Police Arrest Four Juveniles For Slashing 30 Tires

The slashing of tires on 14 vehicles on Basic Road, Tungsten, Atlantic and Buchanan streets, Friday night, was brought to a quick halt when police arrested four youths between the ages of 14 and 16, shortly after calls started coming in.

On some cars two tires were slashed with a knife, and on others, all four tires were slashed. One woman had all four slashed and could not even move her car. Police estimated about 30 tires were slashed.

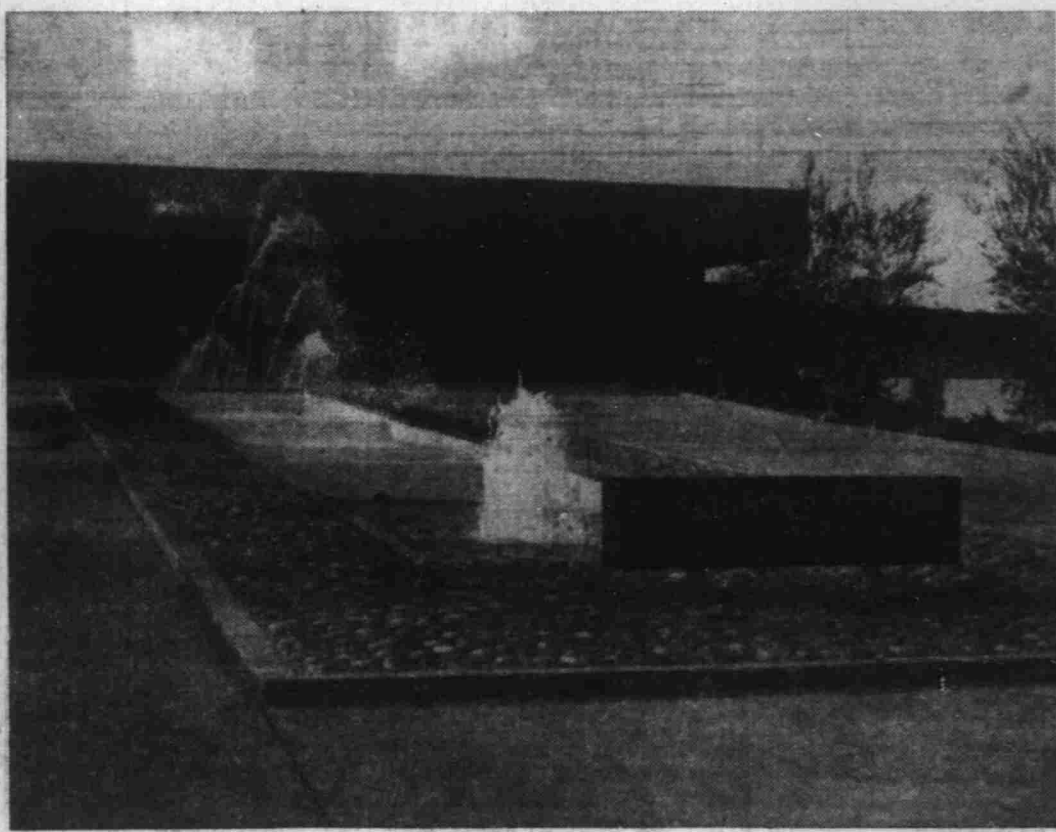
Police Officer Joe Vitek said the first call came in about 9:40 p.m., and two other calls were received that night. The others discovered their tires were slashed in the morning. It was reported that Pat Doherty, city superintendent of building and safety, who was attending a city employee's party at the Eagles hall, had two of his tires slashed.

Police received a tip on who the vandals were and the four were rounded up. They said the youths and parents were "very cooperative."

The youth had two knives and will appear in juvenile court on Jan. 7 on charges of injuring or tampering with motor vehicles.

Police said one of the boys reported said that after the first one or two cars, it wasn't fun any more.

Several service stations were busy Saturday morning repairing and changing the tires.

Morry's Story

I believe Howard Hughes talked via phone last week to Governor Paul Laxalt and to District Attorney George Franklin.
The only reason why I believe it is because if it isn't so—and if it is proven that it was a fake voice on a fake attempt to cover for someone else, then the state of Nevada has no other course than to close all the Hughes gaming operations immediately.
Knowing that Hughes was concerned over the possible payout of \$161 million dollars on the TWA court verdict against him, it adds up he doesn't want to blow another \$150 million by the closure of his hotels.

So—continuing my simple-minded reasoning—I feel he has asked the men who run his Hughes Tool Company to take over direction of Nevada enterprises — while he (Hughes) gets care and treatment hoping to recover his strength and health and then return to Nevada.

I believe Laxalt to be right when he says Hughes would sell out his Nevada holdings if forced to appear before the state gaming board, or any other board—city, state, nation or world.

There must be a reason for his desire for privacy—and the freedom this country allows everyone also gives Hughes the same privilege.

But—push him around, irk him, challenge him, threaten him—and you'll find the hotels on the market at bargain prices—in my opinion.

While I, too, believe in Mahue's abilities as Hughes' front-man, how are we as outsiders to know what went on on the inside? It is really none of our business, or anyone's business, as long as the hotels pay their taxes to the state and operate according to the state laws.

However, the state does have a right to close the hotels, I would think, if the legal entity listed as the boss—in this case Hughes — is not available upon a call to answer charges or any questions at any time.

Hughes could clear this matter, and should, immediately, by another call to the Governor—or by another letter—properly notarized.

I'll bet a buck Mike O'Callaghan will find a way to satisfy himself on the Hughes matter. Incidentally, his selection of this city's one time favorite lad as a Basic student—Frank Schreck—to the gaming commission is a dandy. Frank has a fine mind, new thinking and guts galore.

Some 40 years ago I sat in the Wisconsin field house covering a basketball game between Purdue and the Badgers. Purdue showed a sophomore sensation that night who from then thru his senior year tore up the floors with the most adept dribbling anyone had ever seen. The ball never bounced more than four inches off the floor as this lad—named Johnny Wooden—streaked in and out-up and down the floor to lead the bollermakers to two Big Ten titles and the 1932 national college championship.

Jim Pugh is Part Of Nat'l Emergency Network

Every morning at 5:45, a time when most of us, including me, are still snoozing in bed, Jim Pugh, who lives at 81 Mallory Street, in Henderson, becomes part of a national amateur radio network, dedicated to helping make blind people, or those with eye injuries, get a chance to see again. Jim is the only person in Nevada presently performing this service.

Jim is a part of the Eye Emergency Network, an organization containing people all over the nation, ham radio operators, who check in every day at 5:45 in the morning and 4:45 in the afternoon, on the forty meter band, so that whenever a corneal transplant is available, this news can be transmitted over the entire nation, so that donor and recipient can be matched.
The cornea, which is the transparent part at the front of the eye, is thus the part of the eye most susceptible to injury. If it becomes scarred, or damaged in any way, the sight in that eye may be impaired. A way to overcome this is to transplant an undamaged cornea from someone recently deceased. However, the transplant must be performed within twelve hours, as the corneas do not last beyond that time. And that is where Jim, and people like him, come into the picture.
Let us take a hypothetical case. Suppose someone were brought into Rose de Lima here who had died in an accident, but his eyes were not damaged. If the family of this person released the eyes for donation, the doctors there would notify Jim. At the next check-in, Jim would inform those taking part in the Eye Emergency Network that a pair of corneas was available. The demand always exceeds the supply so there is never any difficulty in using them.

Let us assume that Jim was informed by one of the three ham radio operators in Denver that the corneas were needed there. Jim would direct them to contact Rose de Lima here, so that immediate shipment by air mail special delivery would be made.
How many ham radio operators are thus involved? Jim supplied with a list; there are 43 people on it, in 27 major cities. Jim informed me that the number is growing constantly.
Jim told me that people who want to donate their eyes for this purpose can sign an affidavit, or notify their doctor so that he would know. Of course, permission can also be granted by the relatives of the deceased person. I long ago told my wife that if anything happened to me, that any part of my body could be donated. (That makes me feel like a walking spare part factory!)

So tomorrow morning, while most of you readers are still in bed, at 5:45 Jim will be checking in again on the forty meter band, with his call sign WA7CZT, to see what services he can perform. You can do your part to serve people by making sure that your doctor and relatives know about your willingness to donate corneas, so that other people may see!

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State Okays City Loan For BC Golf Course

City Attorney James Ordowski met with the State Finance Director in Carson City Monday to determine whether or not it would be legal for Boulder City to tap its utilities fund to help underwrite a municipal golf course.

The ruling was in the affirmative, subject to the discretion of the city council.

Ordowski secured a copy of a resolution which will have to be approved by all five council members.

The Municipal Golf Association, comprised of more than 200 members, approached the council recently for a public course which would be owned by the city.

MGA suggested financing the project with a loan from the utilities fund and use of L. V. Convention Authority recreation money which is given to each entity in the county from room taxes.

Two questions arose — is it legal to borrow from a city fund for a capital improvement, and is the LVCA money already allocated to other recreation improvements.

City Manager Dick Isenberg states he is applying for an Outdoor Recreation Grant from federal funds, and it is possible that it won't be necessary to use utility money.

The latter would be paid back to the city from green fees.

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Juanita White Preparing For Assembly Session Next Month

BOULDER CITY—

Next month when the State Legislature convenes, it will be the first time in the city's history that we will be represented by an Assemblywoman. She is Dr. Juanita Greer White, two-term University of Nevada Regent, and a member of the WICHE Board of Directors for several years.

The latter is a board of western states who cooperate with one another for the financial benefit of exchange students interested in higher education in some form of medicine. Her doctorate is in science, but being the wife of a physician and surgeon, medical students are close to her heart.

Dr. White, since elected last month from District 1, has been on a fact-finding tour of her valley constituents as to their needs and problems which must be dealt with in the coming legislative sessions.

She did a great deal of homework when she was running for the assembly, not only in the outlying areas, but in Boulder City as well. The past few weeks she has concentrated on her electorate up in the valley, the unincorporated towns which are primarily agricultural, with tourism centered in the Valley of Fire and the fishing interests along Lake Mead.

As she pointed out, Boulder City's needs differ entirely from those of the valley, and Searchlight and Nelson are totally different from either of the other areas.

Dr. White is of the opinion that the unincorporated towns should be, in a sense self-governed and not dependent on the county commission. Small town boards would solve this problem, and when necessary, all the boards could convene on a regional basis.

"The outlying unincorporated communities in Clark County are going to be shut out unless reapportionment gives them representation," she said. "This should very carefully be worked out. There is no reason that Las Vegas should determine how everything in the County is run."

"For instance, I am proposing a bill for either election or appointment of a representative for the unincorporated areas on the Clark County School Board of Trustees. If elected at large as a resident of the unincorporated areas, there would be representation on the board. If appointed, I suggest the school board select a person from the unincorporated areas. There are two appointees on the State Board of Education which represent labor and agriculture. This same procedure could be followed."

"Mesquite, Moapa, Logandale, etc. have specific problems unlike the Las Vegas area generally, and there should be a spokesman on the school board to represent them. It was the intent when consolidation of the school system took place that these people would be represented."

"Tourism for the benefit of small areas is just as important as in the big cities. We have to develop parks, museums and good roads to attract tourists. The Lost City Museum and the Valley of Fire are both inadequately financed."

"We have to develop more state facilities. The above two are the only ones the state has control of. There is no

control over those under the Bureau of Land Management.

"Another concern of mine is that the overcrowded classrooms. The state says the quota should be 30 students to a room. Boulder City has more than that and in the county there are as many as 46 to a classroom."

"The stress on education must start in the lower grades when children are learning to read and write. Everyone has a right to learn to read and the best possible teachers should be hired for the lower grades."

"Many juvenile problems stem from inadequate learning during that period. We also need continuing education programs for adults. An adult job may be phased out, through no fault of the employee, and this is where more education for another type of work could be provided."

"I have also prepared another legislative bill for changing the enrollment for students. I think school funds should be based on average daily enrollment, not average daily attendance. Expenses go

on whether the students attend or not.

"I believe teachers' salaries will be worked out by them. They deserve commensurate pay for what they do."

"As far as Boulder City is concerned, there are needs for our hospital and for the city. Our hospital is very important as an emergency facility in this area, and it's imperative that it be funded for new buildings and expansion."

"It will be up to Sen. James Gibson and me to shepherd the bills through the Legislature for our special needs. I can't do it alone. I have been promised a legislative intern who will help with the bill drafting, and I hope to receive the cooperation from the people in District 1 to keep me apprised of what's needed. It will be necessary to relay to individuals in the district what is going on in Carson City during the session also."

"I have contacted the hospitals and schools in my district about the legislation they're interested in, and have asked that they send me information on what they need."

"The valley feels it must have some kind of reapportionment ratio to give them representation. Like us, the valley does not favor concen-

trated consolidation. The unincorporated areas should be encouraged to become independent."

Wildlife Threat

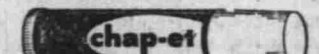
When we hear about man's destruction of wildlife species, we usually think in terms of other people in other places. But a number of animal types have suffered from our own activities right here in the Lake Mead Country. For example, the following are included in the U.S. Department of the Interior's report "Rare and Endangered Fish and Wildlife of the United States."

VEGAS VALLEY LEOPARD FROG: This medium sized frog formerly occurred in springs and seepage areas of Clark County. Today, it is either extremely rare or extinct. It may be the only amphibian to have become extinct in historic times in the United States. Destruction of its habitat through water developments, and introduction of the predatory bullfrog, are responsible for its decline.

COLORADO RIVER SQUAWFISH: This largest of the American minnows reached five feet in length with weights up to eighty pounds. Beautifully adapted to its environment of warm, flowing, muddy water, it is unable to survive in clear cold water reservoirs such as Lakes Mead and Mohave. It is now rare in the Colorado River drainage system.

PEREGRINE FALCON: This beautiful swift bird was once found throughout most of the world, including southern Nevada. Today it stands on the brink of extinction because of man's stupidity. Molesting of nests and shooting are major causes of its reduction. Another highly suspected cause is the cumulative effects of pesticides which may either kill the birds directly or prevent reproduction.

Other species of the Lake Mead Country which have been adversely affected by man include the Sonora River Otter, Prairie Falcon, Sandhill Crane, Razorback Sucker, Bonytail, Moapa Dace, Gila Monster, and Desert Tortoise.
