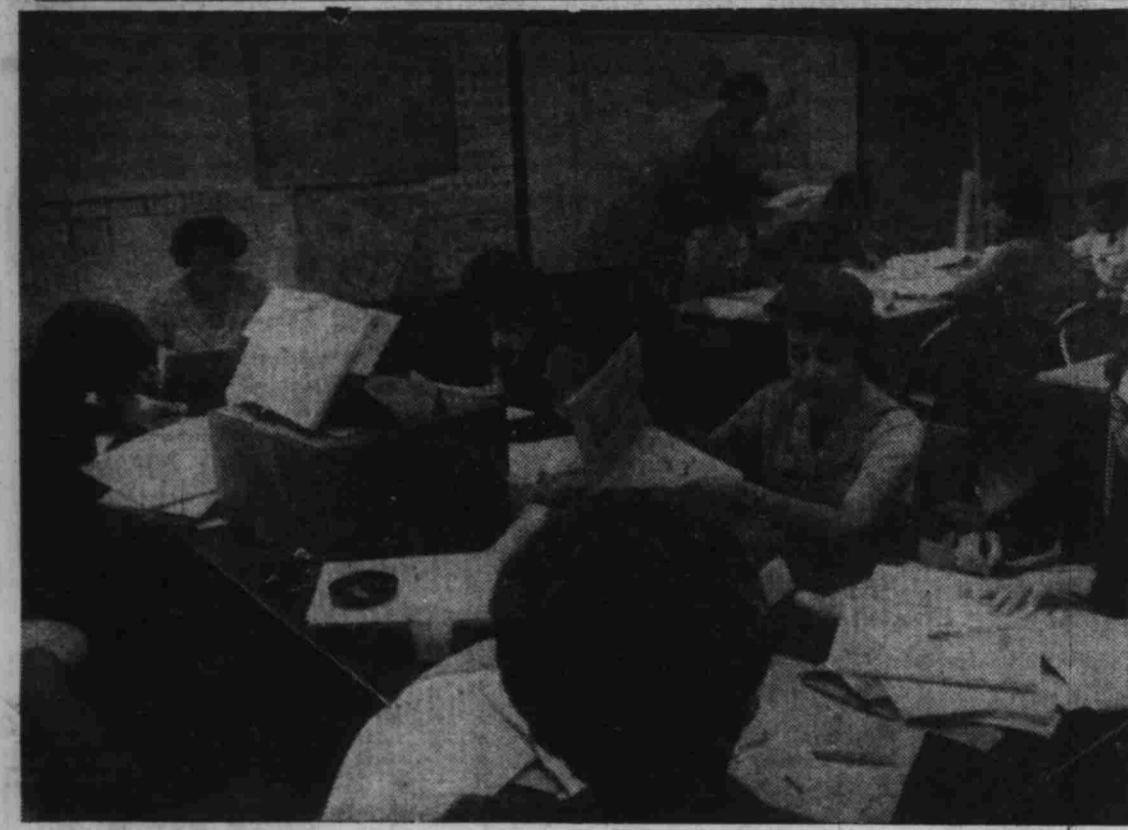

Helen Brown is Example Of National Volunteer Week

The first week in April is National Volunteer Week. Let us take just a few moments to say "Thank you" to Clark County's volunteers. Imagine — over 69 million people in America donate their time and talents to some volunteer service on behalf of their fellowmen!

Individuals getting together, voluntarily, to do something where they see a need is a special characteristic of American life. Over a century ago, Alexis de Toqueville, European traveler, observed, "Wherever at the head of some new undertaking you see the government in France, or a man of rank in England, in the United

States you will be sure to find an association."

Volunteers in the Las Vegas area serve the community in many capacities: as aides in hospitals, as the leaders of youth groups, as friendly visitors for the homebound or hospital patients, as volunteers in education, as the drivers for those needing clinical care, as temporary helpers in offices, telephoning the lonely or homebound, working with Senior Citizens' projects, teaching swimming or first aide, helping the blind or retarded with many activities.

A local example of volunteerism is Mrs. Helen Brown, of Henderson, who saw a

need — found an unused building — organized a project — and now presents to the residents of Carver Park assistance in making the most of government commodities, remaking otherwise unusable clothing, and the like. Mrs. Brown shares warmth and friendship along with her time to make life much more pleasant for others.

Applause for volunteers is heard all around, for instance — the Blind Center really appreciates the excellent office help and crafts aides — Red Cross is most pleased with clerical helpers and the dozens of other men and women who through volunteer hours make the organization function — volunteers appreciated the courtesies extended them by the United Fund staff — other volunteers smiled and heard "Thanks for the ride" from the retarded persons taken to the Opportunity Center and from cancer patients taken for treatment.

Volunteers in Clark County don't number 69 million but they do number in the thousands. All kinds of people have turned to volunteer activities as a means of using their talents and energies — men, women, youth, the aging, the affluent, and the poor all contribute their skills and time without pay to work of voluntary and public agencies. They are of every occupation, race, age, interest, and educational background. They all have one thing in common — all have made a free choice to serve on behalf of their fellowmen!

This dog cost me \$75, plus the cost of food and other expenses of raising him. I'm not interested in recovering the money, all I want is my dog back. If I ever see him, I'll get him back, and in the process, find out how the precise owner got him and where.

I don't believe you will print this, but copies of this letter are being sent to the editors of the Review-Journal and the Sun . . . maybe they will help.

I am not only disgusted and disappointed in this matter which smells like heck, I am also mad.

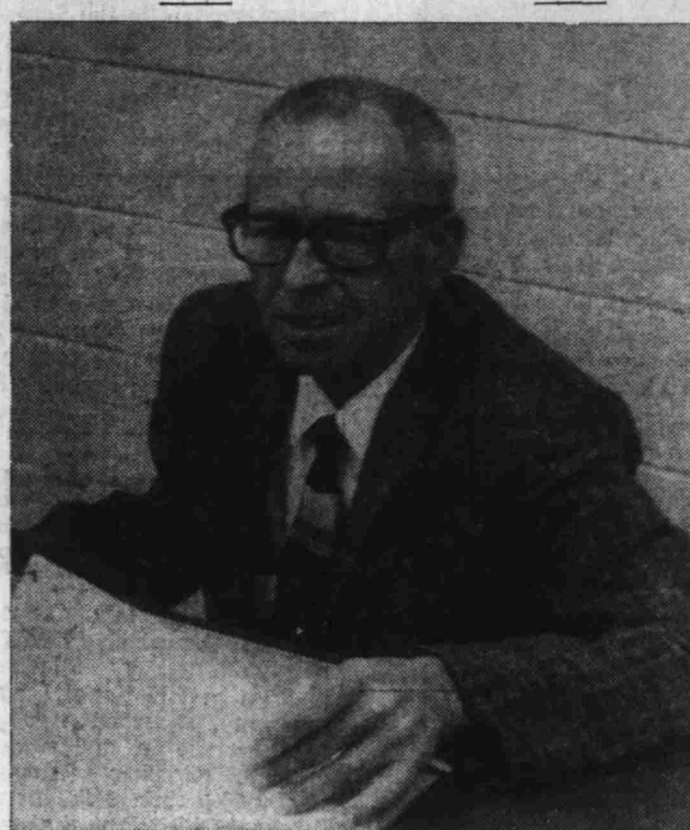

Perhaps next year they won't have too much of a problem because maybe a lot of parents will try not to let the little ones become aware of an "Easter Egg Farce," and keep the children from the tears and disappointments.

Postmaster Charles Connor, who has served as this city's postmaster since Feb. 15 of 1961, has requested the Post Office Dept. to approve his retirement for Friday, April 3.

Assistant Postmaster Joe Rodriguez will be the officer in charge until another appointment is made.

In ending his public service, Connor said he wished to thank all of the fine people in Henderson for their cooperation.

"I especially want to thank the fine crew at the post office," Connor said.

The Connor family came to Henderson on Memorial Day in 1945. Connor served as an accountant for an accounting firm in Las Vegas where he did accounts at the El Rancho hotel, Golden Nugget, Flamingo and others.

He was later assistant to the resident manager of US Lime, and was given a temporary appointment as postmaster by Pres. John F. Kennedy, and it was made permanent by the Johnson administration.

When he retires, Connor and his wife plan to move to Pioche where they own a 640-acre ranch and a home in town. His daughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Newton, will take over the Connor home here.

Jaycees Apologize For Egg Hunt Mishap

The Henderson Jaycees wish to extend apologies to the parents and children who arrived at their annual Easter egg hunt last Saturday and found that the event had already taken place earlier than scheduled.

President Dick Stewart, Jr., stated that around 9:40 a.m., the public address system was hooked up to be tested. The children were asked if they could hear, and if they were ready. Then before anyone knew what was happening, over 300 children picked up 6,000 eggs in less than three minutes.

Titanium Metals Records 20% Increase in Dollar Sales

Titanium Metals Corporation of America (TIMET), jointly owned by Allegheny Ludlum and National Lead Company, recorded a 20 per cent increase in dollar sales in 1969, following settlement of a 3 1/2-month strike at the Toronto, Ohio plant that ended early in the year. The increased volume was offset somewhat by lower prices and unsatisfactory product mix — a market condition caused by industry over-capacity for melting and processing titanium. TIMET's net loss of \$502,000 in 1969 represents an improvement in operations over 1968, when the net loss was \$2,545,000. Operating results of TIMET are not consolidated with those of the parent companies, and TIMET made no dividend payments to its parents in 1969.

With market conditions improving, TIMET recently adjusted prices of a wide range of titanium billet, bar and wire, resulting in an average increase of three to four per cent.

Industry shipments of titanium in 1969 were a record 32,000,000 pounds up from 23,800,000 pounds in 1968, and previous peak year, 1966. Incorporation of increasing amounts of titanium in the new jumbo jet commercial transports, Boeing 747, McDonnell DC-1 and Lockheed 1011, is expected to provide market growth for the next several years. In addition, the new Navy Grumman F-14, and Air Force F-15 jets, requiring greatly increased usage of titanium, are in design and testing stages. The aerospace industry remains by far the largest consumer of titanium. Others are: chemical and metal processing, hydrospace and ordnance.

During 1969, TIMET virtually completed its four-year, \$50 million expansion program, with these major start-ups: Extrusion Facility at Toronto, Ohio, which began operation at mid-year and went into regular production in November.

Bar finishing facility, which began operation in May. Rotary Forge Equipment, in start-up stage at year-end. Also, a plate flattening unit began operation in December. Titanium sponge crushing

plant and a new leaching unit at Henderson, Nev., brought into operation in September.

Koscot is New Idea In Cosmetics

Koscot is a new idea on the horizon of American business.

Before a distributor is turned loose to fend for himself and Koscot, he is provided a complete retail training, in which he, or she, is fully indoctrinated.

Turner, who describes himself as a sharecropper on his way to harvest the world, claims with an organization of positive thinkers and a product like Koscot, the company will make him a billionaire.

"And," Turner adds, "I will make at least 30 people a million each along the way. I

The Horticulture Division is open to residents of Henderson and to members of the Desert Gardeners. A limited number of containers are provided, but exhibitors should be prepared to supply their own clear glass bottles.

The show will be open to the public April 11, 2 to 5 p.m.; and April 12th 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

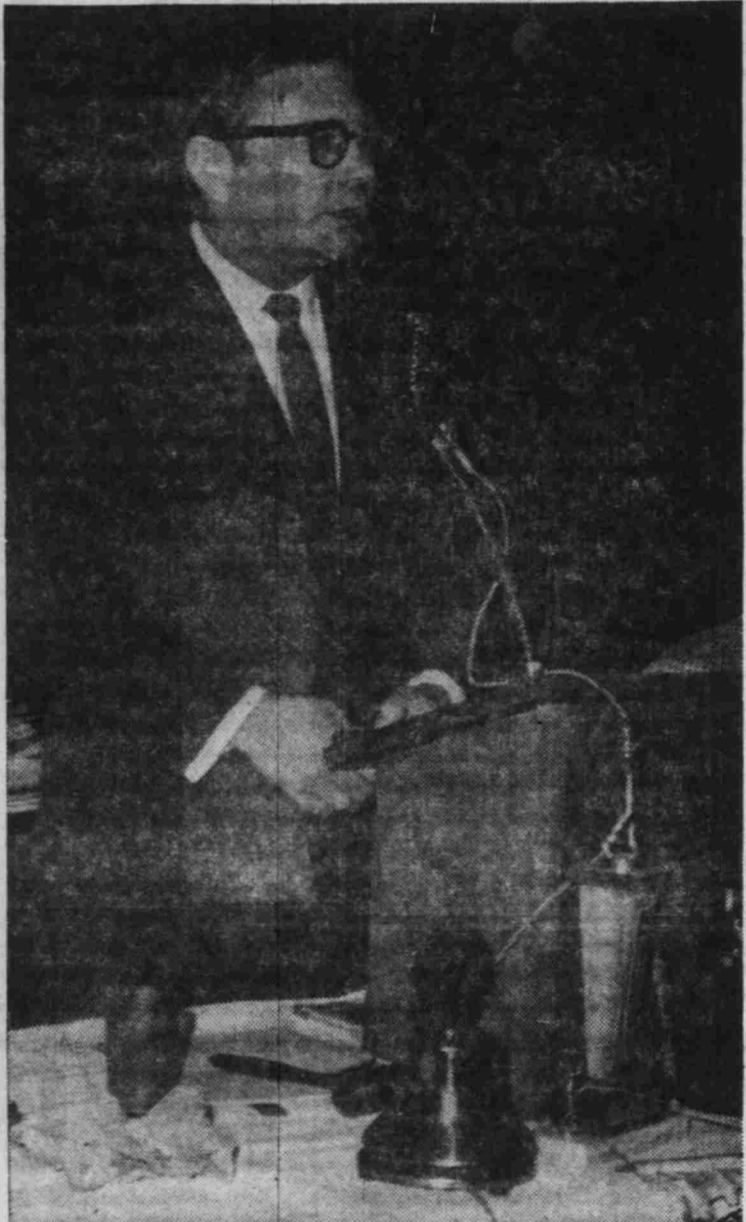
Home Show, according to Coordinator A. D. "Mac" McKenna.

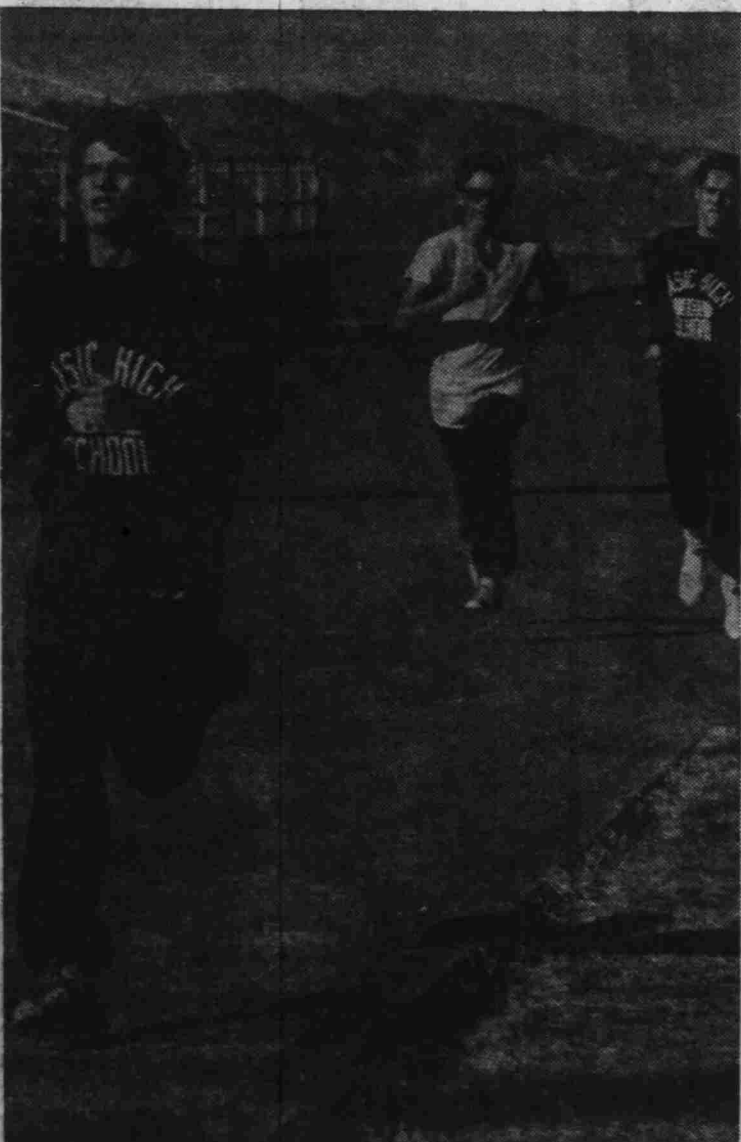

Mrs. Wilma E. Keenan, guidance counselor, and Charles R. Dear, assistant principal of Henderson Junior High School were among a group of state educators recently completing a three-day orientation here.

Captain Zelvin D. Lowman, USNR, Naval Academy Information Officer for Nevada and state legislator from Clark County, escorted the

group of school administrators, counselors and coaches. New \$15 million science and math buildings have recently been completed at the Naval Academy, and their facilities were used for briefing the group on the Annapolis Program.

In addition to an address by the Superintendent, Rear Admiral James Calvert, the visitors heard from the academic dean and the admissions director.

They also took a Naval Science Department tour, including a demonstration of the planetarium and a short, steaming trip on the Chesapeake Bay aboard the destroyer-like yard patrol craft.

A highlight for all was a visit with the 16 midshipmen from Nevada. They discussed their experiences and reactions with the educators and gave them an insight into the officer-training institution from the midshipman's point of view.

With a faculty of 600, about evenly divided between officer and civilian professors, and an enrollment of 4,200 the Naval Academy has a seven-to-one student-faculty ratio.

The academic curriculum provides a broad education in math, science, social science and the humanities, as well as a background in seamanship, navigation, engineering and weapon.

Majors are offered in 24 areas ranging from aerospace engineering to oceanography to foreign affairs.

In nearby Washington, D. C., Captain Lowman arranged for discussions with Senators Alan Bible and Howard Cannon and Congressman Walter Baring.

In addition, the group toured the White House, FBI Headquarters and various historical monuments before returning home.

The continued popularity of the television program, "Hee Haw," is amazing.

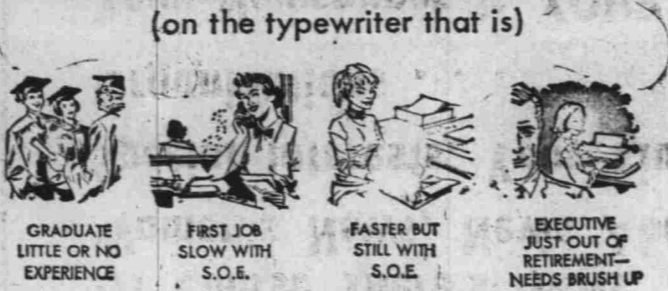
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Dennis Willden Visits USU

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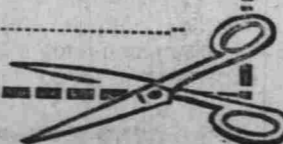
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
