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Legislative Work Slows With Bill Drafter Load

The third week of the legis-
lature is now underway. The
pace of work is still quite
slow because of the many
complicated measures that
have been requested of the
bill drafter.
So far, through Jan. 30, 69
bills have been introduced in
the senate, and 107 bills in the
assembly.
This is only a small part of

the number we have been told
would be put in this session.
The work of the assembly has
been slowed somewhat await-
ing a decision on the seating
of the Henderson representa-
tive. Now that that has been
settled, things will move
ahead there. In the Senate,
the organization was accom-
plished quite smoothly and
work commenced.
This year there are several
new attorneys in the Senate,

Close, Foley, Walker, and Wil-
son, so I would guess that
whatever speed has been
picked up in the beginning
will be lost before the end as
these gentlemen get debating
the issues.
This session is the first in
the new legislative building.
It has taken some time for
people to learn their way
around, but as it shakes down
it will be found to be a great

facility and an improvement
in the law-making process.
There are now adequate com-
mittee meeting rooms, both in
number and in size. There
are fine facilities for the pub-
lic in the new building.
The staff has much more
adequate room and support
facilities, allowing them to do
a much better job than ever
before. The building itself is
very beautiful and functional.

The only matter of direct
concern to Clark County that
has been acted on so far is
the measure which would al-
low the issuance of conven-
tion hall bonds which were
voted by the people at the
last election.
These bonds were under a
cloud because of a court rul-
ing in Phoenix on the type of
ballot, which was similar to
our two-ballot system. In or-

der not to delay the project
which is vitally needed for
the business of the conven-
tion authority, it was neces-
sary that the legislature is-
sue special authority for
those bonds to be sold. The
schedule is very tight as
there are at least two major
conventions booked in to the
facility which will depend
on the added room.
They are to come in very

close, the completion date
scheduled for the new con-
struction.
One of the major matters
of this session will be reap-
portionment. Little is being done
as yet because the official
census break-down figures
are not yet available. How-
ever, there will be need for
considerable computer help
and figuring out the various
combinations that might be

tried, and the legislature has
been asked to authorize the
expenditure of \$25,000 to get
the necessary computer pro-
gram set up to do the work
once the population figures
are available.
This initial work will take
six weeks alone. Unless this
matter can be put over to
special session later in the
year it will be certain to take
us past the 60 days.

Police Seize 340 Pounds Of Pot In City's Biggest Haul

Police Chief Bill Allen quipped yesterday that "a lot of pot parties will go to pot," after two men were picked up by local officers with 340 pounds of marijuana hidden in a carry - all type truck which had been made into a camper in the back.

The men, Dennis Blanda, 27 of Yonkers, N. Y., and Harry R. Sherin, 32, of Los Angeles, apparently trying to dodge Las Vegas officers, came from California, took the Henderson cut-off and were heading towards Las Vegas from the eastern entrance. They were stopped by Sgt. Harold Hoover and Officer Carl Erickson just three minutes after a broadcast from the sheriff's office was received. They were stopped on Boulder highway just north of Stuckeys.

Allen said the two men had 155 kilos of marijuana in 2-4 pound weights, valued at a minimum of about \$15,000. It was the biggest haul in Henderson's history.

The arrest was made yesterday at 4 p.m. and the men were lodged in the Henderson jail pending further action.

No bail had been set last night.

The California highway patrol had warned local authorities that the van may be heading this way.

Dump Causes Smelly Situation For Council

Charles W. Deaner, chairman of the Clark County Board of Health, threw a monkey wrench into council discussion last night of a requested 90 percent rate hike in garbage rates when he threatened action to close down the disputed Henderson dump.

The Henderson Disposal Co. — owned by Lester LaFortune — had requested a 17 percent collection fee hike and 76 percent raise for the maintenance of the dump site. It would raise Henderson homeowner garbage collection rates from \$1.83 per month to \$3.48.

"Unless some action is taken by the city by Thursday night to close the dump we will begin legal proceedings," Deaner said. "We are out of patience."

Deaner said the county had asked LaFortune to do three things, (1) truck the garbage to Sunrise mountain; (2) dig a trench at the local dump for casual dumping; and (3) work up a program to clean up the pot holes which have been burning for years.

City attorney Monte Morris advised the county to take action so that the city would not break its contract with the disposal company. The councilmen complained that they had not been advised of

the problems at the dump and needed more time to study the issue. The present contract does not expire until 1973.

City manager Don Dawson said the city will study the possibility of going into the refuse business itself.

Attorney Ralph Denton told the council that negotiations between Greenspun and the council had never been discontinued. He said even after the council had decided to negotiate with the Lyon Dev. Co. which later defaulted, Greenspun had continued to attend the meetings.

Morris told the council he received a telephone call this week from an attorney from the Lyon Co., requesting the city to negotiate with the m again.

Councilman Barney Cannon made the motion to reject all land sales proposals from the Sept. 16, 1969 land sales notice, which included Greenspun spin, and the motion carried by a 3-2 vote.

"I resent this very much," Prince said. "They've (Greenspun) put in a lot of time and we've got a bond issue coming on, I don't want to put it off any longer."

Mayor McDaniel said, "We are all looking out for the interest of the city. I'm disturbed that we haven't sold the land, but we don't want to give the land away."

Prince then asked the mayor how he knew they would be giving the land away until they sat down to a table and negotiated.

"If we turn down the proposals, I don't believe they will be back, but I hope they are," Prince said.

Greenspun said he would not go through more years of negotiations.

Under the new notice of sale, proposals will be received for 30 days and after that none will be accepted.

Research Can Be Fun Sometimes . . .

There are two common conceptions of research

work that it is either very methodical, plodding work, and consequently dull; or that a revolutionary breakthrough occurs, which transforms everything. Neither of these is correct, though the first notion is closer to reality.

Research can be tedious, exasperating, repetitious, most certainly; it can also be rewarding, and even funny. At times, the humor will only be apparent to others; and on other occasions, it will be seen only in retrospect.

The two incidents that I relate show this. The first one did not involve me, though I was right next to it. And the humor in it was most certainly not appreciated by the person who was responsible for it.

It took place in England, at a time when I was working for a few months on the analysis of titanium alloys. One of the people in that section was a car buff, and devoted his life to automobiles.

I think he spent as much time under the car as in it! He had replaced several sheet metal parts with titanium sheet, and at the time of this incident, was well on his way to having the world's first titanium bodied car.

Because of his constant work on the auto, there were often parts of it being brought into work, to clean or paint. Now in this section, the analytical equipment was stored in cabinets underneath the bench. These cabinets were of special design, and the person who had designed them was in charge of the laboratory.

This supervisor was a pompous, theatrical type, with virtually no sense of humor. He would have been great on television, not that such a person would descend to such squalid depths, of course. Spit and polish was his trademark.

I have always been in favor of keeping things reasonably neat, but not in favor of cleaning polishing everything that does not move. As you can imagine, whenever visitors came around this section, work came to a standstill for a couple of days while everything was cleaned. On these occasions, one bald member of the group would symbolically polish his shiny dome too.

At the time of the incident which follows, we had received a 'red alert' that the directors of the company were coming around. You can imagine the state that this threw our supervisor into; I wonder that he survived it.

As the time of the visit approached, we tried to get our auto buff to quit his operations until it was over. He did, but the day before the visit his car developed trouble, and he brought in some

parts, unknown to anyone, and stashed them away in his cabinet under the bench.

The great day arrived, and with it our august visitors. They came into the laboratory, and our fat, pompous little supervisor was at his theatrical best. As they approached the section where we were working, the talk got around to the cabinets for equipment storage, our supervisor's pride and joy.

As fate would have it, they stopped right by the bench where our auto buff worked. The supervisor, bursting with pride, pointed to his storage cabinet. "And this is where we keep all the equipment, my own design!" he said, and dramatically threw open the door.

Parts of a carburetor fell out, with a crash; then, seconds later, a large pot of red paint, which our auto fanatic was using on his parts. In seconds over half a dozen expensive suits were covered with red paint. At this point I ducked down behind a bench, to hide my laughter. When I resurfaced, the whole place was in turmoil, you would have thought a riot had broken out.

As it happened, the auto buff was not around just then, or he might have been lynched; he was merely fired a short time later. It probably took him some time to see the funny side of the incident.

The other incident involved me. It all started in a casual manner, when I was working on titanium alloy development. The supervisor here was a tall, thin type, who always looked like he had feasted on lemons, and washed them down with a glass of vinegar.

At the time, he had a thin smile on his face, which should have warned me that something was in store, but all he said was "There's a little melting job we would like you to do, see me when you are free." That must have been the understatement of the year.

What the job consisted of was fifteen samples of material — none of them containing titanium — which had been irradiated in an atomic pile for various lengths of time, and then removed and allowed to 'cool' for various periods. Each sample thus represented an investment of several years' work, and was irreplaceable.

Each of these samples had to be arc melted into a little ingot. That was what the "little job" consisted of. This might not seem to be difficult, but the design of the arc melting furnace rendered it a difficult task. The material to be melted — called the 'charge' — was contained in a deep cooper crucible with walls only one-sixteenth of an inch thick, outside of this crucible was water, for cooling purposes. As you can no doubt imagine, it was a difficult task to melt all the charge, especially that material at the bottom, without piercing the thin crucible. If the crucible was pierced, the water would flood in, and ruin the material completely.

Under normal circumstances, it was hard enough to do a good job, but with typical thoughtlessness, things were made even worse. It was impressed upon me that the samples were irreplaceable (as if I did not already know) and that positively, definitely, absolutely, no foul-ups would occur. Or, presumably, else; That really filled me with self-confidence!

With this sort of job, you would at least think that I would have been allowed to do it quietly, but some people have no sense at all. The day of the first melt, I stood by the prepared furnace — after almost having had to fight my way through the crowd — and flash bulb after flash bulb exploded as they took pictures to preserve the historic (?) moment for posterity.

(This work, by the way, was being done for the British Atomic Energy Authority, and as such was "classified.") Later I asked for a copy of one of the pictures, and was told that, because I did not possess a security clearance for that work, the pictures were confidential and could not be released to anyone without a clearance!

Thus having reduced me to a nervous wreck, I was supposed to do a perfect job. In this type of work, it was customary to slowly lower the electrode until it touched a piece of magnesium ribbon at the top of the charge, which would vaporize. This would maintain the electrical arc until enough titanium was vaporized to carry the arc. This does not contaminate titanium, as magnesium is insoluble in titanium.

However, in these cases the magnesium ribbon was omitted, as it might contaminate the alloys being melted. This made piercing of the crucible far more likely. So on this first sample, with a large crowd looking on, I slowly lowered the electrode until the arc struck. And then, in a second, it suddenly went out.

imply that the crucible had been pierced, which usually occurred at the beginning. However, this time, before I could even react, the arc suddenly struck again, of its own accord. And this time it lasted.

Somehow I managed to complete the melt without further incident, and produced a good ingot. As the operation was completed, the whole crowd burst into applause. My reaction would have been to slowly slide down to the floor, if I could have.

It took me some time to see the humor of this — me, a nervous wreck, just managing to perform the task, while they looked on in blissful ignorance, supremely confident that nothing could possibly go wrong!

The other fourteen melts were also completed without incident, in itself a notable feat (the average failure rate in melting was one out of five or six). Fortunately they were also done without publicity. I never did hear anything more about them, because it was "classified."

It was this work that, as mentioned in a previous article, caused me to be designated as a skilled melter of difficult alloys, requiring British Government permission before I could emigrate.

And so you see, research can be fun — sometimes!

1/2 Cent Tax Eyed By NMA

The Nevada Municipal Association, headed by the new president, Verington Mayor Frank McGowan, will seek repeal of the present county half-cent local option tax and seek a new county relief tax of four per cent.

Sponsors of the proposals contend that the present one-half cent optional tax, now being collected, and on which Clark County cities' budgets are based, is illegal in Washoe and Clark because the tax is not returned to the counties, just the cities.

The Nevada Supreme Court will consider the constitutionality of the half-cent controversial tax Feb. 9 which the 1969 Legislature authorized for the relief of cities. The law was challenged by a Paradise Valley businessman who raised the constitutional doubts, pointing out the new levy was being paid by county residents as a whole, while the revenues benefited only those who live within the corporate cities.

Dist. Judge Thomas O'Donnell upheld the doubt, stating that under the Nevada Constitution, sales taxes can be adopted only by a vote

son on Feb. 9. Those improvements providing water storage and distribution system renovation, is a must for present water service and future water service to the entire City of Henderson.

There are two main issues regarding this Water Bond Improvement; first, the need for improvements, and second, the financial planning to amortize the bond debt after the bonds have been sold.

The need for immediate improvements has been thoroughly justified by an independent engineering consulting firm. The decision for long term financing has been justified by City fiscal advisors, independent certified accountants, and by professional fiscal agents with final adoption by your City Mayor and Councilmen.

After the people have voted to sell Water Revenue Bonds, the next step is to find a willing buyer for the bonds. As I stated last Thursday, the City Administration has demonstrated good financial judgment and responsibility; therefore, before bonds can be sold, your City must factually demonstrate its ability to meet its debt obligation.

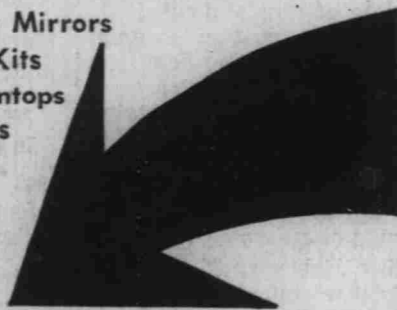
