Council Gives Nod to Air Pollution Ord.

An addendum to the air pollution ordinance was approved Monday morning in a brief special session of the City Council over which Mayor Pro Tem Ida Belle Riggins, presided.

With Mayor W. R. Hampton out of town, and Dr. Paul Marshall, unavailable, the measure was approved by Mrs. Riggins, and Councilmen Dale Roberts and Bud Franklin.

Mrs. Riggins explained that she and Mayor Hampton, and City Manager Ralph Pfiffner had attended a meeting in Las Vegas where the ordinance has been questioned by Las Vegas officials concerning the use of tax money to pay for the service, and the addendum had been requested. The local Council had also questioned the matter when it was approved here.

Dump Trash At City Dump, Doherty Warns

City Building Superintendent Pat Doherty issued a second warning this week that those who dump trash and debris in the desert will be cited to appear in municipal court.

Doherty said that the city dump is free for those wishing to use the facilities, and there is no need to dump in the desert.

Those cited for dumping could face a six months jail term or a \$299 fine, or both, Doherty said.

Doherty asked the support of local residents in the cleanup effort of the city.

Meeting Set To Check Ticket Sales

A meeting to check on ticket sales for the annual football banquet at Basic High School, set for Thursday, Jan. 27, will be held Wednesday, according to ticket sales Chairman "Andy" Anderson. Mrs. Nellie Bunch, whose office experience spans 31 years, two months and two days, was honored on her retirement from the Whitney post office, last Thursday by high post office officials at the Eldorado Club for a luncheon.

Mrs. Bunch was honored with telegrams and letters by people who could not attend, 74 postmasters from four different Nevada counties were present, along with four guests, and Bob Lias, postmaster from Las Vegas, who was master of ceremonies; Ray Germain, regional assistant director from San Francisco, and Ed White, postal service officer from Reno.

Two readings were presented and a piano and violin duet, along with speakers. She was presented an award for her service, and a pen and pencil set with a plaque.

Mrs. Bunch retired from the post office on Dec. 30 in order to obtain a higher retirement rate, and she joins her husband now at home, who is also retired.

She began her career with the post office in 1934 in Whitney, when the postmaster at that time asked her if she would be interested in taking over, since he was leaving. Her answer was, "Oh, yes, I guess so."

Her post office went from fourth class to second class during her tenure in office, and she said that she loved the post office and her work from the time she opened it up in the morning, until she closed it at night.

She dreaded retiring so much that it almost made her sick, but she figured it would take over two more years work to make up what she would lose on her retirement if she didn't take it when she did.

City to Study Improvements For Boulder Highway Streets

The city traffic advisory board recommended recently that an evaluation be made for various locations on Boulder highway for possible improvement for channelization and lighting.

Jack Parvin, district engineer, said he had received a letter from Otis Wright of the State Highway Department, relating to "Highway Safety Improvement" projects, for existing hazardous locations on all federal aid highways. The use of federal-aid funds would be used, although Parvin said that his department would not receive additional funds for this program, but would use present budgets.

Locations recommended were Water street and Boulder highway, Basic and Boulder highway, Lake Mead and Water street, and Major avenue and Boulder highway.

Parvin said it was his feeling that there should be a minimum of cross overs on Boulder highway, and the board agreed that a study should be made to see if some could be removed. The board suggested that barricades be installed at Titanium and Lake Mead Drive and Haynes Drive and Lake Mead Drive since the re-construction of Lake Mead Drive makes these streets no longer necessary.

Discussion was also held regarding the Pittman fire truck as it enters Boulder highway from Coogan street on emergency calls. Chief Don Richard stated that an installation of a warning traffic device should be taken under consideration for safety precautions. Police Chief George Crisler said that this matter had been discussed by the Council, however, no estimates had been given by a contractor. City

Manager Ralph Pfiffner requested a letter from Parvin regarding permission to install a traffic warning signal device at the intersection.

Flower Show Plans Made By Patio Unit

Plans for the annual spring flower show, which will be held at St. Peter's hall on April 23 and 24 were discussed at the recent meeting of the Patio unit of the Desert Gardeners.

Thelma Oldfield of the Purple Sage unit attended as a guest and suggested that the three units combine their March meetings where a federated judge would instruct the members on proper grooming procedures for the flowers to be entered in the show.

Guest speaker for the evening was Joe Mast, art instructor from Las Vegas. He demonstrated the art of arranging dried material and emphasized the use of simple unobtrusive containers which should be earth colored. He pointed out the unit of container and plant material to be used and the establishing of lines which follow the lines of the container. Several arrangements were given using among other things, dried greasewood, galax leaves, Mormon tea, and globe thistle.

The modern arrangement was composed of cockscomb, sunflower pods and Ivy leaves, and showed the element of surprise which is a characteristic of modern interpretations.

The collecting of material such as sand, rocks, shells, glass chips, marbles, driftwood and bones, was suggested for use at a future time.

This is a free country. So why can't we do anything we feel like doing? Here's the answer: Possibly we could if each of us lived entirely alone. But this is not possible. America is a land of freedom. Freedom to do as we wish and go where we will—but only if we do not trespass on the rights of others. "Your right to swing your fist", said a famous judge, "ends at the point where the other fellow's nose begins."

Laws guarantee your freedom by guaranteeing your safety and your right to own and use property. Without laws, you couldn't keep your possessions if someone bigger or stronger wanted them. If your neighbor wanted your home or car or anything else you own, he could simply take them — by force. If someone didn't like you, he could attack, maim or even kill you. Might — not right — would prevail.

In a dictatorship, one man or one group of men makes the laws, and the people have no say about them. In America, the people we elect to govern us make our laws. They make them to meet your needs and the needs of all of us. Occasionally laws turn out to be foolish or unfair, but then people must work to have that law changed or repealed. It must be obeyed until it is changed or repealed!

There are two kinds of laws — civil and criminal. Criminal law is what the police department is concerned with. It regulates private rights and guarantees everyone the right to safety of his person and property.

A crime is committed when a criminal law is broken. There are two kinds of crime: Felonies are the more serious. They include murder, serious assault or mayhem, grand larceny, etc. Anyone committing a felony can be sent to the state prison for a year or more or, in some states, be put to death. Misdemeanors are less serious.

Excise Tax Removal Brings Low Cost to Extra Telephone

If you have been putting off a color telephone in the bedroom or an extension phone in the den because of expense, you can get one with slight extra cost now that the Federal excise tax has been cut, according to Hershel Trumbo, president of the Henderson Telephone Company.

Congress cut the tax levied on telephone subscribers for local and long distance service from 10 per cent to 3 per cent effective January 1.

Trumbo said the immediate tax saving of 7 per cent on the average residential bill will just about pay for either of these convenience services.

"The tax-cut offers a wonderful opportunity for many family gifts on special occasions throughout the year, said Trumbo, whose company is a member of the U.S. Independent Telephone Association (USITA). The nation's 2,400 independent (non-Bell) companies operate more than 15 million phones covering more than half the country's geographic service area.

Trumbo pointed out that USITA was a leader in the drive to end the excise tax, originally imposed as a "temporary" measure during the Korean War. The current 3 per cent tax will drop 1 per cent a year until it is wiped out in 1969.

He went on to explain that subscribers could obtain a variety of other services at bargain prices, through different applications of the tax saving. For example, it would help pay for an additional phone.

Science Fair Big Success At PTA Meet

Young scientists, from grade three through six, attracted a capacity audience at their science fair held last Tuesday evening at Basic Elementary School.

What was scheduled as a voluntary science exhibit snowballed into well over 200 quality entries with their youthful enthusiasts as the catalyst. The event took place at the regular Parent-Teacher's meeting.

"No one was under any compulsion to enter this show; it was strictly voluntary," stated John Coe, sixth grade teacher and coordinator of the event.

The gamut of almost every avenue of science was shown: from the candle's need for oxygen to a complete weather station worked out by a scientific minded sixth grader.

Undeniably, one of the reasons for this student's great interest in science is the use of the school's new Mobile Laboratory which was demonstrated by Coe. This unit, designed by Coe for use in the area school system, resembles a chemistry lab; it looks like a lab used in high schools and colleges, only this one can be rolled into the classroom and used by several classes. It is supplied with water, heat, storage, supplies and a work area.

Apropos of an evening of science an AEC loaned film, "Underground Testing Weapons" showed the intricacies involved in an underground nuclear shot at the Nevada Test Site. This was particularly enlightening inasmuch as so many workers are from Henderson and their families could learn something of the area in which they worked.

Mrs. Barbara Bagley, vice president, conducted the meeting in the absence of the president, Mrs. Freema Rose. Gordon McCaw, principal, commended the students for their entries.

The pledge of allegiance was led by Girls Scout Troop 101 under the direction of their leaders, Mrs. Merle Brown and Mrs. Glee Currier. The girls participating were Pam Gibbs, Debbie Currier, Martie Brown and Roxanne Cox.

Rev. Glenn H. Lutz, minister of First Presbyterian Church gave the invocation. Refreshments were served by the fourth grade room mothers. Miss Cunningham's fourth grade room won the cash prize for the greatest parent participation.

HOW TO BUY A HEALTHY PUPPY

Often in the excitement of buying a puppy, you buy blind. Some of the more common pitfalls are selecting the one with the most distinctive or amusing markings, the smallest one, the fattest, or the one that looks the most in need of a home... the shy little fellow off in a corner.

If you let your head rather than your eyes or heart dictate your choice, you should look for characteristics that spell health and sturdiness. Be guided by the following check-points:
1. Good legs. Puppies 7 or 8 weeks old, the minimum age you should buy a puppy, are already fairly steady on their legs unless they're displayed on paper or other slippery surface. In such event, ask that they be placed where they can get some traction; and then watch them move from front, rear and side view. Eliminate the puppy whose rear legs slide out from under him and keep in contention those with good control of their legs.



2. Clear unwatery eyes and non-running nose.
 3. Clean pink ears.
 4. Firm pink gums and a good bite.
 5. Healthy-looking coat free of bald or dull patches. Look under the hair for a clean skin.
 6. Puppy plumpness but not a bloated-looking tummy which may indicate worminess.
 7. Normal hearing. Make a sharp noise. Be suspicious of any puppy that doesn't respond to the rumpus.
 8. General alertness and playfulness.
- Now your heart can take over and you can choose from those that passed muster on all points, the one that most appeals to you from personality, markings or size standpoint.

Intertie Segment To Begin

BOULDER CITY — The award of a \$13,602,662 contract for construction of the southern leg of the mammoth intertie system near Boulder City is announced by Senators Alan Bible and Howard W. Cannon.

Bible and Cannon said that the award would cover a 230 mile segment of 345 KV single circuit line from Lake Mead substation at Hoover Dam to the Liberty station near Phoenix, Arizona. The low bidder on the project was the Power Line Erectors of Spokane, Washington.

Appeal Planned On TV 4

BOULDER CITY — Las Vegas broadcaster Mike Gold, one of the applicants for Boulder City's channel 4 television outlet, plans to appeal a recent decision of the Federal Communications Commission to allot the channel to Charles Vanda of Beverly Hills, Calif., also an applicant. Gold, owner of radio station KLUC, states he is prepared to take his case through the federal courts if a review board of the FCC turns him down.

FCC examiner Gifford Irion admitted that the decision to bypass Gold was a difficult one since both Vanda and Gold were considered financially qualified to erect a station. Gold would build in Boulder City, having already picked out a site for his facility, and Vanda plans to move the station to Henderson. Either would serve approximately the same area. Irion stated that actually Gold's facility would include more people.

Also, Gold proved in the long series of hearings that there is a greater need for the service here than in Henderson, Irion said. In Irion's opinion, Vanda had one advantage over Gold. He has a long experience in TV programming. Gold has operated radio broadcast stations. Further, Vanda planned to take direct management of his station and Gold apparently would hire others.

Baring Endorses BM Pilot Plant

BOULDER CITY — Bureau of Mines employe George Vaughan's plea to the Nevada delegation to propose that the local metallurgical research station be considered for a pilot plant for converting scrap automobiles, into useful metal, has borne fruit for the second time.

Congressman Walter Baring has written a letter to Vaughan commending him on his suggestion that the government use the Boulder City facility rather than go to the expense of building another plant.

Sen. Cannon, in a telegram to the NEWS last

week stated that he has ordered a field study of the proposed pilot plant with the local station as an argument for using existing facilities to hold down federal spending.

Congressman Baring's letter is as follows:

"Dear Mr. Vaughan: I feel that you have made a very constructive and sensible suggestion that the Bureau of Mines use the present Boulder City pilot plant to house their proposed pilot plant for converting scrapped automobile hulls into useful metal. I have, accordingly, addressed a letter to the Bureau of Mines not only endorsing your request, but also urging that everything possible be done to modify the present pilot plant to whatever extent is necessary so that it can house the proposed pilot plant. I shall be more than happy to advise you further upon receipt of information from the Bureau of Mines.

ATOM SMASHER PROSPECT DIMS

BOULDER CITY — Talk of alternatives to the \$348 million atomic reactor planned by the Atomic Energy Commission which 43 states are competing for may scuttle plans to build the mighty plant, according to a congressman from California who is a member of the Joint Senate-House Atomic Committee.

The expense of the war in Viet Nam as well as proposed domestic federal programs could cause the AEC to shelve the project and consider the AEC's existing 33-billion electric volt atom smashers at Brookhaven Laboratory, Long Island, N.Y. be scaled up to 120-150 BEV range; a suggestion from the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory of the University of California that the existing 200-BEV plan be scaled down to a lower intensity. This would cost about \$260 million; or a suggestion by Prof. R. R. Wilson of Cornell that a \$150 million machine of lower intensity be built with provisions to increase its intensity over a period of years.

Selection of either of the latter proposals would still require AEC to choose a site. Eldorado Valley, Boulder City's neighboring area, is one of the sites under consideration for the original atomic reactor.

R. Williamson Serving Army In Okinawa

Marine Private Roger O. Williamson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Williamson of 301 Major Ave., is serving as an infantryman with the Basic Training Unit of Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division at Camp Schwab, Okinawa.

As a regiment in continuous training, the 1st Marines participate in amphibious landings on the beaches of Okinawa and practice the techniques of counter-guerrilla warfare in the dense jungle growth on the northern most part of the island.

This training, combined with the unique facilities available on Okinawa, enables the 1st Marine Division to maintain a constant state of combat readiness.

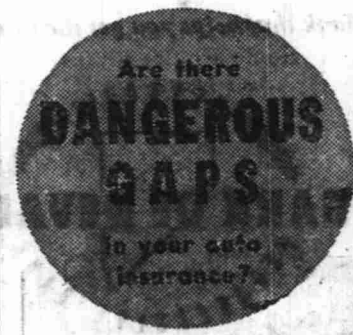

Late in the 19th Century, a well-known industrialist barked out four words that echoed across America and took root, like a bad seed, in the nation's consciousness.

The words, of course, were "The Public Be Damned." In the years since then, however, substantial change has blotted out that message. Nowadays business cares a great deal about what the public thinks and wants. What's more, considerable time, effort, skill and hard cash reflect this modern business attitude.

Just recently, a leading business organization took another eventful step in the direction of further protecting the interests of corporations and their public stockholders. In a new booklet entitled "The Corporate Director and The Investing Public", the New York Stock Exchange outlined the many responsibilities of corporate management.

Among other things, for example, the booklet urges corporate executives to announce promptly important company news to the public, avoid premature announcements of new products not yet realistically tested and include outside directors on the company's board.

The new Stock Exchange publication also recommended that corporate officials ought to wait until the news of company earnings, dividends and other important developments has first appeared in the press before making a purchase or sale of the stock. Quite plainly, this would avoid the inference that officials had an inside advantage over the public.

Under the circumstances, it isn't surprising that America's 20 million investors have access to more and better information than ever before. Over a period of many years the Stock Exchange and other organizations have contributed much to this climate of disclosure. As partners in our free enterprise economy, investors deserve to be served instead of damned.

American business, in other words, has come a long way since the time when public opinion could be ignored with those four searing words. As President John F. Kennedy of the Stock Exchange says in the booklet, "The interests of stockholders, employees, customers, and the general public must all be recognized by corporations and their directors."

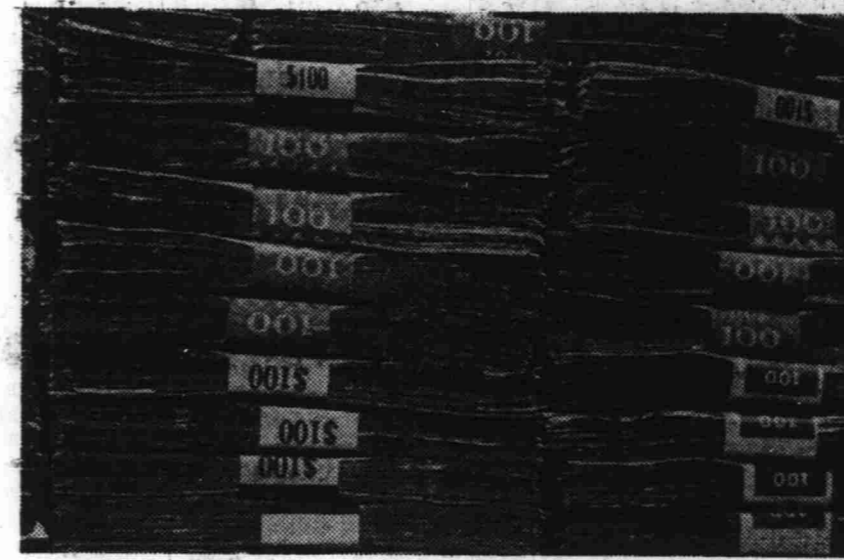
