

Rose de Lima Will Need Money For Burn Center

City Richer by \$120,000 In Ind. Park Agreement

The city entered into a contract yesterday which will bring \$120,000 into the city's land fund as the Henderson Industrial Park group is expected to put the money in the bank tomorrow.

The contract completes five years of negotiations, and transfers 601 acres of land from city ownership to the Industrial Park group. The land was purchased at \$250 and \$500 per acre, from the city.

City Manager George Charchalis said that the sum looks like a large amount but he said that the city has obliga-

tions already which must be met with some of the money. He said that he and City Auditor Alfred Hyman will prepare a list of priorities to present to the council on how the money can be used. Some administrative costs have already been levied against the land fund in the budget since some of the officials spend time working on the land problems.

Some of the items where the money will be used include payment for resurfacing the streets, \$15,000 for water

survey, \$12,000 for master planning, and Charchalis said that according to prior commitments, the city must provide water to the Ladoo property on Boulder highway, some of which is now being sold.

"If we're going to develop section 29, we will have to advance some cash," he said, "even though much of it will be recoverable." Auditor Hyman has already suggested in prior meetings that the city needs a new fire truck and ambulance.

Military Services For "Sonny" Hopkins Saturday

Military funeral services for SP-4 Wallace W. "Sonny" Hopkins, will be held at 2 p.m. Saturday at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, with a military group from Ft. Irwin, Calif. performing the military portion of the funeral.

Young Hopkins' body is expected to arrive at around 2 p.m. in Henderson today at Palm Mortuary, and interment will be at Palm Memorial Park.

The youth, who was popular in Henderson with both the young people and adults, was killed last week in Vietnam. He was a member of the 101st

Paratrooper division stationed at Chu Lai, and would have completed a year in Vietnam in February.

He is the second Henderson casualty in the Vietnam war. Jack Cossins was killed in June and was the city's first war casualty.

The popular young Henderson athlete was co-captain of the 1966 football team, and was selected the "Most Inspirational Player" by the coaches. His senior year he was on the B honor roll.

Plans are being made for a Sonny Hopkins memorial fund which will go to a deserving senior to further his education.

The fund will be administered by the school, and donations can be made to that fund.

Curtain to Fall Tonight On Bosom Shows

Unless something happens to the contrary, tonight will be closing night for the bare bosom shows and the bare bosom waitresses at the downtown clubs, according to City Manager George Charchalis.

The enforcement of the recently enacted ordinance will begin at midnight tonight.

He said that he and Attorney George Rudiak for the Rainbow would submit briefs and additional points to the court and then would argue in detail. It is expected that it will take two weeks to calendar the case.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

What can be done about the service a person receives in the emergency room or section at the Rose de Lima Hospital at Henderson, Nevada?

I have taken my children several times to the emergency room, either you have to wait 30 minutes to an hour to be taken care of, or the doors are all locked late at night and you have to wait until someone lets you in, or even you have to wait for them to find a doctor.

For instance, today my boy had an object stuck in his eye. They told me to go home and they would call me whenever they reached a doctor, but it would be a few hours. Instead I drove straight to Boulder City hospital and was taken care of in 10 minutes.

Why is it a town the size of Henderson isn't better equipped for emergency? I have talked to several other persons that have the same complaint with the emergency section of the hospital.

\$6.5 Million for Water Project Clears Senate

Announcement is expected here soon concerning the Southern Nevada Water Project, following announcement yesterday that the Public Works bill which includes construction money for the project.

Tuesday's action completed full congressional approval of the measure which now goes before a Senate-House joint Conference Committee. Senator Alan Bible, a member of the powerful Senate Appropriations committee, has been named a conferee on the bill.

Bible said he could foresee no difficulty in securing conference approval on the bills since they had been approved by both houses. Senator Howard Cannon described yesterday's Senate action as "a big step forward in our efforts to provide vitally-needed public works for the state."

The advanced planning group for the Southern Nevada water project has moved into the new office building on Lake Mead Drive in Henderson, however no construction people will take part until the appropriations are completed. The \$6.5 million water project is one of three major Nevada reclamation projects contained in the public works bill

which was approved.

The new water project headquarters was constructed by Jim Gunville and Franklin

Morrell, and has been leased by the government. It is located in the shopping center on Lake Mead Drive.

State Gaming Approval Issued For Dante's New Ownership

State Gaming Commission approval was given this week to George K. Campbell and Joseph R. Williams for a 50-50 ownership of Dante's Lounge, Inc., on Lake Mead Drive.

Both long-time Henderson residents, Campbell was previously associated with Dick Stewart's Dodge and prior to that owned a hardware store on Market street.

Williams is former owner of the Bowling alley on Boulder highway.

The need for outside financial assistance in establishing an intensive care unit at Rose de Lima Hospital, which would include burn treatment, was brought to the attention of plant and city officials at a meeting held recently to formulate plans for obtaining such a center.

Hospital Administrator Sister M. Georganne, O.P., presented a resume of cost for

equipment and personnel needed for a four-bed unit at around \$18,800. She pointed out that the establishment of any new department is dependent upon outside financial assistance of some type, since presently high operating costs exclude such additions from operating funds.

Need for such a program was indicated by presentation of film slides showing actual burn cases treated at the hospital. This was followed by an open discussion regarding formation of a possible funding program for the project, with enthusiasm evidenced by those present. Another meeting is being planned for the near future at which time a committee will be formed for planning.

Community interest in an intensive care unit was activated by the recent emergency in which three employees were severely burned in a plant fire, and one death resulted.

The Chief of Staff at Rose de Lima gave a brief description of the purpose of an intensive care unit, indicating the extent of the minimum equipment and personnel necessary for such a service. It was noted that such a unit could be utilized for all types of emergencies, severe illnesses, cardiac care, postoperative continuous care, etc. Because of the hospital's strategic location to the industrial plant complex, initiation of such a program would provide a most important and vital life-saving factor to the hospital care already provided the community.

The invocation at the meeting was offered by Rev. Mother John Joseph, after which introductions of those present was made by Mrs. Selma Bartlett.

Section 29 Land Discussed By Council

The council was scheduled to meet last night in private session to discuss land applications from our firms or individuals for the purchase of land in section 29 near the golf course.

The third application from Art Espinoza was withdrawn. City Manager George Charchalis said he hoped the item would be ready for official action at next Monday night's regular city council meeting, but said he would not rush the council in its decision.

The land at the golf course must be developed into single family dwellings, and Charchalis said that reputable firms had applied for the land.

Air Pollution Noted in City Past 2 Days

An increase in air pollution in Henderson, noted this week by residents, is caused by temperature inversion, according to John Farnsworth of the air pollution control authority, and where there is no verticle air movements until later in the day, the heavy air has a tendency to hang over the city.

Farnsworth told the HOME NEWS that there had not been an air pollution officer in Henderson the past two mornings, and he further stated that the air pollution ordinance would not go into effect in the county until Oct. 25. He said that so far the odor sources at the plant have been successfully eliminated by efforts of the plant officials. At the present time with no ordinance, there could be no legal enforcement.

The new air pollution ordinance will control the plants, however, other sources of air pollution will have to be taken care of under the nuisance provisions.

When questioned by the HOME NEWS about where the smog came from, he said he did not know because it had not been investigated.

Monument Committee To Meet Tonight

A meeting of the committee to erect a monument to servicemen of Henderson, will be held this evening at 9 p.m. at the VFW hall, according to Joe dePeal, chairman.

DePeal said that a contractor has been obtained, the plans have been drawn, cost estimates have been received and the location picked out.

I won't ever call home cause it's just hard and it costs \$25 for the first three minutes.

Boulder Police Arrest Possible Murder Suspect

Boulder City police, following a wild chase which at times reached 100 miles per hour Monday, arrested Kenneth H. Hicks, 35, of California as a possible suspect in the murder of Sgt. Paul B. DeWeert, veteran Las Vegas police officer in that city Sunday night.

Local police state that Hicks accosted a Boulder City woman on Hoover Dam, telling her he had a quart of liquor, some marijuana and a gun. She reported him to one of the dam guards who in turn called North Las Vegas Police.

Boulder officers picked the report up on their monitor and headed toward the dam. Hicks was sighted just below the east entrance to the city.

Seeing the red lights, Hicks began his aborted escape through the city. He sped down Nevada Highway, right on Date St., over to Colorado St. and back down the truck route where he ran afoul of construction at the roadside rest area.

Boulder City Police Chief Smith, in referring to the latest development in the capture of Kenneth Hicks, now held in the Clark County jail, states it is his belief that North Las Vegas lawmen and the local department may be dealing with two separate homicides.

Gary Gardner of Las Vegas was arrested and is being held on suspicion in the case of the killing of a veteran Las Vegas police officer, Sgt. Paul DeWeert, found shot to death Sunday night.

Monday the BCPD picked up Hicks after a 100-mile-an-hour chase through town and found when checking out the vehicle Hicks was driving that it was registered to Glenn Christiernsson, a North Las Vegas cab driver who has been missing several days.

It is Smith's opinion, until further investigation reveals evidence to the contrary, that Hicks may not be involved in the murder of the Las Vegas officer, but may only be tied in with the cabbie's disappearance.

Meantime NLV officers are holding Gary Gardner, 32, as another possible suspect in the DeWeert killing when a witness reported seeing a Jeep-type car near the murder scene at the time of the killing. DeWeert was shot through the left eye with a small caliber bullet.

Gardner owns a 1967 International Scout.

He is now being held in Clark County jail for failure to register as an ex-felon. It is also reported spent 22 caliber cases were found in his vehicle.

Permits Continue Upward

BOULDER CITY
Building permit valuations have almost tripled over the first nine months of 1966. The total to date in 1967 is \$800,145.85 compared to \$297,491.35 through September last year.

A permit for a new apartment building was valued at \$69,110 and a commercial permit was written for \$19,110.

Other categories and values were: six residences, add-alteration, \$6,750; 1 patio, \$350; 2 carports, \$1,320; 1 garage, \$1,400; 3 accessory buildings, \$576.80; 8 fences, \$1,241.70; 1 miscellaneous permit, \$85. They totaled \$88,943.50.

Fees were also charged for 26 plumbing permits, 6 electrical, 7 signs, 47 building inspections, 28 plumbing inspections, 10 electrical inspections, 17 sign inspections, 1 offsite inspection and there were 3 violations.

Fees collected were: \$305.50, building permits; \$267.45, plumbing; \$53.55, electrical; \$10, signs and \$37.50, plan check.

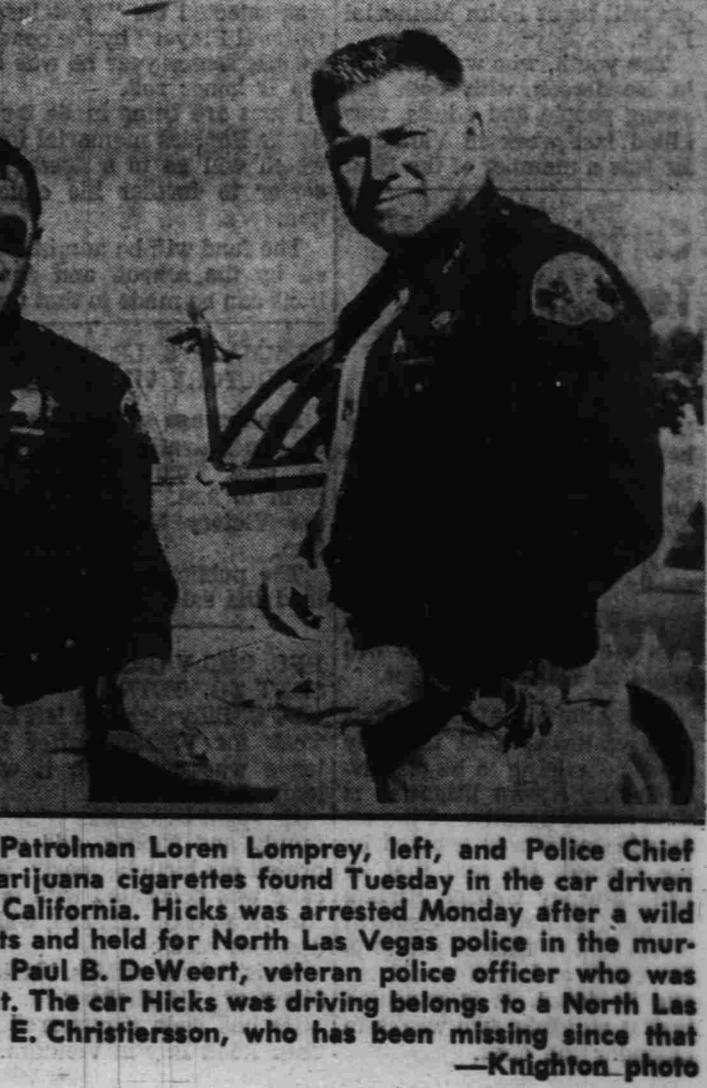

Surface Mail For Overseas Has Deadline

Although it is only October, it is already time to think about mailing Christmas packages which are to go by surface mail to members of the armed forces overseas, according to the Postmaster. To be sure of delivery be-

fore Christmas these parcels should be mailed between Oct. 16 and Nov. 11, according to Post Office Department mailing instructions.

"SAM" or Space Available Mail, surface parcels which will go by air as space is available, should be mailed between Oct. 21 and Dec. 1. To qualify for SAM treatment a package must not exceed five pounds in weight and 60 inches in length and girth combined. These parcels must be marked by the postal clerk

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in large letters, SAM, on the address side, preferable below the postage and above the name of the addressee.

Parcels sent by airmail should be mailed between Dec. 1 and 11.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. The boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy

paper and tied with strong cord. Boxes should be stuffed with cushioning material. Unless tightly filled, they are likely to be crushed. A slip of paper showing contents and the name and address of sender and addressee should be enclosed.

It was noted that Christmas is a good time to complete the ZIP Coding of addresses in address books and post office patrons are urged to include ZIP Codes in their return addresses to help with this.

Fire Prevention Week Brings Inspections

During Fire Prevention Week which concludes on Saturday, Oct. 14, the firemen of the city will be out in force inspecting every business building in town, according to Fire Chief Don Richard.

These inspections help the owner or occupant understand and improve existing conditions which improve life safety and keep costly fires from starting and spreading. They also aid the firemen in their pre-fire planning by making them familiar with the structural features, contents, general occupancy, tactical vantage points and exposure problems to other buildings, should a fire start.

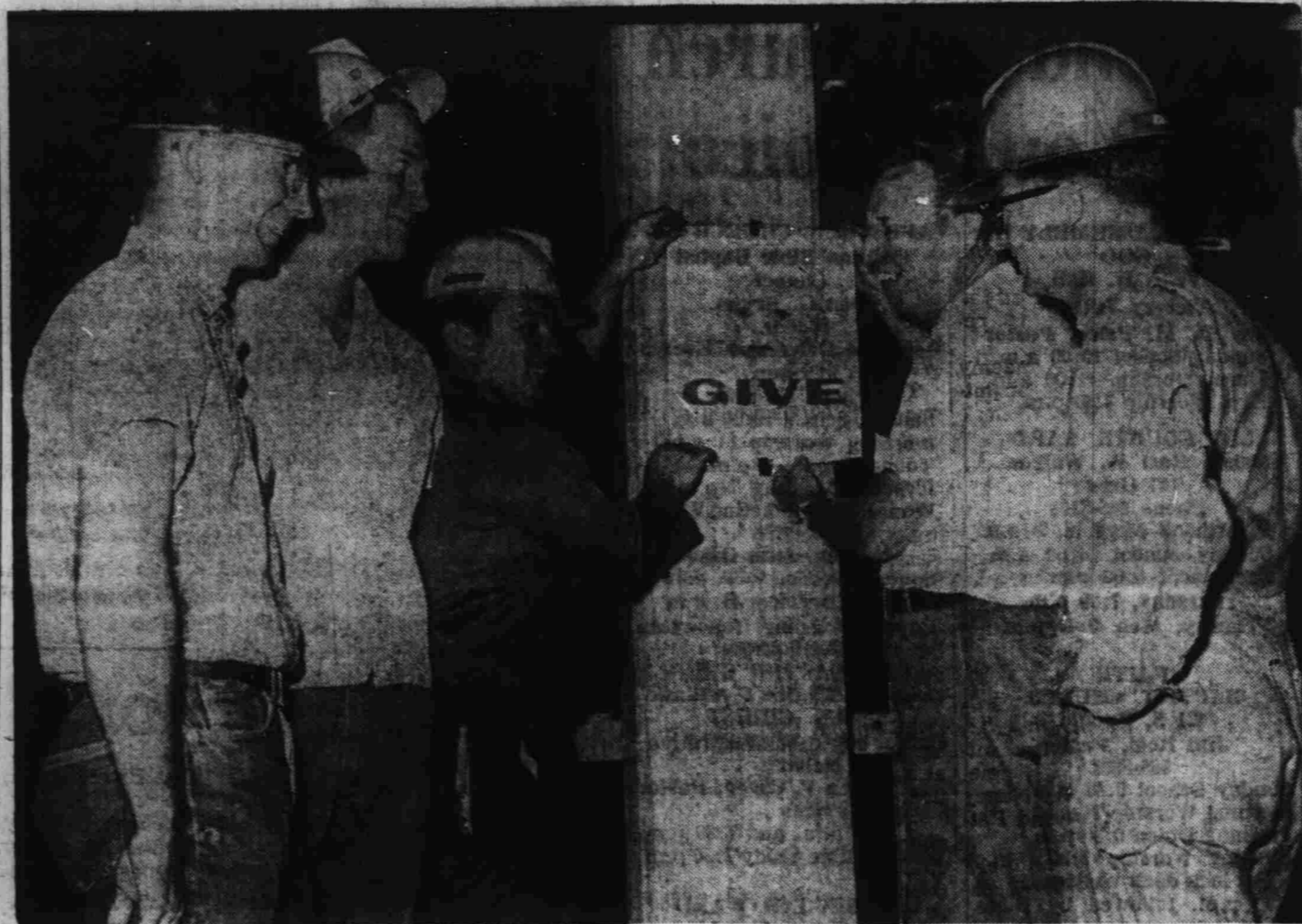

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Jada Kubic Tells About Her Recent World Tour

Jada Kubic, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Kubic, recently returned from a world tour which was sponsored by the Wisconsin State University in White-water, Wis. She was in company with 38 others. The following are some of her observations.

One of our first stops was Expo '67, in Montreal, where everything was fascinating and beautiful. Because of the

long lines, we were unable to visit very many exhibits, so instead of waiting I took as many tours around the three islands as I could and took pictures.

Our next stop was London, England, where between planes we had a short tour and saw Winsor Palace and the Royal Gardens. From London we flew directly to Athens, Greece. I'm sorry to say that I missed seeing Paris, because I fell asleep,

but I did get some pictures from the plane of the Swiss Alps and of Italy. On Sunday, July 2, we toured the Acropolis and then the City of Athens. All of the shops in Greece are closed from 1 to 4:30 p.m. because of the heat. It's only 120 degrees in the sun.

On July 4, we visited the Corinth Canal which was built in 1893. This canal saves about 1500 miles of travel and is carved out of stone. From there we went to ancient Corinth, a small village where I bought a Greek dress. Our next stop was Yugoslavia, and on July 5, started to tour the old City of Dubrovnik and then the new.

Tel Aviv was our next stop, and there we noticed several soldiers near by, both men and women. Women are drafted at the age of 18 if they are not married, and must stay in the service for two years. They all looked ready to fight if necessary.

From Tel Aviv we headed for Tiberias. During our ride soldiers could be seen everywhere and most of them were young kids carrying machine guns which did make us feel a little uneasy. Electricity is very high in Israel and of course the country is poor. Every once in awhile you can see water tanks on top of the roofs with mirrors which reflect the sunlight on the tanks and thus they have hot water. Two hours of sunlight gives 24 hours of hot water.

Sea of Galilee
We had a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. The sea is very calm in the morning and white capped in the afternoon. During the ride it was mentioned that we were the first group to pass the River Jordan from the north since the six-day war. From the boat, we were able to see where the Sermon on the Mount was given and where Jesus multiplied the fish and bread. We were all uneasy while in Jerusalem because we kept hearing blasts and we just knew the war was going to start all over again. We were assured however, that they were only exploding those bombs that were not used during the six-day war.

When we arrived in Bombay, India, it was like stepping into a steam room at 3:30 a.m. The humidity is about 96 percent. After leaving Delhi and New Delhi, we arrived at the Taj Mahal. It was even more beautiful than I had dreamed.

On July 27th we left Banaras and headed for Calcutta, India, where we saw the Queen Victoria memorial and the zoological gardens where we saw a white tiger. On July 29, we left Calcutta and headed for Bangkok, Thailand. The hotel was like heaven after India, as it was so clean and just plain excellent. Here we viewed Thai boxing which is mostly kicking, and you may kick anywhere you please, however, you may not spit or bite.

Next stop was Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia where we visited a tin mine and factory where they mix the tin with sand and move it along with water which is called hydro-mining. We then visited a rubber plantation. Women start cutting trees at 5 a.m., and a good woman can cut 200 trees a day.

On Aug. 3 we headed for Singapore where we visited the sights, and from there

went to Hong Kong. This island has 80 percent new buildings and they hope that in the near future no old buildings will remain. We visited the New Territories and at one point were only 500 feet from the Red China border. The next day road blocks were set up and no one could enter. We were surely lucky.

Visit Japan
Japan was our next stop and we saw many beautiful and interesting sights. On Pearl Island we saw women dive for pearls and also the whole process of cultured pearls, from opening the oysters to stringing the pearls. You can buy an oyster that is guaranteed to have at least two pearls in for about \$1.38 in U.S. money. I bought two oysters and received four beautiful pearls which I had set into a necklace.

From Japan we flew to Hawaii and on the way got caught in a tropical storm, but it only lasted for a few hours. Upon arrival and after customs we were each presented with a lei of flowers and we then departed for the hotel. We visited the Iolani Palace, the new Governor's mansion, the National Memorial Cemetery, the Peace Chapel, Taj Mahal of the Islands, the Mormon Temple, a sugar cane field, and other sights. Our hotel was right across from the Waikiki Beach and I walked along the beach at midnight the day before we were to leave.

Our plane was to arrive in San Francisco at 8:05 p.m. and leave at 8:55 p.m. for Las Vegas. The customs director wouldn't let me through so I had to wait. But luckily our plane was late arriving in S.F. They held the flight to Las Vegas so I was able to get home that night.

With all my slides and pictures back, I am now reliving this wonderful experience through my pictures which all turned out good except those in Japan and Hawaii. I feel lucky to have the opportunity to take a trip like this now while I am young and able to enjoy it and while I am unattached. It's an education of a lifetime and something I will never forget the rest of my life. I only wish more people had the opportunity to see more of the world and they would appreciate the U.S. even more.

About one of every five applicants for social security disability benefits delays so long before making his application that he risks possible loss of some payments, Ed Cocks, district manager of social security in Las Vegas, said.

In an effort to remedy this situation, the Social Security Administration is asking anyone who might possibly qualify for disability benefits to get in touch with a social security office as soon as possible.

"Some people fail to apply because they don't realize that they can benefit from the program," Cocks said. "Younger people often think that social security payments are only for people in their 60's. The disability program was specifically set up to protect the wage earner who is forced to stop working before he is old enough to collect retirement benefits."

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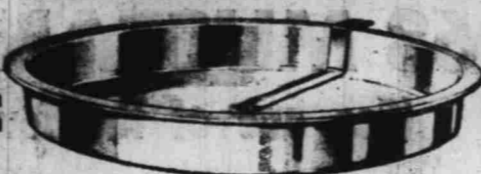

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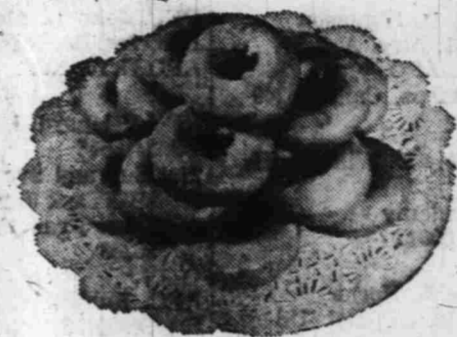

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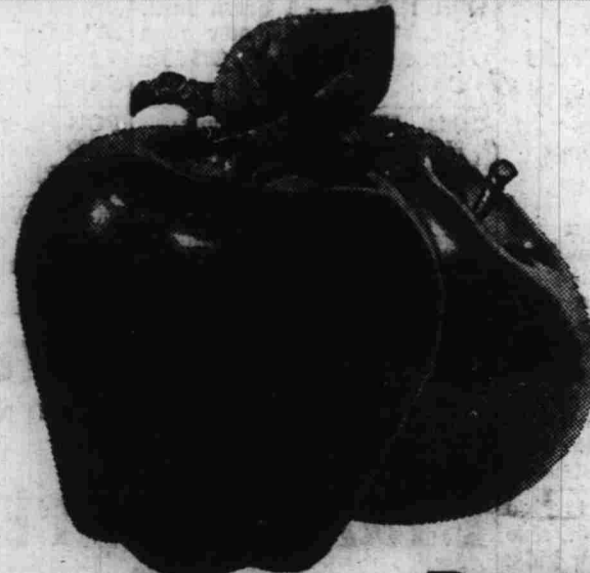
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
