Temporary Restraining Ordervana STATE LIBRANThief Takes Keeps Water in Trailer Estates

A temporary restraining or-der to keep the City of Henderson from turning off water and sewer services to some residents of Trailer Estates, was filed in District Court by Lloyd George, attorney for H. W. Polk and Bentonite, Inc.

The restraining order will be in effect for 15 days, and a hearing will be set on the injunction within that time to determine if it will continue or not. The action was filed by two residents of the area. and George said that further action will be filed by Polk

The city had determined to shut off the water to around 20 residents of the area who had not had water meters placed on their property, and had not paid connection fees. Polk claims the city is in-

debted to him for past services and construction and has requested that the \$12,000 owed by Bentonite for connection fees be exchanged for what the city owes him.

Attorney George said that by going to court the action will be settled in a reasonable manner. The two parties involved have not been able to settle the matter in negotiations, George said, so the action will be determined by an independent determination of the court.

The restraining order was filed July 23.

ers of the law. The Associated Press picked up the story and sent it nationwide, and added to it by interviewing Nevada Supreme Court Justice brother, who has an opposing view on the subject.

The newspaper that serves the Stanford University community, the Palo Alto Times, ran the following story under a six column headline that

The rising crime rate is cited by Morry Zenoff, publisher of the twice-weekly Henderson Home News, as the reason for his decision to print names of juveniles.

"We find kids are the biggest culprits," he said Wednesday. "They've had immunity for so long that they are flaunting it and go around thinking they can not be touched."

His brother, Justice David Zenoff, disagrees. "It has been established all over the country," he said, "that to publish the names is harmful to the society in general and to the best interests of the kids who get in trouble."

The Nevada law says, in part: "Nor shall the name or race of any child in connection with any proceeding in juvenile court be published in any newspaper without a writ-ten order of the court."

Both Justice Zenoff and Judge Alvin Wartmen of Clark County Juvenile Court said this wouldn't prohibit a newsman from getting names from jail or police records.

Publisher Zenoff said he in-

tends to do just that. He said

offenders in major crimes such as narcotics or burglary who are 16 years or older will be named from police records.

The possibility that a publisher who prints juvenile court records may be cited for contempt and given 25 days in jail or fined is recognized by Zenoff. He said he hopes he isn't breaking the law but would go to jail to support his

It may be that the law is unconstitutional, Justice Zenoff said, because it bars public access to court proceeding.

"Even so," said the judge, "it has been a gentlemen's agreement not to publish juveniles' names. This helps the child, who otherwise may get into trouble again because of written recognition."

Issues Warning On Dry Ice Use

Dr. Otto Ravenholt, district health officer, cautioned trav-ellers against the use of dry ice for cooling automobiles. Dr. Ravenholt stated that it has been brought to his attention by retailers of dry ice that travelers have been using dry ice to cool their closed

The health officer stated that dry ice is solidified carbon dioxide which is a regulator of the breathing function.
An increased concentration of carbon dioxide can cause an increased rate of breathing and can interfere with a driv-er's ability to control the au-

Traffic Signals To be installed

Continuing its emphasis on highway improvements, the Nevada Highway Department will install traffic signals at the Paradise and Tropicana intersection in Las Vegas. Bids for the project will be opened at department head-quarters in Carson City on Aug. 8, at 2 p.m.

The contract will feature traffic-actuated signals. Loop detectors imbeded in the road-way will record traffic volumes in each lane which de-

umes in each lane which determines the time length of the signal. Separate pedestrian and vehicle left-turn signals also will be installed, as well as intersection lighting. Existing traffic islands will be cut back to provide for six lanes of traffic on Paradise. Signal heads for the new system will be suspended from long-armed poles on the curbs to minimize pole placement in the median.

Current traffic volumes at the intersection are 10,700 cars per day. By the design year of 1988, approximately 14,000 vehicles per day are an-

ticipated.

The project will cost an estimated \$45,000. Department officials expect the work to take about two months to complete. Following installation of the system by the State Highway Department, Clark County will assume the cost of operating and maintaining the signals and lighting.

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
