Here's Senator Gibson's First Story From Legislature

(Editor's Note — Each session of the legislature, this newspaper has always presented first hand coverage, as seen through the eyes of our own representative. This year, Senator Jim Gibson has again consented to send us weekly dispatches by telegram. This is his first:)

State Senator — this area
The first week of the 5th session of the Nevada State Legislature began rather slowly, an indication of the hectic problems which lie ahead. The assembly organized quickly, retaining Mel Close, Jr. of Las Vegas as its speaker, with Bill Swackhamer of Battle Mountain as majority floor leader.

The senate became involved in a dispute over the number of committees which should be organized. In the past session there were 19. There were two proposals offered, one for 16 committees and the other for 12 committees.

The parliamentary maneuvering took up two days, during which tempers flared and feelings were ruffled. When the vote was finally taken, the suggestion for 12 committees was adopted.

The vote in favor was 13 to 7, with 4 Democrats joining the 9 Republicans to make the majority vote. Proctor Hug, Sr. of Reno, Vernon Bunker and M. J. Christensen of Las Vegas, and Gibson from Henderson voted with the prevailing side.

However, the vote was not a partisan matter.

It was done in the interest of improving the efficiency of the senate in attacking the great load of legislation which will be coming up this year. With only 12 committees, all of them will be working committees, and all of the members will be kept busy with their assignments.

Several of those who voted for the 16 committees indicated they were in favor of going to 12 or even fewer eventually. The main disagreement was over the timing.

The effect of reapportionment is very evident in the committee organization that has been established, nine of the 12 senate committees are chaired by Clark County senators. In the assembly, 10 of the 20 committees are chaired by Clark County assemblymen.

In addition, the leaders of the 2 houses, Close in the assembly and Mahlon Brown in the senate, are from Clark County. Many of the major committees have strong representation from our county: Senate Finance has three members from Clark, including the chairman, Floyd Lamb; Senate Taxation has three members from Clark County, and so it goes.

I have been assigned as chairman of taxation; chairman of federal, state and local governments; and as a member of finance and state institutes.

In the assembly our representatives have been assigned as follows: Art Espinosa, chairman of public health and public morals, member of banking, insurance and corporations, education, and taxation committees; Hal Smith is a member of building and construction, fish and game and state, county and city affairs committees; Bryan Hafen is a member of agriculture, irrigation and livestock, civil defense and veterans affairs and state, county and city affairs committees.

In both houses the majority party designates the chairman of each committee and names a majority of each committee.

In this session the Democrats have a majority, though narrow, in each house: 21 to 19 in the assembly and 11 to 9 in the senate.

I might comment that Art Espinosa and Hal Smith have been well accepted by their

Now, too, the channeling of important legislation won't be thru the chairs of those who used to control the place. Problems of taxation, judiciary, education, and gaming will be handled by more votes, more talent, more men with different opinions — so that railroading of key bills will be stopped.

At this moment we can doff our hats in praise to our own Jim Gibson, I am told, and to Chic Hecht and Vernon Bunker and M. J. Christensen, and Reno's Proctor Hug Sr.

And at this moment, I am also told, we can pinch our noses and say phooey to the rest of the Southern Nevadans for their work to date.

Maybe the tanning the latter group took last week will make them wake up and start legislating for the best interests of all. They had better if they want the voters on their side the next election.

The voter, thank the Lord, is becoming more intelligent with each passing year — and the day will come when officeholders will be the very top qualified people, but there by the informed and dedicated voters using the highest level of intelligence in history.

Things are looking up about town since the Lake Adair discussions broke out into the open.

Now we hear — another local plant will start building additional processing equipment for a new product.

And that a very large hunk of land within the city limits is due for development.

And that one of the city water wells is being checked out for production, so as to make water available to a new area.

And that one of the five acre tracts near the golf course will soon have a home put together on it.

And that the gals of the town can soon be having another spot to find the latest style dresses.

And that Hirsch Trumbo still has hopes of giving our town a big derby winner — from one of the colts he's training at his stables.

Section 19 Assessment Dist. Discussed at City Hall Meet

The possibility of developing section 19 property south of the golf course was discussed at a meeting held at city hall Wednesday night with over 40 property owners attending.

The formation of assessment districts for either water and sewer or water, sewer and streets was discussed, and a rough estimate of cost given for each property owner

for the two possibilities. Some property owners were interested in trying to develop a block with the improvements.

City Manager George Charchalis and Public Works Director George Charchalis explained the cost estimates to those present. Over 153 cards have been sent to property owners in that area, and DeValcourt said that only about half have replied.

coordinating committee. Her husband is a dermatologist and they have two daughters, Jan and Carla.

All members are urged to attend this legislative meeting.

Fire Losses Total \$134,920 For Past Year

Total fire losses for the past year were set at \$134,920, according to a fire report by Don Richard, fire chief, to the City Council.

Broken down, the fire losses were \$70,500 in building loss; \$50,623 in content loss; and \$13,796 in other losses.

There were 14 fire calls during the month of December, 8 were in buildings, 1 grass, 1 vehicle, 2 miscellaneous, and 2 false alarms.

One of the fires was caused by grease on a range, 4 by children with matches, 3 undetermined, and miscellaneous.

There was one needless fire call, 14 ambulance calls, 4 with the resuscitator.

Lake Adair Proposal Gets City Council Scrutiny

Numerous questions concerning the annexing of the proposed \$320 million City of Lake Adair were raised by City Councilmen last night as a prelude to any legal action the City may take, and the questions will be formulated into a document and forwarded to the Port Holiday Authority for answers.

A fair-sized group of citizens attended the meeting and also contributed questions which they would like answered concerning the project.

J. Carlton Adair of the Port Holiday Authority appeared before the City Council last Monday night to explain the proposed recreational community, and laid down the ground rules under which the Lake Adair project would be annexed to Henderson.

The three main considerations were (1) That the City's name be changed to "City of Lake Adair"; (2) That the City complex be moved to the lake; and (3) that the City enter into an assessment district for the construction of the dam.

City Manager George Charchalis explained to the Council that the present city hall would remain in service at least until the new building is completed.

City Councilman Giles Franklin said he believes the biggest question boils down to whether or not the city wants to take a chance on the bond issue, and one of the questions the Council will seek an answer to will be how much is the value of the land in question now, and what it will be worth after the construction of the dam, since the land will be the security on which the assessment district will be based.

One question was whether or not the City had secured evidence that the name firms mentioned as partners in the project are sincerely interested, and Charchalis said that he has received several an-

swers to his, concerning their interest. He stated he has received answers from Gulf Oil, Brunswick Corp., and a bonding firm, affirming that they are involved and wish to participate but not mentioning the financial participation. He said he had no answer from General Electric as yet. It has been established in prior conversation that Gulf Oil has committed around \$400,000 in the project.

One question the Council wished to have answered is whether or not construction will be going on while the dam and lake are being formulated, and whether a dam and lake are feasible by engineering standards in that area. Who will own and maintain the lake and dam, are other questions which were posed.

Youth Arrested On Arson Charge

Three charges of arson were filed against a 15-year-old youth who said he wouldn't mind going to the juvenile home so he could get "three meals a day."

The youth was arrested Thursday by Assistant Fire Chief Dale Starr and Police

Lt. Jim Jensen. He admitted to the officers that he set the \$4,000 fire at the Jolly Jug and on two of Price's cabins, where little damage was done. He also admitted pulling the main power switches at the Triple K Trailer Park and at Cole's Auto Sales and the Outpost Motel.

Dance classes in tap, and ballet will be held Friday at the youth center from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. Instructor will be Barbara Johnson. Fee is \$5. Baton instruction will be held each Tuesday and Friday from 4 to 5 p.m. for 8 weeks or 16 hours. Miss Carlotta Boyer is the teacher. Fee is \$5.

Council OKs Old AF 'Hospital' in Sec. 19

City Councilmen last night approved by a 4-1 vote, the moving of a former Nellis Air Force frame hospital building to property owned by Frank Morrell in Section 19, and at the same time proposed legislation to govern the future moving of such buildings.

Councilwoman Ida Belle

Riggins voted against allowing the house to be moved into the area of the golf course, saying that if you allow one then the Council has an obligation to other applicants.

Morrell told the Council that not one square inch of the old building will be showing either inside or out. He said the only reason he wanted the building is that its floor plan fitted drawings which he had already had made for a new home. Both the inside and outside of the home will be stripped to conform to his proposed stucco construction.

Funeral Held Yesterday For James Farndale

Funeral services for James Farndale, executive director of the Federal Housing Authority and on the Clark County Housing Authority for many years, were held Monday at Bunker Brothers Chapel.

Rev. Douglas Harrell, of the First Methodist Church officiated.

Farndale, a 38-year resident of Southern Nevada, died Friday in his home at 922 S. Casino Center Blvd. He was 81.

Well-known in legislative, labor and veterans circles, Farndale was instrumental in helping to establish many of their standard practices today.

He is survived by his wife Edna; two sons, James and Gordon, and two daughters, Mrs. John Rydell and Mrs. Sam Mentzer, all residing out of state; two brothers, Alfred and John Farndale, and three sisters, Mrs. Dorothy Ross, Mrs. Mary Brown and Mrs. Grace Holms, all residing in England and Canada.

Farndale was business agent for Carpenter's local 1780 in Las Vegas during the 1930's and later rose to prominence as a member of the Central Labor Council, the Building Trades Council and Governor's Board of Labor Relations.

He was elected to the Nevada Assembly in 1936 and again in 1940. Farndale was also a member of the state senate from 1942 to 1946.

He was a life member, past commander and past department commander of the VFW, a member of the American Legion, Veterans of World War I, disabled American Veterans and the First Methodist Church.

He was born in Yorkshire, England. He was buried in Mt. View Gardens of Memory.

Frank Thanel Services Held Yesterday

Services for long-time resident Frank C. Thanel, 65, who died Friday at Rose de Lima Hospital, were held Sunday and Monday at Palm Chapel.

Rosary was said Sunday at 7:30 p.m., and Mass at 10 a.m. Monday, with Msgr. Robert Anderson of St. Peter's Catholic Church officiating.

Thanel, who resided at 314 Water St. with his wife Pearl, was a 24-year resident of Henderson. He was born in Calloway, Neb., June 10, 1901. He worked as a painter.

He was a member of St. Peter's Catholic Church and a member of the Painters Local 159 since 1942.

He is survived by his wife Pearl, step-daughter Mary Lou Pearson of Needles, Calif., and a sister Mrs. Edith Shaffer of Nebraska, and a brother Bill Thanel of Brady, Neb. Interment was at Palm Memorial Park in Henderson.

Water Supply Offices Are Expected for Henderson

Although Bureau of Reclamation officials in Boulder

City said they could give no official word for "about two or three weeks," the possibility of putting the headquarters here was discussed at a meeting of the Colorado River Commission Thursday. Executive manager of the Colorado River Commission, Pat Head, discussed the matter with board members during a meeting held in Las Vegas earlier this week.

It was learned that the General Services Administration is seeking a central location for the construction office, of the project which will serve all of Southern Nevada.
