City Planners Study Meat Packing Plant at Meeting

The City Planning Commission was expected to act on a permit last night for a meat packing plant to be located on the south side of Sunset Road near Parkson.

The matter was delayed at the last meeting of the planners to obtain more information to make sure the installa-

tion would not be detrimental to the city.

The application was made by Herbert D. Marchant, 1710 South 7th, Las Vegas, who presented letters from the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, and some politicians endorsing the business. He said the plant would employ approximately

112 people. Marchant told the planners at the last meeting that all parts of the animal will be used and there will not be any odors from the plant.

At the last meeting there were no letters of protest or anyone present to speak against the application. The secretary was instructed to send letters to other cities to find their comments in relation to the problems they have encountered.

City Manager George Charchalis, who was absent from the first meeting, was expected to be at last night's meeting. He was expected to endorse the new business for the city.

Kids To 'Trick Or Treat' For UNICEF This Sunday

An unusual and wonderful event will take place in Henderson this Halloween. Children will collect pennies, nickels, and dimes to give to starving and naked children all over the world. Our children will be helping other children through "Trick or Treat for UNICEF."

The children are sponsored by the Community Church, St. Timothy's Episcopal Church, and the Presbyterian Church. They will canvass Henderson this Sunday from 1 to 5.

This idea of Trick or Treating for UNICEF began in 1950 when a few American Sunday school pupils resolved that rather than candy and apples they would collect coins to help less fortunate boys and girls on other parts of the world. That year they made \$17.

Since 1950 the program has grown. Last fall some 3.5 million American children collected almost \$3 million. That is less than one dollar per child but it can purchase a lot of milk and penicillin and antibiotics, which is what the money will be used for.

So much good is done by UNICEF that in 1965 it was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

In Henderson the children will be soliciting under permit No. 88 given by the city.

Trick or Treat night will be held Tuesday, Oct. 31, the regular Halloween night, Police Chief George Crisler said yesterday.

Crisler asked that children begin around 6 p.m. and complete their rounds by regular curfew time. He asked cooperation of the parents in keeping these hours.

Jay Empey Narrowly Escapes Shot

One of the narrow escapes of deer hunting was told this week by Jay Empey, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Empey, who was shot through his pants leg, and his companion through the hand as they walked through a clearing near Jack Creek in Elko.

According to Empey, he and a friend named "Doc" of Desert Hills, were walking through a clearing of about one of two miles, when someone shot his friend through the hand and narrowly missed his knee when a shot went through his pants leg. His friend was taken to the Elko hospital where he underwent emergency surgery.

Another friend on the trip cut his leg while cleaning a deer and required eight stitches.

Empey went hunting with Elmer Bowen and two other friends, and they returned home Sunday afternoon. Empey was lucky and bagged a deer, but was shaken with the experience of almost being shot. He said the sheriff was called on the incident but he did not come while they were still there although they stayed over night. "Doc", although he had just undergone surgery, came home with them.

Air Pollution Board To Meet On Wednesday

Amendments to the proposed ordinance on county air pollution will be discussed at the county air pollution control board meeting Wednesday, according to reports.

Industrial firms of Clark County, including Henderson, opposed the pollution ordinance at the Oct. 4 meeting. Titanium Metals Corp. and the U.S. Lime Division of Flintkote Corp. objected to the ordinance section dealing with visible air contaminants as well as sections dealing with particulate matter, dust and fumes.

Dr. Otto Ravenholt, county health officer, defended the Ringlemann chart, used to measure contaminants. He pointed out that the chart is a "subjective measure, used as a broad indication of equivalent capacity."

"We will use 40 per cent opacity as a maximum although some areas have a 20 per cent limit," Dr. Ravenholt said.

Chief Says Vandalism Caused Death of B of R Lineman

Chief of Police George Crisler attributed the death and serious injury yesterday of two Bureau of Reclamation electrical linemen to vandalism to an electrical sub-station at the Amargosa station, just south of Tract No. 2.

Killed was Garland L. Frost, 41, of Bullhead City, Arizona, who was electrocuted and burned to death, and in serious condition at Rose de Lima hospital with second and third degree burns over his back and arms, is James Simmons, 40, also a Bullhead City.

BASIC WOLVES TRAVEL TO NEEDLES FRI.

The Basic High School Wolves travel to Needles Friday night. This will be the second California invasion for the Wolves this year. Needles is somewhat of an enigma team this year. They were soundly trounced by a powerful Gorman team in their season's opener 47-0.

Two weeks later Needles bounced back to take the measure of another Basic opponent, Boulder City, by nearly as wide a margin. The game as it looks now is somewhat of a toss-up. Keegan's scouting reports would indicate that Needles is a much stronger ball club than the Gorman score would indicate.

The Wolves will not be at full strength for Friday night's clash. Along with the ailing Gary Smith, Keegan may not be able to play two other key men; Wes Church and Gary Wilson. Both of these received injuries in last week's game with Las Vegas.

Joe has had to hold back a little on practice sessions this week to give some of the boys a well earned rest. Keegan was real happy with the effort his entire club made in the Vegas game in spite of being on the wrong end of a close score.

Keegan has singled out three boys who played both ways in the Vegas game for honors this week. Charley James a junior, who has been Basic's big scoring threat all season on the receiving end of passes from Mike Stewart and Marc Dickens, has played both defensive end and defensive halfback. Last Saturday Charlie's outstanding play earned for him coach Keegan's selection as "Line-man of the Week."

Gary Wilson, Basic's candidate for All-State honors, is again Keegan's choice for Headhunter of the Week. Five of the seven weeks of the current season have found Gary receiving recognition for his outstanding play. Gary goes both ways but he loves that defensive play. In last week's encounter Gary's performance could be called a little less than sensational.

Another senior, Larry Chandler, received an accolade from Keegan with his being chosen Back of the Week. Chandler has been great on defense all season but has only come into his own as an offensive back when he was called on to fill the shoes of Gary Smith who has been sidelined with injuries. Larry has moved along fast and was the leading ground gainer against Vegas.

DUV TO HOLD RUMMAGE SALE

The two men, along with 3 other Bureau of Reclamation employees who witnessed the tragedy, had come to Henderson to repair approximately \$600 worth of vandalism on the insulators here that happened last week. The FBI has been called in to investigate the vandalism and the resulting tragedy.

Police Officer Douglas Struthers, who investigated the incident, said that according to Simmons, whom he talked to at the hospital, he had one wire containing 138,000 volts, disconnected and tied up, and Frost disconnected a second wire containing the same amount of voltage. It is believed that the elbow bucket which they were in might have touched the wires, causing an arc which caused the bucket to blow up and burn. Frost received 276,000 volts and was killed immediately. Simmons was thrown from the bucket to the ground approximately 15 feet below on fire.

Robert G. Green, 604 D, of Needles, Calif., a truck driver for the Bureau of Reclamation, aided by David Bothwell of Bullhead City, and William Edwin Vine, 700 Elm, Boulder City, Reclamation employees, put out the fire on Simmons by jerking off his cloths.

Struthers said that men at the scene had difficulty in getting the victim out of the bucket since it had been damaged so they could not bring it down hydraulically.

In describing the scene, Struthers said, "We received a report at the Police Station that said there was trouble at the sub station. I did not think it would be of such a serious nature but as I approached Van Wagenen street I could see smoke. I was astonished when I saw Frost's body hanging over the side of the bucket."

It is believed that Frost is married and has children but no information was available at press time.

Chief Crisler, last week, asked juveniles to stay away from the sub-station, stating that the voltage could electrocute them.

The men were killed and injured in repairing the damage that was done at that time. Crisler was upset and shocked last night at the results of that vandalism.

Basic High School freshmen were defeated by Gorman freshmen by a score of 40-12 Saturday at the Basic High stadium.

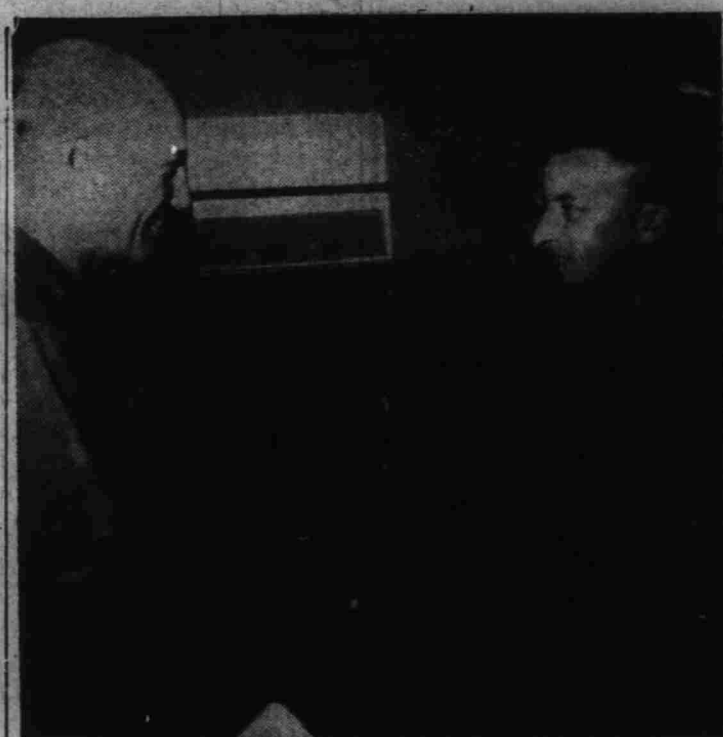
The local freshmen started out in the game keeping even with the Gorman 11, but suffered losses in the third and fourth quarters.

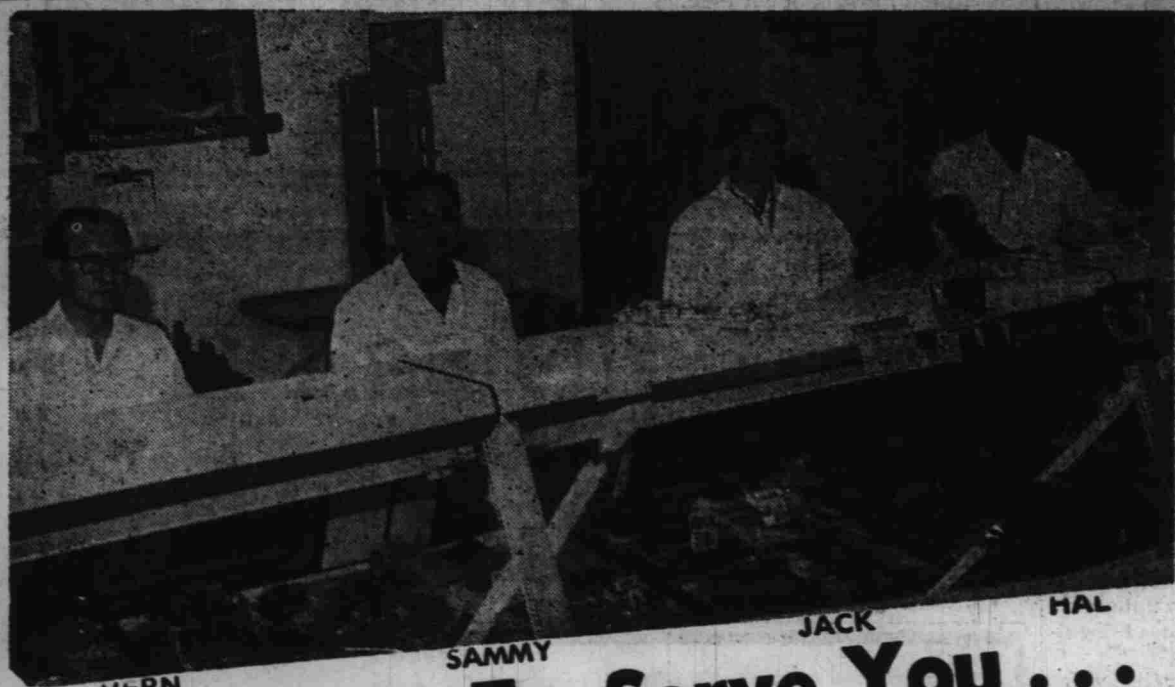

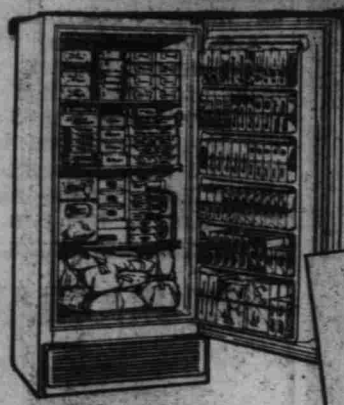

Morry's Story

I'm perplexed with what happens with my own social likes and leanings. For years I have heard of Van Cliburn as being the greatest pianist in the world today, his being excepted even by the Russians as a world master.

I swore years ago I'd go miles to see Van Cliburn, hear Van Cliburn, for it would be like the thrills I had in my youth of watching Babe Ruth hit home runs, Lou Gehrig play baseball, Red Grange run for touchdowns, Bill Tilden win the Davis cup.

Now—this week—like Saturday actually—Van Cliburn is coming to the convention center to give a concert — this man who is a musical institution — this man who in 1958 set Moscow on its ear with his achievements in the Tchaikovsky competition — will grace this area with his presence!

What great news it should

be to lovers of art, classics, the very finest things in life! I once attended a concert given by Rachmaninoff — then the No. 1 in the world—and although I was not or am not educated enough to read the fine print of piano concerts—I admit I was enthralled being in the very same hall with a master.

Perplexed beyond belief, I am today, for on the very same night in this area is a big football game of the home town team, a very big sexy movie at Cinerama, and an invite to get goofy in a Halloween costume at the Press club — all more fun than an evening with Van Cliburn.

Yet—my conscience bothers me—when such a great, great man appears in our area—inviting you to listen to him—I wonder if I can turn him down—and live with the little that is still left within me which cries out for recognition and respect for the living masters in the world today.

WATER CONTRACTS HEARING SET NOV. 8 TO VALIDATE SNWSP

A hearing has been set Nov. 8 in district court to validate two water contracts, one between the Colorado River Commission and the federal government and the other between the CRC and local water users.

Terms of the contracts require the contracts be validated in a local district court.

the Southern Nevada Water Supply Project are on schedule. Bids for the River Mountains and the pumps for Saddle Island pumping plant will be issued as funds are available, Head said.

The scheduled completion date for the summer of 1970 is expected to be met, according to a representative of the Bureau of Land Management.

Major work on the water treatment plant to date has included evaluation of water quality determining process and developing design criteria and a site layout.

A design report summarizing the findings of Bechtel Engineers was scheduled to be submitted to the CRC staff.

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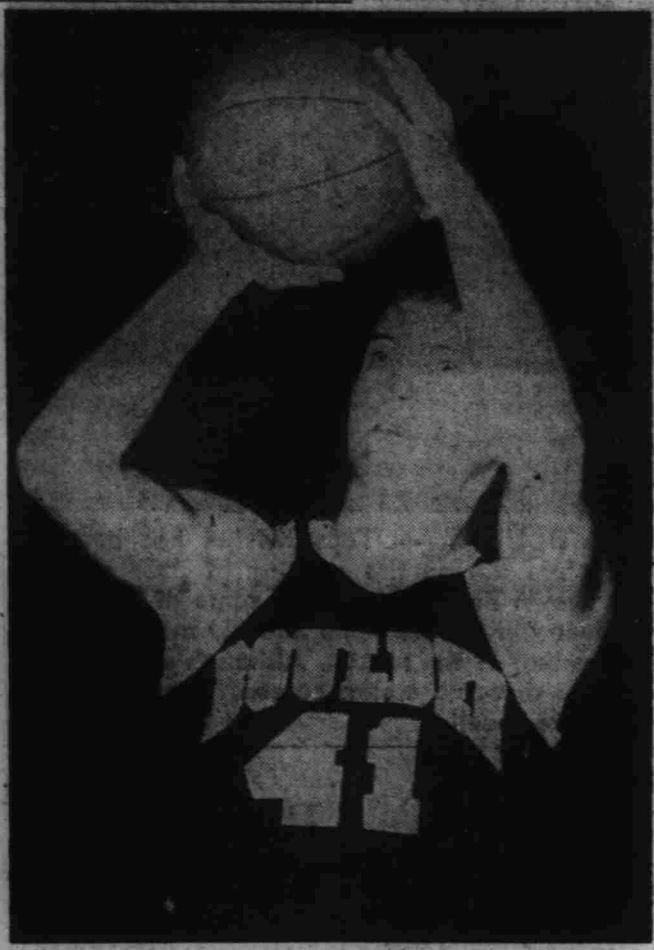

He had a 14-day leave prior to leaving for Vietnam.



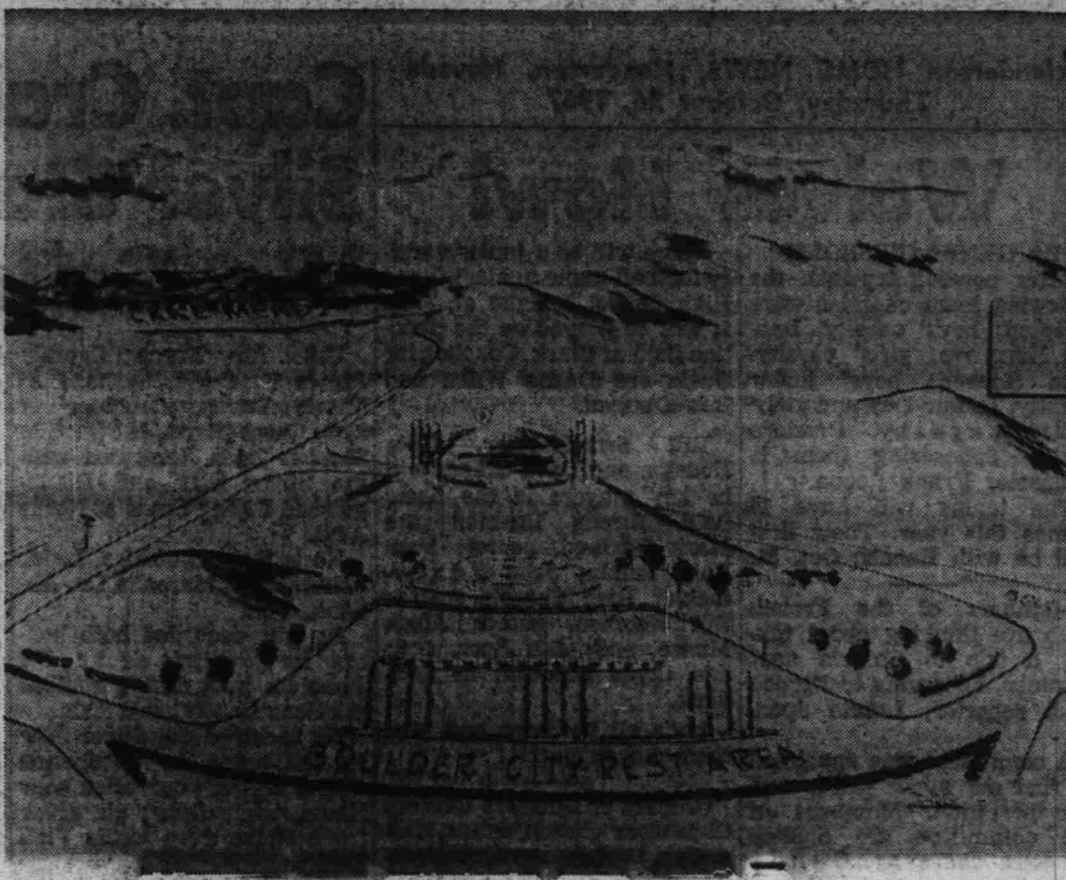

Capt. Craig Wins Silver Star For Viet Gallantry

U.S. Air Force Captain James T. Craig, husband of Missie Doran, daughter of Mrs. Carol Doran, 101 Ocotillo St., has been decorated with the Silver Star and Distinguished Flying Cross at Nellis AFB.

He is the son of Mrs. L. M. Braum, 2417 Marsalis Dr. Abilene, Tex.

He was accorded both honors for heroism as an F-4 Phantom pilot during combat missions in Southeast Asia.

He received the Silver Star for gallantry in connection with a military operation near Hanoi, while flying air cover for a strike deep inside Vietnam.

The inbound U.S. force was intercepted by 16 hostile aircraft.

Capt. Craig evaded surface-to-air missiles in the area and engaged the vastly superior enemy force. Against overwhelming odds, he personally engaged four different hostile aircraft. In the ensuing air battle, he destroyed one plane and successfully protected the main strike force.

His Distinguished Flying Cross was awarded for his successful night reconnaissance mission near Ron, North Vietnam.

Capt. Craig's flight attacked a ferry complex on a major supply route. When the group experienced heavy anti-aircraft fire, the veteran pilot made repeated low altitude attacks which silenced four of the six active sites.

He then proceeded to make an accurate dive bomb attack on the approach to the ferry

in spite of marginal weather conditions and continuing hostile ground fire.

During his combat tour, the captain was a member of the 366th Tactical Fighter Wing at Da Nang AB, Vietnam.

Capt. Craig is now an instructor pilot at Nellis with the Tactical Air Command which provides combat reconnaissance aerial firepower and assault airlift for U.S. ground forces.

The captain was graduated from Winters (Tex.) High School and attended the University of Texas. He has 11 years Air Force Service.

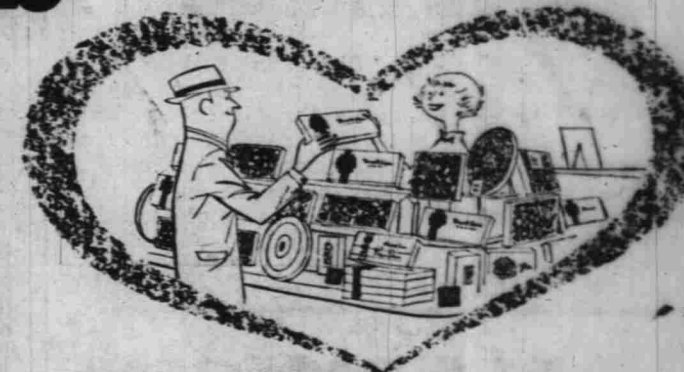

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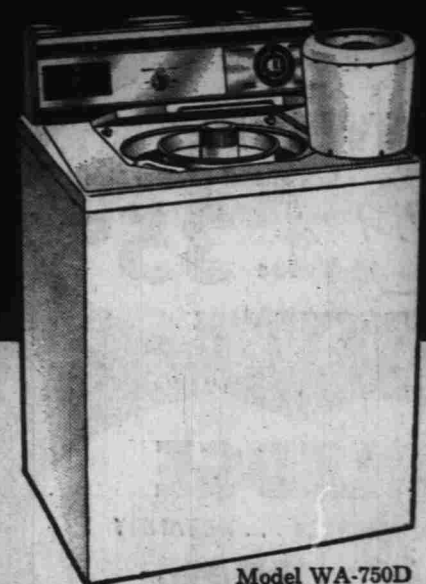

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Some School Drop-Outs Caused From Financial Difficulties

"Many young people become school drop-outs because of financial difficulties," said Ed Cocks, Las Vegas social security district manager. "While Social Security can't help all of these young people, it is now possible for those who wish to continue their education to receive social security checks if they can meet certain requirements."

Cocks explained that to qualify for checks, a student must be the child of a parent who is receiving social securi-

ty checks, or has died and be under 22, attending school full time, and unmarried.

A student is in full time attendance if he attends an accredited junior college, college, or university and it will take 13 weeks or more to complete his course of study. At other schools, such as high schools and vocational schools, a student is in full time attendance if he attends school 20 hours per week and the course of study will take 13 weeks or more to complete. Students enrolled in corre-

spondence courses are not eligible.

Those students who are already receiving checks, but who are not yet 18, should contact the social security office at least three months before they are 18 if they intend to remain in school full time. If the Social Security administration is notified in time, the checks will not stop when they become 18.

Those students who were receiving checks which were stopped when they became 18, may start their checks again by filing a new application if they are now under 22, attending school full-time, and unmarried.

Dear Publisher Zenoff:
Please consider this as a cordial invitation to join a select group of member-executives on the 1968 American Study Mission to Saigon returning Around-the-World. The dates are January 22 to February 18.

For determining policy in the Presidential election year, no foreign journey could be more meaningful.

Special arrangements have been made both with the Defense Department and the State Department for you to make the most comprehensive and authoritative examination of the current American military and political situation in Vietnam and Southeast Asia that can be done in one month's time. Starting with the Commander-in-Chief, Pacific in Honolulu, briefings and press conferences have been set up with military commanders and American ambassadors in each country enroute. Special on-site tours of inspection will be made to key positions in crucial areas and a full work-week will be spent with political and military leaders in and around Saigon. (South Vietnam President Elect Nguyen Van Thieu is expected to be one of them.)

The Study Mission will leave from San Francisco Monday, January 22 and jet to Honolulu. From there it will fly to Tokyo, then Seoul — with a side trip to Panmunjom — then Taipei, Hong Kong, Saigon and Bangkok.

The military phase of the journey will end in Bangkok, but the political situation will be studied in each of the three important capital cities on the return route around-the-world. From Bangkok the group will fly to New Delhi, Teheran and London, with two-day stopovers in each. It will arrive in New York Sunday evening, February 18.

In addition to the official program, members will enjoy many semi-official social functions given in their honor and will be provided the opportunity to see the points of greatest historic and cultural interest in each of the cities to be visited.

All hotel accommodations are deluxe or first class with private bath, on a demi-pension basis. The all-expense cost is \$2195 per person, with two in a room. Single accommodations — as long as they last — are \$110 additional. A deposit of \$250 is required to hold reservations. Inasmuch as the Defense
