to be considered a firm offer," was unanimously approved by city councilmen in a special session last night for the sale of 1280 acres of the 17,000 acres the city will acquire from the Federal Government, to Historical Center of America for \$50 and \$100

The center received action by the Council for approval of 12,800 acres of land, asked for the whole of Section 28 and 29, which are located about a mile off Lake Mead Drive.

According to information given to the City Council, the land in Section 28 will be purchased from the Federal Government by the city for \$6700.

The land in section 29 will be purchased by the city for \$11,660, and it will be sold for \$100 an acre under the proposed agreement. The motion, as made by

> City Administrator Harold Corbin told Hardy that the pocket cost on the land for the city is peanuts per acre."

Although the city administrator could not be reached after the meeting for comment, the Council last year did appropriate \$25,000 for the survey of the land in that

It was learned from Councilman Paul Marshall following the meeting that Raymond Walters, who originally applied to the city for the land, under the name Historical Foundation of America, is one of the officers of the Historical Center of America.

He said that the Council was in agreement that title to the land would not be released to the corporation until construction was underway.







skills is an elementary school responsibility. As a consequence, there is a renewed interest in homweork in the lower grades in the hope that more homework will, of itself, bring about better achievement. It won't. Simply increasing the amount of homework will not necessarily produce better scholarship. Unless we can have better homework, the end would be worse than the beginning.

One of the first improvements that can be made in homework is to be sure it serves valid purposes. Does it provide essential practice in needed skills? Does it train in good work habits? Does it afford opportunity for increasing self-direction? Does it enrich and extend school experience? Does it help children learn to budget time? Does it acquaint pupils with out-of-school learning resources? Dose it promote growth in responsibility?

Criteria for homework helps to keep its selection in line with purposes. Good assignments are well within capabilities of pupils, are adequately motivated, are related to children's interests, extend childrens' fund of information, can be done by pupils without help from others, are reasonable in length, minimize temptation merely to copy, and can be used in the daily program.





TRAINING TOOL FOR BIRD DOG PUPPY

By Bob Bartos, Manager iskies Pet Foods Research Center

Once your bird dog puppy has mastered the command "whoa", you can make con-siderable progress with his field education with a single tool right in your own back-

yard. The tool is a bird wing at-

The tool is a bird wing attached to about 8 feet of fishing line and a rod.

Alternate between casting the wing in the air and dragging it along the ground to get the puppy to chase it, but don't let him catch it. One of your aims is to get him to realize that chasing and pouncing won't get him the bird. Keep him racing around until he's tired. At that time he'll slow down and stalk in instead of chase. You should then quietly command "whoa", and accompany this by the hand signal.



He'll "whoa", but he'll also try to reach the bird. He'll stretch, the result, a point. Once he's slowed down and is "whoaing", introduce a new command . "go in egezy", delivered in a slow.

new command . . "go in eeezy", delivered in a slow, soft voice. Move in on the bird yourself at a slow creep. If he doesn't stalk with you, repeat the command.
When he joins you, give him
the "whoa" vocally and with
hand signal. Continue this procedure, moving towards the bird with a "go in eeezy" and stopping him with the

Once he's mastered this step, hold him on point and stalk in ahead of him, moving slowly so that he doesn't break. You're now teaching him to hold the point while you go in to flush the bird.

1 pint Scotch Whisky 6 ounces (34 cup) sweet vermouth Generous dash bitters Stir with cracked ice, strain and serve with red maraschine cherries for 8 Valentine toasts. VALENTINE STEAK AND KIDNEY PIE

1/4 pound beef kidneys 11/2-2 pounds round or flank steak, cut in 11/2" cubes

1/3 cup flour 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/4 cup drippings, shortening

Pinch thyme, cayenne 1 tablespoon flour 1 bouillon cube dissolved in one cup boiling water 1/2 cup red wine

2 tablespoons parsley

2 medium onions, chopped

Prepare flaky pastry in advance from your favorite recipe, or use a prepared mix. Chill until required.

Wipe and split kidneys and remove cores, skin and any membrane. Toss these and the cut-up meat in a paper bag with flour, salt and pepper. Brown steak in hot fat, then saute kidneys with it for a few minutes. Remove to heart-shaped baking dish that holds 1 quart. Add onions to pan with more shortening if needed, and brown lightly. Then add herbs and flour and brown well. Add bouillon and wine and cook 2-3 minutes, until thickened. Taste to correct seasoning, then pour over meat and kidneys

Roll out the pastry 11/2" wider than top of pie dish. Cut a 1/2" strip around the outside of rolled out pastry, trimming ragged edge. Lay large piece of pastry over meat filling to form top crust. Roll edges under, pressing tightly to outside top edge of pan. Brush pastry edge with water. Twist the thin strip into a rope, and lay around edge of pie, pressing into other crust. Cut cupid's arrow in the center of the pie, to let steam escape.

To glaze pastry: beat one egg with 1/4 teaspoon salt and brush liberally over pastry top. Bake at 425° F, 30-40 minutes. Cover with a sheet of aluminum foil, lower oven temperature to 375° F and bake another hour. Re-glaze, if necessary, before finally removing from oven. Fill in the arrow with Creamy Horseradish Sauce. Serves 6.

TEACH BIRD DOG PUPPY BASIC COMMANDS By Bob Bartos, Manager Friskies Pet Foods Research Cente

If you're planning to train that bird dog puppy you got for Christmas to hunt, don't wait 'till he's six months old or until you get out to some wide open spaces. The latest and fully tested theory is that every puppy can and should be started on simple obedi-

be started on simple obedience training at seven weeks
old, regardless of what his
eareer is to be.

Much can be done indoors
in the largest, least cluttered
room, or outdoors, right in
your own backyard.

The basic commands for
the hunting dog are the "sit"
and "stay" which can be
taught by the usual method,
and the "come" and "whoa"
which are not.



The "come" should be taught by word, by hand signal (the drop of an extended arm) and by whistle—two blasts or whatever you decide on. The whistle is for use when the dog is out of sight and at great distance. The hand signal should be employed when he's within sight. The latter serves another purpose. It gets the dog accustomed to looking back at you for direction.

Put your pup in the "sit", "stay" position. Call "come". Simultaneously drop your raised arm, blast away on the whistle and turn and run away from him, clapping your hands as you go. He'll come running.

For the "whoa" which is

come running.

For the "whoa" which is necessary to curb a dog's natural instinct to rush in and grab the bird, put the pup in the "sit", "stay" position. Command "come". Run full steam away from the pup and then suddenly reverse and turn into him shouting "whoa" and extending your hand in the "stay" position. Repeat the procedure, each time using less of the hand signal until finally he's responding to the voice command alone.

2 pints—1 quart (32 ounces)
4 cups—1 quart

cup or 8 tablespoons.
What measuring gadgets do you need? You can do all your kitchen measuring if you have a

nest of 4 measuring cups and a set of measuring spoons. If you buy them in stainless steel, they won't break or crush, will last a long time, keep shiny and take to hot or cold ingredients. It's a good idea to hang your measuring equipment near by, so it's always at hand. If the spoons and cups do not come equipped with a hanging bar, fasten a piece of pegboard on a small area of kitchen wall and hang your gadgets up with hooks.
