

So why can't we do anything we feel like doing? Here's the answer: Possibly we could if each of us lived entirely alone. But this is not possible. America is a land of freedom. Freedom to do as we wish and go where we will-but only if we do not trespass on the rights of others. "Your right to swing your first", said a famous judge, "ends at the point where the other fellows nose begins."

Laws guarantee your free-dom by guaranteeing your safety and your right to own and use property. Without laws, you couldn't keep your possessions if someone bigger or stronger wanted them. If your neighbor wanted your home or car or anything else you own, he could simply take them - by force. If someone didn't like you, he could at-tack, maim or even kill you. Might — not right — would prevail.

In a dictatorship, one man or one group of men makes the laws, and the people have no say about them. In America, the people we elect to govern us make our laws, They make them to meet your needs and the needs of all of us. Occasionally laws turn out to be foolish or unfair, but then people must work to have that law changed or repealed. It must be obeyed until it is changed or repealed!

There are two kinds of laws -civil and criminal. Criminal law is what the police department is concerned with. It regulates private rights and guarantees everyone the right to safety of his person and property.

A crime is committed when a criminal law is broken. There are two kinds of crime: Felonies are the more serigrand larceny, etc. Anyone committing a felony can be sent to the state prison for a states, be put to death.

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

HOW TO BUY A HEALTHY PUPPY By Bob Bartos, Manager Friskies Research Kennels

Often in the excitement of buying a puppy, you buy blind. Some of the more com-mon pitfalls are selecting the one with the most distinctive or amusing markings, the smallest one, the fattest, or the one that looks the most in need of a home . . . the shy little fellow off in a corner.

If you let your head rather than your eyes or heart dictate your choice, you should look for characteristics that spell health and sturdiness. Be guided by the following check-points:

1. Good legs. Pupples 7 or 8 weeks old, the minimum age you should buy a puppy, are already fairly steady on their legs unless they're displayed on paper or other slip-If you let your head rather

played on paper or other slip-pery surface. In such event, ask that they be placed where they can get some traction; and then watch them move from front, rear and side view. Eliminate the puppy whose rear legs slide out from under him and keep in contention those with good control of their legs.



2. Clear unwatery eyes and non-running nose.
3. Clean pink cars.
4. Firm pink gums and a

good bite.

5. Healthy-looking coat free of bald or dull patches. Look under the hair for a clean

6. Puppy plumpness but not a bloated-looking tummy which may indicate wormiwhich may indicate worminess.

7. Normal hearing. Make a sharp noise. Be suspicious of any puppy that doesn't respond to the rumpus.

8. General alertness and playfulness.


