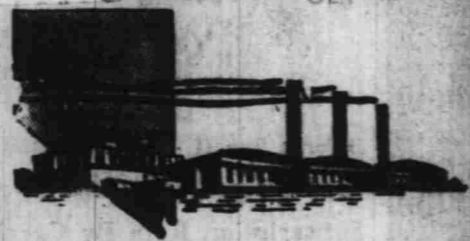

Wolves Begin Season With 30-0 Win

The Basic Wolves soundly defeated a White Pine 11, 30-0 in the season opener for both squads.

The Hendersonites who won only two games all of last year, were triumphant for the first time in a campaign started since the victory over Dixie in 1960.

Coach Callahan's stalwarts scored in every quarter, tallying once in the first three stanzas and twice in the last period.

An electrifying run by Sonny Hopkins on the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff that was good for 56 yards to the visitors 10 yard line set up the first touchdown. Hopkins took three handoffs from quarterback Jim Gibson to eat up the remaining 10 yards to paydirt with only 2:15 of the first quarter gone. The try for the extra point failed.

The Wolves recovered a Bobcat fumble on the White Pine 15 to set the stage for the second score tallied by Gibson on a quarterback sneak.

Robert Radley's pass interception and runback of 20 yards to the Bobcat's 25 started the third Basic scoring march. Five plays later Jim Ness went through a large hole over left tackle for nine yards.

Joe Tram dropped on another bobble by the Elyites early in the final stanza to start the Wolves again. Jim Ness on a cutback covered the final five yards for his second TD and the fourth for the local 11.

Jim Wiggins picked off a White Pine pass midway through the quarter and Jim Gibson sneaked it in from one yard out to complete the Basic scoring. Gibson was then slightly injured on the try for the extra point, which went away.

An alert defense headed by Joe Tram and Jim Campbell with able assistance by Bob O'Dell and Jerry Ebert and Mike Galbraith supplemented by the linebacking of Sonny Hopkins, Danny Hill and Jim Wiggins kept the visitors in check throughout. The offense sparked by the quarterbacking of Gibson and the running of Hopkins, Ness, Cox and Radley indicated a strong running attack. The passing of the Hendersonites could stand improvement.

An overall estimate indicates that the Wolves who showed excellent cohesion on the offense, moving up to the life of scrimmage with alacrity and with a varied ground game will be a more interesting club to watch than any of its recent predecessors.

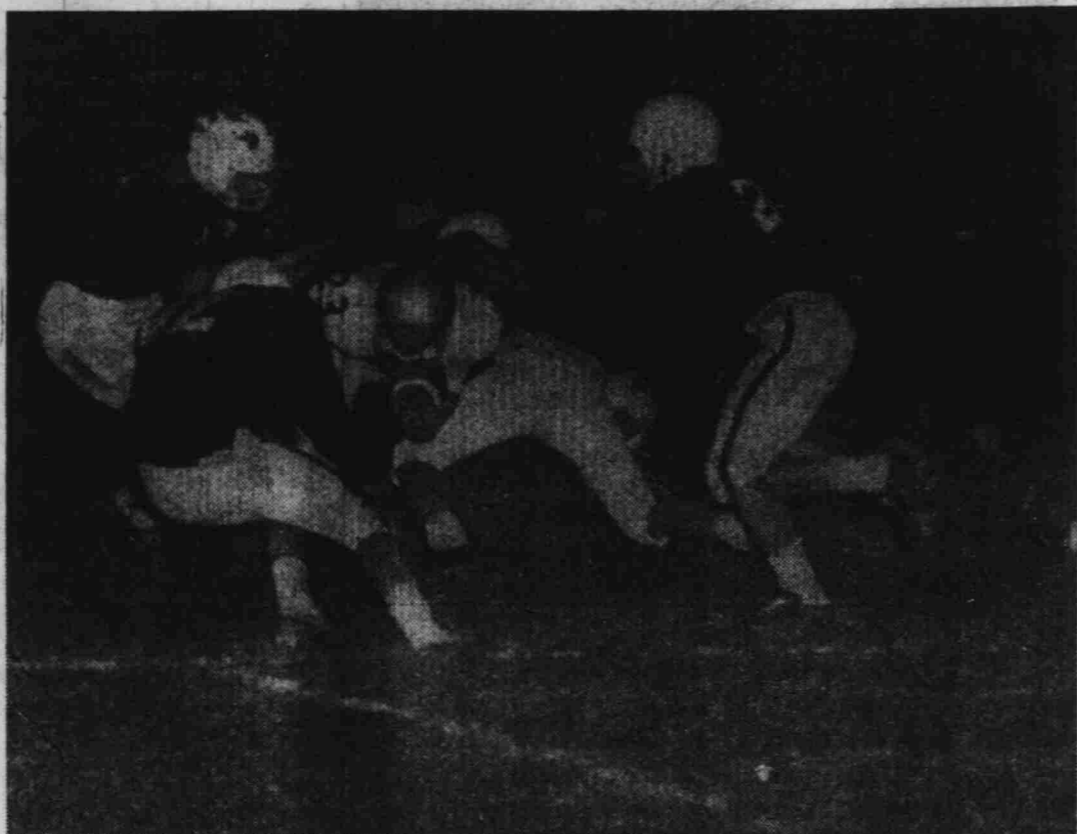

Stauffer To Produce New Material

L. F. McCollum, chairman of Continental Oil Company and Hans Stauffer, president of Stauffer Chemical Company today announced plans to build a jointly owned plant to produce vinyl chloride monomer—the basic material used in the manufacture of polyvinyl chloride plastics.

It will be located on a site adjacent to Continental Oil's petroleum refinery at Lake Charles, La. Engineering work on the new project—which will be the largest vinyl chloride plant in the U.S.—has already begun and is scheduled to be completed by December. A Stauffer-developed oxychlorination process will be used. Engineering will be handled jointly by Stauffer and Continental. Full scale commercial production is planned by late 1967.

Vinyl chloride monomer from the new plant will be used by the parent companies—by Continental's Thompson Chemical enterprises and by Stauffer's Plastics operations.

Adult Math To Be Taught At Basic High

Electronics math, an adult education evening course, will be taught at Basic High School beginning today, Sept. 14 from 7 to 10 on Tuesdays and Thursdays for 10 meetings, according to Raymond L. Sturm, director of vocational, technical, and adult education for the Clark County Schools.

There are no requirements to qualify for the course, and high school credit will be given. There is a \$6 fee.

School Burglar Takes Food From Kitchen

A burglar who took his food in large quantities, entered the Henderson Junior High School, and according to police, made off with several cases of food.

Principal Hal Bennion told police that eight cans of chocolate sauce were taken; five cans of fruit mix; one case of taco sauce; one large can of tuna fish, and a large amount of potato chips.

Police are investigating the theft.

a public hearing on the issue, and according to the city charter, he has 15 days to notify the city clerk of his wishes for a hearing, and the city clerk then has 15 days in which to set up the hearing.

There's a family in Henderson that needs help.

A 28-year-old father, his wife and three children came to Henderson three months ago from Iowa to seek work since they could obtain none at home.

Since coming here, the father has been able to find work for only three weeks time. They do not qualify for welfare because they have not been here long enough, yet the family must continue to eat and be housed.

Arnold Whiteaker, of 17 A West Lincoln, is appreciative of food which was taken to them by kind Henderson people, but he needs and wants to work to support his

family. He has done all types of work including painting and plumbing, laborer, service station attendant, truck driver, and others, but he would be willing to do any one of them.

Because he sold his car to pay the rent and buy food, he rides to Las Vegas, or North Las Vegas every day with a friend to seek work, and every day he walks the miles back home.

Perhaps the strikes in the area have caused the lack of jobs, but he is willing to try anything.

Land Applications Tabled Until Council Sees Land

Four applications for land were considered by City Councilmen last night, however action on all were postponed until Councilmen can visit the land in question.

Mayor W. R. Hampton said that a special meeting will be called after all of the Councilmen have seen the land, to consider the applications. However, he pointed out that prior to the sale of any city land, the city charter requires that the intention to sell land and a description of it must be published 30 days prior to the sale, outlining the terms of the sale so that the public will be aware of land being sold.

The first applicant for city land is the Las Vegas Building Materials, a firm which had placed claims in section 34, prior to 1955. Las Vegas Building Materials, according to Jim Henderson, has applied for nine 40-acre parcels of land in section 34. The land in question was appraised by city appraisers at around \$400 per acre. Henderson told the Council that the city acquired the land as a direct request from his firm.

The second application is from Stewart Rock and Sand who was represented by Attorney Lee Walker. Their primary request was for 640 acres, appraised at an average cost of \$375 an acre, in section 32. This firm also has long-standing gravel claims on the land.

The third application was made by Harry Polk for 40 acres in section 34 towards Boulder City, where he said he planned to construct a transmitting tower whether or not his associates were successful in getting Channel 4 television station.

The fourth parcel of land had previously been committed to Art Espinosa by the former City Council in exchange for a Water street house used for city hall frontage. The Council promised Espinosa an exchange of \$14,000 worth of land for the property, without deed restrictions, and Espinosa has requested 80 acres in Section 27, approximately 4,000 feet east of the bowling alley on the left hand side of the road toward Boulder City. He requested 40 acres on the city agreement, and said he would pay for the other 40 acres. The agreement was made in 1963.

Mayor Hampton said that six proposals for a master planning of the city including the new land had been received by the city and that the Council should study the proposals and decide what action to take.

Frank Morrell suggested that the Council study the previous policy in land sales and perhaps follow that in the sale of land. Councilman Bud Franklin suggested the appointment of a land sales advisory board to advise the Council in the land sales, and Councilwoman Ida Belle Riggins suggested that areas be retained by the city for public purposes.

Steelworkers Begin Negotiations With Titanium Metals Corp.

Following on the heels of the settlement of the Big Steel contract with steelworkers, members of Steelworkers Local 4856 at Titanium Metals Corporation, have entered negotiations, according to President Claude Evans.

They have until midnight, Sept. 30, for meetings, before the present contract officially expires.

Evans indicated that some small items and contract lan-

guage has been worked out, however, he said it is still early in the negotiations to make a statement on other contract items. He did indicate, however, that there is a difference in money.

International Steelworker's Representative, George Sirolli, from San Bernardino, is expected to arrive here within four or five days, and then meetings will be held daily between the union and the company, Evans said.

Jaycee Club House Move Given Approval by City Council

A time limit of two years was placed on a permit for the Junior Chamber of Commerce to move a Townsite house to property adjacent to the old city hall on Van Wagener street and bring it up to code.

The restriction was placed on the move by the City Council last Tuesday night after much discussion, and a previous motion which would have set the limit at one year.

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE DUE FOR COUNCIL ACTION MONDAY

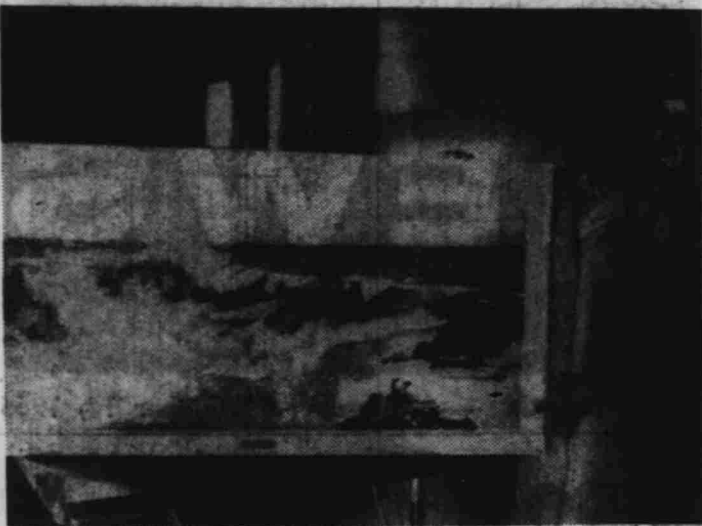
A traffic ordinance will probably be passed next Monday night by the City Council as an emergency ordinance after the 40 pages are read in the regular City Council meeting.

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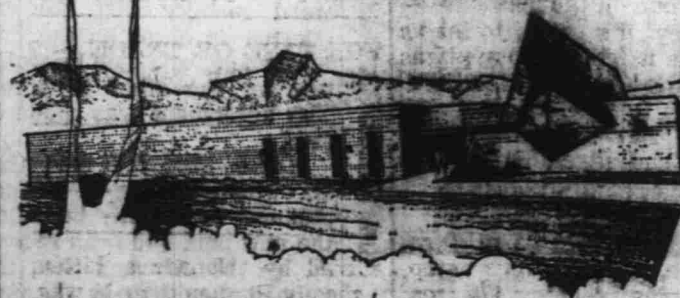

FROM THE CAPITOL

By GOV. GRANT SAWYER

Next month more than 300 representatives of business, industry and government will gather at Lake Tahoe for two days of deliberations that will play an important part in shaping the future of Nevada.

The occasion will be the second Governor's Manpower Conference scheduled Oct. 21-22 at Stateline, and the principals will be sincere and dedicated professionals who are vitally concerned with the proper development and utilization of our human resources.

Purpose of the two-day meeting will be to project Nevada's probable employment demands over the next 10 years and thus determine where shortages and surpluses in specific areas of our labor force are most likely to occur.

These manpower blueprints, representing a consensus of thinking among experts in several fields, will prove invaluable to leaders of government and private industry in a state which has nearly doubled its population in five years and is the fastest-growing, per capita, in the nation.

Prominent on the agenda will be Nevada's participation in various aspects of the War on Poverty and discussions on how our state's business community can help in developing new job opportunities for young people.

The conference will be divided into two equally-important segments. At the opening session, on Oct. 21, representatives of private industry throughout the state will meet in small groups to discuss present employment and hard-to-fill jobs as well as future employment needs. FACTS ON SHOPLIFTING REVEALED AT CHAMBER

A film, "Boosting Is a Business", which described shoplifting as an organized crime, was shown to a capacity crowd of members of the members of the Chamber of Commerce and their guests, at the Swanky Club at noon.

Various methods, used by shoplifters to steal merchandise from stores, were shown in the film, giving the local merchants many tips on what to look for.

Following the film, Chief of Police George Crisler held a question and answer session, and gave a brief talk on his experience as a law enforcement officer with shoplifters.

Crisler said that everyone in the stores should not be under suspicion, since judging from the annual revenues, most of the stores conduct normal business.

Since some shoplifters work in teams, it has been hard for law enforcement officers to convict one person for the offense, since one person may escape while the other slips the merchandise out of the store.

Posters, to be placed in prominent places as a warning to shoplifters, were shown by Ronald Langford, president of the Chamber of Commerce. It was explained that the posters give strength to the enforcement of the law by a security guard within the store.

The lightness of the sentence for shoplifting, which has been only up to six months in jail in Nevada, makes the crime more attractive than other crimes with a stiffer sentence, it was brought out by Crisler, however, a newer law changes shoplifting into a felony after the third offense in eight years, and brings the case into district court with a much longer sentence and higher fine.

Langford conducted a discussion on the Christmas program now underway by Chairman Owen Atkin. The Christmas plans for 1965 were shown to the members on a map, laying out the Christmas route starting at Water Street and Boulder Highway, where a huge overhead sign welcomes guests with "Seasons Greetings From Henderson," to the Townsite school. There a nativity scene will be placed along with a 24-foot Christmas tree.

So far the city has promised \$500 for the project, with another \$2400 promised in commitments from other sources, Atkin said. The project for this year will run around \$5,000.
