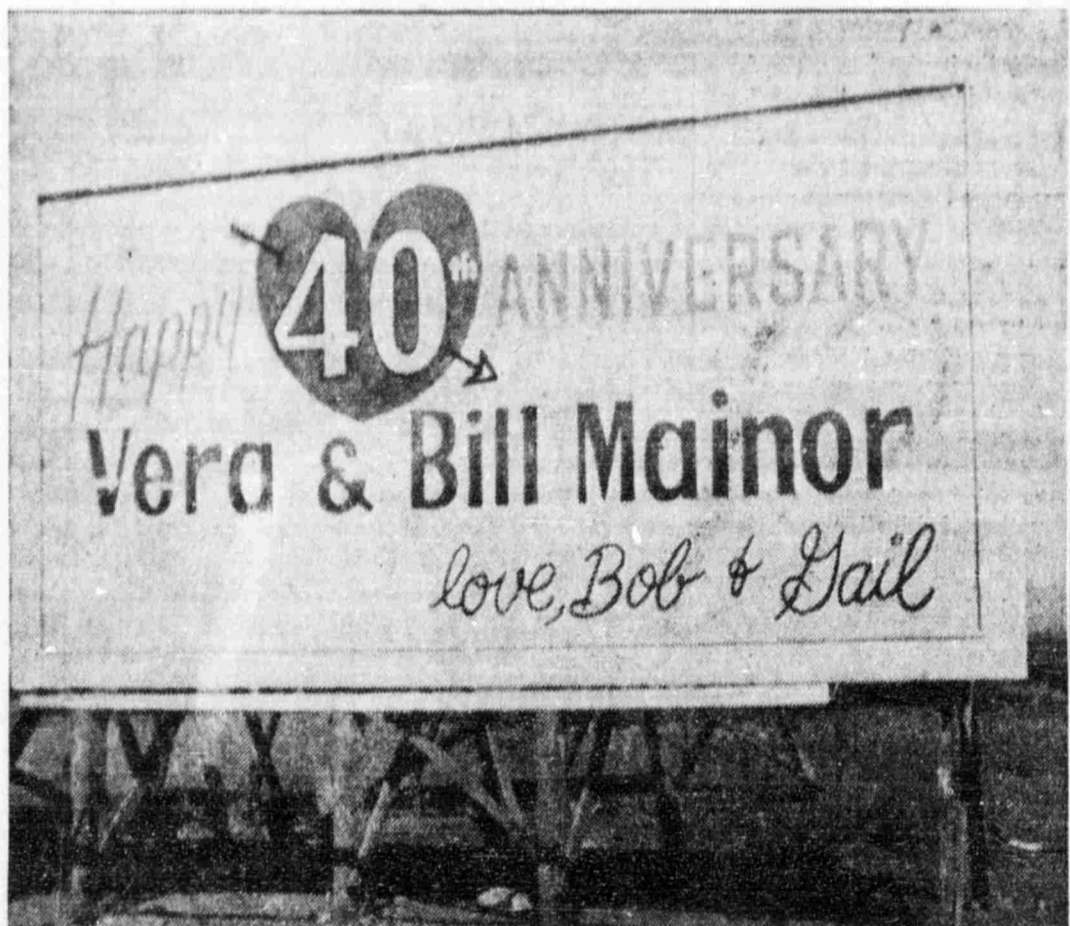

### No News On Vets' Hospital

A check with Sister Geroganne's office Monday was once more unfruitful as far as anything further on a veterans facility in Henderson. There has been no word, the hospital spokesman stated but there is still hope, she added. Rose de Lima, qualified in every way, according to the solons who represent Nevada in Washington, would benefit from the financial lift federal funding for veterans would give. A building, built to house the Southern Nevada Water Supply Project engineering staff, is also being considered for an out-patient clinic for veterans in southern Nevada.

### Greenspun Public Hearing Re-Set

The city council last night rescinded Resolution 329 — which set April 3 as a public hearing date for the annexation of land belonging to publisher H. M. Greenspun and passed Resolution 330 which will re-set the date to May 15. Reason for the move is that the city attorney has not received any word from Green-

spun and certain legal notices have to be published before a public meeting can be held. Time was running out for the April date. The council has also instructed the attorney, Jay Brown, to write asking that Greenspun and his attorney, Ralph Denton, reply in kind to ascertain what their intentions are in the annexation matter.

### Re-Cycle Depot Gets Green Light

The city council has become caught up in the enthusiasm of having a re-cycling depot in Henderson and it will be located at the city yards. City Manager Don Dawson told the council that the cost will be nominal to arrange for the facility. Money expended on a slat fence to hide the operation and also protect city property, will not be lost, because in the future, if the operation is moved, the fence can also be used. He added that he thought the city can find the money for a \$300 scale. Boys' Club President Bill Smith said that his group has quite a pool of manpower and he'd like to see it put to work. Councilman Jerry Franklin who initiated the re-cycling

project here commented that income from the operation isn't necessarily limited to the youth; that many adults are earning their eating money in that fashion. Mayor Estes McDoniel had only one reservation about establishing the depot. Could it be kept from being unsightly?

Director of Public Works Bob Whitney assured the mayor that the slat fence would serve the shielding purpose until greenery could be planted. Henderson will set up the depot and also negotiate an agreement with the Boys' Club to spell out the rules.

A check with the Public Works Department of the city reveals that workmen started pouring the slabs for the Art Espinoza project last Thursday.

The 20 buildings, containing 100 apartments, will house senior citizens at the corner of Pacific and Van Wagonen Sts.

Eight agencies are involved in the construction and all is going well, it was reported to the Clark Co. Housing Authority board at its latest meeting.

The developer and architect of Al Landsman Gardens are gathering data to be submitted to HUD for excellence of design competition, it is learned. The end of this month is the deadline to enter.

A decision has been made on a revised schedule which will provide for no further deactivation until August of units in Victory Village, and after that, 20 buildings per month will be razed, if this schedule is agreeable to BMI.

The city council is expected to take action on a site for 80 family units for low income housing. The city manager and Bill Cottrell, executive director, will hold a confab before the council meeting to try to decide on possible locations. Four sites have been turned down as being undesirable to HUD, and the CCHA was cool toward them too.

CCHA bylaws were revised to change the monthly meetings to the second Wednesday of each month; the annual meeting will be the second Wednesday of each April; order of business has been revised; signatures of chairman or vice chairman now required only for checks over \$500 in value, but no payroll, regardless of the amount.

Cottrell was authorized to set up a fee schedule to sell articles salvaged from Victory Village, such as 1942 refrigerators which Cottrell told the board have suddenly become a hot item on the used market.

Cottrell reported that two sets of people have inquired about buying the old wooden buildings in Victory Village and Attorney Robert Jones advised Cottrell to sell them if there is any salvage.

"They're ours until the lease is up," he said. "They must be moved before that day, and those which are vacant could be sold."

It was learned that CCHA is the only public agency in the state which pays unemployment compensation, 2.7 per cent of the payroll. By rights, public agencies are not obligated to do this.

The CCHA now belongs to the State Employment Act instead of Social Security, and can draw out what they have put into the retirement fund.

Cottrell reported that the ccha at present has an understanding with the two unions involved in maintaining the housing areas, and he will meet with them about the unemployment insurance.

### SITES STUDIED

It was decided Monday nite that more thought will be given to suggested sites for a veterans hospital and a community college, since there isn't any great hurry on either matter.

Suggested locations include an area which is now zoned industrial on Highway 41, acreage near the race track and a parcel in Section 37.
