## Here's Play by Play of Yesterday's Maneuvers in The Committee, Written By On-the-Scene Reporter

As soon as the committee met yesterday morning, Espinoza moved and Bowler seconded that SB-40 be the first order of business. The chairman, Wood, ruled the motion out of order on grounds that it was not necessary the bill be considered at this time. Espinoza made an amendment to the bill which would eliminate any member of the racing commission having any vested interest in dog racing. The motion was seconded and carried. Capurro's amendment was produced for consideration.

The amendment was introduced two weeks ago which would eliminate dog racing entirely and raise the percentage to be retained by horse racing. This amendment was spoken against by Mello on the grounds that the committee was there to consider dog racing and this amendment pertained to horse racing. Capurro withdrew the amendment. Chairman Woods suggested that Capurro submit amendments on the floor of the assembly. Torvinen moved "indefinite postponement" of SB-140. The move was seconded

by Capurro. The motion failed by 3-4 with Wood, Torvinen and Capurro voting "aye." Espinoza moved and Bowler seconded the bill be put on the floor and the amendment with "do pass." The chairman asked for a polling of the committee with Espinoza, Mello, Tim Hafen and Bowler voting "aye." Capurro, Torvinen and Wood voted No, which meant that the bill would come out on the floor with a majority-minority recommendation. There will be a considerable floor fight on the bill. The outstanding point yesterday was

the change of position of Assemblyman Don Mello of Sparks, who on the outset of the committee's consideration of the bill was strongly opposed to dog racing—this was his first public recorded change of heart. The bill was submitted to the Commerce committee on March 14 and has spent more than a month fighting its way out of committee. Every possible move was made to defeat this bill reaching the floor of the assembly, by opponents on this committee. For three weeks the committee stood 4-3 against the bill coming out of committee. The change of heart of Assemblyman Mello moved the bill to the floor.

Young Arkell was born in Boulder City, April 14, 1948 and attended schools through

kindergarten and high school in Henderson. He was captain of the football and basketball teams at Basic high. He won a Fleischman scholarship in forestry. He is survived by his parents, two brothers, Don of Las Vegas, and Lt. David Arkell, stationed at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma and grandmothers, Mrs. Reta Arkell of Henderson, and Mrs. Fred Gibson of Las Vegas. The family has asked that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the heart fund or the giver's favorite charity.



## Assembly Passes Plant Annexation Bill; Goes to Senate

An overwhelming majority was obtained by Henderson's two assemblymen Art Espinoza and Hal Smith this week to win assembly passage of the bill to annex the Henderson plants. The vote was taken Tuesday afternoon and was 27 to

8. The bill now goes to the senate for consideration, and that is where Senator Jim Gibson is spear-heading the project that is hoped will become law before the legislature finishes session Sunday night. Voting against the bill

among the Clark County lawmakers were Woodrow Wilson, Geraldine Tyson, Austin Bowler, C. W. Lingenfelter, Don Mello, Tim Hafen. The bill was asked for by the city council as an economic and social aid to the city.

## City Budget Hearing Recessed Until April 28

A public hearing on the city's anticipated budget of \$2,980,513, was postponed to April 28 Tuesday night by city council action. The recess of the hearing was necessitated by the fact that some of the facts concerning income of the city were not available. Alfred Hyman, city auditor, explained to the city council that the new budget would increase the ad valorem tax rate over last year by 6-10 of 1 cent which would bring the tax rate to Henderson to \$5.50, and amounts to a tax rate of \$12.849. Hyman was advised by the State Tax Commission that the city's budget would have to be reduced by \$217,108 if legislative-new revenue is not received.

During the year the city applied for an emergency loan of \$300,000 and received state approval. The proceeds were specified for an ambulance, \$15,000; \$15,000 for purchase of communication equipment; \$185,000 for resurfacing streets and \$85,000 for constructing a water storage tank. He stated that the city council has not authorized an increase in water rates. The general fund budget is contemplated at \$1,249,213, as compared to \$912,730 for the current year. It includes debt service at \$185,260; utility fund, \$679,537; land fund, \$777,187, and special recreation fund totals \$2,980,513.

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## DOLORES ZENOFF DECIDES TO TAKE IT EASY, SELLS HER 1/2 OF NEWSPAPERS TO MORRY

Dolores Zenoff, who for 20 years has been a key figure in the operation and development of this newspaper, has decided to take life easier.

On April 1 she sold her half interest in the newspapers to Morry Zenoff, who now becomes sole owner of the properties that include the Henderson Home News and the Boulder City News.

Dolores came to Nevada in 1948 and first worked on the

Boulder paper until the Henderson property was founded when she then took over the business management of both properties. Later when Morry Zenoff founded KBMI radio station and KSHO tv station Dolores handled the business details of those operations also.

Dolores lives on the Black Mt. golf course in Henderson and plans to spend her time golfing and traveling.

The dog race bill is now on the floor of the Nevada state assembly.

Having already passed the state senate, the bill needs only an okay by the 40 member assembly to move forward on its way to the governor's signature, which makes it become the law of the state.

Governor Paul Laxalt has told Henderson's mayor, Bob Hampton, that if and when the bill reaches his desk, he would sign it.

The bill came out of the commerce committee yesterday after nearly a month of political maneuvering, featuring attempts of anti-dog adherents in the committee to stall out this session of the legislature by watering it down with amendments and delaying tactics.

The log-jam was broken yesterday morning when Henderson's Art Espinoza won over Don Mello and with it came the necessary fourth out of seven votes to bring it to the assembly floor.

Cheered by the committee's action yesterday morning, the Henderson contingent was cast into gloom toward last nightfall as the word came to them that the big gaming interests fighting the bill had now reached deeper into its bag of tricks in preparing for the floor fight scheduled for either today or tomorrow.

What the tricks were that came out of that bag could not be ascertained, but whatever it was it swung some of the pro votes to no votes, and thus has cast a doubt on whether the Henderson side can get the necessary 21 votes to pass. As of press time, the unofficial count showed the original 20 commitments had dropped to 16, but there were still ten on the maybe list. From this maybe list must be won the votes to win. This list includes Henderson's own Harry Reid and Boulder City's own Bryan Hafen, of all things! And what's more — Woodrow Wilson!

A plane load of interested and influential Henderson citizens were due to take off this morning to lend whatever help they can to Hersh Trumbo, Sam Boyd, Art Espinoza and Hal Smith—as this last ditch fight for a new industry takes on the biggest guns imaginable of the Howard Hughes—Bill Harrah — Harold's Club forces.

At this writing, it looks to this writer that it's time for all of us to cross our fingers, or pray, or start a grand jury investigation of big gaming's role in fighting the bill.

Should the fates rule in favor of Henderson, look for a special souvenir extra edition on your lawn — setting off a celebration the likes of V-J day, Vietnam day, or what have you.

# Assessor Claims Assemblyman Not Giving The Facts

County Assessor James A. Bilbray today took strong and angry exception to a published statement by Hal Smith, Henderson Assemblyman and lumber dealer, that county assessors fighting his efforts to eliminate the tax on merchants' inventories "will deliberately hinder Nevada's economic growth apparently for selfish reasons."

Bilbray charged Smith with deliberately distorting and withholding facts and throwing up a "smoke screen" in

his efforts to justify "special interests" legislation Smith had introduced to abolish the tax on merchants inventories.

"He's running scared," said Bilbray, "not just because the assessors are fighting his insidious efforts, but because the people, especially here in Clark County, know exactly what he's trying to do and have joined in the fight against it."

Smith, in his statement, said that "In fighting the bill, assessors are perhaps unwittingly encouraging dishonesty among themselves and among tax-paying merchants. It is impossible for taxing authorities to make a true evaluation of every business inventory in the state. Assessors are not now doing so and have indicated no intention to do so."

"He's talking thru his hat," snorted Bilbray, "and also deliberately withholding the facts when he says that assessors have indicated no intention of attempting to get a true evaluation of business inventories."

Under present law, he said, assessors can and do, when necessary challenge the accuracy of inventory statements submitted annually by merchants. "However, he added, "Smith pointedly and conveniently neglects to inform the press that he, Smith, during this present session of the legislature, personally led in committee a successful at-

tempt to remove from another bill a proviso giving assessors the legal authority to inspect the inventory record of merchants if necessary which would have put some more teeth in the present legislative set-up". By far the great majority of merchants do file accurate inventory declarations.

"And insofar as encouraging dishonesty among us assessors," Bilbray continued, "Smith is really reaching! Just how in the world does he reason that an assessor can be dishonest by adhering strictly to constitutional mandates that all property be taxed uniformly."

Smith, in his statement, said that the tax on inventories hurt business economy in the state because it discouraged the maintenance of adequate inventory, which in turn meant reduced sales and reduced consumer taxes. Also, he said, it caused a serious

disruption in the flow of goods and materials. Additionally, it put Nevada at a disadvantage in competing with other states for new industry since many states advertise widely that they have no inventory taxes.

"Now lets get the facts straight, for the record," said Bilbray. This bill, AJR 14, originally, was one I had sponsored to exempt homeowners from the personal property tax and give them some needed tax relief. But Smith, in committee, had tacked onto the bill a "rider" to include merchants' inventories in the exemption.

"Despite a plea by Assembly Taxation Committee Chairman Tim Hafen and others that this "rider" would cost Clark County one million dollars and the entire state one million eight hundred thousand in tax revenue which would subsequently be shifted onto the shoulders of the homeowner in one way or another, the bill was passed by the assembly and sent to the senate where it is now being debated."

Bilbray said it certainly was not within his jurisdiction to object to legislators trying to abolish the tax on inventories. But he did object, and strenuously, to "having the present insidious efforts" of a special interest group tacked on as a "rider" to his own sponsored legislative measure to give the homeowner a tax break.

"As Nevada Tax Commission Secretary Roy Nickson pointed out" said Bilbray, "the exemption of merchants inventories would mean raising the assessed valuation of every-

body's property including homes, from the present 35 to 37 1/2 percent, to make up the revenue loss."

"Let then introduce a bill of their own abolishing the inventories tax, if they want to and, if the legislators see fit to pass on this tax burden to the people, then it's up to them to explain why."

Bilbray said that Smith's statement that the tax discouraged maintenance of an adequate inventory was just that much hogwash. Volume of sales governed the amount of inventory a merchant carried and that alone.

"He, Smith, says that some short sighted assessors are apparently willing to trade \$1.8 in present inventory tax revenue for more than \$4 million which could be derived thru a bolstered economy."

"Just how in the world Smith figures that elimination of 1 1/2 percent of inventory, which a merchant pays now and which is passed on to the buyer, will bolster Nevada's economy to the tune of \$4 million annually, is beyond me," said Bilbray. "He must have picked that figure out of the same imagination as the rest of is irresponsible attempts to excuse his actions."

Bilbray further castigated the Henderson Assemblyman for talking out of both sides of his mouth, and now, in his press statement, revealing his true intent — completely abolishing the tax on merchants inventories.

Smith had gone on record as having inventories assess-

ed "on the basis of sales volume." This, Bilbray has contended, would "destroy the entire foundation of the property tax which stipulates that all property be assessed at market value" — it "was unfeasible and impractical because property in inventories would then escape assessment until they were actually sold" — that "property taxes and sales taxes had no affinity to each other" — and also that "volume of sales indicated only a turn-over and gave no true indication of the value of a merchant's inventory as of lien date."

Bilbray charged that Smith and others who had pushed

thru the bill in the assembly had either of two things in mind. "They either wanted to kill the good legislation which would give the homeowner taxpayer a break, or they're trying to "ride in" the merchants exemption feature for their own interests on the popularity of the legislation he, Bilbray had sponsored.

The Clark County assessor believes that the senate will kill the bill rather than pass it with Smith's "rider" and the unfortunate part of that is that because of Smith's action the relief Bilbray hoped to get for the homeowner will also be lost.

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**No Right of Search Jeopardized Police Work Said Chief Allen**

Republican leaders who introduced the "stop and frisk" bill in the State Legislature hailed its signing by Governor Paul Laxalt as "an important step on the road back to sanity in dealing with the suspected criminal."

Speaker Howard McKissick, Reno attorney, and majority floor leader Zel Lowman, Las Vegas businessman, who jointly sponsored the bill were present in Laxalt's office when the measure became law. McKissick pointed out that contrary to press coverage while the bill was being considered in the Legislature, it is the model measure prepared by the American Law Institute, Model Code Division, and was specifically written within limits set by U.S. Supreme Court decisions. It allows police to detain persons found at the scene of a crime, or in situations indicating that a crime is about to be committed, for 15 minutes for questioning and search. He said the 1968 Supreme Court decision, Terry vs. Ohio, allows this action.

Lowman said the measure is a particularly important tool for narcotics investigators. "Chief of Police William Allen of Henderson told me before the convening of the Legislature that the Mapp vs. Ohio decision, which jeopardized the right of search and seizure, has hampered narcotics control more than the Miranda or Escobedo decisions requiring that a suspect be told his civil rights," Lowman said. "Harry (McKissick) and I were searching for some way to help law enforcement in this problem area when we ran across the Uniform Act. I'm encouraged that other legislators and the Governor have agreed with us and it is now another tool to help stamp out drug abuse and to help prevent crime in general."

**'Curly Horses' to Be Shown At Industrial Days Gymkhana**


Outstanding horses will be shown at half time Saturday April 19 at the Henderson Industrial Days Horse Show and Gymkhana. This breed of horses is more commonly known as the "Curly Horse."

The Bashkir horse is most typical of the horses which, at present, can be found in the Southern and Eastern parts of the Bashkir, A.S.S.R. (Autonomous Soviet Socialist Republic), but in Western and Northern parts these horses have been cross-bred with other breeds.

There are two types of Bashkir horses—one is a mountain type, the other is a prairie type. The mountain type is not tall and has a short body. In Southern and Eastern parts of Bashkir these horses reach a height of 137 cm. and in Northern parts up to 140 cm. They have a wide and well developed chest, a thin neck, a small head with a straight profile and small unexpressive eyes. They have a straight and sturdy back, although it is not rare to see a humped back in some.

The fillies are known for their milk productivity and will average 10 litres per 24 hours, but some have been known to reach as high as 18 litres (4 to 6 gal.).

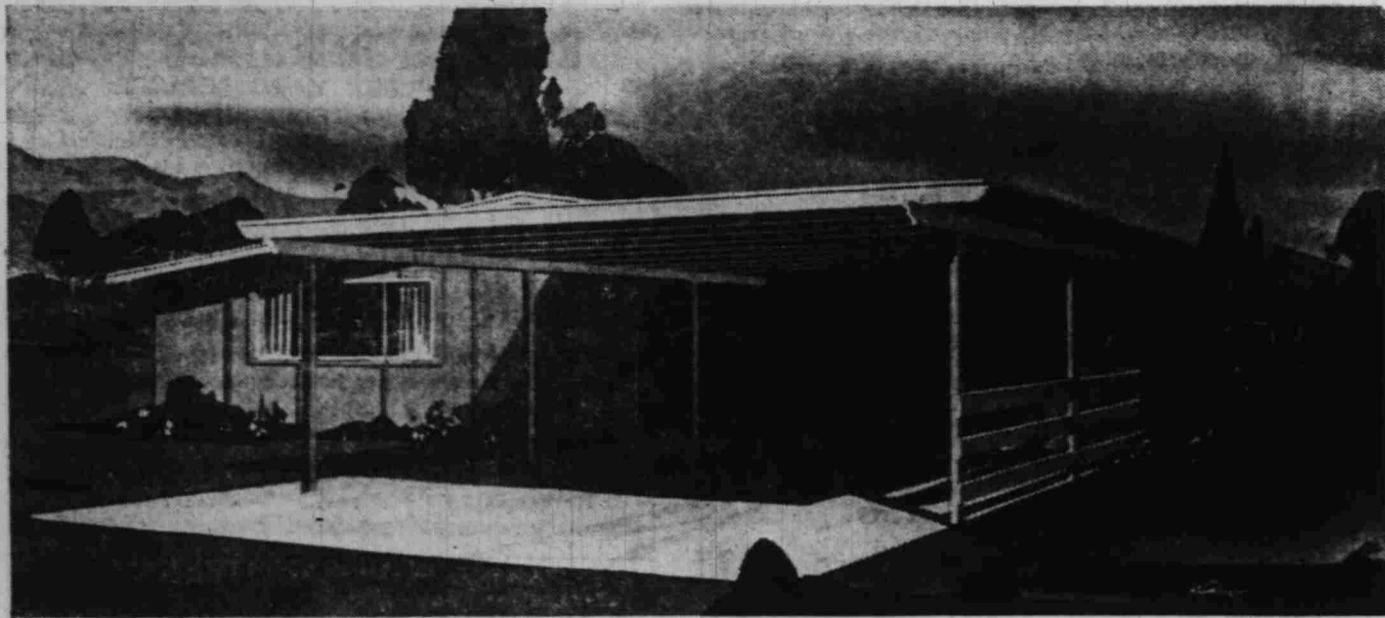






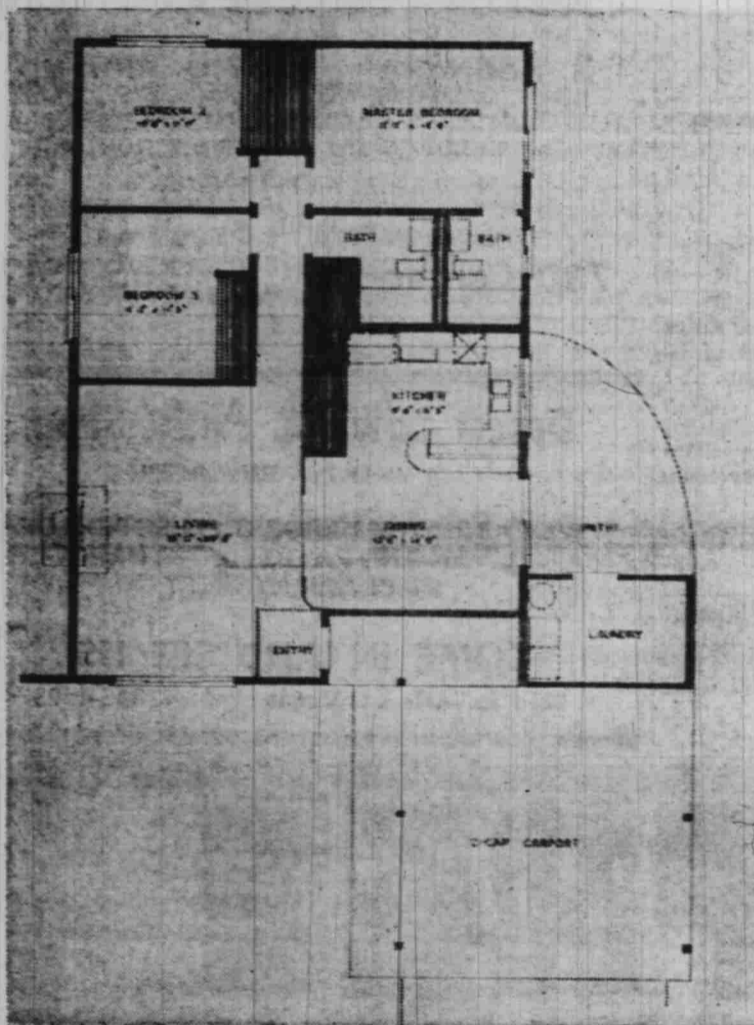

### Westerner Floor Plan

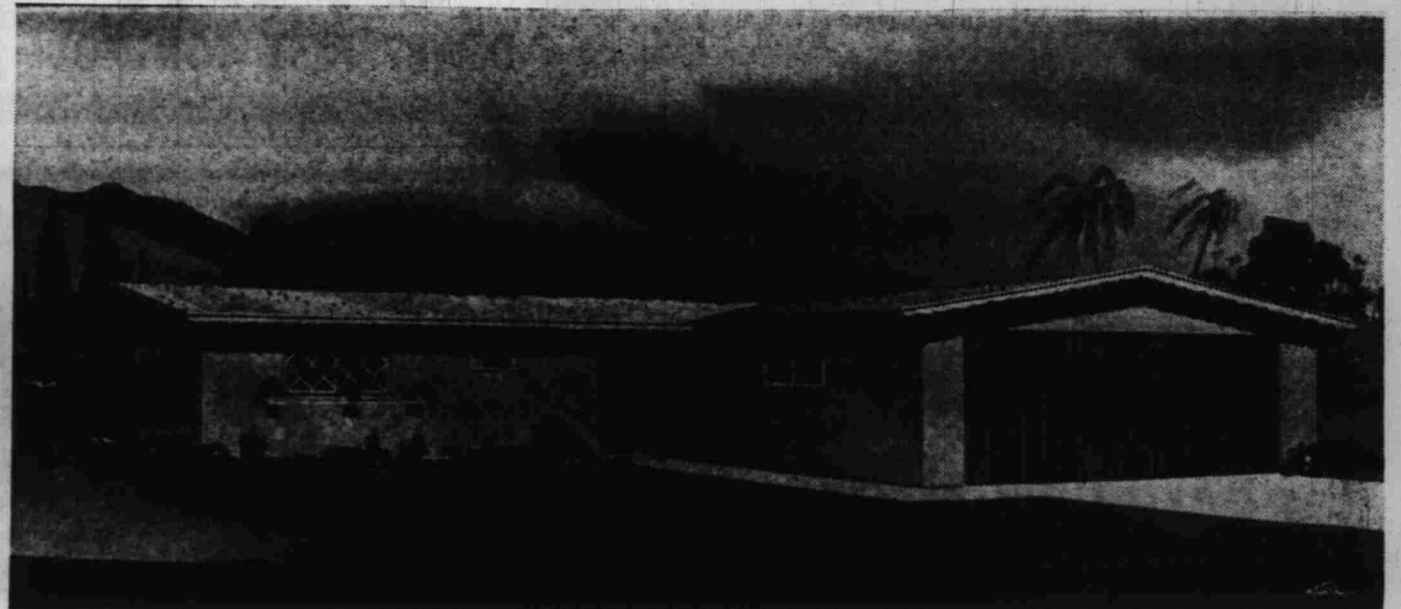

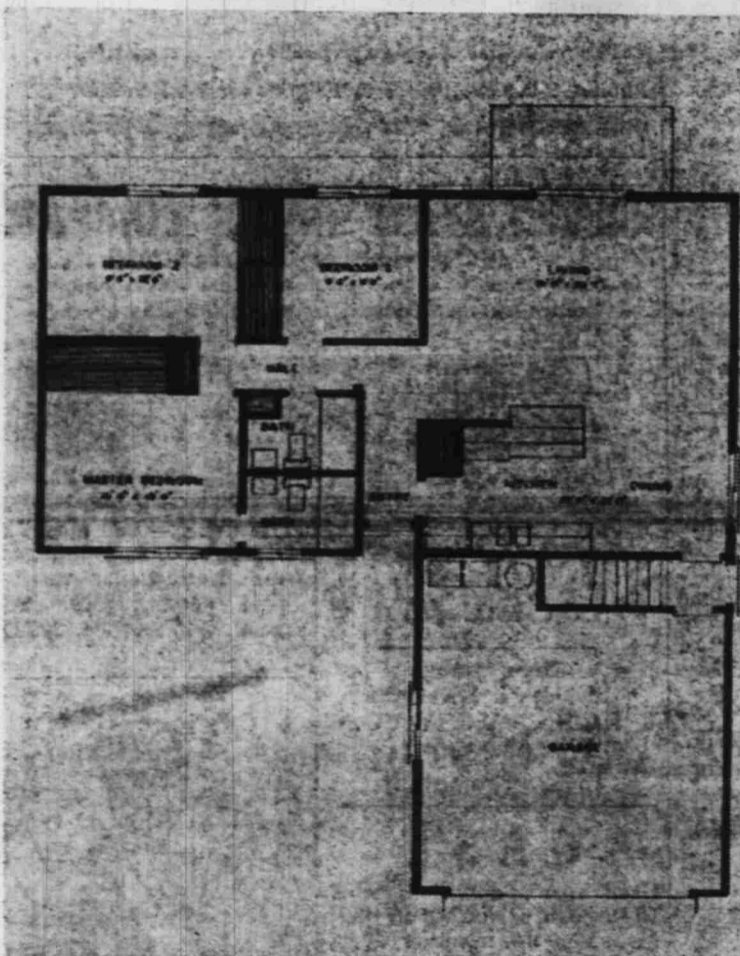

white lace stockings and white fur headbands and muffs.

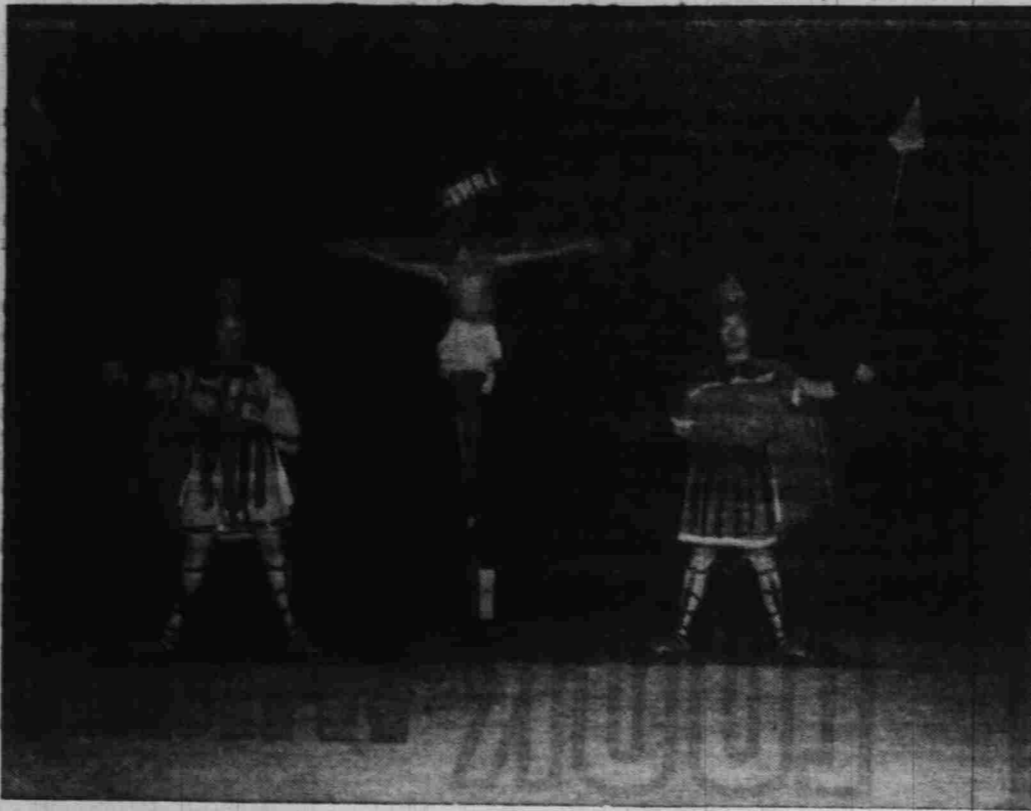

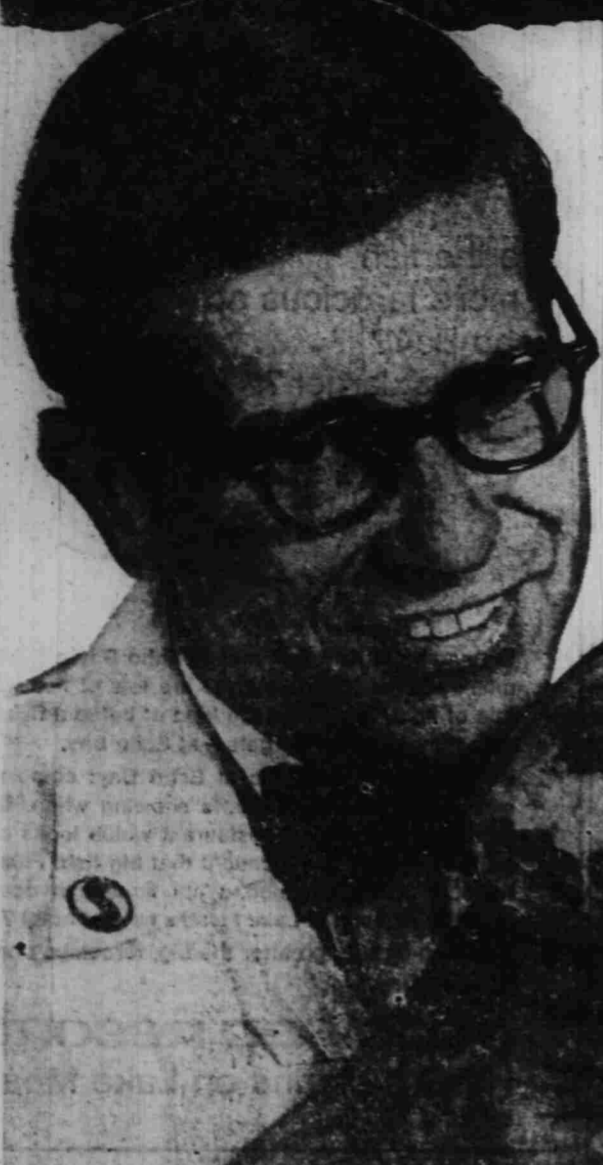

Mrs. Murray has been a member of the Las Vegas Business and Professional Women's Club for the past 10 years.

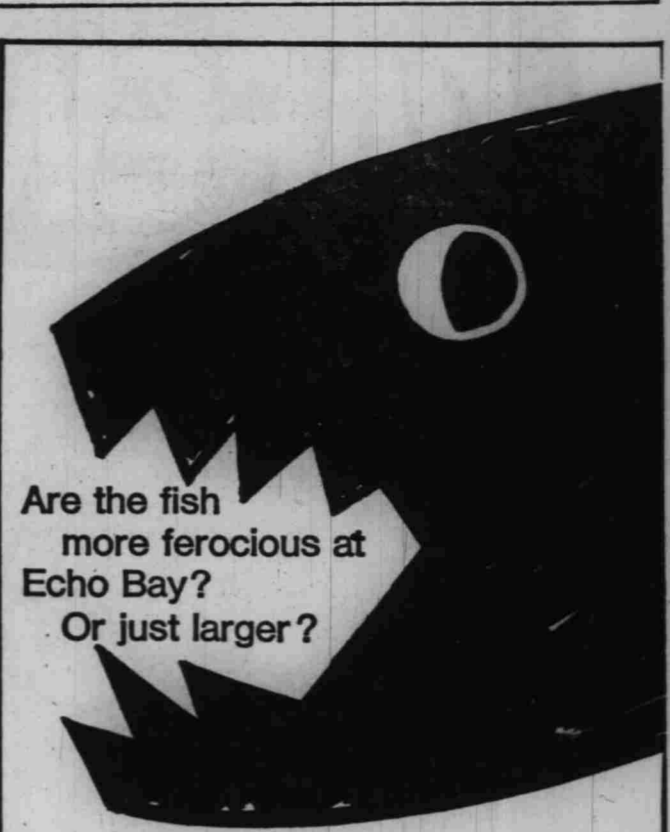

### SPRING RIVER RUNOFF FINE—

The outlook for the coming spring runoff is a good to excellent over the entire Upper Colorado River Basin since April 1 snowpack measurements indicate well above average water storage in the mountain snowpack, the Bureau of Reclamation announced today.

The probable April through July runoff from the Basin above Lees Ferry should be about 106 percent of normal or 9.0 million acre-feet. This forecast is based on the seasonal accumulation of precipitation to April 1 at 58 stations and April 1 snow measurement at 48 mountainous snow courses within the watershed.

Lake Mead on April 1 was at elevation 1140 feet above mean sea level, or about 7 feet higher than a year ago. It contains 15.4 million acre-feet of active storage, or 56

percent of its capacity. The reservoir level was 81 feet below the top of the raised spillway gates at Hoover Dam. The lake is expected to remain near this level or rise slightly through next June.

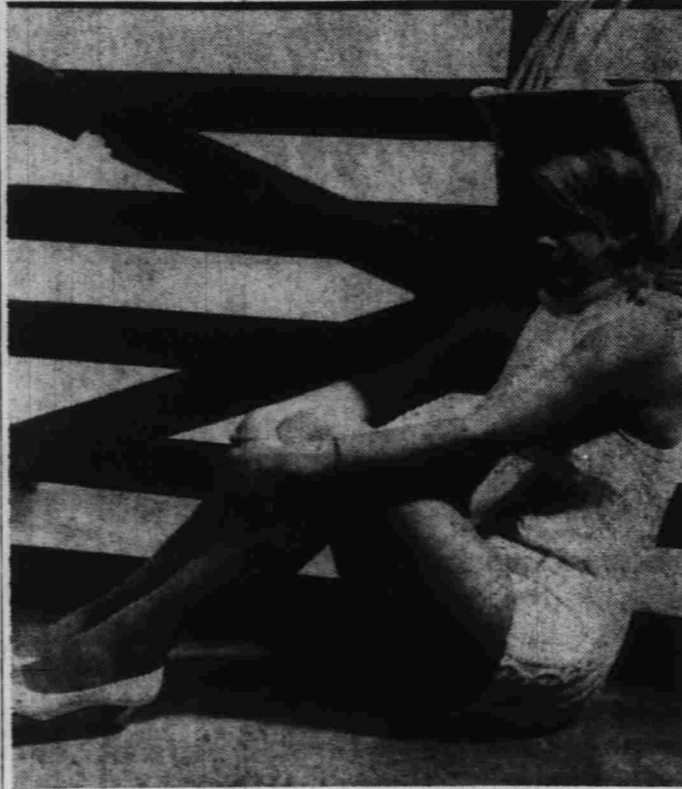
