the Traffic Safety Association was drafted and accepted by the delegates.

High points developed and presented to the delegates by the discussion group, were establishment of traffic safety clubs in all secondary schools, campus sponsored

and conducted vehicle safety check-up, and the initiation and dissemination of highway traffic safety publicity through posters and public examples of safety procedures.

Rate Increase Less Than Company Asked

Free area telephone dialing will become effective here not later than January 1, it was announced by the Nevada Public Service Commission.

A raise in rates has been granted to the Henderson Telephone Company to become effective at the time the extended area service is inaugurated. The Public Service Commission held a public hearing at City Hall September 5 and 6, on an increase in rates requested by the local Telephone Company, at which the Company and the public expressed their views.

The raise in rates which will go into effect on or before January 1, is the result of this hearing. The new rates are considerably lower than what the Telephone Company requested.

Two separate increases were asked for, the first of which would have become effective September 1, and the second on December 1. The first of these was not considered as the PSC did not hold its public hearing until after that date.

In its order to the Telephone Company, the Public Service Commission stated:

"It is ordered that the application of the Henderson Telephone Company, for authority to increase residential, business and other telephone service rates and to revise certain rules and regulations, shall be granted as set out in the attached opinion, and denied in all other respects.

"It is further ordered that within 30 days from the date of this order, December 17, 1963, Henderson Telephone Company shall file with the Commission new schedules reflecting the rates as set out in the attached opinion.

"It is further ordered that this company shall proceed to institute extended area service not later than January 1, 1964 and at such time as this service is available to its customers the rates as set forth in the opinion shall become effective.

Basic Students Compete For NROTC College Scholarships

Saturday, December 14, was the beginning of the rigorous selection system of the Regular N.R.O.T.C. program for three Basic High School students.

If Michael Bergemeyer, David Downer and Bill Larkin successfully attain a qualifying score on the Navy College Aptitude Test, they will be requested to report to the Navy Recruiting Station selected by them at the time of the test.

There they will be given a physical examination, will be interviewed by at least two Naval Officers and will complete the necessary forms and applications required to provide a standard application file for use by the State Selection Committee.

Each state is assigned a proportionate share of the N.R.O.T.C. vacancies which are to be filled in the fall of 1964. Quotas are based upon the percentage of male high school graduates from each state in relation to the country at large.

The Selection Committee,

after careful consideration of each application, determine those who are best fitted for appointment and eventual careers in the Naval Service, within the authorized quota for the state.

The various factors considered by the Committee in arriving at its findings, form a completely impartial evaluation for each applicant's motivation for a career in the Regular Navy, in proper correlation with his established high school record and his aptitude for college level education and commissioned service.

Notification of successful results will be mailed to the candidates, with instructions for reporting for processing approximately January 14, 1964.

Successful candidates are appointed midshipmen, U.S. Naval Reserve, by the Secretary of the Navy, and will be granted the compensations and benefits authorized by law for a period not exceeding four years. The Navy pays tuition, cost of textbooks, other fees of an instructional nature, plus retainer pay of \$50.00 per month at the university of the candidates choice.

Trailer Park Owners Iron Out Ordinance Differences

Trailer park owners and the City Council ironed out a number of minor differences in the proposed Trailer Park Ordinance No. 332 which amends the original ordinance No. 259 in a two hour session last night.

With the changes agreed upon, it is expected that the ordinance will be presented at the first regular meeting in January, 1964 for final passage.

Such provisions as requiring occupancy permits within 48 hours after the trailer arrived and the clause that it is unlawful to move wheel or tires from mobile homes were eliminated.

It was also agreed that no trailer over five years of age be permitted on trailer estates except with the approval of the building department. Eliminated also was the reference to the contested mobile Code, Ordinance No. 333.

About 10 trailer park owners were present for the meeting which was continued from Monday's regular meeting.

In other action, the Council approved a resolution endorsing the \$18 million Fair and Recreation Board Bond issue in January, \$12 million which will be used for land purchases, \$5 million

for Convention Center expansion and \$1 million for expanded recreational programs in the county.

The council also voted to meet with Las Vegas to draft a uniform child welfare ordinance in the near future.

Council members present at last night's meeting included Ida Belle Riggins, Dr. Paul Marshall, Dale Roberts and Mayor, Bill Byrne.

Missing the session were Councilmen L. L. Williams and Wilbur Hardy.

It marked the last meeting of the current year.

Community Church Ladies Honor Presidents At Tea

Past Presidents were honored at a Christmas Tea held yesterday afternoon by the Women's Association of the Community Church.

Ramola Burk gave the opening prayer and inspirational, which followed the Christmas theme.

President Nina Newell introduced the Past Presidents and asked that each give a short talk on the happenings in the church during her term of office.

Marion Lindesmith, a charter member of the Church and one of the organizers and first President of the Women's Association, told of the founding of the town, the church and the organization.

Mrs. Lindesmith and her husband came here in 1942, while the Townsite was under construction and she was chosen to take the first census of Henderson. This

included a religious census which was used in founding the Community Church, representing all Protestant denominations; the LDS Church and the Catholic Church.

She told of the construction of the Townsite School which was built from barren desert to a complete school for grades one through 12 in exactly three weeks.

Community Church meetings were held in the school auditorium until the Church was constructed and dinners were held in the Victory Village auditorium. The first meetings of the Women's Association were held in the homes of members.

When the church edifice was constructed a baptismal pool was installed for the Baptists and other denominations who baptize by immersion.

Rev. Crouch was the first minister of the Community Church and Mrs. Lindesmith told how he brought flats of tiny elm trees from North Dakota. The 150 tiny trees, which she said looked like onion sprouts and were about two inches tall, were planted in the back yard and later distributed to residents, churches and anyone who wanted trees.

These elms, brought here 21 years ago by Rev. Crouch, still shade the yards in Townsite and Victory Village and their seeds have furnished trees for other sections of the city.

Mrs. Lindesmith's term of office was stretched to 15 months when two successive vice presidents of the Association moved away leaving her in office.

Margaret Haven served as president from 1946 to 1948 during the time Rev. George Patterson was minister. She remembered the meetings in Townsite School auditorium and the dinners at the Victory Village auditorium and told about the first bazaar held by the Women's Association at the school which netted them a cool thousand dollars.

Lucille Kubic, who served in 1951-52 and Edrie Hansen, 1956-57 also recalled the meetings in Townsite School, although their terms of office occurred during the time Rev. Ford Gilbert was minister of the church. Madge Ryan was president from 1959 to 1961.

Ramola Burk, immediate past president, served almost two terms in 1961 and 62. She told of the start of the Women's Association's savings account to provide a new kitchen in Gilbert Hall. This kitchen is now under construction.

A short business session preceded the serving of tea to the 40 members and guests present. Mrs. Nina Newell and Marion Lindesmith poured.

Boys' Club History, Plans Described to Rotary Club

The Henderson Boys Club and their leaders provided the program for the Rotary Club at the regular meeting held Tuesday.

Participating for the Boys Club were Steve Alires, George Campbell, Steve Pittman, Eli Sandoval, Gary Smith, Chief George Crisler, Don Bittle and Pat Winters.

The Henderson Boys Club was founded in 1952 by a group of citizens interested in the welfare of our boys. The first meeting was held at the St. Peter's Parish. Later they moved them to the Pearlstein Building. Seven years ago Victory Village furnished a building for the Boys Club which contained a gymnasium. That year they featured a boxing team.

Last year they sponsored six baseball teams, three football teams, track team and a swimming meet. Most of the financing for the Henderson Boys Club is received from the Clark County United Fund. The Boys Club has a membership of 280.

Pat Winters, Head Coach of the Boys Club, has spent three to four hours a night, five days a week for a period of eleven years in working with the boxing teams and other sports. Chief of Police, George Crisler, is Treasurer and Business Manager of the Club. He has been with the Boys Club since his arrival in Henderson. George Campbell, President, has been working with the Boys Club for eleven

years, and Don Bittle, teacher at Park Village School, works with the boys on their football, baseball and other sports.

At present they are working to have the Henderson Boys Club join the National Boys Club of America. It was necessary to have 100 adult members before the Henderson Club could become a member. They now have the one hundred members.

Pressure Worthwhile, Sometimes

Residents and property owners in the "Civic Center" block chalked up some sort of a victory at last week's meetings of the Planning Commission.

About 50 were on hand to hear the Director of Public Works recommend that the matter be "tabled indefinitely" — since there seems to be some mistrust of the city's program.

Probably not one of the protesters objects to the Civic Center plan but undoubtedly an overwhelming majority felt that somebody was trying to put something over on them.

An interested citizenry leads to good government — and care of the part of those charged with the governing functions.

By the same token it gives one a strange feeling to look

around at a City Council session and to note that the number of city employees outnumber the spectators. If the employees are there in the interest of good government — well and good. If they are there because they are ordered to be there — well?

While application of public pressure is not always a good thing, it does have its points.

Many a legislative measure in Congress and in state legislatures have been brought to a screeching halt by a horde of protesters just because the legislators were not "in tune" with the people.

We wonder if a city hall "news release" would have brought out that many people to a public hearing. What do you think? — WVM.

On Revoked Drivers' Licenses

"Driving license revoked" has a very final sound to it, which would readily lead one to suppose that the offender would never operate an automobile again, at least not until he has satisfied authorities that he could be trusted.

But hardly a week goes by here in which officers do not pick up a driver whose license has been "suspended or revoked" or in many instances has no driver's license at all.

In some areas of the U. S. revocation of a license meant only that the person could go into a neighboring state, obtain a license there and drive wherever he pleased.

Now, however, most of the states, through a national driver register service of the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, are putting some effective obstacles in the way of this practice.

The center of the service is an electronic computer to which 46 states have furnished data on 385,000 persons whose right to drive has been canceled for conviction of either of drunken driving or involvement in traffic fatalities. In three million electronic "searches" more than 32,000 applicants have been spotted and kept off the roads because of inclusion in this list.

Two other states soon will participate in the submission and use of data for this date, leaving only Delaware and Massachusetts to cooperate. The objectives of this service warrant full participation and active use by every one of the 50 states.

Like the Sinatra kidnappers will attest — "You can hardly get away with anything, anymore."

We heard one of said agents speak before a Boulder City Chamber of Commerce Committee the other day and his words promised astounding things — which, if done, would surely rate someone buying space in the venture. Such as:

A promise of 250,000 circulation
A promise of 5,000 distribution points

With full knowledge that I am opening myself up for a libel suit by saying this, I must state that I am sure Mr. Bell and associates have not signed a contract with any printer for 250,000 copies and that there won't be 5,000 distribution points. I would

say that he has a plan to print 100,000 with an option to print more if the sale of the thing warrants.

Mr. Bell, who also is one of Congressman Walter Baring's key advisors, is charging some \$2500 for one page of advertising. Buurrother! \$2500 would buy a full page ad in the Los Angeles Times where guaranteed readership is close to one million families!

I would say that the entire print cost of Bell's magazine, if and when it is printed, will come to about 25 cents a copy or \$25,000 for \$100,000 copies.

On that basis he would need to sell only 10 pages of ads to get back his print cost and the other 50 or 60 pages — about \$150,000 worth — would be milk and honey to the promoter and his agents.

Seems to me it would have been more popular if the

state had printed the official state program for the centennial thru its Nevada Highway Magazine setup, or the bureau of economic development. Selling it at half of what Bell plans to get — would more than pay for the thing.

Normally — paid advertising is the best thing in the world for merchants and firms to reach the people — depending, of course, on the vehicle used to carry the advertising.

If Bell and Co. live up to the promises — it could be a good buy.

Boulder Merchants didn't rush into the deal — as a matter of fact, those who have don't add up to enough to buy a half page.

We understand the Vegas hotels, the state's biggest advertisers, haven't all rushed into it either.

Stop, look, listen — then use your best judgement.

General Manager US Lime, Kennedy Ellsworth Dies

Kennedy Ellsworth, vice president of the Flintkote Company and general manager of U.S. Lime Products Division, died at his Los Angeles home early Thursday morning.

The Flintkote Company operates a quarry and lime-calcinating plant at Arrolime, Nev., the Miracle Lime plant at Henderson, as well as the Sloan quarry, one of Southern Nevada's oldest industries, having been established in 1910.

Born at Johnson City, Tenn. on Jan. 18, 1898, Ellsworth moved to Hollywood, Calif., with his parents in 1912. He was graduated from Hollywood High School in 1915 and served in the U. S. Army as a sergeant during World War I. In 1922 Ellsworth received a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from the University of Southern California, where he was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Fraternity, and a member of the executive committee of the Trojan Club.

From 1924 through 1926 he was on the board of directors of the George L. Eastman Company, Hollywood and founded the Security Ma-

terials Company in 1925. He served as general manager and part owner of that company until he joined the U.S. Lime Products Corporation on May 15, 1931. U. S. Lime was purchased by the Flintkote Company in 1956. Ellsworth had served as vice president of the Flintkote

Company and general manager of the U. S. Lime Products Division since that time. Ellsworth was a member of the Jonathan Club and California Club in Los Angeles and past president of the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce.

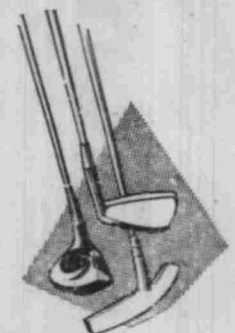

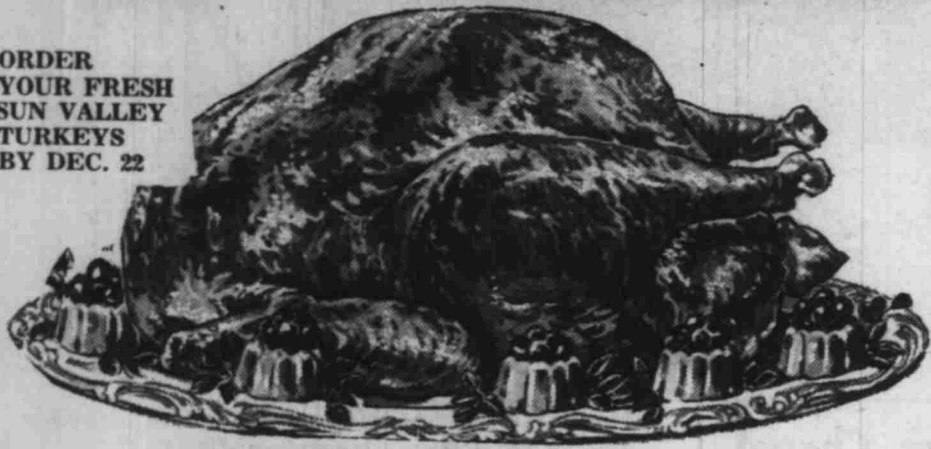

So fer he ain't missed nothin'; he even brung the churches into his mess.

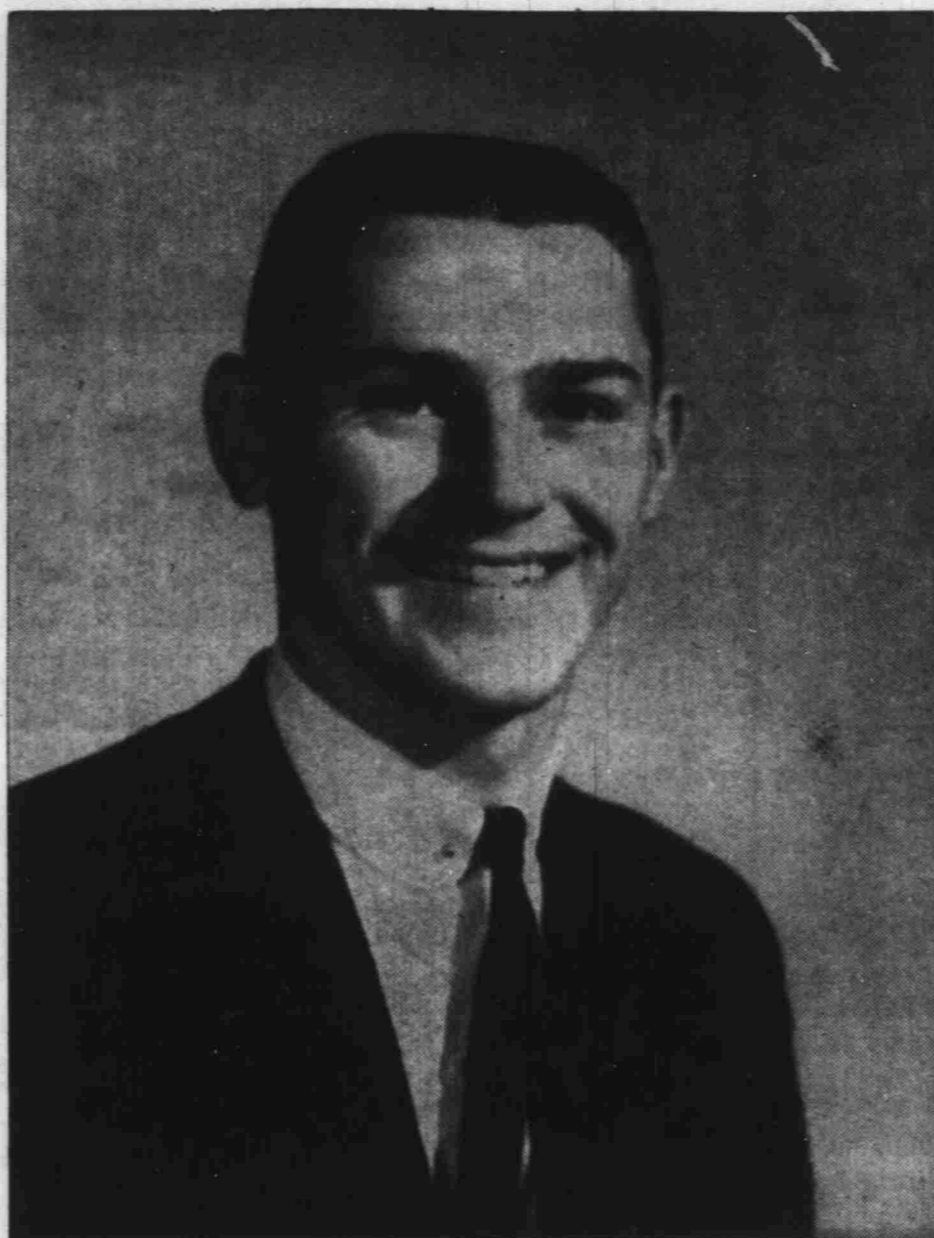
He sez we have too many fer the size of our town an' that's the reason they are only half full or less on Sunday.

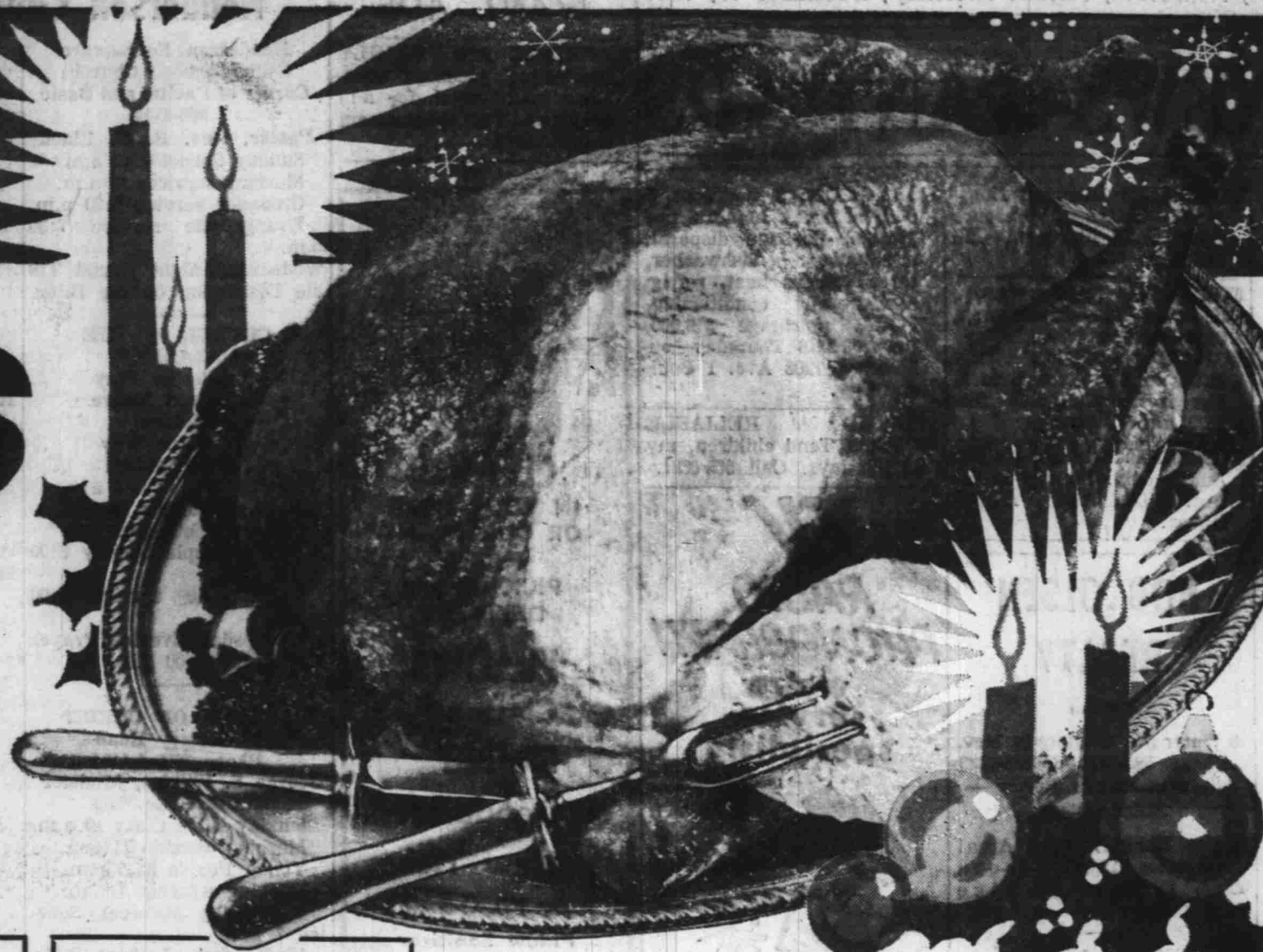

Local Horses Claim Top Nev. State Championships

b Bar C Corral of the Boulder City Horsemen's Association brought home three State Championships from the Annual Convention Dinner of the Nevada State Horsemen's Association held Saturday night in Las Vegas.

The feat is particularly remarkable in that none of the B Bar C group of horses appeared in more than five of the twenty three horseshows from which points could be earned toward State Championships.

The unnamed quarterhorse colt co-owned by Marjorie T. South of Tucson, Arizona and Hila Boyer of Boulder City was named State Cham-

Champion Quarter Horse Stallion — All ages.

Hila Boyer was present to accept the award for herself and her mother. Mrs. Boyer states that to her knowledge this is the only time a stallion colt less than two years of age has ever won two firsts and sufficient points in two shows to merit the title of State Champion.

Mrs. Boyer and Mrs. South are awaiting approval of the name of the colt and registry number from the American Quarter Horse Association.

The young colt has an outstanding background. Sire of the colt is the famed Bar Tonto, by Three Bars out of Tonto Gal. The colt's dam is equally noteworthy being Rhoda Mae who's sire was Parker's Chicaro and the dam Donnie Lisa by Ed Echols all high award quarterhorses.

The champion sorrel with his blaze face and two stockinged hind legs may be seen at the Boyer stables numbers 107 - 108 - and 109 in the B Bar C Corral area. The colt was bred and raised at the Z S Bar Ranch in Tucson, Arizona by Mrs. South and brought to Boulder City at the opening of the new corral area by Hila Boyer for training and handling. Hila Boyer is listed as agent for the champion in the Nevada State Horsemen's Association.

A second quarterhorse owned by Hila Boyer, "Buskin", received the title and ribbon for State Champion in the English Pleasure — Senior Class and was ridden during shows by Mrs. Boyer.

Little 'Un raised and trained by Hila Boyer and recently purchased by Mr. and Mrs. William Farmer for their daughter Peggy brought back the third state honor in taking the Open Jumping Class. Hila Boyer rode the horse to win the competition. Little 'Un is stabled at Stable numbers 94 and 95 in the new Horsemen's Association corral area.

"Stella" third horse owned by Hila Boyer took Reserve Champion in Ladies Western Pleasure — Senior Class — the equivalent to second place in state competition. Mrs. Boyer rode Stella

in the competitive event. Peggy Farmer took 5th place in High Point Performance for riders thirteen years of age and under.

Dr. James French entered his Arabians in only the Lariette Horseshow held in Las Vegas in September but still amassed sufficient points to bring Kister Pride, Arabian Mare — All Ages Class to 12th place and Farul, took third place for Arabian Geldings — All ages and 7th in the state in Arabian English Pleasure — Open. Mrs. Boyer rode for Dr. French's stable in these events.

C. Thomas Boyer in the division for Quarter Horse Stallions "Mexico Gold" to third place in the state. Mexico Gold has as sire Little G Red and Dam Lady Mexico and with Buskin and the new champion colt is stabled at the Boyer corral.

Peggy Farmer qualified to do her own riding in events for persons thirteen and under. In Western Pleasure—13 and under she placed 13th in the state up on "Spider"; in Trail Class, same age bracket with "Spider" secured number three position; in English Pleasure, Peggy placed Little 'Un fourth in the state and in Saddle Seat Equitation for this age bracket was named fifth in state competition.

"Kister Pride" owned by Dr. James B. French placed 12th in the state on the basis of one show appearance to gain points. Dr. French's Arabians are stabled at Stables 64 through 69 in the Horsemen's Association quarters in Boulder City.

Shows in which the local owners and riders appeared during the year included: Henderson Industrial Days Show and Parade; Sunrise Riders' Show; Nevada Lariettes' Horse Show, Region 5, Las Vegas Horse Show and the recent Boulder City Jay-Cee Horse Show held at the Boulder City Horsemen's Association arena.

All of the prize horses and others who were not entered in competition this year will be in evidence during the parade and other roundup events during the 3rd annual Boulder City RoundUp January 3-4-5th.

Area Horsemen Name Arena 'B Bar C'

"B Bar C Corral" has been chosen by the Boulder City Horsemen's Association as the official name for the new Horsemen's area leased from the city and located southeast of town.

The name, suggested by Louise Wengert, a member of the association, was unanimously approved at the recent monthly meeting of the Boulder City Horsemen's Association.

Several other names were proposed varying from Horsemen's Park, Horsemen's Village to Horsemen's Grounds but the association membership felt Mrs. Wengert's suggestion tied in with several factors important to both the community and the association.

The annual RoundUp, one of the major events of the association — scheduled for Jan 3-4-5, was originally started as "a western celebration timed to coincide with the Birthday of Boulder City," as stated by an official proclamation of the Boulder City Council dated November 8, 1961.

At the time Morgan Sweeney was mayor and issued a proclamation establishing January 4 as the "Birthday of Boulder City," and "invited all citizens to observe this day as one worthy of prayer, thanksgiving, and celebration." He further urged that "in keeping with the spirit of the occasion western dress be worn."

The new name will be posted on the head board of the high - pole gateway that is now being installed at the entrance for the corral and arena.

Sen. Cannon's Eulogy To President John Kennedy

(The following statement was among the eulogies to the late President John F. Kennedy, delivered by Senator Howard Cannon to his colleagues on the floor of the Senate on the day set aside for the remarks of all members of the Chamber upon the occasion of the death of the President.)

Mr. President, nearly three weeks have passed since the death of President John Fitzgerald Kennedy, and the nation has not yet fully recovered from the horror and indignation which grew from the most heinous crime of the century.

Certainly, the fact that a brilliant young President, for altogether too brief a period; led this nation and gave all Americans a glimpse of the promise of freedom for years ahead should not be erased from our memory. We should properly preserve that memory for as long as this nation endures.

My thoughts today dwell on the invisible, yet powerful, memorials which could be erected to the great leader who has been taken from us.

We will be a greater nation, and his legacy will be more towering than any edifice of steel and concrete if John F. Kennedy is enshrined in the national conscience as a martyr who gave his life in the enduring battle against hatred, bigotry and intolerance.

Surely, these insidious forces guided the quick and brutal hand that struck down the Thirty-fifth President of the United States.

The greatest memorial we can give President Kennedy is to rid ourselves, as a nation, of the fanaticism and insane rage — turned inward — which made this tragedy possible.

I cannot escape the conviction that such a living memorial in the hearts of his countrymen would have been most earnestly desired by our late President.

Ours is a young nation striving, in a real sense, to find itself. Our national goals and our heritage can never be fully achieved unless we are tolerant of the views and beliefs of our neighbors.

We can't afford to set ourselves upon the devil's work of national distrust, accusations, and suspicions

of our neighbors. These, I firmly believe, are the lessons of Dallas.

We have already suffered an irreparable loss. Yet, how tragically compounded that loss would be if we lost sight of the true meaning and true cause of this tragedy.

In term of Americanism, humanity, compassion and decency, John F. Kennedy has left this nation a great legacy. John F. Kennedy turning point. Will we accept his legacy and rid ourselves of the poison which infects the national bloodstream?

Will we turn from hatred and dedicate ourselves anew to the challenge — not the recrimination — that lies before us now? These are the questions for each and every American to ask himself.

If these questions are answered in the affirmative, if this nation rejects hatred and fanaticism in all forms, the greatest memorial man is capable of constructing will be erected, and John Fitzgerald Kennedy will not have died in vain.

Mounted Posse Clark Distinction

In addition to other enforcement units in Boulder City the community has the distinction of having one of the few mounted posses directly connected with one community. In Clark county the major unit is the Clark County Mounted Posse directly under Sheriff Ralph Lamb.

The Boulder City Mounted Posse headed by Fred Elam, as captain, works in connection with the Clark County Sheriff's department, also taking their assignments from Sergeant Walter Butts of the Clark County Sheriff's department.

The Boulder City Posse was organized in 1961 with Glenn Merrill serving as captain for two terms. Originally the posse number was limited to twelve. Each member must be cleared by the Sheriff's Department of Clark County and is deputized when approved by that unit.

Uniforms of the group include red bedford cord shirts

Students to Double in 5 Years

\$37 Million Bond Election For Schools on Ballot, May 5

"For the first time in the Clark County School District's history, voters will be given a chance to approve... catching up with our building needs — what they actually are — rather than what we have asked in the past to do a temporary job."

This is the way District Superintendent L. B. Newcomer summed up action of the Board of School Trustees last Thursday night after the Board unanimously adopted a resolution calling for the sale of \$37 million in school building bonds at an election to be held May 5, 1964.

"If approved, this election will allow us to see daylight in our future building program which will permit the District to offer a full day of instruction to every student. Voters will be able to express their desires to stamp out part-day, staggered-day and overcrowded conditions that now exist in many of our schools," Newcomer said.

It is now possible for the District to request the \$37 million after the state legislature passed permissive legislation enabling Districts in Nevada to increase bonded indebtedness from 10 to 15 per cent and a reassessment of property values

which has added another \$100 million to the tax rolls.

Optimistic:
 Newcomer said he was optimistic about the election.

"The pressing immediate need of a vocational-technical school and my belief that the people of Clark County want and are willing to pay for quality education for all children, make me optimistic about a favorable vote next May," he said.

The Board's action came on the heels of an extensive study by the District's Building Facilities Department, Odell - MacConnell - Associates of the Stanford University Professional Center and Fiscal Consultants, Stone and Youngberg, who developed the following enrollment figures for 1963-64: Minimum 49,228, most probable 51,000; 1964-65: minimum 55,200, most probable 58,209; 1965-66: minimum 61,603, most probable 68,162; 1966-67: minimum 68,775, most probable 79,521; 1967-68: minimum 76,521, most probable 92,092.

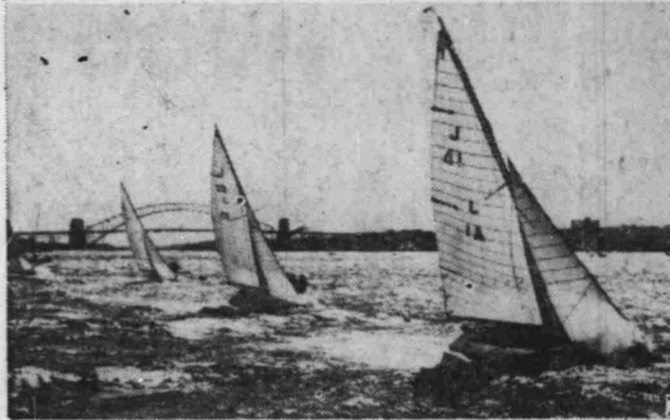
This means that the 100,000 mark should be surpassed during the 1968-69 school year, almost doubling current enrollment figures which stood at 49,818 at mid-November.

It was pointed out that funds from the last bond election in the year for \$21 million have all been earmarked for projects authorized by the Board of Trustees. No additional building projects can be started until the sale of additional bonds authorized by the voters of the District.

The 1964 election, aimed at housing all pupils by 1966 and through September of 1967, calls for construction of 20 elementary schools, 134 additional classrooms on present sites, five junior high schools, the vocational-technical school located in the Whitney Mesa area near Henderson, warehouse-maintenance area, certain fees including engineering and equipment plus \$3.4 million for site acquisitions.

All in all, Sydney is an excellent introduction to the vast country-continent of Australia—a vacation land that has something for everyone.

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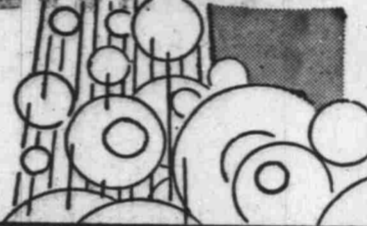
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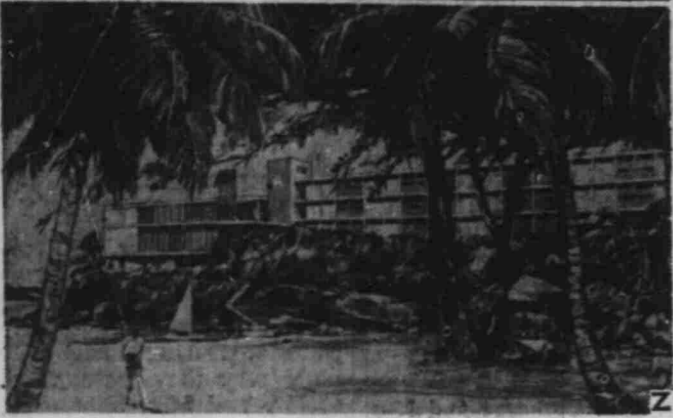

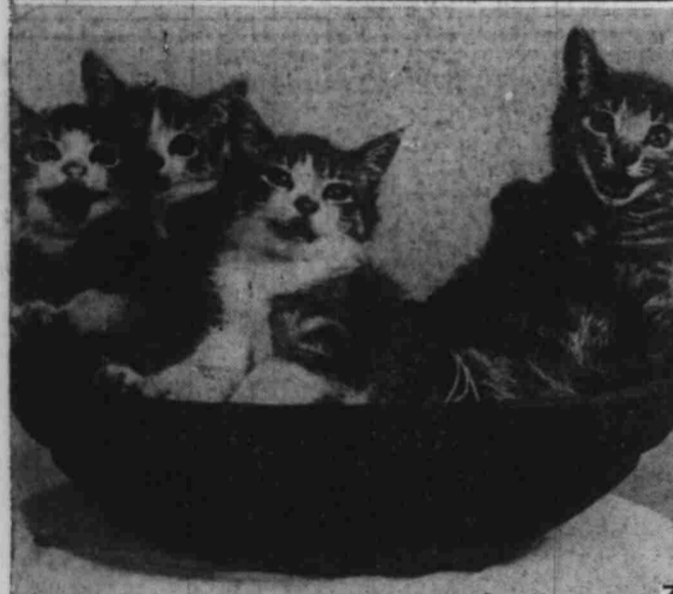
coves and secluded beaches—perfect for picnicking—and picturesque villages.

Here Are A Dozen Hints to Make Your Christmas Tree A Safe One

How do you keep your home safe from fire during the holiday season?

Actually there are more fires than most people realize before and after Christmas but so many are overshadowed by highway fatalities.

Here are some suggestions drafted by the National Board of Fire Underwriters which may serve as an aid to you.

1. Choose a small tree instead of a large one. A small tree can be just as pretty, less hazardous.
2. Keep the tree outdoors until you're ready to install it.
3. Don't set up the tree until just before Christmas.
4. Set up the tree in the coolest part of the living room, away from heaters and fireplaces. Stand it in water to retard drying.
5. Use fire proof decorations of glass or metal, never cotton or paper unless flame proof.
6. Don't set up electric trains around or near the tree.
7. Inspect every electric socket and wire to make sure set is in good condition. Discard lighting sets with frayed wiring. When buying new sets, look for U.L. label of the Underwriters Laboratory, Inc.
8. Provide a switch some distance from the tree for turning tree lights on and off.
9. Don't leave tree lights burning when away from home.
10. When needles start falling, take the tree down and discard it outdoors.
11. Gift wrappings, of course, should be discarded promptly and safely after presents are opened.
12. Check your ash trays and furniture for a possible burning cigarette after your guests leave the party.

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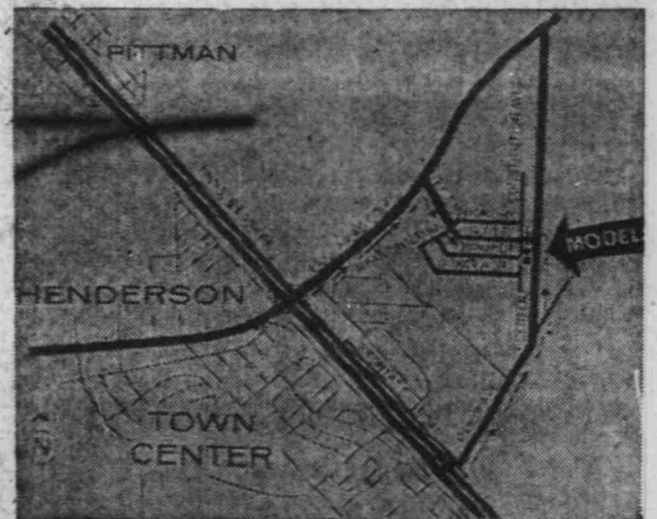
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Bonds Deadline Set December 31

Self-employed persons in the Boulder City - Henderson area are reminded that U.S. Retirement Plan Bonds, offered under the Self-Employed Individuals Tax Retirement Act of 1962, must be purchased by Dec. 31 to qualify their owners for 1963 tax federal benefits.

The reminder came from V. A. Ninnis, state savings bond director, who suggested eligible persons contact their banks for information about establishing retirement programs for themselves and their employees through a bond purchase plan. IRS form 3673, which may be used to establish such a plan, is available at the district office of the Internal Revenue Service.

Most banks can furnish application forms for use in purchasing Retirement Plan Bonds. They are issued only by Federal Reserve banks and the Treasurer of the U. S.

A plan for the purchase of these bonds is only one of several means open to the self-employed to qualify for

benefits under the act. To realize an income tax deduction during this calendar year, the retirement plans must be set up and contributions made on or before Dec. 31. Self-employed persons are permitted to claim as a tax deduction a portion of such contributions made for their employees.

Ninnis said that Retirement Plan bonds, which have been on sale since January, are available at par in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000. They pay interest at a rate of 3 per cent, compounded semi-annually, the interest accruing through increase in redemption value at the end of each six-month period.

The bonds differ from Savings Bonds in that they may not be redeemed until the owner attains the age of 59½ years, except in the event of death or disability. Those persons over the age of 59½ when they acquire them may redeem them at any time.
