

Will It Be Byrne — Roberts — Polk? We Hope You Like Dr. Marshall — Barney Cannon

Will this community today select the combine of Bill Byrne-Dale Roberts and Harry Polk to guide Henderson's destinies in the years ahead—or will it take the view this newspaper believes to be the wisest choices by electing Dr. Paul Marshall and Barney Cannon to the city council?

The best interests of our city will be served if you retain on the city council the honorable, educated, capable, non-political Dr. Paul Marshall.

The best interests of this city will be served if you bring to the council the man who has served this community so well as head of the county hospital board—the

pioneer Henderson resident—Barney Cannon.

In the third race calling for your vote on Tuesday you have two candidates of equal ability, honesty, dedication, altho the incumbent Ida Belle Riggins has more experience and knowledge of the city problems over the challenger Pratt Prince. The best interests of our city will be served by whom ever you vote for in this race.

We urge you to remember the horrible tension, the disrespect and notoriety this city went thru during the eight years Bill Byrne was in office.

It is silly to list again the mess the city was put in under his administration—the involvement in land transactions that caused district attorney and grand jury investigations of conflict of inter-

est; the expenditures of thousands of dollars of city money on water well expeditions and electrical changeovers that were not necessary to a city on a tight budget; the countless granting of contracts without putting the contracts out to bid; the endless disunity on the council that made for bitter council meetings and created a divided community at a time when all of us should have been driving in the same direction to build this city into one we could always be proud to be a part of.

Byrne, an employee of Harry Polk, should not be allowed to use his judgement in the sales of millions of dollars of city land, which are soon coming up for decision.

Dr. Paul Marshall, in his term on the council, has been strictly non-political, has weighed every matter with

the fair, educated, deliberate mind that made us who attended meetings proud of him, a layman called to serve his neighbors.

He does not deserve being defeated by Byrne just because Byrne is politically wise and is more adept at selling a story to the voters.

Marshall is just plain layman—even as you and I—who calls them as he sees them, knows he represents all the people and will not be persuaded by special interests, lobbyists, pressure groups.

Byrne had his chance years ago in the state legislature—but fouled up his record of achievement by involvement in his purchase of state-owned land which developed into a questionable action.

Byrne had his chance as a city mayor years ago and fouled it up when this news-

paper revealed documents showing his name on both sides of a land transaction where the city sold land to a Polk-owned corporation, which we felt was conflict of interest, not to the best interests of the people.

The whole mess brought the citizens to the polls at the next election to install a city charter system and to defeat Byrne and elect the honorable Mayor Bob Hampton.

When Dale Roberts first came to our attention as a council candidate four years ago, he impressed us with his good looks, his youthful enthusiasm. We knew nothing of his ability but we backed him against the then councilman, because that councilman had also been involved in city land transactions which seemed to be in conflict of interest. We felt the people needed a

change and said so—and on election day Roberts won.

Roberts took office and started out well, then he changed as more and more decisions of importance came up. His judgements have, in our opinion, held back the city's progress and his recent associations with the Byrne-Polk group indicate his thinking reflects their thinking—and it is this writer's sincere opinion—the Byrne-Polk-Roberts thinking is not what this city needs.

Barney Cannon, on the other hand, could come in fresh—and with the experience he has had serving on other boards—plus his own pure layman thinking will be the added punch to give the rest of the council the right balance to make the most of the great years ahead.

In Cannon and Marshall,

you could go to bed at night knowing they are carrying well the responsibility of protecting the city, your homes, your children, your city owned land.

You are the voter—and will vote as you please. You have always righted the wrongs, have always marked your x for the best interests of the city.

You are a great people. You will not be persuaded by rumors and innuendos.

Your vote—this year—is so very important. It may be needed to overcome any possible last minute propaganda, rumors, innuendos.

You will use your best judgement Tuesday—on the one day when you set up the city's leadership for the years ahead.

Legislators Clarify Lake Adair Proposal

In an effort to clarify the present status of the Lake Adair project and the permissive legislation that was granted at the recent session of the state legislature, Henderson's three members of the legislature—Senator Jim Gibson and Assemblymen Art Espinosa and Hal Smith—last night issued this statement to the local citizens:

The suggestions of the citizens of the community. "As a part of such agreement, the council would require the necessary iron-clad safeguards to protect the citizens.

"If the council were to approve such an agreement, and if there were still major citizen objection, the council action could be made subject to a referendum via a petition of 10 per cent of the voters.

"The contract or any part of the contract could be made subject to a vote of the people via a petition of 10 per cent of the voters.

"From the information made available to us, at the legislature, it seemed that the local city authorities should be given the opportunity to explore the possibilities of this project to the fullest extent. This feeling was supported by the formal request of the city council, petitions signed by the majority of the business men of the community, and many letters from interested citizens.

"All of this data indicated that if this project could be realized as envisioned, it would be a great benefit to

the entire area, particularly the city of Henderson.

"We urge the citizens of Henderson not to be alarmed by the rumors which they may hear concerning the effect of this legislation. Those citizens sincerely interested in the future of our area should make every effort to find out the facts of the matter and not be satisfied with mere rumor. We would be happy, individually or together, to explain to anyone interested the legislation that has been passed. We also have written material available which would be of great help in becoming informed.

"You can be sure we intend to follow the progression of this subject to be certain adequate safeguards are made in any contract being negotiated and we would just as strongly oppose any agreement that did not include the safeguards as they were intended—as we supported the legislation which allows the city to enter into such negotiations.

Building Permits Still Low for May

Building permits for the city continued low last month, trailing behind those of last year, according to Pat Doherty, superintendent of building and safety.

Total building figure for the month of May was \$38,258, as compared to \$151,658 for the same month last year. The total building figure to date for this year is \$376,876, as compared to \$979,897 for last year.

There were no new dwelling permits issued for the month, although there were 15 residential alterations and additions valued at \$18,075. There were three new commercial buildings receiving permits valued at \$24,272. Other permits were of a minor nature.

There were 305 building inspections made; 195 electrical, 36 plumbing, 15 air conditioning, 49 clean-up, with a total number of inspections of 568. There were three clean-up violations issued and 12 compliances.

There were 15 certificates of occupancy inspection, 12 cars removed from private property, 1 condemnation, and 31 final inspections.

Police Book Eight During April On Narcotics Charges Here

Henderson police booked eight at the Clark County Sheriff's office on charges of narcotics during the month of April, according to a monthly report by Police Chief George Crisler.

There were 46 adult arrests on 52 charges during the month, 4 operating under the influence; 7 gross intoxication; 9 bench warrants; 7 vagrancy; 4 disorderly conduct; 3 resisting arrest; 3 traffic; 1 use of unlawful coins and 14 others.

There were 292 traffic citations; 319 moving violations, 31 issued by radar; 20 juvenile traffic and 132 parking citations.

There was one traffic fatality during the month of April, which was Henderson's first for the year, and four injuries in 32 accidents.

There were 20 juvenile apprehended, with 6 citations issued, 8 sent to the juvenile




