Recreation Director Dundee Jones reported that a representative from Chester Pools was in Henderson Tuesday, and the pool is expected to go through an acid bath preparatory to painting. It will take about ten days to dry.

Councilman Lorin Williams requested information on how soon the transfer station would be completed and City Manager Don Dawson estimated 90 days.




The Advisory Board agreed that regular city employed lifeguards will be the only lifeguards used at the Henderson City Pools.

All fees shall be subject to change immediately upon written recommendation from the Henderson Parks and Recreation Department to the City Council.

Any other special aquatics organizations, clubs, groups interested in renting the entire pool or any portion thereof on a continuous basis after regular public pool hours shall be charged a monthly prorated fee based on the \$100.00 per month rental fee charged for competitive swimming teams.
