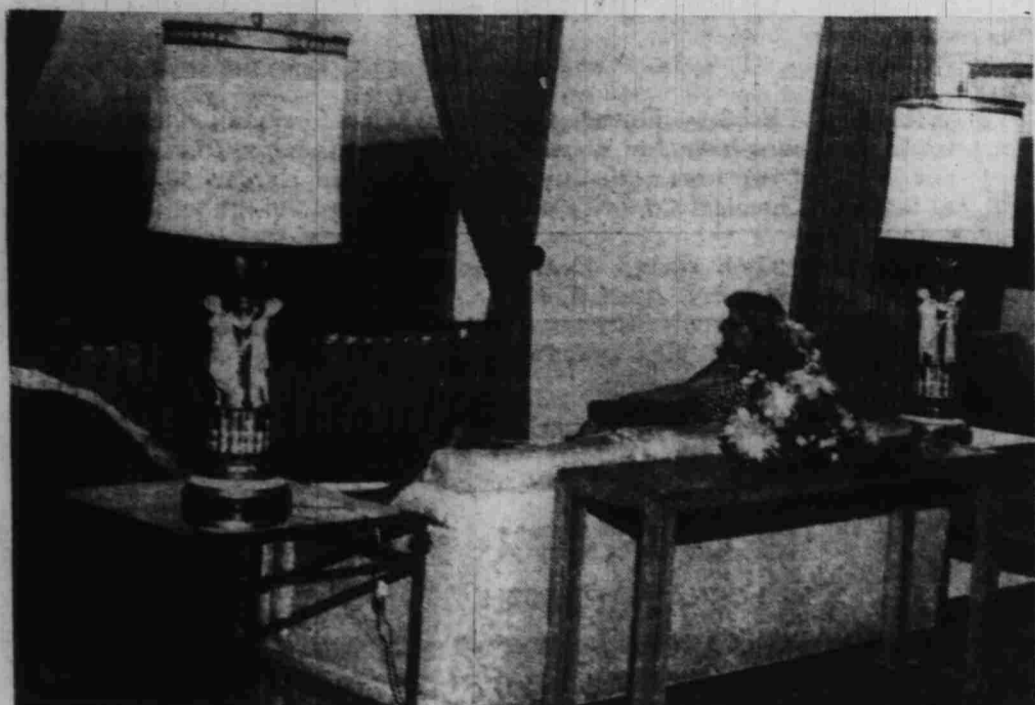

Morry's Story

It's our own Hersh Trumbo vs. Howard Hughes & Bill Harrah today—again—in Carson City.

Trumbo, backed by civic and elected leaders of his community, faces the combined power which seems limitless and unrelenting that the Hughes forces and Harrah forces have mustered to stand in the way of dog racing being okayed by this session of the state legislature.

The Hughes-men on the scene busy button-holing every member of the legislature, winning and dining them, seeking their vote to stop the bill that would give Henderson a new industry—are Tom Bell, member of the Board of Regents, a former Hendersonian, and Jimmy "The Greek" Snyder, public relations man and sports columnist.

Chuck Munson heads up the pressure-men for the northern gaming palaces. Behind the scenes fighting the bill is Wallie Warren, veteran lobbyist, who has our local plants as one of his clients, altho at this writing it isn't known whether the plants realize that the very man they hire and who works against us is a business partner with a man named Jim Woods in a business that serves the hotels.

Woods is chairman of the committee where in lies the dog-racing bill and he has actively clogged the machinery by initiating or allowing non-important amendments. Warren and Woods were in last second discussions before Tuesday morning's meeting of the commission where still another delaying action was initiated.

Following that meeting, this reporter, after earlier seeing the local plant's man Wallie Warren whispering with Woods, then saw Jimmy "The Greek" Snyder out for a "stroll" with another anti-dog man on the committee—Randy Capurro, this while the assembly was in session. Capurro had just put in the latest delaying action—a no other amendment—which stalled the matter until today's session.

Capurro, incidentally, had a half hour previously given our representative in the legislature, Hal Smith, his word that he would vote Tuesday to bring the dog race bill out on the floor for a general assembly vote.

Smith, too, had the word of Jim Woods that he would bring it out on the floor. Smith was furious at the obvious turn-arounds he got, but at this writing, he feels he will still get it out on the floor for a vote.

Mayor Bob Hampton, discouraged at the tremendous battling behind the scenes by the big guns of gaming, went to see the governor Tuesday, asking for any help he could get to bring the matter before the whole assembly.

"We want to win or lose with 40 men representing the entire state sitting in judgment rather than be shot down by the vicious attempts of a few," Hampton told the governor. He also explained what the project would mean to this city as an industry, detailing that besides a payroll of as much as a \$100,000 a week, it would provide many ancillary benefits.

The governor said he would sign the bill, if it gets to his desk. Thus far, it has passed the senate and needs only to pass the assembly. The Trumbo forces feel they have enough votes to pass it, if it can get to the floor.

Just one last chance remains for this city's side—

should the committee today continue its delaying routine. There is a rule in the assembly that the assembly itself can vote a bill out of a committee's hands—but it takes 21 votes to do it—and it is rarely, if ever, done.

Hal Smith and our town's other hard worker on this bill, Art Espinoza, both told this writer at plane time Tuesday that if they had to resort to this unique and last possible action—they'll do it.

And they believe they can marshal the 21 votes.

Espinoza, incidentally, got his lesson in turn-around-ism, too, this week when he saw his good friend, Don Mello, a railroad conductor from Sparks, stand up in bitter opposition at Tuesday's committee meeting—pointing a finger at another committee member, Austin Bowler, because he is on the board of director's of the local racing company. Bowler had received previous okay to be on from the state's attorney general and from the legislature's own counsel.

Mello's purpose appeared to be to stop the bill by stopping Bowler's right to vote in the committee.

Hughes-men and Harrah's men argue with whatever they use to argue with—plus their story that dog racing would hurt the crowds they get in their gambling houses.

To offset this, this city's own Sam Boyd, Eldorado club owner, was in Carson this week for the 15th time since the bill was put in the hopper, helping Trumbo, the mayor, our representatives with his counter-argument that racing might empty out casinos for a few hours but the general betterment would so help southern Nevada's recreation and fun program—that in the long run all would prosper.

This writer talked to just about every committee member and every member of the legislature—and the governor—explaining what passage of the bill would mean to Henderson economically.

I feel confident that good will defeat evil—and that the fellow we all love around this town—Hersh Trumbo—who got where he is by climbing telephone poles here when the town was just starting—will give Mr. Howard Hughes and his billions, Mr. Bill Harrah, and his millions—a run for their money, with Hersh using friends and community betterment as his aids—as against whatever the other side uses.

U.S. Cancels Calls for Bids For Lines to Carry Water From Lake Mead to Vegas

The mammoth multi-million dollar southern Nevada water project, now under its initial phases of construction, this week received a stunning blow in its programming for the immediate future when orders came from Washington D.C. to cancel for the time being any call for bids.

This news, learned exclusively by this newspaper, means the present construction will be finished—but that no lateral water lines will be put in to carry the water to Nellis Air Base, LV, No. Las Vegas and Henderson. Only Boulder City will benefit from the project when water is deliverable from Lake Mead in December 1970. The order in-

cludes postponement of building the main aqueduct.

The current economy kick inaugurated by the Nixon administration is believed to be the cause of the cancellation of calls for bids.

It is not known how long the order will be in effect.

If no laterals are put in soon, it could take years before there would be any beneficial use from the project which has been rated as large as the building of Hoover dam.

Presently being completed on Lake Mead's shores are an intake tower, a tunnel, a treating plant and a lateral line to Boulder City. Pumping stations at Saddle Island are also under construction and three

others are being bid on at this moment, with bids to be opened next week. The stop order did not effect these bids, we learned, and it is believed construction on the pumping stations will go forward when the bid winners are determined.

At this writing, it has not been learned what the state's three representatives in Washington will do or can do about this startling chop off of Nevada's most ambitious in-state project since the building of the dam itself.

The fate of the costly water works at the Lake, after installation, where water could be pumped but never delivered—is difficult to fathom.

Residents to Protest New City Drainage Measures

Residents of Zirconium Way and Rutile Way will be on hand at the city council meeting Monday night to protest the installation of humps in the road by the city to divert water from the culdesacs.

Two petitions will be presented, one from the residents on Zirconium, the other from residents on Rutile Way. The petitions were gathered by the residents of those areas independent of each

other, each protesting the city's solution to the flood control there.

Mrs. Garold McDonald, a resident on Rutile Way, said that there have been several incidents because of the installation of the humps and that some cars have difficulty in getting over them with out scraping the bottom.

"You can tell by the number of scrapes on the top of the hump, how many people

have had difficulty there," she said.

The humps were installed after the council voted not to put in a drainage area at the rear of the property but to try to prevent the water from getting trapped in the home area.

Mayor W. R. Hampton and Councilman Pratt Prince favored the other installation but the proposal was voted down.

Planners Study Zoning To Allow for Dairy Here

City Planning Commissioners were asked at their last regular meeting by Planning Director Franklin Bills to consider the possibilities of a zoning area to allow for a dairy in the city's boundaries.

Without any commitment of any kind, the Commissioners present generally agreed that the possibilities should be explored to allow this type of enterprise.

The commission began a detailed study of a preliminary draft of the proposed zoning ordinance.

This newspaper has consistently suggested that the city needs its only dairy to supply milk for the residents here.

Bills outlined some of the basic proposed changes in the zoning ordinance and questions were listed on a number of items which were referred for further staff study.

The discussion by the planners concluded on Chapter six and will be resumed at a special committee session on April 2 at 8 p.m. in the Council Chambers at city hall.

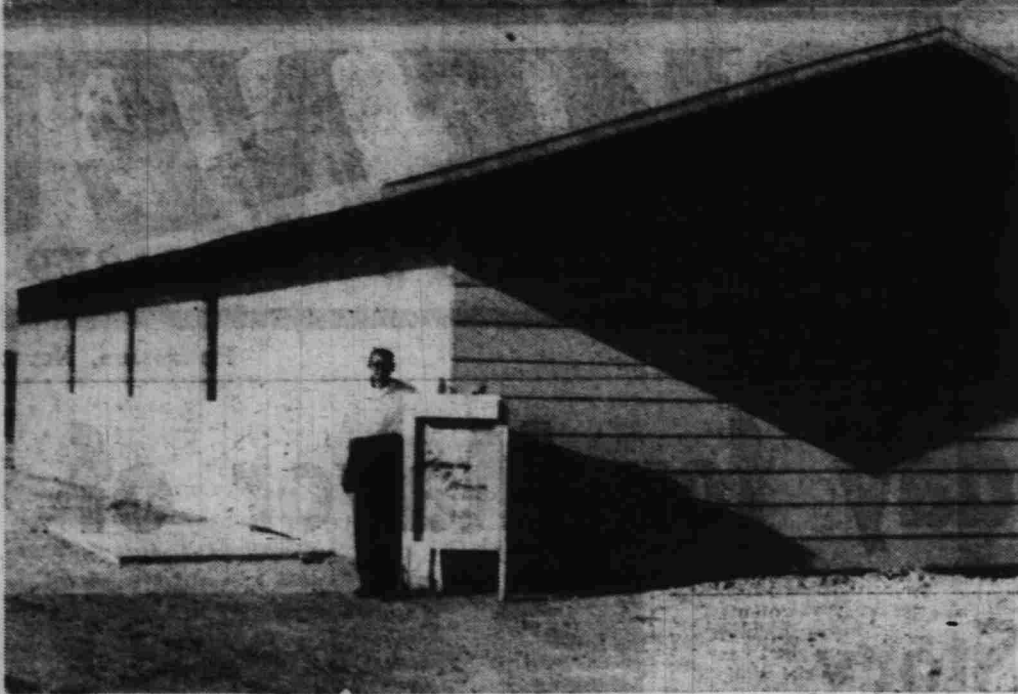

To Dedicate New Church In Trailer Estates Sunday

Dedication services for the "Highway to Heaven Chapel," located at 505 Apache Lane in Trailer Estates, will be held Sunday, according to Rev. Alfred Radke. Services will be held at 10 a.m. and at 7:30 p.m. at the new church site. The new church, a full gospel independent work, has been meeting in Henderson for about three years. For a year services were held in Victory Village administration building and during the past six months, while the church has been under construction, the services have been held in Brother Radke's home in Trailer Estates. The church has a radio program, "Highway to Heaven," on KTOO from 9 to 10 a.m. on Sundays. The new church has been made possible through donations from a number of people and by the hard work of Rev. Radke. The building is completely paid for. It is 24 feet by 60 feet and will seat over 100 people. It also contains a nursery for the children. Rev. Radke has been in Henderson three years. He and his family supported themselves on a mission to Tibet and India. He was originally from Washington. The Radkes have two married children. The public is invited to attend services at the new church.

Plant Annexation Bill Introduced in Carson City

A bill providing for the annexation of the Industrial lands adjacent to the City of Henderson, was introduced into the State Legislature Tuesday by Senator James I. Gibson and Assemblymen Hal Smith and Art Espinoza. The bill, (BDR S-2) was turned over to the government affairs committee of the assembly of which Hal Smith is chairman. The bill states that the city and the industrial complex will have the power to adjust the services to be received and the exemptions to be enjoyed through future negotiations. Whenever the council desires to exercise the power of annexation, it must adopt a resolution of intent identifying the land to be annexed. The city must give notice by at least one publication in the newspaper of the date, hour and place of a public hearing on the proposed annexation which must be held not less than 20 days after the date of first publication. If the annexation is to be completed, the council must then adopt an ordinance extending the corporate limits of the city to include the territory. According to the bill introduced the city would not have regulation over the use of land or buildings or location of buildings and the dedication of streets. The city would also not have regulation over trades, professions and businesses but may impose its usual license fees for revenue only. The city will not have authority over garbage collection or water supply and sewerage. According to figures presented to the council by Mayor W. R. Hampton, the city's benefits from the annexation financially, will amount to about \$30,000 per year. He explained that the city will have to increase its fire protection and equipment.

Gardeniers Set Flower Show April 19th and 20th

The 14th annual spring flower show will be presented April 19 and 20 by the Desert Gardeniers and will be hosted by the Palo Verde unit in cooperation with the Nevada State Federation of Garden Clubs. The show will be held in St. Peters hall and will be open to the public on Saturday, April 19 from 2 to 5 p.m. The hall will be open on Sunday, April 20 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. There is no admission charge. all entries in horticulture will be placed only by the placement committee. Mrs. John Ivary, chairman of classification, wishes to remind the public that all amateur flower growers and arrangers are invited to exhibit. They need not be a garden club member. Flower show programs may be obtained at the Henderson library. Mrs. W. Getts will present an exhibit of orchids. There will be a special exhibit of local student work presented by Tharol Lefler of the arts and crafts department of the Henderson Junior high school. Garden books and miniatures will be presented by local Garden club members.

JUVENILE NAMES TO BE PUBLISHED

Gov. Paul Laxalt Monday signed a bill to allow publication of names of juveniles who get into trouble more than twice if the offense would have been a felony.

MODERN TECHNIQUES AID TROUBLED TRAVELERS



The winds of change — blowing in gale force during the 60's in every area of American life — have produced a number of remarkable developments in the nation's leading social service agencies. Once limited to coffee and handouts to the destitute, these organizations are now utilizing the most modern techniques in sociology, psychiatry, social service and labor recruitment to treat the vast, new problems confronting a large portion of our citizens today.

A dramatic example of such widespread and revolutionary "updating" in approach has occurred in the Travelers Aid Association of America, one of the country's oldest and most respected social agencies.

This agency, the nation's only social service devoted exclusively to meeting the needs of mobile people, each year helps more than a million troubled travelers from approximately 10,000 separate communities. In addition to offices in busy downtown areas and

after moving to new jobs and new communities.

In San Francisco, a Travelers Aid Society project to help alienated young people, has produced a two-year study of eight hundred 18-21 year-olds who had sought the society's services. It has provided these drifting young people with group therapy, a 24-hour answering service to receive their emergency calls and has recently received a grant to establish for these disturbed youths a much-needed low cost residence club.

Along with direct service, Travelers Aid is moving into psychological research to try to learn what makes people run. The organization's Philadelphia branch, through a grant from the National Institute of Mental Health, is now working with a 12-man team of psychiatrists, psychologists and social workers in a three-year study of the motivations of people who keep traveling to escape responsibility.

All Travelers Aid Societies provide free service. Supported by contributions from United Funds and Community Chests, all major offices include a number of staff volunteers as well as a corps of expert professional specialists.

Perhaps the association's work was best summarized in a recent letter from a grateful factory worker. He wrote: "Your effort was the most anyone, any place or anywhere ever done for me."

Heavyweight Wrestling Champ To Defend Title in Las Vegas

H-224 HEAVYWEIGHT Wrestling United States heavyweight champion Ray Stevens will defend his title against the number one ranked challenger Kinji Shibuya at the Las Vegas convention center Tuesday, April 8.

The Stevens-Shibuya match has been one of the most sought after championship bouts in recent years, and was awarded to Las Vegas promoter Bill Miller last week by the national wrestling alliance. Bids had been received by San Francisco as well as 11 other cities. "But we made the match for Las Vegas for two reasons," stated Muchnick. "First, Las Vegas offered the highest guarantee and percentage, but mainly we awarded the bout to Miller as a reward to the fans for their tremendous interest in championship wrestling."

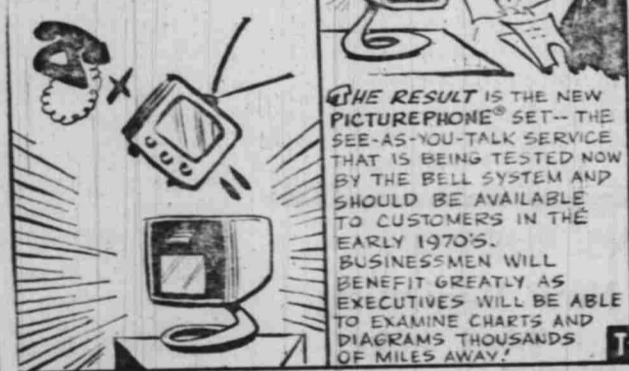

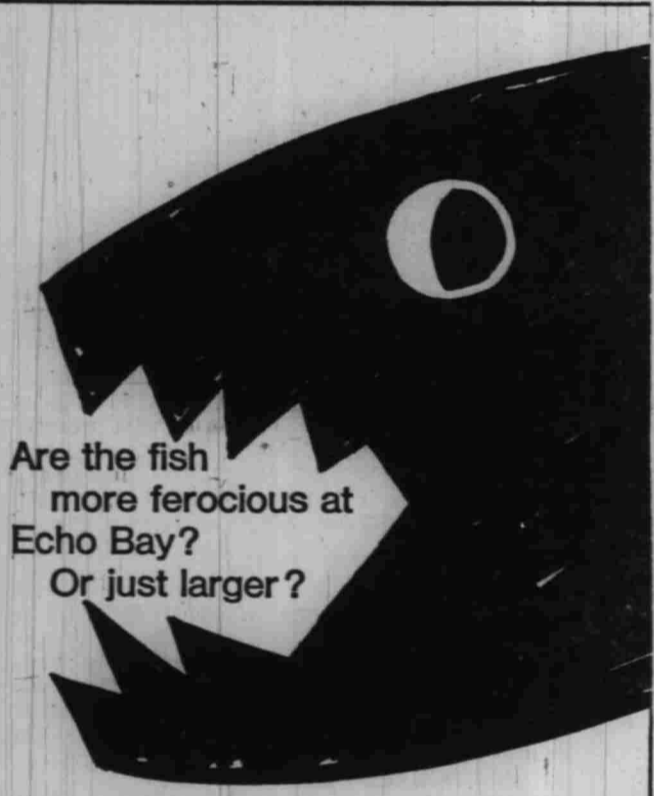

Reclamation Operators of New Mead Substation End Training

Ten Bureau of Reclamation employees, who have been participating in an intensive refresher training program for substation operators since July, 1968, completed their training in a ceremony at the Bureau of Reclamation's Basic substation in Henderson Tuesday.

They are employed by the Parker-Davis project and will serve as operators at the newly constructed Mead substation soon to be placed in operation.

Mead substation is located approximately three miles south of Boulder City, and constitutes another important link in the expanding electric power intertie in the southwest. It will serve as an interconnection between transmission lines of Southern Calif. Edison Co., the Metropolitan water district of Southern California, Nevada Power Co., and the Bureau of Reclamation, and will enhance the availability and reliability of electric power in the Southern Nevada area.

Electric power interconnections of this type make possible the transfer of electric power from one system to another for mutual assistance in supplying peak loads and preventing interruptions to consumers during loss of generation.

The training program was supervised by William M. Doak, Robert Mulkey, LeRoy Nelson and D. R. McQuaid, employees of the Parker-Davis project.

Some of the new operators will begin work next Monday and the entire crew will be there by April 15. Foreman will be Cal Merrill of Henderson, who has been with the Basic substation since 1951. The Henderson substation, which was built in 1942 for the

war effort, will be run by remote control from the Mead station.

Dog Pound Problems To Be Aired at Council Meet

IRS Answers the Question

Q — My refund came and it was lower than I expected. How can I find out why it was reduced?

A — In cases such as these, mistakes in arithmetic account for most of the adjustments. You should receive an explanation from us shortly after your refund check arrives explaining the adjustment.

This year, many mistakes in arithmetic are being made on the surcharge. Taxpayers are either reading the surcharge tables incorrectly, making mistakes by not adding it to their tax or making a mistake when they multiply by .075 to determine the amount of the surcharge.

Q — When do I have to file my estimate tax declared?

A — Estimated declarations and first quarter payments are due April 15. Use the pre-addressed 1040-ES voucher form you received in the mail when you file. It will assure proper crediting of payments to your account.

Q — How does the \$100 limitation apply to casualty losses? We suffered damage from two different storms last year.

A — The \$100 limitation applies to each separate nonbus-

iness casualty. Deduct the excess over \$100 not reimbursed by insurance for each separate loss. See page 9 of the Form 1040 instructions for details.

Q — Can I add the medical insurance premiums I pay for my dependent mother to my own for the purpose of tax deductions?

A — Premiums paid for medical care insurance for yourself, your spouse and your dependents are deductible. Total all of these premiums you paid last year and deduct one-half of them up to \$150 without regard to the three percent rule. The balance of the premiums should be included with your other medical expenses which are subject to the three percent limitation. You must itemize your deductions to use this rule.

Q — When does a person have to pay self-employment tax?

A — To be liable for self-employment tax, a person must have income from a business or a trade or profession which he conducts as an independent contractor or as a member of a partnership. To be subject to the tax net earnings from self-employment must be at least \$400. For ad-

ditional information see Schedule C-3.

Q — My wife died last year. I have not remarried, can I still file a joint return?

A — You can file a joint return for the year of death. You may also file as a "surviving spouse" using joint return rates for the two years succeeding the year of your wife's death if you meet certain requirements. Check page 3 of the 1040 instructions for details.

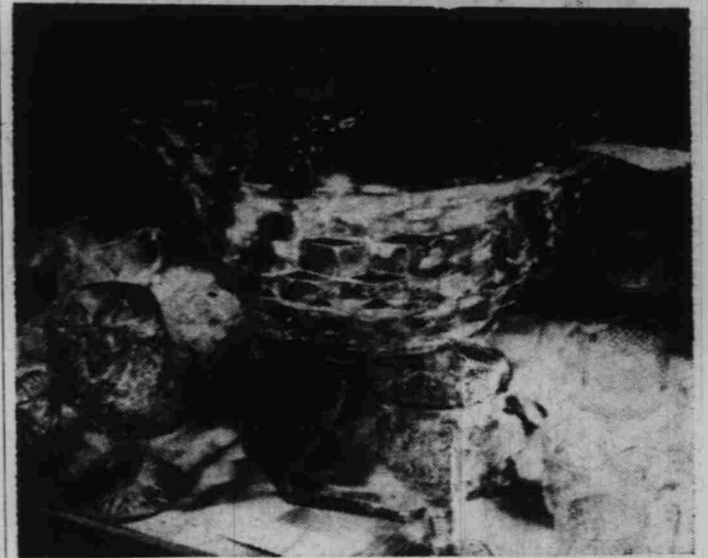

SP-4 Thomas Prato Wins High Army Commendation

Specialist Four Thomas Prato, Jr., has been awarded the Army Commendation Medal for heroism in Vietnam, it was learned here. Prato is the son of Angelina Hayward and nephew of Mamie Vincent. The citation which tells about the medal with a "V" device states: "For heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. On this date, SP-4 Prato was serving as a machine-gunner with his mechanized platoon in a ready reaction force. His platoon was sent to reinforce a small friendly element which had engaged a larger and well equipped Viet Cong force near Highway 301, seven kilometers east of Highway 13. When the Mechanized column arrived at the area of contact, it was subjected to

intense hostile rocket propelled grenade and small arms fire.

His armored personnel carrier assaulted the insurgents' positions. Specialist Prato put forth suppressive barrages from his externally mounted machine gun. With complete disregard for his personal safety, he remained exposed to the hail of enemy rounds when his weapon malfunctioned and he disassembled it to repair a faulty part. He reassembled the machine gun in a minimum amount of time and continued to place devastating fire until the hostile force was completely routed.

"His courageous initiative and bold determination significantly contributed to the successful outcome of the encounter."

The commendation was signed by Archie R. Hyle, Col. Chief of Staff.

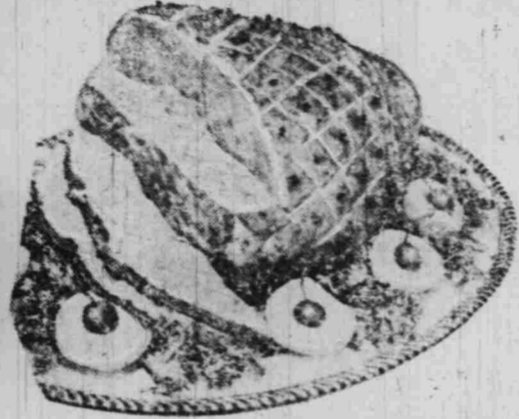

New Air Pollution Equipment Purchased by Health Department

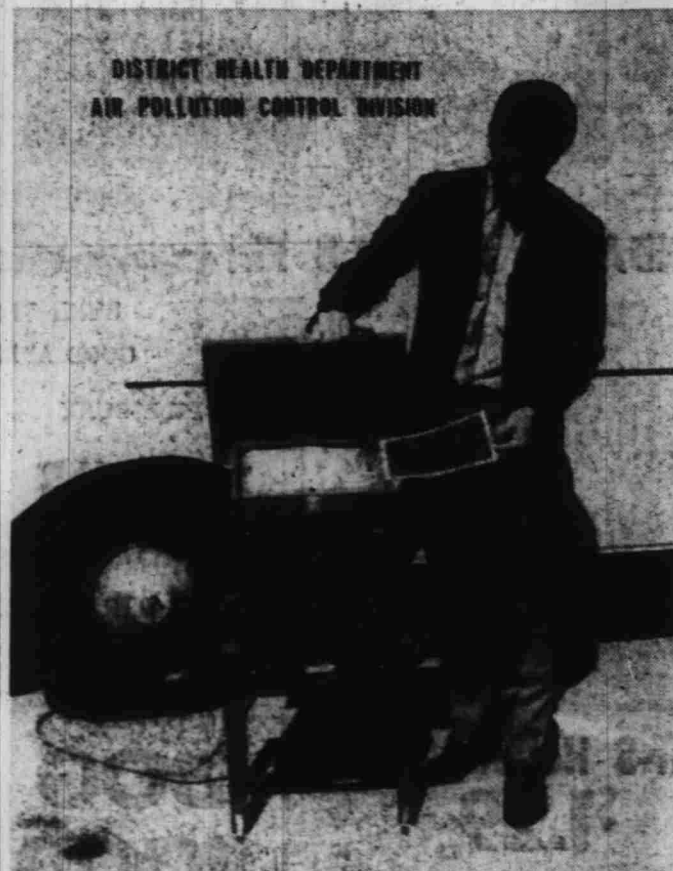
The District Health Department has received additional equipment for monitoring air quality in sections of the county not covered by already installed equipment, according to Dr. Otto Ravenholt, district health officer.

Purchases were made possible through the award of a special Federal Air Pollution Control Program Grant by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Seven new high-volume air samplers will monitor small particles suspended in the air

at the following locations: upper and lower Moapa Valley, all of Las Vegas Valley, Boulder City and the Davis Dam area. The network will extend from Jean to Boulder City and from Moapa Valley to the southern most tip of Nevada, south of Davis Dam area.

This extensive network is essential for the establishment of air quality standards for this area. Recently the federal government announced that the Las Vegas area would be in one of the newly created Air Quality Regions.
