Legislative Plans For Schools Subject Of Basic PTA Speaker

Police Nab Man Destroying Church Bus

Quick detection of a man charged with destroying property at St. Peter's Catholic Church and petty larceny resulted in a 30-day jail sentence to William Perry Dill, 46, in municipal court Friday.

With only a description to go on, Lt. Det. Wilber Perkins picked Dill up in a local bar after he allegedly broke 24 windows in St. Peter's School bus, and took small tools which he later sold. He was identified by Theodore C. Ingraham, who purchased the tools, and by Monsignor Robert Anderson.

He was also turned over to postal authorities on a charge of taking an unemployment check from the mail box of William A. Starrs of Pittman who had befriended the man. Dill, who gave no address, admitted to police that he had taken the check and cashed it at a local eating establishment.

It was estimated that there was \$400 damage done to the St. Peter's property.

Rock Thrower Lands In Jail

John Raymond Kline, 22, of 46 A Victory Village, who claimed he was "dared" to throw a rock through the window of the Bank of Las Vegas on Water street, received cuts to his foot when he finished the job by kicking it out, and was placed in jail on charges of destroying private property.

Kline told police that he and some friends were riding by the bank when someone dared him to throw a rock through the window. He kicked out the rest of the colored glass with his foot which was injured.

After being treated at Rose de Lima Hospital, he was placed in the city jail. He will be arraigned in municipal court today at 10 a.m. by Judge Earl Davis.

Chief 'Fixes' Charges Against Toastmistress And Bank Manager

Twenty-three guests, including a delegation of Rotarians and Rotary Annes headed by Rotary President Ralph Purdy, attended the meeting of Henderson Toastmistress Club Thursday night in the lounge at the Bank of Las Vegas.

The Toastmistresses, who believed the Rotarians had come to speak for the return of their bell and gavel which had fallen into possession of the TM Club, were somewhat surprised at the switch pulled by the Rotary President.

When called on to participate in the program, President Purdy, called on Chief of Police George Crisler who arrested Toastmistress Ellen Shirley for theft of the Rotary Club's property and Jay Bagstad, manager of the Bank of Las Vegas, for being in possession of stolen property.

Chief Crisler was armed with citizens complaints brought by Ed Thalmeyer and warrants for the arrest of the two suspects, reportedly signed by the municipal judge.

Toastmistress members voted to share the blame with Mrs. Shirley and insisted that they all go to jail with her. However, the Chief said there was only one cell available and Bagstad protested that he didn't want to be put in jail "with all those women."

The Chief of Police finally

revealed that he could "fix the charges for certain consideration." The suspects were released after the stolen items were restored to the Rotary Club president.

All but two of the visiting Rotarians participated in the impromptu table topics which were based on "The Four Way Test" applied to items pictured in advertisements which were supplied by Topicmistress Ellen Shirley. Rotarians, Ed Thalmeyer and Dallas Prosser participated in a debate with two Toastmistresses, on the repeal of the "Right to Work" section of the Taft Hartley Bill.

Thalmeyer and Mrs. Jeffrey presented the main talks and Prosser and Mrs. Ivary gave the rebuttal. The debate was somewhat hilarious as the speakers didn't seem to know whether they were for or against the repeal or the Right to Work Bill.

Bank of Nevada To Loan the City \$85,000

The Henderson branch of the Bank of Nevada will loan the city \$85,000 at a 3.81 percent interest rate, a much smaller rate than is usual to most municipalities.

The \$85,000 loan over a three-year period was necessitated when City Auditor Bob Adams pointed out to the Council that the city's bills could not be met for the next two months unless that much money was available.

City Stretches Again, Will Annex 260 Acres

Planning commissioners Thursday night recommended the drawing up of an ordinance to annex 260 acres in section 33, located near Manganes Inc., and the federal land, included in the city's 7,000 acres which will be sold following a Bureau of Land Management appraisal.

Dr. Melvin J. Bagley will have first choice of land to purchase in the section since he cleared the land of mining claims with that stipulation. Approximately 80 acres in the north east quarter will not be acquired by the city since it is clouded with valid mining claims.

The planning commissioners gave formal approval of zoning land formerly occupied by the city drag strip for commercial to a depth of 500 feet, and the rest for light industrial, (M-1).

Basic Management Inc., owner of the land was represented by Glen Taylor.

Level Warns About Refuse On Streets

Local residents who are allowing garbage or refuse to be deposited on a public street or alley, were warned yesterday by Henry Level, a city inspector, that there is a penalty against this type of action.

The health laws of Nevada states: "every person who places, deposits or dumps, or who causes to be placed, deposited or dumped, or who causes or allows to overflow, any sewage, sludge, cesspool or septic tank effluent, or accumulation of human excreta, or any garbage, in or upon any street, alley, public highway or road in common use or upon any public park or other public property other than property designated or set aside for such purpose by the governing board or body having charge thereof, or upon any private property into or upon which the public is admitted by easement, license or otherwise, is guilty of a misdemeanor."

A misdemeanor is punishable by up to a \$299 fine.

Annexation Section Approved By 7-6 Vote Of Charter Members

By a 7-6 vote, members of the City Charter committee voted to keep the annexation of the charter as it was first accepted by the charter committee.

Some members of the committee desired to change the original section to read as the

Las Vegas ordinance reads and make it possible to stop a proposed annexation only by a majority protest by freeholders in said territory, however, according to the way it was adopted, a majority protest of property value can also stop an annexation.

The section will read: "Territory adjoining and contiguous to the corporate limits of the City of Henderson may be annexed to said city with the tenements, property and inhabitants thereof by the passage of an ordinance declaring said territory to be annexed; provided that the majority of the freeholders of the territory to be annexed; first petition the board of councilmen to annex said territory; and provided further, that when the City Council deems it necessary to annex additional territory to the City of Henderson, and the freeholders of said territory have not petitioned for annexation, the City Council shall pass a resolution declaring its intention to annex said territory, describing, describing said territory to be annexed, and ordering a plat of the same to be filed in the office of the city clerk, and notice to be given as to the time when the City Council shall hear objections to the annexation of said territory on the part of the freeholders therein, and the residents of the city; said notice to be published twice each week for a period of two weeks in a newspaper, and to be posted in at least three public places in said territory to be annexed, and to be mailed by certified or registered mail to all known freeholders of said territory sought to be annexed, citing them to appear in person or by filing their properly signed petition with the city clerk on the date named and show cause why said territory should not be annexed to said city; and provided further, that after said hearing, if a majority of the freeholders or property value owners, in said territory sought to be annexed do not protest, said board of councilmen shall declare said territory annexed."

The section would give property owners 90-days to protest the action.

Voting to change the section to include only freeholders were John Ivary, Wilbur Hardy, Dale Roberts, Lorin Williams, Floyd Osborn and Dick Empson. Voting to keep the ordinance as it was originally written were Selma Bartlett, Jim Gibson, Ida Belle Riggins, Tony Carrado, Dick Taylor, Hal Smith and Jack Stevens. Herb Dobberstein left the meeting for another engagement prior to the vote, and Dr. Stanly Jones was not present. No vote was cast by Paul Marshall.

Other changes made included one that the city clerk will be appointed by the Council rather than the city manager; the age limit was removed from the mayor and Council posts; city manager items were taken from the model charter, and it was charged to read that the judge could release prisoners instead of the police chief.

The completed charter will be sent to Russ McDonald for writing, and after it has been completed it will be returned for approval and for a public hearing.

Another changes made in the charter was that ordinances will not be published in full in a newspaper before action, but the title only. According to the section, the title could be published in any newspaper of general circulation in the city. The ordinance would be made available to those interested at city hall.

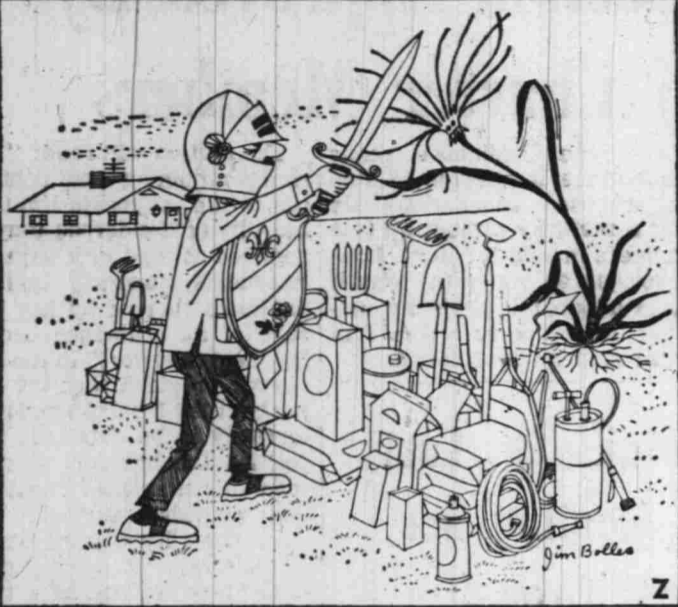

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Bible Lists Southern Nevada Water Supply Top Priority

Sen. Alan Bible, on behalf of himself and Sen. Howard Cannon, have introduced a bill to authorize the Southern Nevada Water Project.

Bible declared the \$72 million pumping and pipeline project will be vital to continued growth of Clark County. He urged immediate action on the legislation.

Cannon backed up the call for prompt action, saying, "No single piece of legislation is more vital to the survival, development and prosperity of our state."

The project, designed to transport water from Lake Mead to Las Vegas, Nellis AFB and other southern Nevada communities for municipal and industrial uses, was sponsored by the two senators in the 88th Congress. Although Bible obtained Senate Interior Committee approval, the measure did not reach a floor vote.

Both Bible and Cannon have listed the project as top priority legislation in the 89th Congress.

"This project is urgently needed to relieve a critical water supply situation in the area, to protect and conserve the dwindling ground water resources to fill the needs of a rapidly increasing population," Bible said.

He cited population growth figures and predicted more than 500,000 persons will be living in southern Nevada by the year 2000. He noted the project had the support of the Nevada Legislature and Governor, the Colorado River Commission and all local governmental agencies.

"We can no longer put off the needs of expanding population and industrial growth," Bible stressed. "Without this project the heavy federal investment in Nellis AFB, the Atomic Test Site and the NASA Project will also be hampered."

Cannon said the need for the water project "is well known to anyone even passingly concerned with the great issues that confront the development of the southwest."

"Southern Nevada," Cannon said, "awaits on the application of water to reach its fullest potential."

Cannon pointed to the economic feasibility of the project and its contribution to long-term water needs of the entire Pacific area.

"Congress has the opportunity to decide whether the growth of the southwest will be orderly and welcome or an insoluble problem and a curse," Cannon concluded.

Both senators pointed out the Southern Nevada Project is a part of the Interior Department's Southwest Pacific Water Plan, but can proceed individually.

Sawyer Wants Double Job Corps Camp at Tahoe Park

Governor Grant Sawyer recently proposed expanding a tentative federal Job Corps Camp in Ormsby County from 100 to 200 youths to allow them to help develop state park land at Lake Tahoe.

In a meeting with Job Corps Consultant Mike O'Callaghan, Sawyer also suggested a camp be established in Lincoln County.

The conference between the Governor and O'Callaghan, who resigned his position as State Health and Welfare Director to supervise Job Corps Camps in the west, was part of the federal program to evaluate possible sites in Ormsby, White Pine and Clark counties.

"So much more could be accomplished if we used all of this energy in developing the Lake Tahoe Park," Sawyer said. "Of course, some good can be done on federal lands but the prime need is on the state lands which will be used by the general public."

Sawyer said he and O'Callaghan agreed to explore these proposals further.

He said a youth camp in Lincoln County would be beneficial to the youths and to the area.

"It has always been my view that the governors are probably more aware of the needs of the state and that's the reason I and several other governors pressed for some

veto power." After the camps are officially approved by the federal Office of Economic Opportunities, then the governors have 30 days in which to veto the choices.

The Interior and Agriculture departments are presently undertaking the location studies. Sawyer said the program may be expanded to state camps and camps requested at the local level. However, the sites must be located on public land.

Trailers Spark Meeting

BOULDER CITY —

Spurred by a second request for mobile home acreage in the Hemenway Wash area overlooking Lake Mead, submitted by a city pioneer, Earl Brothers, the planning commission at its last meeting, has asked that the City Council and the master planning firm, Voorheis-Trindle, meet with the board for a final determination on locations. The group meets next Tuesday.

The planning commission and Voorheis-Trindle have vetoed every suggestion that trailer parks be allowed zoning in that area. The original request came from Robert Kesterson of Henderson more than a year ago.

He was shuttled back and forth between the planning commission and the Council until he finally asked for an appeal against the planning commission ruling and a public hearing.

During the hearing the Council made one concession, which may turn out to be a boomerang as far as policy between the two city boards. The council asked the city manager to make a description of the land Kesterson is eyeing and have it appraised for direct sale.

Council not gone on record stating that it will be sold to Kesterson, but just appraised.

Brothers' request stirred the planning commission enough to ask for a joint meeting with both Kesterson and Brothers present.

Brothers stated Tuesday night that he does not have an exact location in mind and has no intention of competing with Kesterson. His plans call for acreage for 500 mobile home spaces, to be developed as feasible.

Brothers was told to meet with City Manager William Cottrell, go over Hemenway Wash and possibly find a site before the joint meeting.

Meantime, approval of the wash zone map is held up until determination is made on trailer sites, warehousing and multi-family dwellings.

Recreation Department Lists Improvements In Past Year

Improvements and construction of several recreational facilities within the city were termed the most important developments in the recreation department during the past year, according to recreation directors Dalby Shirley and Doug Vincent.

Plans for the coming year call for improvements in offering more and varied activities, acquiring additional personnel to assist in the direction and supervision of the program, and further development when financing becomes available.

The recreation department hopes for a new swimming pool and park complex; parks and playgrounds properly equipped; additional bleachers and conveniences at the ball parks.

Due to a financial grant from Basic Management, Inc., and additional monies made available through the Clark County Fair and Recreation Board, the department was able to broaden the program to include many activities which were never offered previously due to limited accommodations.

One of the major improvements, according to the recreation department, was made in the area surrounding the swimming pool. A wading pool was constructed adjacent to the large pool, which provided many hours of enjoyment for the younger children; a pool heater was installed in the large pool. The shade area around the pool was enlarged by the addition of plexiglass patio roofing and cement decking for the enjoyment of the sunbathers, bar-b-que parties and others.

Pool Reports All-time High The swimming pool reported a 57 percent increase in pool attendance, reaching an all-time high of 26,007 paid admissions. This figure does not include the more than 500

persons enrolled in the Red Cross learn-to-swim program, nor the 5,000 student swimmers from the local schools.

Another major improvement was the completion and lighting of a tri-field baseball complex adjacent to the city park; this field was in use constantly by both junior and adult leagues, with two or three games scheduled each afternoon and evening. Backstops, drinking fountains and cyclone fencing were all installed by the city maintenance department and added to the comfort of the spectators.

Baseball Leagues

The baseball leagues were made up of 21 organized teams in all age groups, providing recreation for 420 players and 47 volunteer workers assisting as coaches and managers. The adult softball league was made up of eight teams amounting to 130 players. These two programs kept 30 umpires and officials busy throughout the summer.

During the summer, a program of gymnastics and tumbling was offered with 80 students enrolled in the evening classes and several exhibitions were given by the tumbling team in Henderson and Las Vegas. When school resumed and the equipment was no longer available fund raising events have been held by the Teenage Club to purchase this equipment.

Part-Time Employees

Throughout June, July and August, activities were scheduled from 8:30 to 10 p.m. each evening seven days a week. Five part-time employees were hired to direct and supervise the programs.

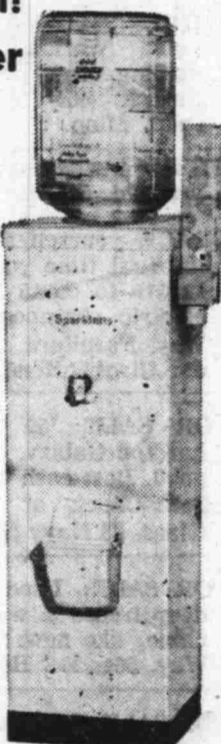
