

Morry Zenoff Wins Zenger Award

Moritz (Morry) Zenoff, owner, editor and publisher of two Nevada non-daily newspapers--The Henderson Home News and the Boulder City News--has been selected to be the 1974 winner of the coveted John Peter Zenger award, given annually by the Fraternal Order of Eagles.

The award is named for the 18th century New York newspaper editor who was jailed because of his editorials protesting the repressive

measures of the British colonial governors. In his ensuing trial he was acquitted, a verdict that established the historic American principle of freedom of the press.

It will be presented by Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice Robert W. Hansen, who has twice served as grand worthy president of the Eagles and who headed this year's Zenger selection committee. It will be given at the Western Regional Conference of the Eagles at Las

Vegas, Nev., on Saturday, Nov. 16.

"During the past 26 years of Zenoff's 45 years in newspapering, he has devoted his life to so-called country journalism, in which his papers concentrated on home-rule, citizen participation in community affairs, and the promotion of 'chat-over-the-back-fence' way of life," Hansen said. "Boulder City and Henderson both needed assistance in establishing municipal government and

Zenoff's newspapers, often in the face of bitter criticism, battled, informed and educated the path to home rule charters.

"The Zenger award represents above all else freedom of expression and encouraged freedom of all Americans to speak up and be counted--regardless of race, creed or color. Zenoff's Nevada papers, we have found by study, champion citizen reaction and citizen participation," Hansen stated. Zenoff's local history in two

towns show such examples as the newspaper taking the part of management against labor and the plant workers reacting with hundreds of letters to the editor. He printed all of them on page one and the headline read, 'Letters to the Editor.'

The fact that every letter was in opposition had a reverse effect--the citizens realized that its paper would print the

stand of the masses. "At other times the paper

took stands for labor, once aiding in the election of a United States senator, who won by fewer than 100 votes," Hansen added.

Zenoff has served as president of the state press association, the Las Vegas Press Club and the Southern Nevada chapter of Sigma Delta Chi.

Gibson, Sena, Jeffrey Potter Win!

Gibson Re-Elected By 3-1 Margin

State Senator James I. Gibson was re-elected to a third term in the senate Tuesday by a 3-1 vote over his opponent Fire Chief Don Richard.

Unofficial returns showed Gibson's vote 6,116 to 2,170 for his opponent. The senate district was created in 1965 and Gibson was elected to fill that post. In 1970 he was unopposed in the election.

When contacted after the election, Gibson said, "Naturally I'm pleased to have been given this vote of confidence. I'd like to thank all of those who assisted in my campaign and worked in my behalf."

Gibson congratulated Richard for carrying on a clean campaign. Since the two were the only ones to file for the post, they did not run in the primary.

"I'm looking forward to the 1975 legislature," Gibson said, and recognized that there will be many important matters coming before the groups.

"One of the most important issues to be before the legislature will be the problem of financial support for the small cities," Gibson said. "I think this will have to be resolved in the coming legislative session."

"Also we will be faced with necessary legislation to continue the next phase of the Southern Nevada Water Project and the implementation of the advanced water treatment plant for the Las Vegas Valley," Gibson said.

"I also anticipate there will be some meaningful legislation in the area of support for our elderly citizens by way of tax relief or tax rebates."

"One of the issues which there was considerable concern expressed in this campaign was the work done with the Urban Action Committee's report and particularly

its major recommendations on annexation and consolidation. With the feeling of the Voters of our district, our mission will be to protect the autonomy of the smaller communities.

"One of the things I will work to do is to change the election laws so that at least the candidates will know where they stand on election night, as well as the people," Gibson concluded.

New Councilman?

With the election of Councilman Jack Jeffrey to the State Assembly, the city will be faced with appointing a new city councilman.

The council, which consists of four councilmen and a Mayor, already has two appointed councilmen, Dick Stewart and Carlton Lawrence. If another councilman is appointed, the majority of the council will be appointed.

Only Mayor Cruz Olague and Councilman Lorin Williams will remain as elected by the people.

Jeffrey said he had mixed emotions as he ran for the assembly seat, in giving up his council post. His term would expire in June.

Jeffrey Glad Campaign Is Over

Councilman Jack Jeffrey, who won the District 22 seat to the assembly by a narrow margin over incumbent Republican Hal Smith, said, "It was a tough campaign and I'm glad it's over."

Jeffrey said he will resign his council post when he leaves for the legislature in January.

He thanked the people who worked for him throughout his district.

His main interests at the legislature, he said, would be a reform of the probate law so that small estates can be settled without an attorney, some reforms in the Nevada Industrial Commission laws, and to keep the smaller cities away from consolidation.

Final tabulation was 2602 for Jeffrey and 2592 for Smith. A former tie was at 2588 each.

Nash Sena Elected To Assembly Dist. 21

Nash Sena, a newcomer to politics, who captured a large margin of votes over his Republican opponent, Bill Dedmon, was impressed with the people of his district after going door-to-door.

According to unofficial returns, Sena won 2,164 to 565.

"All I can say is to thank the many people who exhibited confidence in me," Sena said. "I won't let them down and I'll work to the best of my ability."

Sena, who wondered if someone was trying to tell him something, suffered all types of tragedies during the cam-

About 70 per cent of Clark County's voters went to the polls Tues. to provide some upsets and re-elect other old-timers to their former posts.

A total of 82,761 out of the county's 119,000 registered voters voted to provide Governor Mike O'Callaghan with a landslide vote as was expected.

Republican Paul Laxalt was elected to the Senate Seat over Democrat Harry Reid.

Laxalt is Nevada's former governor. Congressman David Towell was defeated in his bid for re-election by Jim Santini who has been active in working for the Southern Nevada Museum in Henderson.

In the local races, Senator James I. Gibson was re-elected by an easy margin for another four-year term to the legislature. The unofficial vote showed Gibson with 6,116 to 2,170 for Challenger Don Richard.

Nash Sena, with a vote 2,164 to Billy Dedmon's 575, was elected for Assembly District 21.

In a close race for Assembly District 22, Jack Jeffrey was elected over Incumbent Republican Hal Smith. This race ended in a tie at 2588.

The unofficial final total was Jeffrey, 2602 and Smith, 2592.

In the constable's race, incumbent Fritz Crisler was re-elected for another term over challenger David Walker. The tally was Crisler 2,706 and Walker, 1,764.

He was bit by a dog while going door to door--he lost his best friend and campaign manager in an auto accident during the early party of the campaign--his wife was taken to the hospital--and last week he had an emergency appendectomy.

Basic To Withdraw From AAA League?

Basic High School Principal Frank Brusa today will appeal to the Nevada Inter-scholastic activities association from the South at a meeting at Lake Tahoe, to allow Basic High School to withdraw from the Southern Nevada Triple A football conference for a period of two years.

Brusa is making the appeal after

a losing football season with the Wolves winning only one game. He said he is asking for the two-year time to try to rebuild the football program at Basic High School. At the end of two years the football program would be evaluated to see if the Wolves are ready for AAA conference play again.

The withdrawal from the AAA conference in football would not effect the basketball, wrestling or baseball programs, or those of the

girls.

In presenting the request, which Brusa believes will be approved, some of the stastics he will present show that in the two year period Basic has been in the AAA conference, the football team has had no wins and 15 losses. The only Triple A win was last year over Eldorado, but at that time Eldorado was not in the League.

He will show that Basic High

School has an enrollment of 940 students in the 10 through 12 grades, while other schools in the county have an enrollment of over 2,000.

Brusa said that during the two year period Basic has an enrollment shut out nine times, and has chalked up 72 points as compared to 475 made by its opponents.

During the two years Basic would be out of the AAA league.

Brusa said it would schedule games as a AAA Independent team which would allow for free-lance scheduling with teams from equal size schools. Some schools which have expressed interest in playing Basic are Cedar City, Utah, St. George Utah, Kingman, Ariz., Kennedy High School in Barstow, White Pine and Fallon.

"Community support is essential to a football program and we feel the football players and the com-

munity need to have their morale lifted," Brusa said. "In the two year period we are out of the league we can rebuild the program

and give the kids some confidence again," he said. Then if they feel the school is ready for Triple A ball they will request to rejoin.

Brusa feels the football program is essential to the morale of the school

When it was announced that Publisher Morry Zenoff had won the Peter Zenger award through the National organization of Eagles, the people in the cities of Henderson and Boulder City must have met the news with mixed reaction

A newspaper editor can never be popular with the majority of people as has been evidenced when they have run for public office. Usually they meet with sounding defeat. Someone always has an ax to grind.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Morry chose sports as his field. He got a job in the journalistic field for the Hearst papers when jobs were hard to find, and with his energy and drive, won acclaim for his reporting.

He bought the Henderson and Boulder City Newspapers in 1948 and thus became a controversial figure in this area. I became associated with the newspaper shortly after he purchased it and have been in and out of the organization ever since. Morry's office wall is covered with letters of resignation from me.

I have disagreed with him on almost everything. Like politics, religion, how to handle stories, dealing with people, what to drink, the way to spell words, salary, working hours, and you name it -- we disagree.

The only reason Morry keeps me on is that since we usually think opposite, he feels it is fair to the community to represent opposing views. Most people might not give that idea any consideration but that is his feeling.

He has jumped into fights and areas where even the angels would fail to tread.

He has been right and he has

been wrong, but whichever way he goes, he will defend his stand.

Most times he is fair and allows those who feel differently to use his columns to give their views.

Take me, for instance. If there is a dirty job to do I am editor and must think like a man and stand up and be managing editor. If I assert myself I am only an employe and have no say on policy.

Some of the things he does that people don't know include helping hundreds of 'downers and outers' with money from his own pocket. He has one favorite indigent who shows up regularly for a hand-out. A widow needs to put in a thank-you ad but has no money--it goes in at Morry's expense.

Morry's wife, Eva, asks the butcher how to tell if some meat is spoiled. The butcher says to feed it to Morry and if he doesn't die the meat is ok.

Morry bought a movie camera and spent the first roll of film taking pictures of his own schnozz as he held the camera backwards.

Deathly afraid of guns, Morry walked around for several months with a live shell hanging around his neck as an ornament.

Morry believes if a man is paying your salary you don't need to love him but you should deliver the goods and put in an honest day's work. He detests talking when you should be working.

He respects great minds and when he relaxes, he does it completely and blocks out any nagging problems he might have.

Whatever his hang-ups are, his loyal staff congratulates him on his honor.

Constable Council Actions In Brief

A motion to approve the architectural design of a dental building on Pacific street was made by Councilman Dick Stewart Monday Night and it was approved unanimously.

Dr. Montgomery was present and said due to the present conditions of financing, it may be some time before the Spanish type construction is started.

A minor subdivision map for Evalyn Morrell was approved for section 19. Another minor subdivision map for George and Ida Fox was approved for section 27.

Authorization was given by the council to call for applications for towing service for the city.

Councilman Dick Stewart asked what the city had been doing since the contract ran out in June. City Manager Don Dawson said the city is operating under the old contract.

Franchise ordinances for Continental Telephone Co., Nevada Power Co., and California Pacific Utilities Co. were approved by the council. The new franchises are for 25 years of service.

The vacation of the alleyway in block 35 of the Henderson Townsite, fronting on Atlantic and Magnesium, was approved by the city council.

A requirement was placed on the transaction for property owners to have the area surveyed and a plat made at the property owner's expense. The property owners will also have to pay to have the water meters moved at city cost and that gates be included to provide access for maintenance. It was also stipulated that a 20 foot utility easement be provided.

A bid by the Bank of Nevada to provide a loan of \$200,000 at 6.85 percent interest was approved as an emergency loan to finance

Local Residents Can Use Dump Transfer Free

Councilman Dick Stewart complained Mon. night at the city council meeting that local residents should not be required to carry a city utility bill with them to have the privilege of dumping at the new transfer station without paying.

"Some people, like those who live in trailer parks, do not pay a utility bill as such, but they should be allowed to dump," Stewart said. Stewart suggested that the resident wishing to dump for no charge, be able to use his driver's license or other identification showing that he is a resident of Henderson.

City Manager Don Dawson

agreed that arrangements would be made with Black Mountain Disposal Co. to use other identification.

Those not residing within the city or contractors are required to pay \$4 a ton to dump at the transfer station. Discussion also centered around where contractors could dump large materials such as concrete or paving. Public Works Director Bob Whitney said the city will make a provision for that type of dumping when the contractor comes to the city for a license.

The dump is open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. daily and from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on Sundays.

Children Not Safe In Parks Claims Citizen

Complaints that the city parks are not safe for women and children were made to the city council Mon. night by George Zohovetz who asked the council to take action to provide protection.

He suggested that the city have someone in the park from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. such as a police officer to provide protection. He also said he does not believe there is enough police protection. He told the council he has started a petition to ask the city to provide better protection. He claimed several children and women had been attacked at the park.

City Manager Don Dawson said it was his belief that the parents of the children have responsibility to provide protection at the parks. He said, "It boils down to the cost of labor." He said the city could have partial coverage but could not guarantee a man at the parks at every hour because there are to be four parks and not enough men.

Councilman Lorin Williams suggested that perhaps the city could designate hours such as from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. since schools are now in session.

Councilman Jack Jeffrey suggested the city define the problem and then find the solution. It was then turned over to the administration for study.

Police Chief Floyd Osborn said after the meeting there is no big problem in the parks as to rapists. He said there are no recent reports of attacks in the parks.

Lewis Homes To Pay Health Dept. \$50,000 Penalty Clinic Schedule

An interest rate of ten percent was placed by the city on a \$50,000 penalty payment owed by Ralph Lewis of Lewis Homes who purchased land from the city.

The penalty was placed on the land because development did not take place during a certain period as outlined in the land sales contract.

According to the motion made by Councilman Jack Jeffrey, the \$50,000 can be paid over a five-year period at \$10,000 per year at ten percent simple interest.

The penalty was in line with the penalties placed on other city land purchasers who failed to fulfill their development clauses.

Henderson Dodge was awarded the bid for six police squad cars, one four-wheel drive utility vehicle, one half-ton pickup cab and chassis and one station wagon although it was a higher bid.

The total price was \$39,911, over \$500 over the lowest bid.

FIVE YEARS AGO Nov. 4-6, 1969

The first water heater to come off the assembly line of State Stove and Mfg. Co., in the BMI plant, was presented as a gift to the City and was placed on display in City Hall.

The City Council met to study 91 applications for land at special study session. The largest were 3200 acres requested by H. M. Greenspun; 40 acres each, Arthur Liebert and Robert Fields and 1000 acres, A. Liebert and C. Liebert.

Boulder City Post 31, American Legion announced plans for Veterans' Day observance, Nov. 11, at the Veterans marker on Fifth Street and Ave. B. The program included the playing of the National Anthem by the high school band, invocation by Chaplain Luke Whalen, welcome address by Mayor James B. French and guest speaker County Commissioner Bob Broadbent. Following the program coffee and donuts were served and the Girl Scouts were presented with a flag which Alan Bible had flown over the U.S. Capitol in Washington D.C.

An open letter to the Heroes of Railroad Pass, read in part: On the night of Oct. 31, following the tragic collision of a station wagon and a fuel tanker at an intersection called "Railroad Pass" there was assembled as large a collection of real heroes as one might hope to find anywhere.

Not a man there would call himself a hero, though each could probably cite an act of courage performed by "the other guy."

Trucks and men of three competing tow services worked as a team to lift and hold the wreckage while several men of the fire department and tow service worked underneath and inside the overturned truck cab to free the injured

driver. Combined fire department personnel and reservists foaming and washing down fuel leaking from the wreckage. Boulder City police and Nevada Highway Patrol maintaining communications and traffic control.

The tremendous courage of the driver, fully conscious of his fate should the wreckage slip or some spark ignite the fuel or fumes surrounding him.

Every man there put his life on the line. In my book that makes them all heroes I'm very proud to be a Nevadan, where there are people of this caliber.

TEN YEARS AGO Nov. 3-5, 1964

Librarian Lydia Malcolm, assistant librarian Helen Van Wagene, and Barney Cannon, chairman, Henderson District Library Trustees, attended the Nevada Library Association convention held at Stateline, Lake Tahoe.

Mrs. Malcolm, association chairman, presided at the meetings. Cannon, chairman-elect of the Nevada Association of Library Trustees, participated in a panel discussion.

Thirteen well known Nevada authors were present to autograph their books.

The Basic Wolves dumped White Pine 19-0 in their second game of the season. Outstanding players were Denny Ballew, Bratton Booth, Frank Levy, Denny England, Joe Tram and Jim Campbell.

Mr. and Mrs. Margareto Montoya, whose home at 314 Kansas was burned last week, expressed their gratitude to the people here who supplied clothing for them and their children as well as almost all necessary furniture and household items. Their new home is in Victory Village.

I voted twice in the

1964 election, once for myself and once for a myopic gentleman whom an election worker asked me to assist as he couldn't see well enough to read the names and instructions on the voting machine. His politics and mine were exactly opposite and I actually voted for Goldwater and Johnson, Cannon and Laxalt, Baring and Von Tobel, La Porta and Bulloch, and a host of other Democrats and Republicans.

TWENTY YEARS AGO Nov. 2-4 1954

Colvin S. Smith, Jr., manager of the Bank of Nevada here, was named President of the Chamber of Commerce at a special meeting of the new board of directors. Serving with Smith were Harve Perry, first vice president; Paul Dickover, second vice president; Cecile Becker, treasurer and Grace Byrne, secretary.

Chief of Police George Crisler received the Gold Seal of Progress award from the Chamber of Commerce in Mission, Texas.

The award was given in recognition of the outstanding citizenship and wholehearted and generous contribution to the growth and progress of the community.

All was quiet on the local water front after the city, Nov. 3, 1954, purchased the water and sewer systems from Basic Management, Inc., for \$106,371, after a hard-fought battle over the water rights.

The old Home News building was moved to Victory Village and became the parsonage for the Temple Baptist Church (Southern), Rev. Mark Daniel Pastor.

An estimated one thousand persons attended dedication ceremonies at the grotto, "Our Lady of the Highway," at St. Peter's Catholic Church.

Bishop Gorman of Dallas, Texas delivered the message and the Sisters of St. Domine enacted the living rosary.

Mayor James B. French gave a welcoming address and the Rev. Peter V. Moran, pastor of St. Peter's, served as master of ceremonies.

Fashioned in a manner similar to the shrine at Lourdes, France, the beautiful shrine took two years to complete. It was constructed by Joe Del Bianco of Bakersfield, Calif. using native rock from nearby mountains, blending the natural colors of Nevada stone into this work of art.

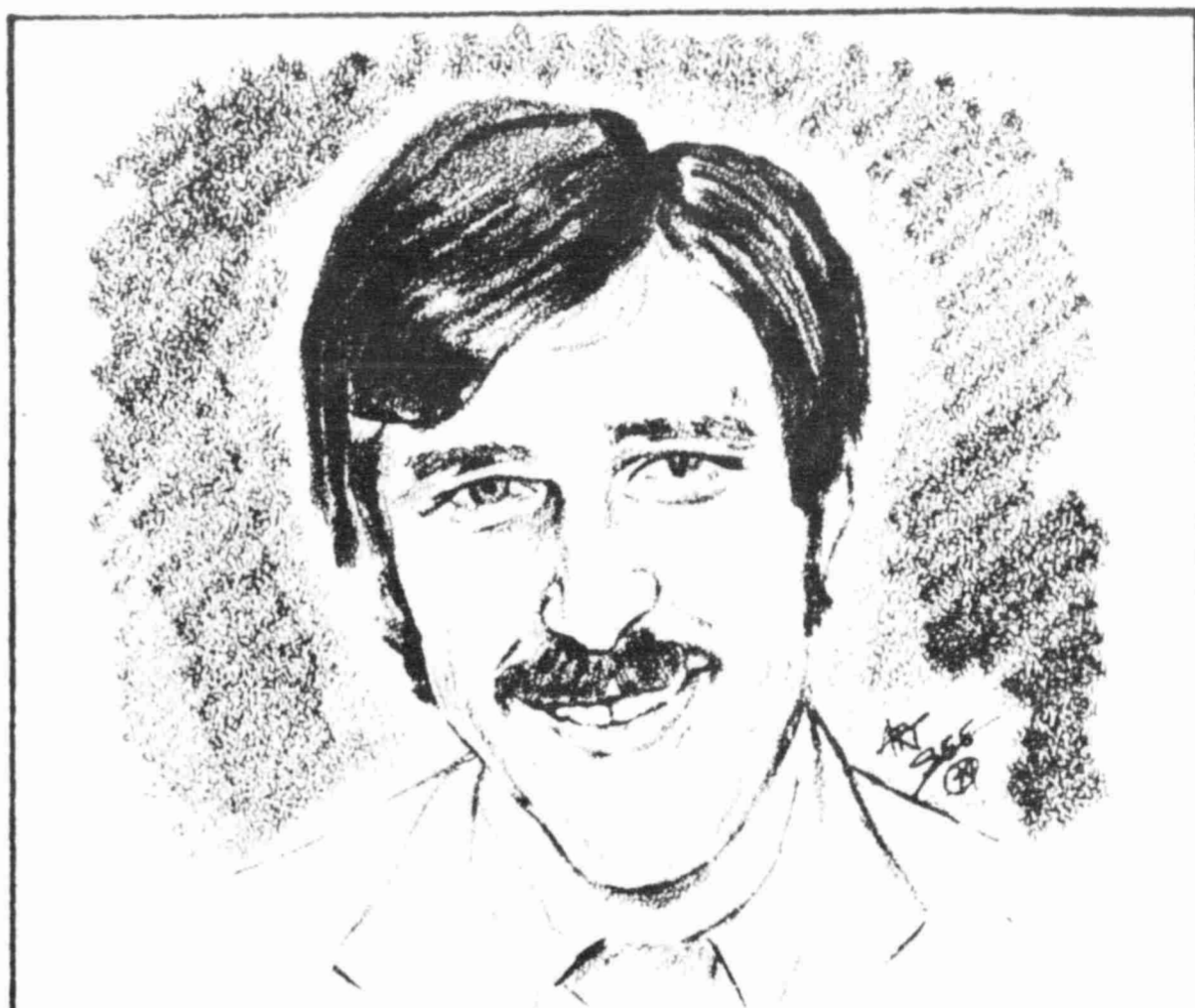

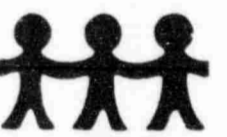

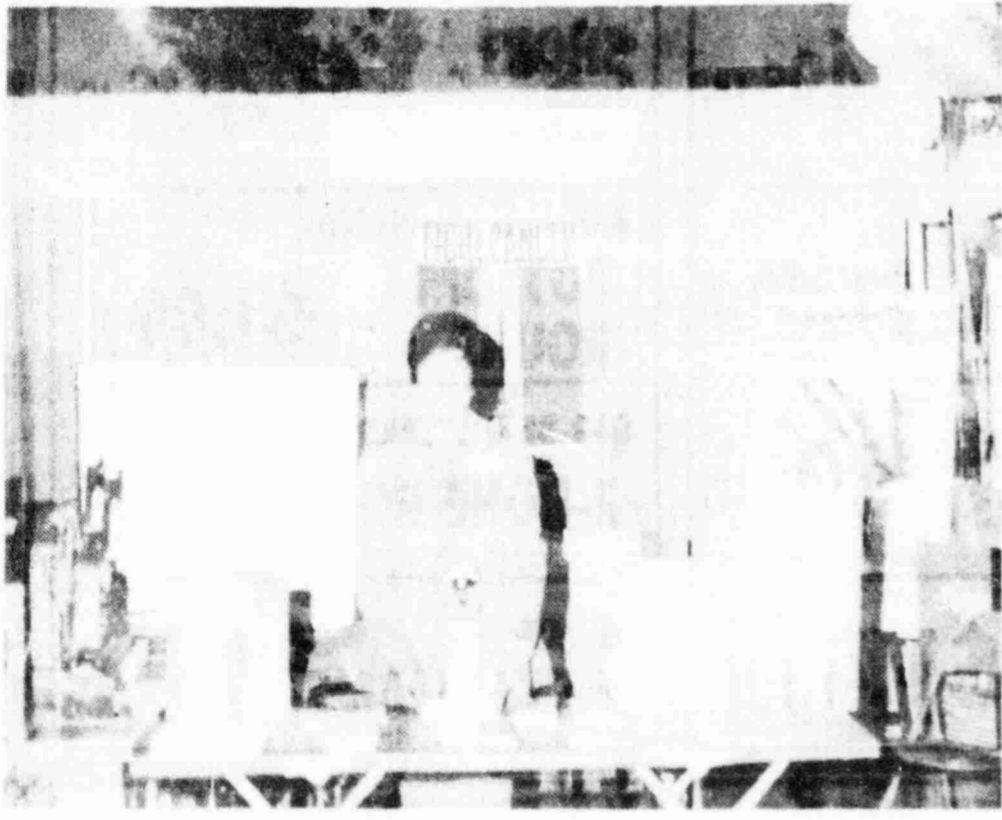

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Who Was John Peter Zenger?

Editor's Note:

When Morry Zenoff was notified that he will receive the John Peter Zenger award, it prompted us all to ask -- "Who

was John Peter Zenger?" The following article was taken from an article, "Who Authored Our Liberties?" We reprint it for your interest.

The Author of American Liberties? Not Patrick Henry and his speeches.

Not Thomas Jefferson and his writings.

Not George Washington and his leadership.

The author of American liberties was a German immigrant boy who came to these shores long before there was a United States of America.

His name was John Peter Zenger. He landed a job in a New York City print shop, served his apprenticeship, saved his money and, in 1726, went into business for himself.

The newspaper he started, the New York Weekly Journal, was a newspaper different from any other in the colonies. In it he attacked the British colonial governors and their tyrannical policies. So John was not very popular with the reigning governors, the ruling class or the other newspaper editors.

An indictment for treason, calling for the death penalty, was sought against Zenger. Instead, the grand jury indicted him for malicious libel.

Zenger went to jail. He wrote his editorials from the jail cell. The jailers took away from him the paper and writing materials. John Peter then shouted his editorials through the barred window to his wife who wrote them down and printed them in the weekly paper.

Then came the trial. John's lawyer was Alexander Hamilton. In his plea to the jury, lawyer Hamilton said:

"The question before the court and you, Gentlemen of the Jury, is not of small or private concern. It is not the cause of a poor printer alone which you now try. No! It may in its consequences affect every freeman. It is the cause of liberty . . . for securing to ourselves, our posterity and our neighbors, that to which nature and the laws of our country have given us -- as a right -- the liberty both of exposing arbitrary power and (in these parts of the world at least) of speaking and writing the truth." That 1735 Jury Verdict has

been termed "the germ of American Freedom, the morning affirmation that man as man had certain inalienable rights not safely to be delegated to the holders of public power. The weekly newspaper publisher who risked his life to assert his right to print and publish the truth was the real author of our American liberties.

It is true that, as a price for approving a federal constitution with federal authorities and powers, the people insisted upon a First Amendment spelling out inalienable freedoms including freedom of worship, freedom of press, freedoms of expression and assembly, and a less frequently discussed Ninth Amendment reserving to the people all powers not delegated to government. The reiteration did not make basic individual freedoms a grudging gift from government. Freedom of worship derives from the spiritual nature of man. Freedom of press derives from the right to seek and publish the truth. Freedom of expression and assembly derive from the social nature of man.

These basic rights of people in the non-governmental areas of living are not for government to give or take away. They constitute an independent sector of living in which people may do as they please, not as someone else pleases.

The current attacks of American Bar Association leaders on the right of news media to cover criminal trials seems an effort to transplant the English system of a news blackout on court proceedings to American soil. The proponents have going for them individual cases of prejudicial press coverage, as in the Shepard case, and the fact that the brain-washing techniques of some big city dailies have destroyed reader confidence in their fairness and objectivity.

But removing a case from a center of press and public pressure, as was done in the Speck murder case, is a far better answer than blacking out a whole community to insure that 12 jurors are kept ignorant of the details of the crime. You ought not plunge a town into

darkness because the light might affect some future juror's eyesight. Even an occasional mistrial or reversal is a small price to pay for protecting the public's right to know what is going on -- in the courts as well as in the community.

A few weeks ago, the current president of the American Bar Association was asked, "What would you do about it -- censor all the press?" He answered, "I think that -- yes, I would, I would myself. I know it is an unpopular thing to say. But I would." He is mistaken. The issue is not one of popularity

or unpopularity. The question is whether there is to remain in America an area of personal and associational freedoms outside the reach and range of government. Freedom of press happens, as is usually the case, to be the first target. But newspaper publishers and radio-TV broadcasters ought not to be left to fight the fight alone. If they lose today, others will lose tomorrow, and we will be on our way to that all-embracing state in which government is everywhere and everything. Then government of the people, by the people, for the people will be replaced by government of a small elite, by a central propaganda apparatus, for an atomized populace.

Ted Marshall To Command Marine Reserve



Headquarters, United States Marine Corps, at Treasure Island, San Francisco, California, has activated Voluntary Training Unit (VTU) 12-9 in Las Vegas to serve the Southern Nevada metropolitan area.

This is the first time the Marine Corps has ever established an organized Reserve command in Southern Nevada. VTU 12-9 is an authorized Reserve Staff unit with emphasis on staff planning and training activities. All present members of the Marine Corps Reserve, and all former Marines who have been discharged from active service, who hold rank to Staff Sergeant or above are eligible to join. Participation is in non-pay status, for reserve retirement points and related benefits only.

Edward G. (Ted) Marshall, prominent Las Vegas attorney, who holds the rank of Major in the Marine Corps Reserve, has been designated Commanding Officer of the new unit. Marshall is a lifetime resident of Las Vegas and is the former District Attorney of Clark County (1963-67). He is a graduate of numerous Marine Corps Reserve training programs including, most recently, the Command and Staff School at Quantico, Virginia.

Major Marshall has indicated that it is the eventual hope of the Marine Corps to organize a reinforced Rifle Company in the Southern Nevada metropolitan area. Whether or not public support, and the support of former Marine Corps personnel, will justify such action remains to be seen. Much will depend

upon the response that is achieved with VTU 12-9 which is viewed as a preliminary effort toward the greater objective.

Regular meeting hours and times for drill activities have not yet been specified. Scripture For The Week: Luke 6:46 thru 49.

Recently I read an article written by Author and Lecturer Jamie Buckingham in which he said, "I personally wish we would stop defining people as 'charismatics'. It's not a New Testament designation. The 'charismatics' of today were simply normal Christians in the New Testament. However, one of the weaknesses of those who, in these last days, are moving up to normal Christianity has been the tendency to climb higher before their foundation has been secured. Jesus said that on judgment day there will be some who say they healed the sick, cast out demons, even performed miracles in his name. Yet they were not Christians because they only heard his commandments; they did not practice them personally."

That's heavy teaching!! To explain it Jesus talked about the necessity of putting down a foundation before building a house. The rock foundation is discipleship!!

Jesus also said that for those who believe, signs and wonders would follow. Yet we have taken that statement and gone wild, not realizing it was given as the graduation address after three years of intense training in discipleship.

I believe the reason we're not seeing more "signs and wonders" is we don't have disciples. We're spawning a generation of people who don't have time to sit still or get quiet long enough to wait on the Lord, who don't have time to live disciplined lives. All they want are miracles, without being willing to pay the price for them.

Before we seek to heal the sick, let's make sure we're personally committed to the Great

Physician. Let's make certain that we have repented of our sin, that we have forgiving all our enemies (and friends), that our homes are in order, and that we are really submitted to a local body. Let the disciplines of giving, fasting and praying be truly established in our personal lives. Then we can move on to signs and wonders.

One of my favorite stories has to do with a mother bird who built a beautiful nest high in a tree. Only the nest had no bottom. When questioned about it the mother said, "Oh, I just love to lay eggs but I hate the responsibility of having to raise babies."

Most of us have been caught in the "soul-winners - syndrome". Jesus, however, never commanded his followers to become soul-winners. Rather he told them to go and make disciples. Discipleship means (1) being responsible to someone else and (2) having someone for whom you are responsible. Being responsible for someone is far more than soul-winning. It means seeing people through. It means sticking with a person - for years if necessary - until he comes into full maturity. It means seeing the potential in a Simon Peter when, even after three years of intense training, he lets you down. We brag about winning thousands. Jesus was satisfied to spend his time with twelve - or three - or one.

Christianity is more than obstetrics. It is pediatrics, public health, internal medicine, diagnostic care, surgery and geriatrics. In short, it is a life of discipleship. Years after Jesus returned to heaven his followers were still known as disci-
