#### Bank of Nevada To Loan the City \$85,000

The health laws of Nevada states: "every person who places, deposits or dumps, or who causes to be placed, deposited or dumped, or who CONGRATULATIONS causes or allows to overflow, any sewage, sludge, cesspool or septic tank effluent, or accumulation of human excreta, or any garbage, in or upon any street, alley, public highway or road in common use or upon any public park or other public property other than property designated or set aside for such purpose by the governing board or body having charge thereof, or upon any private property into or upon which the public is admitted by easement, license or otherwise, is guilty of a misdemeanor."

A misdemeanor is punishable by up to a \$299 fine.




