Imagine this scene, if you will, at Bangor, Maine, early this week as four airplanes came in from Europe. Each plane disgorged some 350 passengers -- all of them at the same time -- all to go thru customs before being allowed to go on to their homes.

Well -- of course you'll realize that it took hours of standing in line -- and now we come to the what-a-small-world part of the story.

Standing in line and spotting others from their home town or home area -- and having a grand re-union become of the amazing accidental meeting were the Lou LaPortas returning from London, the Emil Madsens of Henderson Furniture returning from Africa and the Bill Urgas, formerly half owner of Henderson telephone.

If there was ever a meeting all of us in Henderson should attend, it is the one being held tonight (see story on this page for details)--concerning consolidation -- which could lead us to being swallowed up by Vegas or the county -- which could lead to our losing our identity, our home rule; or, which could lead to a sane plan of some county services being combined to save taxpayers money but yet allow each community to run its own affairs.

Because we have as a community remained alert on this subject, the action committee set up by the last legislature is purposely holding one of its meetings here - tonight!

Let's all be there to show once again we're a community thinking as one when outside pressures show up, yet thinking independently when local issues are up for decision.

Even the plant executives should be there to report back to their parent companies -- because they may not know it -- but they are in the middle and need soon to decide whether to become part of Henderson or part of Vegas. They have to decide soon which of the two cities will be easiest to work with. We think our city government would be most considerate of their problems because they are our main economical support.

See you tonight -- and let's observe -- study -- question.

Donald A. Formentini, one of the most critically burned victims of the July 5th Kingman explosion, was released from St. Rose de Lima Hospital on Wednesday, October 31st.

He is the last of ten burn victims hospitalized at St. Rose de Lima to be discharged. It is newsworthy that Don's father was also hospitalized as a skin graft donor to his son.

Mr. Formentini traveled directly to Stanford University Hospital and Medical

Center, at Stanford, California, for plastic surgery. He was accompanied by his wife, Lola, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dante Formentini, who reside in Redwood City, California. Both his wife and parents have become "Hendersonites" during Don's hospitalization; and have made many friends in this area, all of whom join the staff of St. Rose de Lima Hospital in wishing Don and his family well.

### Concessions At Parks Discussed At Meeting

Concessions at the city's recreational facilities were discussed Tues. at the city recreation meeting, and it was decided that an applicant for the concessions from Las Vegas will be given an opportunity to speak to the board at the next meeting.

At the same time, local vendors who are interested in obtaining concessions may also appear at the meeting.

The concessionaire from Las Vegas, who offered the city ten percent of the "take", already operates in Las Vegas and the county.

The board also discussed the resurfacing of the tennis courts and the possibility of lighting the tennis courts at the high school.

Mike Blankenship said he was unaware, until he took up tennis, that it is impossible to find a court to play on in Henderson. He said the two courts owned by the city in the city park are always occupied in the evening.

The Silver State Sandpipers were given permission to use the BMI pool for practice at \$100 monthly rental fee until the new pool goes into operation.

The Henderson city council has been invited to attend a meeting of Task Force five of the Urban Action Committee today at 4 p.m. at the city hall.

All of the councilmen and Mayor Cruz Olague indicated they would attend the meeting.

According to David F. Causey, executive secretary's office, the discussion will be general. It is expected the Task Force will seek information from the Henderson councilmen concerning feelings on consolidation of different services.

The council addressed a resolution to the Urban Action committee protesting alleged statements of Dr. Albert Johns about Henderson. Johns is chairman of the committee.

It is not expected that the resolution will be read at the task force meeting today.

Task Force Five will also meet with the No. Las Vegas city council at 7 p.m. on Nov. 3; the Las Vegas city commissioners and Mayor Oran Gragson on Nov. 15, and the Urban Action Committee will hold its last meeting of the year at 3 p.m. in room 17 of the convention center on Dec. 6.

The city council urges everyone interested to attend today's meeting.

Recreation Director Dundee Jones reported that a representative from Chester Pools was in Henderson Tuesday, and the pool is expected to go through an acid bath preparatory to painting. It will take about ten days to dry.

When he reported that John Cahill, who also works for the school district, would be aquatics director at the pool at a salary of about \$100 a week on a part-time basis, he was hit with questions from the board members and also City Councilmen Lorin Williams and Jerry Franklin.

Board member Mike Blankenship told Jones it was his

### New Rates For Swim Pool Outlined Here

Following below is a list and explanation of fees recommended for use at the new indoor swimming pool.

The suggested charges were drawn up and submitted to the city council by the Swimming Pool Advisory Board and the Henderson Parks and Recreation Board at a meeting in early October.

**Any Organization Club or Group**  
Any organization, club or group interested in renting the entire pool or a portion thereof after regular public pool hours on a one time basis shall be charged a rental fee of \$50.00 for the first hour; \$75.00 for two consecutive hours; \$100.00 for three consecutive hours; plus the hourly rate for each and every swimming pool staff member required to be on duty. (If the entire pool is in use, minimum safety regulations require at least three lifeguards while the pool is in use.)

For Henderson non-profit service organizations, clubs or groups, the following rates were approved: \$25.00 for the first hour; \$37.50 for two consecutive hours; \$50.00 for three consecutive hours.

However, the board stipulated if the non-profit Henderson service organization can not afford the fee, and-or is raising money for a special purpose, the group, club or organization may request a waiver of the fee from the Advisory Board or City Council; which will be taken into consideration.

The Advisory Board agreed that regular city employed lifeguards will be the only lifeguards used at the Henderson City Pools.

**Competitive Swimming Teams**  
Any competitive swimming teams interested in renting the entire pool or a portion thereof, either during or after regular public pool hours on a continuous basis, shall be charged a rental fee of at least \$100.00 per month for two hours per day, six days per week, Monday through Saturday. Henderson based competitive swimming teams will be given preference when scheduling use on this basis. All rental agreements shall be reviewed by the Parks and Recreation Department on a regular 90 day basis. All fees shall be subject to change immediately upon written recommendation from the Henderson Parks and Recreation Department to the City Council.

**Other Aquatics Organizations**  
Any other special aquatics organizations, clubs, groups interested in renting the entire pool or any portion thereof on a continuous basis after regular public pool hours shall be charged a monthly prorated fee based on the \$100.00 per month rental fee charged for competitive swimming teams. In addition to the rental fee, an additional fee will be charged for the staff members required to be on duty while the renters are on the premises. Henderson organizations, clubs, groups will be given preference when scheduling.

**Swimming Meets**  
Any organizations, clubs or groups interested in renting the pool for events which would exclude public swimming shall be charged a fee of \$100.00 per day plus whatever the general admission revenue would normally be for the days involved, plus an additional fee will be charged for the staff members required to be on duty while the renters are on the premises.

**Commercial Or Private Organizations, Clubs, Businesses Or Groups**  
Any commercial or private organizations, clubs or groups interested in renting the entire pool or any portion thereof, for any one time or continuous basis for gain or profit shall be charged a rental fee of \$2.00 per person or \$25.00 flat rate.

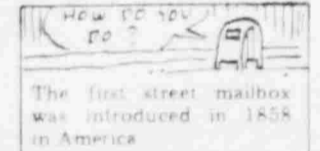

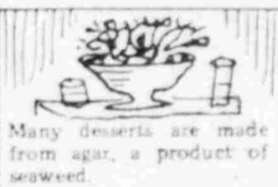

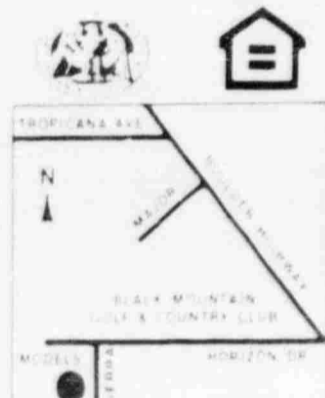

## Joe Phillips Attends Phi Delta Confab

Joe Phillips of Henderson took part in a historic Phi Delta Kappa biennial council held here from October 17 through 21, serving as Delegate for the Las Vegas Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa.

The council took a giant step toward opening membership in the prestigious 76-year-old professional society to women educators. Phi Delta Kappa now enrolls 98,000 men who hold leadership positions in the schools and colleges of the United States, Canada, England, West Germany, the Philippines, and Mexico. By a vote of 318 to 140, delegates representing 409 of the fraternity's 418 campus and field chapters voted to eliminate the "males only" clause in the Phi Delta Kappa constitution. If the chap-

ters ratify this action by a two-thirds majority in a referendum to be completed by the end of January 1974, chapters will begin initiating outstanding women educators immediately thereafter.

The Houston gathering of over 650 educators featured Phi Delta Kappa's First International Conference on Educational Issues as well as the 34th Biennial Council. An action program for the next two years was planned and positions were taken on nine crucial issues identified and studied by the chapters over the past two years.

Commissions or task forces were authorized to study and act in several fields, including tenure, competency, performance based tea-

cher and administrator preparation and certification, alternative schools, and curriculum for lifelong learning (with particular attention to career education, early childhood education, ethical-moral education, etc.).

Notably, the council called for a thorough study of the implications of compulsory attendance laws, which are now under attack from several quarters.

Another task force will examine various aspects of the accountability movement. Finally, the council wants a study of the legal rights and responsibilities of students, perhaps jointly with such bodies as the American Bar Association and the American Civil Liberties Union.

Policy resolutions reaffirmed Phi Delta Kappa's traditional

stand against the use of public funds for non-public schools and reemphasized its basic support of free public education from preschool through the university.

The fraternity will continue its leadership in the area of school finances and will sponsor a national conference on the subject annually.

The seven districts of PDK were asked to establish banks of resource specialists various fields who will stand ready to help school districts upon request, drawing upon the wealth of expertise represented in the fraternity's membership.

Although the council failed to pass a resolution in support of using for equal education, it did resolve to support political and educational efforts to improve housing and increase employment opportunities, medical services, consumer education, and day-care and legal services for minority groups.

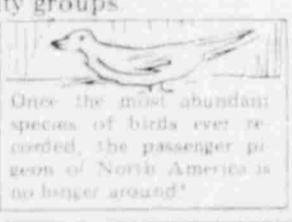

# Many Water Resource Problems Face So. Nevada

**Editor's Note:** Clark County Commissioner Robert N. Broadbent of Boulder City, delivered the following address as a featured speaker at the 1973 Nevada Water Conference in Carson City on October 25, 1973.

For 6 years, we in Clark County have been involved in the Las Vegas Wash - Lake Mead pollution abatement solution. There have been scores of committees and agencies working on the solution, reams of paper consumed in studies and reports, and several millions of dollars spent on these activities. Politicians have run for election on providing the solution,

had pictures taken sniffing at the sewage plants, wading in the effluent down the wash, picking the algae out of Lake Mead and condemning the lack of action by other politicians. Engineers say they could have provided and implemented the solution had it not been for the politics involved. Politicians say, had the engineers done the engineering and stayed out of the politics, we would be nearer the solution.

Suffice it to say here is where we are today. No politicians or engineers involved - just the environmental protection agency, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, the Nevada Bureau of environmental health, the Nevada State Commission of Environmental Protection, the Colorado River Commission, the Legislative Commission, the Governor, the State Water Engineer, Nevada Environmental Consultants, the Las Vegas Valley Water District, the Clark County Regional Planning Council, the Nevada Power Company, the cities of North Las Vegas, Las Vegas, Henderson, and Boulder City, the county sewage and waste water advisory committee, the general obligation bond commission, sanitation district No. 1, the Urban Action Committee, and probably several other agencies needing to either mandate, consult, authorize, approve, negotiate, or modify an agreement, contract,

plan, or standard before the Clark County Board of County Commissioners, through its pollution abatement project staff, can implement the solution.

As many of you can see, we have some very complex water resource management problems confronting southern Nevada. Although the problem of wastewater disposal has been capturing most of the attention lately, we also have some serious concerns about our long-range supply of potable water. In developing solutions to these problems, it has become apparent that they are not independent or unrelated, but that they interlock and relate to other environmental factors.

Consequently, we are becoming increasingly aware of the fact that water management problems are difficult to isolate and investigate separately.

We have concluded that we must develop a total water resource plan for the whole of Clark County. In other words, we believe that, in order to properly manage this vital resource, we must evaluate all water problems. This evaluation starts at the water supply source, continues through its uses and re-uses, and is completed at the final disposal of the wastewater. Failure to develop a management plan for the total resource could find us solving one water problem only to learn that its solution causes an

equally serious problem in another area.

Consideration of a total water resource management plan has added a new urgency to the requirement for the consolidation of all water management agencies under one master water agency. This consolidation will, for the first time in the history of southern Nevada, provide comprehensive and coordinated water resource management.

As you know, last April the Nevada State Legislature passed Senate Bill 288. This legislation recognizes the County as the instrument of government best equipped to manage the collection, disposal and treatment of sewage and wastewater. In other words, the legislature recognized the need for regional wastewater management. This Bill also mandates the County to stop the pollution of Lake Mead while at the same time providing for the fullest beneficial use of the wastewater.

In order to achieve the fullest beneficial use of the wastewater, the Board of County Commissioners made a concerted effort last June to convince the State Commission of Environmental Protection that the water quality standards applying to Las Vegas Wash were neither practical nor obtainable. As a result, these standards were revised. This revision will not be deleterious to Lake Mead but, in fact, represents action to improve the water quality of the Lake. These

revised standards allow us to pursue an alternative approach which will de-emphasize export and place primary emphasis on advanced wastewater treatment. We, therefore, envision the design and construction of a large A.W.T. plant as the first step in this alternative approach.

Pilot desalinization and groundwater recharge is still considered an integral part of the total water management program. The day is quickly approaching when we will have to reclaim our wastewaters to supplement our potable water supply. Once an A.W.T. plant is on line, a pilot desaliniza-

tion plant will be constructed. This will permit us to engage in groundwater recharge programs. The research from such a program could lead the way to the development of a full-scale groundwater recharge facility that would help us solve our water storage problem in the valley.

The construction of an export pipeline, however, is dependent upon many factors. The pipeline may not be needed for five or ten years since, under the revised water quality standards, we can discharge all of the uncommitted A.W.T. effluent into Lake Mead. Conversely, the pipeline

may have to be constructed sooner depending primarily upon the Nevada Power Company's plans and the development of a saline groundwater collection system in the Las Vegas Wash by the Bureau of Reclamation.

I have long believed in the market potential for wastewater. It is our hope that, as a result of A.W.T., we can expand the application of wastewater to such beneficial uses as: in-valley irrigation for parks, greenbelts, highway medians, golf courses, and schools; power plant and industrial consumption; and future groundwater recharge applications. Developing the

full potential of our wastewater and expanding its application will not be simple nor inexpensive. We will need the cooperation of the entire community to realize this full potential.

We feel that community input and cooperation is very important, if not absolutely essential, in the proper management of our water resources. Therefore, community support is being sought through the organization of two advisory committees.

Young trick-or-treaters should be accompanied by a parent. Older children should travel in groups of three to five. Keep them in their own neighborhoods and away from strange doorbells.

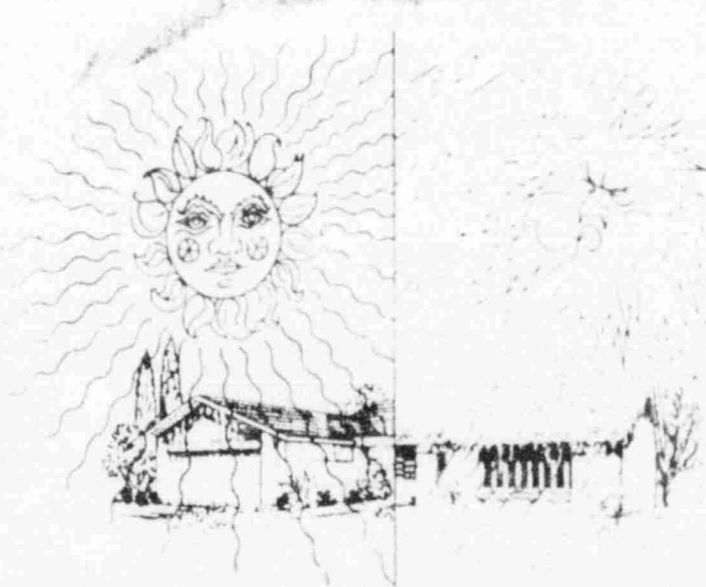

### Check Medical Records For Proper Vaccinations

Have your children received all their vaccinations for childhood diseases? Parents throughout the country are being asked to consider this question by the United States Public Health Service.

Dr. Otto Ravenholt, Chief Health Officer of Clark County, reports that a number of childhood diseases that used to claim massive numbers of young lives -- particularly polio, measles, German measles, rubella, diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), and pertussis (whooping cough) -- have been brought under control through vaccination. He warns, however, that the percentage of children in the one-to-four age group who have been vaccinated for these diseases has decreased gradually over the past several years, to the

point where epidemics of childhood diseases are once again becoming a serious threat.

In the absence of serious epidemics in recent years, Dr. Ravenholt explained, parents have become more complacent about having their children vaccinated. He points out that many parents wait until their children are approaching school age to have them vaccinated, which leaves them susceptible during the years when some of the diseases are most dangerous.

Dr. Ravenholt urges parents to check their children's health care records to make sure they have been fully vaccinated, to refer any questions to their doctors, and to make arrangements for their children to receive any vaccinations that have been overlooked. "Don't put it off," he concludes. "The younger the child is when he is vaccinated the less likely he is to contract serious illness that could lead to permanent disability or even death."

### Occupational Safety Career Program Offered At CCCC

The first class in a new occupational safety career program at Clark County Community College will be offered during the college's upcoming alternate fall semester.

Registration for the class, introduction to occupational safety, will be Nov. 1-2 at the community college and Nov. 5 in Henderson.

Two sections of the three-credit class are open. One section meets at the Henderson Community Center on Monday and Wednesday evenings, 5:40-7:20 p.m. The other section will meet at the community college on Monday and Wednesday mornings, 9:50-11:30 a.m.

This initial course will cover accident prevention, the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, inspection and investigation techniques, records and reporting, safety motivation, and compliance with federal regulations.

The course is part of a developing two-year career program in occupational safety at the community college. The program will prepare students for entry-level employment as trained safety personnel for a variety of area firms and industries.

Walt Lindsey, the college's safety coordinator and instructor, said several scholarships and other financial aids are available for students planning careers in safety.

One complete scholarship has been established by the Las Vegas chapter of the American Society of Safety Engineers. George Parmenter, professional development chairman of the society, recently presented a \$250 scholarship check to the community college.

**Mail Early 1973 Overseas Program**  
REGULAR MAIL AND AIR MAIL:

To most military post offices overseas, packages must not weigh more than 70 pounds or be more than 100 inches in length and girth combined.

**SPACE AVAILABLE MAIL (SAM):**

Packages that weigh less than 15 pounds and are less than 60 inches in length and girth combined can be sent at ordinary postage rates and receive air transportation from the east or west coast on a space available basis.

**PARCEL AIRLIFT (PAL):**

For one dollar more than surface rates, packages can be parcel air-lifted from your Post Office to overseas areas. Packages must weigh more than 30 pounds or be less than 60 inches in length and girth combined.

**GENERAL INFORMATION PERTINENT TO ALL OF THE ABOVE:**

Packages should be wrapped and tied well. Print both mailing and return address clearly, and include the serviceman's identification number in the address. Perishable food items, and flammables (matches, lighter fluid, etc.) may not be mailed. Make sure that the APO or FPO numbers include all five digits. It is recommended that you also include the mailing address and return address inside the package.

# The Magic of Denmark As Shared By Kathleen Wood

After sitting for thirteen hours on one of Pan Americans 707's, with one stop in Chicago, we finally landed in "Wonderful, Wonderful Copenhagen"... Spelled Kobenhavn by the Danish.

From the windows of the bus that took us from the airport to our hotel, we saw neatly arranged, orange brick houses with bright and gaily decorated curtains in the windows.

We saw many cars, but

also a lot of people riding bicycles. We found out that there is a 110 percent tax on all cars, with gas at \$1.25 a gallon, so the cars that the Danish people have are well kept so they will last a long time.

We arrived at the hotel around 1:00, so most of us on the tour spent the rest of the day exchanging money, getting settled down in our rooms and taking short walks around the city.

During our second day in Copenhagen, we went on a "Combined Royal Denmark and Sweden Tour".

We saw the very beautiful Christiansbourg Palace, where the Parli-

ment and Supreme Court are. Denmark has only been a democratic country since 1849. Denmark was ruled by a monarchy before that. Starting in 1167, when Copenhagen was founded by Bishop Apsolon. They still have Royal families, but they are like the English Royal families, mainly as figureheads for the country.

We saw two more palaces, the Danish

Crown jewels, then went to the harbor and took a ferry to Malmo, Sweden. It took us about 1 1/2 hours to get there, then we disembarked, looked around, and went shopping for about two hours.

We returned to Denmark on a "Hydro-foil", a boat that hovers on the top of the water and goes pretty fast. It only took us 35 minutes to get back to Denmark.

On our third day in

Copenhagen, we spent most of our time on the "Pedestrian Street". It is a shopping street about 8 blocks long, and no cars or trucks are allowed on it. There were a lot of really good shops there.

In Denmark and England, Levis are just an incoming fashion. In some of the stores that we went into, they were selling Levis for about

\$20 a pair. Colleen & I thought seriously about selling the couple of pair of Levis we had brought with us for a small profit.

Fur coats are one of Denmark's biggest incomes, so they are pretty inexpensive, compared to American prices. We saw some very beautiful coats in some of the stores and since they were so inexpensive and of good quality, many of the women on our tour got fur coats. My mom included.

On our fourth day in Copenhagen we went on another tour which took us out into the country and through some very old castles. One of the castles we went through was the Kronborg Castle, the setting for Shakespeare's famous play, "Hamlet".

That night some of us went out and wound up at the "Vin and Olgod", a very popular spot down in a cellar. There were very long, wooden tables and benches occupied by a bunch of young Danish people, drinking large steins of beer and singing old Danish folk songs. When a very old traditional song began, the kids would stand up on the benches, lock arms, sway back and forth, and sing. I got an indescribable feeling watching the kids, arm and arm, singing their old folk songs. It was beautiful.

That day we were also introduced to an old Danish drink, "Aquaavit", a drink made from potato juice and very potent. One shot glass full, taken in one swallow, made your cheeks red and dad said it burned all the way down.

On our fifth day we took another tour into the country. We saw some windmills and found out that Denmark has more windmills than Holland. Denmark, also a big flower growing country, exports a lot of tulip bulbs to Holland.

While we were driving through the country we saw a lot of farming areas. In some of the fields we noticed that in some of the areas a whole field would be plowed, except a big mound which had been left alone. The guide told us that these were ancient burial places of the Viking people. The farmers were forbidden to plow over these mounds because the government was trying to keep the graves intact and restored.

The next day was our last in Denmark, so we were up early to check out of the hotel. The rest of the day we spent hurrying up and waiting for buses, planes and baggage.

Though I hated to leave the beautiful people of Denmark with their beautiful country, I was excited to go on to London, England.

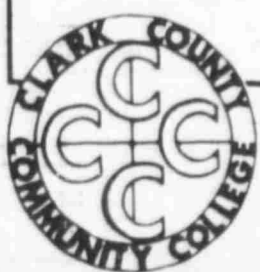

## Quail and Waterfowl Seasons To Close

Several Nevada hunting seasons will close this weekend according to Department of Fish and Game, and hunters are urged to consult regulations brochures for details. Quail hunting seasons, which opened on Sept. 29, will close Sunday in most areas of the State.

The remaining hunting seasons for quail, which will take place only in the fenced and cultivated lands of several northern Nevada agricultural valleys, begin Sunday and continue through Dec. 30. The first portion of the split duck hunting season in Clark and Lincoln Counties will close Saturday and re-open on Nov. 17 to continue through Jan. 20. Elsewhere in the state, duck hunting season began on Oct. 6 and is scheduled to run continuously through Jan. 6.

In all but Clark and Lincoln Counties, the Nevada goose season opened on Oct. 20 and will continue through Jan. 20. In Clark and Lincoln, however, the goose season begins on Nov. 17 and runs through Jan. 6. Nevada's trapping season for all furbearers except marten, begins on Oct. 25, and continues through April 10, 1974. Trappers are urged to become familiar with new regulations which prohibit use of sight-exposed bait within 30 feet of the trap and

### Candy's 4,000-Year Story: How Sweet It Is!

Few things in history have spanned the ages and cultures of the world with such consistent popularity as candy.

In one form or another, candy has found itself carried by warriors through the Crusades, by GIs to the front lines of world wars, by bleacher fans in baseball parks and on interplanetary space by astronauts.

Explorers carried the sugar plant with them on their voyages and sugar cane soon was growing in all the tropical and semi-tropical areas of the globe. Columbus launched the plant in the New World and by 1800 sugar was an important article of world commerce.

#### A SPANISH DISCOVERY

According to the National Confectioners Association, the earliest recorded history of confectioners goes back 4,000 years with the Egyptians. Hieroglyphic inscriptions excavated from the sites of ancient cities show that in 1566 B.C. Egyptian confectioners were selling their sweetmeats from baskets in the market place. Honey was used as a sweetener in those days and was combined with nuts, chopped fruits, sweet herbs and spices.

Chocolate, now the most popular type of candy, was a comparatively late entry into the confection world. In the early 16th century Hernando Cortez discovered the importance of the dark brown cocoa beans when he found the Aztec Indians of Mexico using them in the preparation of their ritual drink, "chocolatl." Cortez brought the beans back to his native Spain where a profitable industry was developed and chocolate became widely acclaimed throughout the continent.

Candy eating habits were passed along to the Greek and Roman civilizations, where physicians started the candy-coated pill tradition by smearing with honey the rims of cups filled with medicinal concoctions to induce patients to drink it down.

The first confectioners in the New World were the Dutch bakers of New York, who in the 17th century made sugar wafers, marshmallows, macarons and other sweets for celebrations. The first American candy shop opened in 1712 in Boston.

The conquering soldiers of Alexander the Great, however, liked sweets for their flavor and not for any medicinal reasons. A favorite of these soldiers (around 325 B.C.) was a Persian delicacy called "kand," a sweet reed garnished with honey, spices and coloring. The word "candy" may well have come from their "kand," or from the Arab word for sugar, "quand."

#### MASS PRODUCTION

#### ENTER SUGAR

Candy, as we know it today, really developed with the emergence of sugar on the world scene. In the Middle Ages, the Arabs spread the cultivation of native sugar cane westward and developed a sugar refining process. The Crusaders, who had acquired a taste for sugar in the Far East, are credited with popularizing candy and starting a demand for the new sugar plant in Europe.

Today, Americans consume an average of 19 pounds of candy annually from a selection of over 2,000 varieties. That first sweet tooth of the Egyptians has created an industry that speaks all languages and knows no age barrier.

Uses of sugar and candy flourished, with Venice becoming the sugar capital of Europe in the 13th century. The Venetians' skill in producing sugar with a very fine grain gave birth to a new art form—sugar sculpture.

## Pepper Steak is a Picnic to Prepare



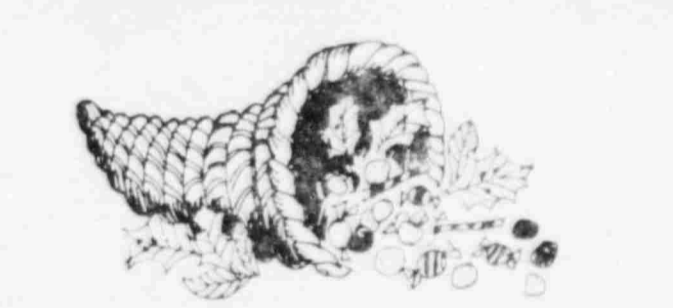
Pepper Steak Italiano is a quick and different main dish. Serve with antipasto and a pasta-kidney bean-tomato salad.

**NEW YORK (ED)**—Pepper Steak in the Italian manner is a different main dish that's a picnic to prepare—for dining indoors or out. Unlike the more ordinary French version, which uses peppercorns and wine sauce, Pepper Steak Italiano is made with roasted peppers, celery and tomato-onion-sauce sauce. And cooking time is only about fifteen minutes—just enough to put together a simple antipasto of green and black olives, mushroom caps, chick peas and fried peppers (all straight from the Italian section of the supermarket; no preparation work required).

When the occasion is festive, round out the meal with one of the vegetable and pasta salads—that are staples of the Italian kitchen. An easy choice: to prepare in advance, slice a half-pound of cooked macaroni shells with three sliced tomatoes and a cup of red kidney beans, right from the can. Season with olive oil, garlic, Parmesan cheese, salt and pepper to taste. Then toss with olive oil and vinegar dressing.

- 3 lb. round steak
  - 1/2 cup olive oil
  - 1/2 cup salt and pepper
  - 1/4 cup finely sliced onion
  - 1 clove garlic
  - 1/2 tsp. oregano
  - 2 jar (7 1/2 oz.) Progresso washed peppers, cut in 1-inch strips
  - 1 cup sliced celery
  - 1 1/2 cups Progresso spaghetti sauce with mushrooms
- Slice steak diagonally into thin strips. Heat olive oil with salt and pepper in a skillet, add steak strips and cook over high heat until brown, stirring frequently. Pour off half the oil and lower flame. Add onion, garlic, oregano, washed peppers, celery and spaghetti sauce and stir to blend. Cover and cook over medium heat about 15 minutes. Serves 4.
