L. Henderson Involved In New Career

PFC Lawrence D. Henderson, son of Mahzel Stolorworthy, 19 New Mexico Way, is now involved in playing the most important role of his Army career.

As a member of the maintenance department, 9th Maintenance Battalion USAR-EUR Augmentation Readiness Group he is participating in the placement of equipment from armored battalions in controlled humidity storage.

The placement of armored vehicles in storage is not an easy task because all vehicles must be ready for a combat mission when stored. As a result, extremely technical, skilled, and competent personnel are needed for this important job. Each vehicle is put through rigorous maintenance checks using the most up-to-date Army maintenance systems. The vehicles are then loaded by a team of Army specialists to prepare it for a combat mission. After all work is completed, the vehicle is finally positioned in a controlled humidity storage warehouse with an assurance that it will be able to perform a combat mission if ever needed.

PFC Henderson's position is an important one for the Army because controlled humidity storage is a test project.

one of the four major terminals of the Pacific Northwest-Pacific Southwest Intertie, the Department of the Interior announced today.

The Mead Substation will be the southern terminus of a 750-kilovolt direct-current line of 1,350,000 kilowatts capacity now being built between The Dalles on the Columbia River and Hoover Dam. A similar 750-kilovolt d-c line will run from the Mead Substation to Los Angeles, and a 345-kilovolt a-c line to connect the Mead Substation to the Phoenix area is now under construction. Alternating current at various voltages will be fed into the substation from the Hoover and Parker-Davis powerplants of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Work under the construction contract for Mead Substation will include installation of a-c equipment such as transformers, circuit breakers and shunt reactors. Other work includes constructing concrete footings for the equipment, furnishing and erecting steel structures for the taplines to the substation, constructing a

service building, furnishing and erecting steel towers, and installing various electrical equipment to be furnished by the Government. A contract was awarded in February 1967 for the site grading of the substation.

Prospective contractors can obtain copies of the bid invitations, specifications, bid forms, and other information by writing to the Office of Chief Engineer, Denver Federal Center, Denver, Colorado 80225.

The bids are scheduled to be opened June 8, and award of the contract is expected by the end of that month.

The Dalles-Mead line and a similar 750-kilovolt d-c non-Federal line to be built between the Columbia River and Los Angeles will be the country's first — and the world's longest — extra high voltage direct-current transmission lines ever built. These two lines, plus two 500-kilovolt a-c lines running between the Columbia River and southern California, will form the backbone of the giant Pacific Northwest-Pacific Southwest Intertie.
