PUBLIC TRUST APPROVES \$2.2 MILLION BOND

Preliminary approval to a \$2.2 Million bond for the Lake Adair project was given by the Public Trust group Tues. night after three city councilmen and Mayor Cruz Olague voiced verbal approval for the project.

J. Carlton Adair, president of the Lake Adair Corp. had originally requested in excess of \$1.5 million, but said the larger amount is necessary for financing; and bonding costs.

The Lake Adair project would feature a man-made lake, fed with untreated Lake Mead Water, partly within the Lake Mead National Recreation Area and within the city limits of Henderson around Vegas Wash.

Adair presented the Public Trust group with a completed application form and \$3,000 for the application fee. As to a previous request by the Trustees, Adair also gave them a completed appraisal of the land made by Gary H. Kent, MAI, SRPA, who said the raw land value to the city would be \$5,187,500.

The bonded money would be used, \$900,000, to relieve the land of financial incumbrances, for the construction of water mains and four miles of roads into the area, and for other matters related to the bonds. Should the project fail, the city will not be liable, it was

The Adair group will see a ruing from the Internal Revenue Service for tax free bonds, but Clarence Hamilton, representing the firm interested in purchasing the bonds, told the council he anticipated no problems with the IRS.

The meeting was conducted by Dr. Harold Miller who replaced Lyal Burkholder, chairman. Estes McDoniel, one of the trustees, questioned who would pay for the dam and the ancillary works, and Adair said this would be accomplished by the second bond issue and the people who have purchased the land.

Adair said there are 2,240 acres involved in the Lake Adair project which overlooks the Vegas Valley in parts and Lake Mead in other areas.

The four city officials present expressed themselves favorably towards the project, and another meeting will be held on March 18. McDoniel said he was voting for the project because all councilmen were favorable. Dr. Miller reminded the group that the trust has a final right of revocation.

Adair promised the council he would proceed with final preparations so that construction can begin as soon as possible.

Sky Harbor Comes of Age

Henderson's Sky Harbor Airport was the scene Tues. of this city's first airplane auction which attracted approximately \$2 million worth of planes.

According to Arby Alper, owner of the airport, the event held Tues. was the first ever held in Henderson but there will be monthly auctions held on the second Tues. of the

month hereafter.

There were 40 airplanes in the line-up, some new and some used. Dealers from all over the U.S. came to purchase the planes. The auction was conducted by Auction Air of Nevada.

Although planes had been flying into the airport since Sunday, the auction did not actually begin until about noon when the auctioneer, from the back of a pickup

truck, gave the traditional auctioneer's call. Claudia Grieco gave a short introduction, stating that "Twenty Years ago, Arby Alper had a dream....." She told the assembled crowd that Alper had constructed the airport single-handedly without help from anyone.

The airport is impressive, considering the type of land on which it is located. The boulders and rocks are tre-

mendous in both size and number, but a large section of the land had been cleared for the auction.

The airport has a 5,000 foot runway and plans are being made for a 1,000 ft. extension for larger craft to land. There are provisions for fuel, tie-down, maintenance, and lessons in flying and gliders, and Alper announced plans for expansion of facilities to include warehousing and fac-

tories.

"Lots of men fly to save time -- then lose time by traveling from the airport," Apler said. He said a new concept is for the factory to be located at the airport so the aircraft can taxi up to the rear door.

"It would be a tremendous advantage," Alper said, and he says he had 2,000 acres of land to work with. The next improvement to the airport will be improving the highway

into the airport and to put in lights.

Alper is all for promoting Henderson. He said he is presently dealing with a number of people from the East who may bring industry to our city.

"The success of Henderson is to provide jobs," he said. Some of the biggest aircraft dealers in the country attended the auction in Henderson Tues. and Alper was pleased with the response.

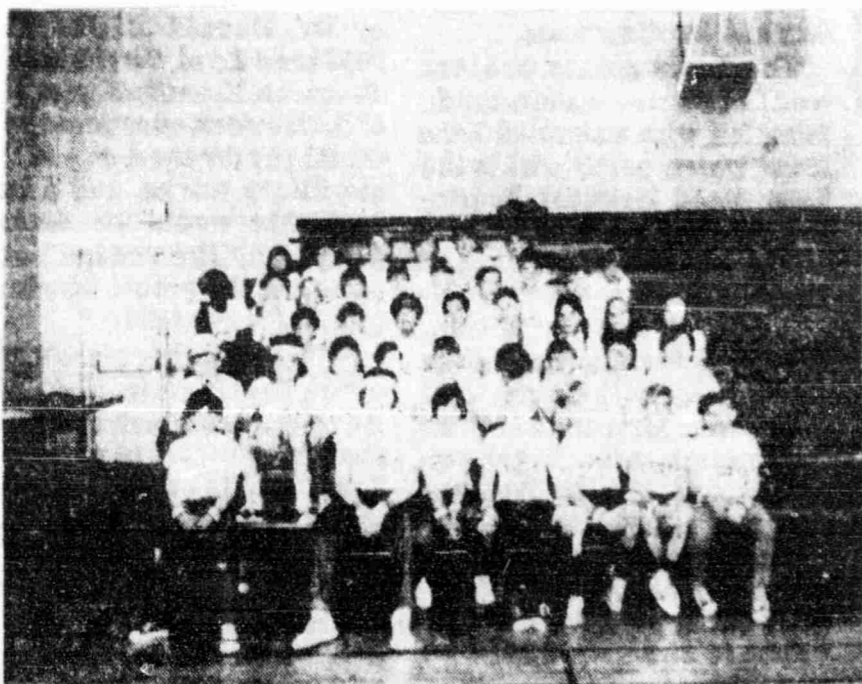

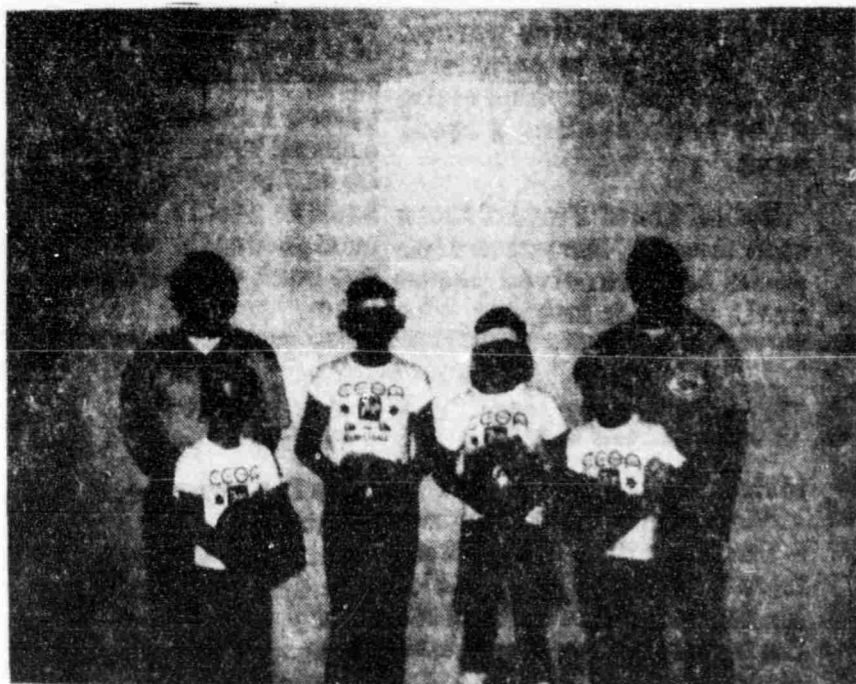

Mrs. Lowell served refreshments from a beautifully decorated table of Buddy Poppies. Following the refreshments a social hour was enjoyed by all.

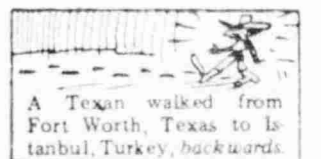

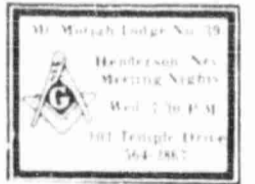

That was the day that the old Boulder City Depot rode down the highway to its new home at the site of the Southern Nevada Museum. In order not to miss anything and to get good pictures of the moving of this historic building I arrived bright and early. I had not been there long

before Teddy Fenton asked me if she could ride with me along the road as the building was moved. So I heard a great deal about early Boulder, the station and the people as we followed the building.

The first problem was getting the building under the telephone line along the north side of the highway. This was solved by the telephone company personnel in a

special rig pulling up on the wire just enough to clear the building. They had to do this several times as the building went down the highway.

I hope that the management of the phone company will see fit to waive any charges for this service. The museum is very short of money and will be hard pressed to meet the bills incurred as a result of this move. I am sure that the phone company can take this expense as a charitable deduction and I sincerely ask that they consider doing this.

Police escort service was supplied by the city of Henderson at no expense. They did an excellent job in keeping the traffic safely moving by the building. The Boulder City police were helpful too in their jurisdiction.

Credit for getting the building moved goes to Jess Bachman of Henderson. Jess became very much interested in the museum some time ago and has been working hard to help make it a success. His experience in building and general contractor work was invaluable in getting this particular project under way. Boulder can be proud too - Jess was at one time a resident of our fair city but business requirements prompted him to move to Henderson. Along with many others I am pleased that the old station will find a permanent home on the museum grounds at Henderson. There it will permanently preserve the early history of both Boulder City and Henderson. It is a fitting function. As it moved down the highway I attempted to get pictures tying it in with its history. One with the power line towers in the background. I am sure that the steel for those towers passed through the depot on its way to its present location. Another picture had the Radar hill works in the background. Hopefully it will show up. This was a case of the old and the new. When that station was built Radar was unknown. Likewise the micro-wave and the TV which currently use the hill too.

If you have not visited the present home of the Southern Nevada Museum in Henderson I urge that you do so - You

will find it very interesting. Roy Purcell the Curator has shown great ingenuity and originality in making the exhibits come alive. Give the Museum your support too. This can be a great educational force for our area as well as a tourist attraction.

I am glad to see that Ralph Denton has plans for political office once again. I have developed a very high regard for him and his integrity over the years that I have known him. I feel that he is the best. I was glad to hear that Bob Broadbent will not be seeking the same office. I hope that this report is true for I would hate very much to see both Bob and Ralph contending for the same office. It would be hard put to make a decision

between the two. I am sure that many other residents of Boulder City as well as the County would have the same problem. I have a very high regard for Broadbent and his civic performance over the years. We are extremely fortunate in my opinion to have two such men willing to serve in public office. They are thankless jobs and in my opinion grossly underpaid. Considering the time and tensions involved in properly filling them.

I regret to hear that Hal Smith has decided not to run again. I felt that he was one of the most able legislators that we have had in many years. I am afraid that it will be a long while before anyone comes along as conscientious

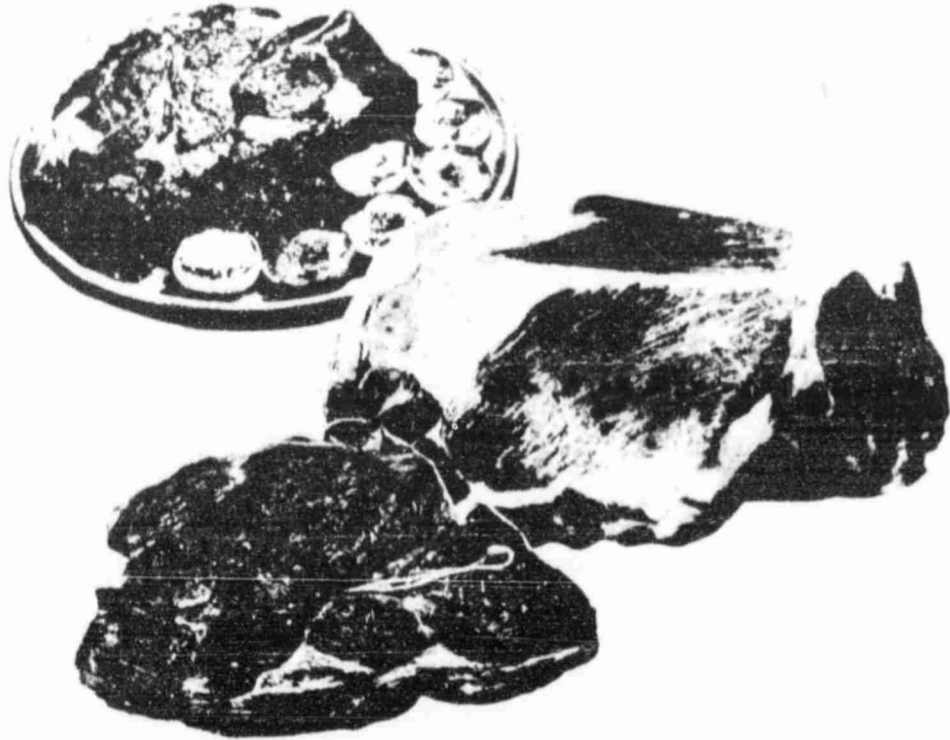

Fishermen Must Secure Permit Before Fishing Pyramid

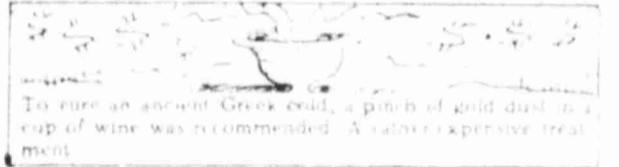
Fishermen are being reminded by NDFG that they must secure a Pyramid Lake Paiute Indian Reservation fishing permit as well as a Nevada fishing license before fishing any waters within the Pyramid Lake Indian Reservation.

Rumors arise annually during the period of increased fishing pressure that fishermen do not need to purchase a fishing permit until contacted by a tribal game warden. This is not the case, according to DFG. The permit must be secured and in the possession of the fisherman

before fishing, according to State law.

The Department also reminds anglers that the Truckee River is closed to fishing to all non-Indians from Numana Dam downstream to Pyramid Lake as is Big Canyon Creek from Pyramid upstream to the Sutcliffe Flanigan Road.

A fishing permit is also needed to fish the portion of the Truckee River from the old Highway 40 bridge in Wadsworth to Numana Dam. The limit on this portion of the Truckee is 15 game fish, of which not more than five may be trout.

TROUT EGGS TAKEN AT LAKE MEAD

More than 50,000 rainbow trout eggs were taken last week by Nevada Department of Fish and Game biologists from ripe spawning fish in a tributary stream to Lake Mead.

The recent egg take from a spawning run of trout in the Lake Mead Fish Hatchery outflow stream greatly exceeded DFG expectations, and according to Cal Allan, Regional Fishery Biologist, "may in future

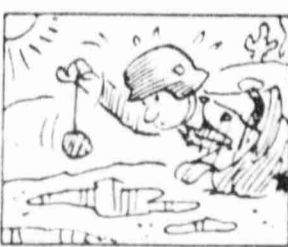
years supply all trout eggs necessary to sustain the hatchery."

A trap and holding pens were constructed in the hatchery stream several weeks ago, and since has captured numerous rainbow trout in varying degrees of spawning condition. Cutthroat trout and coho salmon have also been caught, but in lesser numbers.

Trout were separated by spawning condition, ripe (eggs flow freely from female) or green (not ready to spawn), and when sufficient numbers of ripe trout were obtained, eggs were removed from the fish and transported to the Lake Mead Fish Hatchery for hatching.

At the trap site, eggs were gently squeezed from a female into a bucket containing milk from the male trout, and after thorough mixing and washing, were left to harden before taking to the hatchery.

According to Allan, it will take approximately 35 days for the eggs to hatch and at current hatchery growth rates, these fish should be eight inches long and ready to plant in slightly less than a year.

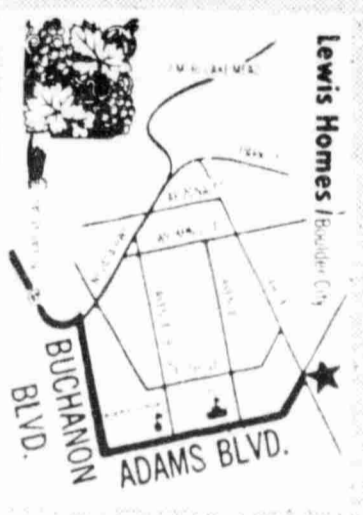

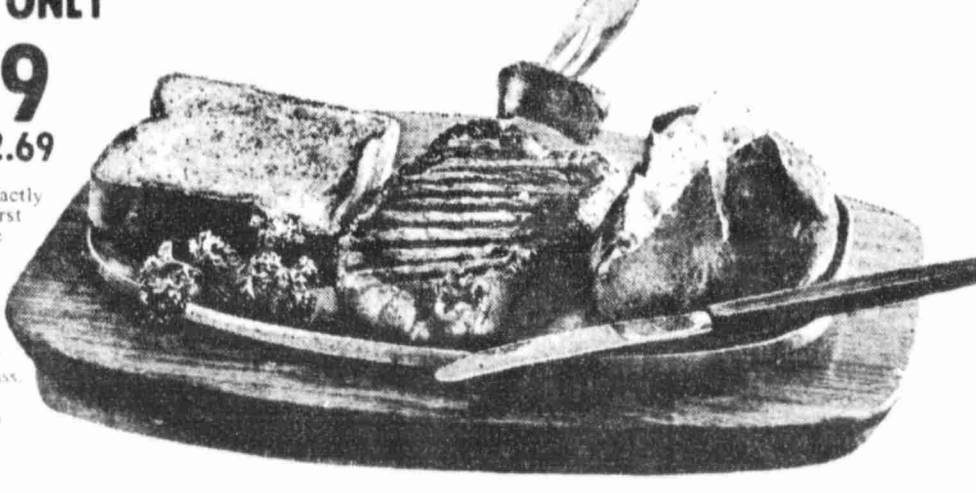

Nevada Rehabilitation Program A Model

Two staff members of the new vocational rehabilitation program for the Pacific Trust Territories will visit Nevada during March for training, with plans to use Nevada's system as a model for developing a program in the Islands.

Gov. Mike O'Callaghan said the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare is sending the Territorial officials to Carson City and a rural outreach office of the state's Rehabilitation

Division on March 7 and 8. HEW chose Nevada as having one of the most successful rehabilitation programs in the nation. In addition, he said, conditions are similar in that the population is located in "pockets" dispersed over a large geographic area.

According to a letter from Dale C. Williamson, associate regional commissioner for rehabilitation services in HEW's Region IX, "In the last three years your vocational rehabilitation program has shown exceptional progress and the momentum con-

tinues at a high level. The Regional Office vigorously supported the doubling of the Federal allocation to your State because of this progress."

O'Callaghan said that Williamson credited Division Administrator Del Frost and the Human Resources Department's Director Roger Trounday with a willingness to try new methods while strengthening existing programs.

The letter concluded "This willingness to innovate successfully is a key component needed at this point in time in the Trust Territory program. Your agency is one of the best equipped to provide this kind of assistance."

O'Callaghan noted that the number of clients

successfully rehabilitated by the division jumped from 520 during fiscal year 1971 to 980 during the last fiscal year—an increase of 89 percent. The number of clients provided service

by the division increased 54 percent during that same period, from 3,352 to 5,159.

According to the governor, one reason for the success of the program has been the increase of

offices providing services to rehabilitation clients, from eight in 1969 to 14 currently operating. And, he noted, three more facilities are scheduled to open in the near

future—public offender outreach offices in Caliente and Reno, and a district office in Fallon.

Services also will be expanded in existing offices, O'Callaghan

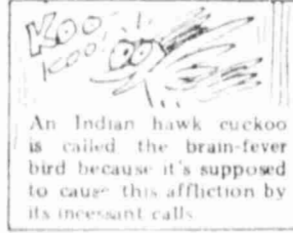

most action for trout with rainbows running from a small nine inches to over 20 inches in length. Largest of the trout were taken in Boulder Canyon on minnows with worms and marshmallows accounting for the remainder near Callville. Crappies are beginning to show in the catch but most fish are running a small nine to 11 inches in length

and they have rated angling as fair. Largest fish taken was a 10 and one-half pound rainbow but most trout ran in the two to three pound class. Mid-channel at the power line is listed as the hottest spot, using nighterawlers and needlefish lures.

Las Vegas Wash slowed down this past week for all species of fish, but what trout were taken were caught on worms, marshmallows and floating cheese baits. One large cutthroat was caught on an unidentified lure.

The catch at Overton Arm this past week was about equally divided between trout and bass, and in general is rated one of the best areas on Lake Mead at this time of year.

Cottonwood Cove anglers at Lake Mohave registered relatively good success for both trout and bass with the majority of both species taken trolling with a variety of lures. The three largest trout, however, were caught from shore with bait. A bass fishing contest Saturday recorded 80 pounds of fish with the largest tipping the scales at seven pounds, one ounce.

Willow Beach success was slightly lower than usual, probably because of high winds in the canyons. Most of the trout action has shifted from shore to boats with nighterawlers accounting for two rainbows in the six to seven pound class.

Sportsmen Urged To Help Stamp Out Poaching Strong Wildlife Import Regulations Proposed

In light of the alarming increase in poaching noted by wildlife management officials all over the country, the National Shooting Sports Foundation has called for an all-out effort by sportsmen to help curb the wave of outdoor crime by reporting all violations to enforcement officials.

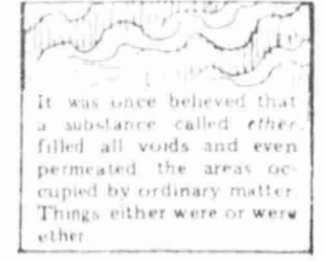
Even with most state conservation agencies adding enforcement personnel to their staffs, it is impossible to effectively crack down on such game thievery without the aid of concerned hunters and fishermen.

According to NSSF President Warren Page, "Heavy poaching not only poses a serious threat to the continued success of wildlife management programs, but the anti-hunting crowd loses no time in depicting the 'rogue hunters' as the typical American sportsman."

As examples of the sharp rise in game violations, Mr. Page noted that poaching in Oklahoma has increased 200 percent despite game rangers' working as many as 18 hours a day, and that Colorado's Wildlife Enforcement

Chief, Jack Hogue, expects the number of cases of deer and elk jacklighting to double in the last half of the year.

Page emphasized that putting the brakes on poaching will require the cooperative effort of ALL hunters. "Shouldering this responsibility," he added, "is part of the code of the ethical hunter."

The Interior Department has proposed strong federal regulations to put tighter controls on the importation of live wild animals into the country, according to the Wildlife Management Institute.

The regulations are based on scientific determinations that all exotic wildlife is or would be injurious in one way or another to native wildlife or other interests when imported into the U.S. Therefore the proposal would prohibit the importation of all wildlife, except as

allowed by the Secretary under a permit for scientific, educational, zoological or medical purposes.

The regulations also recognize that the risk associated with importing some species is so slight as to permit importation without permit. These would be listed as "low risk" and would not require a permit for importation. Such animals include the canary, golden hamster, bull frog, and most marine fishes.
