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IF you find yourself on the wrong side of the new police booking area, you'll find that the steel doors close behind you and can only be opened from the outside. Inside the block walls, which are encased with steel netting, the officer is protected in a booking office. Shown here is Officer J. H. Brown, who takes valuables from the arrestee.



YOU enter the new police booking area from the back of the police station, and if you go straight to jail, you never see the front office of the department. Let's say you were arrested from drunk driving or gross intoxication, the second step the arresting officer takes is to have you breathe into gas chromatograph analyzer. This too, you do through the netting so if you come violent, you do it all yourself. The analyzer tells to what degree you are inebriated.



THIRD step in your arrest would be fingerprinting and mug shots. This is also down in the new booking area. Here Officer Brown shows Lt. Bobby Taylor how it feels to be on the "other side." Before the prospective prisoner leaves this area, he receives a towel and some of Henderson's guest clothing which is sort of uniform throughout the jail. Just around the corner from this point—is the jail, and there you are.



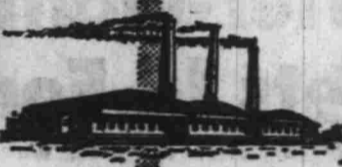
ON TV, TOO—If you've always had a yen to be on television just cause a ruckus and come in that iron door at the back of the police station, and you'll make it. Under the National Highway Safety act, the Henderson police department has installed the latest in police equipment which allows them to monitor actions of prisoners as they are being booked. The action can be re-taped for permanency and can be used as evidence in court. The police dispatcher can also watch proceedings from her office. Officer Brown is shown adjusting tape and picture for use. The equipment was only installed Tuesday. Police also have a portable unit to take into the field. The equipment cost \$3200, but the city paid only \$320.

The possibility of the construction of an olympic sized swimming pool which would be covered for year-round use, and a park and playground in conjunction with the new Basic high school, will be explored by city officials with county school officials.

City Manager Don Dawson told the council that the proposal is not a "cost item" at this point. He said the city's end of the cost could be handled in several different ways: (1) by an emergency loan taken for a five year period, (2) by a recreation bond issue, or (3) by a federal recreation grant. He said he would look into the latter possibility.

Councilman Barney Cannon brought up the question of whether the city would receive full value from such a joint agreement with the school, and Mayor Estes McDoniel, assistant principal of the high school, said that the school and city are now co-operating with the city pool. He said that due to the condition of the high school gym, the students will this week begin swimming daily at the pool for possibly a month or until it gets too cold. Councilman Lorin Williams said he could see no reason why an agreement couldn't be worked out.

The council asked the administration to explore the groundwork and report back on the matter.

Skeleton Found

A skeleton, believed to be that of a woman, is being studied for identification after it was found Monday by Sheriff's deputies.

The remains were found about six miles south of Black Mountain, and both Henderson police officers and men from the Sheriff's department were at the scene.

Seek HUD Funds For Water Project

An application for federal grant funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for the construction of a three million gallon reservoir with connecting pipes and for the upgrading of the water system in the Townsite area of the city, will be made.

City councilmen authorized the request to make application for the money made by City Manager Don Dawson, at a meeting held Tuesday night.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$1,111,800. The federal grant, if approved, would account for \$393,000; a bond issue for \$700,000, and operating funds for \$18,800.

"Timing is very important," Dawson said. "If we don't get federal funds we will have to revamp the whole financial system." He said the first water is expected to be delivered to Henderson by the Southern Nevada Water Project on May 29, 1971.

Karsten Bronk, president of Resource Engineering, said that the downtown deteriorated lines are carrying only 50 percent capacity.

Councilman Barney Cannon objected to the replacement of the cast iron 12 inch water mains, and it was explained that it is only the smaller mains which would be replaced.

After-Game Riot Nets 14 For Dope

Three juveniles, a young woman and eight youths were arrested last Friday night in the culmination of narcotics investigation which had been in the hopper for several weeks. One of the young men Gerald G. Bletsch, 18, was charged with furnishing the hashish and marijuana and the others were charged with possession.

Those picked up on the latter rap were Joseph Kahl, Jr., 18; Gary Wayne Slack, 20; Russell L. Miller, 18; Ned C. Hanson, 18; Michael A. Restivo, 18; Nancy K. Hayes, 20; Stephen L. Lockhart, 18; John A. Chupa, 23, and Riley Gentry Doing, 18.

Doing, a resident of Searchlight, was arrested Saturday and Chupa surrendered in Las Vegas Sunday.

The three juveniles were arrested for possession on five counts. They were taken to juvenile hall and the rest were transported to the county jail, with the exception of the young woman.

A near-riot broke out in the government park following the Basic - Boulder City football game and Police Chief H. G. There were approximately 200 young persons in the donkeybrook and at one time during the night there were 27 in the local jail for disorderly conduct, drunkenness, robbery, theft, and other violations. Henderson and Boulder City were both well represented.

The narcotics arrests concluded many weeks of undercover work by a detective from Chief Nick Janise's North Las Vegas department narcotics squad. The

narcotics officers of the local department were headed by Sgt. George R. Liggett and cooperation between the two units made the crack-down possible.

Warrant Asked For Errant Parents Here

A warrant for the arrest of the parents of six children in Carver Park, was requested by police for contributory dependency.

Officers were dispatched to the residence by complaints that the children were living under deplorable conditions. They were taken on a tour of the residence by the children and they found the mattresses had no sheets and smelled strongly, and clothes were strewn around.

In one bedroom, officers found a picture of a nude woman and there were numerous holes in the walls. The front door was unable to be secured as the lock was broken, and the kitchen contained such items as half can of shortening, half full jar of mustard, quarter full box of Quaker Oats, bag of sugar, jar of coffee, salt and pepper shakers. There was no other food in the refrigerator or cabinets of the kitchen.

The officer asked the children what they had for breakfast and they advised that they always ate Quaker Oats. Asked what they had for lunch, they replied nothing.

It was noted by the officer that both the father and mother worked. The oldest child was 14, and the youngest three.

Ready to Retire? Here's Some Tips

Are you getting ready to retire?

Edgar H. Cocks, social security manager in Las Vegas, Nevada has some tips that may help save you time and trouble when you apply for social security benefits.

A telephone call to the social security office is a good first step. The office can answer your questions and tell you how to apply and when to do it.

When you apply bring your social security card or a record of your social security number, proof of your age, and your last year's income tax withholding statement. (If you are self-employed, bring a copy of last year's income tax return and evidence of payment of the self-employment tax.)

If your wife also is applying for benefits, she should bring evidence of her age and her social security card or a record of her number if she has one.

The best evidence of your age is a birth or baptismal certificate made within 5 years of your birth. However, if these are not available, other documents may be used. Generally, the older the document the better.

If you have children under 18 — or youngsters between 18 and 22 who are full-time students — bring their birth certificates and records of their social security numbers.

It's generally a good idea to apply about 3 months before you retire. Don't delay because you don't have any of the required documents or information. The people in the social security office will be glad to help you get the necessary information.

If you are housebound and unable to come to the office, arrangements can be made for taking your application by mail or, if necessary, someone can come to your home.

Just let the social security office know.

"Remember," Cocks concluded, "the people in the social security office are there to help you."

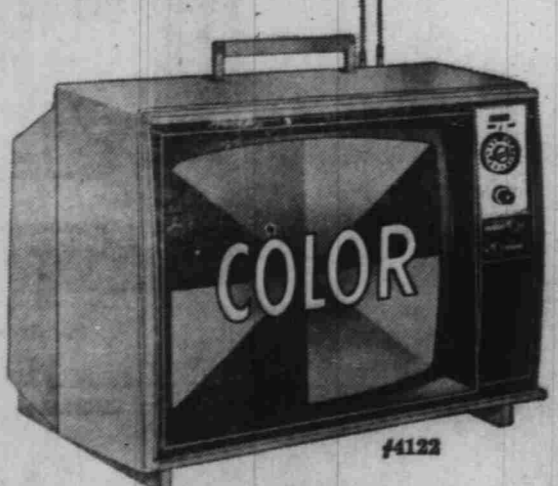

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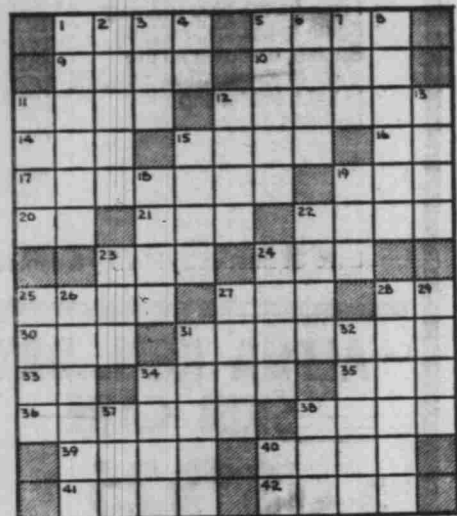

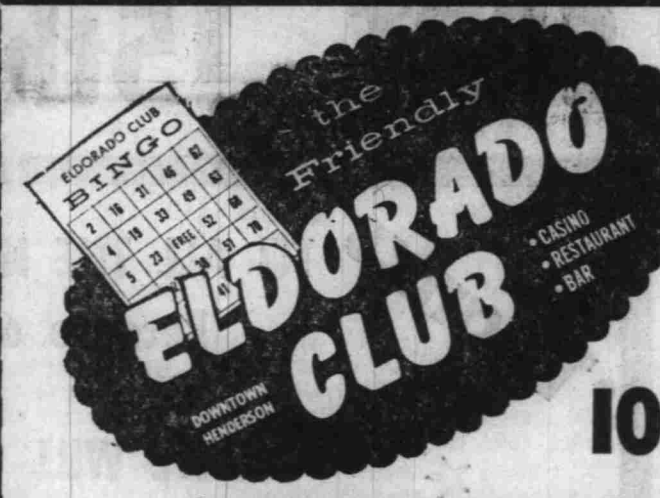

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Not long ago, mention of grandpa or great aunt Min conjured up visions of bent figures searching the ground aloof for each step. Often the familiar, stooped posture was less the result of time than failing eyesight, or cataracts, which required heavy specs that distorted the things around them. Today, due to tiny plastic contact lenses, scores of a new generation of venerated relatives are happier, younger-looking folks. And, they are scanning horizons not the ground. According to Barnes-Hind Pharmaceuticals, Inc., makers of ophthalmic fluids, aphakia another name for cataracts, is an affliction of non-youth, and it usually starts around the age of 50 and up. The crystalline lens (focusing mechanism of the eye) becomes cloudy and opaque. In many cases the clouding-up increases until vision is nil and surgery is required. When the cataracts are removed, a substitute vision aid must be found to replace the "lost" crystalline lens in order that useful vision may become possible.

Until 20 years ago the usual remedy for the post-operative cataract patient was cumbersome bottle-bottom thick eyeglasses. These would restore only limited vision and, almost no peripheral (side) vision, both so vital to confident bodily movement. Now plastic contact lenses, no larger than an aspirin and paper-thin, are fitted to the healed surface of the eye. And because they most closely resemble the natural contour, aphakia patients can have undistorted, clearer vision, sometimes achieving up to normal 20/20 acuity.

In addition to better vision, contact lenses give a strong morale boost to these patients. Since the tiny lenses go undetected and offer freedom of movement, they provide a psychological lift. While millions of Americans now wear contact lenses, it's the legions of elders who make dramatic use of them. With a bat-of-the-eye, they can keep up with younger kin, as nature might have intended.

Boulder Power Problem Solved

Representatives of the Bureau of Reclamation, Colorado River Commission and conference room met recently to discuss problems of electrical service to Boulder City by CRC

Those representing the government were Byron Miller, Harold Hood, John Brown and John Forman. CRC personnel were Chairman Thomas Rice and Charles Baumert. City officials in attendance were City Manager Richard Isenberg, City Elec-

trical Engineer John Pace and Councilman Morgan Sweeney. After considerable discussion and a free exchange of ideas on proposals and counter-proposals, and based upon the assumption that electrical service will continue to be available to the CRC from the bureau, general agreement was reached upon the following:

The CRC will enter into a contract with Boulder City for the delivery of electrical service, to be delivered at 115 kv circuit at the Hoover Mead Line attached to the facilities of the Parker-Davis Project. The contract will be similar to those entered into with the Overton Power District No. 5 and others.

The contract will become effective upon ratification, and approval of the bureau, CRC and Boulder City on Oct. 1, 1975, and shall remain in full force and effect until midnight, Sept. 30, 1984.

Predicated upon a 6 percent growth increase, Boulder City will, beginning Oct. 1, 1975,

receive 550 kilowatts, and continuing with like increments, Boulder City in April 1984 will be contracting to receive 9,800 kilowatts until the termination of the contract Sept. 30, 1984.

All contracts will be subject to renegotiation upon their termination. This will also apply to the agency contracts with the United States or Hoover power which will expire in 1987, Boulder City's included.

In the contract with the CRC it will be stipulated that the commission will supply additional energy as may be required by the city provided, that additional energy is available to the commission as solely determined by the commission from the Storage Project or from other sources.

In the event the city cannot use its full capacity and

energy entitlement in any month, the commission at its sole determination will sell to other contractors of the CRC that unused portion and credit the city with the sums so received from the sale of such capacity and energy sold.

Other meetings will be held with interested parties as progress is made.

Another matter was explored at some length during the above meeting. A request was made by Boulder City to enjoin the CRC to examine the possibility of an exchange of power between the city and Nevada Power Co., which would make possible splitting the city in half, electrically, with two independent sources of power supply, so that in any emergency the dark would not be left in the dark, and critical areas would continue to be serviced.

SNWSP Manager Applications Sought by CRC

The Colorado River Commission has opened applications for a \$16,150 - a year man to head the huge Southern Nevada Water Supply Project when it begins its operations next May.

The Nevada State Personnel Division has been advertising in trade publications and southern Nevada newspapers for those qualified.

CRC Manager Tom Rice states that the new manager should be hired by mid-October although the commission would like to have had him on the payroll two months ago so that he could have become familiar with the system during its construction.

SNWSP is expected to deliver Boulder City's share, plus 40,000 acre - feet of water to Las Vegas Valley in its first year of operation. (The average home uses slightly more than an acre-foot of water - 326,000 gallons - a year.)

Those involved in the project have been asked to submit upgraded figures on how much water needed for next year.

Approximately 80,000 acre-feet of water is being pumped from the under-ground basin now. This figure, Rice said, is expected to drop as Lake Mead begins to furnish more water to the valley.

The system manager's qualifications must include the ability to operate, maintain and plan for future construction of the project and he must have a current Grade I American Water Works Association water treatment works operator's certificate at the time of appointment.

Nevada State Personnel will screen the applicants and the names of the top five will then be submitted to the CRC for final decision.
