219 Seniors to Receive Diplomas Tomorrow Night . . .

Two hundred and nineteen seniors will receive their high school diplomas in the 27th annual commencement at Basic High School tonight, beginning at 8 p.m., in the high school gym.

Juanita Marshall, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Paul Marshall, was named Valedictorian

and James Mathis will give the salutatorian address.

The program will begin with the processional "Pomp and Circumstance," by the Basic High School Band, and the invocation will be given by President James I. Gibson of the Church of the Latter Day Saints.

The Salutatorian address by James Mathis will be followed by special music performed by the high school band.

Juanita Marshall will then give the Valedictory address and then the academic awards will be presented by Mr. Donald Smith, assistant

principal of Basic and the presentation of vocational awards by Estes McDoniel.

Scholarships will be presented by Dorothy Robinson, college preparatory counselor after which Principal John A. Dooley will introduce the guests, and present the class. Diplomas will be presented

by Glen C. Taylor, President of the Board of Trustees Clark County School District.

Following the presentation of diplomas the Basic High School Band will play the Alma Mater, words and music arrangement by John Dooley and the benediction will be offered by Reverend Edward Van Horn, First Presbyterian Church.

Bible, Cannon Resolve City's 5,000 Acre Problem Successfully

Washington Senators A. an Bible and Howard Cannon announced today the federal government has ruled for the City of Henderson in a legal conflict over the purchase of 4,880 acres of public land for annexation and development.

The ruling, by the Department of Interior Solicitor, clears the way for Henderson to continue a series of purchases that began in 1964 on acreage previously owned by the Bureau of Land Management. The city already has acquired 11,643 acres.

Bible, a ranking member of the Senate Interior Committee, was joined by Cannon in seeking the ruling which resolved the question of Henderson's eligibility to purchase the 4,880-acre parcel.

The ruling was necessary because of a provision in federal law requiring a city to purchase available land

within five years after the mayor has been advised of the appraised fair market value of the acreage.

Henderson received such notification in 1964, but did not act within five years because it was awaiting further word from the Federal Government regarding conflicting mining claims on the land involved.

In his ruling, the Interior Solicitor observed that the 1964 notification specifically excluded the purchase of the lands in conflict "at this time" and advised the mayor of Henderson to await additional developments.

"It is therefore obvious that an additional notice . . . was contemplated, and that the 1964 letter was not intended to commence the running of the five-year period," the Solicitor continued.

"We therefore hold that the above-described lands are available for purchase."

Walker Plans Return To Basic High School

J. Marlan Walker, head of the language department at Basic High School, who will leave June 20, for a three-year call as mission president of the North Mexican mission, said he will keep in touch with the Mexican trips he started for Basic students while he is gone.

"Make no mistake," Walker said, "I plan to come back to Basic in three years, and I will keep in touch by arranging an exchange of students in the two countries," he said. Walker has been granted a three year leave of absence by the school district.

Walker's four youngest children will live in Mexico with them during the three years. Randy, who graduates from high school this spring will attend Brigham Young University on a Fleischman scholarship. An older son,

Marley, is in Peru on a mission for the LDS Church.

He will stop by in Monterey to visit them in June on his way home.

Finishes Doctorate

Walker, who has been working on his doctorate degree at BYU, said he will have it completed before he leaves.

The Walker family will be honored at a Testimonial dinner Tuesday, May 25 at 7 p.m. at the LDS Church. A committee of community, school and church people have made plans for the dinner, and Governor Mike Callaghan will be the guest speaker at the affair.

Tickets at \$5 are available at the Bank of Nevada, and should be obtained before May 22. Tickets can also be obtained from Bill Horan, Chapman Wooten and Selma Bartlett.

Surplus in Land Fund Earmarked For New Bond Debts Ok'd by Voters

City Councilmen Monday night set major policy regarding use of surplus revenue in the city's land fund when they passed a resolution calling for the surplus to be applied to amortization of any bond debt which may be authorized by Henderson voters when they go to the polls June 8.

The resolution was adopted over the heated objection of Mayor Estes McDoniel, who charged that the language of the resolution would allow the city manager to use some of the surplus to pay off existing indebtedness.

Despite repeated explanations by City Manager Don Dawson that such would not be the case, and despite assurances by his colleagues on the council, McDoniel remained adamant and at one point, charged Dawson with misstating facts, changing his mind and an assortment of other accusations. All other councilmen voted in favor of

the measure.

In other action at Monday's city hall session, officials delayed motions on a contract with Silver State Disposal Co. for the city's garbage collection, and on a voluminous ordinance governing the development of travel trailer camps.

Councilmen did approve a cooperative agreement with the Regional Streets and Highways Commission for the construction of Twain Avenue between the highway and Paradise Road; approved the purchase of a power valve wrench for \$1,663.74; authorized the purchase of a microfilm camera and filler for a net cost to the city of \$2,730, with another \$4,095 coming from federal funds; and approved the notice of sale of another tier of five-acre parcels of land in Sec. 27.

Horizon Drive Bid Below \$170,000

Construction of Horizon Drive from the highway to Pacific Avenue will cost less than \$170,000, if city councilmen award the contract to the apparent low bidder, according to figures disclosed at Monday night's city council meeting.

Mesa Construction Company submitted a low bid of \$167,252, beating out bids submitted by five other construction firms.

Council also named Public Works Director W. T. de Valcourt to the technical advisory group of the Las Vegas Valley Water District; passed a resolution of intent for a \$310,000 emergency loan for a federal land purchase; approved a \$600 allotment to the Civilian Military Council; gave the green light to the Paradise Valley Country Club for a liquor license; and accepted three land development proposals for Sections 27 and 34 which will be analyzed at a later date.

US Lime Must Report On Progress Being Made To Curb It's Pollution

Representatives of two major southern Nevada industrial air polluters will appear Wednesday before the District Air Pollution Control Hearing Board to make progress reports on programs to reduce their emissions.

The firms are Southern California Edison Co. and the Flintkote Corporation's U. S. Lime Division in Henderson.

The meeting is slated for 7:30 p.m. in the Clark County Court House commission chambers, 200 E. Carson Ave.

Southern California Edison officials will discuss progress being made to bring the \$200 million Mohave Generation Station at South Point into compliance with tougher regulations adopted by the Clark County District Board of Health.

The U.S. Lime Division in Henderson was issued a modified cease and desist order last fall giving the firm until April 1, 1972 to eliminate its regulation violations.

The \$1 million plus project calls for installation of baghouses on the firm's four kilns. Although the firm is now the biggest air polluter in Henderson, emitting about 300 lbs. of particulate matter per hour, the baghouses will reduce the emissions to less than one per cent of that figure.

The hearing Wednesday night will represent a six month progress report for the lime manufacturing plant. The meeting is open to the public.

Ninety merchants have participated in the community sales effort and dance May 22 is a come one and all occasion!

Charles Kates, Personnel Supervisor for the Southern Nevada Division of the Central Telephone Company, spoke to the assembled students on the personal procedures of the Telephone Company of Las Vegas.
Mr. Kates described application procedures, testing processes and personal selection for the many skills employed by the Central Telephone Company. He emphasized the importance of self-salesmanship, because of the short time element involved in hiring procedures.

Bill Downey, State DECA President, opened the meeting by introducing Mr. Estes McDoniel, new Principal of Basic High School and Mayor of the city of Henderson. Randy Micklin, Chapter President, led the group in the pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Marie Lewis, Chapter Secretary, gave the invocation before the breakfast was served.

Mr. Walter Botts, Chapter Advisor at Basic and Mr. Charles McLaughlin Vocational Counselor were also present at the breakfast.

Classes in the Clark County School District's self-supporting summer school program for 1971 will begin June 7, after final registration on June 4.

Secondary students are asked to preregister by May 27, while elementary students should register on June 4. In both instances, students must pay their \$30 per session fee on June 4.

Elementary remedial programs in reading and math will be offered at E. W. Griffith, Vegas Verdes, Fay Heron, John F. Miller, Lewis E. Rowe and Gordon McCaw Schools, while K-6 enrichment programs will be conducted at E. W. Griffith, Crestwood, Lewis E. Rowe, Vegas Verdes, and Doris Hancock, supplemented by a special string music program at Valley High School.

Secondary courses will be offered at Rancho, Clark, Valley and Basic High Schools.

Classes will be offered in any subject where enough students enroll to make the program pay for itself. Generally this means a minimum of 15 students, and on the elementary level no class will enroll more than 20 students. Exceptions to the 20 student maximum will be made in the instrumental music program only.

Elementary enrichment programs will include ceramics, foreign language, science, instrumental music, primary activities, art, and drama, plus others on demand.

Secondary level programs will include courses in basic subjects for those who did not gain credit during the regular school year, required courses for those who want more electives next fall, and special courses that students cannot work into their regular schedule.

Students may enroll for one or two sessions, with each session costing \$30. Secondary sessions will run from 8 to 10 a.m., and from 10:10 a.m. to 12:10 p.m. Monday through Friday for six weeks, while elementary sessions will be from 8-10 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Elementary summer school classes end July 16, and those for secondary students July 21.

The summer school program is conducted on a self-supporting basis because the state does not provide support for students beyond the regular 180-day school year. Basically the \$30 fee goes to pay the salaries for instructional personnel.



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Don Hunter Makes First Visit to Residents on Lake Mead Drive - - -

This country is steadily growing noisier, so I thought that for this survey in Henderson I would select the only street in Henderson that lies on a truck route-Lake Mead Drive. I covered the part of the street between Water and Atlantic.

I got the answer to the question quite quickly, the people who live there are not troubled by traffic noise. Presumably if they were, they would move.

The first lady was concerned about the cost of water. "I do not want the water bills to go up! I think that something should be done to improve the median strip on Boulder Highway, make it

like this street, plant palms there. It does not look very attractive now, all those cacti (Joshua trees to be exact) just dying.

"I would like the City to sell land, I hope that the new Councilmen have more sense. The noisy trucks do not bother me, traffic does not bother me at all. I will be glad when they get a traffic light (at the junction with Water Street). We like it here, and would not live anywhere else."

One of the reasons for living here came out in the next comment. "We went to Hawaii for a week and it rained the whole time, it washed out the entire vacation." Needless to say, this

fact is not advertised by the airlines!

She took aim at the Mayor next. "Now that we have changed the Council, we should change the Mayor too, I wish Hampton would run again. I believe Morry's column does a lot of good, because he is not afraid to say what he thinks, I have known him for twenty years. The paper covers the local news very well."

The next lady only commented: "We are not troubled by the trucks here. The parks could be improved, we need a park in this area."

A man and his wife next commented on several topics. "We have only been here a short time, we came here for our health. This is a friendly town, we miss our home town, but not its weather. Nevada is beautiful, clean air and clean countryside.

"We are used to traffic, so do not notice it. But the mini-bike riders make a lot of noise on the ballfield opposite. I think that they should have a Veterans Hospital here (in Clark County).

"I don't think they want industry here, but they need something for kids 16-21 to do, there is nothing for them. Some form of recreation or activities is definitely needed.

"They should get the race track finished here, and they need dog racing, it is better than horse racing. Any way of raising revenue will help."

(The dog racing bill was scrubbed by the legislature again - Author).

"We sure do not need that book store here (on Water Street), the kids have enough filth available already without that. You know it is mostly teenagers that will go into that type of store.

"Anybody raising a family here has a heck of a problem, it is a poor place to find employment. I was back in Ohio recently, and unemployment is bad there. There is a saying that if you cannot find employment in Akron, you cannot find it anywhere, but things are bad even there now."

With this encouraging thought, I went on to the next house, where these opinions were forthcoming: "I have only been here a short time. At night the trucks do not bother me, and in the daytime we are busy. We have had no trouble with kids here, the car drivers throw their beer cans out on our lawn, and every day I pick them up." (Me too - Author).

"I wish the owner of this house would remove that dead tree." It was an elm tree, and fortunately leaned away from the house. "We need more rentals here. I think this town needs cleaning up, but it's not bad otherwise."

A man: "I just moved here last year. We like it a lot better here, it is so much better than Vegas. Kids ride mini-bikes around here, but the trucks do not bother us too much except when we are watching T.V., and we have to turn it up louder.

"We like living in a small town. There is hardly any odor from the plants here. The kids really like the Junior High School; I am opposed to bussing kids to schools. We like living here."

Another man was clearly not in favor of litter: "I would like to see this town cleaned up a bit, when they had that wildcat strike we must have had ninety beer cans in our yard. Trucks and mini-bikes can be a nuisance at night, and the mini-bikes after school.

"I like the schools here, they are better than the ones in Vegas, there is less turmoil here. I like a small town, because most people here know each other."

A lady next had a lot of things to say. "We are so used to the traffic noise it does not bother us a great deal. They could enforce the leash laws, there is a dog around here that gives peo-

ple a rough time.

"Certain sections of town could stand a good house-cleaning, mostly the townsite section. These days you wonder when inflation is going to stop, it is hard on retired people."

he talked quite a bit about unemployment. "Older people have trouble finding employment. There is not enough opportunity for employment anywhere these days, the whole country is in a sick state now. In the old days, if you did a good job, you were set for life, now people are treated like a piece of worn out machinery, thrown onto the junk pile.

"People get sick, and they

are discarded like a dirty shirt." She talked about a case in Ohio, where the older people who were dismissed, and replaced by younger people, had got a lawyer and were fighting it, with the backing of the Social Security organization. "You can expect this sort of thing with modern management that has an un-Christian attitude, they worship profits now. This country needs to turn back to God, to get back on the track, it is so far off now it is pitiful."

A man next had some views: "I have seen this town grow from nothing to what it is today. The City has to shovel gravel off Water

Street, by the triangle, every time it rains, why don't they oil the gravel or put curbs in there?"

"There is a lot of traffic along this street, but it is mostly kids in hot-rods that make the noise. They break the speed limit on this street all the time, during the afternoon and evening, and it's an accident hazard too.

"Trucks are not too bad on this street, though some of them could be quieter, the kids are worse than the trucks in my opinion. Dogs get into the garbage cans and upset them, and scatter the garbage. There is only one poundmaster here, and he is only on duty during the day,

he has a tremendous job to do. People turn the dogs loose at night for exercise."

A lady next commented that she liked Henderson the way it was, and could not find fault with anything here. Continuing, a man said: "I have lived here for twenty-five years, and I like the town fine. I think that the pollution from the plants is being corrected. Trucks are noisy along here but you must expect it, with the plants nearby. We do not have any trouble with dogs, or cats here."

The last person, a lady, had the following opinions: "I would like to see more recreation here for the kids,

and another swimming pool." (This will be on the ballot in June - Author). "The trucks do not bother us at all, a lot of them go to the plants."

She commented on the political races here. "I think that all the candidates for the Council promise the same things, we should have action instead." She then talked about dogs. "We have a lot of trouble with dogs, I cannot keep a neat front yard because of them. Most people turn them loose at night, or early in the morning.

"We need a poundmaster on duty twenty-four hours a day to cope with them, they soil the yards all the time. There is some smell from the plants at night, and during the early morning hours, but it has improved.

"Our big trouble is with speeding cars down this street, it is a State highway and so is supposed to be patrolled by them, and not by the City. I would like to see something done to stop it being a raceway."

That was the last opinion obtained on Lake Mead Dr. It seems that the people who live there are not bothered or kept awake by traffic noise, they are used to it. Hopefully, the noise of trucks will diminish in the future, as a campaign against noise pollution gathers momentum. There were more complaints about mini-bikes than trucks, and perhaps it is appropriate to end with a remark from another part of Henderson: "It is easy to tell the people who have mini-bikes, they are the ones with the mini-brains!"

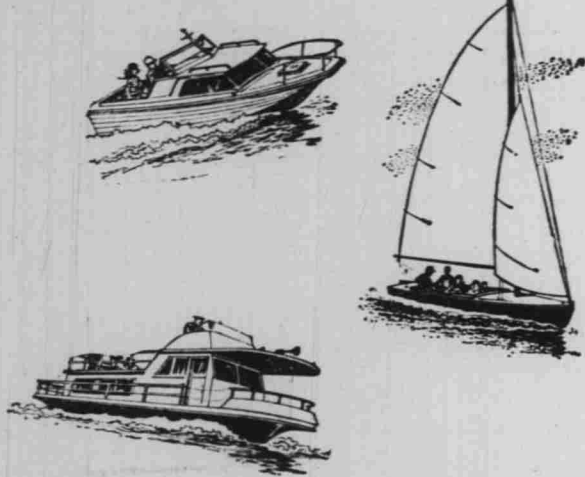
