United Fund Goal of \$997,844 Set at Meeting of Trustees

R. Julian Moore, 1968 president of the United Fund of Clark County, announces the goal for the 1968 fall campaign, which will seek to raise a record \$997,844, to support its 28 member agencies throughout 1969.

The United Fund Board of Trustees set the goal at their recent meeting, when a majority of the board affirmed the need for the goal increase of 21.4 percent over last year. The "Go for a Million" drive is scheduled to begin in mid-September.

Moore, in announcing the goal at a news conference at the Sahara Hotel, pointed out that the substantial increase in this year's goal is an effort by the United Fund to meet

the ever-increasing needs of its present member agencies, while adding five more agencies to the United Fund family. Three of the new agencies have been accepted for admittance to the Fund on a provisional basis, that the 1968 drive exceeds its goal by the amount required to finance these new agencies.

Moore continued, "National figures indicate that all United Funds will have to raise significantly more money for their 1969 health and welfare program, to meet increased needs of men and women in the Armed Forces and to maintain essential basic community services in the areas of greatest need."



Coast Guard Accepting New Applications

Examinations for admission to the United States Coast Guard Academy will be given Dec. 7, at over 3,000 test centers throughout the nation with the administration of the College Entrance Examination Board Tests (CEEB).

Applications to participate in the CEEB exams must be made to the Educational Testing Service before Nov. 2.

Entrance to the academy in New London, Conn. is tendered on nation-wide, competitive basis. Young men who are accepted from the December tests will start training in July 1969 and will be working for a Bachelor of Science degree and commission as ensign in the Coast Guard.

To qualify, an applicant must be unmarried and have reached his 17th but not his 22nd birthday by July 1, 1969.

After two years there he went to the University of Idaho in Moscow, as head of the mining department and professor of metallurgy and ore dressing with a \$30,000 building for his department. At the end of the first year he resigned and returned to Oregon as the first general secretary of the City YMCA. Terrill met his wife at a conference in Los Angeles in 1909 where he was assistant educational secretary of the YMCA, and his wife, Louise,

Although Terrill is proud of his granddaughter, Sharon Terrill, who was recently named "Miss California," and will participate next month in the "Miss America" contest, he can be proud of his record in which he has chalked up many honors.

His next job was superintendent of municipal parks and recreation in Glendale. He built bridle trails in Brand Park and developed a large harmonica band. The next years they spent in Fullerton, Calif. where the professor taught engineering subjects in the Fullerton District Junior. Among his many accomplishments he put in the fluorescent mineral display at Knotts Berry Farm.

U.S. Says Russia Dumps Titanium Sponge Here

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Tariff Commission ruled that titanium sponge imports from the Soviet Union are being dumped in the U.S. market in sufficient volume to injure domestic producers of the semi-processed material, which is used in making titanium.

The Tariff Commission's finding requires the U.S. Treasury to impose antidumping penalty duties on such imports, so long as they are priced "at less than fair value."

The commission vote was split, 2 to 2, resulting in a finding for U.S. producers who had brought the action.

Commissioners Glen Sutton and Bruce Chubb, voting for the ruling, said the U.S. needs some imports of the material. They said the Soviet Union, supplying 2 percent of such imports in 1965, increased its share to about 19 percent last year.

The Russians, they said, also offered U.S. buyers an additional 10 million pounds of titanium sponge last year, which would have made a 68 percent share of imports and about one-fourth of the U.S. market. Tariff Commission officials said this 10 million-pound offering wasn't accepted.

Tariff Commission Chairman Stanley Metzger and Commissioner Penelope Thunberg disagreed with the decision.

Since the Treasury previously had found that the Russians were selling the materi-

al at unfairly low prices, the only step remaining is for the U.S. to announce penalty duties.

Titanium Metals Corp. of America, New York, accused Russia in September 1967 of dumping the semiprocessed material in the U.S. market at prices substantially below those quoted by exporters in Britain and Japan, two other major overseas sources.

Imports of titanium sponge from the Soviet Union in the year ended last February

amounted to about \$2 million, customs officials said. These imports came "in a rush," they said but the Russians stopped all shipments after February.

The Tariff Commission next week will consider similar antidumping cases of pig iron from Russia, East Germany, Rumania and Czechoslovakia.



New School Children in County Must Have Birth Certificate

Children entering kindergarten for the coming school year, and first graders who have not previously attended school in Clark County, will be required to present birth certificates or other proof of date of birth. School opens Sept. 3.

Birth certificates of children born in Clark County from 1955 to the present can be secured at the Clark County Health Department, 625 Shadow Lane, Las Vegas. The fee is \$2.

Birth certificates for children born in Clark County before 1955, and those born in all other Nevada counties, can be secured at the Department of Health and Welfare, Division of Health, Section of Vital Statistics, Carson City, Nevada. The fee is \$2.

Children born in other states should apply for birth certificates from the Bureau of Vital Statistics in the capital in that state.

If birth certificates cannot

be obtained, hospital records or church documents which officially indicate the date of the child's birth may be accepted.

Children must be five years old by Dec. 31, to enter kindergarten and six years old by Dec. 31, to enter first grade.

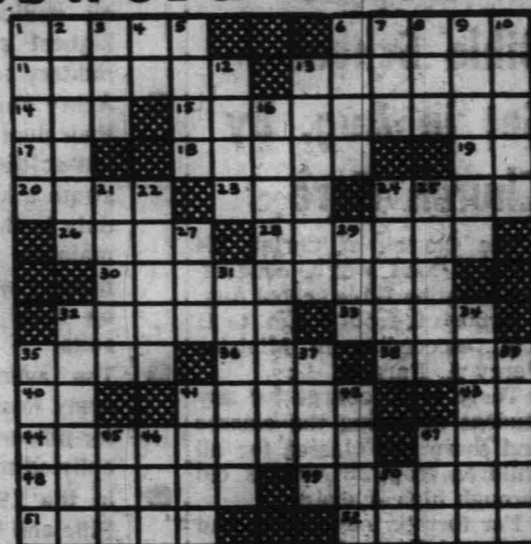

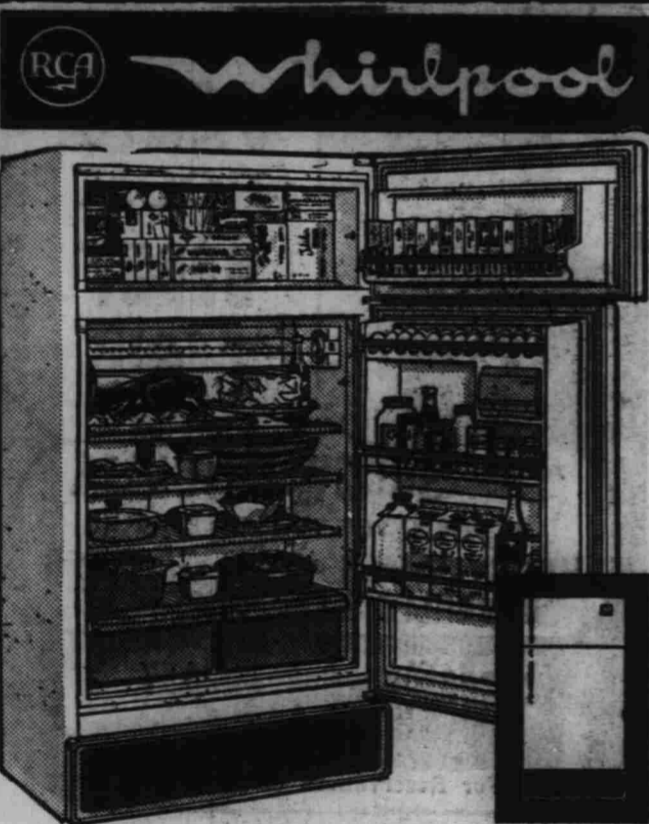

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**'The Story of Nevada Mining',
New Nevada Brochure**

The Nevada Bureau of Mines, University of Nevada, has announced publication of a new brochure entitled "Nevada's No. 1 Basic Industry the Story of Nevada Mining." The new release features mineral location maps, photos, mining history, and production figures.

Based on an earlier pamphlet, "Nevada — Why It Was Born," which was issued in 1964 in commemoration of the Nevada Centennial, the new brochure includes a revised text which describes mining in Nevada today, and color photographs of modern plants and open-pit mining activity. Added also for the first time is a location map of the state's industrial minerals.

The significance of mining on a national level is captured in the brochure by the statements that nearly one-half of the national industrial labor force is employed in metal-working industries; that about one-half of the value of all manufacturing activities in the U.S. is from metal-working industries; and that more than one-half of all railroad freight traffic in the country is made up of raw mineral materials.

In Nevada, the impact of mining on the economy of the state is estimated at \$450,000,000 a year. It is pointed out that among Nevada's basic industries, mining is three times greater than agriculture, its nearest competitor, while 80 percent of all rail freight revenues originating in Nevada comes from the mineral industry.

Listed under mineral products which have been produced in the state are 14 precious and base metals, five major gem stones, and 22 industrial or nonmetallic minerals. The brochure is being distributed to information centers throughout the state, and may be obtained by writing the Nevada Bureau of Mines, University of Nevada, Reno.
