## City excited as key events of 21st I. D. Days approach

### Titanium Credit Union Seeking Loan Note Buyer

The Titanium Employees Federal Credit Union liquidation is "about the largest one we've had in the country." These words are from Robert Selman, Share Insurance Analyst in the San Francisco office of the National Credit Union Administration, who estimates that credit union assets are \$2 million.

Selman talked to a Home News reporter in a telephone interview Friday.

A credit union spokesman said in the credit union office Friday, "The Board of Directors make the decisions here." A reporter was seeking information about the Thursday night Board of Directors meeting.

The spokesman answered "no comment" to all other questions about the credit union, including one as to his identity. The speaker was believed to be William Trednick, credit union manager. Trednick was not available for comment yesterday.

The credit union is trying now to sell its outstanding loans. A schedule which the credit union established had called for all loans to be sold by March 31. Sale of the loans would permit distribution of money to savings account holders.

The March 31 deadline for sale of all loans appeared to be a rather ambitious one to the NCUA, said Selman. The credit union has done a whole of a job in trying to liquidate," in Selman's opinion.

The credit union is in the process of making a 50 percent distribution, in which savings account holders will receive 50 percent of the amount in their accounts, according to Selman.

The remainder of the savings account funds should be distributed when all outstanding loans are sold. If there were any surplus funds, they would be distributed to the owners, or shareholders of savings account holders, in the form of a dividend.

"Fell Through"  
A sale of credit union notes that was anticipated by the credit union "fell through," according to Glen Reese, managing director of the Nevada Credit Union League. He says that the credit union is now seeking another buyer. The league with offices in Las Vegas, is an association of federally chartered credit unions in Nevada.

The Titanium credit union is quite healthy, according to Selman. He says that he was "quite surprised to learn that less than 5 percent of the Titanium employees" had left this area.

"If there were insolvency problems, we'd have a man down there right now," said Selman. There are no NCUA officials specially attached to the Titanium liquidation now.

The NCUA is the federal government agency responsible for supervising the Titanium credit union liquidation. The NCUA handles between 400 and 500 liquidations a year.

Selman says that one or two of those liquidations are involuntary. The remainder are voluntary and occur when a company closes down, the cause of the Titanium liquidation, or moves its operations.

The NCUA insures savings account depositors at the Titanium and other approved credit unions up to \$20,000.

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## Are You Parents Of Kindergarten Children? If So--Here's A Notice:

When Edgar A. Guest said "It takes a heap of livin' to make a house a home" houses were not yet being mass produced. Today it sometimes takes a heap of remodeling to make a house reflect the personalities of the family that occupies it.

The ingenuity that home owners use to stamp their individuality on their abodes never ceases to amaze.

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## BC Aero Club Feels Small Craft Being Crowded Out

In the present Airport expansion controversy, the Boulder City Aero Club feels perhaps it has been the "fall guy."

The aero club, which was given a lease on the airport, is a non-profit organization, and the purpose of the group is to operate so the average man can own an airplane. Each member of the club pays an annual dues of \$10; and \$5 a month for a tie-down.

"There are no junked airplanes at the airport," Lloyd Beadle, vice president of the Aero Club said. "Every plane must be inspected each year before it can fly." He said even though some planes were built in the 1945-47 era, they are kept up to code.

The aero club, represented in this interview by Beadle and Loren Prishrey, claims it is not encouraging more activity at the airport.

The Hobbs business at the airport is conducted from the Elks Club, and the planes are being moved to aero club property at the wishes of the city council.

The most recent business - the Las Vegas - Boulder aviation, Inc., was permitted on Aero Club property when the city indicated it would issue a license.

**Need Airport**  
Prishrey said the small aircraft are being shoved out of the larger airports and there is no place to go. He feels everyone can work together at the airport for the benefit of everyone.

The Aero Club paid the city \$3,000 last year from gasoline sales, and \$100 a month rental and 2 percent of the gross income.

Beadle says the small air-

craft owners pay 80 per cent and a bookkeeper. "The B.C. Airport has a good safety record," Beadle said, "and any hazardous flying should be reported." He said that flight students fly their landings and take-offs at the dry lake.
