

## SHRIMP INDUSTRY SEEKS LAND HERE; WOULD EMPLOY MORE THAN 1,200!

### KIRBY TRUMBO PROMOTED TO MANAGER OF VALLEY BANK OF NEVADA IN HENDERSON

E. Parry Thomas, Chairman of the Board of Valley Bank of Nevada, recently announced the promotion of Kirby Trumbo to the position of Assistant Cashier and Manager of the Valley Bank's Henderson Branch. Kirby has been a resident of Southern Nevada for more than 29 years and

is a graduate of Basic High School in Henderson. He received his degree in business management from the University of Colorado and has continued his education in courses offered by the American Institute of Banking. He is active in the Henderson community and is the Treasurer of the Henderson Boy's Club, member of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce, Henderson Optimist Club and the Henderson Golf Club. He resides in Henderson with his wife, Sandra, and their two children.

### Housing Authority Moving Tomorrow

Barring last minute difficulties, the Clark County Housing Authority (CCHA) will move tomorrow from their present quarters in Victory Village to their new administration building just off Boulder Highway by Nellis Boulevard.

Completion of the new home for CCHA has been delayed due to various problems encountered by the contractor, including his inability to apply the roof on schedule due to the recent spell of rainy weather. The holdup in completing the roof delayed the finishing of the new building's interior.

The contract for the building contained a "penalty" clause and the contractor went on "penalty" on April 3. However, it is understood that he has asked for additional waivers of penalties because of conditions beyond his control.

### CITY TO HAVE NEW APPRAISALS

The Henderson City Council ... in a Land Committee session last night ... decided to request a new appraisal of all city lands offered for public sale.

The action came after the committee heard City Manager Don Dawson submit six requests for purchase of lands currently owned by the city. Four of the six requests were for parcels located on or near Boulder Highway in the general area of Las Vegas Downs.

The first request was from C. Bonanno who was asking to purchase approximately one acre of land on which to construct a supper club specializing in Italian cuisine. The property is located in the entrance road to Las Vegas Downs. It has been advertised for some time. The restaurant would represent an investment of some \$60,000.

Four additional requests for property ... all of which would require advance ... ing ... were received from:

— Charles Aldrich for approximately 90 acres in Section 34 on which to build a western village and movie ranch. Aldrich had previously explored the possibility of the city obtaining BLM land in Sections 35 and 36 for this purpose.

— Bill Edwards and Associates, who requested roughly 180 acres ... also for a western village and movie ranch ... this in Section 33, across Boulder Highway from Aldrich.

— Elliot Alper, for 75 acres for residential development in Section 35.

— Dick Stewart Jr., for approximately 80 acres in Section 35 for three ranch-type homes.

Discussion ensued on the increase in land value along Boulder Highway because of the renewed interest in Las Vegas Downs since passage of the ground racing bill allowing such racing here. It was pointed out that not only this land ... but other city properties ... have probably appreciated in value since their last appraisal some two years ago.

At the recessed council meeting which followed ... the city manager's appraisal of city property offered for public sale. Council ... for sale of the four pieces of property referred to above.

### SIGNAL NOW ON AUTOMATIC OPERATION

The traffic signals at the Major Avenue-Boulder Highway intersection are now hooked into the traffic sensing equipment and are operating according to traffic flow.

When no traffic is sensed on either of the two streets, the signals are set to "dwell" with a red light for Boulder Highway traffic and a green signal for motorists using Major Avenue.

By this arrangement, the red light facing northbound traffic on Boulder Highway entering the city from the south is slowed down to conform with the 45 mph speed limit posted there. If approaching traffic slows down as required by law, the sensing devices in the pavement will automatically switch the signal to green before the cars reach the intersection.

Automatic sensing equipment at the other two signal intersections on Boulder Highway ... at Basic Road and Lake Mead Drive ... is expected to be put into operation in the near future. At these intersections, the signals will carry a dwell of green for Boulder Highway traffic.

### HOUSING UNITS ALIVE AGAIN?

The possibility of the much disputed 80 housing units returning to Henderson ... and it was stressed that it is only a possibility ... was discussed last week by the Clark County Housing Authority Board of Commissioners.

Executive Director William Cottrell explained that the Authority was asked by HUD if they could have the 80 family units to the Annual Contributions Contract stage by June 30 ... If funds became available ... and if these units were authorized to receive funding.

"There is no guarantee of any kind that this will develop," Cottrell told the commissioners, "but if it should, we must take some preliminary actions in order to reach the ACC stage before June 30.

"We have a tentative site," he continued, "and it is available for sale. HUD will provide an appraiser to determine if there is a basis for proceeding."

Cottrell stated that the site in question comprised 21 acres of land owned by B.M.I. near Carver Park and adjacent to Ballerina Trailer Court. "The site is already zoned R-4," Cottrell exclaimed, "and was previously rejected by HUD only because of its proximity to Carver Park."

Noting that it will be necessary to present preliminary plans and specifications in a form sufficient to arrive at estimated costs, the commissioners approved the design of the units by the firm of Cambeiro and Cambeiro, AIA, if all goes well.

A very tentative schedule ... assuming the ... all continues to look favorable ... calls for a HUD appraisal of the property by the end of this month; completion of preliminary plans by May 12, and a HUD review of the development program by June 19.

A request for purchase of 200-300 acres on which to develop shrimp farms that would have an ultimate valuation in the neighborhood of \$8 million and employ upwards of 1,200 people was presented to the Henderson City Council at a Land Committee Meeting last night.

As outlined in the proposal, the farms would be located in Section 34. Beginning with one farm consisting of 80 tanks, the project would expand to eventually comprise five such "farms" as well as a flash freezer plant, trucking facility and other related supporting enterprises.

According to Harry Yeager, president of North American Industries Inc., who would be operating the industry here, the entire operation is "clean" one and emits no odors or otherwise despoils the environment.

Yeager told the council that the entire operation is under cover ... is air conditioned ... and that water used in the tanks is recycled. The initial water demand for each farm would be some 2 million gallons.

Each farm, with its 80 tanks, would utilize approximately 12 acres of ground. If approved, construction on the initial farm would begin soon.

In introducing the request to the council, City Manager Don Dawson stated, "I would point out that this industry, if approved by you, would take just about all the industrial land available. If it should fail, we would have large numbers of unemployed people. I would prefer to see more and smaller industries.

"I recommended," he continued, "that Mr. Yeager check with B.M.I. and search the idea of using their settling ponds for his operation."

Yeager responded to this by saying that he would do just that ... but that all would first depend on a chemical analysis of the water available. Traces of arsenic or copper would immediately rule out such an operation ... and of course the land there might not be for sale.

"The system here ... developed by UNIWORLD Inc. is unique in the industry," Yeager declared. "This system has discovered the secret of the food chain for the shrimp. We know it will work ... it's been proven out. We can raise shrimp at a cost of 67 cents a pound ... and we have a market for all we can produce."

The question of financing was introduced and Yeager responded that, "We have the financing ... we're anxious to get a location and get going."

The council as a body made no specific recommendations nor did they do so at a later recessed council meeting.

The land in question in Section 34 does not have to be advertised. The city manager may ... with council's nod ... enter into negotiations with the prospective purchaser and bring a tentative arrangement back to the council for approval.

### AUTHORITY GIVES HELP TO FAMILY

With little or no discussion necessary, the Clark County Housing Authority Board of Commissioners agreed to donate an apartment in Carver Park to the Atterbury family ... victims of a tragic hit-run accident in which Mr. Atterbury was last night killed and the other three members of his family severely injured.

The request was introduced by Commissioner Art Espinoza on behalf of a group from the VFW who are assisting the family wherever possible.

The Authority agreed instantly to provide a vacant apartment at no charge ... to pick up the utility bill ... and to furnish the apartment for Mrs. Atterbury and her son, Arthur. A second son, Robert Jr., is in Sunrise Hospital and is expected to remain there for some time recovering from his injuries.

... a resident of Wonderworld, went a step further and offered to supply the family with such items as linens, plates and other items for their home, including a supply of food.

## INDUSTRIAL DAYS ART SHOW

The judge for the Industrial Days Art Show has been named. He is Joe Mast of Las Vegas, a well-qualified artist in his own right. Mr. Mast has a B.A. in Archeology, University of Colorado B.F.A. Fine Arts, Colorado State University, and a M.F.A. in Fine Arts, Colorado State University.

He has had many one man shows, in Las Vegas, Denver, Taos, New Mexico, Boulder, Colorado, and Portland, Oregon. He has the distinction of being the first Nevada artist to have a one-man show at the California Palace of Legion of Honor, San Francisco, and has displayed his works at the Castelli Galerie in Rome, Italy. He was commissioned by the Navy to paint a series on naval activities in Alaska.

Mr. Mast is a long time member of the Las Vegas Art League, and occasionally teaches classes for them. He currently teaches art for the City of Las Vegas, Needles, California, and Bullhead City, Arizona.

The Art Show will be held Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. All interested artists are invited to enter. Entry blanks and further information may be obtained by calling the Henderson Chamber of Commerce, 565-8953, or Genevieve Smith, 564-1155.

## TENANT GROUP OBJECTS TO RENT CHARGE

Joanne Rock of Tenants Pulling Together (TPT), appeared before the Clark County Housing Authority (CCHA) at their regular meeting last week and objected to paying rent for office space in Carver Park ... even though it was brought out that TPT is receiving funding for this specific purpose.

Ms. Rock opened her item on the agenda by stating that she wanted to know why TPT was suddenly being charged rent for the office space which previously had been given the group at no charge. She said that she felt it wasn't right ... and that her organization needed their money for other purposes.

CCHA Executive Director William Cottrell replied that he initiated the rent charge after the Economic Opportunity Board had notified him that TPT had been given a grant of \$5,700 part of which was designated for rent.

Jane Patterson, VISTA volunteer, agreed that this was so ... and that although the money was a grant, the cash was paid out on receipt of proper bills. Therefore the group could not use the "grant money" allocation for any other purpose.

Members of the CCHA Board objected strongly to Ms. Rock's arguments on the rent charge. She had questioned whether the commissioners were aware of Cottrell's action.

"After all that this Board has done for tenant groups," Chairman Landsman responded, "after all we did for the county welfare tenants last year when they were unable to pay rent ... and we carried them ... I don't like your idea."

The other commissioners agreed with Landsman. They expressed the idea that it would be a different picture if the group could put the rent money to other use, but that to object to it simply to deny the money to the Authority was pushing things rather far.

To remove any doubt as to the Board's feelings in the matter, a motion to charge TPT rent for the space in Carver ... as long as their funding is available was made and unanimously passed.

## PUBLIC HEARING ON ROUTE 41

The City of Henderson will hold a Public Hearing on April 26 to gather public opinion regarding a change in access control along state route 41 from a point near the west city limits to a point near the Union Pacific railroad crossing.

Informational material on the project will be on public display in the City Council Chambers on the day of the hearing from 2-5 p.m. The hearing itself will be conducted in the same chamber at 7 p.m.

Back in 1955, the State Highway Board passed a resolution designating the "Sloan-Henderson Cutoff" a limited access highway. This was to be a new road connecting the City of Henderson with U.S. 91.

It was anticipated that the road would serve approximately 1,500 vehicles per day. A survey in 1971 showed an average use by 860 vehicles a day.

The main purpose of the road was to provide a direct connection between Henderson and the main route to Los Angeles for recreational and commercial traffic. Access to the road has been limited to those points where section lines intersect the highway.

The public hearing is to consider allowing additional openings onto the state route.

## POLICE TO SPONSOR CHILD SAFETY COURSE

The Henderson Police Department will sponsor a program in child safety in cooperation with the National Child Safety Council. The program will be carried out within our local elementary schools.

Floyd Ward, Coordinator, has named Chief of Police Floyd E. Osborn to the Board of Advisors of the National Child Safety Council.

The Council is a national and state tax exempt organization, dedicated to the safety of children. The Council is made up of Chiefs of Police, Sheriffs, doctors and school officials.

Ward commented that more children die every year from preventable accidents than from all leading childhood diseases combined. Statistics show that 2,400 die annually from fire, 2,200 from water, 2,000 as pedestrians, 700 from falls, 600 from guns, 500 from bicycles, 400 from poisons and 7,200 from miscellaneous accidents, making 18,000 deaths the annual tragic toll.

The program the police department will carry out will include a message

to parents with booklets which will be given to each child. Kindergartners will receive a coloring safety manual. First graders will also receive coloring safety manuals, and the lower elementary classes will receive coloring manuals that include songs about safety and first aid.

Upper elementary grades will receive manuals that include safety leader riddles, safety leaders march to music, crossword puzzles and pictures to color. There are also assignments on mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, gun safety suggestions for hunters, fire prevention, preventing falls, poisoning words of caution about friendly strangers, and bicycle safety reminders.

Drug abuse manuals will go to fourth, fifth and sixth graders. Colorful posters covering holiday fires and other seasonal reminders will be sent to schools every month during the school year.

## TENANTS' PICNIC IN PLANNING

Plans for a Tenant Appreciation Day were discussed by the Clark County Housing Authority Board of Commissioners at their Wednesday night meeting.

It was decided to pursue the idea of a family-style picnic with games and recreational activities.

Although he was unable to be present at the meeting, Tenant Services Supervisor Cruz Olague submitted a written report to the Board stating that he had found it next to impossible to arrange for a carnival to be brought in as part of a planned celebration for tenants.

Commissioner Herb Kaufman, who first brought up the idea at a previous meeting, stated that he had envisioned more of a family-style picnic ... with food, games, races perhaps a ball game.

In discussing the publicity and help needed to put such an event on, the commissioners agreed that the various tenants groups could be of great value. It was agreed to look into the matter in great detail and to ask the help of the tenants groups when the date for the event is picked.





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

**Chamber Protests Legislation**

Boulder City

Three major legislative issues which could threaten Boulder City were subject of protest at the Thursday monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce.

They were the annexation of the strip by the City of Las Vegas, a move to combine Clark County city governments and opposition to the appointment of Las Vegas Convention Authority members instead of by election.

City Manager Dick Isenberg reported that should the strip become part of Las Vegas, about \$30,000 would be lost to Boulder City, money which is based on the population and area of incorporated cities. He revealed that when reapportionment went into effect in 1970, Boulder City lost \$70,000.

The chamber voted against the strip takeover, and suggested that a more equitable basis be found for dispersal of funds.

Sen. James Allman of Clark County is responsible for the unpopular legislation which would pool all the entities in the county into one governmental agency with all funds being in one pot.

The chamber planned to shoot that bill down with a letter to Carson City.

Equally unpopular is the idea of appointment of members to the LVCA and a telegram went to the Legislature Thursday afternoon expressing the chamber's displeasure.

Again Isenberg revealed that Boulder City's share of recreation money could be in jeopardy if the method of choosing LVCA members is changed.

City Attorney Jim Ordowski gave a report on his trip to Carson City for

the Southern Nevada Industrial Foundation meeting regarding freight rates, particularly pertaining to Boulder City.

Representatives of cities, chambers of commerce, freight lines and Upland Industries attended the hearing.

Ordowski's prime purpose for attending was to question the disparity in freight rates paid by Boulder City business people. Rates are much higher in Boulder which discourages industry coming into the community, Ordowski told the group.


Northern Nevadans also learned that they enjoy cheaper rates than the southern end of the state.

One curative was approved by everyone that southern Nevada should be given more publicity on its freight usage in brochures which are sent to prospective businesses and industries.

The chamber voted to spend \$150 for a float to be entered in the Henderson Industrial Days parade this month, and plans are going ahead for the seminar scheduled next Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. in the council chambers. Speakers will be from NIC and a group insurance company. Chamber members and other businessmen are urged to attend. Refreshments will be available, and question and answer periods will follow the talk.

The "Job for Youth" program will be resumed again this year. Neil Olson, chamber secretary-manager, revealed that the chamber helped about 25 young persons find employment last year, some of them permanently for the summer.

## A TALK WITH THE HENDERSON POLICE

Last week, we shared part of an interview with Henderson's Chief of Police Floyd Osborn concerning crime in our community and what can be done about it... and what can be done to help prevent it.

This week we'd like to share the remainder of that interview with you.

Crime in our community received notoriety recently when the city was swept by a "wave" of residential burglaries. To some, it might appear that Henderson had been invaded by every burglar west of the Mississippi.

"Not so," said the Henderson Chief. "Yes, we experienced a problem... but it certainly doesn't indicate we've been chosen for a scene of burglary operation."

He continued, "It only takes a couple of persons... even a couple of kids... to establish an 'epidemic' of burglaries."

He commented on the recent "epidemic" and of the methods used to apprehend those responsible. Much of it cannot be repeated here. No, it's not classified or secret information... but it would lose its effectiveness if made too public.

The Chief did mention such things as searching for... and finding a... a pattern common to many of the burglaries. The pattern pointed to a class of individual and from there it was a matter of manpower and surveillance until the culprits were nabbed.

Again, we turned to the subject of self-protection and the subject of Operation I.D. was brought up.

Operation I.D.? Much as it infers, it is a program to encourage people to mark their belongings for later identification should they be stolen. To further this end, the program furnishes small engraving tools which can be used to inscribe an identifying mark or number on just about any surface.

"Many people use their

social security number or driver's license number... anything that's unique to them... as their identification," Chief Osborn said. It's often the only means they have of identifying their TV, stereo set... appliances... or other valuables which bear no peculiar markings.

The engraving tools are on hand at the Henderson Police Department on Water Street. They are free for the asking. Simply drop by the department and tell the dispatcher what you're after. You'll be asked to produce some identification and sign for the tool. Then it's yours for 24 hours to take home and use as you please.

With the tool, you'll be given an Operation I.D. sticker for your home and a home inventory booklet.

What else can you do to protect your home? Last week we discussed not "advertising" the fact you're away... leaving lights on... telling the police you'll be out of town.

Here's another area to check. Many entries into homes are gained through the sliding glass patio-type doors. These doors are usually located in the rear of homes... away from the view of neighbors and passers-by. Not only that, but the "usual" latching and locking device supplied with this type of door is not that secure and can easily be manipulated by a knowledgeable burglar.

What to do? There are several options. Replace the locking unit... place a broomstick or 2 by 4 securely in the sliding track, making sure it butts against each end.

"There are cases," the Chief said, "where burglars have just lifted the whole door up and out. To prevent this, there's a metal device that can be installed on the inside at the top rails that will make it impossible to lift the door out."

The subject of neighborhood security was brought out again by Chief Osborn. "I can't put too much stress on this," he said. "Many people simply don't want to get involved... or they have a fear of appearing foolish or embarrassed if they call and the 'proowler' turns out to have legitimate business."

"They shouldn't feel this way," he added. "What affects your neighbor affects you. When he is burglarized, you are hurt, too. We can patrol... but we can't be everywhere at once... and law enforcement is a community problem, not just a police problem. Law enforcement is everybody's business."



"Parents should realize when they allow away from their children of an awareness and ecological toy," says Dr. Henry L. Harris, noted pediatrician and author of Open Line, a national telephone network for parents and pediatricians.
